

Many local businesses such as Big Boy, Mancino's, and The UPS Store are independently owned under a franchised name. These independent, locally owned businesses pay a franchise fee between 3 and 9 percent to use the national name, yet they are still a locally owned business.

Many of your insurance companies such as State Farm and Nationwide are operated by local agents of the national company. Investment companies such as Edward Jones are operating under the guise of the national name, yet have a local businessperson operating the office.

Most of your carryout food establishments are locally owned family operations, too. Domino's, Little Caesars, Jets, Jimmy John's, and even McDonald's are locally owned and operated franchises.

Other independently owned businesses in town are Eclections, BC Comics, MosArt Jewelers, Caravan's Hallmark, Sagebrush Cantina, Uncle Ray's Dairyland, Fenton Fitness, Fenton House, The French Laundry and more.

So, as you can see there are hundreds of locally owned mom and pop shops around town. They may be hiding under a national name, but they are locally owned by local business people who are proud to operate a business in Fenton and the surrounding area.



On Tuesday, the Tyrone
Township Board of Trustees
voted to authorize the township
attorney to draft a counteroffer
for the sale of 34.5 acres to
Fenton Sand & Gravel, with no
changes to the existing consent
agreement.

The 34.5 acres of land for sale lies within the Tyrone excavation site where Fenton Sand

& Gravel is currently mining. According to Clerk Keith Kremer, Fenton Sand & Gravel proposed to pay approximately \$2,500 per acre. The township rejected the offer and is currently reviewing what the land is worth.

According to the previous reports, Fenton Sand & Gravel donated the 34.5 acres to the township after the company bought the land in late 2002. The land was donated for the use of a public park.

Kremer said that a consent agreement granted the town-

ship the right to own the land, originating from a lawsuit in 1981. He isn't sure 100 percent how the township came to acquire the right to own the land.

"The consent agreement is part of a settlement in a lawsuit that came from a previous board," Kremer said on Wednesday. "There were disagreements over what was being charged for and what wasn't being done. I don't know all of the particulars anymore."

Currently, Tyrone Township does not possess the title.

"It will cost \$40,000 to fence in this property and 15 acres of it might be usable," said Kremer at the Tuesday night meeting of the board. "Do we really want this land? Why don't we sell it and put the money in a fund?"

Treasurer David Kurtz and Trustee Steve Hasbrouck agreed and said that the money from the sale should

be used for a public park.

Resident Marc McCaffery asked if any of the board member's had visited the 34.5 acres and what is the board's desired outcome of the sale.

Kurtz was the only member who said he had walked most of the 34.5 acres in the excavation site.

"We want to protect our interest and to gain something from this sale. The longer we wait, the more we'll lose," Kremer said to

McCaffery.

McCaffery expressed doubt in the board's knowledge of the land and the proposed sale as a whole. "I hope you guys decide on what's best for the township," he said.

The land sale will be discussed at an upcoming meeting after it is drafted by the township attorney.

this year. This will result in additional expenses for the assessing department.

Burns said it is unknown at this time how many appraisals will need to be done, however, the amount Molloseau is asking for should be more than necessary to move forward. He said the DDA's additional fund balance would cover these expenses. The DDA also will have a reduction to the approved budget of

about \$9,000 this year due to refinancing of the bonds for the fire hall and DPW.

Molloseau said if the money were allocated, the assessing office would select four or five of the 31 businesses in the DDA district appealing assessments and have professional appraisals conducted, if necessary. Appraisals typically cost from \$2,000 to \$8,000.

Lake Fenton High School met the AYP standards and received a B overall for their accreditation grade.

Holly High School was the only high school in the tricounty area to meet the AYP requirements and receive an A for their accreditation grade.

All other schools in the Fenton Area Public Schools, Linden Community Schools, Lake Fenton Community Schools and Holly Area Schools met AYP standards and received an A for an accreditation grade.

Fenton superintendent Timothy Jalkanen said Fenton High School did not meet the AYP standards because only

92 percent of students in the special education sub group participated. AYP standards require 95 percent of students to participate in order to pass.

'Our goal, without question, is to have 100 percent of our students take the test and master the test," Jalkanen

said. "We're very proud of our students and the work they're doing. We want to continue to improve our school system."

Jalkanen said that the majority of students who were tested did show overall improvements compared to last year's results.

Holly superintendent Kent Barnes said he was pleased with Holly's results. "I am very proud of our AYP status," Barnes said. "Thanks to all our staff members and students for doing their personal best."

Lake Fenton superintendent Wayne Wright said that teachers at Lake Fenton High School will work hard to raise the accreditation grade from a B to an A. "The

math score was down somewhat from the past. We are doing well, but we want to move that B back to an A, where it was last year," Wright said. "That's a strong push for us."

In Genesee County, 35 schools did not meet the AYP standards. In Oakland County, more than 17 high schools did not meet the standards. According to the Michigan Department of Education (MDE), 60 percent of high schools in Michigan met the AYP standard, down from last year's 81.9 percent.

Not all of the results from NCLB for Michigan are negative however. The MDE reports that 49 schools achieved

AYP two years in a row, and are no longer on the NCLB consequences list. Schools that received an A on their report card increased from 1,526 last year to 1,765 this year. The number of schools identified for improvement this year was 386 schools, down from last year's 453 schools.

The MDE said every school in Michigan received state accreditation.

In a statement, State Superintendent of Public Instruction Mike Flanagan said that he expects more schools will fail to meet AYP standards next year, as Michigan is raising its assessment cut

scores, which directly influence student achievement.

"While scores may initially decline, educators support this change because preparing students for long-term success is the right thing to do," Flanagan said. "I have faith that our outstanding educators across this state will rise to this challenge — and continue to do so with honest effort and integrity."

concern among residents, fearing for their children and pets' safety.

Stewart Grove, who lives in Tyrone

Township with his wife, Gail, sees and hears coyotes regularly around their home. As an avid hunter, he has hunted coyotes and has one displayed in his home.

Just a few weeks ago, Grove was working in his garage, at home while his dog was lying down in the yard. As he walked out of the garage, he spotted a coyote sneaking up on the sleeping dog. The coyote saw him and left. "Coyotes are like professional killers," Grove said. "It's nothing for them to take a dog out.'

Grove attributes the population increase of coyotes

to a few things. As people spread out, they are purchasing 10, 50 or even 100-acre parcels. This private property, with no hunting taking place, makes for a perfect and protected breeding ground for coyotes.

Another reason why there are more coyotes is that their fur is not in demand as it once was. "At one time, a coyote coat was valuable and pretty," he said. Protests by

animal rights activists has led to a decline in demand.

Grove, who has felt chills run through him when he hears coyotes howling at night, has seen the animals within sight of his back deck. He said his next-door neighbor suspected a coyote had recently attacked their Boxer dog, after seeing that it had gotten into a fight with another animal. The result was about \$800 in stitches.

Jackie Campbell, Holly Village council member, has been a resident of Holly Village for 54 years. She is very concerned about the increasing number of

coyotes in the area. She hears them from her back yard.

Campbell's dogs were attacked by an animal. They believe the attacker was a coyote, based on the evidence, but they can't be 100 percent positive. One of her dogs was injured so badly that it needed \$5,000 in veterinary care.

"We can hear howling at night," she said. She added that things seemed to have calmed down for the time being. Coyotes, as well as other wildlife are integrating more and more with human life, becoming less fearful and shy, Campbell said.

Campbell's biggest concern is whether a coyote could become aggressive enough to attack a small child. She has heard from residents that they are frustrated with the lack of help from the DNR, to reduce the numbers. "There are problems out here," she said. "If you talk to the farmers, they're (coyotes) close to their property.

"It's a growing problem and it needs to be addressed.'

Dave Dinstett and his wife, Andrea, of Rose Township heard a coyote howling for a few minutes around 12:30 a.m. on July 16. The next day, they heard what sounded like

About coyotes

Coyotes breed from January to March and the pups are born about 60 days later. During the breeding season and after the pups are born, the animals become more defensive of their territories.

During the summer and fall, coyotes typically become more vocal as the roam and call to each other or protect their territory, according to the DNR. Just because someone spots a covote, there is no reason to assume they are causing problems or about to cause problems.

Coyotes primarily feed on small mammals, such as mice and voles. They will sometimes feed on rabbits, turkeys and even deer if the opportunity arises. Coyotes will prey on domestic animals, such as sheep and poultry, however, these instances are rare in Michigan.

With more development in rural areas, the chance for interaction between coyotes and people increases. As the wild animal becomes more and more accustomed to living near people, they begin to associate people and their homes with food.

More interactions with people and the fact that hunting is not allowed in urban areas results in the coyotes becoming bolder. Their natural fear of humans is no longer reinforced.

kids yelling and screaming and/or hound dogs yelping. As the sounds got closer to their home, they believed what they were hearing were two packs of coyotes fighting in the woods near their home.

Anyone wanting to hunt or trap coyotes needs a "fur taking license" from the DNR. Landowners are allowed, however, to shoot a coyote on their property if they believe it is about to, or is doing, damage to their livestock or pets, etc. "It's best to get a license," said Grove. "There are rules."

Ways to reduce negative encounters with coyotes

- Coyotes in urban areas are generally frequent your yard.
- Bird feeders can also attract coyotes. Removing feeders and cleaning up bird feed for a couple of weeks can help to
- Coyotes may also learn that other **food** sources may be found near homes and will sometimes take advantage of pet foods and trash left out overnight. Bringing pet foods in at night and placing trash out
- the morning of pick up can help.
 Never intentionally feed a coyote.
- Livestock can be protected at night in barns or by using guard dogs. Motionsensing lights or a radio plugged into a motion detector may also frighten away

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- hunting for mice, which thrive in tall grass, under buildings, in trash, and in vacant lots. Removing brush piles and mowing areas of tall grass or taking other steps to reduce rodent populations decreases the chance that coyotes will
- reduce coyote visits to your yard.
- Small pets should be kept inside or attended to if let out, especially at night, when coyotes are most active.
- Poultry should be confined to a coop and kept in a fenced area.

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

There are new and seasoned runners to lend advice.

Turner's group was one of dozens that dotted the neighborhood around Kettering and west Flint where the toughest leg of the 10-mile run is located, featuring a series of challenging hills through a west-side neighborhood. Some of the groups were walking, some running,

and many wore fluorescent clothing to stand out in traffic.

In the tri-county area, runners are also gearing up for the area's biggest race, the Crim Festival of Races in Downtown Flint on Aug. 27.

Turner's weekly group runs an average of almost nine miles every Tuesday at 6 p.m. "The Crim training program is really awesome," said Turner, who has dropped 20 pounds getting ready.

"It's actually pretty fun, I'm shocked." A little after 6 p.m., the running group takes off down North Chevrolet Avenue, running for three minutes and walking for one, to warm up.

In addition to the weekly run, Turner runs with her Holly friends, Mordue and Kelmar, Thursday and Saturday, every week. Last week, they ran the entire route of the 10-mile race. They usually run through downtown Holly and are generally cheered on by bystanders, and sometimes even joined briefly by children. "Running with people really makes a difference," said Turner

While Turner and her friends run in groups, others prefer to work alone. Gail Thorpe, 45, of Fenton, has spent the last year building up her endurance, finally running a full 10 miles last Sunday." When I finished that 10 miles, even though my muscles were cramping up, I started to cry, because I can't believe my body can do it." Thorpe has good reason to be thankful for her abilities. She is running the full 10-mile Crim to celebrate 10 years being cancer free.

'When I'm running, I cannot believe that God is allowing me to do this," she

said. Thorpe started running shortly after her chemo and radiation treatments ended. "My oncologist told me to take up a hobby, so I picked running," she

Thorpe started slow, with half-mile runs, building all the way up to 10 miles. Her goal for the Crim is to run 12-minute miles, finishing in two hours, at the most.

Thorpe has the full support of her family, and even her boss who frequently checks on her progress. To get ready, she does one long run each week, and three shorter runs, adding up to around 17 miles per week. She said that running gives her a strong sense of well-being, and she has lost 15 pounds.

Thorpe recommends anyone interested in running to start training slow, to avoid injury and discouragement at early difficulties. A good pair of running shoes and an iPod is important, as well as a healthy diet. Setting aside time to run and a good attitude are also crucial, she said.

Jessie Anderson, 21, of Fenton, ran cross-county and track for Fenton High School, and now works at Bauman's Running and Fitness Shop in Flint. Bauman's facilitates Crim prep groups, for about 1,000 people.

Anderson has run the Crim six times, participating in the 10 mile, the 5K, the 1 mile, and the Teddy Bear Trot as a child.

Running is part of Anderson's life, and he's getting ready to run the 10-mile race on his own. "I feel a lot better in general when I run," he said. As part of his training program, Anderson runs six to 12 miles everyday. He looks forward to the festive atmosphere at the Crim and to all the community support the runners receive. "It's fun to see thousands of people in downtown Flint," he said.

Osborn is seeking to retain her seat as mayor and will be running against Tim Faricy, who holds a seat on city council. The candidate with the most votes in November will be elected to a two-year term.

Osborn has been mayor since 1999. She has lived in Fenton since 1976 and is currently employed as an income tax examiner for the city of Flint.

Osborn said she has dedicated 28 years of service as an elected official for the city of Fenton. "I love this community the citizens in it," she said. Although the city has accomplished many things since she was elected as mayor 14 years ago, she said there are important things yet to

Osborn would like to see the Cornerstone building developed. "We've waited so long for the rebirth of downtown and I don't want to quit now," she said. She also wants to create a new library, without raising taxes. "The library is so busy and it needs to be enlarged," she said.

Osborn would like to see that the community center is made handicap accessible. She considers the building an architectural jewel and it should be attainable for anyone wishing to use it. Faricy said he feels obligated to participate. He believes this is an opportunity for someone new to become mayor. "I'd bring a new perspective and thinking to the position of mayor," he said.

After raising his children in Fenton, Faricy said he wants to keep the city going in the right direction. Having degrees from the University of Michigan and Michigan State University and owner of multiple businesses, he believes he would bring a wealth of management experience to the city.

City council

The four residents vying for the three available seats on city council are incumbent Cheryl King, Michael Piacentini, Les Bland and Patricia Lockwood. The three candidates with the most votes will be elected to a four-year term.

Piacentini said he has listened to city council for years from the audience and believes it's time for a change. He would like to bring more citizen involvement to the council. He added that there are several issues that need to be addressed, He does not believe council listens on police protection and the water rates.

"They haven't done their due diligence," he said. "We've been lectured by city council for far too long. We need active citizen involvement, that's why I'm doing it.'

Bland retired last year as the long time director of Fenton's Department of Public Works. He has worked for the city

After working for the city for 41 years, Bland believes he has enough knowledge and expertise to help. "I'd like to use my knowledge to help the city of Fenton.

"I have no plans other than just staying involved with the city." He added that he might be able to take things in a different direction through his insight and knowledge of the budget. "It's a good time to do it," he said.

Lockwood is the former mayor of Fenton, former state representative and former Genesee County commissioner. She said there are numerous issues the city is facing, such as economic development, revitalization of the downtown, declining revenues, increased demands on public safety, and aging infrastructure.

"I believe an emphasis should also be placed on neighborhood road and sidewalk repairs," said Lockwood. "My vast experience will allow me to address these issues and represent the concerns of the citizens and businesses in this community."





The Perseids is a meteor shower visible each year, usually starting in mid-July and lasting until the end of August. Centered in the Perseus constellation, the meteor shower is named after Perseus' son Perseides.

Although NASA reported that Aug. 13 was the peak of the shower and best time to observe the Perseids, the shower is still visible until August 24.

The Leonids meteor shower is visible during the month of November and is considered one of the most impressive visible meteors of the entire year. The showers have been known to produce up to a thousand meteors an hour. Peak hours for the Leonids this year is in the twilight hours of Nov. 17 to the early dawn of Nov. 18.

The use of telescope is extremely tempting, allowing viewers to see things closer and clearer. EarthSky, a Texas based science group, recommends staying away from telescopes and binoculars, as they interfere with seeing the entire sky at one time.

"Using either reduces the amount of sky you can see at one time, lowering the odds that you'll see anything but darkness," the group says on their website, EarthSky.org. "Relaxed eyes will quickly zone in on any movement up above, and you'll be able to spot more meteors."

According to EarthSky, the best conditions to see meteors and planets are to observe them under a dark, moonless sky in a country location, free of lights. The site states, "If you're viewing in dark conditions, the best viewing time will be after midnight, in the hours just before dawn. At most, expect to see approximately 15 meteors per hour."

Mars is also visible until the end of August. However, the planet is so far away that it appears as the brightest star in the sky. Mars will be brighter and much more visible during March 2012.

owner of Michigan RV Broker USA in Brighton. "Even with high gas prices, people are still traveling with their RVs," he said. "They may not travel as far as they used to, but people are still on the road, making memories, no matter what their age."

Just 10 minutes south of Fenton is one of the country's premiere RV campgrounds, Waldenwoods Resort & Conference Center in Hartland, according to Leybourn. His customers will go there to try out the RV experience before purchasing a unit.

"We spend a lot of time camping at Waldenwoods," said Dan Shannon, who commutes to work while his family stays at the campground, several times during the summer. "It's

only 10 minutes away, but it's like being on vacation, with a lake, fishing, golf and tons of kids' activities."

The Shannons own a 34-foot Open Road fifth wheeler, which hooks up to the inside of the box of their truck over the axles, providing twice the control of their former travel trailer. "The biggest advantage of a fifth wheeler over a travel trailer is that you can haul another vehicle, boat or trailer with ATVs, bikes, etc.," said Shannon.

Recreational Vehicles

Motor homes are your vehicle and living quarters combined. They are divided into classes. Class A is the largest, Class B is the smallest and is built on a van chassis, Class C is often referred to as mini-motor homes, although they can be as long as many of the Class A's. They are distinguished by an extended section over the cab, which usually contains an extra bed.

Travel trailers are large trailers towed behind a vehicle. They are hitched to the back of the tow vehicle, which can be anything that has enough power and torque to pull the trailer.

A truck camper is living quarters that sits in the back of a pick-up truck.

Fifth wheels are trailers that have a gooseneck front section that extends over the bed of the pick-up truck. The hitch is located in the center of the truck bed. Fifth wheels can only be towed by pick-up or flat bed trucks.













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

Now, in spite of this disturbing professional prediction, some feeling was returning to his arms. 'God has given me a wonderful birthday present,' he said.

I left that hospital room with a new attitude. Healthy legs were carrying me down the hospital corridor. I was able to swing my arms and move my fingers at will. Suddenly I realized I had been taking these blessings for granted and was determined to never do so again. To keep my commitment, I often quote the first two verses of Psalm 103: 'Bless the Lord, my soul, and forget not all His benefits.'

In his classic book on the Psalms, 'The Treasury of David,' C. H. Spurgeon wrote, 'We should not forget even one of God's blessings. They are all beneficial to us, all worthy of Himself, and all subjects for praise. Memory is very treacherous about the best things. It treasures up the refuse of the past and permits priceless treasures to be neglected. It grips grievances tenaciously and holds benefits too loosely.'

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
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Ingredients

- 2 t. extra-virgin olive oil
- 1 pound chicken breast tenders, chopped
- · Salt and pepper
- 1 small onion, chopped1 pound macaroni elbows
- 1 pound macaroni elbows or cavatappi corkscrew shaped pasta twists
- 2 1/2 c. raw broccoli florets, available packaged in produce department
- 3 t. butter
- 3 t. all-purpose flour
- 1/2 t. cayenne pepper



- 1 t. paprika
- 3 c. whole milk
- 1 c. chicken stock
- 3 c. yellow sharp Cheddar
- 1 t. prepared Dijon mustard

Directions

Place a pot of water on to boil for macaroni.

Heat a medium pan over medium to medium-high heat. Add extra-virgin olive oil and chicken and season with salt and pepper. Saute a couple of minutes then add onion and cook another 5 to 7 minutes until onions are tender and chicken is cooked through. Turn off heat and reserve.

To boiling pasta water, add pasta and salt to season the cooking water. Cook 5 minutes, then add broccoli and cook 3 minutes more or until pasta is cooked to al dente and florets are just tender. While pasta cooks, heat a medium sauce pot over medium heat. Add butter and melt, then add flour, cayenne and paprika and whisk together over heat until roux bubbles then cook a minute more. Whisk in milk and stock and raise heat to bring the sauce to a quick boil. Simmer until the sauce thickens about 5 minutes. Drain macaroni or pasta and broccoli florets. Add back to the pot and add chicken to the pasta and broccoli. Add cheese to milk sauce and stir to melt it in, a minute or so. Stir in mustard and season sauce with salt and pepper. Pour sauce over chicken and broccoli and cooked pasta and stir to combine. Adjust seasonings and transfer to a large serving platter and serve.

Dog tormented by allergies

My 7-yearold dog, "Cara," itches terribly and scratches all the time. She may have allergies, but I'm not certain. I've tried a number of treatments, including Bena-



dryl, steroids, special shampoos and conditioners, sprays, pills, etc. I have her groomed regularly, and during the last trip had her fur shaved off because it tangles so badly when it's long. Nothing helps! Is there anything you could suggest?

A: I'm sorry to hear how Cara is suffering. I'm sure you've taken her to the vet for a complete examination to rule out other underlying causes, but I do want to mention it for my other readers' sake.


Dogs can suffer from allergies to many of the same things we humans do. Allergens like dust and dander, as well as flea bites, can cause allergic symptoms. Certain foods also can cause allergic reactions including skin reactions, itching, diarrhea and vomiting. You've tried several common medications to relieve allergy symptoms, without any improvement. It's time to consult the veterinarian again. Look at Cara's diet, including snacks and "sneaked" food that you may have caught her trying to get at. Also note her home environment, where she spends most of her time, and the objects, carpeting and plants around her. Talk with the vet about any other possible causes of her allergies.



DEAR DR. DONOHUE: Please tell me if a digital mammogram is a great deal better than a regular mammogram. If I need to pay part of the cost, I don't mind, if it's worth it. I don't want to pay for something that is simply "newer."

— S.P.

ANSWER: With a conventional mammogram, the image of the breast is captured on film, like a photographic image. With a digital mammogram, the image is captured electronically on bits of computer code, like a digital camera does. The techniques for taking a digital mammogram are the same as those for a conventional one. Digital mammograms are easier to store, and digital images are available immediately but are more costly.

A large study of almost 50,000 women concluded that the accuracy between digital and conventional mammograms is not significantly different. However, in women younger than 50 and in women with dense breasts, digital mammograms provide better pictures. Unless your doctor has directed you to get digital mammograms, you can rely on standard mammograms to serve you well.

DEAR DR. DONOHUE: For many years, I have put up with floaters. I am quite near-sighted, and my eye doctor says they're common in nearsighted people. Last week, I saw flashes of light. I called the doctor, and he saw me that day. He told me I had a vitreous detachment. Is this serious?

— L.Р.

ANSWER: The vitreous is a thick, gel-like material that fills the back two-thirds of the eye. It provides support for the eye. The vitreous abuts on the retina, the sensitive layer of cells that transfers incoming images to the brain. A vitreous detachment means it has pulled away from the retina. In doing so, it stimulated the retina to cause the flashing lights you saw.

The doctor made sure your retina was OK. Flashes of light also can be a signal that the retina is tearing. For the present, nothing else needs to be done. The doctor will examine you again in a few months to be positive the retina is remaining in good health.





Fenton Twp. — Ed Adams has never let age come between him and the sport he loves.

In fact, age may have been the exact reason why he got back into canoeing.

"I was out of it for 30 years and then one day, I was 70 years old and decided to get back into it," Adams said. "I started doing it and I haven't done too bad at all."

In fact, Adams has done outstanding.

He won his fourth straight gold medal at the United States Canoe Association Canoe and Kayak Championships during the event held at the Muskegon River in Newaygo.

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


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

Kevin, First off if you have paid to have this car fixed for this same problem more than one time, then you need to question the shop that is charging you and not repairing it properly. If they are not able to repair it, then you should not be paying, especially more than once. I would start with a compression test of that cylinder, both running and cranking compression. Compare it to the other cylinders. There are many other things that could be the cause like a vacuum leak, wiring to the fuel or spark control on that cylinder or a restricted fuel rail. You may need to go to a different repair shop to have this checked, but ask if the shop is sure that the quoted repair will definitely fix the problem.

"Program-wise we won more games than we lost," Olszewski said. "This was probably our best year for tournament wins throughout the age groups. Things keep going in a positive direction."

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












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
