Date set for Dominick Calhoun murder trial

Mom, boyfriend face up to life in prison if found guilty in boy's beating death

sstone@tctimes.com; 810-433-6786 A trial date has been set for the murder case of 4-year-old Dominick Calhoun, of Argentine Township, who was beaten to death in April 2010.

Genesee County Circuit Court Chief Judge Richard Yuille will preside over the case, to begin on Sept. 7.

Brandon Hayes, the 25-year-

old boyfriend of Dominick's 26-year-old mother Corrine Baker, has been charged with murder, torture, child abuse and drug charges and faces life in prison if convicted.

Baker faces up to life in prison for second-degree murder and second-degree child abuse. The Genesee County Prosecutor's Office said she did not do enough to protect her son from harm's way.

She is presently incarcerated at the Huron Valley Complex for Women on an unrelated drug conviction out of Livingston County. She was sentenced in August

Residents peeved about water/sewer rate increase

Holly — Around 70 people filled the auditorium of the Karl Richter Campus in Holly on Tuesday for the public hearing on water and sewer rates. While Council President Jeff Miller described the hear-

ing as an "informal meeting," it became an exchange of ideas and comments. More than 30

residents took to the podium, many ex-

pressing frustration at the possible hike in water and sewer rates.

"You're forcing us out of here," said Jentien Swartz, who complained about yellow water and already expensive water rates, drawing audience applause.

Summary

► The Holly Village public hearing on new water and sewer rates drew around 70 residents and nearly half gave public comment. The board will vote on the sewer rate plan on Tuesday.

"I think you guys should really grapple and try to find a way to keep your citizens here.'

In this setting, attendees were able to question the board directly, with Village Manager Jerry Walker and Miller answering many of the questions.

Resident Mark Diaz suggested possibly turning the

enterprise funds into private stocks. Have you guys really thought outside the box as opposed to options that were given?" he asked.

"I agree with you," said Miller, who will ask the village council to approve seeking a second opinion on dealing with the village bond debt.

Many of the comments were directed against the two sewer and water plans that would increase the rates that village residents currently pay, in order to cover the bonds the village must pay back after the new water plant was built.

The first plan has a 3-percent annual increase built in, with no base rate. Option 2 includes a base rate, and both have debt service against the village's bonds built in. Both raise the rates that residents, who receive village water and sewer, are currently paying.

There were also discussions about selling water and sewer service to the township and suing the developer of

> Although Miller took notes on a few of the many public comments and suggestions, he asked that a vote be made on one of the water/sewer options at the next council meeting, which is Tuesday. Miller said he supports the second payment option, which includes a base rate and a debt service increase.

> Walker said that even if a new plan is adopted on Tuesday, the rates could be re-evaluated in the future.

inequity in the wage scale, using informahis deputy's wages. He said that the deputy clerk and deputy treasurer's pay is usually equal.

"So we're going to pay based on a title?" asked Trustee Steve Ruth. Lambert's request suggested raising

the part-time deputy treasurer's salary to

be equal with the salary of the full-time deputy clerk, up to \$24,410.

"You can't just make them equal just because," said Winchester. "The deputy treasurer has been on-call for the last 35 years until the new treasurer (Freeman) took office."

Winchester said she believes her department was threatened by an early memo draft, written by Lambert that suggested reducing her deputy to part time and stripping the deputy clerk of benefits, to make the positions equal. "I feel that that was completely inappropriate," she said, adding that Lambert did not look at what her department does to come to that conclusion.

"That's why we're here discussing it," said Lambert. "That's not what I presented to the board at all."

Trustee Janet Leslie proposed that both positions be analyzed for hours spent on the job, to see if a wage increase could be justified. "It might be a

> good idea for us to review the responsibilities to determine if the workload is being distributed in an efficient manner," she said.

After discussion, the board voted 3-2 to have the deputy clerk and deputy treasurer keep a record of hours and responsibilities to see if a wage increase is justified.

Ruth voted against the measure because he said the board cannot require a report of hours.

Freeman said he wants the information concerning equal pay and benefits to be compared to Oakland County municipalities instead of a direct assessment. "There's no reason voting on it because it's not enforceable," he said.

Freeman also voted

against the measure to quantify the workloads of the deputy clerk and treasurer. All board members, with the exception of Freeman, voted against an increase to the deputy treasurer's wages.

Fenton — Walking from one side of the street to another in downtown Fenton should become a bit safer if the city installs pedestrian crossing signs, as recommended by the Fenton Downtown Development Summary

Authority (DDA).

Michael Burns, assistant city manager and executive director of the DDA, told DDA members Tuesday that Dan Burden, a walkability expert, suggested the city install the 52- by 8-inch signs in the medians of a few downtown intersections.

These signs will alert motorists to pedestrians attempting to cross the street. The tall, flexible bollard-style signs are crash resistant and can be mounted onto the roadway. Other downtown areas, including Birmingham, have similar signs. After discussing the signs with staff, Burns said they would test the signs at

a few crosswalks rather than installing them at every intersection. Intersections first on the list would be Elizabeth and LeRoy streets, Mill and Ellen streets, and LeRoy and Ellen streets.

Six signs, two at each of the three test intersections, would be needed to start with. Burns suggested the DDA purchase 10 signs in case additional signs are needed. New pedestrian crossing signs, at a nominal cost, would need to be placed in the right-of-way of where the bollard signs would be installed.

Each sign costs \$257.27, for a total of \$2,572, plus shipping and tax. Fenton City Council must approve this recommendation for the DDA to move forward on the signs.

How can this happen and who is eligible to receive a bridge card?

The bridge card, similar to a debit card, replaced food stamps as a means for dispersing food assistance to those in need. Eligibility for food assistance is based on gross income and follows federal guidelines. Lottery winnings are considered liquid assets and don't count as income.

According to the DHS, eligibility for food assistance depends on the financial situation of all members of the household group. A person must be a U.S. citizen or have an acceptable alien status. There is no asset test for food assistance. Most types of earned and unearned income are counted. Some examples of countable income are wages, self-employment earnings, rental income, child

support, Social Security and veteran's benefits. Expenses like rent are considered.

The DHS uses the Michigan Assistance and Referral Service (MARS) to determine how much food assistance a person can receive.

About two million Michigan residents received food assistance through the bridge card in March, and around 228,000 received cash assistance, said Gisgie Dávila Gendreau, marketing and public relafor the Department of

tions director for the Department of Human Services (DHS.) The federal government provides these funds.

Electronic benefits transfer (EBT) is the federally mandated system for delivering government food and cash assistance in the United States. These benefits do not include welfare and unemployment insurance payments.

In Michigan, the DHS administers the EBT. The bridge card delivers two types of assistance, food and cash, which functions as a debit card at more than 4,000 retailers and 4,000 ATMs, according to www.Michigan.gov.

In March, \$264,489,389.60 was paid out to clients in Michigan with an average monthly payment of \$135.77 per person. Genesee County received \$15,875,272 in federal food assistance in March.

Gendreau said that about 1 percent of food assistance funds are spent fraudulently.

Gov. Rick Snyder targeted bridge card fraud, starting with his appointment of DHS director Maura Corrigan. "The department is looking at ways to fight fraud, waste and abuse, and to make our limited resources go to people that need it the most," said Gendreau.

According to Gendreau, the DHS has added 30 new anti-fraud agents. For every dollar spent on agents preventing fraud, the DHS saves \$10. For every dollar spent investigating fraud, the DHS saves \$5.

On Saturday, the DHS arrested a storeowner in Columbiaville for food stamp racketeering to the tune of \$22,000.

In February, Corrigan announced changes to the bridge card system cutting out many college students from receiving assistance. Historically, college students could easily obtain a bridge card and receive \$200 in food benefits each month. Students now must also be working 20 hours per week or be supporting a child to receive benefits. Enforcement of the new guidelines began in April.

"We're ready to extend a helping hand to any citizen who is truly in need — including college students who care for young children and are taking the right steps toward becoming self-sufficient," Corrigan said in a DHS news release.

According to Michigan Policy Network, the new policy excludes 28,000 students who previously had EBT benefits.

wage, gave it their best shot Tuesday evening when they requested DDA reconsider their request and recommend they lease the building.

In the end, the DDA voted in favor of recommending Rex Todd Rogers to use the building for his high-end interior design studio in an 8-3 vote, with one member abstaining.

The building in question is a two-story house at 106 West Shiawassee Avenue, directly behind Vek's Auto Service. The DDA purchased the building in 2008, with the intention of tearing it down to make way for development.

Representatives of the FTP and the First Presbyterian Church of Fenton ap-

Craig Schmidt, chairperson of the DDA, proposed that Rogers and the FTP submit their plans and let the selection committee recommend which was the better fit for the downtown district.

Rogers, who was in attendance at Tuesday's DDA meeting, said this was a great opportunity for his studio. He said it would be a great

change for Fenton in that it is unique. He believed it would attract more businesses.

Dale Swihart, pastor of the First Presbyterian Church of Fenton, has been involved with FTP for years and requested that the DDA reconsider its choice. He

Schmidt said the DDA would try to assist them in finding another location. He also said the fact that Rogers is handicapped was one

of the biggest factors in his decision to recommend his design studio.

DDA member Mike Piacentini asked why the DDA would be leasing the building for just \$1 per year. He felt it was unfair to other retailers. "We need parking," he said. Piacentini and his wife, Karen, own Fenton's Open Book across the street.

Schmidt said this is strictly a shortterm plan and if a developer expressed serious interest, the one leasing the building would have to vacate. The entity leasing the space would be required to pay the \$2,400 in taxes to the city.

Mayor Sue Osborn said she was in favor of the FTP moving in and that it would have been an excellent establishment for the students.

Corporate Income Tax

Sen. John Gleason (D) The new tax reform bill eliminates the Michigan

Business Tax (MBT) and replaces it with a flat Corporate Income Tax (CIT) of 6 percent that can only be levied against companies that are C-corporations under

federal tax law. Businesses that are not C-corporations will only pay regular earned income tax of 4.35 percent. The loss of the MBT will cost Michigan almost \$2 billion in revenue, said Zin.

The loss in revenue is partially offset by eliminating or reducing many individual tax exemptions.

The Earned Income Credit (EIC) is being reduced to 6 percent and the \$600-perchild tax credit is being eliminated.

Many pensions can also be taxed under the new plan.

Under the new plan, people drawing a pension born before 1946 are still exempt from paying taxes on their pension.

Taxpayers born between 1946 and 1952 would begin having to pay taxes on pensions until the age of 67. After 67, a portion of the pension income would become exempt.

Don Kirkwood, of Fenton, was born in 1950, and is a retired Delphi accountant. He, and other salaried employees, lost their Delphi pension during the company's bankruptcy, which was replaced by a reduced government pension.

Kirkwood lost 30 percent of his pension, while others lost up to 70 percent, and his pension will be taxed at 4.35 percent. "At a minimum it's \$800 a year the rest of my life," he said. Kirkwood feels like the new tax reform bill is double taxation. "I paid taxes back when I earned the money," he said.

"I'm not broke, but this is how retirees go broke," said Kirkwood, who is Independent politically, but did not vote for Snyder. "People on fixed income are going to be the ones who are paying the price here," he said.

Kirkwood is not sure how it will af-

Fenton DDA recommends Jerry Mansour as consultant

The Fenton Downtown Development Authority (DDA) voted unanimously at its meeting on Tuesday in favor of retaining Jerry Mansour as a consultant. Michael Burns, assistant city manager and director of the DDA, recommended the move. With more than 25 years of experience in commercial real estate, Mansour will assist with negotiating a possible development project for the southeast corner of Silver Lake Road and LeRov Street. He will also assist with addressing possible real estate issues and the securing of tenants for the site. Mansour would be paid a fee of \$3,000 per month for the 18-month contract, which begins on June 1. The contract can be ended with a 15-day notice. Fenton City Council must approve this agreement.

Lake Orion architect selected

The Fenton Downtown Development Authority selected Stephen A. Auger Associates to conduct an architectural and engineering analysis. With the purchase of the Republic Bank site in October, the DDA now owns three contiguous sites along LeRoy Street, from Silver Lake Road to the United Methodist Church. If it were to be developed, the DDA would need the analysis before moving forward. Auger, of Lake Orion and John Costa, of Flushing, submitted proposals and both were interviewed. The selection committee determined that Auger was the most suitable for addressing the project. Costa's price was \$2,750 and Auger's price was \$7,500. OHM would provide the schematic design and site analysis/topography components of their proposal at this time. The cost for the two phases is \$10,900. Fenton City Council must approve this recommendation.

The sergeant had been reading the 145th Psalm just before starting out on the flight and reported that during the fall he found himself joining the Psalmist in saying 'The Lord upholdeth all that fall and raiseth up all that be bowed down' (Psalm 145:14), certainly an appropriate verse for his precarious situation.

Describing his dangerous dangling experience, Entrekin said he asked for strength to climb back into the parachute harness, which he had failed to fasten securely.

Gasping for breath in the icy air and summoning his last ounce of energy, he doubled his body and caught hold of the harness floating just above his foot.

Moving steadily upward, he was able to climb back to a sitting position and re-buckle, while still dropping swiftly. Moments later, upon landing safely, he said, 'Thank you, Lord.'

This may be a dangling day for you. You're not speeding earthward while dangling from a parachute after jumping out of a plane in a snowstorm, but recent events have you feeling like your life is out of control. You may have spent yourself into a financial storm. A church bulletin once wisely warned if your outgo is more than your income, there's no question about the outcome.

Family problems may be getting you down. Your job seems less secure than you expected at this stage of your life. World events are making you a constant worrier and it's affecting your health and family. You're often edgy and cross.

How do you get your foot back in the parachute strap?

Enkreton set a good example for anyone under extreme pressure. He nourished his faith by reading the Bible before leaving on this dangerous venture and by remembering what he had read even when a panic point arrived. He exhibited faith but also had a plan and stayed with it. He trusted God but also kept climbing upward, expecting to reconnect with that parachute strap and survive.

In his book, 'Secrets of the Spirit,' Ray C. Stedman tells about going through a time of deep distress and turning to the following advice of Jesus given to His disciples to help them find peace: 'Let not you heart be troubled, neither let it be afraid' (John 14:27). He says, though he was very familiar with these words, that on that occasion he saw something in them he hadn't noticed before. Let him tell it.

'What impressed me were the words, 'let not.' They mean that these disciples could do something about their problem. They held in their hands the key to their release from heart trouble. It was possible for them either to let it happen or not to let it happen. Our Lord is saying this to all of us. There is a way out of this heart difficulty — this distress.' Thanks, Mr. Stedman. We needed that.

Apricot chicken

Ingredients

- 2 T. extra-virgin olive oil, 2 turns of the pan
- 2 lbs. chicken tenderloins, cut in 1/2 across on an angle
- Salt and pepper
- 1 large onion, chopped
- · 2 tablespoons cider or white wine vinegar
- 12 dried pitted apricots, chopped
- 2 c. chicken stock
- 1 cup apricot all fruit spread or apricot preserves
- 3 T. chopped flat-leaf parsley, for garnish

Directions

Heat a large skillet with a lid over medium high heat. Add oil and chicken. Season with salt and pepper. Lightly brown the chicken a few minutes on each side, add onions. Cook five minutes. Add vinegar to the pan and let it evaporate. Add apricots and stock. When stock comes to a bubble, add preserves and stir to combine. Cover pan, reduce heat and simmer 10 to 15 minutes. Serve chicken with a sprinkle of chopped parsley.

DEAR SEEKING: I'm not aware of any specific protocol surrounding secret second families, and because we don't live in France (where these matters are de rigueur), we don't have much of a cultural guideline. And so you should do here what you should always do: Be kind, be considerate and demonstrate your family values to the best of your ability. Depending on your father's state of health, you and your siblings could speak with him openly. If that's not possible, you should try to locate these family members after your father's death (Facebook is an amazing resource for locating people). I give you and your siblings much credit for facing this challenging issue so gracefully. Somebody raised you well.

DEAR AMY: "Anguished Mom" was very worried about her 17-year-old daughter, who had decided to forgo her own college plans to follow her boyfriend across the country. Wow — this sounded familiar. I made the exact choice when I was her age. I supported him as he attended college (half-heartedly) by working at the local Dairy Queen and other grunt jobs. We married just a few months shy of my 21st birthday. We were young, foolish and really, really poor, but happy. For a few years, that is. About three years later, when I realized he and I were not right for each other, I came back to my parents, tail between my legs, and said, "I made a mistake." DEAR DR. DONOHUE: Do you have information on gout? I am 65, and my son-in-law is 32. We both have it. It is so painful. My doctor was pretty vague. He asked me to go on the computer to find which foods I should or should not eat. I found that you can't eat meat and fish, but salmon and chicken are all right. Some vegetables can't be eaten. How about tomatoes and tomato products? Does one attack mean gout is forever? What is the medicine of choice?

ANSWER: Gout comes about when the blood uricacid level rises. Uric acid seeps into joints to form needle-shaped crystals that cause joint swelling and unspeakable pain. Uric acid, in turn, is a byproduct of cell chemistry. Its blood level rises because a person makes too much or passes too little into the urine. A first gout attack most often occurs in the joint at the base of the big toe. The skin over the joint turns red, and the joint swells and becomes exceedingly painful. One of the best ways of diagnosing gout is to draw fluid from the affected joint and examine it with a microscope to see the needle-shaped uric-acid crystals. Gout can affect other joints: the knee, wrist, ankle and fingers. One attack of gout doesn't call for lifelong treatment. Indocin (indomethacin) is the drug most often used for an acute gout attack. Colchicine and cortisone also work well. Medicines for gout prevention are taken if a person has frequent attacks (two or three a year), has formed uric-acid kidney stones, has kidney damage secondary to gout or passes large amounts of uric acid into the urine. Zyloprim (allopurinol) reduces uric acid production. Probenecid increases its elimination into the urine. Uloric, a new gout drug, is for those not responding to these two. Diet was the sole means for gout treatment in the old days. Now, with effective medicines, it takes a back seat. You ought to eliminate organ meats — liver, kidney, sweetbreads and brain. Decrease but don't eliminate red meat and shellfish. Beer should be avoided. Wine can be taken in small amounts. Soft drinks containing high-fructose corn syrup (and most do) shouldn't be drunk. You can eat all vegetables and any vegetable you want. That's the gout diet. Not complicated.

LF soccer enters GAC tourney in second place

Blue Devils control own destiny for a league title after 7-1 win vs. Byron

That's because the Blue Devils will enter the GAC tournament in second place, just one win behind first-place and defending champions Goodrich after defeating the Byron Eagles 7-1 Tuesday at Lake Fenton High School.

The win means that if the Blue Devils win next week's GAC tournament, they can do no worse than earn a co-GAC championship. Goodrich will win the title outright if they win the tourney or will earn at least a co-title if they make it to the tournament championship game.

The Blue Devils dominated Tuesday's contest throughout, but it took awhile for it to show on the scoreboard, leading just 1-0 at the half.

However, led by freshman sensation Jordan Newman, the Blue Devils' offense took over in the second half. Newman set a school record for goals scored by a freshman by scoring two goals. She has 33 goals, breaking the record of 30 set by Jaime Tomaszewski in 2005. Katie Austin also had two goals, while Alexis Adams, Denise Carlson and Alyssa Kruger had a goal each. Sierra Bruder had three assists, while Sidney Scott had two. Alexa Lanxton and Newman each had an assist as well.

The Blue Devils could've threatened

the eight-goal mercy rule, if not for one player — Byron keeper Christa Latson made several outstanding saves.

"We controlled the game from start to finish. We just couldn't put the ball into the back of the net (in the first half)," Lake Fenton coach Lenny Glasstetter said. "We hit the keeper many times, but the Byron keeper also made some nice saves."
