Whether you call him "Judge," "Sir," or "Your Honor," McCabe has gained the respect of the people that come before him. In a case last week. someone thanked the judge for sending them to jail. "That person said it really changed their focus and changed their life. I guess we'll see," McCabe said.

► Judge Mark McCabe sees a variety of cases in Fenton, up to one-year misdemeanors, and hears felony cases at the Central Court in Flint.

If you get a ticket, file a civil case, or commit a misdemeanor in the area, he's the man you'll be standing before, and perhaps, should consider yourself lucky.

McCabe is friendly and enthusiastic. "I love my job, I like coming in, every part is enjoyable," he said.

As a judge, his duties include sentencing people to jail or probation, or choosing a winning side in a civil case. But, he tries to keep in mind what the people before him are experiencing. They took thousands of photos of birthday parties, graduations and weddings. They clapped at hundreds of plays, little league games, award ceremonies and ballet recitals. They tied bows on countless birthday and Christmas gifts.

Mom's hands proudly displayed her wedding ring to show the world that she had married the love of her life. They shook in fists of anger when she was hurt or angry.

They trembled when she wrote weekly letters to my older brother serving his country in Vietnam. They folded in prayer each night before she slept. They shook when she buried a son, her parents and her baby sister.

I'm writing to express my shock that you did not endorse the GDL library millage. The request was .25 of a mil, \$25 a year, if your home is valued at \$100,000. How could you advise a "no" vote on \$25 to fund a library in our city? Where are your priorities?

Due to loss of property taxes, Headlee rollbacks and reduction of state support, the GDL lost a large part of the 1 mil approved four years ago. This millage will only partially replace those funds.

Twelve thousand to 15,000 citizens visit Fenton's library each month. We have lost a permanent librarian, hours, staff has been cut and we will undoubtedly experience further reductions.

It is my opinion your advice pandered to anti-government sentiments. It was not from careful investigation into the benefits of the millage request.

Last Wednesday, the Holly Village Planning Commission held public hearings for two, special land-use

permits for medical marijuana dispensaries in the village, which drew about 30 residents to the meeting. Several residents offered public comment.

The board voted to postpone both requests, with commissioners Jack Hollands and Gary Okonski casting dissenting votes.

BothHolly Village and Holly Township have passed ordinances allowing medical marijuana dispensaries, with some restrictions.

Caregivers of America was requesting a special permit to open a medical marijuana dispensary at 4048 Grange Hall Rd., near the Subway restaurant. The request was postponed because the owner of the company

was not present, and could not answer questions from the board.

"I'm not comfortable acting on this without someone to ask questions and make things clear," said Commissioner Ryan Bladzik.

The second company, which is

doing business as "Well Greens," was postponed because they requested a space that did not fall within the distance restrictions set in place by the village ordinance, at 15190 N. Holly Rd, Ste. D. Before the May Summary 25 meeting, Well Greens will amend their request to use a Village Planning location that falls within the voted to postpone

acceptable distance, per the ordinance. Both companies will sit beforetheplanningcommission

again at its May 25 meeting. Attorney Denise Pollicella, of Howell, spoke on behalf of the owners of Well Greens. Pollicella also answered direct questions from the audience.

> "Dispensaries are not legal, period," said Mary Ann Vergith, of the Holly Community Coalition, during public comment. She asked why permits are being considered if dispensaries are not provided for in the medical marijuana law.

"The fact that it is not addressed specifically in the act does not make it illegal," said Pollicella, in response to Vergith's public comment. "If the majority of state prosecutors thought (dispensaries) were illegal, there wouldn't be 170 of them."

# Holly Village budget in good shape

Council question answered at final budget workshop

Holly — The Holly Village Council conducted its fourth and final budget work session at a special meeting on Tuesday.

#### Summary

► The final Holly Village budget work session was held on Tuesday. The public hearing on the proposed budget is May 24, at the regular council meeting.

The public hearing on the proposed budget will be held Tuesday, May 24 at the regular village council meeting in the council chambers.

The 2011-12 budget is balanced, with \$13,795 in the

general fund over expenditures, said Village Manager Jerry Walker. "We're actually a little bit ahead," said Council member Sandra Kleven.

The previous workshops focused on various sections of the proposed budget, said Kleven. "This one put everything together."

Council members asked Holly Village department heads questions about line items on their individual budgets. For the most part, departments stuck within the expenditures from last year, said Kleven. Fuel prices forced some departments over. "They did a very conservative budget," said Kleven. "Barring having any

kind of unforeseen accidents, disasters, I think it's a doable budget."

To prepare for a loss in statutory revenue sharing from the state of Michigan, the village has cut unnecessary training, not related to certification, from departments, in anticipation of the loss of revenue from the state.

The proposed budget also reflects both water and sewer plan options, which is up for public hearing and a council vote.

for the best phone calls possible. "A lot of older customers use it," said Radioshack representative Wendy Rodgers. "Customers who have used it love it."

**iPod Touch** — The iPod has come a long way since its debut in 2001. More than just a music device, the iPod Touch allows users to send text messages and make phone calls with the use of video calling (FaceTime).

For text messages, users simply have to download an app such as TextNow or TextPlus from the iTunes store. Each app assigns a phone number to the iPod, allowing the user to send and receive text messages. FaceTime comes standard with the iPod and requires an Apple ID and an e-mail address. From there callers, can chat it up via the frontfacing camera.

The only stipulation is that users must have a wifi connection in order to use the iPod's communication features. Thankfully, a multitude of businesses such as the Fenton library, and most McDonald's provide wifi to customers. Depending on the features, the iPod Touch ranges from \$209.98 to \$364.95 on Walmart.com. The device is available at most retail outlets.

**Google Voice** — Google's Android software is making a big splash in the cell phone world. The Internet hulk offers much more than flashy phones, however. Google Voice is a free VoiP service that has a multitude of features.

Users can screen their phone calls, have voice mail and text messages e-mailed to them, block numbers and archive phone calls.

Mike Oliver, owner of Hometown Computers in Fenton, said that the service is great for saving on his phone expenses. He would replace his cell phone completely with Google Voice if he could.

"Google Voice gives you a lot of options that bigger companies have," said Oliver "It makes you seem larger than you really are."

# The Freedom Center to host drug awareness program

There is just no stopping the local war against drugs. In response to several eye-opening deaths, caused by drug use, community members are emerging to lend their support, expertise and love to prevent one more young person from losing a life to drugs.

Prompted by the recent local deaths of Briona Jawhari and Erika Schlosser and then compounded by the drugrelated deaths of Kevin Harden and Curtis Perry, a group of local adults took action, forming the Community Parent, Inc.

The Community Parent worked together with the Genesee County Sheriff's Department to put together a compelling drug awareness program, "Chasing the Dragon."

Chasing the Dragon has been presented at Lake Fenton High School and Linden High School. The organizers are now preparing for a presentation at Fenton High School on Tuesday, May 10. Parents are encouraged to attend.

Later that day, The Fenton Freedom Center will be holding an open house and related program, featuring speakers who have asked

to share their stories and to offer their help.

Youth Pastor Jason McKay said the program will be informal and there will be a time for guests to share faith. During the open

house, parents or their children can stop by tables and speak directly with police, judges and experts. Police will have drugs on hand so that parents can see precisely what they look like.

McKay said education is imperative for parents so that they are able to spot any red flags with their children, and possible drug use. With a capacity of 600, the pastor is hoping to fill the church.

"Our idea is to empower the community through education and faith," said McKay. "Giving your child a drug test does not make you a bad parent. It makes you a good parent," he said. He added that he is constantly reassured that the kids want to stop this drug epidemic after many teens have begun opening up to him to talk.

• An empty toilet paper roll found in a bedroom could be used as a bong, as well as a pop can. Look for pinsize holes.

• **Missing plastic baggies.** This could be a sign of drug dealing.

• **Spoons, shoelaces,** lighters found in a bedroom could be used for heroin use.

• **Missing prescription** or over-thecounter medication.

In order to vote in the Fenton school board election, voters must live within the Fenton school district. The school district has students in three counties (Oakland, Livingston, Genesee) and three townships (Fenton, Tyrone, and Holly), as well as the city of Fenton.

In the city of Fenton, 5 percent of registered voters cast a vote in Tuesday's election, a total of 492 votes. Those numbers are higher than the last year school board election, where only 379 votes were cast, a less than 4 percent voter turnout. Fenton City Clerk Jennifer Naismith said she was surprised by the increase and attributes it to the library millage on the ballot.

Fenton Township residents within the Fenton school district voted at Lake Fenton High School. Of the 1,837 registered voters, only 134 of them voted for the Fenton board of education.

Last Saturday, the Fenton City Council held its annual budget workshop, where department heads presented their budget proposals and much discussion was held.

A public hearing is set on the proposed budget Monday, May 9 for comment from residents. If council members are satisfied with it, they could vote on it, according to Mayor Pro Tem John Rauch. If not, a balanced budget must be adopted by

A public hearing on the proposed fiscal year 2012 budget for the city of Fenton is set for Monday at 7:30 p.m. Following the public hearing, the council may vote to approve it. In his written summary, City Manager Lynn Markland said, despite the city making substantial reductions in operating costs during the past three years, it is falling further behind each fiscal

year and is not clos-

er to sustainability.

Markland believes that in order to reach a sustainable financial future, the city will have to consider a Headlee over-ride in addition to the reduction in costs and the financial contribution that some employees have made. (see sidebar)

In order to achieve the balanced budget, several contributions from other funds are necessary, as well as many difficult reductions, including the layoff of two full-time Department of Public Works (DPW) employees, said Markland.

The city manager said he wanted to thank the employees who agreed to changes in their health-care coverage and agreeing to pay 20 percent of the monthly premium. "These employees made this decision willingly and by doing so, expressed an understanding of our financial condition and a commitment to the city," he said.

Based on the actual figures and projections for the remainder of the year, fiscal year 2011 would close with a very small surplus in the general fund. Circumstances contributing to the decline in revenue are less development, more foreclosures and declining property values.

Budgeted expenses from the general fund for fiscal year 2012 are expected to be \$4,924,446, which is approximately 7 percent less than last year. Of that amount, more than \$805,450 (16.3 percent) of general fund revenues will be transferred to other funds to subsidize their expenses.

Significant projects (see sidebar) represent \$6,052,724 in infrastructure improvements and the expected grant funding for these projects will be \$1,998,932. Markland is recommending that the

city maintain the current millage and collect 10.6226 mils for fiscal year 2012. Police Chief Rick Aro said his department's budget proposal was reduced by



#### **Headlee roll back**

Headlee requires a local unit of government to reduce its millage when annual growth on existing property is greater than the rate of inflation. As a consequence, the local unit's millage rate is "rolled back" so that the resulting growth in property tax revenue, communitywide, is no more than the rate of inflation. A "Headlee override" is a vote by the electors to return the millage to the amount originally is necessary to counteract the effects of the "Headlee Rollback."

was made primarily from overtime funding.

"This cut will affect all of our officers as opposed to a lay-off, which would only affect one officer and his family," said the chief. "It's much more of a shared sacrifice. It may, however, mean fewer officers on patrol from time to time."

Aro said the department would not be buying any new vehicles. Operational costs for dispatch have been reduced through a decrease in full-time dispatchers. "These cuts were made by attrition and replaced with part-time staff, resulting in a significant cost savings."

Rauch said two people from the DPW could be laid off pending the outcome of the Teamster's contract, which has not been ratified by union members. "Health care was a big part of it," said Rauch. "It depends on figures of the ratified contract. We've given them some options. Maybe we won't have to lay them off."

Rauch believes the police chief has reduced the budget for dispatch by having part-time employees. "This benefits the city," he said. He noted that the police department is short two police officers by them not being replaced.

"Everything looks good," said Rauch. Because of Proposal A, (see sidebar) the city has to work with 10.2 mils, compared to 13. Proposal A was approved by voters in the mid-1990s. It would take a statewide vote to repeal Proposal A.

Rauch said he believes the department heads did an excellent job and the treasurer, deputy treasurer and clerk did an outstanding job putting the budget together.

**Continued from Front Page** good thing as a judge," he said.

"You have to do what your job is. If people have to go to jail, then they have to go to jail. That doesn't affect what my judgments are," he said. "You can't let emotions get in the way of the decision."

McCabe said over the years he has learned how to decide if someone deserves a second chance with probation, or must be sentenced to jail. "People understand that on the criminal side, the person puts themselves in jail," he said.

At the Fenton court, McCabe handles anything from traffic tickets to one-year misdemeanors on the criminal side.

Tuesday was a lighter morning, with most of his civil case files settling before reaching McCabe's courtroom. He handles small claims and civil cases up to \$25,000, landlord-tenant cases, and land forfeitures. His day on Tuesday began at 8:30 a.m., with 75 cases, including landlord-tenant and civil cases, and discovery exams.

The set of cases he'll be hearing is called a docket. He looks over the docket either the night before or that morning when he arrives, around 6:30 a.m.

McCabe spends more than half of his time on the bench in Fenton, but he also shares a rotation with five other district court judges at Central Court in downtown Flint, where he serves as chief judge.

At Central Court, he handles criminal cases, custody arraignments, felony cases, felony and misdemeanor warrants, and pretrial exams for murder. "Those are very busy days," he said. He presides over jury trials every other Thursday and Friday. His schedule is drafted one year ahead, by the court administration. "Every day basically has a purpose," he said.

Being a district court judge is a full-time

job, at least 40 hours per week. McCabe spends significant time in his courtroom, and doing legal research for his cases.

When he retires for the evening, his workday is not necessarily over. McCabe is always on call for search warrants. Sometimes, he will receive a call from a police officer in the middle of the night. McCabe then puts the officer under oath, and the officer gives him the details of the case. Oftentimes, the officer needs a warrant approved for a drinking/driving-related blood drawing.

"You just get used to getting up immediately, at 1 or 2 o'clock in the morning and you have to wake up pretty quickly and clear your head."

The officer will fax a search warrant and affidavit to his home directly for McCabe to sign and fax back.

McCabe is scheduled for 14 weekend and holiday arraignments, each year.

#### His role, in his words:

"The judge has to be an individual who is very attentive to listening to what the facts are, applying the law and reaching a decision that is correct under both the facts and the law, no matter who the parties are and what's at stake. You are an impartial arbiter."

McCabe became an attorney in 1976, and was appointed to the bench in 1993. He has been at the Fenton court on Silver Parkway since 2002.

As a judge, safety is always a concern. Security is always available, and the buildings have secured areas. He said he has generally felt safe and secure while working, and is rarely disrespected in court.

"I think people are very respectful of the court, and the court system. I think they're very respectful of judges. I think that's a very important comment to make about our society."

Vince Paris, director of SLPR, attended the Fenton City Council work session on Monday to discuss the lease agreement that he had drafted. He said, like all municipalities, SLPR has cut back and has been working toward consolidating its staff into one area. It used to have a no-cost lease agreement for office space in Lake Fenton Middle School, but those offices were closed in January. Programs are still conducted there.

their spending habits. Some match ups have included Spartan brand steak sauce with A-1 steak sauce, Top Care Allergy with Benadryl, and Spartan-brand fruit with Del Monte fruit.

"It's been an extremely successful program," said Chris Palmer, assistant director at VG's store on Silver Parkway. "I've had customers tell me they've switched brands because of it."

Even without the challenge, customers have nothing to lose when they try ge-

neric brands. VG's offers a double refund for customers who are unsatisfied with a product. Most generic brands in themselves have a money-back guarantee.

Palmer does not see much of a difference between the generic choice and the brand name selection. "Sometimes, there's a little difference in taste but for the most part, I buy store-brand foods," said Palmer. "Three-fourths of my groceries at home are from storebrand." He also said that many generic brands have the same manufacturer as national brands. Spartan milk for example has the same manufacturer as Country Fresh.

Sally Gearheart, of Linden, is enthusiastic about the program and makes use of the free product. "Even if I don't use the free product, I give it to my friend who's been laid off for a while or save it for the food pantry," she said. She usually purchases Spartan-brand products but admits that some items have a noticeable difference, especially canned vegetables. In these instances, she sticks to name-brand foods. She has seen the price of food go up dramatically so she keeps a sharp eye on cheaper items, and what is on sale.

Smaller food companies see the economic downturn as an opportunity to dispel the ideology that national names are always superior to the private brand.

"That was the perception years ago. With the poor economy, people are more likely to try alternatives," said Mark Castello, vice president of sales for Better Made chips. "Consumers are finding that the generic or store brand is just as good as the national brand, if not better."

Castello said that buying the cheaper brands is great for Michigan's economy since most of the brands are local and regional. Better Made, as an example, uses Michigan-grown potatoes and is family owned, allowing the company to reinvest their profits into the state. Since people are spending more on snack food rather than eating out, Castello sees the present as the perfect time to expose consumers to cheaper and tastier products.

"The per capita consumption (for us) is going up. When the economy gets better, people will still buy store brand. It'll be good."

The economy's future aside, consumers are adapting their shopping habits. You can't judge a book by its cover — and soon, food may not be judged by its label.

My side by side refrigerator is not keeping the food cold enough, but the freezer seems to be working ok?

Is there heavy frost forming on the back wall of the freezer? This is usually the cause of the issue.

Every refrigerator has one cooling system, and is located in the freezer section of the unit. Air is moved through the evaporator via a fan located in the freezer. The cold air is metered into the fresh food side through an air duct and pulled through the evaporator until the thermostat is satisfied.

The refrigerator self defrost the evaporator by use of a defrost timer, that turns off the compressor and turns on a heater attached to the evaporator until the defrost thermostat is satisfied. One of the components in the defrost system has failed and the evaporator has been blocked with frost or ice, causing low to no cooling in the fresh food side. Hope this helps!

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# Lessons learned from a gentleman

I met Orlen while in my 20s, and serving my first church. He was the pastor of a thriving congregation. He had poor eyesight, but his spiritual insight more than made up for his limited vision. Impressed by his accomplishments and the relationship he enjoyed with his church, I once questioned him about the secrets of his success.

'The Bible says the meek will inherit the earth,' Orlen replied. 'What do you mean?' I asked, a bit bewildered by his answer. 'The pastor who is meek will inherit his church,' he explained.

Orlen's view was new to me, but,

to my surprise, I found it to be true for great leaders through the centuries. Moses, chosen to lead his people out of slavery in Egypt, was known as the meekest man on earth (Numbers 12:3). Earlier, while in a position of power and influence, he had failed as a leader. Finally, after losing his high place in the government and leading sheep for 40 years, he was meek enough to lead people.

It's important to know, however, that meekness doesn't mean weakness. Biblically speaking, meekness means gentleness or humility. Orlen was a gentle, humble man, like his Lord. No wonder he had inherited his church, along with their love and devotion.

My second lesson learned from Orlen came when our church joined his in aiding a needy family. The husband and father had recently been released from jail where men from our two churches carried on a weekly outreach to prisoners. Together, our churches supplied food, clothing and housing for this homeless family and made numerous attempts to help them find work



so they could have a new start. As time passed with little progress being made in moving this family to self-sufficiency, I began to be discouraged, doubting that this former prisoner was putting forth much effort to provide for his family. I saw our earnest efforts failing and the whole project as a poor investment, so I voiced my concern to Orlen.

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His response to my now negative attitude has been unforgettable. 'It is better that they fail us than that we fail them,' he replied.

An anonymous writer in a brief but powerful piece entitled 'My Eternal Preference' summed up Orlen's attitude about caring for people. 'When we are given our rewards, I would prefer to be found to have erred on the side of grace rather than judgment; to have loved too much rather than too little; to have forgiven an undeserving rather than to have refused forgiveness to one who deserved it; to have fed a parasite rather than to have neglected one who was truly hungry; to have been taken advantage of rather than to have taken undue advantage; to have believed too much in my brothers rather than too little; having been wrong on the side of too much trust than too much cynicism; to have believed the best and been wrong, than to have believed the worst and been right.'

My third lesson from Orlen grew out of his view that newspapers are the most overlooked means of communicating with people. I took his words to heart and started writing a column. You're reading it, and that's the rest of the story.

#### CREAMY MUSHROOM SPAGHETTI

- Salt
- 1 lb. whole-wheat or whole-grain spaghetti
- 1 1/2 pounds mixed mushrooms shiitake, crimini, any
- that catch your eye at market
- 1/3 cup extra-virgin olive oil, eyeball it
- 2 leeks
- 3 to 4 cloves garlic, finely chopped
- Freshly ground black pepper
- 2 tablespoons finely chopped fresh thyme leaves
- 1/2 cup dry white wine
- 1/2 cup cream
- · Grated Parmigiano-Reggiano or Romano, for topping

#### DIRECTIONS

Heat water to a boil for the pasta, salt water, drop in pasta and cook to al dente.

Wipe mushrooms clean with damp towel. Remove woody stems. Thinly slice the mushrooms.

Heat a large deep skillet with extra-virgin olive oil over medium-high heat. Add the mushrooms and cook until deeply golden and tender, 10 minutes.

While mushrooms cook, halve the leeks lengthwise. Cut off a couple of inches from tough tops. Trim off root end. Thinly slice the leek then vigorously wash in a large bowl of cold water, separating all the layers to free of grit. Let leeks sit a few minutes then lift out of the water and dry on kitchen towel.

Add leeks to mushrooms along with garlic and season with salt, pepper and fresh thyme. Cook 3 to 4 minutes more then add wine, reduce half a minute then stir in cream and heat through. Toss pasta with mushrooms and adjust seasoning. Top with grated cheese at the table.

DEAR MOM: Don't lock your daughter in the tower. She'll just launch into a tearful soliloquy. And don't be indifferent to the boy. Get to know him as well as you possibly can. I suggest you force yourself toward this relationship to keep the door open. You and your husband should have a meeting with the two of them. Ask them to outline their plans for the future. Listen carefully. No scowling.

**DEAR DR. DONOHUE: A recent blood check** showed that my potassium was high. I was told to stop eating bananas and drinking orange juice. I also was told to return to the doctor's office the next week. I did. They took another blood sample. They told me nothing more. What happens when potassium is high?

– F.H.

**ANSWER:** Potassium has many important jobs. It keeps the body's electrical charges balanced. It's involved in transmitting nerve signals. It's needed to keep the heart beating and muscles contracting. It takes part in keeping the body neither too acid nor too alkaline.

High blood potassium raises blood sugar, weakens muscles, causes nausea and vomiting, and triggers erratic and dangerous heartbeats. When the level is very high, potassium paralysis and death occur. Your potassium must not have been all that high. You had no symptoms.

The causes of a high blood level include kidney illnesses, nonworking adrenal glands, a lack of insulin, sudden death of body cells, overuse of potassium supplements and medicines like beta blockers.

The blood level of potassium can be read erroneously as high when the patient, during blood collection, keeps clenching and unclenching arm muscles. It rises when blood cells break apart in their journey from a patient's arm to the laboratory. It could be your reading was high because of either of these situations.

It's hard to come up with an explanation that indicts an illness with raising potassium on one occasion and not keeping it raised for a short while.

The electrolytes -- sodium, potassium, bicarbonate and chloride -- are not well understood by most people. Yet they are responsible for many body ailments.
