# Brandon Hayes convicted for murdering **Dominick Calhoun**

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# **Rich facts** about U.S. currency

Bills are comprised of cotton and linen, not paper

axford@tctimes.com: 810-433-6792 They say you have to spend money to make

money, and the U.S. mint is no exception. According to the Federal Reserve Board, \$1 and \$2 bills cost 5.5 cents per note, while \$5 and \$10 notes cost 9.9 cents to manufacture. A \$100 note costs 9.9 cents as well to manufacture while \$20 and \$50 bills cost 10.9 cents to make.

Here are some facts about the U.S. currency, including how it's created and changed throughout history.

• Currency paper is one part linen and four parts cotton. Red and blue fibers are woven into each note. According to CNNMoney, the cost of manufacturing a single note increased 50 percent from 2008 to 2010 due to the increase in cotton prices. All denominations are 6 1/8 inches in length.

• According to the U.S. Bureau

of Engraving and Printing, currency paper is made specifically by the Crane Paper Company. The back of each bill uses green ink and faces on the bill are made with black ink. For

bills \$10 and higher, a color changing ink is used in the lower right hand corner of the bill. • Notes are pressed in machines that use plates to create each bill's unique design. The presses are more than 50 feet long and have eight print units, which are controlled by two computers. The presses can print

10,000 sheets per hour.

• U.S. currency is not backed by gold and hasn't been since Jan. 30, 1934. Notes haven't been redeemable for silver since the 1960s. Instead, the Federal Reserve Banks hold collateral equal to the money in circulation through the U.S. Treasury, federal agency and government-sponsored programs.

• Before 1969, the Federal Reserve issued \$500, \$1,000, \$5,000 and \$10,000 notes. Today, \$1, \$5, \$10, \$20, \$50 and \$100 are the only bills in circulation.

# **Grocery bills** will continue to rise in 2012

Gasoline and corn driving force behind price increases

While consumers experienced sticker shock at the grocery store in 2011 with some prices reaching 11 percent more than the year before, the prices

won't be coming down in 2012, according to the Consumer Price Index from the U.S. Department of Agriculture. They're still expected to rise nationally in 2012 between 4.25 and 4.75 percent, although local estimates from VG's Grocery expect

"This year, we expect grocery prices to be much more stable, with a minor adjustment of about 2 percent." Brian Haaraoja VG's grocery

that number to be much lower.

The highest prices in the grocery aisles last year were in the meat aisles, where beef and pork prices were driven up over 10 percent from the previous year because of low inventories and strong international demand. Because the beef cycle takes about 2 to  $2 \frac{1}{2}$ years to complete, prices aren't likely to come down quickly from last year, according to Brian Haaraoja, senior vice See GROCERY on 10A

# Websites protest Internet censorship

► Google and other popular sites 'black out' in response to proposed bills

Two bills presented to Congress on Wednesday sparked widespread protests across the Internet. The Stop Online Piracy Act (SOPA) and Protect IP Act (PIPA) seek to stop piracy and copyright infringement online, a topic that has caused intense debate since the formation of the Internet.

While most online companies and websites agree that piracy needs to be stopped,

Popular websites across the Internet protested the bills by redirecting users to contact their respective representatives in Congress. needs to be stopped, outcry has arisen over the language proposed in the bills, particularly with SOPA. Under section 103 of the bill, websites are committing copyright infringement if it "enables or facilitates copyright violation or circumvention of

copyright protection measures."

Chris Heald, a programmer for the website Mashables, pointed out that the definition of copyright infringement is too vague and SOPA gives the government widespread power to prosecute anyone sharing links on websites such as YouTube, Facebook, e-mail, Wikipedia, Twitter and dozens of other sites.

"This bill turns us all into criminals," Heald wrote in a post on Mashables.com. "If it passes, then you either stop using the Internet, or you simply hope that you never end up in the crosshairs, because if you're targeted, you will be destroyed by this bill. This bill will kill American innovation and development of the Internet, as it will become too risky to do anything of value. It is toxic and dangerous, and should not, under any circumstances, be supported."

Internet giants across the Web have shown their opposition to SOPA and PIPA by disbanding their services and urging users to contact members of Congress. Wikipedia had a "black out page," prompting Internet users to contact their local representatives after typing in their zip code. Wikipedia said their website was viewed 162 million times on Wednesday and eight million people contacted their politicians.

Google covered its logo with a black box. Clicking on the censored logo brought users to a petition against the bill by signing in with their e-mail.

Numerous corporations support the bills, stating that copyright infringement is hurting American jobs and the overall economy. Ford Motor Company, NHL,

NFL, Sony, Wal-Mart, Nike and the Motion Picture Association of America

(MPAA) are just a few of hundreds of corporations that support SOPA and PIPA. The MPAA believes search engines such as Google and online payment services such as PayPal negatively impact the American economy and the film industry.

"Meaningful legislation must include measured and reasonable remedies that

include ad brokers, payment processors and search engines," the MPAA posted on its website. "They must be part of a solution that stops theft and protects American consumers."

As of Thursday, 62 members of Congress supported legislation that would censor websites on the Internet while 102 members opposed such legislation, according to propublica.org.

Michigan Rep. Dale Kildee (D- District 5) said that he would be against the bill if it showed up on the house floor. Michigan Rep. Mike Rogers (R-District 8) in an e-mail said, "Thave long defended the protection of intellectual property, but I have some concerns about the unintended consequences of government regulation of the Internet."

U.S. Sen. Carl Levin (D-Michigan) said that he was concerned about the current version of PIPA and that a Judiciary Committee is reworking the bill.

U.S. Sen. Debbie Stabenow (D-Michigan) did not respond before press time.

The Senate is scheduled to vote on PIPA Jan. 24. SOPA is still in the preliminary stages of the House.

# HOW WEBSITES PROTESTED SOPA and PIPA

**Wikipedia** had a "black out" day for 24 hours, redirecting traffic on its website to a black page explaining SOPA and PIPA and why the website opposes it. Users were then prompted to type in their zip codes and contact respective representatives and senators in order to voice opposition to the bills.

**Google** placed a black censorship box around its logo. An online graphic of statistics appeared after clicking on the logo. Users could also sign an online petition against the bills by providing their name and e-mail.

**WordPress**, a blogging website, placed censorship bars on every item of its homepage. Clicking on the censorship bars brought users to another page where they could write to Congress members directly.

**Craigslist**, the Internet's biggest classifieds website, shut down its services on their homepage and urged users to contact their respective Congress members.

# The two-minute warning

Since January begins with the annual college bowl games, proceeds through the NFL Playoffs and ends with the Super Bowl, it's the greatest football month of the year. Millions pass their January leisure hours watching helmets crash and bombs fly through the air to the outstretched hands of imperiled receivers while coaches, their jobs often in jeopardy after every loss, direct these 100-yard wars from the safety of the sidelines.

Each year, the most exciting time in many of these championship games occurs during the final two minutes. There's even a provision in the rules to make this happen: it's called "the two minute warning."

The two-minute warning does wonders. After this brief break in the action, each tick of the clock becomes more important.

Players plunge, pass and perform with new vigor and breathtaking efficiency, forgetting their earlier blunders and making the most of the moments that remain. These end-time revivals have rescued teams that seemed hopelessly behind and bound for defeat. Games are often won or lost depending on how well teams use the final two minutes.

Life's like that.

Many who have thought themselves sure losers have snatched victory from the jaws of defeat during the two-minute warning.

I'm not sure when I heard the two min-

ute warning. Maybe it was when I began looking into the faces of grandchildren, when it seemed only a few years earlier I had been holding their parents. It may have sounded during some close call or when I noticed the graying of what's left of my hair. Whatever the reason, at some point, I began seeing the remainder of my life as similar to the final two minutes of a football game. Let me tell you what life is like after you're aware of the shortening of time.

After the two-minute warning, there isn't time to mourn over past mistakes or gloat over past accomplishments.

Past sins are forgiven when they are confessed to the Lord and there isn't time to allow them to hinder future progress. Past accomplishments can be enjoyed only to the point that they build faith for greater conquests. They must never make us feel we've arrived or done enough to retire from serving God and helping people.

A woman once wrote to tell me she had retired as the church organist but after reading one of my books has asked her pastor if she could return to this long held position. She wanted to stay involved; she had learned now how to live profitably after the two-minute warning.

During the last two minutes, we learn the value of the present. The Psalmist once wrote: "This is the day the Lord has made; we will rejoice and be glad in it" (Psalm 118:24). What good words for two-minute men and women.

Life after the two-minute warning calls for the best possible use of every second that remains. There is no time left for being moody, critical, gloomy, negative or depressed.

# **Township mulls recycling program**

**Holly Twp.** — Holly Township is enjoying an income bump from the state of Michigan because of a population increase, and some of that extra cash might be used on a new recycling program.

At the regular Holly Township Board of Trustees meeting on Wednesday, the board heard a presentation from Boxxter National Recycling Systems, a Michigan company that also recently pitched its product to Rose Township.

After listening to the presentation, the board decided to consider

a recycling drop-off every weekend as a starting point, at the back parking lot of the North Oakland County Fire Authority (NOCFA) building on Grange Hall Road.

Supervisor Jesse Lambert preferred offering service 24/7 for the convenience of the residents. "It's more

of Trustees is considering a recycling program that would allow drop-offs at the NOCFA fire hall on Grange Hall Road on weekends. about doing ample service," said Lambert.

Clerk Karin Winchester was worried about going over the \$4,000 budget allocated for recycling. Lambert said that amount could be amended as needed.

The cost of the program varies. The company uses a two-yard collapsible system that can take a variety of materials including paper and e-waste. Each container will cost about \$200 to use when filled, and the company suggests starting with 13 containers, or the equivalent

of a 30-yard dumpster. The township would only be billed for the containers that are filled. "Iteliminates waste and hopefully some litter," said Trustee Janet Leslie.

Lambert said any potential recycling program would work in tandem with Holly Clean-up Day, the date which has not yet been established.

The board discussed details on a grant from the Daughters of the American Revolution (DAR), which is specifically interested in historic grave site preservation and restoration, namely Oakhill Cemetery in Holly Township.

Agitated with questions from the board concerning details in the grant proposal, Lambert abruptly called a fiveminute recess, and left the room.

Lambert had asked the board to approve a letter of intent only, and not

about the grant language. The approval eventually passed 3-1, with Clerk Karin Winchester casting the dissenting vote, and Treasurer Mark Freeman excused from the meeting. "There's a lot of things that need to go into it that have never been thought about," said Winchester.

She voted against the motion because Lambert said during earlier discus► The Holly Township Board of Trustees took another step toward receiving a grant for grave restoration work at Oakhill Cemetery, after discussion on the grant's details. sion that her office should handle the inventory of 90 grave sites, which Winchester said was a huge undertaking. "I can't physically do it," she said, adding that she wished Lambert had discussed the

inventory with her before.

Lambert was not worried about the inventory, and offered to handle it himself if it was needed.

The grant is for \$6,000 in matching funds for structural materials for Oakhill Cemetery and it

> would include a flagpole and materials for grave marker restoration.

Winchester and Trustee Janet Leslie were concerned that aspects of carrying out the grant

were not spelled out in the grant application. "I think we should know how this is going to be managed," said Winchester.

Lambert said it was his first grant and there were some questions he couldn't answer. Trustee Steve Ruth defended Lambert, pointing out how much work he had already put into the grant.

president of VG's Grocery. High grain and feed prices also contributed to the large price increases in dairy products, cereals and bakery items, etc.

"We really struggled last year with food prices," said Haaraoja. "Our food prices didn't go up anywhere near what our costs from manufacturers and suppliers went up. This year, we expect grocery prices to be much more stable, with a minor adjustment of about 2 percent."

Haaraoja also noted that food prices have lagged behind inflation, compared to many other items in the marketplace. "Ten years ago, a consumer would pay about \$1.99 for boneless chicken breasts, the same price we offer now, and sometimes lower," he said. "We also sold strawberries 'two quarts for \$4,' 10 years ago, the same special we offer now."

Because food is now an international marketplace, all of the weather conditions, shortages and supply and demand around the world affect the grocery prices at your local grocery store. Even here at home in the U.S., recent winter freezes in the south will likely affect

the price this year of tomatoes and citrus.

Also affecting food prices this year will be the price of gasoline. Monthly average regular-grade gasoline retail prices in November 2011 averaged \$3.38

per gallon, 52 cents per gallon below their 2011 peak Food prices are

prosecutor, after the verdict was read. "We hope this will bring some closure for Dominick's family."

Justice is coming in the form of a life sentence for Hayes, and 13 to 30 years for Dominick's mother, who already pleaded guilty to second-degree murder. Her son Tyler has been living with a foster family since April 2010.

Closing arguments were heard on Thursday and completed by 1 p.m. Assistant

Genesee County Prosecutor Tammy Phillips offered a graphic final argument, while Hayes' attorney James Piazza blamed Dominick's death on Corrine Baker.

The jury received its instructions from the judge and deliberation began in the mid afternoon, and ended within two hours.

This verdict ends a 19 month drama that began with the death of Dominick, by Hayes, who confessed to the abuse in a digitally recorded statement to Genesee County Sheriff's detectives.

Since Dominick's death, the family has worked to push "Dominick's Law," which would deal out stiffer penalties for those guilty of child abuse. The effort was spearheaded by Dominick's paternal Grandfather Rick Calhoun.

Dominick's death generated much public outcry and resulted in the selection of a jury from St. Clair County due to the great amount of pre-trial publicity and media attention about the case. Jury selection, opening and closing arguments, and the verdict were held in St. Clair County while witness testimony in the trial took place at the Genesee County Courthouse.

Argentine Township Police Chief Daniel Allen has been a part of this case since the day his police officer, Angelo Panos responded to Hayes and Baker's apartment on Sunday, April 11, 2010. Alerted by Dominick's grandfather, Rick Calhoun, Panos found a lifeless and badly beaten Dominick lying on the floor in a bedroom.

Allen said, "This case has been very emotional for the whole community, doctors and everyone involved. I'm glad it turned out the way it did.

"I hope the family gets some closure even though it can't bring him back."

While the preliminary hearing presented enough evidence to proceed to trial, the trial revealed many more details and testimony, as well as never shown photographs taken of Dominick. "Testi-



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mony was tough to go through," he said. When the verdict was read, Allen said he could feel relief in the courtroom. "Weight was lifted from the family's shoulders," he said. Allen is proud of

his police department and acknowledges that this was the worst case he has ever seen. "It makes you appreciate life," he said.

During the trial, Allen said Hayes' attorney attempted to transfer blame onto Baker, especially since she had already pleaded guilty to second-degree child abuse and second-degree murder. He said the jury was not convinced of his theory.

A tentative sentencing date has been set for Feb. 27 in

Genesee County Circuit Court.

DDA member John Strayer brought forth the idea during the December meeting. His idea was met with positive feedback from other members. The artwork, he said, would enhance the cultural aspect of Fenton.

By renting, the city would have the opportunity to display sculptures costing as much as \$45,000 and beyond at a much lower cost. Each leased sculpture costs \$1,200 per year

and the city would be required to rent at least six sculptures, for an annual cost to the DDA of \$7,200.

Although this program would not begin

until 2013, Strayer said it would be in the city's best interest to get on the organization's list early so that Fenton could have more sculptures from which to choose.

Strayer added that the next 14 months could be used to get the public engaged in this program. Bringing artwork into the city would also comply with the city's master plan.



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The city expects to begin its extensive Streetscape construction project in the spring of 2013, which involves the area surrounding LeRoy Street between Elizabeth and Sixth streets. Strayer said the sculptures, at strategically placed locations, could be another reason for people to visit downtown.

City Manager Lynn Markland agreed with Strayer that the artwork would attract visitors to the downtown area. He suggested that a work of art could

be on display outside the library or behind some shops to draw foot traffic to alternative entrances. City Councilwoman

Cheryl King said she would like the DDA to pursue the idea of find-

ing local artists who might have sculptures to display. She reminded DDA members that many residents believe the DDA spends money and it could be a benefit to everyone to seek local art. "Have them create permanent art for the city," said King. "That's my opinion."

City Councilman Les Bland asked DDA members if Midwest Sculpture Initiative would allow their art to be on display in construction zones. "It's something to consider," he said. The DDA said locations would be taken into consideration.

DDA member Roberta Sweetman said she thought it was an excellent idea to use local artists. Craig Schmidt, DDA chairman, said the DDA would definitely consider local artists.

Strayer said there could be businesses or organizations that would want to sponsor a sculpture, which might attract visitors to their location.

City Councilwoman Patricia Lockwood said one of the visions for the Fenton Community & Cultural Center is to have a sculpture garden. She suggested a subcommittee be formed for selecting the pieces and locations.

Terry Green, DDA member and owner of Billmeier Camera, was in favor of this program and felt it was a cheap way to bring art into the city.

fact that I earn a living compiling people's taxes maddens me. Let's simplify this and I'll do something else with my life."

Irvin makes it clear that he loves his job, but is frustrated by how mindbogglingly complex the system is. "Our current tax structure is like standing in a bucket and trying to lift

yourself up with the handle. It makes no sense."

There are few people who would deny that the current tax code has its problems, and with tax season coming up, it is probably on many people's minds, especially business owners.

It is Irvin's job to understand the tax system, and be up to date on the changes that affect his clients. He doesn't even know how many pages comprise the current tax code. "It's

huge," he said. What he doesn't like about the current system is that his clients, who are mostly small business owners, worry more about taxes than they do about making changes to or growing their business. They worry about changes to their payroll tax, property tax and others. "If you name it, they're being taxed," he said.

Irvin believes that the system discourages people from making money. His grandfather, for example, is in his 80s and tries to avoid making more money from his investments so that all of his tax liability is covered by Social Security income tax. Irvin thinks that a tax system that discourages generating income is

Irvin suggests that those receiving Social Security income be allowed to opt out of receiving Social Security payments, and instead, take their Social Security in the form of a tax refund off of investment income. Instead of being paid \$20,000 per year in Social Security, and then be taxed on the income, people like his grandfather can pay \$20,000 less in taxes to their investment income.

He said the system grew in complexity over the years by elected officials attempting to maximize government income. Irvin admits he understands why taxes are needed, but thinks the system is ridiculous. When it comes to tax changes, he'd like to see politicians stay out of the process, and instead take advice from

# small business owners.

Instead of the current code, Irvin favors a flat tax, as opposed to a percentage tax. He said that way, the government knows exactly how much money is coming in and they will know what their spending limits are.

With taxes, salaried income and income from a business are taxed at a higher rate than income from dividends. "I think that's probably something people would question," said Keith Moreland, University of Michigan-Flint School of Management Accounting professor.

Moreland said those advocating for a lower tax rate on investors would argue that raising taxes on investments would count as double taxation, because the corporations that disburse dividends have already paid corporate income tax on that money.

"I think the pendulum has shifted too far in their benefit," he said. Moreland invests, and is also a salaried employee at U of M Flint. "I get that benefit, but not like Warren Buffet does." Another argument for lower taxes on investments is that it encourages more investment in companies that can expand and create jobs.

When questioned by a TIME reporter this week, Mitt Romney speaking about his tax rate said, "It's probably closer to the 15-percent rate than anything because my last 10 years, my income comes overwhelmingly from some investments."

Moreland thinks the system is also too complex, but isn't in a hurry to overhaul. He said a flat tax does have some benefits, but he couldn't support one unless there is an exemption for lower income people, as the money they rely on to survive would be taxed. "It's all about the details," he said.

Regardless of how you feel about how fair taxes are, they still play an important

Elfstrom was convinced that the original specs required solid aluminum for the scroll tops because the specs called for 3-inch thick aluminum. Concerned about the weight of solid aluminum, his alternate bid included a hollow top to reflect the apparent ambiguity of the specs.

To resolve the situation, the DDA called for a joint meeting of Hoppe, City Manager Lynn Markland, Department of Public Works Director Dan Czarnecki, city attorney Steve Schultz, DDA Chairman Craig Schmidt, representatives of Universal Signs, paid consultant Sue Grissim of Grissim, Metz and Andriese and Jennifer Weaver of Weaver Designs.

The three major issues the group discussed on Jan. 11 were the differentiation between the written specs and the specifications listed in the drawings, changes to the support poles for the club signs and changes to the vinyl reflective lettering.

DDA members learned that the support poles on the "club signs" were not what they thought they were purchasing. Grissim informed them the initial product was not available. These signs will be left unchanged.

Did you take a nice buck or drop a brace of Canvasbacks this fall that you want to have mounted? Land a big king or brown you'd like to display on the wall at the office? How about keeping the head of your favorite race horse around as a conversation piece? If so, then your local taxidermist is ready and waiting.

Taxidermy

Preserving the memories

Men and women have yearned to display the trophies they've taken for as long as they've been taking them. And, as long as people continue to hunt and fish, there will always be a market for a taxidermist to preserve their memories. If you recently took a trophy, you might wish to know a few things about this craft, its processes, and

the costs, before you decide on a taxidermy studio to work with. Taxidermy as an actual skill has a going back centuries. Modern taxi-

history going back centuries. Modern taxidermy hasn't changed all that radically from the days of old, as it still involves mounting animals in as close an approximation as possible to what they looked like while alive. By and large, it describes the three-dimensional reproduction of animals for permanent display as trophies, educational tools, or scientific study. The word itself is a derivative of the Greek words *taxis*, meaning movement, and *derma*, meaning skin.

and stuffing it with whatever material the artisan had at hand, or was familiar with using. This resulted in some very unsightly and smelly trophies hanging from the walls of the King's chambers, but it also brought about many changes still in existence today. These pioneering taxidermists found it better to develop preservative methods that kept a hide from decaying, and to use forms that made the mount appear natural, than to suffer the King's wrath.

Today the term "stuffed" is cause for a professional taxidermist to shudder. While a modern taxidermist still uses the preserved skins of specimens, these are then "mounted" over pre-molded forms. These foam forms are purchased and shaped by the taxidermist, or the taxidermist creates them to fit the specimen at hand, and in the staging, he or she wishes to show the animal. Today's taxidermist not only takes hides and applies them over forms, but he or she must be a sculptor, a painter, and a mold maker as well.

Mounts can now be made using nothing but man-made materials. This is often the case with mounted fish. After releasing the live fish, anglers can supply the taxidermist with a photo of their catch, supplemented



with length and girth measurements. The taxidermist will then make a fiberglass mount painted to look like the real fish.

Painting is a fundamental part of taxidermy. Not only for fish, but wild game and birds need to be painted around the eyes, mouths, beaks, and feet. The taxidermist also has to paint the bases that support the mounts, so that a log crafted of foam, looks as real as if it were taken from a tree in the woods. Foam boulders need to appear heavy and solid, and the tannin colors of a simulated streambed have to be just so, where a mounted brook trout rests displayed in shadow next to a faux root mass.

If you study the mounts you come across, you'll see the distinctions of very good workmanship, versus just having mounted a specimen. The diorama or pose used; or the painstaking attention paid to the littlest details, such as eye shape, head tilt, a feather ruffled by an imaginary breeze, or the minor twist of an ear or fin, makes the exceptional artistry in taxidermy stand out from the ordinary.

The most common game animal mounted in the United States is of course the white tail deer. This is due to the amount of time spent hunting them and from the numbers of successful hunters. Game birds and fish also make up a large part of what a typical US taxidermist will work on during a normal year, yet they don't make up the brunt of many a taxidermists' workload.

According to Bob Taylor, the owner of Hilde Wildlife Studios in Clarkston, roughly 70 percent of his work is on exotics from other countries, with the bulk of these being African animals. Lisa Noelle, a taxidermist at the Hilde studio, said that Greater Kudus make up most of the African mounts they do at Hilde.

Taylor's largest mounted specimen to date was the full head and shoulder mount of an African elephant. Taylor and his staff



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mounts of hippos, rhinos, all of the large cats and bears, even giraffes and crocodiles. A fully mounted, 18 foot long crocodile, with teeth bared, will set you back about \$6,000, but it would sure be a great conversation starter setting alongside the indoor pool.

The tiniest mount that Taylor ever worked on was a Brown Snake, which is about as small as a night crawler. Hilde and other studios do all manner of tiny mounts. Many are small birds, small mammals, rodents, and bats. These are usually mounted for training purposes, scientific study, or displays used by conservation groups or museums.

When it comes to difficulty, it turns out that small birds are very complicated to mount, due to the smallness of the subjects. Noelle said, "It's tricky to get the feathers to lie just right, or place the wings so they look natural. With painting," she added, "the hardest to paint are the fish, because you have to paint the entire mount, and you have to get the coloration just right."

The rarest animal ever mounted by Taylor was a Golden Takin, which sounds

like *tockin*. It's a golden-retriever colored, goat-antelope found in the Himalayas. It's the size of a cow, has extremely dense fur similar to the fur of a musk ox, and comes with a mean disposition. From its picture, it looks like a shaggy blond wildebeest with a moose's nose.

I asked Taylor about the craziest animals they had ever mounted, say perhaps someone's pet, and he said, "We've done a couple in the past, but probably wouldn't again." That was when he told me about actually mounting a few racehorse heads for the owners.

As I have a mounted deer head that was poorly done, and hasn't aged well, I inquired about repairing older mounts, and was informed that they do indeed repair all manner of mounts. While visiting Hilde, I saw a large polar bear rug, an elk, a mountain lion, a wall-sized Marlin, and an alligator, all in stages of repair. My disheveled 11-point buck will be visiting Taylor and Noelle soon.

Properly caring for your trophy in the field is one of the things you can do to help the taxidermist create a better mount. Big game should be carefully skinned for the type of mount you are considering. Game birds need to be wrapped carefully so feathers and wings lay naturally. And fish need to be kept intact and frozen quickly. All of these need to be taken to the taxidermist of your choice as soon as you can.

Taxidermy is certainly not a dying art form, but the market has shrunk over the last 20 years due to fewer hunters and fishermen, the economy, and of course, that biggest absurdity of all, political correctness. Over all, the industry seems stable, but Taylor said they only mount about 200 deer heads a year now, when they used to do nearly twice that many. That statement was reflected by a couple of other taxidermists I spoke with. www.tc nes.com

ed at least 50 taxidermy schools around the country, so it seems that many people are still quite interested in becoming taxidermists in order to support that many schools. Taylor feels that although many people could work as taxidermists, you need to be an artist first if you are going to be really good at it.

As the Hilde Studio has been around for more than 80 years, it seems you can make a decent living doing this type of work, but taxidermy is a craft, and so the pricing has to be competitive, and in line with the economic climes. You don't eat mounts, and so one has to have the additional cash available to have a trophy mounted.

With that in mind, what does it cost to mount that deer you took this fall or the elephant you dropped while on safari? Typical deer mounts average under \$500, but that elephant will remove about \$15,000 from your bank account. That brace of ducks will cost about \$225 each, and a lunker bass will be \$15 per inch. A full-bodied Musk Ox will have you shelling out about \$5,000, and while I have no idea what that songbird that crashed into your window will cost, I'm sure your taxidermist would be happy to quote you.

If you'd like to see some terrific mounts in the process from start to finish, then make a visit to Hilde in Clarkston. Close by too is Mid-states Bolt & Screw in Flint, where the Somers family has on display many of their outstanding trophies that have been taken from all over the world, or perhaps take the family down to Cabelas in Dundee to see their whole in-the-store mountain of trophies.

# **Creamy Avocado Pasta**

Yield: Serves 2 Prep Time: 5 minutes Cook Time: 10 minutes

# INGREDIENTS

- 6 oz. pasta, we used whole wheat spaghetti
- 1 large ripe avocado, pitted and peel removed
- 1 T. fresh lime juice
- 1 clove garlic, minced
- 1/4 cup chopped fresh cilantro
- 1/2 t. kosher salt, or to taste
- Freshly ground black pepper, to taste

# DIRECTIONS

- 1. Bring water to a boil in a medium sized pot. Salt the water and add in your pasta, reduce heat to medium, and cook until Al Dente, about 8-10 minutes.
- 2. While the pasta is cooking, make the sauce by placing the avocado, garlic, lime juice, cilantro, salt and pepper into a food processor or blender. Process until smooth and creamy.
- 3. When pasta is done cooking, drain and place pasta into a large bowl. Add the sauce to the pasta and toss until pasta is well coated. Season with additional salt and pepper, if desired. Serve immediately.

# **Cat-proofing your house**

**DEAR PAW'S CORNER:** A friend of mine recently commented that when she brought her new cat home last year, she immediately had to put protective caps on all the electrical outlets because the cat kept trying to stick her claws into them. Do cats really do that? Mine doesn't.

— Sarah in Burlington, Vt. DEAR SARAH: It's not unheard of, as cats are curious, like to explore and often find certain things fascinating (while being totally uninterested in other things, like the expensive catnip-infused designer mouse I bought for my cat last Christmas. Not that I'm bitter about that).

Because of this, and because no one

is ever totally sure what a cat will take a keen interest in, cat-proofing the areas in which your cat roams is essential. Make sure it can't access the places where you store cleaning supplies or human food (some of which can be poisonous to cats). Put houseplants, particularly those from the lily family, out of reach -- or even better, out of the house -- as they can be deadly to cats when ingested. Don't let the cat access areas like the garage, workshop or the utility room. Be aware of where your cat is before you open the front door, so that it doesn't slip outside.

Because cats tend to be much more low-maintenance than dogs, most pet owners don't think much about taking precautions keep their cats away from dangerous areas. Do what's necessary to keep them safe from potential hazards.

**DEAR DR. DONOHUE:** I am a 74-year-old male and have been diagnosed with peripheral artery disease, PAD. I have a complete occlusion of the main artery just above the knee. What, in your opinion, are the chances of getting through the blockage with angioplasty? There is constant soreness in my calf, even at rest. Is that caused by the blockage? Will cilostazol (Pletal) and Crestor possibly dissolve some of the blockage? — J.C.

**ANSWER:** Peripheral artery disease, PAD, is also called peripheral vascular disease. It's an obstruction to the flow of blood through a leg artery. The obstruction is a buildup of cholesterol, fats and various other blood elements. Between the ages of 60 and 65, 4 percent of adults have it, and by the time people reach 80, 20 percent or more are victims of it.

Its chief sign is intermittent claudication, which is pain in leg muscles, quite often the calf muscles, when a person is active. Many can predict almost to a specified number of steps when the pain will arise. Once the person rests, pain usually lasts minutes, but it can take 20 or more minutes to leave. It returns when the person begins to walk again. I can't say definitely if your constant calf pain is due to PAD; it might be.

Ankle blood pressure is a valuable test for detecting PAD. Normally, the ankle pressure should be close to the arm blood pressure. A lower ankle pressure indicates an obstruction in a leg artery.

Your medicines cilostazol and Crestor won't completely dissolve the buildup in your leg artery, but they'll keep it from growing larger. Crestor might reduce the size somewhat. You can help matters by watching your cholesterol; eating a diet that emphasizes grains, fruits and vegetables; controlling your blood pressure; and controlling your blood sugar if you have diabetes. Walking is an exercise that is most helpful.

Angioplasty is one option for you. It will get through the buildup. It's the same procedure used to open heart arteries with a balloon-equipped catheter that is threaded to the blockage through a surface artery. The balloon is opened at the obstruction, and often a stent is left in the artery. A stent is a wire device that keeps the artery opened. Surgical replacement of the clogged segment of artery with a graft is another option. The location and extent of disease determine which is the better choice.

Lossing said Linden is going through an interesting time right now, with the unexpected passing of City Councilman Gary Mahnke and the resignation of City Manager Chris Wren. He told of how Mahnke left two envelopes, which were to be opened upon his death. One letter detailed funeral arrangements; the other was a love letter to his wife. "He was a sweet man," said Lossing.

As the city's population continues to grow, Lossing said officials have the task of replacing Wren. He acknowledged that the city's infrastructure is aging and replacement must be planned. Lossing said as a cost-saving move, the city is focused on shared services. "We can't afford to do things like we used to," he said. The city has also joined the five-county marketing initiative to attract more businesses near I-69.

Markland said he believes the economy has started to turn around and property values are stabilizing. "That's a really good sign," he said. Revenue for the city is derived from property taxes, based on values. "The future looks pretty good to us," he said.

With several commercial projects underway in the city, Markland believes the city is moving in a positive direction. For planning purposes, he'd like to have a two-year budget. Road projects are also in the planning stages. This spring, LeRoy Street from North Road to the northern city limits will be rehabilitated and in 2013, the streetscape project, from Elizabeth to Sixth Street will be done.

In addition to these road projects, the city would like to evaluate the needs of the local streets. Markland expects the police department's new 911-dispatch center equipment to be up and running by May.

Haddon told the audience that manufacturing is so important right now to the economy. "I've never felt better about where manufacturing is right now," he said. He said manufacturers for the auto industry are taking in full orders and they are working to fulfill those orders.

In 2008, Haddon said businesses went lean with the number of employees they kept. They kept whom they could because



they did not want to lose their talent. Now, he said, things are starting to pick up again. Despite those orders rolling in, there is still uncertainty, he said.

"We have a talent for manufacturing in this state," he said. "But, no one is doing it like they used to. It's very clean, tech savvy operations."

Haddon is very encouraged with the direction the state is going. "We're starting to feel our strength," he said. As manufacturing become stronger, other sectors of the market become stronger.

The auto show in Detroit was an example of confidence and positive outlook for the future. Haddon said the manufacturers spent "big money" on that show.

Haddon expects renewable energy sources, such as wind energy, to gain support. High-tech jobs, especially dealing with plastics are also starting to grow.

One issue Haddon would like to see addressed is personal property tax. He believes a replacement needs to be found since local governments rely on that revenue. Markland said personal property tax is not his favorite tax since personal property is difficult to tax. Some business owners don't understand the details and the assessors have to guess what a business has.
