Rose Township -Chickens, recently liberated from their coops by owners Seth and Kierra Henderson, move freely about the one-acre yard, clucking, buzzing, and bobbing their multicolored heads.

They were generally content in their different coops, but were also a little upset they hadn't been let out to roam the yard sooner. "By dark they'll all be back in," said Seth, 27.

The chickens know the drill, and don't put up much of a fuss. The couple could head out to a Tigers game, and simply close up the different coops for the night when they get home, knowing the flock will be in bed for the night.

Seth Henderson and his wife, Kierra of Rose Township, keep chickens in two coops and another ad-hoc area in their one-acre yard. This goes along with their attempt to eat as much organic food as possible. the idea around of allowing residents to raise chickens, with some re-

of meat and eggs. So far in just a year of keeping them, their 20 or so chickens have provided 3,000 eggs.



## Shooting suspect bound over to circuit court

#### Victim identifies suspect at preliminary hearing

The suspect believed involved with a shooting incident in Fenton Township on April 14 has been bound over to Genesee County Circuit Court.

David Eddie Collins, 23, of Flint remains in the Genesee County Jail on \$250,000 cash surety bond. He is facing three felony counts, armed robbery, first-degree home invasion and weapons felony firearms. If convicted as charged, he faces up to life in prison.

Genesee County Sheriff Robert Pickell said deputies responded to a home in the 13000 block of Linden Road in Fenton Township on a report of shots fired during a home invasion.

Robert Johnson, the 23-year-old resident asleep in an upstairs bedroom at the time of the break-in, was shot in an exchange of gun fire with two intruders, one of whom is believed to be Collins.

The sheriff said detectives believe the second suspect, Kalien Stubbs, was killed in a homicide in Flint on April 16.

Johnson told investigators that the suspects demanded money as they threatened him.

During Collins' preliminary exam on Thursday, Johnson identified Collins as one of the men who broke into his house on April 14.

Collins' circuit court arraignment has not yet been scheduled.

#### **FACEBOOK GOES PUBLIC**

Facebook went public on Friday, May 18 with an initial public offering (IPO) of 421,233,615 shares at \$38 per share.

Facebook's IPO (NASDAQ:FB) is expected to set records once it is in the hands of investors and will raise \$16 billion for the company if every share is sold. CNN reports Facebook is the largest tech IPO in history and the third largest IPO overall. 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## **Test scoring changes affect Holly schools**

District loses little Oakland County ground against tighter standards for MEAP and MME

tjagielo@tctimes.com; 810-433-6795 Holly — Though results from the 2011 Michigan Educational Assessment Program (MEAP), and Michigan Merit Exam (MME) appeared lackluster, Holly Area Schools (HAS) has some reason to be proud.

The recent scores presented by Noni Miller, superintendent of instruction, showed the district mostly standing pat against tightening cut scores across the state, when compared to

tary reading and science, HAS remained in the middle of the pack, resting evenly between Pontiac at the lowest end, and Birmingham at the highest. HAS lost ground in math and social studies between 2005 and 2011.

HAS also met Adequate Yearly Progress (AYP) across the district with "No Child Left Behind" standards. Miller said better MEAP and MME achievement could be done, but at the sacrifice of AYP.

"This should be a celebration, but also a reality check," said Miller, who also highlighted the difficulty with a reduced teaching and support staff.

Much of the impact on scoring is based on these "cut" scores, which do not directly affect the MEAP and MME tests, but give more stringent interpretation of the results. More on the cut scores below.

for this 2011-12 school year. They dramatically reduce what was considered proficient before. For example, elementary math scores in 2010 are reduced to 35 percent proficient,

instead of 95 percent proficient, according to the Michigan Department of Education (MDE), when current cut scores are applied.

This is what HAS experienced with MEAP math scores, sinking from almost 90-percent proficient, to just under 40-percent proficient now. Holly is not alone in being negatively affected, with all districts losing proficiency in the 2011 MEAP test.

This puts the pressure on teachers to get students ready for the test, and the higher standards. "They're thinking about, 'how do we close that gap?" said Kaye Thorsby, HAS director of curriculum. She said it is hard work to keep up the standard every year, with what Miller described as

moving target.

Miller said that teachers and staff are positive in their pursuit of better MEAP grades against the tougher cut scores.

#### Cut scores

The current cut score for the MEAP and MME is 329. The Michigan Department of Education (MDE) approves these cut scores.

The cut scores is a method of interpreting the data from the test results, and the "cut" is a cutoff between proficient and not proficient.

Proficiency means "progressing appropriately" on the MEAP score, and also signals college readiness.

A higher cut score means higher standards, and more work for teachers and students. It also dampens the achievement of the MEAP scores, though the scores and the tests are the same.

As cut scores rise, the number of students rated as proficient will decline, and students rated partially or not proficient, will rise. This is according to a Regional Educational Service Agency (RESA) video on cut scores in Michigan. Scores formerly reported as "proficient" might only be "partially proficient" now

Cut scores were increased accordingly because of a changing market, and knowledge based economy, instead of a manufacturing economy.

The higher the student scores above the cut, the better chance they have at academic success at the next step.

These cut scores are determined by a complex formula, and is not widely understood or even agreed upon by statisticians. It is supposed to be one more measurement of a student's proficiency.

## Holly police still facing cuts

#### Move would help cover \$126,000 budget gap

tjagielo@tctimes.com; 810-433-6795 The Holly Village Council budget work session Tuesday centered again on reductions in the police department to close a \$126,000 deficit.

The topic of laying off police officers has been discussed at length, with many public comments voiced against any lay offs.

"We've done reductions in every department except police," said council member Jackie Campbell. The village also reduced insurance costs, and was affected by the lawsuit from former manager Marsha Powers, by more than \$130,000.

The current proposal with the police department is to lay off one sergeant. The police department also agreed to give up this year's and last year's pay raises. Manager Jerry Walker said foregoing raises will add around \$26,000 to the See CUTS on 14A





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

Residents applaud council for taking first step on upgrades

Township will get some relief this summer. Council members approved road construction on Linden Road and Bennett Lake Road at Tuesday's meeting.

The meeting to discuss proposed road construction attracted nearly 30 residents

from the township, all of whom supported updating the roads. Drivers told the council numerous stories of cars being damaged due to driving on the roads, and numerous safety issues that came with poor road upkeep.

One couple claimed the roads haven't been worked on in more than 40 years.

road construction in this year's budget. According to Township Treasurer David Kurtz, Livingston County only has \$400,000 set aside for road construction this year. Livingston County will pay for \$80,000 of the Bennett Lake Road repair, which will stretch from White Lake Road to the county line. Tyrone Township will

pay \$80,000 as well, putting the total project at \$160,000 for 1.19 miles.

The improvement is expected to last between 7 and 10 years.

"This is 20 percent of the road commission's budget," Kurtz said. "We're looking

at a gift of \$80,000. I suggest we use it.' The township will pay an additional \$42,000 for repairs on Linden Road. Another \$90,000 from the township's budget will be used for road bleaching and grading.

While some residents felt the road improvements were not big enough, council members were applauded for starting improvements in the township.

"The roads will be smoother, but I don't know how much," Kurtz joked.

budget recommendations from Superintendent Kent Barnes that the board adopted early this spring.

Trustee Dave Rath admitted to being hesitant to the layoffs, but the resolution was approved unanimously. Barnes pointed out

that the layoffs were originally set at 23

staff and faculty members. "By the time everything pans out, we may only have

two people," he said that could be permanently laid off.

Barnes said personnel can leave for other reasons, such as family changes or retirement. "At one point we were talking about 23 people," he said. "Brandon (schools) laid off 20 people."

Barnes said reducing the number of layoffs was due to 12 retirements, some employees who have taken leave, or have moved. This left them with four layoffs.

Barnes said the layoffs are across the board. "Give it another month; you don't know what will happen." Barnes said these layoffs aren't final; their status could change in the

A fresh and unique edition of the Times appears on your doorstep each Sunday and Wednesday — so how does it all come together?

It's a surprisingly simple, and surprisingly complex process. For each edition, numerous meetings and planning sessions were attended, hundreds of phones calls were made, lots of miles were driven, and of course, caffeine was consumed.

Editorial meetings are held every Monday morning. This is where the next several editions are planned in detail, and writers report what government meetings they will attend in their respective communities.

The schedule is completed a month in advance, and tweaked with the direction and suggestions of publisher Craig Rockman.

A newspaper is run on deadlines. The editorial staff's deadlines are Tuesday at 10 a.m., for the Midweek edition, and

Thursday at 10 a.m. for the Sunday edition.

Often the staff scrambles to write stories by deadline after their nighttime meetings or after an election. The staff must also accommodate any breaking news.

Photos are shot ahead of time and edited for print.

Tuesdays and Thursdays are hectic, with feverish activity all day long to ensure the paper is "put to bed" on time.

Writers turn stories in to Editor Sharon Stone, who then edits them and submits them to the composition manager, Jennifer Ward.

Ward puts the paper together with a

program called Adobe In-Design, while also planning placement color, and black and white advertisements, which takes a great deal of time and extra hours.

Rockman will then look at the nearly complete layout, and make changes to headlines and basic layout as he deems necessary.

Once the paper is essentially laid out, "flats," or 11x14-inch copies of the pages are printed out for the editorial staff to proofread. Mistakes and missing "copy" are corrected.

After the staff is satisfied with the corrections, the paper is hung on the walls to be read again, and finally a "checklist" is conducted on

important areas of the newspaper. The finished paper is uploaded to the

web, and sent digitally to the printer, after which it finally ends up on your doorstep, or in your mailbox.



Without the advertising department, there would be no newspaper. The staff is led by Gail Grove, who sets sales goals for her group of five sales reps.

The volume of ads they sell can also change the length of the paper in pages. The ads that are placed in the paper are either "camera ready," or, the ads are built by the composition staff.

The editorial staff consists of four fulltime members, two part-time employees, and one intern. The editorial staff is responsible for all words or "copy," and photos related to news and features.

Editor Sharon Stone manages the overall editorial staff, ensuring that none of the small or larger stories slip by.

#### Summary

The Tri-County Times, published on Sunday and Wednesday is made possible by a small group of dedicated managers, sales reps, and editorial staff, as well as community input.

She edits every document that comes through to the paper. This includes features and news stories, social features and police news releases. She edits all of the Hot lines for grammar, and sometimes "colorful" lan-

guage. She generally does all police reporting, and works with the advertising department to come up with, and coordinate,

educational feature sections. Associate Editor Tim Jagielo assists the editor in managing the editorial staff and the upcoming stories.

The role also includes community coverage, taking and editing photos, and offering story ideas.

Sports Editor David Troppens is part of the editorial staff, but exclusively works in sports.

He is responsible for all stories, photos and layout of his section, which varies depending on the sports season, for each edition.

Nearly each weeknight is spent at a

game, which he will write up in the morning. These add up to many brief stories that are statistic-heavy, in addition to five or six longer stories.

Because of the breadth of his coverage, he must spend a lot of time following up on games with coaches through the phone or by e-mail.

Sally Rummel is the primary business writer for the Times, and handles feature section writing almost single-handedly.

Though she is part time, she still can write more than a dozen stories per week regularly from home. Her extensive social network keeps her connected to various topics.

Reporter William Ax-

ford covers the communities of Linden, Fenton Township and Tyrone Township. He attends around two meetings per week, and writes feature stories.

Axford typically writes the majority of the tech stories.

Ryan Tackabury covers the city of Fenton and Fenton schools. He is part time, but has taken on the important role of covering the government most central to the community.

Intern Christopher Jones handles the Street Talk and Teen Talk sections, while writing feature stories when he can, freeing up the full-time staff for assignments.

#### Penalties created for abuse committed in the presence of another

The Michigan House today unanimously approved legislation known as "Dominick's Law" to strengthen penalties for child abuse in Michigan and create penalties for abuse in front of other people.

The legislation is named in memory of Dominick Calhoun, who was beaten to death in April 2010 at the hands of his mother's live-in boyfriend, Brandon Hayes, while at their Argentine Township apartment. Hayes is serving life in prison for his conviction and Dominick's mother, Corrine Baker is serving 13 to

30 years for second degree child abuse and second degree murder.

House Bills 5562 and 5563 are sponsored by state representatives Matt Lori and Joseph Graves.

"This legislation hits very close to home for me as Dominick Calhoun was beaten to death right in my home community," said Graves, (R-Argentine

Township). "By strengthening penalties for child abuse in Michigan, we are giving the courts the tools to properly punish criminals for committing child abuse."

The bills establish penalties for committing child abuse in the presence of another child, which is not currently


"We cannot change what happened to Dominick Calhoun, but hopefully by updating these laws we can demonstrate our determination to better protect Michigan children from child abusers," said Lori, (R-Constantine).

The legislation also strengthens penalties for first- and second-degree child abuse, creating additional penalties for additional offenses of child abuse.

The proposed bills now must be passed by the state senate and sent to Gov. Rick Snyder for his signature.



in each direction during the work. Traffic signals have been adjusted to help traffic flow through the project.

The city is asking motorists to be patient as they travel through the construction area.

Residents and visitors will have access to all businesses during construction and the city and businesses are encouraging people to visit businesses as they normally would.

Currently the northbound lanes and center turn lane have been closed for construction as the contractor makes improvements. One option available in the past but no longer, is dipping into the fund balance. Currently, the fund balance is the lowest it can be, at around \$150,000. The previous council used \$305,649 to balance the budget last year, said Campbell. This option is not available this year, as the fund balance serves as an emergency, or rainy day fund. "That's why you can't repeat that trend," said Walker.


Overall, a drop in revenues and prior use of the fund balance has reduced it from around \$600,000 last year, said Campbell. "Every community is doing reduction, cutbacks and layoffs," she said. "There is no extra spending."

With Scott's exit from the scene, four candidates have filed for his old seat in the 51st district. The 51st district was redrawn earlier this year and includes the cities of Fenton and Linden, the townships of Fenton, Holly, Mundy, Flushing, Argentine, Clayton, Gaines and Rose and the villages of Goodrich and Holly.

The 51st district attracted a lot of attention when Scott was recalled last fall with February's special election, where Joe Graves (R-Argentine) was elected as Scott's replacement. The controversial recall also funneled hundreds of thousands of dollars into the 51st district, with the Michigan Chamber of Commerce (MCC) spending \$50,000 against Scott's recall and an additional \$33,000 toward Graves, reports the Detroit Free Press.

The Michigan Education Association (MEA), the state's largest teacher union, spent nearly \$150,000 in the effort to recall Scott.

It is currently unclear if or how the MCC, MEA and other organizations will influence the district. If the past year has been any indication however, voters shouldn't be surprised if the district attracts funding from organizations all around the state.

Here's a brief look at each of the candidates:

**Joseph Graves** was elected as the district's representative in the special election held in February. Graves said

his main focuses have been creating jobs and increasing public safety. As far as his time in office, Graves said, "It's been wonderful, I enjoy every minute of it."

Graves also wants to rescind the pension tax and said he has created a bill to do so. He is working with Gov. Rick Snyder on creating a police force to combat violent crime.

"We're knocking on doors and meeting with people to make sure their priorities are understood," Graves said.

John Lauve (R-Holly) is a Vietnam veteran and worked at GM for

30 years after his service. Lauve has unsuccessfully ran for U.S. Congress and governor when John Engler was voted in. Lauve said he would focus on senior citizens and schools if elected to office.

"We need to fix the education system in Michigan. Schools need to be managed by the state board of education," Lauve said. Lauve is also against Michigan legislators' actions that allow new laws to take immediate effect. "The people that support this are violating their oath of office."

Steve Losey (D-Linden) is a Redford Union School District union president and teacher. Losey also serves as a member of the Linden school board. Losey lost to Graves in the February special election and said he learned a lot from the experience.

"My main focus that I want more than anything else is I want people to vote. I want to encourage everybody

in the 51st to have their voices heard," Losey said. Repealing the pension tax, public education and jobs are priorities of Losey's platform. "I think the folks are finally tired with what's

going on and are ready for change."

Ryan Starski (D-Goodrich) is running for public office for the first time. Starski has worked for James Swenor, a Republican candidate for the 51st district in 2008. In 2009, Starski worked with Democratic State Sen. Hansen Clarke. Starski said his experience working on different campaigns will help bring bipartisan views to Lansing.

"One of the things

I pride myself on is that I've worked for both Democrats and Republicans," Starski said. Prior to campaigning Starski worked as a software technician at Jackson National Life. Starski's platform includes re-

"At first the third baseman (Ashley Rinks) called it. She said 'Kim, Kim, Kim,' and I was like oh shoot," Roe said of the pickle play. "I grabbed it and I was going to look the runner at third, but she was right there. I was like, 'Yes' and tossed it (to get her out).'

That play may have been a good example of how Amos Rinks' young varsity softball team has improved as the season has gone on. They are making the smart plays at critical times. And against LakeVille, that resulted in two wins. Lake Fenton defeated LakeVille 13-3 in the first game and 4-1 in the second contest at Lake Fenton High School.

"They are getting better," Rinks said. "I reminded them that against good teams they faced runners in scoring position, on third, with no outs and bases loaded with no outs, and that we've been able to get out

of those innings without allowing any runs. That's a mark of a quality team. When you can do that, it's a sign you are getting pretty good."

The Blue Devils (9-2, 15-11) are doing just that, getting pretty darn good. At the start of the season it was a squad that was young but full of potential. It seems in mid-May that potential is starting to show.

"We are a really young team," Roe said. "We started off OK, but we've really gotten better and grown as a team. Especially in future years, we are going to get better playing together."

The Blue Devils were tested during the second game of the twinbill. LakeVille busted out for an early run in the top of the first. Roe allowed two hits and two walks, allowing a run to score. 

His next fight was against a future UFC legend who was competing in his second fight of his career, Brandon Vera. He lost that bout. In his next three fights he competed against UFC fighters Jeff Monson and Travis Fulton, and another well-established fighter named John Dixson. All four bouts Richard lost, but he bounced back to win four straight matches in 2006.

Richard competed in organizations like King of the Cage, Next Level Fighting, Tournament Fighting Championships and Ironheart Crown. His last match was in the Extreme Cagefighting Championships on Jan. 16, 2010, when he beat Ray Lopez with a rear-naked choke. But Richard also broke his hand and nose.

"I never really wanted to be a fighter but I got swept up into it," Richard said. "I always did my competition and fighting because I wanted to teach. I wanted to make sure what I was teaching would work. It allowed me to give my students the best techniques. I didn't want to fill their heads with a bunch of BS.

Perhaps Richard's most memorable fight came in King of the Cage on Nov. 21, 2007 when he wrestled UFC Hall of Famer, Severn.

"I thought I won that fight but the judges didn't," Richard said.

Richard said Severn got a takedown late in the first round and another in the third. Minus those takedowns, which Richard got up from quickly afterward, Richard pounded Severn with his kickboxing skill.

"I walked out of the fight with no scratches on me or anything," Richard said.

"He had ice on his knees. I definitely did more of the damage, but he was able to control where the fight took place. I was kicking him, punching him and landed some good stuff."

A discouraged minister told me the reason for his melancholy mood. He had just resigned as pastor of a church he had served for 11 years. During this time as pastor, the church had grown from only a few families to a sizeable congregation. He had enjoyed his work there until one of the members began to criticize him; then he had allowed this grumbler and a small group he had gathered to drive him to despair.

Since it's always easier to be part of the faction than to get into the action, critics usually increase in number so this minister under fire had been feeling the heat. Finally, tired of the attacks of these complainers, he had quit. Now he regretted his resignation.

Ministers aren't the only targets of cruel critics. Fault-finders exist everywhere.

Oliver Wendell Holmes said, 'The human race is divided into two classes — those who go ahead and do something and those who sit still and inquire why it wasn't done another way.'

Some who are continually criticizing others do so to turn attention away from their own faults. One writer warns constant critics as follows: 'Criticizing others is a dangerous thing, not so much because you may make mistakes about them but because you may reveal the truth about yourself.'

Judas didn't care about the poor, but linking his protest to helping the needy made him look good. Those who focus on faults are always looking for ways to justify their caustic comments.

Peter said we are most like our Lord when we take unjust criticism patiently (I Peter 2:20-21), but that's a tall order. Few aspire to follow the loving steps that led to the cross.

Opportunities to demonstrate the reality of our faith when under fire abound because there is never a shortage of critics. These negative nuisances are everywhere, continually searching for reasons to complain. They are always the first to hear of anything wrong and feel it their duty to spread the news. For centuries, their cruel tongues have kept ministers on the move, contributing to what a major news magazine once called 'the game of musical pulpits.'

Are you a victim of critics in your church or community? Lovingly tune them out.

Even the moon couldn't keep shining if it paid attention to bark-ing dogs.

The discouraged pastor finally found help in realizing he had been listening to the wrong people. Many in his church had appreciated his dedication, but he hadn't heard their compliments because he was so occupied with the cutting words of those who chose to focus on his faults.

Let's stop listening to the wrong people.

Those who love, support and encourage us are gifts from God to enable us to live in the sunshine no matter how dark the day.

moving target and they will go after it." In reality, the bees are the ones who find themselves in danger, despite the many different things that they do for us, and the number of living honeybees in the world is dwindling every year.

Bees are responsible for the majority of the pollination that takes place with much of the food we eat. Blueberries, apples, almonds, and many more fruits come to us through pollination by honeybees.

A Cornell University study estimated that approximately \$14 billion worth of crops in the United States are pollinated by bees.

Different places in the world have been hit to varying degrees. Beauchamp said that some places, like Japan, have to resort to manual pollination. "They have to pollinate by hand with miniature brushes," Beauchamp said. "It is labor intensive."

We may not be able to rely on the bees for pollination for much longer, though.

According to the National Agriculture Statistics Service, over the last 30 years the number of honey producing hives in the United States was cut in half.

While the decline in bees in the nation and across the world has been decreasing over a long period of time, the term Colony Collapse Disorder (CCD) was coined in the last decade as the decline became more drastic. The term describes the phenomenon of entire bee colonies to vanish overnight — leaving no trace of what may have happened to them.

Carl Schumaker, a beekeeper in Fenton, has had his own encounter with CCD having lost one of his own colonies.

"No one understands completely what is happening with CCD. What we know is that as a beekeeper you will have what seems to be a healthy colony or bee hive, and then one day they will just be

gone," Schumaker said. "They are not dead, they are just gone."

Bees face other threats besides CCD. In some cases, just having reduced numbers itself poses extra problems.

Beehives require many of their kind to survive. It takes thousands of bees to make honey, and without

them all working together in unison, the colony of bees would not be able to produce enough honey to survive the winter.

"One year off of three beehives, I took off about 800 pounds, or about 60 gallons or more of honey," Schumaker said. "Now-a-days, honey production is typically less than half."

Human activity also poses other threats to the life of bees.



#### Buzz on bees How much do you know

about bees? Here are some interesting bee facts from local beekeepers.

• Your average bee has a lifespan of just over 40 days.

• A queen bee can lay an egg every 30 seconds.

• **Bees don't hibernate** during the winter. They stay close together in their hives to generate heat, and live off their supply of honey.

• **By the end** of winter, a hive could contain around 30,000 bees. By the end of summer, that same hive could easily house more than twice that number.

• **Bees in a colony** have many specific roles. Undertaker bees for example, have the task of removing dead bees from the hive. Guard bees will protect the hive from bees that belong to other colonies.

• **The role a** bee plays in the colony depends on their age. Early in their life, bees will care for the bees. The elder bees are the food gatherers and foragers that you might see outside on flowers.

"CCD is only a part of the problem, as (are) pesticides," Beauchamp said. Fertilizers and mosquito sprays have also been shown to have adverse effects on bees.

Advances in pesticides may be coming at a cost to the bee population. Beauchamp said that in the past, bees only faced a tough time when pesticides were being sprayed. Seeds that are sold pre-coated with pesticides, Beauchamp said, now pose a threat to bees all of the time. The use of pesticides can cause bees to become lost and unable to find their way back home to the colony.

Pesticides and CCD may not be two separate events, either. A recently conducted study from the Harvard School of Public Health that will be published in the Bulletin of Insectology journal in June names imidacloprid, acommonly used pesticide, is linked to Colony Collapse Disorder.

Even though their numbers are decreasing, now is the time you may be most likely to see them out in numbers so it is important to be careful around bees.

"May is swarm month for bees. It's when the hive gets crowded, and the queen will take half the members of the tribe, and they will find another home," Beauchamp said. "It's not uncommon to see swarms."

to grow as much food as they can. They buy local chicken food, which affects the chickens' eggs. "We try to get closer to self-sufficiency and organic," said Kierra.

Gardening and farming are part of their lives, and younger couples like them in the area also have chickens.

The couple said the chickens are also fun to have around. "They're entertaining," said Kierra. The chickens have their own personalities, and some of them get nicknames. "Cutie" is a small orange chicken, and "Rani" is an Americana who likes to be carried around the yard. She lays green eggs.

The chicken manure is used for compost, and the chickens also eat up the grubs in their garden.

They have one permanent coop and one mobile one that is moved twice a day around the yard, and another larger area for their Jersey Black Giant chickens. Within three areas, the couple has different chicken species named Americana, Jersey Black Giants, Buff Orphingtons, Plymouth Barred Rocks, Iso Brown, Production Reds and Rhode Island reds.

Though they have several different kinds of chickens now, many are dual purpose, meaning they lay eggs, and are also good for meat once they no longer lay eggs.

Seth built his two coops out of old pallets, and only bought the chicken wire and corrugated plastic for the roof. He's even considering building coops for a business.

A chicken coop is usually made of three different parts. The "run" is the fenced in area, the "coop" is the enclosed box they sleep in, and the "nesting box," is where the chickens go to lay eggs. "They like a safe dark place to lay their eggs in," said Seth.

The chickens need a translucent covering to deflect the sun, and

to also keep the ground dry. They need food and plenty of water. The water needs to be heated in the winter. Seth said chickens can live in green houses during the winter.

Local mills, such as Scramlin Feed, Maher Feed

and Pet Supply and Tractor Supply Company (TSC) produce food. Pellets and





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#### **CHICKEN COOP BASICS**

• Because chickens are social animals, it is recommended you start with three. A male chicken, a rooster, is not needed. Hens lay eggs whether there is a rooster.

 An easy coop to start with is a larger enclosed dog house, with a narrow entrance and ramp for the chickens. Two to three square feet per chicken is enough of a coop inside.

• An area where the hens can sit and lay eggs should be attached off the side, which allows eggs to be collected from the outside.

• A roost is an elevated loft inside the coop where the chickens sleep. It is also needed inside the coop.

· Bedding, food and water are all needed, even if they can roam the yard. The amount and type varies per season and region. Do research, and see what works for others

#### **Casual shoes**

The same rules for wear apply with casual shoes worn every day to the office. In fact, another important rule is to not wear the same shoes every day - rotate pairs so that the inside of the shoe has time to air out between wearings.

Regularly worn casual shoes have a lifespan of about a year, said Dr.

James Hirt, of Fenton Foot Care. "When shoes start to wear out, they lose their stability, and can cause ankle strain."

First look at the sole of the shoe to see how much it's worn. "The industry standard is that if there's more than 4 millimeters of wear, the shoe should be replaced or resoled," said Hirt. In fact, resoling a shoe is one of the most affordable ways to make a pair of shoes last. Men's dress shoes

Shoes that are worn only once a week or occasionally will last a lot longer than shoes worn every day.

Experts have two words to say when it comes to extending the life of expensive men's dress shoes: shoe trees. "Shoe trees help keep shoes from deteriorating by keeping their shape," said Hirt. In addition, they also keep moisture away from the shoe.

After purchasing shoe trees, pick out a water repellent/conditioner to protect shoes from water damage and soften the leather. If you wear your shoes out in the rain, allow them to dry completely before wearing them again.

Don't stop there: plan a trip around the U.P. this summer for a truly unique and memorable vacation destination. Michigan boasts its own national park, Isle Royale National Park near Houghton, but 502 miles from Fenton makes it a two-tank trip just to get there.

## To the South (and west)

Fenton to New Buffalo: 205.5 miles

On Lake Michigan's Gold Coast, New Buffalo has been called the "Hamptons of the Midwest." You're likely to run into more Chicagoans than Michigan folks, but this coastal town's amazing beaches, sand dunes and prime fishing conditions make it a popular weekend getaway. ## 4 TREES

1. **Trees produce oxygen** in exchange for carbon dioxide. A large tree puts out enough oxygen to sustain four people every day. On the other hand, it takes about 100 trees to capture and store one tonne (2,204 lbs.) of carbon dioxide in a year – two reasons why we need more trees than people.

2. **Pruning tree roots** will not necessarily kill a tree, but don't go too far. Never cut more that 30 percent of the root system of a mature tree, which means leaving a minimum space of 3 feet from the base of the tree for those with trunk of 30 cm or more in diameter.

3. Lilacs, elms, oaks and beeches can all live 200 to 300 years or more, common firs and spruces can live as long as 800 years, and sequoia are well known both for their bulk and their great age, but the champion grower is the pine, one of which, Pinus longaeva, has been clocked at 4,900 years.

#### 4. Do trees talk to each

other? Lots of people think so. In fact, while trees don't speak in comprehensible sentences, they appear to communicate through several different means. Some trees appear to exchange information and even nutrition through the network of mycorrhizae that populate their roots systems. Others (acacias) appear to be able to send either a chemical or an electrical message to fellows in their vicinity when they are under threat from a leafnibbling animal. And trees such as the black walnut certainly send chemical signals with a toxic substance called juglone that wards off competition from certain other plants.

#### CAN TELL US WHITE ASH offers various commercial, ornamental and ecological values. The very strong and yet elastic wood of the ash is used extensively for materials demanding high strength and resil-

yet elastic wood of the ash is used extensively for materials demanding high strength and resilience, such as bows, tool handles and baseball bats. Also is used for making guitars and office furniture.

**SPRUCE 2 HICKORY** is a great tree in areas with high winds because of the tap roots that go down deep in the earth making the trees very wind resistant. Man and animals enjoy the nuts.

#### **3 HONEYLOCUST** A fast-

growing tree with fragrant spring flowers. Its delicate, open silhouette lets grass grow underneath. Tiny leaflets turn yellow or yellow-green in fall. Pollution, salt and drought tolerant, which is why many downtowns plant them.

• **ASPENS** do not thrive very well in the shade, and it is difficult for aspen seedlings to grow in an already mature aspen stand. Fire indirectly benefits aspen trees, since it allows the saplings to flourish in open sunlight in the burned landscape.

SASSAFRAS is known as the root beer tree. In earlier times, homemade root beer was made by fermenting molassess (sometimes mixed with honey) and sassafras root. Sassafras leaves can have a mitten shape or the leaf can be threelobed

tively small deciduous perennial tree, native to northern North America. Its conspicuous white spring flowers and outstanding, persistent orange fruit make it one of our most recognizable trees.



WHITE SPRUCE has a cone-shaped crown, and when grown in the open develops a conical crown, which extends nearly to the ground. Leaves (needles) are needle-shaped, and are often somewhat crowded on the upper half of the branchlets.

• WILLOWS all have abundant, watery bark, sap which is heavily charged with salicylic acid, soft, usually pliant, tough wood, slender branches, and large, fibrous, often stoloniferous roots. The roots are remarkable for their toughness, size, and tenacity to life, and roots readily grow from aerial parts of the plant.

**YELLOW BIRCH** is named for its silvery-yellow, thinly peeling bark that develops with maturity. Many birches, have pathogens (leaf diseases, trunk rot, bark cankers) and pests which can cause either cosmetic (non-lethal) or lethal injury to the tree.

- Perplexed



DEAR DR. DONOHUE: I am a 55-year-old man who finally bit the bullet and had a colonoscopy. My doctor had badgered me to have one for the past five years. I don't have cancer. I don't have polyps. I do have diverticulosis. I didn't know I had it before the scope exam. I've never had even a twinge of pain. What is this, and what do I need to do about it? - H.L. **ANSWER:** A diverticulum is a small, balloonlike protrusion of the colon lining through the muscle wall of the colon and onto its outer surface. By small, I mean that diverticula range from 0.2 inches to 0.4 inches (0.5 cm to 1 cm) in largest diameter, around the size of a pea. Their cause appears to be a lack of fiber in the diet.

In places where the diet has lots of fiber, diverticulosis is rare. In North America, it's rampant. Fiber keeps undigested food from drying out. Dried food residue requires powerful contractions of the colon muscle to push it along. Those contractions also push the colon lining through the colon wall, creating a diverticulum.

Diverticulosis is frequently a silent affair, not causing any troubles. Diverticulitis, on the other hand, is an inflammation and infection of diverticula. That is quite painful. It produces abdominal pain on the left, lower side of the abdomen, often with nausea and vomiting. The diverticula also can burst and release bacteria into the abdominal cavity, a serious situation. Severe diverticulitis must be treated in the hospital with IV fluids and IV antibiotics.

To prevent diverticulosis from becoming diverticulitis, increase your fiber intake. Fiber is the indigestible coverings of many fruits, vegetables and grains. White flour is refined wheat — wheat without its outer coat, the bran. Bran and other sources of fiber draw water into undigested food and make it easily pushed along the entire length of the colon.

We're supposed to get 25 to 35 grams of fiber a day. Beans, whole-grain cereals, whole-grain breads, dates, prunes, unskinned apples and pears are examples of fiber-rich foods. If you cannot get enough fiber from foods, then commercial products such as Fiberall, Metamucil, Citrucel and FiberCon can provide it for you.
