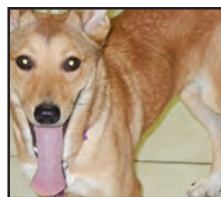
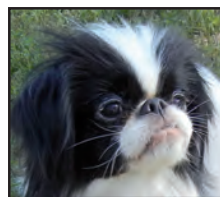

Fenton parks and downtown now have free wireless Internet access

Local company donates equipment and installation costs

Despite a government mandate several years ago urging municipalities across the nation to provide wireless Internet access to downtown areas, Fenton is one of the few Michigan cities to actually accomplish it.

Effective Sept. 9, all seven Fenton parks and nearly the entire LeRoy Street corridor, from Dibbleville to the north city limits, have free Internet access available to residents

and visitors.

Tri-County Wireless, a Fenton-based company in operation since Aug. 2004, donated all the equipment and labor at no cost to the city or residents.

“It was put in place by Mr. Rockman before he died last March,” said Tri-County Wireless CTO Fred Moses. “He felt very strongly that free wireless access was crucial to keeping our downtown areas vibrant and growing. He made us promise to finish

the project as soon as possible.”

The state-of-the-art equipment and accompanying wi-fi signal is not limited to just the LeRoy Street corridor and parks themselves, but will also serve many of the immediate surrounding

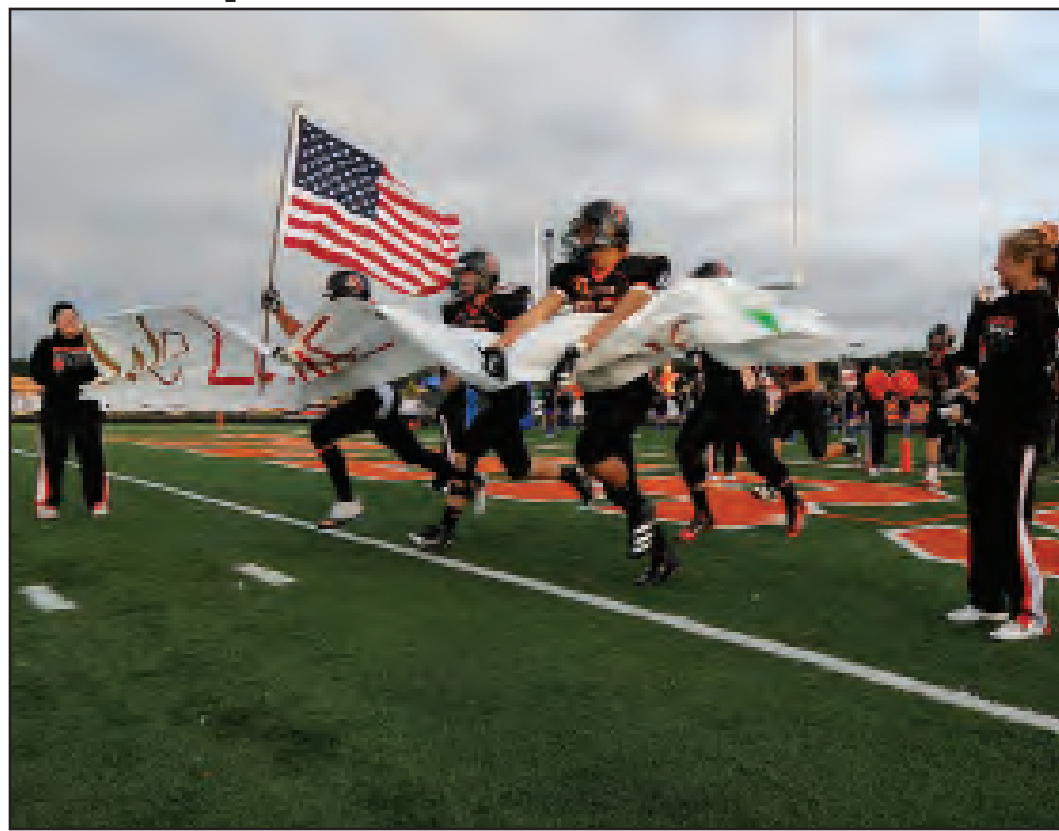

Federal investigators are challenging claims by SeaWorld Orlando that a killer whale grabbed trainer Dawn Brancheau by her long pony-

1 Add sparkle to copper

Add sparkle to copper by buffing it with a lemon half dipped in salt. Rinse and dry the copper with a clean cloth. Lemon's citric acid dissolves tarnish, while the salt grains scour to reveal shine.

2 Grease on clothing



Whisk away grease from clothing by adding one can of light colored soda (like 7UP), into a washing machine while its filling, then toss in greasy clothes. Add detergent and run through a regular wash cycle. The soda's citric acid breaks down oils so they wash out of fabrics and down the drain.

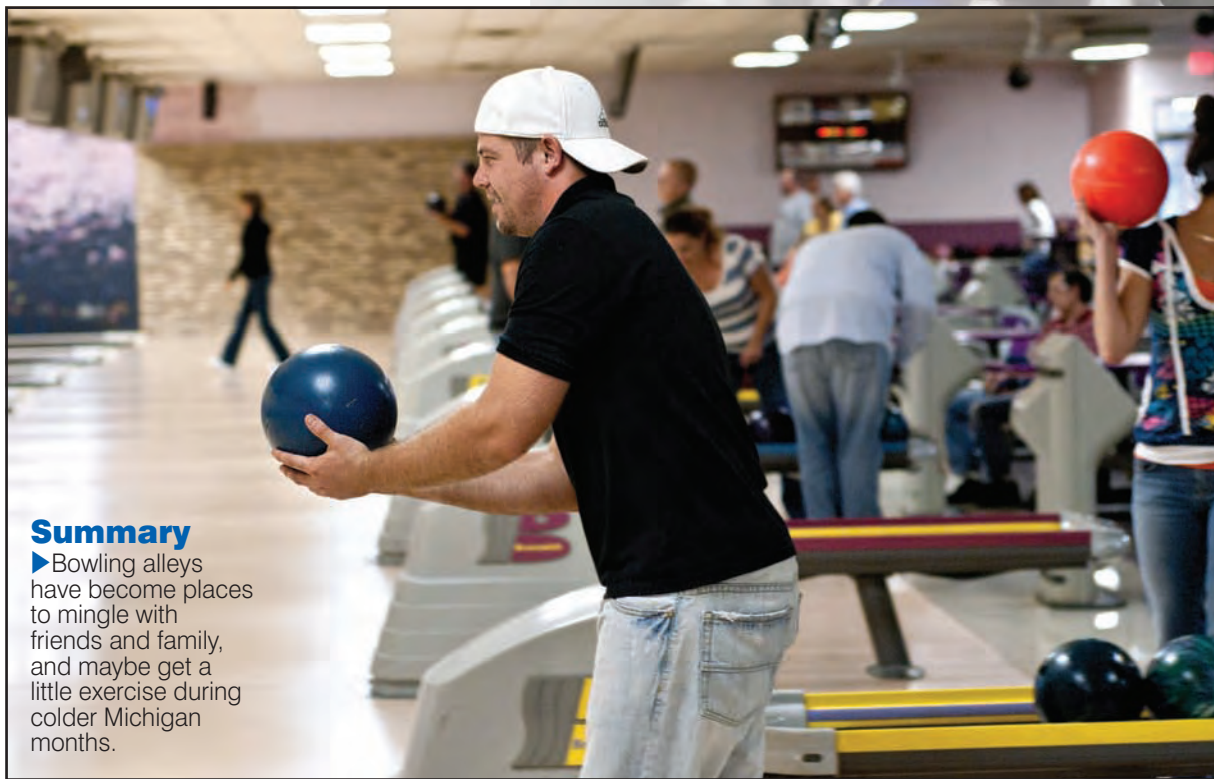

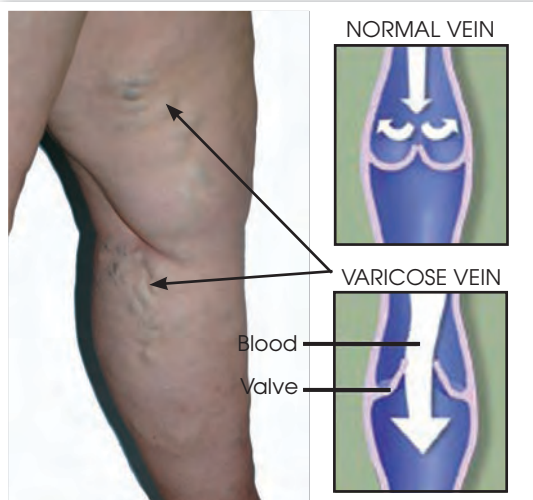

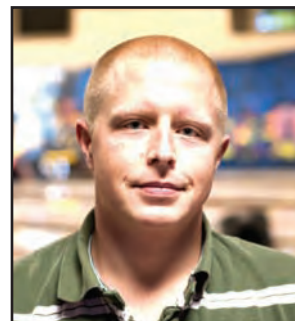

Township ponders purchase of mobile home park

►More than \$1 million owed in delinquent taxes to county

Tyrone Twp. — Tyrone Township has found itself in a bit of a financial bind. Cider Mill Crossing, a mobile home park located in the township, will be part of a public auction in Lansing on Sept. 28. Township officials are debating whether to purchase the mobile home park.

Also owed is \$1,334,540 in delinquent taxes to Livingston County from Cider Mill Crossing, which is located at Old U.S. 23 and Parshallville Road in Tyrone Township. When factoring in county interest and administration fees, the township must pay \$1,757,883 back to Livingston County.

Due to laws in Livingston County, all delinquent taxes within a municipality are collected by the county.

"The biggest risk here is if someone does buy it for \$100,000 and turns it back in four years," said Supervisor Mike Cunningham. "We'll still owe \$1 million in taxes."

The best-case scenario for Tyrone Township would involve an outside bidder committed to running Cider Mill Crossing. Such a scenario seems unlikely however as the owner of Cider Mill

Crossing could collect revenue without paying taxes, forcing Tyrone Township to pay the delinquent taxes.

Summary

►The Tyrone Township Board may or may not purchase Cider Mill Crossing. The board has to make a decision by Sept. 28, the day the mobile home park will go to public auction.

"As much as I'd like to say it, we can't make money off of this," said Treasurer David Kurtz. "Even if we leveled it, we'd still have to pay for the sewer (bond) rates. Either way, we're going to take the hit or buy it and run it."

The sewer bond rate for Cider Mill Crossing is \$225,000.

The board discussed the possibility of buying Cider Mill Crossing for \$1 million in order to retain the highest return on rebates possible. If an investor bought Cider Mill Crossing for \$1 million, the township would receive a rebate of \$779,600 split between various funds. An additional \$717,232 sewer bond rate would also be paid to the township. However, if only \$100,000 is invested into the mobile home park, Tyrone Township will receive a \$77,960 rebate from various funds and \$71,723 from a sewer rebate fund.

The board of trustees voted to table further discussion in lieu of new information and to hold a special meeting before the Sept. 28 auction. The specific date and time for the special meeting has not been scheduled yet.

News briefs

Emergency sirens approved

Rose Township is one step closer to having full emergency siren coverage. Last week, the Rose Township Board of Trustees approved a cost participation agreement with Oakland County for sirens. The issue has been moved to the planning commission for approval, said Supervisor Alison Kalcec. The township's portion of the cost will be \$69,000. Kalcec expects installations to begin in late fall. Currently, the township has no sirens of its own.

Enhanced recycling

The Rose Township Board of Trustees has approved enhanced recycling service for the township, which will expand items that residents can drop off on Oct. 1, at the North Oakland County Fire Authority (NOCFA) fire hall, at Rose Center and Milford roads. At no extra cost, residents will now be able to drop off grocery bags, phone books, plastic containers, pots and pans, newspaper, clear glass, aluminum cans, junk mail, and office paper. Supervisor Alison Kalcec said the items don't need to be sorted.

Scott's victims' rights bill passes Senate

►36-0 vote makes parole details public

On Wednesday, the Michigan Senate approved a bill sponsored by state Rep. Paul Scott (R-Grand Blanc) that would provide greater oversight and transparency in the parole process.

House Bill 4703 came after a series of hearings where Scott and Genesee County Prosecutor David Leyton testified before the House Judiciary Committee.

"I'm proud that today both Democrats and Republicans stood up to protect victims' rights," said Scott. "Increasing transparency in the parole process will give prosecutors the tools they need to keep our neighborhoods safe."

Current law forces prosecutors to file lawsuits against the state of Michigan in order to gain access to information regarding potential parole candidates.

ASK THE MECHANIC

Chris Wilkinson,

Q: I have a 2000 Chevy S-10. When it sets over night or 3 - 4 hours, it's very hard to crank. It whines over several times then it starts and runs fine. I have run several kinds of cleaner in the gas tank and nothing has helped. Do you have any suggestions? Thanks for the help!

— Jesse

A: Jesse, I would start with checking the fuel pressure regulator on this truck as they have a history of causing this kind of problem. To check this, you will need to find the small round canister with a vacuum hose going to it on the fuel rail. Unplug the vacuum hose to it, then have someone turn the ignition key from off to on while you watch for any fuel to come out of the tip of the metal canister. If fuel comes out, then you most likely have found your problem. If not, the next thing to check is the crank sensor as they can cause this problem too. This would take a lab scope and knowledge of the signal that it produces so you may need to take it to a repair shop for this. Other than that, you would be best to leave it at a shop overnight so that it can be diagnosed when it is acting up in the morning.

iPods, iPads, to hear and see the latest news and gossip. Their gadgets are linked directly to websites, such as Facebook, that allow them to know where their friends are at any given moment, the score of their favorite sports team, the weather, and who just broke up with whom.

There are now so many ways to communicate, such as the social networking site, Facebook, Twitter and Smartphones.

Facebook's mission is to give people the power to share and make the world more open and connected. Twitter is a real-time information network that connects anyone to the latest information about what he or she finds interesting. Smartphones are high-end mobile phones that combine the functions of a personal digital assistant computer and a mobile phone.

Area high school principals and their staff must be up on all the latest technology so that the technology is not abused by techno-savvy students.

Todd Reynolds, the new principal at Lake Fenton High School, said it would be difficult to find a student who did not own a cell phone. Per school policy, students are required to keep their phones in their locker or keep them turned off and stored in a purse or small nylon backpack.

The first time a phone becomes an issue, school officials will confiscate it for the remainder of the day. If the phone

becomes an issue a second time, a parent is called and the phone is turned over to them. The students know that if their phone becomes an issue a third time, the school will keep the phone until the end of the year.

Reynolds said that in his eight years as an administrator, one student has had their phone confiscated for the year. "The parents usually make it an issue after the

first time," he said.

Other electronics, such as iPods, are a completely different thing, said Reynolds. Because of their Wi-Fi capabilities,

students can access any website or listen to music. Students using the school's computers can only access school-approved sites.

Reynolds said teachers may let students use their iPods after instructional time and many do put earbuds in and listen to music. Students commonly use their iPods during lunch or in between classes. Because of the Wi-Fi capability, students can also check their Facebook account. "It's a lot for us to manage," said Reynolds.

Building trust of when the devices are appropriate to use is stressed so that they

do not become an issue to academics. "The academic integrity of the classroom is always at risk," said Reynolds who acknowledges that the potential is there for students to snap a quick photo of a test and send it to another student in a matter of seconds. "We're trying," he said. When tests are out, all electronic devices must be put away.

Students are not the only ones who violate the school's policy on cell phone use. Reynolds said oftentimes it's the parents, who send a text message to their child, and help the student break the rule. He added that if students truly needed to use their cell phone during the day, all they have to do is go into the office and ask for permission.

Teachers also interact with their students online through the district's website and their fusion webpage. The site's Blackboard page encourages back-and-forth communication between teachers and their students.

It's critter hunting time

►Volunteers needed for water monitoring program

On Thursday, Sept. 29 and Saturday, Oct. 1, volunteers are asked to get outdoors with the Flint River Watershed Coalition for its 13th year of a water quality, monitoring program.

Water quality monitoring is a vital tool that helps assess the health of the area waterways. The organization samples and identifies "creek critters," also known as macro-invertebrates, such as caddis fly larva, dragonfly larva, and snails.

It's a fun reason to get into the water. Testing occurs at 34 sites across Genesee and Lapeer counties, includ-

ing sites along the Shiawassee River in Linden and Argentine Township. The FRWC needs everyone's help to ensure that all 34 sites are assessed.

Data collected is used by the FRWC as well as local and state agencies to protect the watershed.

If one was unable to attend a recent training session, he or she will be paired with an experienced volunteer, who can teach novice volunteers.

was married to Scott Brancheau, the son of John and Terry Brancheau, of Fenton Township.

A Lengthy weeklong hearing began Monday and lawyers for OSHA said in court that they believe the 6-ton killer whale, Tilikum, grabbed Brancheau by the arm.

According to the Orlando Sentinel, OSHA's conclusion was based in part on the testimony of a SeaWorld Orlando security officer. Park officials have said that the whale grabbed her ponytail as it drifted into his mouth, while OSHA lawyers contend that the whale's actions were a more serious and dangerous matter.

OSHA argued that SeaWorld Orlando's animal trainers couldn't work safely while in close contact with the world's largest ocean predator. Lawyers also challenged the accuracy of an internal log that SeaWorld kept, which was supposed to document and analyze every aggression incident over the last 23 years. Lawyers argued that not all acts of aggression were recorded.

SeaWorld Orlando attorneys argued that Brancheau's death was an isolated tragedy.

Video footage has shown that the whale repeatedly struck and thrashed Brancheau and pulled her under water

as she attempted to escape. An autopsy revealed she died from drowning and traumatic injuries.

OSHA cited SeaWorld for three safety violations, including one classified as "willful," a \$75,000 fine in August 2010. "SeaWorld recognized the inherent risk of allowing trainers to interact with potentially dangerous animals," said Cindy Coe, OSHA's regional administrator in Atlanta, Ga. "Nonetheless, it required its employees to work within the pool walls, on ledges and on shelves where they were subject to dangerous behavior by the animals."

The whale that attacked Brancheau was also involved in the death of an animal trainer in 1991, at a park in Canada. SeaWorld had forbidden trainers from swimming with this whale because of its dangerous past, but allowed them to interact, by touching him while they were lying on the pool edge in shallow water, according to OSHA investigation.

The OSHA investigation also revealed that SeaWorld trainers had an extensive history of unexpected and potentially dangerous incidents involving killer whales at its various facilities, including its location in Orlando. Despite this record, management failed to make meaningful changes to improve the safety of the work environment for its employees.

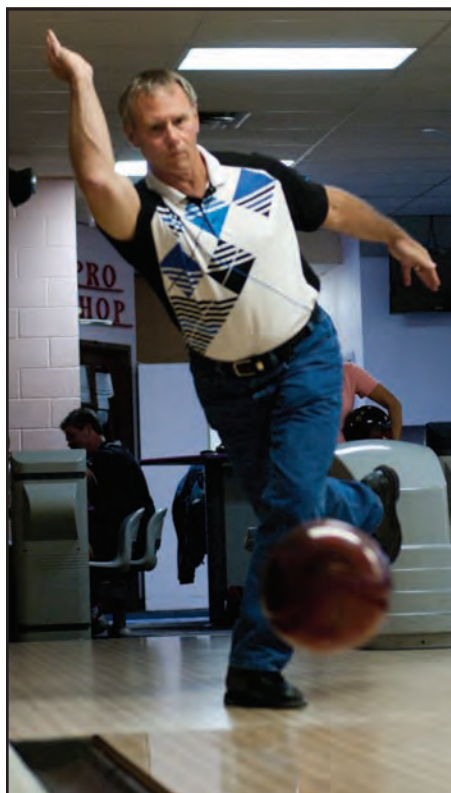

it on one of the 24 lanes. Fenton Lanes is one of two bowling alleys in the tri-county area, with Holly Lanes in Holly.

Both local bowling alleys have a variety of schedules and leagues. Some are held during the day, but many are at night.

The bowlers on Wednesday night were a mix of different backgrounds and professions, which Jennifer enjoys as she mingles and greets the guests. She knows many of them by name, and has played match-maker to at least one marriage. The senior couple was married right at the alley. "Isn't that interesting?" she said.

At the far end, a set of couples bowl, and munch on a plate -o-nachos. "I bowled my first strike!" said Eri Pochubay of Fenton, pumping her fist in celebration. Pochubay and her husband bowl for a team called "The Wild Ones" on weekends.

Jimmy VanVliet, of Grand Blanc, is celebrating his birthday with friends and a few pin-shaped Budweisers. "Beers and bowling, you can't beat it," he said.

Employee Dan Munro, of Fenton,

maintains the 40-year old machines that collect bowling balls and re-sets the pins. He usually only hears the customers. "It's great," he said. "I hear the hollerin' and screamin' and I know they're having a good time." He greases the many pulley wheels to keep the complex machines running smoothly.

Fenton Lanes is run and managed by Jennifer's family. The heavy-duty repairs and preventative maintenance are done by her brother, Jim Berg. Jim is an electrical engineer by trade, but does all of the mechanical engineering the alley needs. His workshop walls behind the five-foot tall machines are lined with dozens of small jars containing tiny pieces of hardware so he can be ready to do quick repairs. Even through a closed door, the sounds of spinning pulleys, crashing and pinging pins are ever present. "When all 24 (lanes) are going, it gets loud," said Jim.

He finds working at the bowling alley very fulfilling. "You work on something different every day," he said. At that moment, his mother, JoAnn Berg, called over the loudspeaker, "Ball return on 24, ball return on 24." Jim took off down the narrow aisle with machines to place the wayward bowling ball back on its track.

The heart of the business, balls and

A history of Bowling

According the International History and Bowling Hall of Fame, bowling may have started in Germany as early as 300 A.D. Some form of bowling was very popular in England in the 13th century, and variations were being played across Europe. Bowling came to America with British, German and Dutch immigrants, and endured a rocky relationship with the cities in which the game was played. In 1841, a law in Connecticut made it illegal to maintain bowling lanes, because of the gambling involved at the time. In 1895, pin sizes were standardized, and league competition was formed. Today, bowling is played by 95 million worldwide in more than 90 countries.

pins, also keeps him busy. The pins themselves are coated plastic, with a maple wood core. After a month of use, Berg lets a set "rest" back in dated boxes behind the return machines. This allows the pins to re-expand to their correct shape after being beaten on by the bowling balls. Sometimes, he has to send them back to be resurfaced.

While Jim keeps the machines humming along, Jennifer works to provide hospitality to her guests, for 12 hours at a time. She points to the majority of her customers, identifying them by name. "We work hard in the winter," she said. The business just opened for the season at the end of August, and they close down during the summer.

Jennifer stocks the bar with Michigan beer and wine, even trying to buy local grease to cook with.

Their business dropped at least slightly with the smoking ban, but Jennifer decided to see the positive side. "On the upside, more families are coming," she said, which includes more kids' birthday parties.

To Jennifer and her family, a bowling alley ends up being a microcosm of the tri-county area, almost like a community center. The core of a bowling ball is cork, foam, plastic or ceramic. The core of a bowling alley, at least in this area, is made of family, friends, and good times.

where the church would sell gift cards to its members and the church would be reimbursed a small amount of money on the transaction.

Summary

► A former member of a local church is suspected of embezzling \$10,000 from the church.

After a new treasurer was hired this year, a discrepancy of about \$10,000 was discovered. The church hired an attorney to look into the matter and to contact the suspect, a 58-year-old Flint woman, and former member of the church.

The suspect managed the gift card orders submitted by church members and accepted their payments. She is suspected of ordering numerous gift cards for her personal use and not paying for them. The church is still responsible, however, for paying for the gift cards that the suspect ordered and did not pay for.

The church went to police after attempts to reach the suspect were unsuccessful. The case remains under investigation and attempts are being made to contact the suspect.

**Focus on Vision**

Eyes on Learning

Going back to school ramps up the visual demands on your child drastically. There are many visual tools kids need in order to learn effectively.

Floyd Tymrak spends his mornings blending colors and manipulating paintbrushes. He reels through images from his past, conjuring a scene and eventually transforms a white canvas into a work of art.

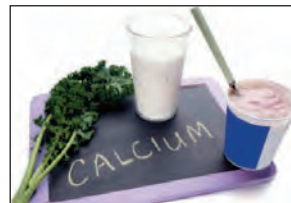

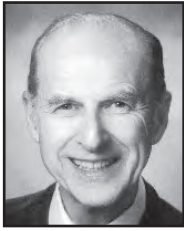

When losing is winning

'Do you recognize me?' a woman asked following a service at her church. 'I know I should,' I replied, trying to remember her name. 'I've lost 90 pounds since you were here last,' she announced proudly.

No wonder I hadn't remembered her. What made her success in slimming possible? Self-control she had gained through prayer.

In trusting God for strength, she had found the discipline she needed to achieve her weight loss goal and knowing I had written on the subject was eager to tell me of her desired accomplishment.

Not everyone appreciates my long effort to help those struggling with this very personal problem. 'A minister writing about losing weight?' one questioned. Some do more than question.

While being interviewed on a call-in radio talk show, I was scolded soundly by a listener who called to complain about my Biblical approach to weight loss. She accused me of using valuable time and effort to teach concepts on a subject in which God has no interest.

At one time, I would have agreed with this angry caller. Now, I know I was wrong.

God is interested in helping us overcome every problem we face. Since He

cares about flowers, clothing them with beauty (Matthew 6:28-30), we can be sure He cares about our health, our appearance and all of our other needs. If we mean more to our Heavenly Father than fowl or flowers, He must be interested in all the problems that eat away at us, taking away the joy of living.

A friend of mine had such a severe weight problem that at age 19, he was confined to bed. He weighed 750 pounds and spasmodic weight loss efforts were but temporary fixes. In the early hours of one morning, he stared at the ceiling and said, 'Lord, I'm impossible. Make me possible!'

The next morning my friend found strength enough to walk across his room and shortly after that was able to walk across the yard. He then committed himself to discipline in eating and exercise, which, over time, enabled him to lose 600 pounds.

Richard Ely, a busy pastor, wrote to me saying he had found success in losing weight through walking. He said he had to admit that his weight problem had been spiritual and by the time his letter arrived, his faith commitment had enabled him to lose 50 pounds. Describing his new way of life, he said, 'I've discovered the time walking is a precious time when I can talk and listen to the Lord and enjoy the beauty of His creation.'

On the wall of my study are the words 'God can move your mountain.' Name your mountain and God can move it! He moves hills and bumps in the road, too.

of artwork includes a man holding the reins of wild horses pulling a carriage, a painting that covers the door to his workstation.

"I paint because I love it. It gives me something to do. At 90, there's not much else I can do," Tymrak said.

Tymrak believes that anyone can be an artist, as long as he or she has the drive and a great instructor.

Professional artist and Fenton resident Sally Bright is a participant of the Grand Rapids ArtPrize this year. ArtPrize is an international art competition with nearly half million dollars in prize money. First place wins \$250,000. The general public will determine the 10 prizewinners through voting.

Bright said that artists get better by "doing art, studying art, and then doing art some more."

"You have to do art every single day. Look at what you've done and look at what you can improve on," she said. Over time, an artist will only get better and better.

Bright's art goes beyond canvasses.

Instead, she bends rattan and pieces of palm trees into fiber sculptures. She communicates abstract ideas and concepts through colors and different shapes that she sculpts. Many of her pieces have the illusion of motion, accentuated by curves and indents.

Whether by utilizing a brush or weaving materials into a sculpture, residents in the tri-county area are exploring their artistic skills. And, as Tymrak proves, it doesn't matter if you are 9 or 90 years old. "The first thing you have to do is find a qualified teacher," advises Tymrak. "Find an instructor that will teach you all the techniques."

For tri-county area residents looking to discover some of their artistic skill, the Fenton Community & Cultural Center and Loose Senior Citizen Center in Linden offer programs for beginning artists.

The Fenton Artist Guild meets every Wednesday from 9:30 to 11:20 a.m. A volunteer painting instructor is present at the senior center every Monday starting at 10 a.m. For more information, call the community center at (810) 629-2512 and the senior center at (810) 735-9406.

Turn off the water while brushing your teeth. The average American wastes 8 gallons of water while brushing their teeth with the water running.

Unplug the charger. Appliances use electricity even if they're still plugged in — up to 40 percent of their full running power, in a year that can add up to 190 pounds in greenhouse gases and about \$70 extra on your electricity bill. You can use one power strip to plug in things that can be turned off, like phone chargers, that way, you can turn them all off at once.

Cut down on plastic bags. Instead of taking new plastic bags every time you leave a store, put your purchases in a reusable bag or reuse the ones you already have.

Drive smarter. Don't add extra weight, don't speed, don't drive aggressively and don't overuse your air conditioner, all of which decrease fuel economy. Also, check the air pressure in your tires regularly. Poor air pressure can reduce your gas mileage.

Light it up with compact fluorescent light bulbs: They last 100,000 hours compared with Edison-inspired bulbs, which last from 750 hours to 1,000 hours. Using energy-efficient lightbulbs can reduce household emissions up to 10 percent.

Humidifier May Help Dog's Skin Allergy

DEAR PAW'S CORNER: I have just read your column about "Cara," the 7-year old dog with skin allergies that itches and scratches terribly. My dog had this problem, too, and I was helped by the Tibetan Terrier Club of Canada with a very simple solution -- run a humidifier for at least eight hours per day in the room where "Cara" sleeps. I did this with my scratchy fellow, and the problem was solved within a few days! Neither my vet nor groomer had ever heard of such a thing. I also switched to Science Diet Sensitive Skin kibbles. This has taken a toll on me. Any advice?

DEAR TROUBLED: Your friend seems to have a weakness for manipulative and controlling people, because you are quite obviously attempting to manipulate and control him. You cannot change your friend and you cannot make him break up with his girlfriend, regardless of her suitability. Instead, you need to examine your own behavior and make an effort to change your perspective. You are not being fair, and if you fire or demote your friend because of this, he will have legal recourse against you and your company. I suggest you seek psychological help to work through what seems to be a very unhealthy, toxic and obsessive cycle. In the meantime, back off and give this person -- and this relationship -- plenty of space.

DEAR AMY: I am a junior in high school. I am a good student, a member of many clubs and organizations, and play a varsity sport. My family is very close-knit. I have never given my parents any reason not to trust me. I don't drink or party, I never use profanity, and -- as a chronic perfectionist -- I always try to please them. Recently, I got a Facebook page. My parents check it once a day, though they don't have Facebook themselves (other relatives are on Facebook). My family seems to think that they should have jurisdiction over what I post. For example, if I post "rough day today," they tell me that I'm moping and to get over myself. If I post that I received an award, they'll tell me I sound arrogant. I had to take down pictures from my homecoming dance because both my aunt and my grandmother called my mother to say I looked like a prostitute because I wore makeup. The dress I wore covered my shoulders and went past my knees. I feel as if they control me so much that I can't create my own identity. I know they're looking out for me, but it hurts when your mother tells you family members think you look like a prostitute. I love them very much, but I wish my parents would let me live my own life. Do I just sound like a whining teenager?

DEAR TEEN: The good news is that I understand the classic teen rebellion musical "Footloose" is being re-released this month. The bad news is that your family seems to have provided the plot. From my perspective, your folks are lucky you haven't pushed back in the knee-jerk and (sometimes foolish) way that teens do when they feel smothered. Your parents are being very disrespectful. However, Facebook is public (to a degree). If your folks didn't look over your shoulder at your postings, other family members would report you to them. Keep a private diary (offline and for your own expressions), and if someone in your family insults you, respond to them by saying, "Wow. That hurt my feelings. I deserve better."

To your good health

DEAR DR. DONOHUE: What is the difference between anxiety and panic attack? I am claustrophobic, and I need to fly from the West Coast to the East Coast and back. I can't do so because of my problem. I have tried therapy several times, but it did not help. I do not want to go that route again. Can you give me some suggestions on how to be able to fly with this problem? Is there a medicine I could take before I get on the plane? -- Anon.

ANSWER: Anxiety is excessive worry. In some cases, worry is appropriate. But with pathological anxiety, the worry is about things that don't merit worry or about imagined things that truly merit no concern. Under "anxiety disorders" are many different conditions, each with a slightly different set of symptoms. They all share some things in common.

Panic attacks are the sudden onset of terror in places where such terror is inappropriate. The attack builds to a high point in a matter of 10 minutes or less. The attack can take place in a perfectly neutral situation, like shopping in the grocery store. During an attack, the heart beats fast, people become short of breath, and they often sweat and fear they are at death's door.

Phobias are unreasonable fears of people, places and things that don't engender fear in others. Claustrophobia is the fear of being in an enclosed space, like an airplane. Phobias can bring on a panic attack. Maybe your phobia is not so much a fear of enclosed space but a fear of flying.

I'm not certain these distinctions are of importance to you. The important thing for you is to uproot whatever it is that paralyzes you when you must board an airplane or to blunt it so you can function. Mental health professionals can get you over anxiety, panic attacks and phobias. I'm not positive what you mean by "going that route" again. Do you mean a detailed probing into your childhood and such matters? That isn't usually necessary. The doctor might prescribe a medicine that calms you and that you take only when needed. You won't become dependent on that medicine every day of your life. You use it only for the situation that throws you into such high anxiety.

"Really, in our front row, we can go to anyone to put it away with kills," said

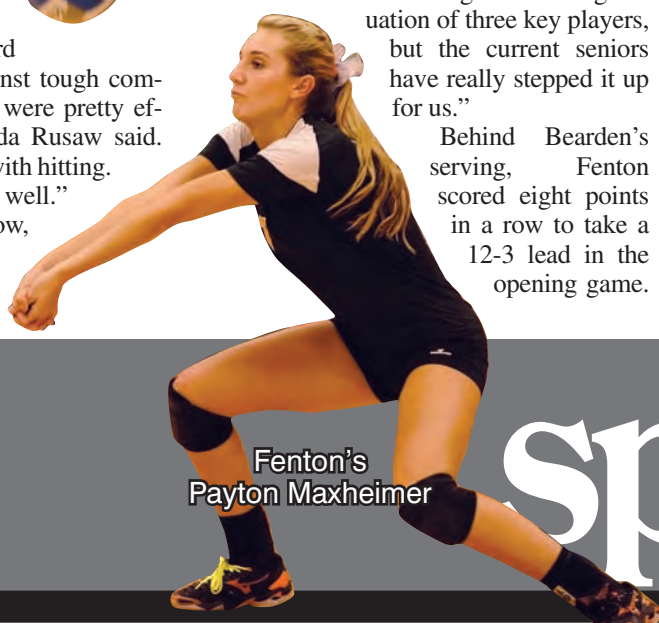
sophomore Ashley Bearden. "We were a little scared coming in with the graduation of three key players, but the current seniors have really stepped it up for us."

Holly — Goals have been tough to come by for the Fenton and Holly varsity soccer teams at times this year.

On Wednesday, that epidemic reached both teams once again as the two teams battling for the top spot in the Metro fought to a 0-0 tie.

The draw doesn't hurt Fenton nearly as badly as Holly. The Tigers (2-0-1) still can win out this season and win the Metro League title. Meanwhile, the Bronchos (1-0-2 in the Metro) now probably need to win out and still need some help to defend their championship.

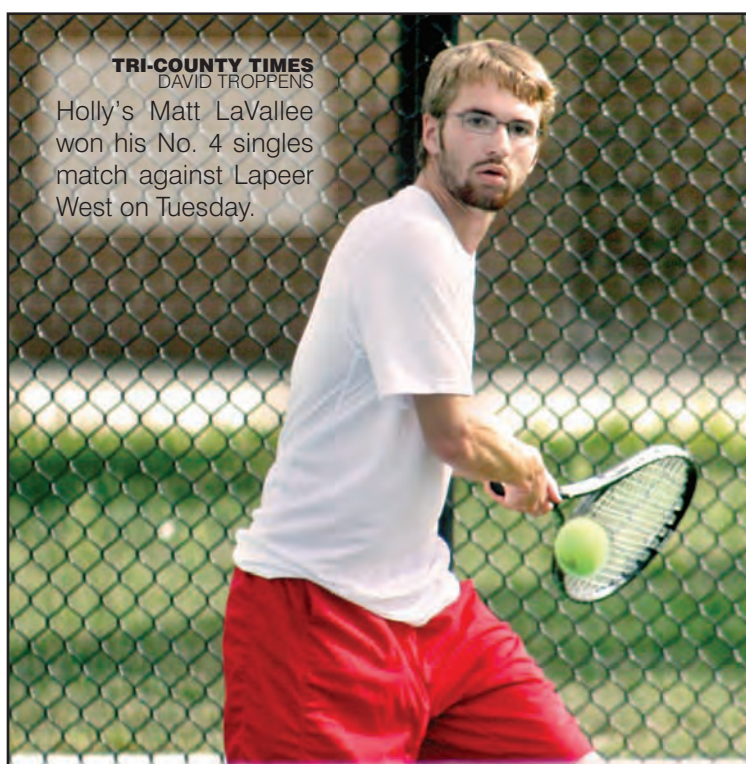

Kenny Allen had a full-ride scholarship offer from Oregon State.

He had other several big-name Division I football schools interested in his services on the football field. He made a trip to Alabama.

But when it came down to it, Allen knew what he wanted to be all along.

So when it came down to choosing a school to continue his punting/placekicking career, it probably was never really a question where he was going. And recently, he verbally committed to sign with the University of Michigan football program as a preferred walk-on.

"My whole life, me and my brother would play football outside and pretend we were a team," Allen said. "Every time we'd pick Michigan."

Allen has been on the radar as one of the nation's best punters and placekickers for awhile now. He credits that to Chris Sailer. Sailer holds a kicking camp, and while attending it, Allen's stock rose.

"I went to Chris Sailer's camp and after that camp, I was ranked the No. 2 in the country," Allen said.

Currently, Sailer had Allen ranked No. 10 in the nation, as a four-and-a-half-star prospect out of five stars.

Allen has always been around kicking in one way or another. Soccer has always been big in the Allen household as well. Eventually, that resulted in Kenny's older brother, Jimmy, playing youth football

and kicking for those teams. Still, Allen was thinking about playing soccer entering his freshman year and not much about football, until he was asked to give it a try. Since then, Allen has only worked on establishing his name out there. Last year he averaged 39 yards a punt, and rarely had the punts returned for any additional yardage. This season, Allen had his biggest highlight of his prep football career when he kicked the game-winning 45-yard field goal against the Linden Eagles during the second week of the season, ending a 10-year losing streak the Tigers had against Linden. For the season he has made three of his four field goal attempts, and all of his 11 extra-point attempts.

It's still not known exactly what role Allen will take with the team, but he senses it may include punting and kickoffs. He's not sure what his major will be yet, but he is thinking about sports management and business management.

Michigan's kicking game was among the worst in the nation a year ago, making just 4-of-13 field goals. The Wolverines have made their only field goal they've tried this year — a 21-yard field goal.

Punter Matt Wile is averaging 38 yards a kick this season, with a long of 47 yards. Allen is averaging 37.7 yards a punt this season and has kicked about 40 percent of his kickoffs into the end zone this season.

"I think I need to get better strength," Allen said. "But working with Michigan's strength and conditioning coaches, that won't be a problem."

PREMEDICATION

In 2007 the American Heart Association in conjunction with the American Dental Association came out with new guidelines for antibiotic premedication for bacterial endocarditis. Endocarditis is a serious and life-threatening bacterial infection of the lining of the heart and heart valves. The disease is fairly rare and usually only affects those people with an already underlying heart condition and/or defect. The same bacteria that attack the heart in endocarditis also commonly live in the mouth where they are a harmless part of dental plaque. In theory, it is thought that these bacteria in the mouth would migrate into the blood stream and ultimately to the heart during a visit to the dentist. Before 1997 anybody who had a simple heart murmur, or a history of rheumatic fever needed to be on antibiotics before going to the dentist. This meant that between 10-20% of our patients were having to take antibiotics as a precaution against bacterial endocarditis every time they had a dental appointment. Now, with the new recommendations, only patients with serious heart conditions and defects need to take antibiotics before their dental appointment. Less than 2% of our patients now need to be premedicated against bacterial endocarditis; and not for every dental appointment as before. Antibiotic premedication is recommended only if major dental work is needed. This is great news for a lot of people who used to have to take a lot of medication as a precaution.

Q. Why do I have a white film on my dishes at end of my dry cycle?

A. During 2010, dishwasher manufactures were required to remove phosphates from dishwasher detergent. This followed an earlier requirement for laundry detergents.

Phosphates help carry away lime from hard water, improving cleaning performance, and preventing white lime film from depositing on dishes, glassware and dishwasher tank. They were removed because they promote algae growth in lakes and rivers, depleting oxygen levels for fish and marine life.

Removing phosphates forced detergent makers to use different formulas with less than ideal cleaning results. It affected all dishwasher manufactures equally since dishwashers basically spray hot water and rely on detergents to break down and clean food away from dishes.

Lake Fenton — The final score may have not looked like it, but the Lake Fenton varsity boys soccer team gave Goodrich a battle before falling 4-1 in GAC Red soccer action Thursday.
