didate said that in 1962, the beer tax in Michigan was raised to 2 cents per bottle. It was lowered to 1.9 cents per bottle in 1966 and it has remained at that level since.

"For 50 years it has been flat," he said. Since 1966, Michigan has imposed a tax of \$6.30 per 31-gallon barrel of beer, according to Lauve. This equates to about 1.9 cents per 12-ounce can, or \$0.20 per gallon.

As of March 2009, Michigan ranked 28th among the 50 states in its beer tax rate, meaning that 27 states have a higher tax and 22 have a lower tax.

Lauve said alcohol taxes Candidate for 51st district were once in-

tended to keep prices high enough to deter excessive use, however, these taxes have not kept pace with general inflation, and the real price of beer has actually dropped.

His plan is to raise the beer tax to 10 cents per bottle, cut property tax by 2 mills for non-homestead properties, send generated revenue, about \$245 million to the schools and contribute 1 percent toward alcohol treatment and prevention programs. "They're alcoholics, not criminals," he said.

For the second time in two weeks, the Genesee County Health Department advises against swimming (full body contact) at Byram Lake's Clover Beach, due to elevated E. coli bacteria found in the water. E. coli bacteria spiked the week of July 16, with 445 E. coli per 100 ml per sampling and again spiked the week of July 30 with a reading of 387. The readings are not to exceed a state guideline of 300 E. coli per 100 ml per sampling event.

"The blind man who can still see is a very lucky man," Goldstein said of his limited sight. "I remain very positive to this. It's not terminal or painful, it's just something

that needs to be overcome. Having a positive attitude is very important."

Goldstein's vision started to decline when he was 40, shortly before he moved from Flint, where he owned Roberts David Alan clothing store, to work in real estate for John Tremaine in Fenton. Instead of accepting the notion that his lack of vision would hold him back, Goldstein built a loyal clientele through hard work and cultivating a formidable reputation.

Many of Goldstein's clients have become close friends, recommending him to others and even providing transportation during dealings.

"My friendships are all about building bonds and bridges," Goldstein said. "Most of my practice is getting clients and continuing to do business with them. It makes for more than just a 'business relationship.'"

While specializing primarily in land development, Goldstein also deals with high-end residential real estate.

The advancement of technology plays a role in Goldstein's dealings. Before he surveys a property, "kicks the dirt," he researches land on the Internet. With the ability to change fonts and their sizes, Goldstein often does a lot of work from his home.

And, it's not just friendships that have been responsible for Goldstein's success. The real estate agent said he has a good working relationship with local governments and various planning boards. Being on a first name basis makes his job all the more easier.

"My true love is doing vacant land and learning all aspects of buying or selling it," said Goldstein, having experience with pollution issues, environmental studies, easements and title problems. "If you don't do due diligence, you may end up with something that costs you hundreds of dollars."

Realtor John Tremaine is amazed by Goldstein's passion and enthusiasm, despite his disability.

"It's amazing the way he stays positive, putting deals together without using his vision as an excuse," Tremaine said. "He does not let that interfere with his success and progress."

and Brewery, have big plans for their new building. Immediate goals include using bigger equipment for increased production and the sale of ingredients and products for home brewing.

Long-term plans include opening a pub and establishing beer gardens (an open-air location where beer is served) on the fiveacre property located at 1370 North Long Lake Road in Fenton Township. For the Sherrows, acquiring the new property was something that simply came up at the right time.

Summary

Matt and Ginny Sherrow acquired the property located at 1370 North Long Lake Road. Supplies for home brewing and increased wine and beer production are some of the immediate goals for the location.

"We never planned for this, it just happened," Matt said. "We're going to take our time. We're going to do it right."

The current Fenton Winery and Brewery location on North LeRoy Street will remain open and operate as usual.

The Sherrows have also expanded into Holly, having opened a wine tasting loca-

tion in Battle Alley. The Holly location opened up a month ago and has been a great addition for the Sherrows.

"The foot traffic is so good there, it's driven people over to our Fenton location," Matt said. The Holly location is licensed as a wine-tasting location and does not have a bar. However, wine, sangrias, specialty meats and cheeses are sold at the location, serving as another location for marketing.

Further down the road, the Sherrows hope to eventually sell kegs of their beers to local restaurants and bars in the area. Ginny said there are no plans as of yet to distribute bottled beer. That may change however if the two discover there is a high demand for bottled beer and if a distributor is interested in working with them. The two have spoken with some distributors and have described the encounters as "exciting."

"We're thrilled to have a home," Ginny said of acquiring the property. "We're outdoor enthusiasts and beer gardens have been on our priorities list."

The property went up for public auction earlier in June. Officials at the Loose Senior Citizen Center had expressed interest in possibly purchasing the former Creative Wood building but found that the renovations were beyond the organization's budget. According to Fenton Township records, the location was purchased for \$286,908.

Matt said the sale of brewing supplies and equipment should only take a few months to establish, since all that is required is a retail license. For the pub and beer gardens however, Matt expects the process to take at least six months, due to the numerous liquor licenses and compliances that must be met. Renovations within the building will begin soon.

day-by-day. Ask him what he thinks about when

he's looking at his future, and that's what he'll say.

So far, that strategy has served the incoming Linden junior well during the first half of his prep track and field career. Parcher has come amazingly close to earning state championships in his craft, and actually broke a Division 2 state meet record in an event, but had two others do the same just a bit faster than him.

Put a speed detector at Linden High School, and he'll likely make it light up while at the track. That's not shocking considering he's the area's premier prep sprinter.

And, now, despite finishing just his sophomore year, his track exploits have earned him another honor — he's our 2012 Tri-County Male Track Performer of the Year, a title he also earned his freshman season in 2011.

"I don't think about it really," Parcher said when asked about what the next two seasons might have in store for him at Linden. "I just take it day-by-day."

Parcher may have come into his freshman year as a semi-unknown entity to some in the tri-county area, but, of course, that changed really quick when he started posting the best times in the Flint area in the 100 and the 200. Since then, he's an established prep star. And it seems like he's taken it well in stride.

"I just try to stay being focused on being myself and being faster," Parcher said. "That's all you can do."

He was faster in 2012. After posting a time of 10.8 seconds in the 100, earning second at the state meet, and a time of 21.8 seconds in the 200 during his freshman season, he got even faster in 2012. He capped the season by posting a FAT time of 10.67 seconds in the 100, once again earning a state runner-up finish. Meanwhile, his FAT time of 21.64 seconds in the 200 broke a state meet record, but he finished "just" third since two others also broke it with better times.

He also helped lead the 400 relay team of himself, Connor O'Connell, Kevin Baker and Austin Buerkel to a fourth-place team finish at the state meet with a school record time of 43.4 seconds.

"I thought he did phenomenal," Linden varsity boys track and field coach Nick Douglass said. "He worked hard all year, and I think that is evidenced by the success he had at the end of the year. Fortunately, he got through the season relatively healthy. He may have been fatigued at times, but he was physically healthy and that was the key to his success.'

Douglass also saw some progress in Parcher's season in another way. Mentally, he's maturing into being a smarter sprinter, something that only comes with experience.

"Physically he matured but he also matured mentally," Douglass said. "During his freshman year, he'd go out in the prelims and semifinals and beat the door down to beat everyone. But this year, he ran more strategic, and that helped him advancing through the rounds in the 100 and the 200 at the state level."

# LOTS OF FREE FOOD IS ONE OF MY BEST OLYMPIC MEMORIES

When people my age think of great Summer Olympic moments, a lot of images come into their minds. Many involving the vault come to mind quickly. First, there was Nadia Comaneci earning the first 10 on the vault in Montreal in 1976. I'd be lying if I said I really remember the performance, but as I grew up, I remember hearing a lot about it.

I do remember Mary Lou Retton's 10 on the vault in 1984. She earned the gold medal in the all-around in Los Angeles. Finally, there was Kerri Strug, who helped lead the U.S. women to an all-around gold medal in Atlanta in 1996 after performing the vault on a bad ankle injury.

There have been plenty of others that I could detail, but that's a pretty good start right there. But while all three of these performances were outstanding, I have to say, none of them amount to what really was my top Summer Olympic memory — and that memory is a lot of Big Macs, french fries and soft drinks.

I was 15 during the 1984 Summer Olympics. At the time our family lived about two miles away from Lakeside Mall, a place we'd ride our bikes to frequently when I wasn't working at the good ol' party store that gave me my needed financial resources to buy whatever teenagers feel important on that given day. I worked, about 30plus hour weeks at the party store, so I always had money to go to the ol' mall to get an album (or more likely a cassette at that time), some magazines, some silly sports glass or some other piece of memorabilia at the mall. And with the urgent feeling most teens felt, it's a given we were going to the mall quite frequently.

In 1984, McDonald's started a game campaign surrounding the summer games. The slogan was, "When the U.S. wins, you win." And, it was accurately stated. Essentially, anytime you purchased certain items at Mc-Donald's you received a game piece with a certain Olympic event listed on it. If the U.S. won a gold medal, you won a Big Mac. If the U.S. won the silver it was fries. And if the U.S. won the bronze, you won a drink. And because it was the year of the Eastern Block boycott (meaning countries like the Soviet Union and East Germany weren't participating), the games in Los Angeles became a U.S. free-for-all of medal victories.

Needless to say, there was a Mc-Donald's next to that mall we went to, and we frequented it, well, frequently. We'd get our game pieces, and they were also very generous with giving out free game pieces as well. When the games happened, the U.S. won 83 golds, 61 silvers and 30 bronzes. There were track events in which the U.S. won all three events, giving you, essentially, a free meal. But, the best part was, once you redeemed your winners, you received even more game pieces, which usually gave you more winners.

Shooting National Shotgun Championships, winning the junior class of the women's track competition. Danhausen is pretty excited about having the new equipment.

"I actually got a brand new gun this winter because I wore the other one out," Danhausen, 19, said. "It wasn't shooting properly because it was shooting too many rounds, more than it was built for. This one fits a lot better. When I went down to Ohio, it took me about 200 rounds a day to get used to the brand new gun. That's all I did. I kept going to Columbus, practicing with the new gun and my scores kept going up.

"It probably took about 1,000 rounds to get used to this gun."

Her scores certainly went up during the women's trap competition. Danhausen actually qualified to compete in the 2012 Olympic Team Shotgun Trials, held in Arizona, hitting 185 targets out of the 250 she was presented during the event.

Along with her 181 she hit in an earlier event in Texas, she finished the competition with 366 targets hit out of 500.

"That was one of my highest scores for a national event. I was very pleased with it," Danhausen said. "But I don't like the desert, though (the event was in Arizona). The desert is so dry, you feel like a little raisin out there. And it can affect your eyesight. If you don't drink water, then your scores will go down."

Danhausen didn't stop there. She only performed better at the 2012 USA Shooting National Shotgun Championships earning the gold medal in the junior girls trap competition with a total of 232 targets hit out of 275 for the competition.

Danhausen started the national event by hitting 21, 21 and then 22 targets out of 25

in each set, resulting in 64 hit targets out of 75 after the first day. During the second day, she hit 21 and 19, giving her 104 targets hit out of 125 for the two days. She got stronger during the final two days. She hit 65 of 75 on the third day and then hit 63-of-75 on the final day, earning the junior national championship.

"I had no idea where I was. I was just shooting," Danhausen said. "I find it better not to know what is going on. It gets in your mind and messes with you. I did not know I was in the running for the finals until I finished."

The new gun apparently made a difference. After hitting 185 targets out of 250 at the trials, she had a total of 211 targets

#### selves during that summer. And, as

noticed. "Everyone asked about my training and how on earth I got so good," Danhausen said. "You don't see people shooting 185 to 211 only two months apart. Everyone was surprised. I scared myself, to tell you the truth."

While competing in collegiate competitions, Danhausen finds herself under a different format of shooting. In the two competitions detailed previously, she competed on what is known as an international trap or a bunker trap. It has 15 trap machines that will create target flights that vary tremendously at 65 miles an hour. These bunkers are limited, the reason why Danhausen finds herself going to Ohio for training frequently. There are no international traps in Michigan.

However, the school season uses American traps, which have just one trap. They target flights are much more consistent and the speed of the clay pigeons is only 45 mph. While she still is somewhere in the middle in terms of talent on the team right now, Danhausen continues to improve.

"It helps because you get that friendly competition," Danhausen said. "When I go to Ohio, I don't always have that competition. But (at school) you can go out and try to beat each other."

Danhausen can compete at the junior level until she turns 21. Then she will have to continue in the open divisions. She plans on working hard on her shooting.

"I'd really like to see how far I can go with this," Danhausen said. "I'd love to go to a World Cup, go to a different country and shoot on a world Cup team. I can do that on a National Junior team, but I also can make it on a national team.

"I'm not very far. I have the ability to be on the national team. I just have to practice a little more. You have to work on it, just like everyone else does."

must've not understood that the U.S. would end up with almost as many golds in 1984 as they had medals in 1976.

But we didn't care about McDonald's misfortunes. We had what was a pretty limitless supply of free food — and we used them all. It got to the point, if you had a game piece for something like U.S. basketball, you got upset. You certainly felt like you were going to win something, but you realized you'd only have one winner on the card. Yeah, we got that spoiled.

But, without a shadow of a doubt, that was my greatest Olympic memory the McDonald's medal game.

Parcher did that. During his freshman year, Parcher ran a 10.81 in the semifinals and then posted a 10.8 in the final at the state meet. This year, he went from a 10.93 in the prelim, to a 10.8 in the semifinal, and then a 10.67 in the final, losing only to his summer teammate and Auburn Hills Avondale's Kyle Redwine (10.53).

"I thought running a 10.67 was awesome," Parcher said. "I hadn't run a 10.8 since the state meet (his freshman year). All of the competitors pushed me hard to run my best time. I was glad I got to go faster at the state meet."

To some, Redwine came "out of nowhere" to win the 100 since he wasn't in the event a year ago. However, injuries and bad luck had plagued him in the past, and Parcher knew about his speed.

"He happened to get beat, but he ran the race of his life against Kyle," Douglass said.

"At the beginning of the year if you told me he'd run a 10.67 FAT I'd be thrilled. Kyle was great. Ted was ahead at 80 yards, tied at 85 and a stride back at 90. I didn't think that was even possible. That kid was legit, but Ted ran a 10.67 and that's flying."

Douglass also sees Parcher being more mature about how he approaches a season. And it's also true about Douglass himself as he matures as a coach.

"We did not go into this season thinking the 100 was his to win or lose. He knew he was going to have to work hard just to have a chance to accomplish his goals," Douglass said.

"He knew Kyle was running successful times and there were others. The point is Ted knows he can control only what is in his control. Goals are relative to the conditions you run in and relative to your competitors.

"Some place, somewhere, there's probably always going to be someone who is faster. And if that guy is not on the track with him, Ted wins. If he is, he might not. It's hard for a teenager to maintain that focus all the time, but Ted has done a great job with it."

Parcher's work ethic remains high.

After a successful freshman year, he continued to push himself by running in a variety of summer track meets. Parcher has continued to do that this summer as well. In fact, he recently competed at the 2012 USA Track and Field Junior Olympic Championships at Morgan State University, in Maryland, earning ninth in the preliminary round of the 100 dash with a time of 10.77. He followed that with a ninth-place time in the semifinals of 10.69, nearly the time he posted to take second at the state meet in 2012.

He also competed at the Michigan regional of the Junior Olympics earlier this summer, winning with a time of 10.89 seconds. His 400 relay team also earned a second-place finish with a time of 43.0 seconds.

With half of his prep career left, who knows what Parcher will accomplish. Like he said, he'll "take it one day at a time."

"You can't get caught up in place and time, but the key is he has to stay healthy." Douglass said. "I know his goals, and if he stays healthy he'll have a chance to accomplish them. But, again his goals are relative to the conditions and the people you run against."



I own a 1999 Plymouth Voyager. Last week the fuel gauge was reading empty with the low fuel light on. I know the tank was not empty as I had just filled it. Then it was fine. Today the low fuel light began lighting up and going off along with the wonderful dinging noise. Also the fuel gauge kept fluctuating between 3/4 which it is and empty. Any ideas? - Tony

Tony, in this case I suspect that you have a bad fuel sending unit, but you will want to test it before replacement. To test, you will need a wiring diagram and an ohm meter. The pump and level sender are located in the fuel tank, so you will want to do this when the tank is below 1/4 of a tank so that it is not so heavy when taking out. After removal of the pump and sending unit, you need to hold it steady and have a partner watch the ohm meter while you sweep the sender from full to empty slowly and watch the reading. It should change at a slow pace and not drop out which is what I suspect that you will see when it gets near 3/4 of a tank or so. If it does, then you will need to call the dealer if you only want to replace the sender, but pay attention to the cost because this sending unit also comes with the fuel pump when you replace it. It may be in your best interest to just replace the pump assembly Check Car-Quest for a Delphi fuel pump, that is what we prefer to use, they seem to have the least problems in my opinion

their non-profit organization, Wild Oat Animal Rescue, Inc. These raccoons have already graduated from being bottle fed, to eating puppy chow. Soon, they'll be moved, and switched to fruit, frogs, eggs and anything else they would encounter on their own, before being released into the wild.

"I'm their mommy so they're fine with me," said Allen as she let them grab her finger with their dexterous paws through the enclosure bars. "When I release them, they won't like me anymore."

She doesn't get attached to them, she's never sad when releasing them back into the wild. "That's the good, that's the awesome part," she said. Allen is sad, however, when an injured animal does not make it. Deer and raccoons are both incrementally introduced to the wild.

Allen spends about an hour feeding the veritable wild menagerie every morning.

As she gathers feed for the deer, Romeo, a Nigerian dwarf goat sneaks mouthfuls for himself from her pail. "You're fat enough," she said, scolding the grey and black goat, who followed her around the farm like a dog.

Romeo is one of 50 or so rescued animals that include horses, deer,

raccoons, rabbits, a peacock, and a fox that hides from view.

The property is 23 acres, and nestled therein are three big pastures, two big pens, three larger enclosures, and a smaller one up front for baby raccoons.

Scott hand-built all of these, and included posts given from Deer Park in Grand Blanc as it was closed down.

Allen said there they have five habitats, including wetlands, woods and grasslands.

It all started with taking care of a baby raccoon and a kitten, and it grew from there. Just this week she took in an injured opossum, and they often respond to 911 calls for injured wildlife, and receive many animals from the Department of Natural Resources (DNR).

She is licensed through the DNR for wildlife rehabilitation, and the DNR has inspected the enclosures and pens. The couple has to fill out a lot of paperwork, and take continuing education classes.

Every year for 13 years this cycle of nursing baby deer, raccoons and rabbits in the spring, and administering pet vaccinations for four months continues its dizzying path for the couple.

The work can range from eight hours per day, to four, to almost nothing in December. "December would be perfect without the holidays," she said. Through all of this, the couple has paid for their expenses out of pocket. "It's just us," she said. Now, this 501(c) 3 non-profit is in trouble.

The Allens purchased 12.5 acres behind their property in 2004 to expand

their animal rescue operations, and having fallen behind in payments, they are in danger of losing those essential 12.5 acres if the bank forecloses. "If they do, we can't do this anymore," she said. Their hearing is Aug. 15, to lift

the stay of the land. They need \$48,000 by then,

or the land can be repossessed. "All of this that you see, that bank can take back," she said. Efforts are well underway to raise the money. Wild Oat Animal Rescue, Inc. has a Facebook page with almost 1,000 fans, and a companion petition page to help keep the acres open.

Even if they raise the money needed in time, they will probably need funds continuously. They've been holding auctions on Facebook for items including jewelry and even saddles.

For a fee, people can sponsor, and name an animal. Romeo was named Luke before he was snatched up. All

the baby raccoons need sponsorship, she said. Through the stress of the possible

repossession, and the sheer workload, Allen finds the daily chores therapeutic. "You can come out here and listen to the sounds. I have peace out here," she said looking over her pens, with a group of baby deer nearby. "It's a stress reliever."

# Dogs can hear 40 times better than humans

The shape of a dog's ears doesn't affect the frequency that the dog can hear, but does affect the acuteness or sensitivity of the dog's hearing. The range of hearing is approximately 40 Hz to 60 kHz,[6] which is much greater than that of humans. Dogs with flaps over their ears, like Bloodhounds, Basset Hounds and Poodles don't hear as well as dogs with prick ears, ears that stand up straight, like those of German Shepherds or Pomeranians. When dogs hear a sound, they will move their ears towards it in order to maximize reception. In order to achieve this, the ears of a dog are controlled by at least 18 muscles allowing the ears to tilt and rotate.

#### **DOGS GET HIGH OFF EAR RUBS**

Has your dog ever fallen into a trance, or into a light sleep, while having her ears rubbed? The nerve impulses sent through the hypothalamus and pituitary glands actually secrete endorphins — the same pain-killing, feel-good hormones humans release during exercise, for example — that make your four-legged companion feel relaxed, mellow and very happy.

When you rub your dog's ears, she's essentially getting high on her own hormones, says Dr. Allen Schoen, director of the Center for the Advancement of Veterinary Alternative Therapies.
