# Orchards adapt to keep doors open

Apples from other areas will replace lost crops

drought are keeping the apples at bay.

The Michigan Department of Agriculture and Rural Development estimates that up to 90 percent of Michigan's apple crop might have been lost this year due to unfavorable weather conditions. This includes the warm period earlier this spring that caused apples to start growing early only to be killed off by the freeze as the temperature dipped back down.

# Linden man rescues 12-year-old boy from Lake Michigan riptide

"They were bobbing up on the waves, calling out in defeated voices."

news@tctimes.com; 810-433-6823 Israel Thatcher, 21, of Linden, said that he wasn't thinking about the 5-foot waves rolling onshore of Van's Beach in Leland Township, or the riptide that had pulled out 12-year-old Patrick Corrigan and his father, John in early August. He wasn't thinking about the strong currents or wind. Thatcher simply heard calls for help and responded.

"The cries went over my head at first but I heard it again and saw a middle aged guy and a boy," Thatcher said. "They were bobbing up on the waves, calling out in defeated voices."

Thatcher swam out to the boy, realizing relayed th how difficult the rescue was going to be. **"They probably** 

"I was already exhausted, and the boy kept grabbing around my neck," Thatcher said. "A wave crashed right on top of me. When I got done rolling around in the wave I felt my feet hit the sand." The boy's father was helped onshore by another rescuer, and met his son when Thatcher brought him in.

"It was an emotional time for them," Thatcher said. "Handshakes and tears were exchanged. It was a beautiful feeling that everyone made it back safe. Almost indescribable."

Thatcher, who was visiting his grandparents on the day of the rescue, said he has had no training that would have helped him in the rescue. It was simple luck.

Soon after the incident, Thatcher's grandparents, Steve and Sally Miklos of Leland, received a visit from the man that Thatcher had helped to rescue.

"The man biked up to my grandparents house and told them how he felt, it gave me goose bumps when my grandparents relayed the message to me," Thatcher said.

"He also wrote a letter."

The letter stated, "My name is John Corrigan. I believe your grandson rescued my son at Vans Beach yesterday. He saved our lives and I'm not sure how to thank him but want to try. John."

The officer followed as the car turned east onto Silver Lake Road. It continued east until the driver lost control of the car and

struck a utility pole near Lincoln Street. Police closed Silver Lake Road for about an hour while officers completed their investigation and Consumers Power cleared downed electrical wires.

The 20-year-old male driver from Argentine Township and male passengers ages 19 and 20 were transported to the hospital. The leg of the 20-year-old passenger was broken during the crash and he underwent surgery at the hospital. The driver and 19-year-old passenger have been released from the hospital.

Lt. Jason Slater said alcohol is believed to be a factor in the crash. He said that the police department will be seeking an arrest warrant on the driver, who has a prior operating while intoxicated (OWI) conviction. Slater said OWI, causing serious injury is a five-year felony. Fenton police will also be working with Livingston County to see if this car was involved with the reported lawn damage in Tyrone Township.

#### BUSINESS OWNER WARNS OF SCAM

The UPS Store in Fenton is advising area residents to be aware of fraudulent e-mail scams that have been recently circulating the Internet. Les Beare, the owner of the Fenton store said that he has had a rash of calls from concerned customers about an e-mail they received. Beare has been warning his customers not to click on any of the links and to delete the e-mail immediately. "A good practice is to hover (but do not click) over a suspicious link," said Beare. "It will display the Internet site connected to the link. If it doesn't say www.ups.com or https://epackage1.ups.com, do not click on it." UPS does not request payments, personal information, financial information, account numbers, IDs, passwords, or copies of invoices in an unsolicited manner through e-mail, mail, phone, or fax or specifically in exchange for the transportation of goods or services. Beare said that other carriers such as FedEx and the USPS (post office) are also experiencing a higher volume of these attacks.

#### INTOXICATED MAN THREATENS COPS

Just before 2 a.m. on Friday, Aug. 31, Fenton police responded to the 1000 block of North Road to investigate a report of a disorderly man. When police arrived, they observed a male standing in the eastbound lane of North Road. He could be heard yelling and swearing and threatening to assault the officers if they approached. Officers detected the odor of intoxicants coming from the man. The man told police he had been at a bar and people were taunting him and he was in the street to confront those people. The 38-year-old Fenton man was taken into custody and a preliminary breath test came back as .18 percent blood alcohol content. He was lodged at the police station and released Friday, when sober. He has an Oct. 1 court date for disorderly intoxication and for verbally threatening officers.

#### WOMAN REPORTS

**BREAK-IN ON SWANEE BEACH** On Aug. 30, a 55-year-old Fenton woman reported to Fenton police that while she was out of town in late July, someone entered her home, in the 14000 block of Swanee Beach Drive through an unlocked window. Sue McEwen and her husband, of Argentine Township, are stewards of the nature sanctuary and are hoping that nearby residents and other community members will be more observant and report any suspicious activity.

of Holly on Cogshall Street, which has a railroad crossing. The community, just south of the village limits, is somewhat of a triangular peninsula as it is bordered by two sets of merging railroad tracks and marshland.

Another NOCFA fire truck en route on Cogshall Street reported to dispatch that a train was passing and they had to stop at the tracks at 3:54 a.m. This fire truck arrived on scene at 3:57 a.m., or three minutes later, according to Lintz. "It was bad timing," he said.

Johnson has expressed concern that the only entrance into that entire subdivision is Cogshall Street, which runs through both Rose Township and Holly Village. She fears time can be wasted as emergency responders wait at the railroad crossing for a passing train. The department responds to an average of two structure fires per year in this subdivision.

Lintz said his department rarely has to stop at the train crossing, but it does happen. He said, that many years ago, it was much worse, when trains often stopped in this area. NOCFA expressed concern and trains no longer stop.

In this most recent fire, Lintz does not

believe the second rig having to wait at the train tracks made a difference in the man's death. He said the victim's brother, who had been sleeping in the living room and escaped, tried for several minutes to get his brother out, by running around to the other side of the home and pounding on his bedroom

window. There was no phone in the home and he did not have a cell phone.

Lintz said NOCFA and state police believe a lit candle in the living room where the 62-year-old man was sleeping sparked the fire.

After several minutes of pounding on the bedroom window, the next-door neighbor awakened, came out to investigate and called 911, said Lintz.

Lintz wishes there were another entrance to the subdivision, but believes there is

no place to put one, short of building a bridge over a section of railroad tracks. "There's no other physical access other than a bridge," he said. "It was poor planning." He believes the subdivision was built in the early 1970s.

The fire chief said he will be addressing the Rose Township Board of Trustees at its next meeting asking for its assistance in enforcing safety codes in this subdivision. He said the low-income subdivision is a mix of mobile homes, manufactured homes and traditional homes. Many of the mobile homes are 30 or more years old and not in very good condition.

Lintz' focus is to have all of these homes brought up to code.

Richard and his brother Michael were sleeping in the trailer that belonged to Johnson, and the power had been off for a year. She said an issue with identity theft led to an exorbitant bill she couldn't pay.

Johnson and her daughters have kept vigil over the site and she has slept in a tent to protect the space from looters.

"Saturday, I was talking to the church, I was at the funeral home, I was at Great Lakes cemetery, trying to make arrangements, and I come back and all the copper water pipes are gone," she said. "We have to take all the metal, the copper, everything, to bury my husband, I have nothing. This is what we have."

Her husband didn't carry life insurance, and a friend suggested they scrap the trailer to give him a proper burial.

As the family sat and talked amongst themselves, volunteers dragged charred aluminum from the

pile, and loaded it onto trucks. One of the volunteers was neighbor John Austin. "It's been pretty rough on us all, I've known him for about six years," he said. Austin was there when the fire happened, and called 911.

Richard's body still hasn't been positively identified, but Johnson

hopes a set of false teeth she found in the remains of the trailer might put the issue to rest, and then maybe they can put him to rest too.

Brother Michael was in the trailer during the fire. He escaped and tried to rouse his brother to get him out. On Thursday, he sat in a lawn chair, smoking Newports, gazing over what was left of the trailer. He admitted he was only still there because the Times was there. "I don't stick around very much," he said. "I don't like being here. I kind of watched my brother die."

Johnson said, "He was trying to get my husband out, (Richard) was saying, 'It's hot in here."

According to North Oakland County Fire Authority (NOCFA) records, fire fighters arrived on scene around three minutes after they received the 911 call. Patricia was behind a second fire unit, but she had to wait three minutes until the train passed. The train was blocking the only entrance to the park.

"That's been a fight we've all had in here," she said. According to Johnson, the park is contractually obligated to provide two entrances, but now, the neighborhood is hemmed in by train tracks and marshland. NOCFA chief Jeremy Lintz was first

# Linden moves to 2-0, defeats Bronchos 37-14

▶ Eagles dominate both sides of the ball after slow start vs. Holly

Two weeks into the Linden varsity football season, he's proven that pretty effectively.

Brown completed passes to eight different Linden Eagles' receivers, completing 33-for-43 passes for 370 yards in Linden's 37-14 Metro League victory against the Holly Bronchos at Claude Cranston Field Thursday night.

"The thing is we have five receivers, including the running back, and everyone is an athlete," Brown said. "So when you try to go man, we just go over them. We just spread it out. They can't double-team and they can't zone. Our receivers are too athletic and too smart to stop. Whoever is open, I'll get it to them.'

And after a slow start for the Eagles on all sides of the ball - Linden trailed 14-0 with 5:16 left in the first quarter — it seemed there was no stopping the squad.

Linden tied the contest up at 14-

all before halftime. After the offense was stopped at its own 9 on its first possession, Linden drove 70 yards on 11 plays on its second possession, cutting the gap in half. Brown completed 6-of-8 passes for 62 yards and to five different receivers during the drive, eventually scoring on Brown's one-yard TD run around the left side. Cameron Cook made the first of his three extra points, cutting the Holly lead to 14-7 with 1:34 left in the first quarter.

After allowing a 95-yard TD run by Evin Papuga on Holly's second play from scrimmage during the contest, giving the Bronchos a 14-0 lead with 6:12 left in the first quarter, the Eagles' defense got stingy the rest of the game, allowing just six first downs. Three of those came on an uneventful fourth-quarter possession that ended in an interception by Linden's Garrett Beaudry. Holly ran just 31 plays for 220 yards, but only had 122 yards after the Bronchos' first two plays from scrimmage.

"It's a pattern we've been in. We've been dry and been sitting under a lot of high pressure," Schultz said. "The sun comes out and being so dry helps heat things up too."

Schultz said there have been 20 days in Michigan this summer when the weather was 90 degrees or higher. The state has experienced some relief in mid August with some rain. Temperatures began to soar again however at the end of the month, reaching above 90 degrees again. The drought has been so bad this year

that the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) has declared all of Michigan to be natural disaster area. The drought started this spring and has con-Farmers all around the country have have struggled with the

heat, causing produce and meat prices to increase. "The drought has affected the market big time," said Jody Brunori, executive chef at The

Laundry, in Fenton.

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deeper in the Great Lakes in order to reach cooler temperatures, forcing fishermen to work harder and catch less. And though summer months are generally tough on restaurants, this summer has

been somewhat more brutal. "It came really early, that's the downfall," Brunori said. "The duration of it has been a hardship. Lettuce has been shady this year, the strawberries have not been that great and the tomatoes are taking forever to ripen on the vine.'

Brian Haaraoja, senior vice president of VG's Grocery said corn and cherries have been hit especially hard in the state. Corn ears are smaller this year, stressed from less than ideal conditions. The past warm winter followed by a cold snap in the spring has left most of the state fruitless this year. VG's Grocery was forced to order produce and meat from around the country this year instead of getting products from in-state farmers.

"Local produce has been very difficult to come by, it has been a tough year," Haaraoja said. "The heat has been tough on regions that produce beef, too."

Haaraoja said it's not certain but the strain on farmers could translate into potentially higher beef and produce prices down the road.

For now, Haaraoja said VG's Grocery has been promoting produce that has been growing well this year, such as peaches and nectarines from California.

Brunori said The Laundry and the restaurant business won't be crippled by this year's lack of produce, but it will affect the bottom line.

"We have to eat it, for a lack of better words," Brunori said.

# Meet Carla Feamster

# Police officer, actress, cancer survivor

Fenton police officer Carla Feamster, 36, has had some challenging and gratifying experiences during her 13 years with the Fenton Police Department. She also shares her love of theatre and retells how she became the officer she is today.

### When did you first realize you wanted to be a police officer?

wanted to be a police officer? My senior year in high school. I initially wanted to go into the Marine Corps because my dad was in it. But in my senior year, I was diagnosed with cancer, so I couldn't join the military. They wanted me to wait two years, but I had just graduated and did not want to sit around. I talked to my school counselor and she said I should go to Ferris State and get an associate's degree in criminal justice so I could be a military police officer in the Marine Corps. I really liked what I was learning about at Ferris, so I got my bachelor's in criminal justice and wound up here. I'm from Clarkston, and I sent a lot of resumes out, through a phone book, of all the police departments. I landed on 'F', and I got the job here.

## What is a day like for you as a police officer?

We don't have anything mandatory that we do. I come in and check my e-mail or voicemail to see if anyone needs my attention immediately. Sometimes people will request to speak with me, or if I am working on their case. I try to drive through the neighborhoods. I do a little traffic, but that's not my big thing.

# What are your likes and dislikes about being a police officer here?

I like that there is something different every day. What I do can have a huge impact on people that I work with and for, and the community in general. With that huge responsibility comes that huge gratification that I'm doing some sort of good. People will come up to me, even in a bad situation, and say that I really helped them. That's the satisfying part. Things that I don't

like — my job can be significantly stressful. Each individual has their own problems. When I come to work, I have to try to put my personal difficulties aside and problem solve for everyone around me. You've got so many people with so many emotions to help. I have to purge what I just came from and focus on the next challenge.

## What is your most memorable event being on the force?

I have had some sexual assault victims who have come back and told me how influential and how much I helped them to get through their situation. Even drunk drivers I have arrested some have come back just to say thank you for arresting them. You would think that's odd, but they realize that they were on a path to killing themselves or someone else.

#### Do you have any hobbies or interests outside of being involved with the police department?

Oddly enough, I'm very involved with local theatre. I'm in a show right now with the Fenton Village Players, "Escanaba in Love." I'm the only female in the cast. I coach cheerleading when asked. Recently I coached basketball for sixth grade at St. Johns.

#### How did you meet your husband?

I met my husband here at the FPD. He was my training officer. We were both single at the time, and started out as friends. Our beliefs matched, so we ended up together.

pleasant days of September and October," said Jennifer Tremaine, 50, who spent her childhood summers with her parents Duncan and Mary Ann on Case's Island, including three, year 'round.

Once the dock is out for the season, then the summer is done. We were able to stay longer because we had a furnace," she recalled. "Now I believe there's one other cottage out there with heat." DEAR DR. DONOHUE: My 88-year-old relative has high blood pressure and atrial fibrillation, both of which are well-controlled by medication. She is mentally sharp but has developed arthritis in various joints. She's been told that she can't take any medicine for pain because it would interfere with her medicines for blood pressure and atrial fib. I know she could have a better quality of life with less pain. Is there something she can take? — **A**.H.

ANSWER: I have to presume your relative has osteoarthritis, the kind of arthritis almost all older people develop. Cushioning cartilage in joints crumbles and eventually becomes functionless. Bone rubs against bone, and that is painful and stiffens joints.

Your relative ought to try heat in the form of hot baths, hot packs or heating pads. Heat lessens joint pain. If heat doesn't do the trick for her, she should try ice packs. Heat can be left on a joint for 15 minutes; ice for 10

If she has hip, knee or foot arthritis, padded shoes or padded shoe inserts lessen the force generated in leg joints when the foot hits the ground.

An exercise program supervised by a physical therapist will strengthen muscles around the affected joints, provide them protection and give the joints a greater range of motion.

Occupational therapists devise splints or braces that protect joints and mitigate pain. They also can suggest devices that make the tasks of daily living much less troublesome

Has she tried anti-inflammatory medicines applied to the skin directly over an affected joint? Pennsaid lotion is one example. Some of the medicine does get into the blood, so she'll need to have her doctor's approval for it. It is a prescription medicine. The amount of medicine that gets into the blood is less than the amount she'd get from an oral medicine, yet a sufficient amount reaches the joint.

**DEAR MOM:** The things you mention probably wouldn't worry me in the slightest, but I'm not the mom. You are. You should never hesitate to ask a reasonable question or state your standards when it comes to your daughter's care. And so you can say, "I've noticed these scratches on the baby's legs. Can you tell me how she got them?" This presents an opportunity to remind or refresh any instructions you have for the sitter.

**DEAR AMY:** I have been hosting dinners at my home for many years. Recently, I have encountered situations when guests have special dietary requests. An invited guest has stated that she can eat only organic food purchased at a specific specialty store. This can be very expensive and I'm not prepared to do it. How should I handle this situation? - Unsure

**DEAR UNSURE:** It is unreasonable to request that a host serve food purchased from a specific place. You'll have to tell her, "I'm sorry, but I'm really all set as far as the food is concerned. We'll miss you, but maybe we can see you another time.
