

How I came to Fenton and to this building and we stayed there 23 years. church...

My story started in Children's Hospital, where my son was in an Iron Lung. As I looked out the window to a roof next door, God appeared to me and said, 'I'm going to take your son home with me, but I will make it up to you.'

I couldn't understand at the time, but Mark did go home to be with Jesus, on January 20, 1957.

My life changed and I knew it would never be the same. We started going to church and one Wednesday night, God called me to the alter and told me He wanted me to preach the gospel.

Nevertheless, I was scared to death because I knew nothing about the Bible. But, I obeyed God, started taking Bible courses, and attended Bible College in Detroit. I was asked to come to Fenton to the Odd Fellows Hall and fill in for a church that was without a pastor.

There were two families to start with, the McCalls and the Kennetts, seven people in all. I had a dream to get out of the Odd Fellows Hall and 10 months later, we purchased the old Baptist church on Ellen and Walnut streets. It had been empty for a year and badly in need of repair.

We were so happy and not discouraged at all of the work. As pictures showed, it was a place to be proud of. All of my sons were married in that

But, we had no parking space and the church was growing. We knew we had to move on. We bought 10 acres on Shiawassee Avenue where we are now, from Mr. Dolza, and began to dream.

Because of the economy, we couldn't break ground until 1986. We had owned the property since 1980.

Everyone worked and we only borrowed \$150,000 to do all we had to do. The ladies of the church would cook supper every night and bring it to the church. The men would not even go home from work, but would come directly to the church.

After a couple years, Mrs. Dolza gave the church the other 10 acres, so with the 20 acres, you could look around and see what we have here — a beautiful view and the best 20 acres in Fenton.

What I want to say is that God in His wisdom used a child to lead us, and the Bible tells us that (and a child will lead them) and softened the heart of the rough and tough person that I was. It gave us a dream that we still have to this day.

Of the last day of our work here, and my last sermon and resigning of the church, please know my prayers are always asking God to give Pastor Jim wisdom and guidance as the church enters into this new level.

God bless you all. I'm always here if needed.

sstone@tctimes.com; 810-433-6786 Rev. F.E. Burke, the founder of the First Assembly of God Church, now known as The Freedom Center, died Thursday, Dec. 22 at the age of 85. He was at his home in Zephyr Hills, Fla. with his wife, Thelma and four sons.

Burke's grandson, Chris Burke, said his grandfather had been battling leukemia for the past five years before he died.

Burke was born in Tennessee and his family moved to Detroit when he was 16. He fought in World War II and returned to the Fenton area afterward. He worked his way through Bible school and began his ministry in his mid-'30s after the death of a son. He felt God calling him into the ministry.

In 1962 he founded Fenton Assembly of God, which was later renamed The Freedom Center. He was involved with building of The Fenton Freedom Center in 1985 and it opened in 1986. Jim Wiegand took over as pastor after Burke retired in 1995.

"He started the church with nothing," said Chris. "He had that old time grit. He did a lot of good things for the community. He had a good life."

Funeral services will be held Monday or Tuesday in Fenton and are being handled by Sharp Funeral Homes. His funeral is set for 11 a.m. at The Freedom Center.

"Secret Santas" this Christmas, who have anonymously come into the store and paid off peoples' layaways. "In my 35-plus years in this business, I've never seen the generosity of people toward total strangers as I've seen this year," said Faulk.

The Times ran a story on Wednesday

about these anonymous benefactors, who stop in at stores and restaurants and pay off layaways and orders of food that are waiting for pick-up. At Kmart, they focus primarily on layaways that have toys and children's' clothing, like outerwear and boots.

Because Kmart has been known for years for its

layaway service, more of these "Secret Santas" are paying off layaways there, than at stores like Wal-Mart, which just this year began to offer layaways on toys and electronics. The Fenton Wal-Mart hasn't reported any anonymous benefactors, as of Friday morning.

Since the story ran on Wednesday, another 20 layaways have been paid off, according to Faulk. "What it does is plant the seed to a lot of people that this is something they can do," said Faulk. "One person came in to our store on Thursday and paid off \$2,000 worth of layaways. The stories I've been hearing have actually moved me to tears. It has

been unbelievable."

One lady who came into Kmart on Thursday to pick up her layaway found it had been paid except for the last penny. "She came up to me and thanked me, and said she was determined to save money for next Christmas so that she could pay off someone else's layaway and give them the same feeling she had," said Faulk.

> Mary McKenzie, footwear manager/event planner, has been overwhelmed by these acts of kindness this year. "One lady broke down in tears when someone anonymously paid for the only two toys her kids had asked for," said McKenzie. "Another gentleman had been standing in line in our layaway department to

return the layaway because he couldn't afford to pay for it, when he found that his layout had been paid — all except for one penny."

Faulk estimates that about 40 layaways have been paid off by "Secret Santas" so far this season. It's been happening nationwide at Kmart, with more than a half-million dollars donated by people toward layaway payoffs. "When the holiday season is all done, I think the numbers of anonymously paid layaways will be amazing," said Faulk. "It's been a continuation of the whole 'pay it forward' concept of generosity. I've never seen anything like it."

#### **Police seek** witness to morning crash

▶Flint man airlifted to Ann Arbor in critical condition

**Fenton** — Fenton police are hoping that a witness will come forward and provide information about a Friday morning crash on southbound U.S. 23.

Det. Ron Skarzynski said police were called to the highway, just south of Owen Road at 7 a.m.

A 1996 Chevrolet Blazer with three male occupants from Flint was traveling southbound. None of the men were wearing seatbelts and all three were injured, one critically.

The driver, who sustained minor injuries, told police that a vehicle had cut in front of him, causing him to lose control of the Blazer. The Blazer left the roadway and flipped over as it entered the ditch.

The front seat passenger was ejected due to the Blazer rolling over.

All three men were transported to Genesys Health Park in Grand Blanc Township, however, the critically injured man was later flown to the University of Michigan Hospital in Ann Arbor.

signs in place were inconsistent with what he believed the specs asked for. Elfstrom, of Fenton, owns Bill Carr Signs of Flint.

City attorney Stephen Schultz told the DDA that, "At the very least, the bid package was ambiguous and the DDA, if anticipating solid aluminum decorative top pieces for this project, did not receive the product it sought."

Sue Grissim of the landscape architecture firm, Grissim, Metz and Andriese, was the hired consultant and she prepared the construction documents based on designs created by Weaver Design, a company based in Fenton. The Wayfinding Signage Project was released for bids on Feb. 8 and 11 bids were submitted.

Two groupings of bids were submit-

ted for the project, with a notable discrepancy between the two, however, no bidder requested clarifications about the bid package as a whole or the apparent ambiguity, said Schultz in a memorandum to the DDA.

One of the items in question is the aluminum scrollwork at the top of the large monument signs. Because the bid specs were ambiguous, bidders either understood the tops to be 3-inches thick (hollow) or 3-inches thick (solid). It could be interpreted either way.

Elfstrom's bid came in at more than twice that of Universal Signs because his signs included solid aluminum at the top rather than hollow, which Universal Signs used.

Another item in question was the vinyl used for lettering on the smaller signs, as well as the size of the lettering. The original specs asked for reflective vinyl so that it would increase visibility at night. The signs in place do not have reflective lettering. Lettering on the small signs have already been redone as the first ones delivered had lettering that was too small for many motorists to read, but the lettering is still not reflective. The last issue is the poles used for the small signs and the service club signs. These are also different from the specs.

According to Schultz's research, Grissim recommended Universal Sign Systems, out of Grand Rapids, based on the company's March 18 proposal. On Grissim's recommendation, the DDA entered in an agreement with Universal Sign System on May 20.

Schultz said Grissim has consistently stated that Universal's bid proposal and the signs as completed meet the specifications. In a letter dated, Dec. 7, Grissim told Schultz, "The word 'thick' is a dimensional reference, and does not mean solid. They are two different words with two different meanings. If the specifications stated 3-inch solid aluminum that would mean a solid piece of aluminum, but 3-inch thick was used to specify a dimension. It is not an industry standard to interchange the words thick and solid."

Despite Grissim's statement, Schultz said it is not so clear that the words thick and solid are not interchangeable. Because of the uncertainty, Elfstrom did submit an alternate proposal, however, that bid was also more costly than that of Universal's.

Michael Burns, assistant city manager and director of the DDA, said that at no time did Grissim tell him about the changes. "I should have been told," he said. He added that these findings give validity to Elfstrom's complaint.

Craig Schmidt, chairperson of the DDA, said the problems they are currently facing are because of Grissim.

Schmidt said one thing they need to find out is if Grissim changed the specs or if Universal Signs asked to have the specs changed to save them money.

"They have to be held accountable," said Schmidt. "We need to get it fixed and move on."

DDA member Jim Saule said there is a huge difference in cost between reflective and non-reflective vinyl for the lettering. "The changes were not approved by the DDA or Mike (Burns)," he said.

Schultz said, "They (Elfstrom's company) did us a favor by pointing out the discrepancy."

Councilman Les Bland, who was in the audience, said he was confused and upset that the city administration was not in on the bid specs to make sure they were right. "Someone has to take responsibility," he said.

"If she's (Grissim) at fault, she's at fault."

Currently, the city has not paid Grissim for her \$1,600 consulting fee on this project, which was her final project with the city, since the city had already dissolved their relationship with her firm for unsatisfactory work and excessive fees.

Saule motioned that the DDA hold back a portion of the full payment to Universal Signs because a portion did not match what they believed they were to receive. The DDA unanimously approved holding back \$20,000 of Universal Signs \$80,000 bill.

After the vote, Bland told the DDA that he felt bad for holding back money to a company that did the work when the issue was someone else's fault.

DDA member Chris Bayer said the signs are not how the DDA wants them. By holding back money, it allows time for the DDA to look into the matter and possibly redo the signs.

Schultz suggested that the DDA hold a joint meeting with Universal Signs, Grissim, Weaver Design and OHM to work something out and to bring back a recommendation to the DDA.

Schmidt said, Grissim and Universal signs now have attorneys involved, which has forced the city to seek counsel.

Schmidt said, "We will get to the bottom of this."

On Thursday, Grissim said her firm was hired to provide the construction bid documents and administrate the bidding and construction so that the signs met Weaver Design's committee-approved sign designs. She said Weaver Design was in charge of all approvals related to the sign design, meaning they were responsible to determine and approve the appropriate colors, sizes, text, layout, shapes, etc.

"We were to make sure the signs were durable and made with quality to last per the specified warranties," she said. "Throughout the process, we obtained shop drawings and requested approvals from Weaver Design on the items they were responsible for."

Grissin added that her firm copied the approvals and forwarded them to Burns for his records. She will be bringing these records to the joint meeting.

Sue Grissim was hired by the DDA in 2006 as part of the consulting team that John Dziurman, to conduct the Downtown Master Plan. Since that project, Grissim was hired by the DDA and Fenton City to be involved in a number of projects. Those that she has been paid for include:

- Landscaping upgrades to Bush Park in 2007.
- **Downtown Master** Plan in 2006 and 2007.
- Landscape architecture services for the Fenton Community & Cultural Center parking lot in 2007-09.
- Landscape architecture services for the tree restoration project due to the 2007 tornado in 2007 and 2008.
- **Development of** a landscape maintenance plan for the Downtown District in 2009.
- The Wayfinding signage project that began in 2008 that is still ongoing.
- Landscape architecture services for the 2010 downtown landscape
- Landscape architecture services for the Silver Parkway landscaping, lighting and irrigation project in 2010.
- **Work as** part of John Dziurman's team for the Community Center restoration project in 2010 and 2011.
- Work involved in creating a Downtown Streetscape Project (she provided a conceptual design in 2010, prior to us contracting with Landscape Architecture Services).

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

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

The alleged beating occurred over several days in April 2010 at the apartment Hayes shared with Dominick, Dominick's 27-year-old mother, Corrine Baker and her other son Tyler.

In September, Baker pleaded guilty to her original charges of second-degree murder and second-degree child abuse. Investigators and prosecutors said from the start that she had opportunities to get help for her young son, but chose to do nothing.


Sentencing guidelines for her guilty plea indicate 1 to 13 years in state prison. She has not yet been sentenced. She is already serving prison time for an unrelated drug conviction out of Livingston County. She could be released as early as November 2014 on that case.

According to court records, she has agreed to testify against Hayes. She has also lost parental rights to Tyler.

Hayes' trial was set to begin in September and jury selection began on Sept. 12. On Sept. 15, the judge dismissed the entire jury pool after becoming aware that jurors had inappropriately discussed the case. Hayes' attorney, James Piazza has been motioning to have the case moved to another county and the judge is currently considering that motion.

This case has gained national attention and Dominick's extended family has established Justice For Dominick, a non-profit organization to help children. Prompted by pleas from Dominick's family and supporters, lawmakers in Michigan recently passed a bill, Dominick's Law, which has stiffer penalties for those who abuse children.

#### Pamela Heavner, 55, of Tyrone Township, was sentenced to 23 months to 14 years in state prison for an embezzlement conviction. She was given credit for 187




In addition to prison time, she was ordered to pay restitution of \$610,200.

Heavner was a payroll clerk for WPM Construction in Grand Blanc Township. She was initially charged with embezzling more than \$1 million from the company through an intricate payroll scheme, dating back to 2005. She pleaded guilty to amended charges of embezzling, using a computer to commit the fraud and writing bad checks.

Tvler Earl Fischer-Greenfield was

convicted of robbing the B & C Pharmacy in Fenton twice this year, once on Feb. 22 and once on Jan. 20. He was sentenced from five to 25 years in state prison. He is also serving time for three similar cases in Oakland County.

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

The U.S. economy has experienced

so many highs and lows this year it could match the top thrill ride at Cedar Point. The debt-ceiling crisis over the summer brought out the worst in U.S. politicians, creating a polarizing view of



both parties. With slow job growth and steady unemployment, the U.S. economy frequently made headlines. Recently, unemployment has been slowly falling and the holiday shopping season is stronger than expected, signs that the economy may be improving.

#### It's a revolution

All across the Arab world, civilians have demonstrated and protested against

authoritative governments, demanding a more inclusive society and democracy. So far, there have been fullblown revolutions in Tunisia, Egypt and Libya, where dictators have been overthrown.



Other uprisings have occurred in Bahrain, Syria and Yemen. The world is watching now to see which governments will be set up across the Middle East.

#### Japan rocked by earthquake

On Friday, March 11, Japan was hit by the most powerful earthquake ever to hit

the country. The earthquake triggered several tsunamis, causing 15,842 deaths and injured 5,890 people. Japanese Prime Minister Naoto Kan said, "In the 65 years after the end of World War II,



this is the toughest and the most difficult crisis for Japan."

#### **Massacre, car bombing in Norway**

Norway was hit with a one-two punch this year on July 22. A car bomb exploded near government buildings, killing eight

people. That same day, a shooter went on a rampage at a youth camp on the island of Utoya, killing 69 people before he was caught by authorities. The shooter was 32-year-old Andres Behring



Breivik. Diagnosed with paranoid schizophrenia, Breivik will either be placed in prison or a psychiatric institution after his trial in April of next year.

#### Tornado rips through Joplin, Mo.

On May 22, a powerful EF-5 tornado struck Joplin, Mo., reaching nearly one mile in length when it touched the ground.

Early estimates place the amount of damage at nearly \$3 billion. Emergency managers of the National Weather Service reported that nearly 75 percent of Joplin was destroyed by the tornado.



With 160 deaths and nearly 1,000 people injured, the tornado was one of the most powerful and deadly in U.S. history.

#### Penn State scandal

The sexual abuse case at Penn State

may very well come down as the worst scandal in sports history. Former assistant coach Jerry Sandusky was indicted on 40 counts of sexually abusing young boys. Even more disturbing are the accusations that football



coach Joe Paterno and the university president knew about the behavior and did nothing to stop it.

#### **News international phone** hacking scandal

Media mogul Rupert Murdoch, who owns publications including The Wall Street Journal and News of

the World, was ousted for hacking into the phone of a murdered 13 year old.

A private detective deleted old messages on the 13 year old's phone, giving the family hope that their daughter may still be alive.

It was eventually revealed that Murdoch's publications have a widespread act of phone hacking, setting off doubt about journalism ethics in Britain.

#### **Occupy Wall Street** spreads across the country

On Sept. 17, hundreds flooded Lower Manhattan's Zuccotti Park to protest

against alleged financial greed in America. Since then, the Occupy movement has spread across the nation and has caused some friction between protestors and authorities. Opinions of the movement have been



mixed, as demands and a leader have not been identified. Some see the movement as a massive change in American thinking. Others view it as a complete waste of time.

#### **Candidates step up for 2012 elections**

America has been captivated all year by the pool of Republican candidates vying for the 2012 candidacy. From

Texas Governor Rick Perry to Tea Party-favored Michelle Bachman, each Republican candidate comes with his or her own colorful past and unique method of campaigning. So far, former Massachusetts Gov. Mitt Romney and

former House speaker Newt Gringrich lead the polls for most favored candidates. That all could change within weeks however, and the Republican Party will, without a doubt, be a top story for 2012.

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

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

# Many happy returns

return it, guilt-free. While gift receipts are increasing

in usage, many gift recipients said Santa brought just what they wanted last year. According to a survey by the National Retail Federation (NRF), six in 10 holiday shoppers say they didn't return a single gift last Christmas.

This year, with many people loosening their purse strings, there may be more returns as a result. Retail sales are up 3.8 percent this year, setting a record thus far of \$469.1 billion, according to the NRF.

If you think you might want to return a gift you opened for Christmas, think sooner, rather than later. Consumers returning merchandise quickly will find better selections to choose from for an alternate gift and have less chance of losing their receipt. They will be able to take advantage of the extended hours and extra help in the stores during the holiday season.

People also should keep in mind that gifts from local, independent retailers may have stricter return policies than large national retailers.

At Eclections in Fenton, returns are welcome through Jan. 8, except for final markdown clearance items that have been clearly marked as "final sale." At Glik's, the store will be opening early on Monday, Dec. 26 to accommodate returns and exchanges beginning at 8 a.m. In order to return merchandise, a gift must have tags attached with a receipt for a full refund. Refunds will be returned in the form that the gift was originally paid for — debit card, credit card or a cash refund.

Sears Hometown Store in Fenton will open early on Monday at 7 a.m. for returns and exchanges. "If you have a receipt and everything is packaged in the original box as it was given, then you should have no problem," said Sears co-owner Jeff Stone. "Without a receipt, your return will be given in the form of a gift card."

#### **TIPS FOR RETURNS AFTER THE HOLIDAY:**

- Know the retailer's return policy before you buy. Most retailers have return policies prominently displayed, and spelled out on the merchandise receipt and on their website.
- Save and file all receipts for hasslefree returns. Some retailers will allow consumers to exchange merchandise without a receipt, but may only provide merchandise credit for the lowest markdown price at which the item was sold during the holiday season. Provide the recipient with a gift receipt to save the hassle of a return after the holidays.
- If you think you will be returning a gift, avoid opening the packaging, especially those items that are sealed in hard plastic. Keep the original packaging including Styrofoam, plastic product wrapping, the box, instruction manuals, and all parts (including tags). If you are given clothing or sleepwear, try it on for fit with tags intact and without wearing perfume, powdered deodorant or makeup, which could stain the item. If merchandise appears to be worn, most retailers have the right to refuse a return.

#### **MAKE ONLINE RETURNS EASY**

Returns are a part of shopping, no matter where you buy. In addition to the other rules of returns, here are a few things to find out before you purchase a gift online:

- Who will pay for shipping the return, you or the merchant?
- Is the return pickup policy the same for exchanges or refunds?
- Is there a restocking fee on returns? • Can the item be returned to a local physical store?
- What is the mailing address for returning merchandise to the company? Some online merchants have off-site service centers specifically assigned to handling returned merchandise.
- Be patient. The week after Christmas is one of the busiest weeks of the year for retailers. With people's frustration high and tolerance low, be patient when returning merchandise.

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
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

#### Fenton unveils 'Be Closer' tag line

The Fenton City Council unveiled the tag

line 'Be Closer' in January, which included coordinated bill-boards, several signs, a website, and other promotional media. The project cost



more than \$60,000, and has been popular with some, and confusing to others.

#### City manager inks \$88,508 contract

City Manager Lynn Markland signed on through 2014, with no increase in pay. Markland has 25 years of experience as a city administrator. He said he is proud of his accomplishments, including captured grant money for Silver Parkway, sewer lift stations, and balancing the city budget in difficult economic times.

#### **Acument reopens**

The Fenton fastener company reopened in February after closing in 2009 at the peak of the recession. Acument has adjusted its business, and employs more than 45 people.

#### Two teens dead due to drug overdoses

Fenton and Lake Fenton high schools were shocked by the deaths of Briona Jawhari, and Erika Schlosser. The teens died of heroin overdoses less than a week apart. Their deaths inspired the "Chasing the Dragon" campaign, designed to compel students to avoid illegal drugs. Two more young people in the area died from drug overdoses in the following months.

#### Fenton First Presbyterian Church undergoes renovation

The Fenton First Presbyterian Church in Dibbleville began its \$1.6 million expansion in April, which included larger space for youth and fellowship. The expansion also included a new, larger kitchen, gathering space, classrooms and condescended offices.

#### **City Council approves new equipment**

In December, the Fenton City Council approved the purchase of new emergency dispatch equipment, ending a debate that began in the spring. The city council had considered closing it, as Flint and Fenton are

the only cities with their own dispatch centers. The equipment will be paid for by the Downtown Development Authority (DDA). The



DDA budgeted \$320,000 for the project. Police Chief Rick Aro hopes to have the equipment in place by late January or early February.

#### **Culvers coming to Fenton**

In June, Clarkston Culvers' owners Kevin Powers and Katie Schmitt announced plans to tear down The State Bank building on Owen Road, across from Fenton High School, and build another Culvers restaurant. As of December, the building is well under construction.

#### North LeRoy Street to receive \$1.25 million facelift

The Fenton City Council approved spending almost \$150,000 on an engineering firm to design improvements for LeRoy Street, from North Road to the Fenton Township border. The Michigan Department of Transportation (MDOT) will complete the project. The construction of the project will begin spring 2012, and cost \$1.25 million

#### LINDEN

#### Officer Conklin rescues men from methane gas

In August, Linden Police Officer Gary Conklin rescued two men from a sewer hole filled with poisonous methane gas. One of the men died. The other survived. Conklin

was recognized for his heroic efforts by former State Rep. Paul Scott, State Senator John Gleason and the Linden City Council. Conk-



lin was also selected as the grand marshal of the Linden Holiday Happening parade.

#### Linden Summer Happening cancelled, Linden Mill Days born

The Linden Summer Happening may have fell through this year but Linden still celebrated the summer days with the Linden Mill Days. Activities included a dog contest, live music and dancers from the Linden Academy of Dance and music.

#### Michigan medical marijuana

The Linden City Council voted throughout the year to keep a moratorium on adopting a medical marijuana ordinance. City Attorney Charles McKone recommended to the council that Linden police continue to arrest those found with marijuana, whether or not they have a medical marijuana card. The Michigan Medical Marihuana Law has drawn heated debates since it was passed. The moratorium in Linden still exists.

#### **Linden gets free Internet access**

Tri-County Wireless donated and installed equipment in downtown Linden for free wireless access.

#### Linden ranks first for population growth

While many people are leaving the state, Linden saw the biggest population growth in Genesee County, witnessing an increase of 39.5 percent. Overall, Linden had the fifth largest population growth in the state.

#### **Linden Masons celebrate 150 years**

The Masonic Temple in Linden turned 150 this year, and the members celebrated it well. The Linden Masons have 162 members, with more than 30 at-



tendants for each monthly business meeting.

#### **Loose Senior Citizen Center fire**

The Loose Senior Citizen Center experienced its fair share of hardships this year, including a fire in September that burned down one of the buildings. The center is moving on however, reopening their doors, with tentative plans to add additions to the building. Fundraising efforts are underway.

#### **Union Block property still for sale**

In the wake of a 2007 fire, the Union Block property is still for sale. The LaFontaine family were in the works of purchasing the property but backed out of it in June. The property is still for sale.

#### HOLLY TOWNSHIP

#### State police Groveland post closes

As part of a larger restructuring plan, the Michigan State Police (MSP) Groveland Post closed in October. The areas of Groveland, Rose, and Holly townships will continue to be served, but the troopers report from the Flint Post. MSP reduced its posts from 62 to 29 posts, to save more than \$20 million.

#### Holly Township man fights to keep his property

A 20-acre parcel of land in Holly Township has been a point of a legal battle between Timm Smith and Holly Township since 2009. After a complicated and drawn out legal process, the courts upheld the township being gifted 10 acres of the property, which were being paid for by a mortgage upon which Smith defaulted.

#### HOLLY VILLAGE

#### Medical marijuana ordinance

The village of Holly was one of the first to approve a medical marijuana ordinance allowing dispensaries to operate within the village borders. Most municipalities either disapproved dispensaries, or placed moratoriums on them, waiting for the courts to work out how dispensaries are defined, and where they can be.

#### **Powers lawsuit settled**

After Marsha Powers was fired from her position as Holly Village manager in fall of 2010, she filed a lawsuit against six members of the council. Powers was awarded a jury trial in 2011, but the council settled with Powers for an undisclosed amount in December 2011.

#### **New village manager hired**

After former village manager Marsha Powers was fired in 2010, former police chief Rollie Gackstetter was appointed to serve as interim manager. Jerry Walker, a former city manager and police chief, was hired as interim village manager. After an interview process, he eventually became the permanent village manager.

#### First woman police chief hired in Holly

Police Chief Rollie Gackstetter retired in December 2010. Sgt. Michael Story

served as interim police chief and nearly 50 candidates applied for the position. The committee to interview the c a n d i d a t e s



fielded the applicants and made a recommendation to village council. Elena Danishevskaya was hired as the first female police chief in the village of Holly.

#### Village residents swallow higher water bill

The residents of the village of Holly saw their quarterly water/sewer bill increase by at least \$40 this past summer. The council voted to raise the fees to cover the bond service that was used for the expansion of the village water treatment system several years ago. Residents registered complaints at public hearings and during public comment at meetings before, and after the fees were implemented.

#### ROSE TOWNSHIP

#### Rose Township family barely escapes fire

A Rose Township family safely escaped the house fire on Demode Road that

engulfed their home in January. When North Oakland County Fire Authority chief Jeremy Lintz arrived, the family was watching the fire



consume their home, from the safety of a family vehicle. The home owners blamed a partially doused fire from a wood-burning stove as a possible cause.

#### **Rose Township supervisor resigns**

Rose Township Supervisor Alison Kalcec resigned in November, effective Dec. 22, 11 months prior to the ending of her term. Kalcec said she wanted to help end the divisiveness that had plagued board meetings. She said when leaving, she was proud of her accomplishments, including the township offices being remodeled, the warning sirens being installed, and condensing and centralizing services at the township offices.

#### ARGENTINE TOWNSHIP

#### Police move back to old building

In March, the Argentine Township Police Department moved back to its old building on Silver Lake Road, across from Navistarz Bar & Grill. In

the summer of 2007, the department moved from that spot to the basement of the township hall, about a ½ mile down the



road to save the township \$12,000 per year in rent. The police department opened its own impound lot. The lot opened for business in August.

#### **Lawsuits settled**

A lawsuit filed by a former firefighter was settled out of court for \$400,000 in January. The lawsuit was filed against **William Harvey**, the former fire chief. The settlement was covered by the township's insurance provider.

**Blythe Amenson**, a former lieutenant with the fire department, filed the lawsuit in 2010, against Harvey for alleged sexual harassment, and against Argentine Township for alleged discriminatory discharge. She was employed by the township from May 2007 until July 6, 2009.

#### 51ST DISTRICT

#### Paul Scott recalled

State Rep. Paul Scott, (R, Grand Blanc, 51st District) was recalled by a narrow margin in November. The recall effort was largely credited to the Michigan Education Association (MEA) who did the bulk of the signature gathering.

Scott fought the recall in different state courts, but ended up facing the election at a loss. His recall brought into question



the possible need for recall election reform, because of the price tag for recall elections.

Steven Losey (D-Linden) was selected by the Democratic Party of Genesee County to be the Democratic candidate for state representative. In February, voters in the 51st District will vote for Losey or Joseph Graves, (R-Argentine) to serve the remainder of Scott's term, which expires November 2012.



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

## **Shoplifting brother steals family's security**

**DEAR AMY:** One of my siblings was diagnosed more than 20 years ago with bipolar disorder. He is in therapy and on medication.

His mania has taken the form of anti-social behavior. It appears that it currently manifests itself as kleptomania. He has already been arrested once and was spared jail time because he went through a special treatment program.

He told me he is still stealing, and another sibling told me that he continues to shop-lift on a weekly basis.

My sister-in-law doesn't know. I can't tell her because

she supposedly told my brother that if he were arrested again for shoplifting she would leave him.

I find my brother's behavior morally reprehensible and have told him so. However, I don't want to see him arrested and jailed -- or break up his marriage. I believe he is sick and needs help.

I was contemplating writing a letter to his therapist, but was wondering if you had any other suggestions.

**DEAR CONFUSED:** You have chosen not to disclose this issue to your sister-in-law because she "supposedly" told your brother that if he were arrested she would leave.

I have two thoughts.

"Supposedly" creates an expectation that only the word "actually" can really fulfill.

In short, you don't actually know what your sister-in-law said to your brother.

My second thought is that if an arrest for shoplifting would ruin your brother's life, then why don't you try to prevent an arrest by telling an involved party (his wife) about what's going on?

You should also try to deal with your brother directly. Don't bother passing judgment on his behavior (he already knows stealing is wrong), but re-educate him about the consequences of his behavior (jail) and urge him to get help.

Telling his therapist would also be a good idea. Your brother's treatment is not working.

**DEAR AMY:** My husband and I bought our first home more than a year ago. A friend of my husband's asked if he could stay with us for "a few weeks" while he worked on finding a job so he could move in with another friend.

It has been almost a year since he started living in our house. His welcome expired very quickly for me, but my husband was more protective of him.

The friend acts incredibly ungrateful and has remained unemployed the entire time he has lived in our home. He stays in his bedroom playing video games most days.

Last summer he said he would move out by the end of August. That didn't happen. In October my husband told him he needed to move out by the end of December. That time is fast approaching, and I am afraid my husband will not follow through.

The friend already has told him that he will probably just have to live in his car.

How can I emphasize to the friend and my husband that this is the last deadline we are setting for him to move -- without coming across as an insensitive person?

**DEAR IRRITATED:** After all this, do you really care about coming across as insensitive?


I'd say a little less sensitivity is needed.

I suggest you serve your freeloader's morning coffee along with a calendar. Point out that the month is quickly waning, and tell him that if he has to live in his car that's a shame -- but that he had better not park it in your driveway.

**DEAR DR. DONOHUE:** A friend has a case of constant hiccups. Can you suggest any possible cures? —P.W.

ANSWER: Hiccups come from involuntary contractions of the diaphragm, the horizontal muscle sheet that lies between the chest and the abdomen. It is the principal breathing muscle. Sometimes persistent contractions can be traced to gallbladder problems, diseases of the pancreas, reflux of stomach acid into the esophagus (heartburn) or an abscess on the abdominal side of the diaphragm. However, most of the time, no cause is found. For temporary hiccups, gulping food and simultaneously swallowing air sometimes brings them on. So can carbonated beverages.

Through the years readers have provided me with hundreds of home remedies for dealing with hiccups, and I welcome new additions. Swallowing a teaspoon of sugar irritates the throat, which sets in motion a reflex that can end hiccups. Breathing into a paper bag raises the blood carbon-dioxide level, which, in turn, raises blood acidity, and that triggers a release of calcium. Calcium can spark nerve signals to stop hiccups. Putting angostura bitters on the back of the tongue is another sometimes-successful trick.

Hiccups that last longer than 48 hours aren't likely to respond to home remedies. Medicines have to be turned to. Chlorpromazine, omeprazole, metoclopramide and baclofen are often successfully used.

In cases that are resistant to medicine treatment and that are disrupting a person's life, doctors can interrupt, in a number of ways, the transmission of nerve signals conducted to the diaphragm by the phrenic nerve.

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








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


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
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## Christmas has special meaning to area fourth graders


Wealthy ones who have found their chase for power and property disillusioning can come to the manger and learn that satisfaction isn't found in gathering gold but in a right relationship with God.





The Tigers proved that, competing into overtime in what was an entertaining 56-53 loss to Davison Tuesday night.


Even in defeat though, the Tigers are starting to show that they are a much different team than the one that opened the season about a month ago.

much. He opened the season posting a first-place time of 16:34.97 at the first Metro League Jamboree at Torzewski Park, winning the event by about 26 seconds. From there, Gilbert kept up his dominance in key meets.

He made it a clean sweep in the Metro League, by easily winning the final two races. He won the second jamboree at Linden Middle School with a time of 16:30.59, and then won the final meet at Vienna Greens Golf Course with a time of 16:11. While cruising to the Metro title, he also won the prestigious Holly Invitational Division 2 title, winning with a time of 16:19.

Gilbert's biggest challenge may have been the most demanding Division 1 regional in the state. To qualify for the state meet, he had to finish within the top 15 individuals at his regional. He did that by recording a seventh-place time of 15:41.77 at Huron Meadows Metro Park. The bronchitis attacked Gilbert by the next weekend at the state meet, but he still finished that event with a time under 16 minutes.

"I ran really well at regionals," Gilbert said. "Unfortunately, I got bronchitis before the state meet."

Gilbert has played other sports. He's played basketball, soccer and baseball at various times in his life. However, when he was in the seventh grade, he joined the cross country team.

"It was just the idea that my dad was good at it. He ran at the University of Cincinnati and I thought I might be good at it," Gilbert said.

He quickly found out his suspicions were true.

"At my first race I was second and just got out-kicked," Gilbert said. "I thought this may be something I might be good at and continued doing it."

But while Gilbert is a strong cross country runner, it's not his top race. That race would be the 1,600 during the track season. Last year, he took third at the Division 1 State Track and Field Championships in the event, with a time of 4:17.04. The good news is the two runners who finished ahead of him — Grand Blanc's Omar Kaddurah and Swartz Creek's Jeremy Dickie — graduated last season.

"I am one of the top guys returning in the state because Omar and Jeremy are gone," Gilbert said. "I'd like to be a state champion and break 4:10 for sure."

"Matt is a pretty confident kid and is well informed on the sport," Fenton cross country coach Todd Mills said. "While he likes cross, he prefers track and the shorter distances. He has talent that hasn't been reached yet."

After Fenton, Gilbert expects to run in college. He hasn't made his decision yet, and is expecting to make several visits soon.

"I think once he gets to the collegiate level, if he is willing to work hard, he will do some amazing things," Mills said. "His future can be really bright if he's willing to put in the extra work. This year, he would run in the mornings as well, and I think this is one of the reasons he was up on top, but I still think he has so much more potential."
