Fenton man joins rebel forces Shares chilling accounts of violence under Qaddafi's regime

tiagielo@tctimes.com; 810-433-6795 On the other side of the world, a rebel fighter working to overthrow a brutal dictator and establish a free country has roots in the Fenton area.

Mustafa Gheriani, of Tyrone Township, was not staying in his birth city of Benghazi, Libya to join the popular uprising. He was there on business, where he spent much of his time.

Then, the protests began. "It started with a simple protest. The government opened fire on them. People died. They came up for funeral marches the next day. They shot them again. It just escalated from there like wildfire," said Lois Van Lente, Gheriani's wife. When Van Lente spoke to her husband on Feb. 17, the protests had started in Libya, and he had an opportunity to leave the brewing re-

bellion, and the possible armed crackdowns from the Libyan leader. However, her husband made it clear — he would not be hiding. He would not be fleeing the country, as he did for his own safety, along with many other young students, in 1977. In 2011, Gheriani would

be diving in to help the antigovernment forces. Van Lente knew Gheriani

Board delays decision on all-day kindergarten

atroppens@tctimes.com; 810-433-6792 **Fenton** — The board of education has postponed action on a proposal for all-day kindergarten, until its May meeting. During that time, more information will be gathered, said Superintendent Dr. Timothy Jalkanen.

In a survey, 75 percent of 230 parents of 3 to 5 year olds said they would be very interested in full-day kindergarten.

The vote by the board to postpone action on the proposed program, KindergartenPlus, was 3-2. Secretary Nora Kryza, who voted against postponing it, raised the issue of the timing of Kindergarten

Round-up and having the Kindergarten-Plus Program for the 2011-12 school year.

It is still possible Fenton could have all-day kindergarten in the fall, Jalkanen

said. Half-day kindergarten would still be available.

Part of the KindergartenPlus proposal could eliminate mid-day bus transportation, Jalkanen said at Monday's meeting. Administration is gathering more information on it. The change would offset the cost of offering KindergartenPlus, except for around \$10,000.

The full-day experience for kindergarten students would include a halfday of state-approved curriculum and the other half-day with a kindergarten facilitator, where students would still be working on the curriculum in different ways, such as art projects.

End of automatic pay increases for teachers?

▶ Rep. Scott sponsors controversial bill

A bill that would stop automatic salary increases when a public education employee's contract expires is under consideration by the Michigan House of Representatives.

Rep. Paul Scott (R-Grand Blanc) chairs the House Education Committee. He announced that the committee is recommending that the House pass Rep. Marty Knollenberg's HB4152. The Senate's approval and governor's signature would also be required for the bill to become law.

Under current law, public educators receive salary increases after their contract expires without having to negotiate a new contract.

Knollenberg and the Michigan Association of School Boards (MASB) believe the main benefit of the bill is that it will encourage all participants in the negotiating process to come to the bargaining table in good faith.

Currently, the bargaining units have little incentive to negotiate because they are receiving pay and benefit increases even when their contract expires, said Scott.

Tahoe or Impala? •Fenton police need new vehicle

atroppens@tctimes.com; 810-433-6792 Fenton — Fenton police are minus one patrol vehicle after a Jan. 28 crash totaled their 2007 Impala. A debate is taking place, over the replacement and its costs. Chief Rick Aro is recommending the purchase of a Chevrolet Tahoe, for around \$26,000. A Chevrolet Impala sedan would cost about \$21,000, he said. City council will consider the issue at Monday's meeting, 7:30 p.m. at Fenton City Hall. Aro said Tahoes might seem like a luxury to many, but they make more sense financially. Impala sedans typically last the police department three years, while Tahoes are in service for four or more years.

"We are still using our 2005 Tahoe," Aro said. It has 142,000 miles.

This enables them to obtain a better price, he said. Aro has presented Vic Canever Chevrolet, in Fenton, the opportunity to bid. He has not heard back from them yet, but if the Fenton dealership can match Shaheen Chevrolet's price, he — and city council — would support obtaining the vehicle locally.

Fate of emergency dispatch up in air

► Council will make decision in upcoming budget discussion

Fenton — Fenton's new budget is coming up, and an issue is keeping the city's emergency dispatch or going with another provider. Police Chief Rick Aro said it would cost the city \$60,000 to \$70,000 over and above its 911 revenue to keep it. Fenton receives approximate-ly \$147,000 to \$150,000 annually in 911 revenue from people's phone bills. The cost of having the city's own emergency dispatch for another year would be \$210,000, Aro said.

Another issue in maintaining the 911 dispatch is replacing the aging equipment in the dispatch center at the police station. Its service life has ended, and it would cost almost \$300,000 to upgrade and replace, he said. "That money's very hard to come up with."

However, if Fenton is going to keep its dispatch center, the equipment needs replacing. And, if the city buys new equipment, a question is whether it can maintain its dispatch center over several years, Aro said.

WHERE COULD FENTON RECEIVE DISPATCH SERVICES?

City administrators met with representatives from Genesee Central, regarding emergency dispatch services, said Police Chief Rick Aro. Another meeting is approaching soon. In addition, Oakland County has approached Fenton about providing dispatch services for it, and the Village of Holly Police Department is interested. It's not at the point where they are discussing prices for service, Aro said. Once administration

Graves suggested an anonymous hotline be created so that anyone can call with tips about drug deals and/or dealers. The Genesee County Sheriff's deputy informed the audience that it already has an anonymous hotline, (810) 424-4444.

Drug dealer registry

The idea of a drug dealer registry was urged. Similar to the sex offender registry run by the Michigan State Police, this proposed drug registry, to be named "Briona's List" in memory of Briona Jawhari, could

reveal the identities of convicted drug dealers and where they live.

"They (drug dealers) work in a cloud of secrecy," said Brown. "Our kids are their number one target.

"Let's exploit them like they're exploiting our kids.'

Legislation

State Senator Dave Robertson said he would look into possible legislation for

the registry. Judge Duncan Beagle said the idea should be put on the table for discussion. "It's worth considering," he said.

John Kupiec, a former candidate for Michigan 5th U.S. Congressional District, said communication really begins at home and parents need to strive for more dialogue with their kids so that their kids will

be comfortable going to them. He also suggested more public service announcements be provided to the local media.

A grieving father's story

Sam Jawhari, Briona's father, is working with this task force so that his daughter's death is not in vain. He said his daughter believed her boyfriend, who introduced her to heroin, was a savior. "It's not the drug pushers; it's sometimes the ones that they love. They blindside you."

Jawhari is compelled to help. "I want this torch to keep going. These children are our future. Let's come together and do something."

Brown worked with Briona as her debate coach. He wants to make sure she does not just become a statistic as a white suburban female who died from a heroin overdose. "I don't want her to be anonymous. The last thing she said to me was, 'I love you,'" said Brown.

There are problems here in Fenton and we need to resolve it.'

Community Mental Health representatives offered their help. They also said there are ongoing, open and closed Narcotics Anonymous meetings in the Fenton and Grand Blanc areas.

Law enforcement

An undercover narcotics officer for Genesee County said his three-member team is working around the clock in their attempts to rid the streets of drugs. Drug cartels and gangs out of Detroit are what they're seeing now. "They're changing the

way they do business," the officer said. "We are committed to this. Education is the key. Get the parents involved."

Ideas, such as taking field trips to the county jail, billboards with photos of convicted drug dealers, obtaining input from young people, public service announcements and hard-hitting presentations and ongoing programs at the schools are being considered.

Tom Richard, a Fenton Township planning commissioner and retired narcotics officer from Detroit, said he routinely investigated doctors and pharmacists, even 40 years ago. "Those doctors are no better than the drug dealer working in the gutter," he said.

Richard added that addicts and drug dealers steal prescription pads, write prescriptions, drop-off the fake prescriptions at pharmacies and get what they want. "It's extra money in their pocket," he said.

The mother of a 27-year-old heroin addict also shared her story. The room fell silent as she shared details of her daughter's addiction, which evolved from taking prescription Vicodin for pain. (See accompanying story.)

In a Tuesday press release, Sheriff Bob Bezotte said the Livingston County Sheriff's Department Detective Bureau responded to an apparent

The Livingston County Sheriff's Department is investigating its first fatal overdose involving Oxymorphone, a Schedule II controlled substance. fatal overdose in Tyrone Township. Preliminary indications were that the victim crushed multiple Opana tablets and "snorted them.

Detectives believe the crushed tablets were ingested at approximately 3:30 p.m. on Friday, March 4. The vic-

tim was later found to be unresponsive at 7:30 a.m. on March 5. He was transported to Genesys Health Park in Grand Blanc Township, where he was pronounced dead.

The investigation is open pending the results of the autopsy and toxicology report.

Bezotte said they are investigating as to how the victim obtained the tablets, since they were not prescribed to him.

This is the first suspected overdose death related to this substance in Livingston County.

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Continued from Page 3A According to the study, store-brand foods cost, on average, 27 percent less than the national brand counterpart. Researchers found that price gaps have less to do with what goes into the package than with the research, development and marketing costs that help build a household name.

Because more money is spent on national brands, those products are likely to have the latest in convenient packaging, newest tastes or fortified with trendy supplements, according to Harry Balzer, chief industry analyst for the NPD Group, a leading market research company.

Some people might remember the plainly packaged generic food products of the '70s. These alternative products were offered to offset the double-digit inflation of those years. Many found those foods not quite as tasty as the national brands. Based on the recent taste tests, store brands are much improved.

Respondents, 18 to 39 years old, were particularly likely to question the quality of store brands. Those surveyed said store-brand paper goods and plastics were fine, however, when it came to other products, such as wine, pet food, soda or soup, shoppers tended to stick with the national brands.

Although 17 percent of survey respondents said, "name-brand foods are more nutritious," they found nutrition similar for most of the tested products. The most notable differences: Mott's applesauce has more sugar than Publix, Ore-Ida fries have more sodium

Some companies manufacture store brand and national brand products. Among those companies making both are Sara Lee, Reynolds, 4C, McCormick, Joy Cone and Royal Oak (charcoal).

Spartan Stores is a leading regional grocery/drugstore retailer and wholesale distributor based in Grand Rapids, Michigan. It owns and operates 97 supermarkets throughout Michigan, including VG's grocery stores.

According to Spartan Stores, it supplies more than 40,000 private-label and national-brand products to nearly 400 independently owned grocery stores in Michigan, Ohio and Indiana.

Chris Palmer, manager of VG's Grocery on North LeRoy Street, said on average, two shoppers out of three are selecting the lower-costing store brand. The trend to buy store brands has really gone up, he said, adding that some of the national manufacturers also make store brand products.

According to Palmer, the grocery store has a program that is going over well with customers. It's called "Take the Challenge." With this program, the store rotates three to seven products every two weeks to give shoppers a no-cost opportunity to try the store brand.

With selected items, when a customer purchases a national brand, they receive a like store brand item, at no cost. "It gives them an opportunity to try a Spartan brand," he said. "It's a very popular program and shoppers are not out anything if they don't like it."



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About Libya

Libya is located in North Africa, situated between Algeria and Egypt. Its northern border is met with the Mediterranean Sea, to the south, the countries of Chad, Niger, and Sudan. For 41 years, Colonel Moammar Muhammad Al-Gaddafi has remained in power in Libya, and has a bloody track record that included public, televised hangings. Gheriani fled the country in 1977, and pursued an education and a life in the United States. Spouse Lois Van Lente met Gheriani in 1979. They were married and had two sons; one is in college and one in high school. Van Lente has stayed in Tyrone Township with her sons, while Gheriani conducted business in Libya. Following the ousting of the Egyptian leader, protests began in neighboring-country Libya, where Gheriani was working His offices are in the Libyan capital Tripoli, which is currently under rebel control. Currently there are about 100,000 citizens prepared to fight the government, hand to hand.

"It would have ruined him," she said. "If he was here while this was going on, he would be dying inside."

Their oldest son posted on Facebook, "You've been dreaming of this all your life — go for it."

Since mid February, Gheriani has worked solely for the resistance movement in Libya, and Van Lente has kept a wary eye on the unfolding events. "That's where all my attention's going, I haven't been able to read a book, I haven't been able to read a magazine."

She has become the conduit between Gheriani and his friends and family. "I'm constantly checking the news, watching the tweets, sending e-mails," she said.

Van Lente will rise in the middle of the night to check the news, as events are unfolding that could affect her family, while she sleeps. Sometimes communication is spotty, and she has to search the news to look for his name to know he is still safe. Van Lente calls her husband on a very

limited basis, each day. Their calls are short and lacking detail

about exactly where he is, or what he is

doing, as the calls are likely monitored by the very government he is fighting against. "It's mostly been, 'Tell the kids I love them, how are they, how are you holding up?Ilove you," she said. "It's very short." Gheriani frequently sleeps in a different place for his own safety.

Van Lente has few details on what her husband is doing, but she knows he has a role assisting the new provisionary

Summary Mustafa Gheriani, of Tyrone Township, was in Libya on business when the uprising against the Libyan government began. Now, he works with the antigovernment forces, while his family waits at home.

"He was standing on his balcony, with his phone held high and said, 'listen to these large caliber weapons they are shooting people with,'" she said. "The rebels, they have no training, no uniforms, no equipment," she said. "All they have is heart." "You've be of this all **Bustafa G** *Facebo*

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On her kitchen table in her Tyrone Township home is a laptop with news website AlJezeera, an established independent Arab news outlet that is closely covering the Libyan uprising. Next to the laptop are two notebooks with notes from phone conversations with her husband.

Atop the notes is a printout of the Libyan "Declaration of the Establishment of the National Transitional Temporary Council," stamped with an official seal.

In other words, the document on the table is part of the Libyans' own brand new, declaration of independence. "They want transparency, they want a reduction in corruption, democracy, they want a constitution, they want law and order, it doesn't get any purer than that," said Van Lente. They want Gaddafi out, and they want the help of the international community, she said.

Van Lente speaks with clear, focused passion, describing the people she has learned about, and lived side by side with

> for around three decades. "The Libyans have a great love for their country and they have great pride in their country, but it was an embarrassment always to them, that Gaddafi was their leader," she

said. "That was a painful thing to carry, all those years."

"They finally overcame their fear. They finally reached with critical mass and all joined in together to fight this fight.

"To even begin it, they knew they might have to pay the ultimate price. And all of them without hesitation have gotten out there, and are ready to do that."

Gheriani has been a spokesperson for the new movement, coordinating media coverage including the BBC, and AlJezeera and many others. His name can be found on Google, and in the news.

Currently, more air strikes have not been called on Benghazi, where Gheriani is staying, since the first two sets of planes Gaddafi sent defected, instead of firing on their own people.

The government has been attacking rebels in the oil hub of Ras Lanuf, and the U.N. is considering imposing a no-fly zone to stop Gaddafi from using planes against his people. "We can't fight planes with machetes," Gheriani had said to Van Lente.

The French government on Thursday recognized the provisional, rebel government as legitimate.

Recently, Van Lente made her own Libyan flag, the version the rebel groups have been flying, and hung it outside her home. "To me, it means I'm showing support for those people, for their bravery. I'm so proud of them," said VanLente. Tears form in her eyes, and she pauses. "For their determination," she continues. And, I want them to succeed. (I'm) so proud of them. They are kind. If you go into a Libyan home you will be treated so well, as a guest."

The future is unclear. Van Lente does not know when her husband will be back, or when the country will stabilize.

Van Lente explained what it felt like to have a loved one so far away, in harm's way.

"It's similar to a military family. There are those people that, when the building is burning, they run in instead of running out, and that's kind of what this situation is like for us. It's so much a part of who my husband is. We have accepted this as what he has to do."

"She burned my house down. She's stolen my identity. She lost her kids. She lost her teeth," said the woman. "But, I love her. It will be a bit of relief, but I'm planning her funeral, too. She's so far in, that her death would be more comforting to me."

While living through her daughter's drug induced world, the mother knows that to treat the drug problem, the underlying cause has to be dealt with, first. "Those who turn to drugs, do it out of emotional distress or physical pain," she said.

Although some people might think heroin is a new problem, it is not. The mother said, "Heroin is not grown in Fenton. It comes from out of the borders," she said.

The mother is convinced the drug

"My daughter will die from that drug. "I cry. I worry. But, I have an awesome God and he picks me up and carries me."

BOARD ALLOWS RESIDENTS TO APPEAL PROPERTY TAXES IN WRITING

The Tyrone Township Board has approved allowing residents to make board of review appeals in writing. Previously, without this authorization by the township, nonresidents could appeal in writing but residents could not, Clerk Keith Kremer said. Many Tyrone residents go to Florida for part of the year, and the change accommodates them.

RIGHT OF WAY PERMIT EXTENSION

Tyrone Township has approved a permit extension for AT&T, for work in the township's road right-of-ways. AT&T pays Tyrone \$9,000 annually to use township right-of-ways for its telephone wires, etc., said Clerk Keith Kremer.

MICHIGAN CHLORIDE SALES

Tyrone Township's board has approved contracting with Michigan Chloride Sales Inc., of St. Louis, for the 2011 dust control season, on gravel roads. The price is the same as it was for the last two years, said Trustee Steve Hasbrouck. The price for Michigan well brine is 14 cents per gallon, with discounts of 13.5 cents/gallon for certain time periods.

TYRONE MOWING AGREEMENT

The Tyrone Township Board has renewed its agreement with Murph's Turf, for mowing at the township hall and the Clough, Colwell and Gardner cemeteries. The price is \$120 per cemetery mowing, \$40 per mowing for the township hall, and \$10 per hour for additional services. Township officials bid the work out last year, and the price has not increased since then, Clerk Keith Kremer said.

The high cost of getting even

'I'll get even with you.'

We've all heard these five wounding words and some of us have spoken them, not really being aware of their destructive power or the negative influence they can have on both the speaker and hearer. This seething desire for retribution can sentence one to the prison of anger — the cell of recurring rage — where revenge is the jailor and release from selfishness is the only key to freedom.

The desire to get even creates playground bullies, workplace tyrants and miserable marriages. Those who stay angry because they feel life hasn't been fair can expect their misery to continue until they've shed the 'get even' complex. But how can those enslaved by selfishness break free from the desire to get their due from all who they're convinced owe them?

Freedom begins with forgiveness. In his book, 'Total Forgiveness,' R.T. Kendall posts this freeing statement on the title page. 'When everything in you wants to hold a grudge, point a finger and remember pain, God wants you to lay it all aside.' He then adds that God can enable us to forgive no matter how deeply we've been wounded by another person.

Our Lord's first words from the cross, 'Father, forgive them,' should challenge all who feel they've been cheated in life and must get even. Entering the office supply store of a

man of faith, I asked how he was doing. 'Better than I deserve,' he replied. And, he could have spoken for us all.

Not one of us is worthy of God's love or His many blessings. Yet, He loves us and gives far more than we deserve. A man once came to the noted devo-

tional lecturer, F.B. Meyer, saying he had lost the joy of living. He then explained that his misery had begun when his brother had treated him unfairly at the death of their father, causing a breach between them over their inheritance. At that time, he had vowed never to forgive his brother.

Now, however, the brother was going through many trials. He wife and child had died and he was seriously ill. This joyless man wanted to go to his brother and make peace with him, but had declared he would never do so.

'It is better to break a bad vow than to keep it,' said Meyer, urging the troubled man to go to his brother and be reconciled to him while he had time.

'He went, and the smile of God went with him,' wrote Meyer, describing the positive results of breaking down barriers between the man and his brother.

Who awaits your forgiveness?

What barriers now exist between you and another person that ought to be broken down?

To whom should you go offering reconciliation instead of seeking revenge? Go!

And you will not go alone.

They sought help by researching the Internet, and attended a conference in Nashville, Tenn., hosted by Ron Deal, a licensed marriage and family therapist, now an author, speaker and leader, who specializes in stepfam-

ily relationships. "It turned things around for us, by changing our perspectives," said Frantz.

"Couples need to understand that it is much harder to be a family, than it is to be a couple," said Deal. "What eHarmony never tells anyone is that they may be compatible as a couple, but the step-

family dynamics often wear and tear at the relationship to the point of divorce."

In fact, the rate of divorce for remarriages is actually 67 percent, and 50 percent of those are usually within the first two years. The divorce rate for first marriages is about 50 percent, according to www.marriage101.com.

"Building a Successful Stepfamily." The conference is intended for couples who are struggling in blended family relationships, are thinking about blending a family in the future, or for pastors/leaders who counsel blended families.

If you are in a blended family or in a re-

lationship that may result in one, you are not alone. "It affects over half of our community," said Frantz. "Many of these families are truly hurting."

Any relevant message about stepfamilies has to address the needs of the children in the events of divorce, re-marriage and step parenting. Having to share biological par-

ents with a new spouse and step-siblings, sharing limited space and adjusting to new extended families and holiday situations are just a few of the issues that come up in a new marital relationship.

Christian and Aubrie were just 7 and 5 years old when their parents, Phil and Karen, divorced. But, they both remember how much their parents' remarriages changed their lives.

"It was especially hard at the beginning to make all the adjustments when Christian and I would spend weekends with dad and his wife, Melissa, plus Melissa's two kids," said Aubrie, a junior at DeWitt High School. "I get along really well with Melissa, so we were able to work it all out. I just wish I could spend more time with dad. We're still really close."

Christian, 18, a freshman at Lansing Community College, remembers sharing space and time with his new stepsiblings

to be a big adjustment at the time. But, when his mom and stepfather had two children of their own, he found it easier to connect with them because they were born into the family.

"I'm closest to my mom and feel I can talk about a lot of things with her," said Christian. "I text my dad. I'd like to spend more time with him, but work and school always get in the way."

The difference in relating to a stepchild compared to a biological child can create a giant tension in a blended family. Bruce and Beth Bair, of Fenton, have been married for 10 years, with five children between them — two each from a previous marriage and one born since their marriage.

After years of praying and hard work, Beth said she loves her stepchildren as much as she loves her own children and would do anything for any of them. "I call them all my children," she said of her large brood, Ashley, Chris, Calli, Kirsten and Bailey.

But, it hasn't been a smooth road, especially with some of the pain caused by the unexpected death of her ex-husband, Ron Humitz, in November. "Ashley really reached out to Calli and Kirsten. That was huge," said Beth. "Since the beginning, I've prayed that God would help me love my stepchildren as much as my own. I have that love in my heart."

Parmesan Crusted Chicken Breasts with Tomato and Basil and Potatoes with Peppers and Onions

Ingredients

- 1 1/2 to 2 pounds fingerling potatoes or red skin baby potatoes
- 1 small red bell pepper, seeded and cut into thin strips
- 1 Italian mild green pepper, cubanelle, seeded and thinly sliced
- 1 medium yellow skinned onion, thinly sliced
- 4 large cloves garlic, cracked away from skin
- 1 teaspoon crushed red pepper flakes
- 1/4 cup tablespoons extra-virgin olive oil, divided
- Coarse salt and pepper
- 2 cups shredded Parmesan, available in tubs near deli make sure to get shredded cheese, not grated
- 4 (6 to 8-ounce) boneless, skinless chicken breasts
 4 plum Roma tomatoes or small, vine ripe tomatoes,
- seeded and chopped
- 15 to 20 leaves fresh basil, pile leaves, roll then thinly slice – chiffonade

PREPARATION:

Preheat oven to 500 degrees F. Cut fingerling potatoes into halves or quarters, depending on thickness of fingerlings thin, small fingerlings may also be left hole, larger potatoes should be quartered to speed cooking process. If you are using small red potatoes, halve or guarter them in the same way. Cover a large cookie sheet with foil. Place potatoes on cookie sheet. Combine with peppers and onions, garlic and crushed red pepper flakes. Coat the potatoes, peppers and onions with extra-virgin olive oil just enough to coat vegetables in a thin layer, 2 to 3 tablespoons. Season liberally with salt and pepper. Place potatoes in the oven and roast 20 to 22 minutes, until potatoes are just tender and peppers and onions are crisp at edges. Toss mixture with tongs, turning the potatoes after 15 minutes. When the potatoes are cooked, transfer them to a serving dish and peel the foil off the cookie sheet and discard for super-quick clean up! While potatoes cook, prepare chicken. Roll out a 2-foot piece of waxed paper or foil near the stove top. Heat a large nonstick skillet over medium high heat – your pan must be very hot when the chicken is added. Pile the shredded cheese on the work surface created with the waxed paper or foil. Season your chicken breasts with black pepper but no salt; the cheese will add enough salt to the taste of the dish. Press the breasts firmly into the cheese. Coat both sides of breasts with as much cheese as possible. Add 1 tablespoon extra-virgin olive oil to the skillet, 1 turn of the pan. Set breasts into the skillet and cook 7 minutes on each side, until cheese forms an even, golden casing around the tender chicken breasts. While chicken cooks, combine chopped tomatoes with basil in a small bowl. Season with salt and pepper, to your taste. Drain off any excess oil from chicken as you remove it from the skillet. Top chicken with big spoonfuls of raw sauce and serve with potatoes, peppers and onions.

What should I do? — Apartment Dweller

DEAR DWELLER: This family may have assumed that your kindness after their relative's death meant that you had done things for her when she lived down the hall. Sometimes people don't know how to express their gratitude, other than to try to compensate someone financially. You might want to pop that \$20 into the collection plate at your place of worship (or hers), donate it to your favorite charity, or take a friend out for a drink and raise a glass to your late neighbor. Don't return this money. The family was trying to do something nice for you, and though their gesture was clunky, they meant well.

DEAR DR. DONOHUE: Please explain why I have to take my shoes off late every day because my feet and ankles have swollen and don't fit into the shoes. I flop around in slippers without heels. In the morning, after a night's sleep, my feet are back to normal. I am 77 and take no medicines. — K.M.

ANSWER: I can't give you an unequivocal response because there are numerous causes of foot and ankle swelling. The medical name for such swelling is edema. Even in relatively healthy people, it occurs if people sit or stand for any length of time. Gravity pulls fluid out of the circulation, and it accumulates in the feet and ankles. This is especially true at older ages, when the circulatory system becomes somewhat leaky. For this kind of swelling, the solution is to elevate the legs when sitting. The most effective elevation is raising the legs above heart level, something that can be done only by lying down with pillows propping up the legs. Getting up and moving about is another way to prevent fluid accumulation in the feet. Heart failure is a more serious cause of such swelling. When the heart's pumping action becomes feeble, fluid escapes from blood vessels and again accumulates in the ankles and feet. Kidney disease with retention of body fluid is another cause of edema. Liver disease does the same. Another condition called lymphedema produces the same picture. Lymph is fluid that normally escapes the circulation to percolate around tissues and organs to provide nourishment and to wash away germs. Small vessels called lymphatics vacuum up this fluid and return it to the circulation. Anything that disrupts lymphatics can lead to ankle/foot swelling. An old infection and surgery are two such disruptors. Since ankle and foot swelling is a sign of many urgent medical conditions, don't fool around with this. See your family doctor. The Holly Village Council has begun the process of finding a replacement for Clerk/Treasurer Susan Nassar, who is responsible for overseeing the village office administrative operations, such as payroll, and water and sewer billing and collections. Nassar announced her resignation at a special meeting last week, and has mostly been at home. Technically, her last day is March 18.

Soon, the village will be posting an advertisement for the new position, and has already received one application.

If one feels pressured by the office administrator into making an appointment or hurried off the phone, it could mean the counselor is high-pressure or too busy to provide his or her full attention. If the receptionist is friendly and not hurried, it often means the counselor has established a supportive atmosphere (ehow.com).

Discover the counselor's specialty. Therapists often have certain areas of expertise. If a family's issue or issues are complex or unique, they might need to find out whether potential therapists have dealt with a specific challenge before.



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VILLAGE OF HOLLY ORDINANCE NO. 407

An ordinance to amend the Village Zoning Ordinance to regulate medical marijuana dispensaries.

THE VILLAGE OF HOLLY ORDAINS:

Section 1. Amendment to Section 201 of Article 2 of the Village of Holly Zoning Ordinance.

The Village hereby amends Section 201 of Article 2 of the Village Zoning Ordinance by adding thereto the following definition:

Medical Marijuana Dispensary.

A medical marijuana dispensary shall mean a facility, jointly owned or operated by two or more "primary caregivers," where marijuana is grown, cultivated, stored, dispensed or offered for sale to "qualifying patients" under the Michigan Medical Marijuana Act of 2008. A "primary caregiver," "qualifying patient" and "marijuana" shall have the meanings ascribed to them in the Michigan Medical Marijuana Act of 2008.

Section 2. Amendment to section 1102 of Article 11 of the Village of Holly Zoning Ordinance.

The Village hereby amends Section 1102 of Article 11 of the Village Zoning Ordinance by adding thereto a "medical marijuana dispensary" as a principle use permitted as a Special Land Use in the Commercial zoning district.

Section 3. Amendment to Section 1710 of Article 17 of the Village Zoning Ordinance.

The Village hereby amends Section 1710 of Article 17 of the Village Zoning Ordinance by adding thereto a new subsection 31, labeled "Medical Marijuana Dispensary" to read as follows:

30. Medical Marijuana Dispensary.

a. Locational Limitations.

A medical marijuana dispensary shall not be permitted:

- (i) within five hundred (500) feet of any other medical marijuana dispensary;(ii) within five hundred (500) feet of a residential district or use;
 - (iii) withing one thousand (1000) feet of any school, nursery, licensed day care center or other building used for the care or instruction of children under 18 years of age;
- (IV) within one thousand (1000) feet of any church, house of worship or other religious facility or institution;
- (V) within one thousand (1000) feet of any public or municipal park.

b. Operational Limitations.

(i)

a medical marijuana dispensary shall only operate between 8:00 A.M. and 8:00 P.M., Monday through Saturday;

(ii) a medical marijuana dispensary must comply at all times with each and every provision of the Michigan Medical Marihuana Act of 2008 (MCL 333.26421, et seq.).

(iii) marijuana or cannibis shall only be grown, manufactured or harvested inside a fully enclosed structure or building that is kept secured with locks to prevent unintended or uninvited access;

(iv) persons under the age of eighteen (18) years of age are not permitted to be on the premises of any medical marijuana dispensary unless they possess a valid Medical Marijuana Registry Card issued by the State of Michigan or another state;

(v) the owner of a medical marijuana dispensary who violates these sections shall be liable for all costs associated with the investigation, prosecution and enforcement of that violation;

(vi) the cultivation, manufacturing, growing or distribution of marijuana shall not occur in connection with or at a location at which any other commodity, product or service is also available.

Section 4. EFFECTIVE DATE

This Ordinance shall take effect 30 days after publication.

Turnovers cost Bronchos against Clarkston, 58-40

Fenton — Holly varsity boys basketball's season ended Wednesday.

Like Fenton two days earlier, they were a victim of Clarkston and their run of 17 district championships in a row.

The Wolves knocked out the Bronchos 58-40 in the MHSAA Class A District semifinal. Clarkston started the season slowly at 4-5, but have not lost since, as they ran their winning streak to 13. The Wolves (17-5) went for their 18th straight District championship Friday against Grand Blanc.

The Bronchos scored only one basket in the opening quarter. Brent Staffne scored that one with 4:13 left in the period. Meanwhile, the Wolves scored 13 unanswered points, making a 4-2 lead into a 17-2 one at the end of the first quarter.

In the second quarter, Nick Stoll and Jared Plawski converted offensive boards into hoops, cutting the lead to 23-11, but Holly never got the lead back to singledigits. The Bronchos' leading scorer, Josh Fugate, was held scoreless in the first half as his jumper rimmed out as time ran out in the second quarter, with Clarkston holding a 27-11 cushion at intermission.

"The story was, simply, our turnovers," Holly coach Lance Baylis said. "They have a good defense, but the factor was we had 14 unforced turnovers in the first half, just throwing the ball away for whatever reason.

"We played them pretty even after that. Our defense was fine. It wasn't the fact of missing a lot of shots. It's just, with that many turnovers, you don't get many shots off."

"It was hard to drive and then kick it out for shots like we like to do," Fugate said. "They played great defense, always with two guys right on you."

Fugate scored his first points on a drive and a flip reverse with just over a minute elapsed in the third quarter. At the 2:13 mark, Stoll was called for a technical for hanging on the rim. Tatu sank both free throws. Then the lanky 6-foot-7 Marcus Hardy had a hoop for a four-point play on the possession. Tatu's free throw with 1:39 left gave the Wolves a 24-point lead, which was their biggest of the game.

snowmobiles.

"I used to race when I was a kid — when I was 20 years old until I was 24, I think," said Yovich, who is now a few decades older than that. "I've always been into racing."

And now the Rose Township resident and Holly bissnessman is back into the sport he loves.

Yovich, a collector of snowmobiles, is the owner of a snowmobile that races in the Great Lakes Antique Snowmobile Series during the winter season. And right now, his team is doing pretty good.

With one race remaining in the season, and that race was this weekend, Yovich's Team 407 North snow-

mobile team is in first place in the season point standings. And his team is on a hotstreak. The team's

8-6789 most recent race — the Lincoln 150 — was a victory. While it was a non-points race, it did help the team test out a new motor in preparations for this weekend's race in Sault Ste. Marie.

"We ran it 88 laps with Nate Woodward, and then Justin Waleski raced it the last 62," Yovich said. "We went to test a new motor and it ran really good."

Snowmobile racing is much like a NASCAR event. Before each race, there is qualifying. The fastest lap times take the better starting positions. Drivers can try to improve upon their qualifying time as many times as they want. Most races have just over 30 drivers and each race has a designated number of laps. But while there are laps, not all tracks are clean ovals. There are pitstops to refuel

and for mechanical problems, which happen frequently. But unlike NASCAR racing, the teams do change drivers frequently during

stops. For Yovich, who serves as a mechanic for his snowmobile, he has three drivers — Woodward, Walesky and Eric Zellar.

The team runs in a division that includes vintage snowmobiles. What qualifies as vintage in this case are snowmobiles that were built in 1975 or earlier. There are modifications to the snowmobiles and newer, or even fabricated parts, are added to the snowmobiles, but crucial parts must remain from 1975 or earlier. A couple of those parts are the chassis and the engine.

Yovich got back into racing about three years ago.

"A bunch of my friends were getting into it, so that's why I did it," Yovich said. "The first year I ran and I liked it so much, I decided I was going to build my own snowmobile."

His first year, he ran the one race, but then joined the four-race GLASS season last year. He ended up taking third during what was the first points season ever.

This year, his team has remained very strong. The team won its first race of the season, but it was a non-points race. They have taken ninth, first and third in the three points races, giving them a slight, 10-point lead in the standings.

The races involve much more than actual racing. In fact, that may take the least amount of time to be successful.

Yovich's team takes apart their snowmobiles completely after every race, looking for mechanical issues and other problems.

"It involves hundreds of hours," Yovich said. "I have a guy that all he does is work on my stuff."

Because the snowmobiles are so old, it's hard to find some of the parts needed. Yovich has at least "two of everything," and much of that was collected by traveling the

country for those pieces.

And because the snowmobiles are old and only have 350 CC engines, mechanical problems always arise. In fact, it's how teams deal with these mechanical problems that will dictate much of your race success.

"At Newberry, we found a problem with the motor at 9 a.m. and the race started at 10 a.m.," Yovich said. "We had the motor tore apart, back together and out to race in 45 minutes.

"Pretty much something is going to happen every race. These snowmobiles aren't designed for 200 laps a race. If you don't have problems, you are going to win."

The sport doesn't pay much. In fact, once expenses are figured in, it doesn't pay at all. Most races pay about \$3,000 for winning and about \$250 if you qualify for the pole. Other tracks may give a small bonus (maybe \$1 a lap) for each lap a driver leads.

Yovich hopes to create a sled for the stock class, which would allow him to compete in the Soo 500, the Indianapolis 500 of snow-mobile racing.

"We just got a sled," Yovich said. "We are just getting started."

Poyner (125) had a memory he'll never forget. At the team state meet, he had one of the most memorable matches in Lake Fenton history, defeating Dundee's Joey White, placing the team into the state finals. However, the next week, White kept the senior from winning a state title, in an overtime victory against Poyner. Poyner finished his career with 199 wins.

Justin Melick (145) capped off a dazzling career as he won his second straight state crown with a 6-4 decison over Dundee's Travis Reinhart. He won an individual and a team state last year with Detroit Central Catholic.
