



fer from region to region in the world as well. In Germany, you may find the three of acorns in your hand instead of the three of clubs, or the five of swords instead of the five of spades in Italy.





"They are up from last year's counts without a shadow of a doubt. How much though, I am not certain yet," he said.

A count shows that preliminary numbers for Linden schools shows that they have 3,014 students. This is a decrease of 26 students from the same time last year.

Enbridge cancels, renews contract with sheriff

▶Pipeline company will not work in Tyrone Township until further notice

Enbridge canceled its contract with the Livingston County Sheriff's Department, but renewed its contract a few days later, said Undersheriff Mike Murphy. Enbridge is a Canadian oil pipeline company that is installing a new pipeline on a 40-year plus easement that runs through some homeowners' property.

On Tuesday, a deputy from the sheriff's department attended the Tyrone Township Board of Trustees meeting and informed township officials and residents that the contract was canceled.

Murphy said Enbridge recently received approval to do work in other parts of Livingston County. Murphy said Enbridge will not be working in Tyrone Township for now, but that could change in the future. Murphy would not disclose where Enbridge would be working in Livingston County.

"It's going to be an on again, off again contract," Murphy said. "It will probably last until the first of next year."

The new contract is similar to the old one, where off-duty deputies are paid \$60 an hour for 10-hour shifts. One deputy will work the shift, which runs Monday to Saturday.

Enbridge is scheduled for a court hearing on Sept. 25 with Tyrone Township resident Debora Hense, whose property was damaged due to Enbridge construction.

Tyrone Township Clerk Keith Kremer said township officials and residents are concerned about fair protection if the police are hired by Enbridge.

"It didn't look right," Kremer said. "Some people thought it was a conflict of interest between citizens and the company." Kremer said Livingston County commissioners are reviewing the legality and implications of the contract.

Murphy said deputies will work to ensure fairness for residents and Enbridge.

"I know we've taken a few hits, people say Enbridge is a 'henchman,'" Murphy said. "We made it very clear to (Enbridge) that if a resident said you're not supposed to be on their property, you have to go." Murphy said that if Enbridge has the proper paperwork, they will allow them to work on residential property, even if



Essentials for increasing faith

Most people would like to increase their faith. They struggle with problems too difficult to solve and carry burdens too heavy to bear. Sleep eludes them and they are on a continual search for peace of mind.

How fervently this husband and wife prayed! And, they believed God would answer. Their faith was contagious and it increased mine. Soon I found myself becoming bolder in prayer and more likely to expect answers to my prayers.

Great faith is developed by exposure to the Bible. It cannot be pumped up or faked. So time must be taken to read the Scriptures if we wish to increase our faith. To be sure I do this, I try to keep two rules each morning: I do not eat anything until I read the Bible and I do not read anything until I read the Bible.

Add Bible reading to your early watch.

The Bible encourages faith. As you read the Bible, you will find guarantees of strength, peace, courage, salvation, power, victory and answered prayer. You will read of the exploits of others who have conquered problems through faith. Identifying with these promises and personal triumphs will cause your faith to increase. Expectation will emerge.

What a great way to start the day!
But faith should also be growing all
day long. Acting in faith will be vital to
faith's development. Like most things,
faith grows with exercise. If you want
faith to increase, you must start using it.
Do something that demands faith.
Whatever you do in faith will add
adventure to life. As God honors your
faith and answers your prayers, your
faith will keep growing.

Faith will move the mountains in your life.

are awarded for each trick called, but only if all of the called tricks are taken. Extra tricks get you nothing, and when you take 10 extra tricks you are set back a hundred points. The first team to 500 points wins, and of course, spades are trump.

Hearts is a game many people are likely more familiar with playing on their computer than with an actual deck of cards. While hearts may be the name of the game, they are also the card suit you will want to avoid if you want to win the game, as they are each worth one point, while the queen of spades is worth 13. The first person to 100 points causes the game to end and the person with the lowest score wins. Since the game is every player for themselves, Hearts is a great

game to play while having a conversation, as you don't have to worry about table talk.

Euchre is a game that has its roots here in Michigan, having been brought here from German settlers. The game spread across the nation, though the popularity of the game in the Great Lakes State is unmatched.

"It's a very fast-paced game," said Carla Chenoweth, who can also be found playing cards at the Loose Senior Citizen Center. "When my husband and I have people over for dinner, we like to play Euchre instead of discussing politics." **Cribbage** is a game that requires an accessory — a cribbage board. Among the many card games to learn on this list, cribbage is perhaps the most unique.

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

winter and sudden cold snap in early spring. "We can't substitute our festival with other fruits," he said.

Despite fewer apples and high demand, Spicer Orchards will fill St. John's usual order of 110 bushels for the festival, which amounts to roughly 11,000 apples. Fr. Harvey said dumplings and turnovers will be added to this year's apple

specialties, along with pies and crisps. Patrons will see a slight increase in prices, with pies going for \$10 this year as opposed to last year's \$8 pies.

Will Cartwright, market manager of Spicer Orchards, said his farm gathered apples

as soon as possible and kept them in storage all summer. Spicer Orchards has provided apples for the festival in the past and planned accordingly for this fall.

"The price has gone up. Michigan typically raises about 33 million bushels and it's down about 5 percent this year," said Cartwright. "At first I was really worried but we have a lot of good friends. Packing companies decided to help out farms like us instead of packing them up for groceries."

the proceeds are used as the church's operating budget. St. John's had a record year in 2009, raising \$200,000.

While many small-town festivals come and go, St. John's has become a staple of the community. Fr. Harvey attributes the 40 years of success to Fenton's sense of community and the gradual change in leadership each year.

"A lot of the organizers have kids and responsibilities," he said. "Kids become a part of the planning, it's very family orientated. The event is an expression of stewardship."

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

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

because of a "Vote of No Confidence" letter signed by 12 members of the Holly police officers union, the Police Officers Labor Council (POLC). "The 'Vote of No Confidence' letter cites 19 separate incidents of actions or inactions on the part of the Police Chief, which the signers allege

amount to mismanagement of the police department and violations of Village and police department policies and procedures."

Danishevskaya said she answered each incident in writing.

The Oakland County
Sheriff's Office will investigate the accusations of mismanagement as a neutral third party.

Oakland County Undersheriff Mike McCabe said his department started investigating the possible allegations against her by members of the Holly police. He said the allegations are not criminal, they are violations of village and departmental policies.

"We're going to do a complete and thorough job," he said.

Danishevskaya believes she was placed on leave for a different reason. "It is clear to me that since the day I filed my complaint of discrimination, Village Manager Walker has made his mind up to get rid of me," said Danishevskaya in her own news release sent out Wednesday.

Danishevskaya filed a complaint in March against Walker and council

member Tom Clark, citing discrimination and sexual harassment.

"Councilman Thomas Clark had sent me sexually explicit e-mails including a video of a topless woman shooting a handgun, made sexually inappropriate comments to me and hugged me inappropriately. I also

expressed concerns that the Village Manager Jerry Walker treated me differently than male Department Heads as well as treating me in a discriminating matter."

Clark said, "She made accusations against me that I have been completely exonerated from." He chose not to comment on the topic of questionable e-mails, and Walker stood by the original news release.

The investigation into her claims ended in late August, declaring her accusations unfounded.

The village council received the letter including her resignation from Danishevskaya's personal e-mail on Wednesday afternoon, with the exception of Don Wingelmire who doesn't use e-mail, and George Kullis who is brand new, and may not have been on the e-mail list. Council member Jason Hughes said that Walker did not receive the e-mail.

"I'm sorry to see the chief go, and I regret that it ended in a situation such as this," said Hughes. He said they will next try to move forward and try to reach an amicable conclusion that is best for the village.

There are no specific plans to send out requests for the position, but Hughes thinks it will be a hot topic at next week's meeting. "We have to move forward from here."

As far as Danishevskaya's allegations, Hughes said he hopes they aren't true. "I don't think Elena would wish to continue in this environment unless there are some major changes," he said.

President Jeff Miller said, "She has resigned, therefore she's no longer on the payroll. It is what it is." In regards to her accusations being the reason she was put on leave, he said "she has the right to say what she wants to say." "We had six in the top 10 so we'll take that," Holly coach Matt Weisdorfer said. "We knew (Linden) would be tough. This is our second race and their third. We knew coming out as hot as it was, it wasn't going to be a speed race. It was going to be a matter of hearts and guts and, fortunately, the running gods smiled on us, and things turned our way."

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

A more recent 80-card deck created in 2007 offers to make decks a little more complicated by adding an extra

suit, as well as additional cards, such as the princess to accompany the kings and queens.

The original four suits themselves are rooted in the different historical feudal classes. Hearts, diamonds,

clubs, and spades each represent the clergy, the merchants, the peasants, and the nobility respectively.

Changes in the social classes that were represented by the playing cards has had an effect on the rules of card games. After the French revolution, some games were changed to count the ace as a high card when it had traditionally been used as a low card up until that point. This promotion of the ace was symbolic of the common people rising above the royalty that ruled them.

Card games continue to hold their relevance today and their effects can most commonly be seen on our popular culture. Tournaments of Texas Hold 'Empoker are played for multi-million dollar prizes and broadcast on televi-

sion. Films such as Casino Royale and The Grand feature plots revolving around such card games.

It is possible that card games have even influenced our own local history.

As the story goes, Fenton reportedly received its name from a card game between William M. Fenton and Robert LeRoy. The winner of the card game named the city, while the lower named the road that formed the

main route through the city.

"I have never seen anything that would authenticate that that's how it happened," said Ken Seger of the Fenton Historical Society. "I haven't seen it disproven either, though."

The story is similar to card games in a way, as they are both passed down from one generation to the next.

"It's an excellent story. Everyone likes it so well that they perpetuate it," said Seger.

The joker shows up in card decks much later than the other cards we are accustomed to—its first appearance was documented in the mid 19th century. The joker was first used as the highest trump card that could be had, and is thought to be used mainly first in euchre.

Half of all raw materials in U.S. come from recycled scrap

Holly Twp. — On Wednesday, Dan Maser of Fenton Township's scrapping crew was trying to beat the rain. "Cut me there, then we'll take the aluminum," he said to Nicholas Brown, of Fenton. Maser was referring to the cross beams of a partial old tractor trailer. The section of frame was about 20 feet long and both axles and all tires were still attached.

This was a typical job — cleaning metal scrap off of someone's property. Many times it's old farm equipment, vehicles or motor homes — "anything you can imagine out in the woods," he said.

While Maser gave orders and Brown cut with an acetylene torch, Maser's business partner Deon Hall of Flint, helped load sections into the back of a Ford pickup and Victor Scott, also of Flint, worked with a four-foot pry bar to get the aluminum off the sides of the frame section.

Off to the side, Tabbatha Brown of Flint took apart a water heater.

Maser said the jobs are sporadic and his goal is to keep the group busy with work. Hall has children at home and Scott is a truck driver between jobs. Some scrappers have routes along roads they follow, looking for anything they can recycle, but he relies on newspaper ads for his crew.

Scrappers like Maser that recycle old

steel equipment are recycling "obsolete" metals, which make up half of the steel produced in the U.S. "Prompt" steel comes from industrial sources.

In 2010, 74 million metric tons of ferrous scrap metal was processed in the U.S. according to the Institute of Scrap Recycling Industries (ISRI). Ferrous metal refers to metals like steel that degrade and rust over time. This scrap metal makes up 60 percent of total raw steel produced in the United States.

Non-ferrous metals, such as copper, tin or nickel do not degrade and can be recycled an infinite number of times. The value of the non-ferrous scrap industry was \$40 billion in the U.S. in 2010. Though non-

Copper, like scrap steel, makes up half of the copper used in the U.S. Right now, steel is going for 7.5 cents a pound at Fenton Scale House, while clean aluminum is 40 cents.

The best quality copper fetches \$2.30 a pound. The price will depend on what scrap yards are willing to pay, based on the price of stocks.

Mark Bradsher of Fenton Scale House was busy on Wednesday, handling incoming customers. Someone like Maser would load up the metals and bring them here.

When someone tries to sell scrap, Bradsher said he first inspects the trailer


for anything they don't recycle, like tires. They also don't take liquids. Then they weigh the trailer, before and after the scrap is removed. The difference is multiplied by the going rate for what they're scrapping, and the customer is paid based on that. "It's that simple," he said.


Smaller amounts are weighed on a precise, indoor scale.

Gary Walker of Fenton dropped off 200 pounds of steel and some aluminum to Fenton Scales. "We're taking scrap that would be going to the landfill and putting a little gas money in our pocket," he said. Walker isn't an active scrapper, but he also won't pass up an opportunity.


Bradsher's company will sort the materials, take the bulk metal and sell it to who is paying the most. He said the scrap usually ends up on a boat headed for China. "It's just a link of us getting it to there," he said. "They melt it down over there then we buy it back."

Scrap rubber, plastics and electronics are also recycled and improvements in technology make recycling them easier and better for the environment. Recycling electronics adds \$5 billion to the U.S. economy and 30,000 U.S. jobs, but Bradsher said the industry isn't quite ready to take computer components. "That market is right around the corner from taking off," he said.

"I've never seen a crew act so unprofessional," said Delio Barletta, owner of Johnny's Pizzeria. "They work when they feel like it. One day there's one guy working out there and then there's no one out there for two or three days."

Barletta said construction workers have regularly closed the driveway to his business during lunch hours, causing his business to plummet by 50 percent. Barletta said he called the city but was met with rude responses and little help.

The repaving of North LeRoy Street started in May and is expected to be finished at the end of this month. The original deadline for the \$1.25 million project was August 29. Department of Public Works (DPW) Director Dan Czarnecki said North LeRoy will be open to traffic on Sept. 21. Czarnecki said the city has been as communicative as possible with residents and businesses about the construction.

Czarnecki attributed the project's delay to the Angelo Iafrate construction company use of different pilings. "If they had gone with pilings that we requested, the project would be done on time," Czarnecki said.

Project Manager and Angelo Iafrate employee Ron Roby said his company had to use different pilings because the city's blueprints were not accurate with the history of the road. The company also had to use more concrete than originally planned, needing an additional four weeks to finish the project.

When it comes to allegations of laziness, Roby said his workers are committed to getting the job done as fast and efficiently as possible.

'Our guys start at 7 a.m. and leave at 5 p.m. We're very aware of what the public sees

and I'm not shocked (of the accusations)," said Roby.

Roby said the amount of workers on

site fluctuates depending on what needs to be done. Usually, there are three or four workers on North Le-Roy and up to 14 workers if concrete is being laid down.

Chris Burke, owner of Muffler and Go, said he

sees workers show up at 8 a.m. and leave by 4 p.m. Burke believes the city does not do enough for the businesses affected by the construction.

"For something in the heart of our city, you would think the city would have a

by to talk with businesses that support this town. If I had the same customer service, I'd be out of business."

> "There are definitely not enough workers. There's not enough going on," Jordan said. "Rarely do I see anyone doing work out there. This is ridiculous."

Czarnecki said the city is committed to working with residents and business owners. The DPW director will continue to address problems that arise and understands

> the construction is wearing people out.

"The contractor is required to get the job done and we can't tell them how to do their job," Czarnecki said. "I've been telling people since day one to call

city hall and ask for me."

Czarnecki added that while North Le-Roy Street will be open to traffic by Sept. 21, construction on the road may continue afterward, until the road is completely

Italian immigrant, restaurant owner and small-town man



Recreational skydiving a release for Fenton resident

Ray Township — At around 13,000 feet, the red light turned on in the stark cargo cabin of the airplane, meaning it was time for the door to open. The jumpers inside were greeted with a whoosh of wind, cool air and airplane noise. The green light meant it was time to jump. No one gets to stay inside.

Malissa Bossardet of Fenton went skydiving a second time on Aug. 30, on a clear evening near Romeo. Skydiving began as a military exercise to safely escape warplanes. Today, it is also used by recreational thrill

"Excited, I'm feeling excited," she said, on the ground at the south hangar of Midwest Freefall, the company with which she skydives. She wasn't nervous, she was just trying to remember the instructions from Mike Pelzer, with who she was to jump in tandem.

Before anyone jumps, they fill out paperwork, watch an instructional video and learn from instructors like Pelzer, who go over the basics of jumping. He is in control the whole time, as they are essentially harnessed together at the hip. "Everyone gets a little something different out of it," he said. "It's always different for everybody."

After Pelzer and Bossardet donned

their jumpsuits and harnesses, Pelzer went over instructions, detailed down to the seating positions on the plane. "If you have a question, don't feel silly about asking," he said. "At 10,000, I'm going to finish hooking up the harness." All jumpers wear a jumpsuit with a harness and goggles.

The staff at Midwest Freefall is what you'd expect a bunch of chronic skydivers to be like — excited and energetic. There was a feeling of electricity before and after a jump.

"Are you pumped?" one staffer asked a client who was about to get on the plane. "Let's do it!"

Before the jump, everyone chatted outside the hangar. "Just smile and look pretty, that's all you have to worry about," said skydiving photographer Jim White. "If you don't, we just get pics of Mikey's face and we can't sell those," he joked. White wore a helmet fitted with both a camera and camcorder. He triggered the shutter with a

remote under his tongue.

Finally, it was time to go, as the Cessna cargo plane taxied up the runway. This was a dusk jump, where colors were amplified and warm. Pelzer said it costs \$700 per hour to run the plane, which takes up to 17 people, to 13,000 feet in 15 minutes.

At 13,000 feet, the earth is less distinguishable, but that's where skydivers jump. They free fall for 8,000 feet, at 120 miles an hour. The fall only lasts about a minute

before they are "under canopy," meaning the parachute is deployed and they spend three minutes circling, drifting to the ground.

From the ground, the airplane was barely recognizable, and the parachutes were only dots when they were deployed. They quickly grew into clear colors and soon roared down

from the sky at up to 40 miles per hour.

Moments after the jumpers landed, the plane landed nearby. Bossardet said, "It was really amazing, the drop area, you can see so far, you can see Troy, it was a little hazy, you couldn't see downtown Detroit."

She said she was a little more relaxed the second time. "You've already done it so you know what to expect." She said she jumps "just for the thrill. It's like a release when you're up there."

Bossardet received a DVD of her jump and 125 photos, for a fee. Then, crew and jumpers relaxed with a beer as the night came to a close.

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

Lapeer man takes home \$159 million payout

The Michigan Lottery changes lives, without a doubt. Recently, a man named Donald Lawson, of Lapeer claimed a \$337 million prize and took the lump sum pay out. He ended up pocketing \$159 million according to the Associ-

still eat at McDonald's. A call to the number for Donald Lawson of Lapeer on yp.com led to the wrong person on the wrong address, who has been inundated with calls. "We just let them go to the answering machine," said the man named Ron, who lives in Lapeer, but not on the same street.

Lawson's win was the second largest in Michigan ever, and huge jackpots like that drive sales up. Tony Aleyas, owner of Lockes Party Shoppe in Fenton says small winnings are cashed at his shop fairly often. "We had the winning fantasy five winner, but nobody claimed it," he said. When the shop sells a ticket that wins in the thousands, when the winner claims it, the shop will get \$2,000. He said the shop selling the winning Powerball ticket will get \$50,000.

Because of this, Aleyas follows lotto winnings closely.

The highest winner in Fenton was for a \$1 million raffle, sold at the VG's on Silver Parkway, in January 2010. It was claimed a week after it was sold.

According to the lotto website, \$23 billion has been paid out, covering all Michigan counties since 1972. In 2011, the lotto reported \$2.34 billion in annual sales, which generated \$727.3 million for the school aid fund.

Retailers received a commission of \$168.4 million for sales, from the 11 games offered by Michigan Lotto.

Aurthur, This could be a few things and you might want to have a mechanic near you listen to it, the fuel pump will make a steady humming noise when the car is running and one thing you could do is listen while someone turns the key on and see if the sound is the same, (when you turn the key on the pump should run for 10 seconds or so to prime the fuel system) if this is the sound try changing the fuel filter first as it could be clogged causing the pump to work very hard to produce enough pressure and volume to keep the car running, next thing to look at is if the hissing sound is coming from the fuel cap or the vent valve under the car in the evaporative emissions canister, these valves can become inoperative at times causing the fuel tank to pressurize or have a vacuum, if this is the case you will need a professional to diagnose this as the cost can go very high if you replace the wrong part.

Kids and dogs

DEAR PAW'S CORNER: A while ago, you printed information on how to safely approach unfamiliar dogs. I'd like my two children to be familiar with those procedures. Can you provide that information? — Candice

DEAR CANDICE: I sure can. Here are a few tips courtesy of the American Kennel Club on how to safely approach a strange dog:

- Ask permission: It's very important to ask a dog's owner first if you can pet the dog. Not every dog reacts the same way to strangers petting them The owner will know if the dog is friendly and if it is safe for you to approach
- Approach calmly: If the owner says yes, make a fist, extend your hand slowly to the dog, and let it sniff the back of your hand. Dogs recognize people by scent, so letting it sniff your hand lets the dog become familiar with you.
- Where to pet: Once the dog has sniffed your hand, pet it gently under the chin or on the chest.
- Don't hug dogs: Kids should never hug a dog. Dogs don't hug each other, and they don't understand hugs to mean love and affection like humans do. Wrapping your arms around a dog can stress it out and lead to an unnecessary bite.

DEAR DR. DONOHUE: I am an 82-year-old woman. My body cannot tolerate antibiotics, vitamins or painkillers. I am told I have macular degeneration and was advised to take Ocuvite once a day. My sister suggested I write to you to see if you have an idea of how to take Ocuvite in some other manner or some other way to get the ingredients in it. Help. — L.M.

ANSWER: In 2001, the results of the first AREDS report (Age-Related Eye Disease Study) was published. It showed that the combination of beta carotene (a form of vitamin A), vitamin E, vitamin C, zinc and copper could slow the progression of moderate macular degeneration to severe macular degeneration. Macular degeneration is a wasting away of the macula — a small, round area of the retina necessary for clear central vision, the kind needed to read, sew and drive. Ocuvite is one capsule that incorporates all these nutrients.

Currently a new study, AREDS 2, is being conducted. The vitamin-mineral combination has been altered a bit and new ingredients have been added: lutein, zeaxanthin and omega-3 fatty acids. Some Ocuvite pills also contain these materials.

Since you're unable to tolerate vitamins, you'll need to get these nutrients from foods. You might not be able to reach the high levels found in pills, but you'd be getting all the ingredients in those pills.

Beta carotene is found in colored vegetables like carrots and peppers, in dark-green vegetables and in colored fruits. Vitamin E is widely available in many foods: meats, nuts, cereal grains, wheat-germ oil and sunflower oil. You find vitamin C in citrus fruits, tomatoes, potatoes and broccoli. Zinc is in meats, shellfish, nuts and legumes, like peas. Copper is in shellfish, nuts and organ meats.

The new version of AREDS, not yet published, contains lutein and zeaxanthin, which you can obtain in kale, spinach, collard greens, corn, green beans, carrots, squash and tomatoes. Omega-3 fatty acids are found in fish like salmon and tuna.

- 3. Cut the potatoes into bite-size chunks (leave the skins on) and place them in a large bowl with the celery. Scrape in the dressing with a rubber spatula and gently stir it all together. Serve immediately, or cover and chill. Serves 8 to 10.
