### Trial of Brandon Hayes begins

In Port Huron on Wednesday, the graphic first testimony in the trial of Brandon Hayes for the beating death of 4-year-old Argentine township boy Dominick Calhoun began.

The first responding officer, Argentine Township Officer Angelo Panos, testified that he found Dominick lying on the floor of the apartment in April 2010. He was summoned to the scene by Dominick's grandfather Rick Calhoun. Officer Panos found Domi-

nick with mother Corrine Baker. Dominic was breathing weakly moaning and with bruises on his body. He later died from his iniuries.



### **Fenton native writes Hospital Handbook**

Chances are that sometime in your life, you or a family member or close friend will spend some time in a hospital. In order to help people navigate the sometimes intimidating environment of a hospital, Fenton native Mary

▶ Fenton native Mary Peabody-Soper has written Hospital Handbook: Strategies for Surviving Your Hospital Stay, in order to help people navigate the hospital experience. Peabody-Soper has written a book to help the reader find the hospital visit easy and comfortable.

The Hospital Handbook: Strategies for Surviving Your Hospital Stay and its companion book, The Patient Journal, were published last year by On Cedar Creek Pub-

lishing in Marquette, where Soper has made her home for the past 40 years. She uses personal story telling and coaching techniques to give the reader 29 tactics about the hospital environment and maneuvering within the hospital corridors. A social worker by profession and the oldest of nine siblings raised in Fenton, Soper has found herself at the hospital bedside of many family members, especially as her extended family has begun to age.

"We found ourselves asking the question, 'What could we have done better today to improve this situation?" said Soper. "I began to take notes from my families' own experiences, and compiled them into a book that I hope can be helpful to others."

Soper, a graduate of Northern Michigan University, is a former campus chaplain, founder of the Marquette Women's Center, director of Gov. William Milliken's Upper Peninsula Office and served as vice president of Northern Initiatives. She has also held a number of positions in the Michigan Depart-

ment of Commerce and was founding director of the Michigan Public Policy Initiative.

Soper explains that the book is not

geared for the patient as much as it is for the patient's family, friends and his/her advocates. "Reading this book needs to be a part of each person's personal health plan," said Soper. "Don't wait for a health crisis. Everyone needs to prepare for an eventual hospitalization,

so that it can optimally benefit the patient, instead of being a 'nightmarish' situation."

One moment he was on his couch with his wife Janet, the next he was in an ambulance where his heart stopped completely, at least twice.

He was medically dead, but he remembers the painful hits from the defibrillator. "I went up to heaven and came back down," he said. He woke up three weeks later at The University of Michigan in Ann Arbor, with a tube coming out of his side, connected to a machine that pumped blood from one side of his heart to the other, in his chest cavity.

Under an induced coma, he missed the colors changing in the leaves. "They were green, then the trees were bare,' he said. He lost 50 pounds while under

The device is allowing him to live, even if his heart is 90 percent

dead. It was installed with an open-heart surgery. You can't even feel a pulse on his wrist or hear a heart beat. "It's just a continuous flow," said Janet.

Heart attack

What you hear instead is the incessant "whirring" of the 9000 rpm pump representing state of the art medical technology that is keeping him alive. He is a battery system away from heart failure.

The Left Ventricle Assist Device (LVAD) is pumping blood for him, and is connected to one of two outside battery packs with twelve hours of run time in each. The technology is so new it was featured in AARP's Dec. 2011 issue. Former Vice President Dick Cheney is currently using an LVAD.

With the device, Todd needs 24-hour supervision. He also has several battery back ups, because should the system fail, he would die quickly. He calls the LVAD's ac power his "jumper cables," which power him through the night.

Janet has to clean and change the exit point of the tube, and is certified along with their son, and brother and sister to operate the LVAD equipment. They allowed Janet to leave Todd's side only twice the entire time. Neither is working because of his condition, but his restrictions might be eased around February.

Todd has had to change his diet to low sodium, high protein, and take a cocktail of medication, including blood thinners.

Fortunately, the LVAD is temporary for Minock. He will get on the list for a heart transplant in May, and he hopes to get a heart before summer. "That's my prayers," he said. "I need to get my strength back and get back to normal."

Janet and Todd credit Stat-EMS for the quick response which saved his life, and all their friends who gave their

"Most people purchase an LCD TV because it's close to LED quality," said Sears Hometown Store Manager Nick Salisbury. "Samsung and Sony are the most popular brands."

In addition to screen quality, screen size should be taken into account as well. Most quality TVs start at 32 inches and go well past 54 inches. The lighting of a room should also be an influence when selecting a TV. Windows and harsh lighting can cause glares and affect visibility.

The last important features of a TV are the refresh rate, which is measured in hertz, and the resolution. The refresh rate refers to how cleanly a TV screen shifts from one scene to another. TVs with lower hertz may show imprints of the last scene when a show shifts to a new camera angle. 240 hertz is the best quality available, followed by 120 hertz and then 60 hertz.

As far as resolution, 1080p has the clearest and sharpest picture. 1080i offers a great picture too but isn't as high of qual-

ity. 780p is lowest quality of HDTVs and is better suited for screens smaller than 32 inches.

The resolution and screen back-

lighting makes or breaks the entire viewing experience. In Salisbury's opinion, consumers should spring for the best quality available when it comes to selecting a new TV.

"A 1080p LED screen at 240 hertz is the best quality television on the market right now," Salisbury said. And since LED TVs are currently the best on the market, they're sure to outlast plasma

#### **TV** terminology

Plasma, LCD, LED - The three different ways TVs are backlit. LED is the highest quality but significantly more expensive. For those looking to be economical, LCD offers high quality at a more affordable price. Plasma is the cheapest option but is nearly outdated

**1080p, 1080i, 720p** – The numbers refer to the amount of lines that create an image on the screen. 1080 creates a clearer picture than 720. The "p" stands for Progressive Scan while the "i" stands for interlaced. The p illuminates more lines simultaneously than the i, creating a better picture.

Hertz, refresh rate – The refresh rate is how clean a screen can transfer from one scene to the next and are measured in hertz. 240 hertz is the cleanest, 120 hertz is average quality and 60 hertz is the lowest.



It will stop but the brake pedal goes all the way to the floor and when I push the brake, it will smoke! What could the problem be? - Derek

Derick, There are a couple of possibilities here, first thing is to check the level of the brake fluid. It is most likely leaking and either spraying on the hot engine or exhaust as you hit the brakes. If the smoke is coming from the tailpipe of your exhaust then you most likely have a bad master cylinder and it is getting in to the vacuum hose through the brake booster. This will cause damage to the brake booster if it happens for too long.

include entertainment, room and board, and there are now many different ports from which to leave for a cruise, not just Florida anymore. "They're appealing to a broader audience," said John Schmitt, Superior Travel of Fenton co-owner.

On the low end, cruises can cost \$60 to \$120 per person per night, and up to

\$1,000 per night for luxury cruises. Schmitt likes cruises because the nightly rate covers the room, the food and entertainment. "The cool thing about cruising is that you get a blend of different cultures in one vacation experience," he said. "To cover that much territory on a land package would be much more expensive."

Schmitt is also a director of sales, and certified travel consultant. It's his job to recommend the right ship for a cruise,

at the right time for the best bargain. "The most important component for cruising is matching the right cruise product with the customer," said Schmitt.

For example, a senior citizen shouldn't take a Carnival cruise on spring break. They would end up surrounded by 20-somethings, and probably not have the best time.

He feels that there is an art to picking the right cruise for a traveler. "It's literally

like picking a needle out of a haystack," he said, because of all the options. There are Alaskan cruises, Mediterranean, Caribbean, and even themed cruises.

To have the best experience, Schmitt said it's important your agent understand what kind of experience you want.

There are few tricks for saving money you may not have heard of.

Repositioning cruises are one afford-

able option. A ship that has been sailing over the Atlantic Ocean is changing to a Pacific route. As an example, Schmitt said a guest can leave the port in Florida, sail with the boat up to its new home port in Vancouver, British Columbia. They would then fly home, and the cruise would be cheaper.

A term travelers should also learn is shoulder season. Shoulder seasons happen just before and after the peak season for a particular cruise. A

European cruise and a Caribbean cruise have different peak times, and shoulder seasons, he says, so there are frequently different shoulder season options, depending on the product you want.

A region's hurricane season offers shoulder season pricing before and after.

Although booking tools are available online, Schmitt cautions against booking without any advice from a travel consultant. "The caution is that the traveler might not understand the ramifications of a cruise," he said. They may not realize why they got a good deal — it may be hurricane season.

You probably knew this already: **book** early. Booking early gives you a better choice and even the chance of a cabin upgrade for free. Schmitt said cruise lines attract customers with their lowest price cabins, which are smaller with no windows. He said there are only10 percent available at the entry level rate, and they go quickly. If you book early and take the smaller cabin, the cruise line may bump you up to a mid-level cabin in order to free up the cheapest cabins to continue to advertise the lower fares.

Schmitt has heard concerns that they might be bored on a cruise, being stuck on a boat for a period of time. "Cruise ships are usually 12 to 14 stories tall, and three football fields in length," he said. "They are filled with opportunities to do things. There is no possible way to get bored on a cruise ship."

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

Livingston County Sheriff Robert Bezotte said Beneson was not wearing a seatbelt and was killed on impact.

Her cell phone was found 15 feet from the vehicle by family members.

"We estimated her speed at around 40 mph, which was under the speed limit," Bezotte said. "But with these icy conditions, you have to

be cautious. This was an unfortunate accident."

Beneson is survived by her husband Donald Skinner, son Logan, 12, and stepchildren Heather, 29, and Grant, 22. She is preceded in death by her father Dennis Beneson, who passed away in November of 2006.

Beneson is remembered for her humor and honesty.

#### **Summary**

Melanie Beneson, of Fenton, died Tuesday afternoon after losing control of her car on Crouse Road in Hartland. Icy conditions and no seatbelt are believed to be contributing factors to her passing.

graduated from North Farmington High School in 1989. She worked at Royal Oak Waste for many years, which was owned by her father. Beneson met her husband while working at Royal Oak Waste. Prior to her death, Beneson worked at CVS Pharmacy in Hartland Township.

Crouse Road was closed for more than one hour while authorities investigated the accident. Logan was en route home on his school bus when the driver had to take a detour. He was unaware that the accident involved his mother.

"My mom was the greatest mom. She took care of me and really loved me," Logan said. "She drove me to school and always cared. I hope she is up there looking down at me. I love her more than anything."

Beneson was very involved in the Jewish community and Logan's activities outside of school. Family members said Beneson was an enthusiastic amateur photographer, loved to scrapbook and attended concerts frequently with her husband and mother Esther.

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

### ► Local man crews on Alaskan fishing boat

For Jason Vanderlip, 29, of Argentine Township, it's all go, all the time, on his commercial fishing boat in Alaska, for months on end. If you've seen the show "The Deadliest Catch," you'll have an idea of the conditions he works in. If Vanderlip makes a mistake, people can get hurt, or worse, and all the while his family with his wife Sandra and four kids are counting

Vanderlip isn't on the popular show, but he knows the crew members, and even frequents the same spots they do. His crew of 30 turns out 340 tons of fish in less

than 10 days. He

has broken toes, fingers, his arm, commercial fishing boat and sustained a few concussions. He has had his fingers

and toes smashed by cases. These injuries were minor, but he has seen people get badly hurt. He saw one person fall 20 feet from the top deck, and land face-first. "The gear gets tired out after you've fished it so long," he said. By gear, he means the vast network of heavy lines, nets and webs that haul the fish out of the water, that can break, injuring crew members in the way.

Tendonitis is a problem with the repetitive consistent motion. He has seen men tape the knife to their wrist because they could no longer maintain a grip. "If you want to make the money that's what you have to do," he said.

After nine years he has advanced up to being a "deck boss." He spends most of his day mending web, and splicing cables that haul the nets out of the water. "It's just about as fast as you can move your hands all day long," he said. He takes a quick break every four hours if work is caught up. His regular work day is 16.5 hours. He wakes up an hour before his shift, and eats breakfast.

The boat is processing fish around the clock. If he's lucky, his shift will end after 16 hours, but can stretch to 48 hours if the nets need frequent repair. "As a deck boss, your hours depend on your gear," he said.

Vanderlip is in charge of keeping the complex nets together that haul up tons of fish everyday. The net itself is one quarter mile long, and it is composed of webbed sections and hundreds of fathoms of line. A fathom is around six feet, or an arm span. "It's pretty heavy, especially when it's wet,"

he said. As a deck boss, he has to move quick and think on his feet. He has to make loops and knots in the line that will support hundreds of pounds of fish and webbing. If one of his straps break, it could have 40 tons of pressure behind it, and one of his six crew members that work under him could be hurt. "You could kill somebody," he said. On deck, there is a lot of pressure on everything and everybody.

The job pays around \$4,000 per trip. The length of the trip depends on how quickly they fill the boat's freezer. Once the freezer is full, they head back to Dutch Harbor to drop off the load, then head right back out. The crew averages three to four trips per

Sole. His boat is an "H and G" boat, meaning head and gut. Using a type of table saw, the crew members who are processors cut the head and gut out, which are discarded. "You want to put as much fish through as you can," he said. The body is saved and stored in large cubes. It doesn't happen often, but because of the exposed blade, crew members can lose fingers in accidents. This was his first job on the boat.

Once the fish are collected, they are offloaded into semi trailers that end up on a boat to China or Japan. Some fish goes to Norway, and some goes to Russia, but most to China. Fish end up being used for a variety of foods, including imitation crab and lobster. "They use every piece of the fish over there," he said.

Vanderlip's last trip ended just before Christmas. Trips out to Dutch Harbor have been his main job for the past nine years. When he returns home on leave, he takes a week off, then works at a local




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



slaughterhouse part time. "I get kinda stir crazy," he said.

Being stir crazy can drive his family a little crazy too. "He's always gotta be doing something," said his wife Sandra. "If we're not fast enough for him, he'll just go build something." While Jason is gone, Sandra has little contact with him, and this last trip was nearly one year, ending just before Christmas.

"It's sad when he's gone of course. It's hard to get used to him when he gets here," she said. "That's the tug-of war that's hard, especially on the kids."

A roller coaster of emotions surrounds Jason's career, with mounting excitement and expectations when he is on his way home, the adjustment of having him home, and then the sadness when he leaves.

"You cry for a week at first, but it's gotten easier over the years," she said. To better handle him leaving, she washes his laundry immediately, and picks up any reminder that he was there recently. "I just pretend he'll be back in few days," she said. After six years of being together, she knows how to cope.

#### ▶Espressos, lattes and cappuccinos make coffee a versatile drink

If you're still in the routine of simply dumping your coffee grounds into your coffee maker and pressing "go" every morning, you're missing out. From national chains like Biggby Coffee to smaller coffee houses such as Fenton's Café Aroma, coffee is just as varied as any other drink.

In fact, there are so many variations of coffee that a vast majority of people have no idea what to order or how to proceed after staring at a coffee houses' menu.

"For someone who has never tried a latte, I would recommend a caramel mocha or a chocolate mocha," said Stephanie Evans, owner of Café Aroma.

Lattes and cappuccinos are other popular forms of coffee drinks. Akey ingredient to both drinks

is espresso, a condensed way to brew finely grinded coffee grounds through hot water and extreme pressure. Espresso is especially potent, as three shots are equal to about one cup of drip-brewed coffee. The biggest difference between lattes and cappuccinos is the amount of

**Cappuccino** – A drink consisting of one shot espresso, one shot milk and then foam.

**Dirty Chai** – Chai tea that has one shot of espresso in it.

French Press – A style of brewing that is known to capture more oils and taste from coffee beans. For coffee purists, a French Press is the only way to drink coffee.

espresso and steamed milk in one drink. Lattes have a double shot of espresso and one shot of milk. Cappuccinos are comprised of espresso, milk and foam.

'When you add milk and foam, it compliments the espresso," Evans said. "Our most popular drinks are the café mocha, which has a shot of chocolate, and café caramel, which has a shot of caramel."

For specialty roasts, taste is dependent on whether someone likes a dark or light roast. Some beans are fruitier in taste or can be more acidic. No matter which roast or bean is used, freshness is important for a good cup of coffee. According to Evans, the key is to get the beans while they're still green and to roast them within 48 hours of having them.

But it's not just the beans that make a great pot of coffee. To get the most out of any roast, experts agree the French Press is the best way to go.

"A French Press doesn't filter out any of the oils or natural flavors," said French Laundry General Manager Steve Wittenger. "It gives it a little bolder taste and it's the most natural

way to brew coffee.

Most coffee shops offer seasonal drinks such as pumpkin spiced drinks in the fall and peppermint infused coffee during the Christmas season.





#### ▶ How to plan for your future as you age

Aging is a time of adaptation and change, and planning for these changes will help ensure you can continue to thrive and maintain your independence for as long as possible. Maybe you can modify your home to make it more liveable as you age, while looking ahead to a time when either you or a loved one may need a housing facility with more support options on site.

#### When planning ahead, consider the needs you might have in the future:

• Physical and medical needs. As you age, you may need some help with physical needs, including activities of daily living. This could range from shopping, clean-

ing, and cooking to intensive help with bathing, toileting, moving around, and eating. You or a loved one may also need increasing help with medical needs. About 70 percent of individuals over the age of 65 will require some type of long-term care services during their lifetime, according to the most recent statistics.

• Social and emotional needs.

As you age, your social networks may change as friends and family may not be located nearby. It's important that you maintain and build new social networks

for the sake of your health.

• Financial needs. Long-term care can be expensive, and balancing the care you need with where you want to live requires careful evaluation of your budget. You may consider moving to a facility with more onsite care or easier maintenance, or modifying your home and using in-home help if necessary.

If most people have their choice and if their health and mobility allows it, they would prefer to stay at home for as long as possible. This is known as "aging in place."

With home being familiar where you know your neighbors and the community, being able to maintain your independence at home is often your first choice. This is a good option if your live in a safe area with a close network of nearby friends and family. It's also important to have transportation, plus help with home and yard maintenance. It's not a good option if your mobility is limited, you don't leave home often and become isolated and lonely.

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**Summary** ► Aging requires adapting to a person's changing needs, either modifying their home environment or seeking out other facilities that will meet their physicial, social and financial needs.

### A few senior housing options

#### **Assisted Living**

When health and aging make it too hard for a senior to live alone, many people turn to Assisted Living, which allow a healthy degree of independence while still maintaining a helpful, supportive community around them.

#### **Adult Day Care**

A community respite care service is offered at staffed facilities to care for seniors in need of care during daytime hours. Often, these facilities focus primarily on patients with Alzheimer's or other types of Dementia.

#### **Respite Care**

This service offers help to full-time caregivers who need a little time off, either regularly or occasionally. Respite Care workers can be in-home nurses or workers at a facility such as an Adult Day Care or Assisted Living community.

Home care providers can offer a wide array of services depending on the patient's needs - from skilled registered nurses who can deal with most any medical situation to home care companions, who simply offer a helping hand and a watchful eye.

#### **Foster Care Homes**

Residences that offer different degrees of medical care and and living assistance to the seniors who live there.

#### **Independent Living**

Also known as retirement communities, this is a setting designed for seniors who do not need medical care and want to maximize their independent lifestyle in an active senior community. Many Independent Living communities still offer basic benefits like hospitality and meal services, and are connected with more intensive levels of Assisted Living and Skilled Nursing homes should the need arise.

#### **Memory Care**

Short-term memory care often comes in the form of Respite Care, where an adult day care or a home companion can keep an eye out for seniors with memory impairment. Long-term memory care usually comes in an Assisted Living facility, where special care is taken to ensure the security, safety, and mental stimulation of the patients.

#### **Continuing Care**

Many residents join a continuing care community while they are still healthy, living in an Independent Living segment of the community. As their daily and medical needs increase, so does their level of care, so that they are able to easily graduate to Assisted Living and Nursing Home care, if the need arises.

#### **The Village Concept**

The Village concept enables active seniors to remain at home without having to rely on family and friends. Members of a "village" can access specialized programs and services, such as transportation, home health care, household chores, as well as a network of social activities. The cost of membership varies according to area and the level of services required, but is often in excess of \$500 a year.

#### **Nursing homes**

A nursing home is the highest level of care for older adults outside of a hospital. While they do provide assistance in activities of daily living, they also provide a high level of medical care. A licensed physician supervises each resident's care and a nurse or other medical professional is almost always on the premises. Skilled nursing care and medical professionals such as occupational or physical therapists are also available.



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

While we're still in the January resolution mode, why not resolve to make this your greatest year? It can be! But for this to be true, you may have to change your definition of greatness.

A man who had just discovered he had a terminal illness shared his feelings about life with me. 'It's been deceiving,' he said.

This successful businessman had spent his entire life in getting and now had little time to enjoy his wealth. There had been no time set aside to worship God and precious little to enjoy his family. Now he had only a short time left to live and there was no way to call back those wasted years. The real purpose of life had eluded him.

When Florence Nightingale was thirty, she wrote the following in her diary: 'I am now thirty years of age, the age at which Christ began His mission. Now, Lord, let me think only of Thy will.'

Years later, near the end of her heroic life, she was asked the secret of her success. 'Well,' she replied, 'I can give only one explanation: I have kept nothing back from God.'

Seizing and applying the secret of a meaningful life given by her Lord, she avoided the trap of living for what she could get and instead invested her time and talents in service to others. In losing her life, she found it; in giving, she gained. And the world was enriched because she held to this unchanging principle of successful living.

Babe Ruth once said, 'Most people who have really counted in my life were not famous. Nobody ever heard of them, except those who knew and loved them. I knew an old minister once whose hair was white and whose face shone. I have written my name on thousands of baseballs. The old minister wrote his name on just a few hearts. How I envy him! I am listed as a famous home-runner, yet beside that obscure minister, who was so good and so wise, I never got to first base.'

Ruth came to value the impact of his friend's life more than money or applause. He saw the old minister's example being followed by others who loved him and knew that this was a greater tribute than being in man's hall of fame.

The one who spends his or her life gathering temporary trophies to impress others will ultimately be disappointed. Focusing on gaining wealth and popularity to the exclusion of the real and lasting values of life produces inward poverty. It is the giver who gains, the investor who draws interest, the person of faith who moves mountains.

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

### Sausage & asiago stuffed mushrooms with balsamic glaze

#### **INGREDIENTS**

- 20 large mushrooms, cleaned with damp paper towel, stems removed and saved for later use
- 2 links Italian sausage
- 1 t. dried rosemary or 2 t. fresh, finely chopped
- 1 t. dried fennel seed
- 1 onion, diced small
- 2 cloves garlic, minced
- 4 oz. cream cheese
- 3 oz. Asiago cheese, grated
- 3 T. olive oil
- 3 T. balsamic vinegar
- · salt and pepper

#### **DIRECTIONS**

- In a large bowl, toss the mushrooms with the balsamic vinegar and 3 T. olive oil, salt and pepper. Place onto a parchment lined cookie sheet and place in a preheated 350 degree oven for about 30 min. Stir once or twice.
- Remove from oven. Meanwhile, in a large skillet, over medium high heat, squeeze the sausage meat out of the casing and cook until no longer pink, breaking it apart with the back of a spoon. You want it fairly crumbly and in small pieces.
- 3. Stir in onions and garlic and spices, and cook a few minutes longer, until onion is softened. (If you find that your sausage filling is too greasy, drain it on paper towel first before adding the cheese.)
- 4. Remove from heat and place into a bowl, along with the cheeses (save some of the Asiago for topping). Stir well to combine. Take a teaspoon and fill each mushroom cap. Sprinkle with remaining Asiago. Bake at 350 degree for about 30-40 minutes, until golden. Can easily be doubled if feeding a large crowd.

# Adopting dogs from puppy mills



DEAR PAW'S CORNER: My family would like to adopt a shelter dog, and a recent news story about several dogs rescued from horrible conditions in a "puppy mill" facility really captured our hearts. However, the shelter caring for these dogs is not immediately putting them up for adoption, and it says there will be stricter requirements for those who want to adopt them. Why is this? — Karl in South Florida DEAR KARL: Many shelter pets come with their own special set of behavioral quirks, often due to the stress and trauma of being abandoned at a shelter. But dogs (and cats and other pets) that suffer especially traumatic situations, such as abuse or starvation or neglect, can have a very difficult time adapting to home life.

Because of this, many shelters have developed special policies regarding these rescues. As you found, the puppy-mill dogs were not immediately put up for adoption; they're being treated and evaluated. Some may never be considered safe to adopt.

Once dogs are considered healthy enough to adopt, the shelter is following guidelines to make their transition to a new home as smooth as possible. For instance, it may not allow a puppy-mill rescue to go to a home that has kids under age 10. First-time pet owners will likely be discouraged or outright not allowed to adopt. Adopters may need to attend special classes, and the shelter may ask to make follow-up visits to the dog's new home.

Many rescues need a great deal of one-on-one attention, love and patience. If you're an experienced dog owner, meet the guidelines and are willing to take on the challenge of rehabilitating a rescued dog, go for it. But if you're not sure, then consider very carefully whether your family is ready to care for a rescued pet.

— Mom


**DEAR MOM:** Did you raise your offspring to be so cavalier about their mother's birthday? I hope not.

DEAR DR. DONOHUE: Six years ago, my father died of a stroke. My mother tried to rouse him from bed, but he responded with confusion and was unable to speak. She called for an ambulance. He was in the hospital only four hours before he died. The doctor said he would have lived if he had gotten treatment sooner. My mother has felt guilty about this ever since.

She lives with us now. I don't want to miss a stroke if she has one. How do you recognize one, and what should be done right away in an emergency? — T.B. ANSWER: Nearly 900,000 strokes occur yearly in the United States, and of those victims, 200,000 die. Many of the survivors are left with great disabilities. Strokes come in two types: One is an ischemic (is-KEY-mick) stroke, and the other is a hemorrhagic stroke. "Ischemic" means "deprived of blood." It's the more common kind of stroke, accounting for 80 percent of all strokes. The flow of blood to part of the brain is blocked by a clot in an artery. It's the brain's equivalent of a heart attack. The other 20 percent comes from bleeding in the brain, a hemorrhagic stroke.

Signs of either kind of stroke include slurred speech, sudden confusion, numbness of the face, arm or leg, trouble seeing, dizziness and severe headache. Many advocate testing the person to decide if a stroke has occurred. Asking the affected person to stick out his or her tongue and seeing if it deviates to the side is one of those tests. Don't waste time doing tests. Immediately call 911.

I'm limiting what I say about treatment to strokes resulting from the obstruction of blood flow. Brain cells begin to die within minutes. However, there's a three-hour window during which clot-dissolving medicines can be given. They almost always lead to a full recovery of function. Now the window has been opened wider, to 4 1/2 hours. That doesn't detract from the important message that the earlier the treatment, the better the result.

Kennedy is a perfect example of a woman who decided to "seize the gray" by making a fashion statement with a stylish cut, wearing make-up and wardrobe choices that flatter the silver, rather than "wash out" her appearance.

Experts suggest that a new "edgier" hairstyle will make all the difference in looking fashionable in gray, and a regular trim will keep the look current and well-groomed.

Women who make the choice to "go gray" can make their new color even more striking by wearing black,

white, shades of gray and jewel tones - while avoiding "earthy" beiges and olives, which can wash out their complexion. Cosmetic choices matter, too, and women should make a special effort with their make-up once they've "gone gray." Since gray hair can tend to make a woman's complexion appear dull,

blush can be her new best ally. Shades like apricot, peach and rose and better complements to her new "do" than beigy or tawny colors, suggest experts.

Make-up experts also add that women sporting silver should pay more attention to grooming their brows, because grays tend to be wiry. They suggest that women define their arches with a taupe brow pencil, so they don't disappear.

Women in gray may also need to change their hair products. Experts suggest washing the hair every other day with a hydrating shampoo and topping it off with a conditioner containing antioxidants, which help protect the hair against UV light and environmental damage.

### Gaines' Kautman motocross career off to great start

### ▶Places seventh in season point standings in just two months of racing

Rudy Kautman hasn't been racing motocross very long — at least not competitively.

For most of his life, he's spent his time racing his bikes around his family's yard in Gaines Township. But then one day that changed.

"My dad asked me if I wanted to start racing and I said, 'Yeah,'" Kautman said. "So I showed up at Baja (one of the motocross events) and I started racing."

Quickly, Kautman, 7, found out he was pretty good. Despite only racing for just two of the seven-month season, Kautman finished the AMA District #14 in the 50 Trail Class in seventh place.

Included in his 11 events, Kautman placed first twice and had top-three performances in seven events.

Kautman is having a whole lot of fun racing.

"It's fun," Kautman said. "I like jumping and getting good places.

"One time I was at Baja and I kept coming up and hitting the jump. I flew way forward and when I landed, it took all the suspension that I had."

While Kautman may be good on the jumps, one wonders if he could jump high enough to leap the bountiful number of trophies he earned during his two months of competing. They fill the family's living room already.

"I was surprised (how well I did) because every race I went to, I got a tro-

phy."

Motocross events typically involve two "races" on the track. In both events the driver earns a place. The driver that does the best in the two events combined takes first. In Kautman's first event — the Baja Brawl — he took seventh in the first moto event, took fifth in the second and third in the final event. That earned him fourth place in that event overall.

"At the first race, he was first place out of the gate and there was a funnel of bikes behind him," said his father, Bill Kautman. "He was first place out of the gate. He didn't finish first, but he came out first."

He only improved from that point.

About a week later, Rudy Kautman placed second overall at the Portland Trails, taking second in each of his heats. Then on Sept. 25, he placed first overall at Polka Dots, earning third and second in his two heat races.

He followed that up by taking first at the Great Lakes Grand Prix on Oct. 1 and then first at the same place on Oct. 2.

The Dragons blew the contest open in the second period, outscoring KBH 4-0 during that stanza.


