# **World population growth nearing zero percent**

▶ People living longer but birth rates lowest since WWII

The world population increased from 3 billion to slightly more than 6 billion people between 1960 and 2000. Today, there are more people on Earth than ever before. The rapid increase in human population has spawned debate on the possible depletion of vital resources and other fiascos. But current data from the 2010 U.S. Census points toward a different future — a decrease in population growth.

While birth rates are declining, people are living longer than ever, causing the population to grow at a slower rate. The U.S. Census Bureau projects a negative population growth starting around 2015.

# The population by 2040

- 1.3 billion people will be 65 or older, making up 14 percent of the world population.
- In America, seniors are expected to comprise 20 percent of the population. People aged 20 to 64 will make up 55 percent of the population and people younger than 18 will make up 25 percent of the population.
- There will be 2.1 workers per Social Security beneficiary by 2040. Currently, there are 3.2 workers per beneficiary. In 1970, there were 3.7 workers per beneficiary.
- Life expectancy is predicted to increase by 20 years by 2040.
- Seniors are becoming more educated. By 2040, 35 percent of people 65 and older will have a college degree; 19 percent will have some college and 34 percent will have at least a high school diploma.
- The senior population will be more diverse. By 2040, 67 percent will be non-Hispanic white and 10 percent will be non-Hispanic black, 14 percent of seniors will be Hispanic and the remaining 9 percent will be Asian, American Indian or people of mixed race.

The government may soon be recording the driving habits of every American. Under section 31406 of Senate Bill 1813, drivers will, by law, be required to install an "event data recorder" (EDR) into their vehicles. The bill is also known as "Moving Ahead for Progress in the 21st Century Act" or MAP-21.

# Remove candlewax from carpeting

To remove wax from carpeting or other fabric, first scrape away any excess. Then, place a brown paper bag over the wax and run a warm iron over the bag. The wax will melt right into the bag. Continue moving the bag around as you pick up the wax so you are always using a clean section. If a little grease stain remains on carpet, sprinkle with baking soda and allow to sit overnight before vacuuming, which will remove the grease residue. If colored wax leaves a stain on carpet, blot with spot remover or carpet cleaner, following label directions.

You may or may not be aware that white distilled vinegar is just the job for a multitude of household cleaning tasks. Cleaning with vinegar is great for killing germs, bacteria and mold due to the high levels of acidity. # To humidify, or dehumidify?

Michigan residents either enjoy or tolerate the wide changes in weather. We know to bring out the dehumidifier in the summer and the humidifier in the winter. One needs draining religiously, the other is always thirsty.

Humidity is defined as "a quantity representing the amount of water vapor in the atmosphere or a gas." Humidity affects everything from mold growth, to out-of-control frizzy hair. More humidity can make the air feel heavy, even oppressive in the dog days of summer.

The amount of moisture the air can hold depends in its temperature. A "low relative humidity" means that at that temperature, the air can hold more water. A cubic meter of air at 68 degrees Fahrenheit can hold up to 18 grams of water. At 18 grams of water,

## **DENTIST CHARGED FOR WRITING BOGUS SCRIPTS**

Anthony Carbajal, a 55-year-old dentist from Grand Blanc was arraigned Wednesday on four felony counts of obtaining a controlled substance fraudulently. According to Fenton police, Carbajal allegedly called in multiple prescriptions for himself at area pharmacies, using fake names and addresses. In January, a pharmacist working at a store at Silver Lake Road and Silver Parkway called the Fenton detective who was investigating the incidents and reported that Carbajal had called in another possibly fraudulent prescription for hydrocodone. The detective advised the pharmacist to fill the script and as Carbajal exited the store, police arrested him. The courts ordered a \$25,000 bond on each of the four counts.

record a driver's speed, braking, deployment of safety devices in an accident, along with other information.

If passed by the House of Representatives and then signed by the President, drivers would have to install an EDR into their car no less than 180 days after the bill is signed into a law. Lawmakers are expecting the bill to be signed into law before 2015.

While the bill states the information from the EDR cannot be retrieved without an owner or lessee's consent, there are provisions around these restrictions.

Information can be retrieved if "a court authorizes retrieval of the information in furtherance of a legal proceeding" or if "the information is retrieved pursuant to an investigation or inspection authorized under section 1131 (a) or 30166 of title 9, United State Code." The information can also be retrieved in the event of an accident.

If passed, drivers without an EDR can be punished by law.

In addition to EDRs in every vehicle, the proposed bill also includes a section that would revoke passports to citizens that owe the Internal Revenue Service \$50,000 or more in unpaid taxes. MAP-21 gives full authority to the IRS and does not require a court ruling in order to revoke passports.

"If the Secretary receives certification by

the Commissioner of Internal Revenue that any individual has a seriously delinquent tax debt in an amount in excess of \$50,000, the Secretary shall transmit such certification to the Secretary of State for action with respect to denial, revocation, or limitation of a passport..." the bill states.

The bill is more than 1,500 pages long and has already passed through the U.S. Senate. The bill was presented by Barbara Boxer (D-Calif.). Senate Majority Leader Harry Reid (D-Nevada) wrote the amendment for section 40304, which would give the IRS the power to revoke or deny a passport.

The bill is currently under review in the House of Representatives and is expected to be decided upon in the near future.

# Did you know?

The National Highway Transportation and Safety Administration (NHTSA) estimates that about 64 percent of 2005 model passenger vehicles had the EDR devices. By 2005, General Motors, Ford, Isuzu, Mazda, Mitsubishi, Subaru, and Suzuki were voluntarily equipping all of their vehicles with EDRs, according to NHTSA. Recent information from vehicle manufacturers indicates that most new passenger vehicles have EDRs, although those EDRs may not include all of the data elements specified in the NHTSA rule.

The U.S. Census Bureau reports that the population increased by 2.8 million from April 2010 to July 2011, a 0.7 percent overall increase. It's the smallest population growth since 1945 when the population only grew by 0.3 percent at the end of World War

"Economics has something to do with it. People are having a hard time finding a job or income, and are less likely to move out on their own," said Chris Douglas, a professor of economics at the University of Michigan-Flint. "In the long term, having both parents work makes having a kid harder."

ago." The decrease in parenthood may last longer than vying grandparents want to hear. A recent report by the Associated Press said half of college graduates

this May will be either unemployed or underemployed. The U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics reported unemployment at 8.3 percent in February, the same level it was at in December of 1983.

The population size isn't shrinking however, as lifespans are increasing faster than people are dying. The current average lifespan is nearly 80 years in the U.S. compared to 60 years in 1960. The U.S. Census Bureau predicts people 65 and older will make up 14 percent of the world population by 2040, or 1.3 billion people.

By 2040, the average life expectancy could reach 100 years, according to studies by the Urban Institute. The expectant shift in age is shaping local economics and ideology as to how people will interact in the near future.

'We are an aging population that is living longer," said Dean Rumsey, general manager of Caretel Inns of Linden. "We know the population is going to age, now it's just a matter of being prepared in our local community."

Rumsey said the senior population is

also more sophisticated than past generations as well, with most of today's seniors seeking to maintain a high quality of life. Caretel Inns is currently in the process of adding 20 additional rooms to their facilities, which has already generated a waiting list.

By 2040, the U.S. Census Bureau predicts a negative population growth of .62

percent. The world population is expected to be slightly less than 9 billion by 2040.

A shrinking working population may force the way Medicare and Social Security are funded in the future, since both programs are dependent on taxes from the youth.

"With birth rates slowing, it puts pressure on Medicare and Social Security," Douglas said. "The workforce has decreased over time and it's true for all Western countries. It's going to be really challenging."

have mutually agreed to terminate the lease of the old fire hall to the restaurant.

Burns and DDA Chairman Craig Schmidt said that they and city representatives met with MBC representatives on Thursday and all parties agreed that it was in everyone's interest that the lease be terminated.

The termination came before the restaurant or DDA spent any funds on the project.

"We regret that MBC was unable to complete this development, but we are already working on alternatives to bring this project to completion," said Burns.

"We look forward to reporting to you in the near future." The old Fenton fire hall is adjacent to

the Shiawassee River and a city park. The scrapped plan included a microbrewery with a full-service restaurant.

Following Thursday's meeting with restaurant representatives, Burns said he was not at liberty to discuss the alternatives right now, but that the DDA is working on it and hopes to have an announcement in the near future.

Burns added, "It was a very good relationship, and we did enjoy working with them. They are good people, but unfortunately, it is a financial situation that caused this, and I hope they can do what they can to be

successful in the future.

"On the positive end for the city, this project is still going to happen in the near future, and no tax dollars were spent."

The company was also recently evicted from its headquarters in Webberville. At the time, the company said this would not affect the project in Fenton at the old fire hall.

The prettiest goal was Linden's first-half tally that tied it at 1-all with 17:55



humidity is at 100 percent. At 9 grams of water, it is 50-percent humidity.

On average, an indoor humidity of 45 percent is most preferable. Relative humidity can make the air feel five degrees warmer, or cooler depending on the amount of humidity in the air. This means that controlling the amount of humidity in the air can save money with less heating and cooling.

According to howstuffworks.com, we feel warmer if we can't sweat off excess heat because the air is at 100 percent humidity. We feel cooler if the air is less humid, and can therefore evaporate that excess sweat.

## **Dehumidifiers**

As we approach summer, it will be time to get the dehumidifier out. We dehumidify to feel comfortable and cool and keep mildew out of the basement.

'The dehumidifiers sell like crazy, I run out of dehumidifiers," said Nick Salisbury of the Sears Hometown Store in Fenton. When it gets hot and humid, he will have a waiting list for the units every week. He suggests planning ahead, and buying before the weather, and the crowds hit. "At 70 percent humidity, that's when people want them, they don't think about them until then."

A dehumidifier works by causing the moisture in the air to condense, much like a sweating beverage container. A fan pulls the surrounding air into the dehumidifier. As the warm air passes through, it is cooled off by coils. As the air cools, it deposits the excess moisture onto the cooler coils, and it drips back into the reservoir. The air is reheated and sent out again as exhaust. Depending on how humid it is, the reservoir may need to be changed frequently while some empty directly into a drain.

Humidifiers use more power than a refrigerator, but less than an air conditioning unit. Howstuffworks.com suggests keeping the dehumidifier set to 50 percent, and keep windows closed while it is running. The water it collects is not drinkable, but it can be used to water


During the winter, we use a humidifier to stay comfortable. Dry air means dry, cracking skin and lips, and being shocked when touching something metal. "That's when they want to add humidity, that's when they buy humidifiers," said Salisbury. It can also lead to creaking floors and walls, as the wood dries out over time.

The reason the air in the winter is so dry, is because it can only hold 5 grams of water per cubic meter at 32 degrees, colder air means less moisture. The air was already dry when heated inside,

further reducing the amount of humidity.

Evaporative humidifiers are relatively simple, and work with three main parts, the basin of water, a filter, and fan. The water is drawn from the basin into the filter, which is distributed into the air by the fan. Because the air can only accept so much water, it naturally regulates itself, evaporating more moisture into the air as it is more dry. This system can also be hooked up to a ventilation system.

Humidifiers are less expensive to buy and use than a dehumidifier.







without him, and they don't like that," she said. "If you can't handle that, then you're not the person for me," she said.

These people don't get past the initial coffee shop meeting, which she first sets up for her safety. The next step for her is an actual "date." Unfortunately, she said, many don't make it past the coffee meeting. "They tell you one thing on the computer, and then when you meet in

person, they're different than on the computer," she said.

Despite some people being uncomfortable with her status as a mom, she said overall, the experience has been positive. "It's been a mix," she said. Ferguson deals with regular propositions for flings from the men on OkCupid, which she deflects.

Her experience with a large number of propositions for flings is not uncommon

for the female experience online. A search of everyone aged 25-35 reveals hundreds of users on OkCupid — but 70 percent of them are males. This can lead to women being inundated with messages, and more than a few are inappropriate.

Though the larger percentage of callers fall into this category, she does meet enough nice men that are genuinely interested in learning about her. "Some have been asking questions, sending pictures," she said. Ferguson only has one photo posted presently and the site encourages a thorough profile with several pictures.

While OkCupid focuses on nudging users to chat with each other, many paying

sites claim to have an advantage by using math equations to decide who is a better match. eHarmony.com and Chemistry. com, claim to use personality equations to find better matches. The New York Times isn't so sure. "Because they gather data from singles who have never met, the sites have no way of knowing how two people will interact once they have been matched," said the article.

OkCupid has a bevy of quizzes to answer that help determine a "match per-

centage." It will even sort your potential matches by the percentage. And again, it's a free site. Match.com costs around \$18 per month to use, but guarantees meeting the next relationship in six months. It also has a larger local user base, while OkCupid has a larger user base near Detroit, Ann Arbor and Grand Rapids.

After two years, Ferguson said she has some cool friends she still keeps

up with, and has some advice for men seeking women online. "If you want to actually meet the girl and get a chance, use your manners, and approach them as your mother would want you to. Treat the person like a lady."

Huffington Post blogger Molly Shapiro said that many people will talk themselves out of going online to meet people, but urges singles to keep an open mind. "Most people know at least one online dating success story — their second cousin, their boss' daughter or their best friend's sister who found love on the Internet," she wrote. "So why not make the next happy ending your own?"

My wiper blades keep stopping in the middle of the windshield while they are turned on. Christine, The wiper problem you are experiencing is most likely the cause of a bad wiper motor, but it could also be in the control circuit. You may want to have this checked at a repair shop, since the motor can be expensive and difficult to replace. As for the Grand Am, this one is a common failure and is usually the turn signal/ hazard multifunction switch. They short out internally and cause this problem quite often.



**DEAR DR. DONOHUE: In October of last year,** my husband, age 63, died of a brain hemorrhage (stroke). He was a youthful, health-conscious man, now sorely missed by his wife, family and friends. This tragedy was due to undiagnosed high blood pressure, since he, like many men, refused to visit the doctor. Please encourage people, especially 55 and older, to have a checkup so they don't suffer a similar fate. — R.A.

**ANSWER:** My sincerest condolences to you and your family. I hope many who read your letter will take your advice.

I've written about ischemic stroke, the kind that comes from a plugged brain artery. It accounts for most strokes. The letter-writer's husband suffered a hemorrhagic stroke, one that comes from bleeding from a brain artery.

Hemorrhagic strokes have an abrupt onset. A person can be fine one minute, and the next there's a profound change. He or she can't move an arm or a leg, can't talk or has a sudden, severe headache. Shortly the person becomes unresponsive. For 50 percent of people with a hemorrhagic stroke, death is the final step, and it often comes quickly.

Differentiating a stroke caused by bleeding from one caused by artery plugging is not something for an untrained person to attempt. Confronted by someone who has the signs of a stroke, an untrained person should call for immediate help.

As Mrs. R.A. points out, high blood pressure is one of the most common medical conditions responsible for a hemorrhagic stroke. Prevention of these lethal strokes depends on knowing what your blood pressure is. Keeping blood pressure in the normal range is the best way to prevent them. The trouble with high blood pressure is that it seldom produces any signs until it's too late.

# Spring cleaning with your pet

No Mud-Slinging! Teach your dog to stand at the door so you can wipe his paws and any fur that may be caked in mud.

Roll Over, Rover! Dogs don't understand why it's OK to roll on the furniture after a bath but not when they are covered in mud. - Put only ripe avocados in the fridge; unripe one will not ripen in cold temperatures.
- Do not slice them before refrigerating since they will turn brown after being cut.



Three Fenton Regional Chamber of Commerce board members, Patrik Welty of Legacy Realty Professionals, Ed Koledo Superintendent of Linden Community Schools and Dennis Leyder of The State Bank shared their thoughts and stories of how volunteering has made an impact on their lives and business.

The exercise revealed some true leadership strategies and Welty has carried that experience forward in his business.

Koledo talked about the importance of encouraging youth to volunteer. He told of how a bowl-a-thon was held to help the Loose Senior Citizen Center, and the response from the kids and their families was overwhelming. He said if we are good role models now for our children they will volunteer and be good role models as adults.

Leyder reminded us that many years ago

companies required their employees to give community service. His first job at a bank was to be their community liaison for United Way. Now it's harder to require or dedicate time for employees to volunteer, but in the long run one's company will be rewarded because people like to do business with people who give unselfishly to their community, church, schools, etc.




