City to vote on contract for critter control

animals from water plant area

Fenton — During its work session on Monday, Fenton City Council agreed to vote on a proposal to hire Wildlife Management and Rescue to trap and remove wildlife from around the wastewater treatment plant for calendar year 2012 for \$2,500.

Last fall, the city hired Wildlife Management and Rescue, out of Flushing, to trap and remove animals that were making homes in the fenced area behind the water treatment plant, around the lime lagoons

Daniel Czarnecki, director of the Department of Public Works, said the animals were

creating a nuisance and compromising the integrity of the ground around the plant. As part of the city's new groundwater discharge permit from the Michigan Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ), these items needed to be addressed.

According to Mike Lowe, of Wildlife Management and Rescue, the company live trapped and removed nearly 80 animals from the property, so far.

Czarnecki told council members that the program has been successful and should be continued, at the same cost of \$2,500.

Steven Guy, water plant supervisor, said the animals dig and burrow, which could become a problem. A badger, which he did not know was in this area, was even caught.

Michigan students will be taking a tougher standardized test in the next

few years. The Common Core State Standards, which Michigan adopted in June 2010, is set to replace the Michigan Education Assessment Program and Michigan Merit Exam test by 2015. So far, 43 other states in America have adopted the Common Core State Standards.

"The whole goal is that our students will be prepared

for the work force and will be college ready," said Fenton Area Public Schools Superintendent Timothy Jalkanen, who presented the new standards to the Fenton Board of Education. "The bar has been raised for our students."

Under the Common Core State Standards, student test scores will

be comparable with the other states that have adopted the same standards. The new tests will take place in the spring instead of the fall.

The new standards may be too much for Michigan students, however. The Michigan Department of Education applied the new standards to MEAP and MME scores from the past four years and found that a majority of schools in Michi-

gan would not pass the new tests. The Common Core State Standards require students to answer nearly 65 percent of the questions correctly, as opposed to the current 39 percent that is required to pass the MEAP and MME.

Overall, fifth-, sixth-, and seventh graders in the Fenton school system were 91 percent proficient in math under current state standards. Under the new

standards, each grade dropped from 38 to 40 percent proficiency in math. Proficiency dropped significantly for every grade under the new standards.

"Fenton is above the state average in every area, but under the new standards, we're lower than the 95 percent we're

used to," Jalkanen said.

Board of Education Vice President Nora Kryza questioned what would happen to the district if the new standards were not met. Jalkanen said the outcome is unknown for now and that legislators in Lansing predict two-thirds of schools in Michigan will not pass the new standards.

"The U.S. Department of Education is allowing states to apply

for waivers if they cannot meet 100 percent proficiency," Jalkanen said. "I believe Michigan is currently applying for the waiver."

However, not all of the board members agreed with the new standards. Treasurer

Rick DesJardins said the new overall scores do not factor in Michigan's shift in demographics, causing the scores to be skewed. "We had one of the most devastating economic disasters in the state over the past few years," DesJardins said. "A lot of highly educated people left the state, causing our scores to drop. These results are arbitrary, meaningless."

Overall, the Fenton Board of Education agreed that students

should be prepared for the new standards. The Common Core State Standards is expected to be implemented into the Fenton Area Schools, curriculum before the new tests are adopted. Jalkanen stressed the importance of speaking to teachers for student progress rather than solely relying on test scores.

"The classroom teacher is really still the best person who knows the progress of each student," Jalkanen said.

The International Baccalaureate Theater at Fenton High School is adapting Shakespeare's 'Romeo and Juliet' with a twist. Under the direction of theater director Laurie Thompson,

students are updating the classic tale with a striking wardrobe and set props based upon designer clothing. The theater troupe is out to prove that under the

right conditions, the play can appeal to a modern audience.

"The play is about how we can display a classic piece of literature to students in a contemporary setting," Thompson said. "The story is timeless. The play's not about men in tights or a time period."

Tights and dresses have been replaced by ripped jeans and flared blazers. Designer boxes and chess pieces cram the stage instead of castles and countrysides. A runway jutting out into the middle of the crowd was also added, rounding out the themes of fashion and high class.

Students in the play are expecting their updates to captivate the audience. Hours of research and analyzing went into the production of the play as students deciphered each scene for a modern translation.

After rehearsing and memorizing every line, students discovered that aspects of the play are still relatable, even if they don't fully understand the language. War II as a young man. In fact, he was drafted the same day as Abbey Park resident James Dean, 92. Both were 22 when they served in the Army.

Keyworth was with the Army Signal Corps, and lost an arm to a

bomb in New Guinea, which lead to his discharge. "I still have a ringing in my ears," he said. He was in traction for 28 days and in the hospital for seven months. He was concerned about his injury and how it would affect his wife. "When you come home, you're not whole anymore," he said. "You don't know what the reaction is going to be. She never mentioned it."

Veterans Day grows more importance as he gets older, he said.

Dean is a little more reserved when talking about his service, though Veterans Day has always meant something to him. He has two sons who served in the military. One was badly injured in the Vietnam War. "It affected my life," he said. "Myself, I didn't see too much action."

Dean said he attended Veterans Day programs at different churches and cemeteries. "It always meant a lot to me," he said.

"It has a special meaning," said Keyworth. "It means more as you get older." He lost a close friend in the war. "I think about that a lot more than I used to," he said. "When you think about the life I've had that he missed." He paused, overcome with emotion. "He had two little girls."

Keyworth was able to return to his family, including an 18 month old baby boy he had never seen.

Bob Robison, 87, served from 1943 to 1944. As a B-17 bomber navigator, he feels fortunate to survive. "Many of my friends did not," he said. "They were shooting at us all the time."

Flying in a bomber was inherently dangerous. "Flights over Berlin were the most dangerous," he said. "Then there was that little girl in London," he joked, winking at his wife Helen of 65 years.

While he was on that run, his own plane was shot down. All the officers were spared as prisoners of war, but six crew members died at the hands of the people of the ground. Robison, who was 22 at the time, was safe on another bombing run. He was discharged after 31 missions. "I think of how lucky I was to be

a survivor," he said. Marjorie Tippett, 89, is one of two women veterans at

Abbey Park. She served as a nurse in the Army Air Corps, the precursor to the U.S. Air Force. She wanted experi-

ence as a surgical nurse, and remembers working with a paraplegic. She had the approval of her family to enlist at the time. "I was to make up my own mind," she said. "You felt as though you wanted to help, and that's why I joined." As a nurse she helped many people and was in charge of several hospital wards. "I feel that (Veterans Day) is an honor for all those that served," she said. "I always felt that way, even before I served."

Abbey Park's oldest veteran is Al Gillespie, 95. At 24, he served in the U.S. Navy. He had two roles on his ship, as 20mm gunner and the ship store keeper. As a gunner, he was responsible for shooting down Japanese Kamikaze, but laughed when he admitted he never actually had to.

Gillespie remembers Christmas Eve, 1944, when his group was preparing for an invasion. His wife was back at home. He vividly remembers seeing a Kamikaze plane fly over his ship and

plow into another one nearby. The Japanese plane killed more than 16 people on that ship, in addition to the commanders on board.

To him, Veterans Day is about the memories. "I don't think we should forget the people who were over there." he said.

The Tigers (9-2) earned it with a complete effort, slowly taking Okemos apart in each phase of the game in a 35-7 victory, Saturday at Fenton High School. The win means Fenton will play at Lowell Saturday at 1 p.m. for a chance at a regional championship for the second straight year.
