Fenton — Here's the latest news on roundabouts in Fenton: There won't be one at Shiawassee and Adelaide streets, nor at LeRoy Street/Silver Lake Road. A roundabout at LeRoy Street

and North Road is a possibility in 2012, in conjunction with the North LeRoy Street construction project. The Fenton Downtown Development Authority (DDA) Board has tabled, for an undisclosed time, the roundabout issue for these intersections. The DDA might evaluate the situation five years from now, but nothing will happen anytime soon, said DDA Director and Assistant City Manager Michael Burns. The suggestion for roundabouts at Shiawassee and Adelaide streets, and Le-Roy Street/Silver Lake Road, was from consultant Dan Burden, who visited Fenton



Tyrone Twp.—A frozen septic system pump created a mess at the township hall a few weeks ago. No one was aware the pump wasn't working, and when a toilet flushed, the septic system overflowed.

The township board has approved the purchase of an alarm that will alert people

when the septic pump isn't working correctly. It happened on a Thursday, and blowers ran for a few days for drying, Clerk Keith Kremer said. Cleanup cost \$2,500.

An alarm is estimated to cost \$302, the lid is around \$80-100 and installation is \$100. Township officials are asking for a formal bid, from Lashbrook Septic.

The new alarm has a battery that will need changing every two years, said Trustee Steve Hasbrouck. Township officials should test it occasionally.

► The Holly Village Council has initiated the process for the hiring of a new village manager and police chief. both the village manager, and police chief search.

Council member Sandra Kleven made a motion that all council members read over the applications for village man-

ager and turn in five top choices by Dec 7. The motion was supported by Council member Don Winglemire.

A personnel subcommittee will review the top choices selected by the council members. President Jeff Miller, council members Pauline Kenner and Jackie Campbell will serve on the committee.

Interim Village Manager Jerry Walker said the manager position would be filled before a police chief is hired. He will send out notices for the position of police chief by the end of November, with a 30-day deadline.

A committee will narrow down the applicants. That committee will include the Holly Village manager, Lt. Gary Parsons of the Michigan State Police, village of Lake Orion Police Chief Jerry Narsh, Holly Area Schools Superintendent Kent Barnes, retired police officer and Council member Tom Clark, and an area clergy member, yet to be decided.

Walker said the committee would likely meet in January to begin narrowing down the applications. A permanent selection will be made in either late January or sometime in February.

Police Chief Rollie Gackstetter will



retire Dec. 17, leaving a gap to be filled by either a ranking sergeant of Holly Village Police, or current interim manager Jerry Walker. Walker is a certified police officer who spent five years in the dual role of police chief and city manager of Walled Lake from 2003 to 2005.

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

While most American families might shy away from serving venison on Thanksgiving, a standing rib roast of beef or a crown roast of pork or lamb can offer a different twist on the traditional fare of hearty meat served this holiday.

At the Fenton Hotel, where owner Nick Sorise expects to serve 550 Thanksgiving diners between 12 and 6 p.m., the second most popular entrée, next to turkey, will be prime rib. "We'll serve our traditional turkey dinner to about 60 percent

of our guests on Thanksgiving, but the next most popular entrees will be prime rib and whitefish," said Sorise. He himself enjoys more fish



entrees, even during holidays, but will likely indulge in turkey with his staff, when all the serving is done.

Speaking of seafood, meaty cuts of salmon and shellfish dinners are also festive ways to celebrate the holiday. In fact, this writer's family often served a very rich and delectable seafood lasagna (see recipe) on Thanksgiving, or a marinated flank steak on a platter accented with leaf lettuce, topped with spiced apple rings, along with a traditional turkey breast. Instead of pumpkin pie, there was often a French Chocolate Pie with an Oatmeal Pie Crust, for dessert.

Fowl is another tasty alternative to turkey, especially the more exotic varieties not served every day. Maybe your family would enjoy Cornish game hens, duck or quail.

Fenton resident, Penny Fausey, recalls eating capons as she was growing up, still to this day preferring the taste of chicken to turkey. "Whether we serve chicken or turkey, it's always fresh and farmraised without antibiotics or hormones," said Fausey.

What she remembers more than the food served on Thanksgiving is the laughter and the fun of being together with family. "Probably our most memorable, one year when our kids were in high school and we went to my sister's home in Ohio," recalled Fausey. "It was one of those years when everything was just a bit 'off' for our family, and my Dad picked up take-out Chinese food for our dinner. We still had my mother's famous pecan pie, so that was traditional, but I can still remember all the laughter and fun of the day.'

That's just more proof that all you need on Thanksgiving Day is the right spirit of being thankful. The food that is served is not nearly as important.

RECIPES

Seafood lasagna

INGREDIENTS:

12 lasagna noodles

3T. butter ½ c. chopped shallots

1/3 c. green pepper, finely chopped

1/3 c. red pepper, finely chopped

2 cloves garlic, minced 2 T. flour

1 t. dry mustard

½ cup dry vermouth

6 T. tomato paste

½ c. minced parsley

3 T. chopped chives (optional)

2 t. salt

1/4 t. hot red pepper sauce

3 c. light cream

1½ c. shredded Swiss cheese

½ c. freshly grated Parmesan cheese, divided

6 ozs. frozen crabmeat, cooked and thawed

8 ozs. lobster, cooked and cut into small chunks

6 ozs. shrimp, cooked and cut in half 6 ozs. scallops, cooked and cut in half

PREPARATION:

Cook lasagna noodles, drain, rinse in cold water and set aside. In medium saucepan, melt butter, stir in shallots, peppers and garlic. Cook over medium heat 7-8 minutes, until peppers are just tender. Stir in flour and dry mustard; cook, stirring one minute. Stir in vermouth, tomato paste, parsley, chives, salt and hot pepper sauce; simmer 2 minutes. Add light cream, stirring constantly and bring to a boil for 1 minute, stirring frequently. Remove from heat and stir in Swiss cheese and 6 T. of the Parmesan cheese. Pour 1½ cups of the sauce into a small bowl; set aside. To remaining sauce in pan, add drained crabmeat and other seafood; mix well and spoon 11/4 cups onto bottom of 9- by 13-inch pan. Cover with three lasagna noodles. Continue layering alternately with seafood sauce and noodles, ending with last three noodles. Spread reserved 11/2 cups sauce on top and sprinkle with reserved 2 T. of Parmesan cheese. Cover pan with foil and bake at 350 degrees for 20 minutes. Remove foil and bake uncovered for another 25 to 30 minutes, until bubbly and lightly browned on top. Remove from oven and let stand for 10 minutes before cutting. Eight servings. It helps to have two people in the kitchen making this recipe — one cutting and chopping the ingredients, while the other assembles it together.

French Chocolate Pie

From the kitchen of Mark and Sally Rummel of Fenton Oatmeal Pie Crust

INGREDIENTS:

½ c. butter, softened

⅓ c. sugar

½ t. vanilla 1/4 t. salt

3/4 c. rolled oats, quick or old-fashioned

PREPARATION:

In medium bowl, cream together butter, sugar, vanilla and salt until smooth and fluffy. Mix in oats, add flour and mix until thick dough is formed. Press into bottom and sides of lightly greased 9-inch pie pan and flute edges with fingers or fork. Bake at 350 degrees for 15 to 18 minutes until lightly browned. Remove and cool completely. Serves eight.

Chocolate Pie Filling

INGREDIENTS:

1 (6 oz.) pkg. semi-sweet chocolate chips 3/4 cup butter

3 eggs

1 c. confectioners' sugar

1 c. heavy cream, whipped with 2 T. sugar and ½ t. vanilla

Semi-sweet chocolate curls

PREPARATION:

Melt chocolate in double boiler over medium heat; keep warm. Cream butter at high speed of electric mixer until light and fluffy, about 10 minutes (no shortcuts). Add eggs one at a time, beating three minutes after each addition (no shortcuts). Add sugar and beat lightly. Add vanilla and salt and beat until well combined. Quickly fold in hot melted chocolate, just until no streaks remain. Pour into prepared Oatmeal Pie Crust and chill at least two to three hours. Just before serving, spread whipping cream over top and sprinkle with shaved chopped chocolate curls. Cut into thin wedges.

Coin shopping on television, yes or no?

Although many of us have at least one relative that finds some joy in purchasing a variety of different consumer goods from the comfort of their couch, the actual value of the items they are buying are suspect.

First and foremost, remember that having an item put on national television costs a great deal of money for those investing in their product, so the return needs to be extremely high. Often you will see a variety of different "modern" variations of coins, such has painted silver eagles, Twin Tower Commemoratives, and presidential dollars with a colorized stickers attached to the face. These items are NOT going to increase in value over the years any more than their US mint official counterparts. Often times they are "dressed up" and defaced, to make them look unique (i.e. gold plated, colorized, fancy packaging etc.) this decreases the value in many instances, and ruins the coin. Television, while entetaining to watch, should not be a standard to which one should judge value. Coins should be purchased through a reputable dealer/directly from the US Mint. Rule of thumb: If it comes from an independent mint or television: be skeptical.

paying half of the cost to repair the sidewalk in front of their land. The city pays the other half, said Assistant City Manager Michael Burns. No one has come forward to use the program.

Sidewalks are addressed if someone complains about one, said Department of Public Works Director Les Bland.

Complaints are written up and go to the property owner. The building and zoning administrator informs

residents of complaints.

Some sidewalks are replaced as part of street projects. The sidewalks by The French Laundry were done as part of the Adelaide Street project, Bland said. Handicap ramps were added at the intersection of Shiawassee and Elizabeth streets, so the city manager and assistant city manager decided to have the old sidewalk taken out for everything would look new.

Sidewalks can be damaged when tree roots push them up. In addition, sidewalks can crack and vegetation can begin growing in them. Different concrete was used in the '50s than what people use today, and concrete can get old and need replacing.

The cost to replace a sidewalk is based on square feet, Bland said. Tree roots pushed the sidewalk up in front of his house, and it cost him a little more than \$200 to fix six flags of it. Concrete costs around \$80 to \$90 per yard.

Bland performed the labor himself, but he said a contractor, such as Free-

> man Brothers, could be paid to do the work.

> At Fenton's annual budget worksession in April, city

attorney Stephen Schultz said the Supreme Court threw all Michigan cities a "big curve ball." Previously, if a defect in a sidewalk was less than 2 inches, the sidewalk was considered to be in good repair. If someone tripped, fell, and sued for injuries, there was a presumption that the sidewalk was in good repair if it met the 2-inch guideline.

But, the Supreme Court struck this down. Someone can now stumble over a sidewalk defect that is a half-inch in size and say the city should have fixed it, Schultz said. In addition, the new standard for sidewalks is 5 feet wide, instead of 3 feet.

in the spring. There were many philosophical differences on the issue - especially on a roundabout for Shiawassee and Adelaide streets — between Burden and Fenton's consultants from Hubbell, Roth & Clark and DLZ, Burns said.

In addition, if a roundabout were placed at Shiawassee and Adelaide streets, and Fenton used state or federal grant money for the project, it would need clearances from the Michigan Historic Preservation Office. There would also be the issue of acquiring easements from property owners on the north side of the intersection, for using some of their land, he said.

At LeRoy Street and Silver Lake Road, a roundabout would cost the city a lot of parking spaces, Burns said. In addition, the DDA recently purchased the former Republic Bank site near that intersection,

for redevelopment.

A possible, future location for a roundabout could be at North Road and LeRoy Street, where three sections of roadway meet, he said. It could take place with the North LeRoy construction project, scheduled in 2012. "Roundabouts tend to fit strange intersections and traffic configurations," Burns said. "A roundabout could solve some issues at that intersection. I don't know for sure, but it might."

In addition, the intersection at Shiawassee and Adelaide streets will get new mast arm traffic lights, at no cost to the city and DDA, as part of the Congestion Mitigation Air Quality federal grant Fenton is using to synchronize traffic lights on Owen Road. This project will be up and running in the spring, and the new mast arm traffic light will be like the one at LeRoy and Caroline streets.

DDA board members Jim Saule and Doug James spent a lot of time evaluating roundabouts, Burns said. "I believe it was good to take the time to properly evaluate what was recommended to us by someone who knows more about street design and creating walkable communities than any of us do."

Holly Twp. — The Holly Township board is considering providing garbage

services to its residents, and after much research, still needs one thing — feedback from the residents.

The issue would go to a vote November 2012. A town-hall meeting would be conducted prior to the election. "It's just something we're mulling over, but we do want more public input," said Clerk Karin Winchester.

Six residents provided such feedback at the board of trustee's meeting on Wednesday.

"We got a mixed reaction from the public," Winchester said. Some residents did not like the idea of more government services, while village residents supported their garbage services provided by the village.

Supervisor Jesse Lambert encourages feedback from residents, which will be added to a report that will go to the town-



ship board at its April 2011 meeting. The report will be included in a newsletter that will be mailed to residents with the July tax statements. The newsletter will also set a date for a town hall meeting to

discuss the topic.

The assessment would likely cost less than what residents are paying already for individually contracted services, said Lambert. Recycling, large item, and yard waste removal will probably be part of the service.

"Research supports the benefits to the community,"

said Lambert. "We need to know if the community wants it."

CRACKED TOOTH

Cracked Tooth Syndrome is fairly common in back teeth weakened by large fillings. If the crack goes untreated it can spread or deepen like a crack in your car's windshield, causing part of your tooth to break away. In advanced cracked tooth syndrome situations the tooth may have to have a root canal or may not be restorable at all and need to be extracted. Symptoms of a cracked tooth are sensitivity to biting and hot and cold sensitivity. Symptoms may start out mild but with time can increase as the crack spreads and deepens. It is sometimes difficult to diagnose a cracked tooth. The patient often is unable to pin-point exactly which tooth is sensitive, the crack is rarely evident on a dental x-ray and examination of the tooth reveals no obvious abnormalities. I often have the patient do a bite test for me where I place a "Q-Tip" on a suspect tooth and have the person close the teeth together. If no response, then I move onto the next tooth and test again until I find the culprit tooth. Treatment for a cracked tooth is placement of a crown restoration which offers much needed external reinforcement, preventing the crack from spreading. Early diagnosis is the key. If left untreated a cracked tooth can progress and lead to loss of the tooth.

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Donations continue to come in for 'Justice for Dominick'

The Justice for Dominick fund, established in the memory of Dominick Calhoun, has raised more than \$20,000, to benefit groups who help abused and neglected children.

Rick Calhoun, Dominick's grandfather, said the nonprofit organization, Justice for Dominick, has raised approximately \$21,147 in his grandson's memory. An additional \$10,520 has been raised, which will be put toward construction costs for the Dominick Calhoun amphitheater, to be built at the playscape in downtown Linden. An architect, builder and engineer have been secured for the project, which is expected to cost \$80,000.

Dominick was beaten to death in April, allegedly by his mother's boyfriend, Brandon Hayes. Hayes faces life in prison in connection with the boy's death and Dominick's mother, Corrine Baker faces up to life in prison for allegedly not doing enough to protect her 4-year-old son. Hayes and Baker are behind bars awaiting their trials.

In their attempt to make something positive out of an incomprehensible action, Calhoun and other supporters have been raising funds to help organizations that deal with abuse and neglect.

Justice for Dominick has given two donations, \$2,500 and \$1,000, to the Court Appointed Special Advocate (CASA) for abused children of Genesee County.

A donation of \$2,582 went to Haven,

a domestic violence and sexual assault prevention service based in Oakland County. Another donation of \$1,000 went to the Child Abuse and Neglect Council of Michigan and \$500 was given to Dave Powell, a minister in Linden.

To help purchase a headstone for a young child who was killed in Flint, \$2,000 was donated to Flint Memorial Park

Calhoun said there is still roughly \$8,000 in the account, which is being saved to use toward materials for working on a house to help abused children. They have painting and general carpentry work planned, as well as remodeling the bathroom. Kohler has donated the fixtures.

Calhoun said a volunteer has donated office space where they plan to set up an office, specifically for their fundraising efforts. Approximately \$3,500 of collected donations has been used to cover expenses, including T-shirts, wristbands and office supplies.

Calhoun said proceeds from recent fundraising events, including a softball event and bowl-a-thon are still coming in. Supporters of Justice for Dominick in Saginaw held another bowl-a-thon on Friday.

In the seven months since Dominick's death, Calhoun said he and other supporters have been talking with organizations, such as Whaley's Children Center and Haven to try to determine the best way to help other abused children. "We're finding our way," said Calhoun. "Whatever we do, it's going to be something good."

a result of being tortured and beaten to death, allegedly at the hands of Baker's then live-in boyfriend, Brandon Hayes.

Following Hayes' arrest, Baker was taken into custody in Genesee County and later charged with second-degree child abuse and second-degree murder for allegedly not doing enough to protect Dominick.

Tyler was removed from the couple's Argentine Township apartment and placed in foster care, pending Baker's case. He testified in Genesee County district court, saying his mother's boyfriend abused Dominick and him. The judge added another child abuse count to Hayes' case, based on the boy's testimony.

Baker violated a condition of her probation on a previous offense in Livingston County when she failed to notify the county she had moved. She was convicted and sentenced in August and is serving up to seven years in prison on this, minus credit for time already served.

The next hearing on this case has been scheduled for Feb. 15, 2011 at 1:30 p.m.





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

Tyrone board receives election report

According to a recent report, Tyrone Township has 7,362 registered voters. Of these, 3,883 voted in the Nov. 2 general election. The township sent out 1,132 absentee ballots, 1,068 of which were returned.

Tyrone receives \$2,000 donation for trees

The Tyrone Township Board of Trustees has accepted a Community Initiative sponsorship of \$2,000 from ITC, for trees and other plantings. ITC owns electric transmission lines in the township and removes some trees to avoid potential power outages, said Clerk Keith Kremer. It will be replacing transmission line poles north of Center Road in the spring.

Township requests additional PEG funds for audio/visual technology

Tyrone Township is asking for about \$4,500 in additional Public Education and Government (PEG) fees, to pay for additional communications upgrades. It is making the request of the Fenton Area Cable Television (FACT) Consortium, which distributes PEG fees collected from residents' cable TV bills. Local governments and schools are limited to using PEG money to improve communication with residents, said Deputy Supervisor Brian Miles. Tyrone's request includes a video screen, meeting minute system and scan converter for directly streaming meetings and presentations onto the Internet or Channel 99.

Tyrone recognizes Fenton Tigers Travel Baseball, Inc. as nonprofit organization

The Tyrone Township Board of Trustees has adopted a resolution recognizing Fenton Tigers Travel Baseball, Inc. as a nonprofit, 501 (c)3 organization. David Church, an officer with the organization, said a requirement for obtaining federal nonprofit status is having a local governing body recognize the organization as a nonprofit. Fenton Tigers Travel Baseball would like to hold raffles, golf outings and poker games as fundraisers. Trustee Steve Hasbrouck expressed reservations about using gambling to earn money for sporting events, but voted in favor of recognizing the organization as a nonprofit.

Parkin Lane construction under budget

The construction on Parkin Lane, a private road in Tyrone Township, is almost complete and around \$40,000 under budget, said Clerk Keith Kremer. Residents along the street are paying for the construction with a special assessment, and the township will return any left over money to the property owners in the special assessment district.

Tyrone has new ordinance for mining

The Tyrone Township Board of Trustees has adopted a new extractive regulatory ordinance for sand and gravel mining. Changes include minimizing noise and vibrations for adjacent property, limiting the height of piles of excavated material to 50 feet, and allowing limited concrete crushing. The board approved the new ordinance, 7-0.

New Holly Village Council members take seats, former members recognized

Holly council members William Kuyk, Reisa Hamilton, and Tom McKinney stepped down from Holly Village Council, along with Peter Clemens as president, at the council meeting on Tuesday evening. New members Tom Clark, Jackie Campbell, Jason Hughes and council President Jeff Miller were sworn in. After the new council took their seats, Miller recognized the former president, and council members for their service. Miller gave certificates to Hamilton and Clemens after shaking hands. McKinney was not present, but received applause in abstention.

Police chief recognizes officers for service

Holly Village Police Chief Rollie Gackstetter recognized officers Jose Garcia and Heather Wolkow for safely arresting a single larceny suspect in Holly Village at 3 a.m. on Oct. 25. The arrest by Garcia, which was assisted by Wolkow, led to the recovery of stolen property and names of suspects in 20 other area larceny cases. Officer Garcia received a Citation for Meritorious Service, and Wolkow received a Letter of Commendation.

Rotary Club projects benefit many

Rotary Club of Fenton has completed two service projects. A 40-foot ramp was built for a Linden resident with the help of Rotarian builders. practicing each week. "It needs to be a year round sport," said Holden.

Her best gymnasts are the equivalent of levels 5 through 8 on the national level.

At six hours per week, Holden said the schedule allows gymnasts to compete, but also have a life outside the gym. She said private groups practice about 12 hours per week, leaving less time for other extracurricular activities.

The gym at Hyatt Elementary School is fully equipped with everything needed for all women's gymnastics events. The beam is a 16- by 4-inch leather wrapped beam of wood, about 4 feet off the ground. The girls not only walk across the beam with poise and control, but also leap, spin and back flip onto a surface the size of a regular index card.

"I usually watch my hands," said Emily Fay, 12, of Fenton as she was taking a flip off the beam. The beam is her least favorite event. She prefers floor exercises, which include tumbles, flips, and dance moves, all set to music.

In the room off to the side, young gymnasts work on the uneven bars, a set of bars the girls grip and then swing themselves about, using incredible core body strength. "It's like when you're doing pull-ups, it's a lot of work," said Emily. "It feels like you're falling, but when you're up high, it feels like you're flying." One beam is 5 feet tall, the other is 9.

Katie Holden, 17, is her mother's assistant coach. "I see things that I used to do that the girls do now, and it's very easy to correct," she said. "I can say, I know how it is, this is how you can fix it."

Katie works with intermediate- to team-level gymnasts. "It gives them confidence in their life, it gives them sportsmanship, it gives them strength, everything."

Nancy said she tries to encourage any Olympic dreams, but prefers to promote a lifestyle that is a balance between gymnastics, school and even other sports.

"Every kid has ability to learn and have

successes," she said.

Her goal is to help the students be "the best they can be."

"I think that everybody has ability to learn," Nancy said. "Gymnastics uses your whole body. You're learning good core strength, back strength, and coordination.

Nancy said that even if one of her students does not become an accomplished gymnast, they would still learn something along the way. "It's life lessons that they learn," she said. "I think it helps them build up their self confidence, even in school activities."

Gymnastics competitions require the athletes to perform on their own, and can help grow confidence in public speaking.

If you love the taste of pumpkin and would like to try something new and different on your holiday table this year, here are a few dishes to enjoy.

Easy pumpkin dinner rolls

(Taste of Home magazine)

INGREDIENTS:

2 t. active dry yeast 1½ c. warm water 11/4 c. canned pumpkin 1/2 c. butter, softened 1/3 cup sugar

2 eggs

2 t. salt

 $2 \frac{1}{2}$ c. whole-wheat flour 4 ½ to 5 cups all-purpose flour

PREPARATION:

In a large bowl, dissolve yeast in warm water. Add the pumpkin, butter, sugar, eggs, salt and whole-wheat flour, beat until smooth. Stir in enough all-purpose flour to make a soft dough. Turn onto a lightly floured surface; knead until smooth and elastic, about 6-8 minutes. Place in a greased bowl, turning once to grease top. Cover and let rise in a warm place until doubled, about one hour. Punch dough down. Turn onto a lightly floured surface and divide into three portions. Roll each portion into a 12-inch circle; cut each circle into 12 wedges. Roll up wedges from the wide end and place pointed side down 2 inches apart on greased baking sheets. Curve ends to form

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crescents. Cover and let rise until doubled, about 30 minutes. Bake at 400 degrees for 12-15 minutes. Remove to wire racks. Yields three dozen.

Pumpkin fudge

3 c. sugar

3/4 cup butter

1 (5-oz.) can evaporated milk ½ c. canned pumpkin

1 (10-oz.) pkg. cinnamon-flavored pieces

1 (7-oz) jar marshmallow crème

3/4 c. chopped walnuts, toasted

PREPARATION:

Line a 13- by 9-inch baking pan with foil, extending foil over edges of pan. Butter foil; set pan aside. In a 3-quart heavy saucepan, combine sugar, butter, evaporated milk, and pumpkin. Cook and stir over mediumhigh heat until mixture boils. Clip a candy thermometer to side of pan. Reduce heat to medium-low; continue boiling at a moder ate, steady rate, stirring frequently, until thermometer registers 234 degrees F, softball stage (20 to 25 minutes). (Adjust heat as necessary to maintain a steady boil). Remove saucepan from heat; remove thermometer from saucepan. Stir in cinnamonflavored pieces until melted. Stir in marshmallow crème and walnuts. Immediately spread fudge evenly in prepared pan. Score into squares while warm. Let fudge cool to room temperature. When fudge is firm, use foil to lift it out of pan. Cut into squares. Cover tightly and chill for up to 1 week. Do not freeze.

PREPARATION:

In a large mixing bowl, beat granulated sugar, brown sugar, shortening, and eggs with an electric mixer on medium speed for 2 minutes, scraping bowl occasionally. In a medium mixing bowl, stir together flour, baking soda, cinnamon, cloves, nutmeg, and salt. Add flour mixture and pumpkin alternately to shortening mixture, beating on low speed after each addition until combined. Stir in raisins, nuts, and cherries. Turn batter into a greased and floured 10-inch fluted tube pan. Bake in a 350-degree oven about 1 hour or until a toothpick inserted near center comes out clean. Cool on a wire rack for 10 minutes. Remove from pan. Cool completely on wire rack. Brush with orange juice and sprinkle with coarse sugar, if desired. (Instead of using the orange juice, Lois Swoveland makes her own drizzled frosting with confectioner's sugar and milk, and then sprinkled the coarse sugar on top). Garnish with maraschino cherries, if desired. Makes 14 to 16 servings.

Slowly whisk the hot whipping cream into the egg mixture. Use a serrated knife to cut off the top ½-inch of the baby pumpkins. Discard the tops. Use a spoon to scoop out the seeds. Place the pumpkins (or ramekins) in a roasting pan. Divide custard mixture evena roasting pari. Divide custaru mixture even-ly among the pumpkins (or ramekins). Place roasting pan on oven rack. Pour enough boiling water into the roasting pan to reach halfway up the sides of the pumpkins. Bake for 30 to 40 minutes or until centers appear nearly set when gently shaken. Carefully remove pan from oven. Remove pumpkins from water; cool on a wire rack. Cover and chill for at least 1 hour or up to 8 hours. Before serving, let custards stand at room temperature for 20 minutes. Meanwhile, for caramelized sugar: in a heavy 8-inch skillet, heat the 1/4 cup sugar over medium-high heat until sugar begins to melt, shaking skillet occasionally to heat sugar evenly. Do not stir. Once sugar starts to melt, reduce heat to low; cook 3 to 5 minutes more or until all of the sugar is melted and golden brown, stirring as needed with a wooden spoon. Quickly drizzle caramelized sugar over the custards. (If sugar starts to harden in the skillet, return to heat, stirring until melted.) Serve immediately. Makes 10 filled pumpkins or 6 custard cups. **Culinary Torch Method: Instead of caramelizing the sugar in the skillet as directed earlier, sprinkle sugar evenly over custards. Use a culinary torch to caramelize the sugar.

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

The power of a thankful heart

With shouts of praise to God, the Pilgrims from Scrooby Village in England came ashore at New Plymouth in 1620. The able-bodied ones knelt on the snow-covered, rocky ground and gave thanks for their completion of their stormy voyage across the Atlantic.

Others, weakened by sickness, lay on pallets reciting Psalms and singing hymns.

A few months later, half of the Pilgrims were dead from exposure and disease. But, the remainder rallied and carried on.

Their first permanent building was an assembly house for meetings of the church and the elected general court. Prayers were always offered at the opening of court and before voting on any important issue.

Though they endured many hardships, they learned to be thankful for daily blessings, and this led to celebrating their first harvest with a feast of thanksgiving. The Pilgrims could have pouted about their privations and problems. Instead, they chose to thank God for the blessings He had given.

More than 100 years after the Pilgrims had set the example, President George Washington issued the following Thanksgiving Proclamation:

'Whereas it is the duty of all nations to acknowledge the providence of Almighty God, to obey His will, to be grateful for His benefits, and humbly implore His protection and favors...

'Now, therefore, I do recommend and assign Thursday, the 26th of November, to be devoted by the people of these states to the service of that great and glorious Being, who is the Beneficent Author of all the good that

was, that is, or that will be, that we may then all unite in rendering unto Him our sincere and humble thanks.'

It is important to note that both the expressions of thanksgiving by the Pilgrims and of George Washington came following times of great distress — the struggle of that first difficult year by the Pilgrims and the rigors of the Revolutionary War by Washington.

Tough times made them thankful. But, there is another dimension to this story that is often overlooked. Their thankful hearts enabled them to endure tough times triumphantly.

A thankful heart is powerful. Depression departs from thankful hearts.

A thankful heart can heal a troubled marriage. A thankful heart turns one from pouting to praising. A thankful heart can overcome fears about the future. A thankful heart can dissolve doubts and eliminate cynicism.

The well-known author of Christian classics, A.W. Tozer, wrote, 'Now, as a cure for the sour, faultfinding attitude I recommend the cultivation of the habit of thankfulness.

'Thanksgiving has great curative power. The heart that is constantly overflowing with gratitude will be safe from those attacks of resentfulness and gloom that bother so many. A thankful heart cannot be cynical.'

In counting our blessings, we can change our lives and the lives of those we love.

Judy, This could indicate a problem with your fuel level sending unit not reading correctly. The only way to tell this is to drop the tank and compare how much fuel is in the tank to how much the gauge reads. The other problem could be a failing fuel pump. It may draw air in when the level gets too low causing this problem. The sender and pump can be serviced separately but if you end up replacing the pump it comes with the sender automatically.

antioxidants equivalent to 11/2 cups of fresh or frozen cranberries, one ounce of sweetened dried fruit or a ½ cup of cranberry sauce. Any one of these

types of cranberry-based products will be a healthy addition to a well-balanced diet, according to researchers.

Why are cranberries so healthful? These nutrient dense little crimson berries provide vitamins, minerals and phytonutrients (the naturally derived plant compounds that have antioxidant activity) with few calories — about 50 in one cup — no fat and very little sodium.

In addition to phytonutrients, cranberries contain polyphenols and the flavanol "proanthocyanidin" (PAC), which helps prevent the adhesion of certain harmful bacteria, including E. coli, associated with urinary tract infec-

tions. They may also help to inhibit the bacteria associated with gum disease, and stomach ulcers — by preventing bacteria from attaching to the stomach wall. Recent research on digestive health suggests that cranberry juice can

> be as effective as probiotics in maintaining good digestive health.

> Cranberries are good for the heart, also. Whole cranberries are a good source of dietary fiber, and all cranberry products contain the natural compounds mentioned above, offering a wide range of potential heart health benefits — favorably affecting platelet function and offering a natural defense against atherosclerosis, common-

ly known as "hardening of the arteries."

Laboratory studies conducted by the University of Illinois have demonstrated the potential anti-cancer properties of cranberries. Although results are preliminary, compounds in cranberries may prove to be a potent cancer fighter.

Magi. In honor of the birth of the Savior, the mince pie was originally made in an oblong casings (coffin or cradle shaped), with a place for the Christ Child to be placed on top. Over the years, the pies grew smaller, the shape of the pie was gradually changed from oblong to round, and the meat content was gradually reduced until the pies were simply filled with a mixture of suet, spices and dried fruit, previously steeped in brandy. This filling was put into little pastry cases that were covered with pastry lids and then baked in an oven. Essentially, this is today's English mince pie.

Canine influenza vs. kennel cough

DEAR PAW'S CORNER: Can you give me any information on Canine Influenza Virus?

Jordan C., Kansas City, Mo.

DEAR JORDAN: This relatively new virus was identified about six years ago, following an outbreak of a mystery illness among dogs at a race track in Jacksonville, Fla. It was determined that a horse virus had been transmitted to the dogs. Since then, Canine Influenza Virus has joined a list of communicable diseases to which dogs, especially those in crowded living conditions like a kennel or shelter, are vulnerable.

CIV is sometimes mistaken for kennel cough, as one of its symptoms is coughing that can worsen after activity. However, unlike kennel cough, CIV is often accompanied by a runny nose, sneezing and runny eyes. In more severe cases of CIV, a high fever is present, along with loss of appetite, lethargy or depression, and sometimes difficulty breathing. Any of these symptoms should prompt a visit to the veterinarian to confirm

CIV and make sure pneumonia doesn't set in.

Because CIV is a virus, antibiotics aren't an effective cure. Treatment includes making your dog more comfortable — including cough medicine or other medicines to reduce symptoms — and keeping its immune system strong through a good diet and vitamin supplements. Prevent your pet from exposing other dogs to the virus, and monitor its condition closely in case its health worsens. The illness usually runs its course in four weeks.

Fortunately, a vaccine for the virus is available. Ask the vet about immunizing your pet, particularly if you plan to place it in a kennel or doggie daycare. More information and a clinic locator tool are available at www.doginfluenza.com.

Fenton — They sat in the Fenton auxiliary gym preparing for their senior seasons on the Fenton varsity girls basketball team, probably unsure of what Fenton coach Brad Dewitt may do for that particular practice Tuesday.

Yet, at the same time seniors Alyssa Ostrowski and Gabrielle Rivette know exactly

what they'll be doing next year. Both players decisions already figured out. will be headed to college, preparing to play college basketball at the next level.

Fenton hockey looking for another title

Fenton — Fenton is coming off a stellar hockey season.

The Tigers finished 2009-10 as the unbeaten Metro League champions, finishing with a 21-4-1 overall record. The Tigers bowed out in the Regional final falling 5-3 to Powers, the eventual state runner-up in Division 3.

Having that type of success again this year won't come easy. Fenton lost six players to graduation, including Austin Giesey (70 points) and Will Dawson (61 points). However, the cupboard isn't bare, and the Tigers hope to have another magical season this year. Fenton opened the season skating against Grand Blanc Saturday. The Tigers open the Metro League season with Lapeer East Dec. 1 at 8 p.m. at the Hartland Sports Center.

"We have the same goal as we do every year, to win the Metro League championship,' said Fenton coach Matt Krusniak. "It is too early to tell, but we have a group of guys that are not afraid to work hard. We just need them to work smarter and we could have another great season if we come together and play well. We lost six seniors, but we still have seven seniors who have been around for awhile, and now it's their turn to step up and take the leadership role."

The goalkeeper position is between sophomore Joe Foguth and senior Dillon Deloye.

"Joe came in as a freshman and played well as goalie," said Krusniak. "Dillon is a roller blader and he is just starting to

Rivette enters her senior season as a three-time All Tri-County selection. She led the Tigers in scoring (354 points), assists (50) and steals (55) last year. She's a strong ball-handler who can make her free throws down the stretch. She made 84 percent from the line a year ago.

Rivette will be expected to continue at the collegiate level as a guard at Northwood. The choice was between Northwood and Bowling Green. Rivette plans on going into accounting and finance.

"Northwood is close to home," Rivette said. "You can go away when you want to be away and come home when you want to come home. Plus, it's a good business school."

Northwood has a strong women's basketball program. The team finished just 13-14 overall and 9-13 in the GLIAC a year ago, but posted records of 21-8 and 18-9 the two seasons before last year. The team is off to a 2-0 start this season.

"My sister's friend (Pam Wilson) went there, so I know a lot about it," Rivette said. "They've had a lot of success.

"I think (my playing time) is waitand-see. I'll just keep working hard, and, hopefully, be in the rotation pretty quick."

Urbana has been a strong program for the last four seasons. The Blue Knights finished 6-22 in 2005-06, but since then have finished .500 or better each of the last four years, including posting a 17-10 mark last year. Urbana plays as an independent.

"I liked the size," Ostrowski said about Urbana. "It was smaller. It was competitive in terms of the basketball team. It was a good fit for what I wanted."

Ostrowski, a member of our All Tri-County Team last year, scored 168 points during her junior season, and grabbed a team-high 124 rebounds. She's slated to play power forward or center.

"I will have to work really hard," Ostrowski said. "I definitely need to stay in shape and just keep working on my skills, like my ball-handling."

Dewitt thinks both girls have made good decisions.

"I think it's a good fit for Gabrielle," Dewitt said. "I know the coach and I think she will fit really well there. They need a guard, and Gabrielle is an experienced guard.

"I don't know much about Urbana, but from what Alyssa's parents told me, they are very exited about Urbana and they think it's a great fit. Alyssa is going into education, and they have a strong education program."
