





Downtown Development Authority (DDA) agreed to amend the contract with Lindhout and Associates to provide architectural services for the Fenton Community & Cultural Center

The original contract paid Lindhout 8 percent of construction costs, which came out to \$43,360. The contract amendment came after a decision to renovate

renovations and expansion.

the existing building in addition to the construction of an expansion. Accounting for these extra costs, Lindhout will receive \$133,546, which is still 8 percent

of the now \$1.6 million total for the community center project.

"When we first looked at it, it was, how do we get the building where we need it to be?" said DDA Chairman Craig Schmidt, who also serves on the community center restoration committee.

"If we are going to put handicap bathrooms in and handicap accessible entrances, it is easier to do it in an addition than in the original building?" Schmidt added.

The plan consists of an addition being built on the south end of the building, as well as a series of renovations to the current structure. Making the building reliably handicap accessible, safe, and code

compliant were all priorities of the design.

The contract amendment was approved by the city earlier in March, and was awaiting DDA approval.

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# Fenton 'shops local' for lawn care

►City council decides that using local contractors is worth an increase in cost

**Fenton** — In a 5-2 vote on Monday, the Fenton City Council accepted the bid of CJ Callaghan & Sons to cover the 2012 mowing season. Councilman Michael Piacentini and Councilwoman Cheryl King cast the dissenting vote.

Eight lawn maintenance companies submitted bids with the option of extending the agreement into the 2013 and 2014 seasons.

The list of candidates was narrowed down to two options. Quality Landscape based out of Rochester, and CJ Callaghan and Sons, the lowest Fenton-based bidder. The cost of Quality Landscape came to a total of \$49,072, while CJ Callaghan was higher at \$58,403, the same price that the city has paid for their previous lawn maintenance contract.

Councilman Les Bland spoke in favor of CJ Callaghan & Sons. "I am not in favor of giving bids outside the city if we have qualified bidders from the city,"

Bland said. "I think we should stay with local contractors that we know can do the work, have done it for the last three years, and do excellent work."

Staying local was an idea shared by Councilwoman Patricia Lockwood. "Every opportunity that we can, we have to go local," she said. "They have done a great job."

Councilwoman Cheryl King noted that she liked seeing local contractors receive work, though also noted the financial issue. "Money is just not as plentiful," she said.

The money was an important matter for Councilman Michael Piacentini. "Ten thousand dollars is \$10,000. Nothing against Callaghan's

job they did last year. We have a bidding process for a reason."

Councilman Bradley Jacob acknowledged the cost disparity. "We're looking at making cuts everywhere. I can respect the fact that there is a pretty significance difference," he said.

Councilman Benjamin Smith spoke

highly of the local company. "I think Callaghan does a fantastic job with our city," he said. "I hear about a lot of things that they do that are over and above what they are paid to do."

Mayor Sue Osborn shared similar positive thoughts of CJ Callaghan. "I think they have done an outstanding job for us," she

said. "I feel that this is a local company, and it is \$9,000 to \$10,000 more, but I think it's worth it. I have seen their work. and I have seen what they have done, and it is exemplary.'

Fenton Assistant City Manager and Downtown Development Authority Director Michael Burns recognized that it was a tough decision.

"I have never had an issue with them in the three years I have been here. I know what I am getting," Burns said about CJ Callaghan. "On the other hand, the other one is of high quality too, and they are a lower price."

Aportion of the cost for the lawn service is to be paid by the Fenton DDA, which voted on Tuesday to accept the bid.

# DDA planning for worst case budget scenario

► May have to make do with \$1 million less





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**Fenton** — The Fenton Downtown Development Authority may be facing severe budget issues, and is planning their finances accordingly.

Thirty-three properties in the DDA district have appealed their taxes with the Michigan Tax Tribunal. Many of these properties consist of chain box stores

which have had success in reducing their taxes in other communities.

If these properties are successful, the DDA could potentially lose \$326,679 in revenue and have to reimburse \$630,306 to the property owners in 2013.

At the DDA meeting on Tuesday, Director and Assistant City Manager Michael Burns presented a revised budget to deal with these is-

sues that would make cuts in several areas. "I looked at it as what do we need to do, and what do we want to do," Burns said.

This is the worst case scenario, but the best information I have available at this time." In the newly proposed budget, the

Cornerstone Project would receive \$300,000 less in funding than previously anticipated.

The budget could also see a reduction in money for the Streetscape Project from \$4.5 million to \$3 million, which would scrap plans to repave several streets in the district.

A \$64,400 cut in marketing funds would see the suspension of the billboard and radio spot campaign.

This proposed budget eliminates the Third Thursday events, though sets aside \$5,000 of the budget used for the event for a potential future event on Silver Parkway.

The Façade Improvement Program would also be suspended from the budget, with the possibility of being looked

> at to return if revenue losses are not as serious as projected.

> DDA Chairman Craig Schmidt said that he foresees the budget being fluid for the next three or four years while facing uncertainties such as the tax tribunal and the personal property tax.

> "I mean, we could submit a budget to the council that we think is going to

be good, and then because of revenues dropping, we may have to come in for a budget amendment," Schmidt said.

DDA member Chris Bayer reminded everyone that the budget was a worst case scenario, but that they should still take their time in approving it.

"I think it's kind of painted across the whole thing that this is the worst case scenario, so don't put your doomsday glasses on," Bayer said. "Let's not just put the pen to paper, I think we should have some time looking at this."

The DDA must approve a budget before the third Monday in April, and has set a special budget meeting for April 11 at 8 a.m.

In one complaint received by the IC3, a business claimed their computer was infected with a virus after opening the attachment in the e-mail they received. As a result, the business lost nearly \$100,000 when fraudsters successfully wired money from the company's bank account after the virus enabled them to capture passwords and other important banking information.

**Holly** — It's not a lot of money, but for residents using village water and sewer service, it's a step

in the right direction.

The Holly Village council passed a reduction in the flat water and sewer debt service fee on Tuesday, lowering the fee from \$48.30 to \$42.64.

The measure passed 5-2, with council members Pauline Kenner and Sandra Kleven casting dissenting

"I think we just need to look into this more, especially with this multi-unit building," said Kleven. The savings are coming from the Department of Public Works (DPW) adding 500 more users to the pool, found mostly at apartment and mobile home communities.

Kleven said some of the units didn't have separate meters, and she wants to ensure they are being charged fairly. She asked how a seven-unit office building with one restroom, for example, should be charged for the debt service.

Pauline Kenner echoed Kleven's concerns. "We have to be fair to everyone that lives in the community," she said. These residents will obviously be unhappy with the new charge, while the rest will be happy at a small reduction.

The village began charging the \$48.30 fee for village water and service users,

to more quickly reduce the bond debt service the village owes on new facilities built early last decade, and to ensure the water and sewer operations are paid for.

"We are all going to be sharing in the debt reduction," said council president Jeff Miller.

**Holly Township** — The settlement discussions with lawyers representing

Holly Township and residents Timm and Maria Smith last Friday were helpful but a settlement was not reached. "Everyone thought it was very productive," said Holly Township Supervisor Jesse Lambert.

Smith said that Holly Township's attorney made an offer of \$45,000 for the two parcels the Smith family owns outright, but they declined.

"All options were discussed," said Lambert.

Smith decided he'd rather fight for the disputed land in between the two five-acre parcels on which the township made an offer.

To Smith, this situation is part of a trend that encourages bad mortgages.

At the last regular Holly Township Board of Trustees meeting, the ongoing situation boiled over and dominated the discussion.

At the meeting, the same complex is-

sues involving the Smiths and township were rehashed by both parties, with Maria and Timm Smith speaking with clear passion, and venom for the township board and the board mostly deflecting legal questions, explaining that they cannot comment on issues in litigation. "I'm not going to let you whip me in front of my friends," said Maria Smith.

The audience also spoke out, supporting the Smiths, while Lambert maintained a cool, but slightly agitated exterior.

The Smiths argue that the township board is not upholding the law because they are attempting to claim property that has no tax ID number, and that they discussed future uses for the property before the property was secured.

This story has been playing out since 2009, and recently the Smiths were evicted from their 10-acre parcel by the Oakland County courts, after the township brought legal action against them.

The Smiths still own the two five-acre parcels east and west of the parcel in question on South Holly Road.

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

disrupted by crews of the pipeline in 2010—and those crews are coming back.

The name Enbridge should sound familiar to Michigan residents. The pipeline break in 2010 leaked around one million

gallons of crude oil into the Kalamazoo River in Marshall and took 16 months to clean up, according to Michigan radio.org.

One resident of the township, who does not want to be named, will be affected severely by the oncoming projects. He came to the rural community because he

wanted to be left alone. "I moved here to avoid the rat race, and the rat race came to me," he said.

The man, 55, was frustrated as he pointed out places that will be permanently changed when the crews arrive—his pool, his trees, his fenced-in lawn, a propane tank and dog kennel. His family and his dogs will essentially lose the use of the yard, and around one third of his

five acres for untold months. Even after the restoration, the property won't be the same. More than 400 feet of the pipeline runs through his property.

In 2010, he lost a large portion of his pine trees that signified his privacy. "They took all that away," he said. The trees they planted to replace his pine trees are growing poorly, the

roots showing on many of them.

"There is some temporary destruction," said Enbridge Energy spokesman Joe Martucci. He said that in the long run, oil pipelines are better for the environment and consumers, and replacing the pipeline is better than several shot term fixes. "We'll do our best to work with him, and all the land

owners to minimize destruction as much as we can, and restore the land to as close as original as we can."

Recently, another representative for Enbridge Energy started meeting with residents to offer a cash payment as compensation for the inconvenience. Around 60 plots of land in Rose Township will be involved, and more in Tyrone Township.

The pipeline is called Enbridge Energy Partners 6B, and is part of the Lakehead project transporting Canadian crude oil to mid-western refineries. Martucci said that the oil that is transported is mostly used by regional consumers, including Michigan residents, and some Canadian consumers. Martucci said it's possible that residents are using gas that was transported in crude form under their feet.

The local section of pipeline runs Northeast, from Rattalee Lake Road, ending at the border of Livingston County, between Foley and Rohn roads.

The Tyrone Township section runs from there, to Parshallville.

Rose Township is part of a section that will be decommissioned, and a new pipe will be laid 25 feet from the existing pipe, to push the crude oil through. Crews will need a 30-foot-wide workspace around the pipe.

Ellie Vance of Rose Township has made it her personal mission to educate the residents. She stands to lose more than a dozen trees along her dirt driveway, and heavy equipment will probably be stored on her large front lawn. "Once they drive on your land, things don't grow the same." she said.

On Wednesday, she walked her property, pointing out what the company did last time. Her lawn used to have topsoil but is now mostly clay, yielding sparse clover and sharp, dry grass.

The problem is that the residents don't have a choice as to whether the crews can

use their property. An easement set in the 1960s gave the original company the power to use the property as needed.

The company may be able to use the property, but the property owner will first negotiate an amendment to the easement, giving the resident an opportunity to set the terms of the land's use. "They have the right to say 'no," said Vance, a fiery career educator.


She drew her finger across the swath of the pipeline's range, asking for more land to use for workspace than in 2010.


The 55-year-old resident is still negotiating and so is Vance and her husband, but some residents have already signed a contract with the company's first offer. This offer is usually around \$2,000, which they are immediately taxed on, said Vance. Martucci said the terms depend on the property itself.

Vance rejected the first offer from Enbridge, asking that fewer trees be sacrificed by the crews. "He said he had a new plan that I would like better," said Vance.

Residents like Vance would like to see the old section of pipe removed, but Martucci said that would entail an entire new construction project, which would be more disruptive to residents.

Vance urges all residents from the communities affected by the pipeline to attend an informational meeting at the Rose Township office, Tuesday, April 3 at 7 p.m. A second meeting will be Wednesday, April 11 at 7 p.m. at St. John the Evangelist Church, Activity Center at 600 N. Adelaide Street in Fenton.

A few thoughts about the area's sports scene and some others not dealing with sports at all.



#### **A BUNCH OF THOUGHTS**

When it comes to the sports world, this time of year is a funny one.

On the prep scene, winter sports have just ended and spring sports haven't started enough to get excited about.

Meanwhile, minus the NCAA's Final Four, not much else is going on. And even the Final Four sometimes feels kind of anti-climatic after previous weekends that seemed college basketball was on 24 hours a day. The NBA and NHL are kind of in a waiting pattern as well until the playoffs, and golf doesn't really matter until the Masters. But among all of this stuff, there are still some interesting topics to check out. I thought I'd look at a few and give a quick opinion.

#### **MANNING AND TEBOW**

It must hurt Indianapolis Colts fans to see Peyton Manning leave the Colts for Denver, but at the same time I think most have to understand the decision. Manning isn't getting any younger, and with last year's poor showing, the Colts are set up to help address the QB issue quickly. It made a lot of sense.

And Denver is a good fit for Manning, because the Broncos had nothing resembling a legitimate QB in their organization last year. That's why they were so quick to get Manning, and forget about "plans" of Tim Tebow being their No. 1 QB.

It's a squad that hasn't made it to the conference finals in the last two years. For an organization that many like to consider the top in the NHL, a third straight year of short playoff runs could be troublesome. The road wins are also bothersome. I don't have the same air of optimism going into this playoff season as most.

#### FIGHTING IN HOCKEY

I supported fighting in the NHL in my last column. Never did I think I'd hear much controversy over that column. Kind of shocked by it.

It makes me glad I didn't write a column about my views on steroids in baseball during the 1990s and 2000s.

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


American history. The collection includes sabers that were used at the battle of Gettysburg, as well as the sword that once belonged to Colonel Fenton himself. Old rifles and uniforms used and worn by Fenton residents are also on display. One key item that sticks out in the collection is an original drum used in the Civil War.

Those who are interested in technology can take a look at the tools that residents may have kept in their shed had they lived in the 1800's. By comparison, a display of audio and visual equipment houses newer technology such as cameras and music devices; though they are somewhat bulky by today's standards and unlikely to fit into anyone's pocket.

The largest historical artifact in size in the Fenton Museum is part of the museum itself. Built in 1900 by A.J. Philips, the building was donated to the city in 1906, two years after Philip's death, and became

the A.J. Phillips Library. In 1987, after the library moved to its current location, the building became the museum it is today.

When originally built, the building served as a personal office to A.J. Phillips. The museum's Victorian Room holds several of the items owned by Phillips when

he was still alive, such as the French-made fireplace, light shades made of handblown glass, as well as his desk.

Some of the more popular items in the museum are not on display—they are in the museum's records. "Genealogy is the big thing, and is probably what most people are interested in," Seger said. In addition to genealogical information, the museum also has records detailing the histories

of approximately 150 houses in Fenton.

The history of Fenton is important for people to know about, Seger said. "Ithink they ought to know why Fenton is here. Why do we have a town here? A lot of people don't know that. If there wasn't a Robert Leroy and the knowledge he had, there wouldn't be

a Fenton either," he said.

I don't take things

For many years, Seger has given students tours through the museum. Teaching the history to young children can sometimes be difficult, Seger said.

"The younger ones can't relate to what we tell them. They don't have the attention span to delve into something that is so abstract to them.

"They really don't know what they are looking at," he added.

While they may have difficulty understanding, Seger said that most of the kids are respectful and well behaved. Older





Asked to demonstrate her app, Axleford called Polly over and ordered her to sit. Holding her Apple iPhone4 a few inches in front of the dogs mouth, she ordered her to speak. Polly obediently barked several times. After a three to four second wait, the words "Could I have a cookie" appeared on the screen.

"Most people are skeptical when they first see it," says the inventor. "But after they use it awhile they are amazed at the accuracy of the reading." Axleford recalls one man who emailed her that his pet was able to let him know that she had a bowel obstruction. "You saved Roxie's life," the grateful owner wrote.

Axleford says she is enjoying the attention. "I have interviews scheduled with both National Geographic and the

Animal Planet TV show. USA Today is also doing a story. And every day I receive email from veterinarian clinics that tell me Speaking for Spot has been a tremendous tool for communicating with ailing dogs. It's very gratifying."

The obvious question everyone asks is, will Axleford be able to create the same type of app for the cats of the world?

"Unfortunately, no," she says. "All my husband's research was based solely on canines. I don't have the energy to start a new project."

Asked what she'll do with all her newfound

wealth, Axleford says she'll share it with her granddaughter. "She's the one who suggested that we turn it into an iPhone app. I asked my grandson to help but he said he was too busy. So he'll get nothing"

At \$1.99 per download, and with over 78 million dogs in the U.S. alone, Axleford's sales are increasing by the hour.

"I don't think I'll have to worry about money for a while," she says with a smile. "So I've got that going for me."

Sutter, who has been with the department since December 2010, said Dilley, was employed with the Linden Police Department from 2002 to Feb. 24, 2011, when he resigned.

The three counts of second-degree CSC



involving a victim under the age of 13, out of Mundy Township, stemmed from alleged incidents in 2009. Arrest warrants were authorized on Jan. 20 and Dilley was arraigned in district court on Jan. 25. On Tuesday, March 20, those cases were bound over to Genesee County Circuit Court.

With the complaints filed with Fenton police, Dilley was initially arraigned on one count of first-degree CSC and one count of second-degree CSC in January, stemming from alleged offenses in April 2011. On Tuesday, March 20, those counts were amended to two counts of second-degree CSC and the cases were bound over to circuit court.

Aro said first-degree CSC involves penetration while second-degree CSC involves touching.

Dilley is out on personal bond as he awaits an April 2 arraignment on all charges in circuit court.

- In the 75-year history of the Masters, only three men have ever won back-to-back titles: Jack Nicklaus—'65 and '66. Nick Faldo—'89 and '90. Tiger Woods—'01 and '02.
- There have been only three double-eagles in the history of the Masters---Bruce Devlin in 1967, Jeff Maggart 1994 and Gene Sarazen in 1935.
- 1982 was the first year that players were allowed to bring their own caddies to the Masters. Prior to that, all players were assigned local caddies for the duration of the event.
- The **Masters** is simply a club invitational. It isn't run by the PGA Tour.
- The average winning score at the Masters is 279.8.
- Only one man has won the tournament during his first trip to Augusta National, and that was Fuzzy Zoeller in 1979.
- Tiger Woods holds the all-time money lead at the Masters, picking up \$6,472,139 over 16 appearances.

- Augusta National members first began wearing green jackets in 1939 as a way for patrons to recognize them if they needed help or had questions about the tournament or the golf course.
- The Masters has been decided by a playoff 14 times and in sudden death 8 times.
- Arnie's Army originated during the 1958 Masters, when Augusta National let military personnel from a nearby army base onto the grounds for free and they were recruited as volunteers to man the scoreboards throughout the course.
- Rae's Creek is a small creek running through Amen Corner where many Masters dreams have met a watery death. But who is Rae? Rae's Creek is named after former property owner John Rae, who passed away in 1789.

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# Michigan maple syrup

# 'Taps' are early due to warm weather

Golfing and gardening aren't the only early spring pursuits that arrived early this year.

Gov. Rick Snyder declared March as "Pure Michigan Maple Syrup Month" to honor Michigan's selection of high quality pure maple syrup and the industry's contribution to the economy. Ranking seventh in the nation in maple syrup production, Michigan produces about 123,000 gallons per year.

The maple season starts in February in the southern counties of Michigan's Lower Peninsula and runs into April in the Upper Peninsula. However, this year many maple syrup producers ran about two weeks ahead of schedule, and are already "tapped out."


Larry Haigh, of Bellevue, and other Michigan producers began tapping Feb. 15 and finished about two weeks ago. "Once tree buds are out, the sap is no good," he said. Michigan maple syrup producers yield about one quart of syrup for each tree tapped, according to Haigh.

"We're done this year, and we got an average yield," said Haigh, who also

serves as president of the Michigan Maple Syrup Association. He tapped just fewer than 1,000 trees this year, with

a yield of 273 gallons. Last year, with 200 more taps, Haigh's yield was 418 gallons. "It was an excellent year in 2011," he said.

Haigh and his wife, Karen, are now in the process of bottling the syrup, making maple sugar candy and maple crème,

as well as granulated maple sugar and maple cotton candy. Together with other family members, they operate Haigh's Maple Syrup Supplies in Bellevue, near Battle Creek. Tracing maple syrup making back four generations in both of their families, they sell their maple products at their farm, local farmers' markets and festivals. They also sell supplies to other maple syrup producers.

Families who want to watch the process of making maple syrup can find Michigan farms that welcome visitors, by going to the Michigan Maple Syrup Association website at www.mi-maplesyrup.com.

Kensington MetroPark in Milford still has one more weekend of running their annual Maple Syrup event. A one-hour

program runs on Saturday, March 31 every half hour between 12 and 3 p.m. at the Kensington MetroPark Farm

Center. A pancake breakfast precedes the event from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m.

Michigan also celebrates its maple syrup pride with two weekend festivals in April. For information, read the sidebar accompanying this story.





#### Palm Sunday's Passion

The week beginning on Palm Sunday and ending with the crucifixion of Christ focuses on the darkest period of history, yet, throughout this passionate period, a light shines through: the hope of the resurrection.

Passover was near and thousands were gathering at Jerusalem for this important occasion. Jesus and His disciples were among them and as they descended the Mount of Olives the crowd broke into shouts of praise, crying: "Blessed is the King who comes in the name of the Lord!"

This enthusiastic welcome must have taken the disciples by surprise. On a previous visit to Jerusalem, there had been an attempt on their Lord's life; now He was being welcomed warmly with his arrival being called the fulfillment of the Prophet Zechariah's ancient prophecy: "Rejoice greatly, O daughter of Zion! Shout O daughter of Jerusalem!

Behold your King is coming to you. He is just and having Salvation, lowly and riding on a donkey, a colt, the foal of a donkey' (Zechariah 9:9).

To celebrate their acceptance of this one they now called their king, the people placed palm branches along the road before Him: hence the reason for calling this annual celebration of this event "Palm Sunday."

When Jesus neared Jerusalem, He began to weep because He knew difficult days were ahead for this beloved city. Jerusalem would ultimately be under siege by Roman soldiers; its citizens' enduring untold suffering. The city would be leveled and the temple destroyed, but this weeping one would also suffer. The mood of the crowd would change and the people would soon call for His crucifixion.

The tears of Jesus on Palm Sunday, as he descended into Jerusalem, revealed his love for those who faced terrible things in their future.

Ahead lay his betrayal by Judas, a mock trial by spineless Pilate and the crucifixion, yet his tears on that first Palm Sunday were not for Himself but for other suffering ones.

In his widely read book, "Dark Threads the Weaver Needs," Herbert Lockyer wrote:

"At the head of the procession of the world's sufferers is a thorn-crowned man," adding that the reason most of us don't measure up to the compassion of Palm Sunday's wounded One is because we're too busy thinking about ourselves to be moved by His sorrow over

what was ahead for the people following Him.

In contrast, our Lord was ever concerned about the pain and sorrow of others and this ought to be our frame of mind as Palm Sunday reminds us of the suffering of the Savior.

While Handel was composing his great 'Messiah," a friend came to visit him just as he was working on the music for "He was despised." Handel sobbed as he worked because his heart was broken as he thought of the shame and suffering of his Lord described in the Biblical text before him.

Palm Sunday opens the way for that moving text to come alive and change our hearts.

While many recognize the importance of the events of Palm Sunday, too many will forget that this is the day that should turn our minds to both the cross and the resurrection.

God meets us in our dark times. Even those you're facing today.

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

# Have a green Easter celebration

Easter calls to mind colored eggs and baskets full of candy and toys. Many of the things used for Easter celebrations are not necessarily eco-friendly. But there are ways to embrace greener options to ensure Easter is a happy time for celebrants and the environment. Here's how to get started. Easter Baskets

Easter baskets overflowing with fake grass and plenty of treats are an eagerly anticipated component of Easter celebrations. However, many of the items found in a typical Easter basket — or even the basket itself — may be made of items that are damaging to the environment. Plastic easter eggs may be made using chemicals that are damaging to the environment. Plastic grass

carries the same dangers. Once discarded, plastic grass also may pose risks to wildlife that can become tangled in the substance or inadvertently eat it and choke on it.

Instead of pre-packaged Easter baskets, individuals can construct their own. Look for baskets made from reusable materials, such as wicker or other wood-based materials, steering away from plastic. Instead of plastic grass, shred paper that is headed for the recycling bin.

Look fortreats without excessive packaging. You can gather healthy treats and toys individually and put together in the basket. Easter Eggs

Coloring Easter eggs is a tradition. So are the coloring kits that may be made from

chemical food dyes. Instead, look to natural foods to add a festive hue to the eggs. Cranberry juice or beet juice can turn eggs pink. Red cabbage leaves or mashed blueberries can dye eggs blue. And turmeric can give eggs a yellow tint. These all-natural dyes are safe for little fingers.

#### All-Natural Decorations

Rather than silk flowers and plastic eggs, use the real thing in your decorating. Bring a little of the outside indoors with fresh flowers in a vase. Use twigs and ribbon to create inexpensive and green centerpieces for the holiday table.

#### Table Settings

Avoid disposable products whenever possible to prevent extra items from ending up in

the trash. It is easy to wash ceramic or even fine china with ease in a dishwasher. Think about purchasing decorative spring-themed glasses that can be reused year after year. Resist the urge to use disposable bakeware and serving platters as well. While they may take a little longer to wash, you'll be doing your part to help the planet.



# Fence etiquette important to preventing disputes

# ► Check with neighbors before building, obtain proper permits

People fortunate enough to own their own plots of land often choose to fence in their pieces of paradise. Fences serve many purposes: to designate property boundaries, keep pets or children contained in a safe environment, corral livestock, offer privacy or add aesthetic appeal.

Although installing a fence may seem like the right idea for you, going about it the wrong way may lead to problems among neighbors, particularly if you live where the houses are relatively close to one another. Some homeowners find fences become the final point of contention among disagreeable neighbors or create tension with a neighbor with whom you previously had a good relationship.

Erick Ward, owner of Fenton Fence Company said, "Being courteous with fence plans is the way to avoid any animosity along the way.

"Most neighbors will appreciate being informed of any plans prior to actually making changes to a yard that could affect

their views," said Ward.

Before drawing up fence plans with a contractor, talk to the neighbors on either side of your home and gauge their receptiveness to a fence. At this point, you may want to consider offering to make the fencing project a joint deal to save money should the neighbors decide to install a fence as well. Property owners can save by splitting the costs of the shared walls of the fence where their property lines meet.

Explain your case for the fence. Most neighbors are receptive to the idea if they know the reasoning — especially if the desire for a fence is not to keep them at bay. It's difficult to protest a fence that is a safety

precaution for children. If your neighbor already has a fence, you must ask whether you can connect your fence panels into the support post on your shared side.

Once you notify your neighbors as a

courtesy, there are certain steps to take that will prevent any legal disputes down the road.

"Even the most easy-going neighbor could grow aggravated if the fence is put up carelessly or ends up partially on his property," says Ward. The best way to prevent this is to apply for a new, professional property survey and have property lines indicated with paint or wood markers.

Each town or city has different regulations with regard to fencing, so it is important to learn the ropes or hire a contractor who is familiar with the rules. It might be illegal to install fences directly on the property line. The law might require the fence be installed a few inches inward. There also may be rules about how high fences can be in the front of the home, sides and back. Corner lot properties may have added regulations depending on whether the fence could

prove to be a visual obstruction to drivers.

If you live in a planned community, or one with a homeowners' association, it is your job to find out the guidelines for any home improvements. The HOA may dictate the style, size and maintenance of the fence or may not allow a fence at all.

Ward said, "We install many different types of fencing. Even with the toughest guidelines, a fence can be erected to meet the homeowners' requests, as well as following community requirements."

Once all the details are checked, you may have to apply for a fence permit. This way the construction of the fence and finished product will meet safety standards, and the area in which you live can provide consistent quality control. If the fence is installed by code, there is little chance it will have to be torn down or changed in the near future. Doing it by the book also means that a neighbor can be unhappy about a fence but not have legal recourse to ask you to remove it.

As an added form of courtesy, it is proper fence etiquette to put the "good" side of the fence facing the neighbors' yards. That means the side of the fence that doesn't show the support panels and posts.

"Many homeowners have opted for a wood, shadow-box fence, which looks the same from both sides, but uses the same amount of material," said Ward.

Remember, it is your fence so you are also responsible for all maintenance of the fence — on all sides. Just because your neighbor will be benefiting from your fence, it does not mean he will have to care for it.






