Early birds get the worm, but who gets 'early bird' gene?

► Night Owls most active around 9 p.m.

Do you find yourself waking up at dawn, ready to start your day? Or do you find yourself preferring to sleep in and stay up long into the night?

For the majority of people, there is no strong preference one way or another. For others though, the time of the day that finds them in their prime can be extreme.

"There are individual variations among a number of people," said George Zureikat, M.D., of the Mid-Michigan Sleep Center. "There are people who can function and be more alert in the evening, and those who are more alert in the morning."

Sleep schedules can be greatly affected by outside factors, such as the hours worked for jobs.

Chad Crane, a Fenton resident who is no stranger to working nights, has had to adapt an unusual sleeping schedule even though he considers himself a night person. "It cuts into your social life," Crane said. Trying to find the sleeping pattern that works best for you when working late hours can be difficult, and so can getting normal activities or errands done, Crane said.

In 2009, a group of scientists at the

Typically, 'morning' people are most alert around 9 a.m. while 'evening' people are most alert around 9 p.m. No matter what type of personality, people still need seven to eight hours of sleep a day.

University of Alberta conducted a study that monitored the brains of "morning" and "evening" people. The study found that those who considered themselves morning people had brains that were most

excitable at 9 a.m., while the brains of evening people were more excitable and active at 9 p.m.

The day and evening preferences of a person have also been shown to become more ingrained with age.

"Teenagers tend to like to be night owls by choice," Zureikat said, although that is certainly not the case for all night owls.

Some people may be a night owl due to their body's circadian rhythm being set in a certain sleeping pattern. Scientists believe that others still may be born with a genetic mutation termed the "after-hours gene," which may

Village considering two tough budget options

►Special meeting to be held before June 12 budget adoption

Holly Village — In a slightly unorthodox move, the Holly Village Council asked village manager Jerry Walker to draft two different budgets, at the Tuesday night budget study session.

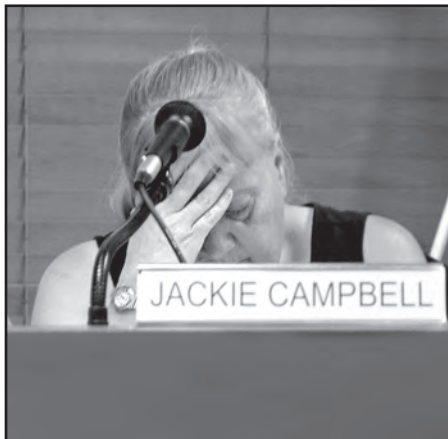
Summary

►The village council has one more meeting before adopting a 2012-13 budget, which contains cuts and concessions, and possibly police lay offs.

The first budget would call for the lay offs of one Holly police officer and one sergeant. The second would make other cuts and would dip into the fund balance for around \$14,000.

The fund balance, similar to a saving's account, is the lowest it's been in recent history, at about \$120,000.

The council scheduled a special meeting for Tuesday, June 5, at 6 p.m. at council chambers, where the council can make motions and decide on which budget they will vote to accept on June

12; the day the budget must be adopted by village charter. The council cannot make motions or vote during study sessions.

By ruling out cuts to the emergency dispatch center and dipping into the fund balance, the council and village administration's job became more difficult.

These budget discussions have hinged around the Holly Police Department, as the current draft of the budget calls for two officers being laid off, to help cover a \$120,000 deficit. In a show of support, much of the audience

This recognition is the result of an incident that occurred in February 2011 in Norton Shores, where he is a police officer. The incident involved him saving the life of an elderly woman by putting his own life in danger and receiving a stab wound in the process. The suspect was fatally wounded. Rhyndress now lives in North Muskegon with his wife, Joellen and two sons, Noah and Aidan.

project on North Fenton Road in Fenton Township, where it butts up to North LeRoy Street at Fenton City's northern border.

A curved section of roadway, which joins the city and township, needs to be reconstructed. The curve, which is located in both the city as well as Fenton Township, will not be paved during the current construction taking place on North LeRoy Street.

"We did not want to pave the section of the curve that is in the city and have the county tear it up next year

to reconstruct the curve as a part of their project, that would be a waste of taxpayers' dollars," wrote city manager Lynn Markland in a memorandum to the city council.

Though North LeRoy will see more construction, Markland said that even without agreeing on the contract, the area would be backed up from the GCRC's construction on Fenton Road regardless.

Councilwoman Pat Lockwood said she appreciated the ability to work out the city's road project with the GCRC's project in Fenton Township. "I think this is a good move," she said.

The city has been in contact with the GCRC to negotiate the cost of the project to the city. "The costs are less than what they originally wanted us to agree to," Markland said.

Construction is expected to take place between the city limits and Bly street. Though the exact dates of construction are not yet known, the project will likely not start until spring of next year.

Police seek to identify larceny suspects

►One distracts while the other steals from resale shop

The Fenton Police Department is investigating a larceny, which occurred at a resale shop in the 1500 block of North LeRoy Street on Wednesday, May 30.

Police Chief Rick Aro said an officer was sent to the shop around 8:30 a.m. on Thursday, May 31 to investigate the complaint. The owner of the store said at about 5:40 p.m. on Wednesday, two women and a child entered the store and were looking at items.

One of the women asked the owner to walk to the back of the store to ask questions about some golf clubs on display.

Shortly after that, the women and the child exited the store without making a purchase. After they left, the owner realized that a large amount of cash and five

credit cards were missing from her purse. Aro said the one woman most likely distracted the owner so that the other woman could get into the owner's purse.

Aro said the owner has since learned that someone used her credit card to buy five gift cards for a large sum of money from a department store in Burton.

Summary

►Fenton police are investigating a larceny where two female suspects are believed to be responsible for taking a storeowner's credit cards and cash.

Fenton police issued a be-on-the-lookout to other police agencies in the area. Aro said Grand Blanc City police advised Fenton police that they were investigating several similar incidents. The departments are working together to investigate and detectives will be reviewing store surveillance videos to identify a suspect.

The owner of the Fenton store described one suspect as a black female, between 25 and 30 years of age, about 5-feet, 5-inches and about 150 pounds. She described the second suspect as a black female in her 50s, about 5-feet, 9-inches and about 300 pounds. The case remains under investigation.

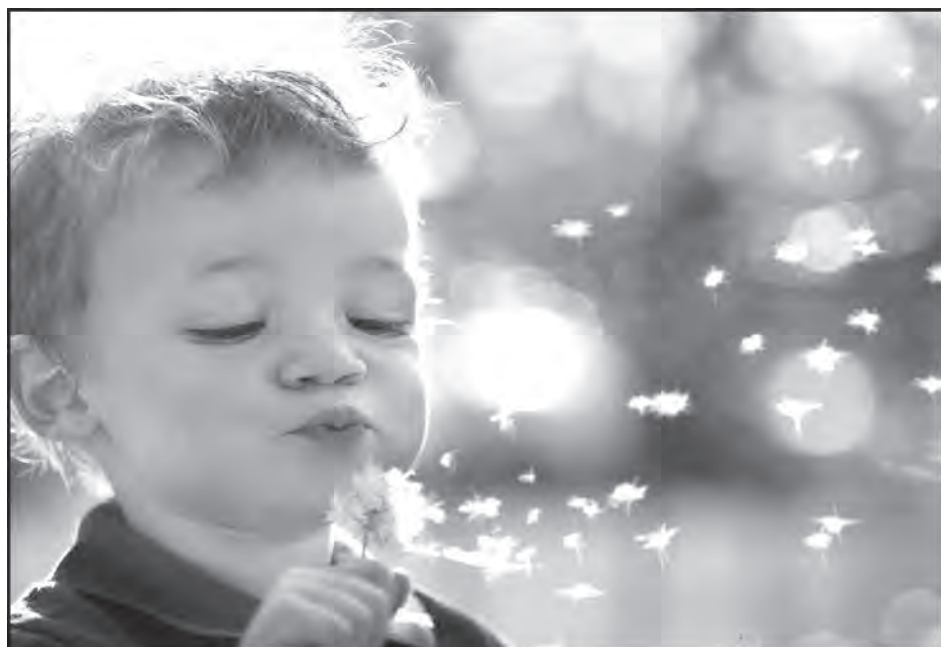

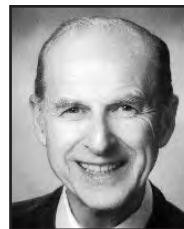

Light for the dark days

When Reinnie Barth was appointed a missionary to Germany, following World War II, he knew he was going to serve in a difficult place during a tough time. But this dedicated man had no idea just how draining his task would be until he arrived and began counseling those whose world had collapsed around them.

Lines of desperate people seeking help began forming early each morning at his door and continued to do so well into the night. Meals were brought to this committed counselor so he wouldn't have to leave his post and could continue his mission of compassion without breaks as long as possible. Finally, the inevitable happened: the one who had come to help found

he needed help. Mental and physical exhaustion pushed this caring man over the edge, causing him to experience a total breakdown.

Years later, sitting in my office, Reinnie described the dark days that followed.

Listening, I could almost feel the fatigue he had experienced during those long hours that had drained his energy and affected his health. Then he shared one of the keys to his recovery. Help had arrived in the form of a quote that met him in his darkness and gave him hope: 'Never question in the dark what God has shown you in the light.'

These 13 words directed to anyone in darkness helped my friend rediscover Biblical faith builders that had been his guiding lights during better days and now he was able to reclaim their stabilizing power for his current crisis. Resting his faith on these life changers of his past gave him peace for the moment and confidence for the future; restoring his emotional, spiritual and physical strength and enabling him to help other struggling ones do the same.

Most of us encounter dark days and facing this fact enables us to see how important it is to embrace the bright days so we can draw strength from them for those when the sun refuses to shine.

Do you feel unloved?

Hurry back to the bright day when you first realized how much God loves you. Think again of the time when you responded to His offer of eternal life (John 3:16).

Do you feel alone?

Revisit the great day when you learned that your Lord promised He would never leave nor forsake you and that nothing could separate you from His love.

Have financial clouds darkened your view of the future, causing you to wonder how you're going to survive your present money crunch?

Remember the feeling of peace that came the day you conquered your financial fears by accepting God's promise to a church of poor but generous believers that He would supply all of their needs out of His abundant supply (Philippians 4:19).

During a dark time in Martin Luther's life, he wrote, 'If I did not see that the Lord kept watch over the ship I should long since have abandoned the helm. Faith conquers fear and makes every dark day bright.

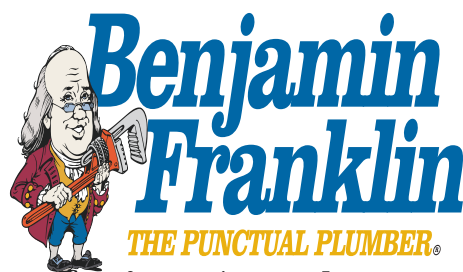

Strawberries nearly two weeks ahead of schedule

► Good news, crop is plentiful

Michigan strawberries are ready to pick this season, and residents who crave these sweet homegrown berries will find them in plentiful supply.

Summary

► This year's Michigan strawberry crop is 10 days to two weeks ahead of schedule, so check with your local markets to see when they'll have berries ready. Spicer Orchards in Hartland has just opened its pick-your-own season for strawberries, and they'll be available in the market, too.

"Our phones have been ringing off the hook," said Will Cartwright, strawberry crop manager at Spicer Orchards in Hartland. "We made a last minute decision this week to start picking this past Wednesday. We wanted to be sure we had plenty

of berries for people who want to come out and pick their own."

The 2012 strawberry crop is about 10 days to two weeks ahead of schedule, according to Cartwright.

"We've got a very good crop this year, with our berry size up," he said. "Timely rains helped us produce a nice, heavy crop."

But the excellent crop

When is strawberry season?

The strawberry season starts in early June and can extend into mid-July. Berrien, Leelanau, and Van Buren are Michigan's largest strawberry-producing counties.

What's in a strawberry?

Strawberries contain 80 percent of the recommended daily allowance of vitamin C. Strawberries are an excellent source of fiber and potassium. There are approximately 50 calories in a cup of fresh strawberries.

at Spicer's this year didn't just happen. March's unseasonably warm weather caused the strawberry plants to start growing early, so Spicer's had to take a proactive stance in order to save the crop from spring frosts. They had to pump water on each of the plants about 20 times during the spring, allowing it to freeze to protect the delicate blossoms. Usually, they only have to do this about five

times a season.

"We had a lot of sleepless nights, but such is the life of a berry farmer," said Cartwright.

The pick-your-own season for strawberries is short. Typically, there are only three or four weeks when the berries in the fields are ripe enough to pick. They'll be available in area markets through June and into the beginning of July.

Many mortgage lenders will want to protect their investment and do so by requiring homeowner's insurance before they will allow a mortgage to be taken out.

Reynolds said that he has seen many people that have bought insurance only because their mortgage requires them to do so, and they are unaware of everything that their policy covers. Without knowing the details of your policy, you are unable

to take full advantage of what it offers.

For Derek Moore of Moore Insurance Agency in Fenton, home insurance is necessary. "Insurance is important so that you don't lose all of your stuff in an emergency, and it covers you from getting sued if someone is injured on your property."

The biggest question that Moore is asked is the difference between the replacement cost and market value.

"The answer would be if you had a house in the city of Flint, you can only sell it for \$10,000. But if you needed to rebuild, it would cost \$80,000. So it needs to be insured at \$80,000, instead of what you can sell it for, or even what you bought it for," Moore said.

Moore said that homeowner's insurance comes in three major categories: dwelling coverage, personal property coverage, and liability coverage.

Dwelling coverage will take care of the actual structure of your home and rebuilding or repairing it in the case that it is damaged.

"Most people think they are buying a homeowner insurance policy for fire," Reynolds said. "We have more wind and water damage than fire anymore, it's important to have that covered."

Personal property covers exactly what it sounds like, all of your belongings that may get destroyed or stolen. Reynolds said that under most homeowner's insurance policies, the contents of a house you have insured are automatically covered for 70 percent of what the house itself is insured for.

"For most people, that's usually more than enough to cover a person at replacement costs," Reynolds said.

Liability coverage is overlooked by many people, according to Reynolds. Liability insurance will cover a homeowner from potential lawsuits that may spring up.

"You are also insuring yourself in case you become liable to damages for anyone else," Moore said.

There are some things that home insurance will not cover, primarily floods and earthquakes, neither of which fall under standard home insurance policies.

"There is coverage for water damage, in case you have a pipe burst in your

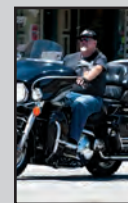

house," Moore said. "Flood is different. If there is a flood, that would go to a national program, unless you have flood insurance."

Insurance companies do sell coverage that protects homeowners if sewer drains back up and overflow. If water hits the ground and finds its way inside a home through a crack though — they will be out of luck.

Flood insurance is available to some people who live on floodplains, though Reynolds said that due to the cost, many people who qualify do not purchase it.

For those who are renting a house, they will want to have an insurance policy that is tailored to their situation as a renter.

"People who are renting houses need to buy what is called a homeowners four policy. It covers you like you own the house but it doesn't cover the structure. It provides coverage for your belongings and liability," Reynolds said.

Regardless of your policy, or if you are a homeowner or just a renter, it is important to understand your policy to make the most for your money.

Errors lead to Devils' district loss to Byron, 11-4

Lake Fenton — The Lake Fenton varsity baseball team did some good things in its Division 3 district opening game against Byron on Tuesday.

The Blue Devils took an early lead, scoring three first-inning runs, for example.

However, errors hurt the team as the Byron Eagles defeated Lake Fenton 11-4 Tuesday at Lake Fenton's home field.

In all, the Blue Devils made five defensive errors, directly attributing to the Eagles' victory.

"We did find we gave up some unearned runs when they were ahead," Lake Fenton coach Hewitt Judson said. "And the inning that they scored five more runs, they were unearned runs. We should've been out of that inning. It's a matter of we didn't make the plays in the field that we needed to. They took advantage, and I give them a lot of credit."

The inning Judson was talking about was the sixth. The Blue Devils trailed just 5-4 entering the top of the sixth, but errors allowed Byron to load the bases with two out. What followed after that put the game out of reach. There was a three-run triple and consecutive RBI-singles as well. The Blue Devils now trailed 10-4, effectively ending their chance of advancing to Saturday's semifinal round.

The game started out well. The Blue Devils took a 3-0 lead in the bottom of the first inning. Neil Allor walked and an out later, Cody Alexander walked as well. Wyatt Wilson reached base and Joe

Boughner answered with a two-run single. Tyler Hammond followed that hit with an RBI-single as well, putting the Blue Devils ahead.

However, Byron cut into the margin getting single runs in the second and third inning, cutting the gap to 3-2. The Blue Devils then made it 4-2 in the fourth on singles by Jim Lyons, Tim Hooks and Wilson.

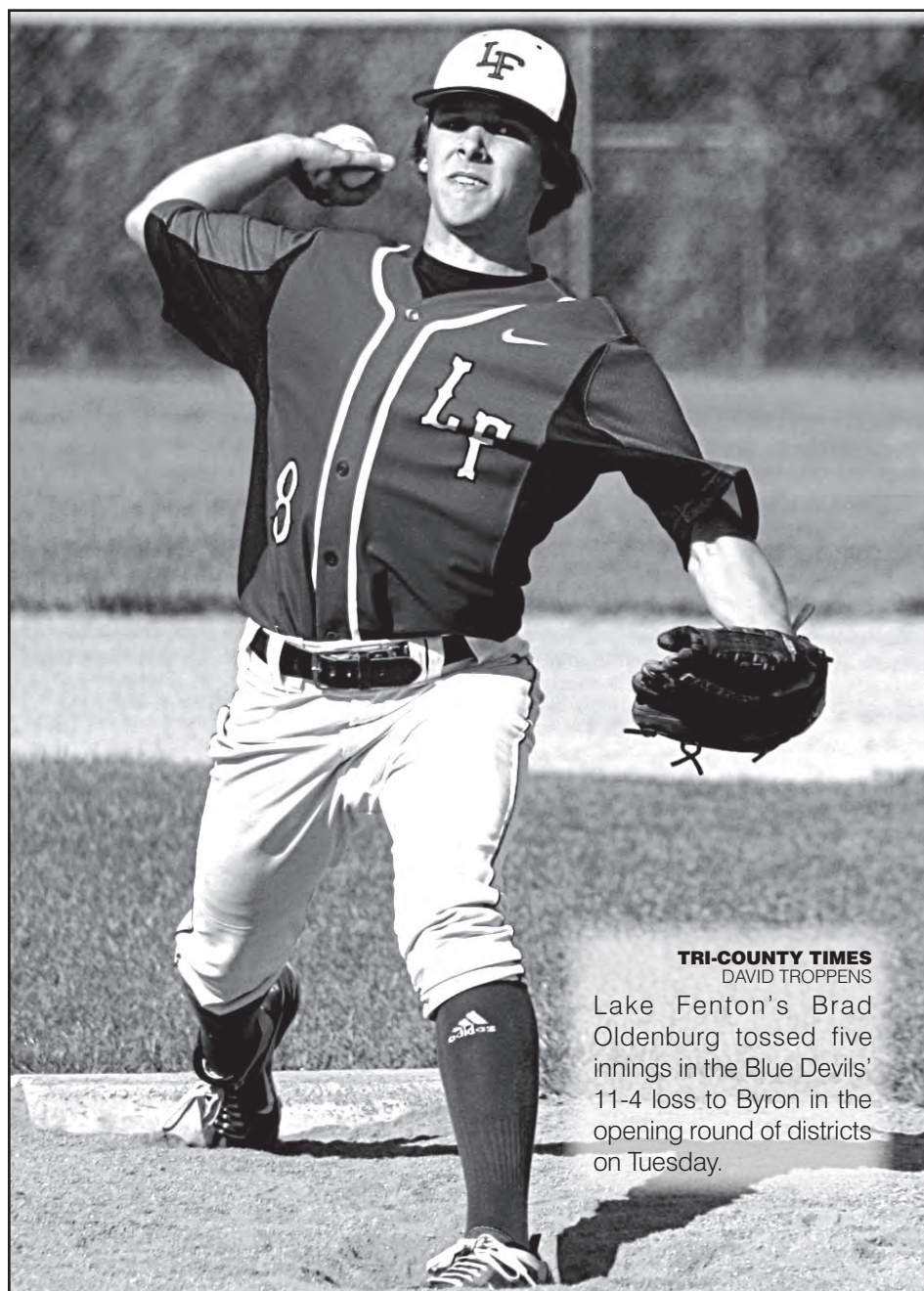
That lead wouldn't last long. Byron scored three runs in the fifth inning, and then blew it open with the five-run sixth. The Eagles added another run in the sixth after a walk, a hit batter and a single allowed a sacrifice fly to plate a run.

On the mound, Byron's Gavin Shepard calmed down after a tough first inning, allowing nine hits in seven innings of work. He walked just one and struck out seven. Brad Oldenburg tossed the first five innings for Lake Fenton (13-18-1) and took the loss despite allowing just two earned runs.

Lake Fenton was paced by Wilson's two hits and a triple by Allor. Sawyer Fultz ended the game with four hits and four RBI for Byron. Hunter Tonti also drove in three runs.

Judson is encouraged about the future. The JV program had a successful season as well.

"We started off the season short on pitching, and we had some kids come through who became pitchers," Judson said. "Now there's a good nucleus of kids coming from the JV that are pitchers. I think things are looking up for Lake Fenton."

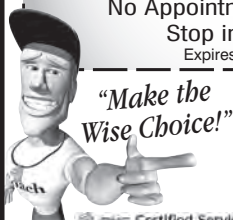

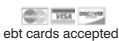

wore blue "Save Holly PD" T-shirts including council member Pauline Kenner.

Council said they have made cuts to every other department in this upcoming budget except Holly police. Recently, the police union agreed to forgo the salary increases for 2012, but did not agree to give back the 2011 wage increase. This left funds that still need to be made up elsewhere, said Walker.

Walker, Police Chief Elena Danishevskaya and Sgt. Michael Story have all agreed to wage concessions for the 2012-13 budget. With the police union members forgoing their 2012-13 raises, and selling three village vehicles, the savings before lay offs amounted to \$93,661, or the equivalent of one police officer.

Walker said they would need part-time personnel to help run dispatch — still leaving around \$25,000 to cut.

Walker said the options were pulling \$25,000 from fund balance, or taking \$11,000 from economic development funds. "That still leaves you about \$14,000 short," he said.

Walker said that if the police union had agreed to concede last year's raises, the budget would be balanced, provided council takes money from economic development.

"We pulled every dollar that we had," said Walker, when combing the budget for savings. He said even \$100 line items

were considered for cuts.

Council member Jackie Campbell is opposed to dipping into the fund balance and wants to see if the police union would reconsider last year's wage increase.

Kenner believes that laying off two officers is going to lead to more overtime for the remaining officers, essentially negating the savings from the lay offs.

Danishevskaya urged the council to use fund balance. "We're just so close to the number, we're almost there," she said. "I would just urge council to use the funds that are available in order to move us forward." She added that she would pursue grants in the future to avoid this problem again.

Though Campbell and Kenner disagreed about fund balance, they both liked the idea of asking for a public safety millage.

Currently the village levies 13 mills, with a ceiling of 21 mills. Walker said 1 mill would bring in about \$100,000 per year. The earliest it could appear before voters would be the November 2012 election; too late to resolve the current budget problems. Walker said he had discussed a millage with Danishevskaya before and he supports the idea.

Council President Jeff Miller even offered to loan the village \$14,000, but knew it was not possible, by law.

Whatever budget they choose, it has to be adopted on June 12. Low property taxes ensure the 2013-14 budget, will also be a challenge.

about \$21,447, and a private college will cost \$42,442.

Fast forward to 2029, 18 years later, and the picture has changed. With inflation, it is expected that a degree from a public school will cost \$41,228 per year, and a private college will cost \$92,869 for a year of education. This is based on expected 5-percent inflation. The numbers are more dismal with 7-percent inflation.

While tuition rose 439 percent between 1982 and 2007, household income only rose 147 percent, according to a News America Foundation article. The same article said that college tuition rates grew at a rate of 6.6 percent — pointing to the darker tuition picture in the future.

John Creasey is a social studies teacher at Holly High School. Under the social studies umbrella, he also teaches economics and personal finance. "We know that the wages have actually gone down, our real wages have dropped," he said. He's doubtful that wage growth will ever reach inflation, meaning that the current disparity between college tuition and household median income will probably not end.

"I think the scariest thing about this tuition is the amount of student debt," said Creasey. He said that college debt is more than consumer credit card debt in the U.S. "Is your job going to be able to pay for your education some day?" he said, though he pointed out that it's almost a necessity to have a college degree in today's economy. There are no longer blue collar assembly line jobs available for high school graduates.

The silver lining to this cloud is that students can figure out how to pay less for college through grants and scholarships. An NPR article illustrated that students could cover more than half their "sticker price" for tuition in both public and private colleges.

An average private school's sticker price for tuition was \$28,500, while the "net" price for tuition was \$12,970 in 2012. Basically, academic performance will always save you, or your child money.

Another clear solution to the issue is putting money away early and often. Websites like collegesavings.org are dedicated to educating parents on Michigan Educational Trust 529 plans.

Rob Phillips of Fenton Township puts money into the Michigan Education Savings Program for his two sons, aged 3 years and 4 months. "It's basically a 529 plan with the ability to write-off all contributions, so there are multiple benefits to doing it," he said in an e-mail.

Phillips automatically contributes in a bi-weekly basis through his employer. "Keep it out of sight and out of mind," he said. He expects to see his 3-month-old's tuition to be around \$120,000 for a public, four-year degree.

"I wouldn't be surprised to see 18 years of savings barely pay for a single semester at a public school," he said.

Derek Musall, 26, has a regular savings account for college that he puts \$100 to \$300 per month, whatever he can afford, for his young children. "I know it's gonna be pricey," he said. Considering a public college could cost upwards of \$40,000 per year at a public school, Musall said, "It's kind of ridiculous if you ask me."

ASK THE MECHANIC

Q: I called for a price to replace my timing belt and the price from one shop to another was very far apart, like over \$200. When I asked the last shop I called why it was so much more, they said that the other shop may not be quoting as complete of a job. The shop manager explained that when doing a timing belt even for maintenance you should use a complete kit with pulleys, tensioner and a water pump where applicable. I called back the first shop and they said I did not need to do all that "other stuff" unless I need it or have the extra money to spend anyway. What should I do?

A: Well, I have been in this situation many times. With something so important to your engine, it is always better to do the most complete job you can afford. Some engines will damage the valves if the timing belt goes bad—then repairs get very expensive. The timing belt has several pulleys it goes around and often drives the water pump as well. If any of these pulleys go bad, the timing belt goes with it every time. I always recommend replacing them when possible. The water pump is the same as a pulley but it can also leak coolant as it ages. Even if the pulley is still turning it would need to be replaced and may require removing the timing belt as well. Installing a new one when doing the belt could save you a lot of extra labor down the road.

Q: When ever I start my gas oven, it comes on with a boom, or whoosh sound. What could cause this?

A: When ever a gas oven control calls for heat it sends voltage to the igniter. As the igniter heats up it creates amperage, or current flow causing the gas valve to open and the gas is ignited! (whoosh) The sound is a result of the igniter becoming weak and allowing the gas valve to open very slowly. This slow release of gas allows a build up until enough has built up to ignite. (BOOM)! You'll need an igniter soon.

make people more likely to only sleep later in the night.

The sleep schedule you are set to can have a meaningful impact on your life, and can affect your job, school and personal life.

"If I am a night owl, and I am a student in high school, I can't initiate sleep until late in the evening. I might only have had six hours of sleep for the night, and I have to function in the morning at school, and it is going to be very difficult," Zureikat said.

On average, a person will require between seven and a half to eight hours of sleep a night. This number can be different for everyone though, as certain people may need a little less or require a little more to function at full capacity.

"If you cannot get enough sleep and you are sleep deprived, that will affect how you function," Zureikat said. Concentration, memory, and cognitive abilities are all hindered when lacking sleep.

When deprived of sleep for too long, your body may begin to start "microsleeping," according to Zureikat.

Microsleeping may last anywhere from less than a second, to half a minute, and can come without warning. Microsleeping can result in dangerous consequences in some cases, such as driving an automobile.

"It's more of the circadian rhythm in your body which controls the timing of sleep," Zureikat said. "There are always things you can do to alter that."

To become less of a night owl, you have to train your body. Exposure to bright light is an indicator for your body when it is time to wake up and when it is time to sleep, and it is one way you can try to change the sleep schedule of your body's internal clock. When you wake up, try and take in as much light as you can, and limit your exposure before you are preparing to go to sleep.

Not everyone may be able to change their body's natural sleeping cycle though — if you are an early bird or a night owl, you may just have to learn to adjust the best you can.

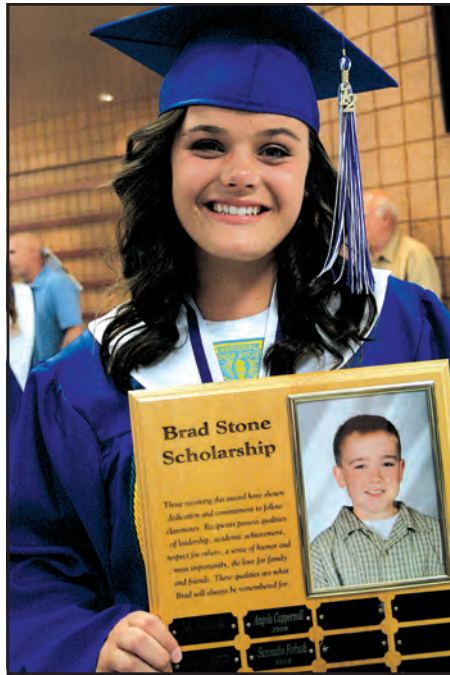

Linden — Hans and Sasha always get excited when it's time for a ride. The pair of German Shepherds wait patiently in the driveway for owners Don and Shannon Turnpaugh Wednesday afternoon.

Sasha wears a pink Harley-Davidson vest and Hans, a black one. Both

have goggles waiting to be pulled down over their eyes.

Don and Shannon both like to ride; they both have Harley-Davidson motorcycles of their own.

Attached to Don's 2003 Harley-Davidson Ultra Classic is a sidecar of matching paint color, built for two people. It's a bigger bike, but not uncommon. What's uncommon are the

two full-sized German Shepherds, Hans and Sasha that hang out in the side car when he rides.

Around four years ago, they had to solve a simple problem — how to take Hans along for a ride? At the time, they didn't have Sasha yet. Enter the side car. "He's been riding with us ever since," said Don. "He loves it." Don said he rides his

bike as often as possible, to work, regularly. When he suits up to ride, his dogs go nuts, expecting a ride.

Hans has been riding along with them for four years, and Sasha for around a year. "She likes the wind, he doesn't," said Shannon. Hans has sensitive ears and prefers to take a nap during rides. Sasha takes in all

the wind with her head above the windshield.

For safety, Don has them harnessed to restrict them from leaving the car. They are also highly trained, and canine "good citizens." They've even taken some shepherding courses. "It's a lot of work, but it's worth it," said Shannon.

Don credits Shannon with their training. On the road, the dogs have vests, goggles and skull caps with ear holes. "It's quite a scene," said Don. Enough so, that people will stop them to take a picture of them. "People are just amazed."

Last weekend, Don took the canine pair through the Dog Bowl parade in Frankenmuth, and will soon take them through the Lake City classic car show.

"It's a different type of freedom," he said. "You see more, hear more, smell more when you're on a bike."

He loves riding on country roads, taking in all the things that being in a car doesn't allow. "You don't hear the animals, you don't hear the nature."

Getting started with a bike

The first step in getting on a bike is taking the mandatory State of Michigan safety course that allows a cycle endorsement to go on your license. "It is well, well worth it," he said. It teaches safety tips, different live scenarios, and defensive riding. "I learned more from that class than any safety class from my work," Don said. "They really teach you about riding."

"There's always the old argument, 'the Honda or the Harley,'" he said. "There's nothing like a Harley." In buying a bike, Don said a lot depends

on what you can afford.

"Get the size that fits you, make sure you can handle the bike," he said. Get one that you are comfortable with. You should be able to stand up, and hold up the weight of the bike. A lot depends on whether you'll be riding hours and hours or just around town.

Don prefers newer bikes that are fuel injected that start right up. Newer bikes have quieter motors. He suggests getting all the necessary gear, which includes gloves, boots, jeans, leather coats and helmet.

Although under certain conditions a rider can now go helmetless in Michigan, Don prefers to keep his helmet on.

Safety

Though riding is fun, Don and Shannon take safety very seriously. Riding season is here, and bikers will be everywhere. Don said, "look twice" at intersections. "It only takes one second."

He said he has been pretty safe and has avoided accidents by being vigilant. He once had a young driver pull out in front of him, and

had to ride in gravel to avoid him. He was saved by the side car, which kept him stable on the loose terrain.

Don is concerned about deer while he's riding and has come within two feet of them, making it necessary for him to apply the brakes.

He also always wears his safety gear. For that reason, he usually avoids taking short rides for errands. He said at that point your mind is on the errand, and not the task of riding defensively. "That's when you'll get into trouble," he said.

Anderson Cooper, Tulane University, 2010: Cooper hilariously reflected on his own lack of memory of his commencement address and poked fun at liberal arts majors: “I, too, was a liberal arts major, so like you, I have no actual skill.” But Cooper also told the seniors how much he admired them for taking the chance on coming back to school in New Orleans after Katrina. “Your choice helped this city rebuild.. re-new...re-start,” he said.

4. Bono, University of Pennsylvania, 2004: U2’s frontman struck the perfect balance between humor — he poked fun at annoying rock stars with causes and fans following him into bathrooms — and raising the call for this generation to end the spread of HIV and extreme poverty in Africa.

5. Wynton Marsalis, Northwestern University, 2009: Marsalis is known for giving music and song-filled commencement speeches. At NYU’s commencement in 2007, he simply got on stage and played his trumpet for almost two minutes. Two years later, in 2009, he briefly spoke to a nearly rained-out crowd at Northwestern University, referencing lessons he’s taken from jazz legends and honestly addressing the realities of life.

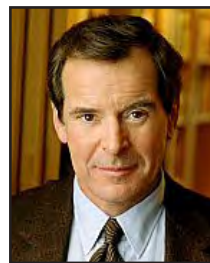

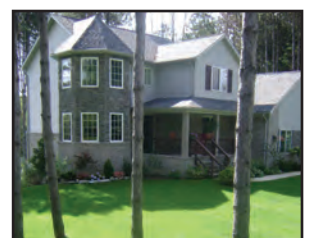
