My journalism professor Mike Lewis, a 30-year veteran of print and TV news often said, “We write the first draft of history. That's the journalists' job.”

It's sometimes a dirty, unpopular, and difficult job. It's the most difficult and unpopular one if someone is hurt or, worse yet, fatally injured.

Photojournalists have the duty to record events with their camera, preserving the dramatic moments

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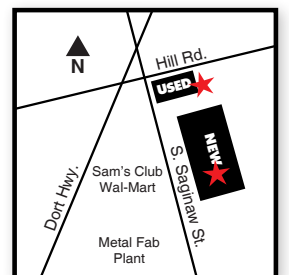

One of those comedians includes Bryan McCree. What motivates him to perform on stage?

"There is nothing like the power of being able to make somebody laugh," he said.

The youngest of three bigger brothers, McCree said that he survived his household — with his mouth. "I would torture them with my mind instead of getting them back physically," he said.

Many of the premises for McCree's jokes originate from things that happen to him, he said. "Some of the premises come up organically, but then I'll take them back home and do some writing, and sit down with the premises and work them out," he said.

A lot of McCree's material has to do with race. "As great as the country is, we still have major obstacles with race," he said. "It's very hilarious."

Being a comedian is not without its challenges. McCree said he comes across hecklers all the time. "I think people

Before his class takes the bigger exams, University of Michigan-Flint psychology lecturer Darryl Douglas will intentionally tell his class about a funny movie, or comedian he

just saw, and direct them to a clip online. "The general strategy there is to relieve some of the stress in taking the exam," he said.

Laughter decreases amounts of the stress hormone cortisol and therefore increases memory. "While our body needs (cortisol) at the right levels, laughter helps to reduce anxiety," he said.

New anti-bullying law brings changes to area schools

►Matt's Safe School Law directs all schools to have procedures in place, protect all students

The shine of freshly waxed floors. The squeak of new sneakers shuffling in hallways. The dull chatter of tired teens that have greeted 7 a.m. for the first time since June. All these characterize the start of a new school year.

But for a slew of Michigan school officials, this new year brings the adoption of a new policy. Matt's Safe School Law, an anti-bullying law, is being implemented for the first time in Michigan schools. Until this policy update, Michigan was among five other states that did not have anti-bullying legislation.

The legislation was named after Matt Epling, an honor-roll student who killed himself at the age of 14 in 2002 after being assaulted by bullies at his school.

Matt's Safe School Law requires each Michigan school to have, among other things, "A statement against bullying, a procedure for reporting an act of bullying, and a provision indicating that all pupils are protected under the policy and that bullying is equally prohibited without regard to its subject matter or motivating animus."

Each school in Michigan must have:

►A statement against bullying.

►A procedure for reporting an act of bullying.

►A provision indicating that all pupils are protected under the policy and that bullying is equally prohibited without regard to its subject matter or motivating animus.

Bullying is defined as "conduct that is reasonably perceived as being dehumanizing, intimidating, hostile, humiliating, threatening or otherwise likely to evoke fear of physical harm or emotional distress," according to the Michigan state board of education.

Schools are also encouraged to bring in outside presentations to help educate students and parents on the subject matter.

Fenton High School is welcoming 'The Bullycide Project,' an anti-bullying production into its auditorium this October to help inform students and faculty of the ramifications of bullying.

"We actually had 'The Bullycide Project' here at Linden High school last October for our entire student body. It was a very powerful and well received assembly," Assistant Principal Darin

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Tyrone Township

►Some residents question effectiveness of services

Tyrone Twp. — Residents in Tyrone Township will continue to receive services from the Livingston County Sheriff's Department and various local fire departments, following a unanimous vote by the board. Residents will pay \$150 annually for the services while businesses will pay \$250. Those who own vacant land will pay \$75 annually.

Some residents expressed concern however, about the amount of coverage the township received and the billing methods for fire runs. Currently, Tyrone and Hartland townships share one on-duty officer around the clock. Shifts for the officer are 12 hours each. Undersheriff Mike Murphy said time spent between Tyrone and Hartland is not specified to prevent people from setting times to commit crime.

"The car is free to float between the two townships, depending on what's going on," Murphy said. "The coverage is not always 12 (Tyrone) and 12 (Hartland). It's give and take."

According to the July sheriff report, deputies responded to a variety of calls including criminal sexual conduct, a domestic physical call, a warrant arrest and breaking and entering. The two townships paid the Livingston County Sheriff's Department \$148,025.50 for services

between April 1, 2011 and March 31, 2012. The two townships are currently paying \$154,647.50 for services up to March 31, 2012.

At the Tuesday board of trustees meeting, some residents told board members that the police are rarely seen in their neighborhoods, questioning the practice of paying for police protection.

"Your insurance would be a hell of a lot higher without these services," Township Treasurer Keith Kremer said to residents.

Some residents such as Cam Gonzalez believe the police are vital to their community. Gonzalez told the board that his house had been broken into and nearly half of his stolen property has been returned.

Also of contest was the use of fire protection in the township. Currently, Tyrone Township contracts fire services from the city of Fenton and Fenton Township fire departments and Hartland Deerfield Fire Authority. Residents who do not have a \$5 fire permit are charged \$1,337 for firearms. If residents have a fire permit and fire departments are deployed, the township picks up the tab.

Fenton Fire Chief Robert Cairnduff said the bill is set based on fuel costs, payroll insurance and overhead costs. The bill is the same price even if firefighters respond to a house fire or a hazard call.

"When people respond, I have to pay the workers that show up to the hall, not just what is dispatched," Cairnduff said.

In January, the township had to pay \$40,747 to the department for fire runs. Township Supervisor Mike Cunningham said the township has been working to lower the amount of calls and dispatch with the fire departments.

"The surplus is going up and the calls are going down," Cunningham said.

BYRON MAN FALLS ASLEEP AT WHEEL, CRASHES

A 20-year-old Byron man was transported to the hospital where he was treated and released for minor injuries he sustained in a head-on collision in Argentine Township on Wednesday, Sept. 19. Argentine Township Police Chief Dan Allen said Argentine officers responded to Silver Lake Road, east of McCaslin Lake Road at 6:48 a.m. to investigate a report of a crash. The Byron man was traveling eastbound on Silver Lake Road in his Pontiac Grand Prix when he apparently fell asleep at the wheel, said Allen. The man drove off the south side of the road, then across the centerline, striking a 2006 International van, driven by a 59-year-old Kalamazoo man. The Byron man complained of back pain and had cuts to his hands.

DETROIT WOMAN OWI IN ARGENTINE

At 10:43 p.m. on Tuesday, Sept. 18, an Argentine Township police officer observed a westbound blue Ford Explorer on Silver Lake Road. The officer saw the vehicle run off the right side of the road several times, as well as cross the centerline. The vehicle turned south onto Seymour Road and the vehicle was traveling completely in the northbound lane as it headed south. The officer initiated a traffic stop and

made contact with the driver, a 48-year-old Detroit woman. The officer found that the driver was driving while intoxicated. She was arrested for OWI and transported to the Genesee County Jail.

BICYCLIST RIDES INTO SIDE OF VEHICLE

Fenton police responded to a vehicle/bicycle crash on Poplar Street, near Silver Lake Road at 6:23 p.m. on Saturday, Sept. 15. A 42-year-old Burton man riding a bicycle rode into the side of a 2000 Saturn that had exited a business parking lot on Poplar Street. STAT EMS ambulance responded and transported the bicyclist to Hurley Medical Center in Flint with incapacitating injuries. The 48-year-old Fenton Township woman driving the Saturn was not injured and her vehicle sustained minor injuries.

MAN UNDER THE INFLUENCE OF 'BATH SALTS'

Just after midnight on Tuesday, Sept. 18, Fenton police responded to the area of North LeRoy and Third streets on a report of a possibly intoxicated man walking southbound, wearing no shirt. Responding officers spotted the man, who appeared to be under the influence of something. The man tried to hide behind a tree when he saw the officers. Once contact was made, the 33-year-old Linden man admitted to police that he had consumed illegal "bath salts" as well as alcohol earlier in the day. Lt. Jason Slater said the man was incoherent. STAT EMS ambulance arrived and transported him to the hospital for medical treatment.

Police chase passes through Fenton area

►One robbery suspect caught, two more suspects on the loose

Mundy Township robbery suspects led police on a car chase on southbound U.S. 23, through Fenton, late Thursday night. One suspect was caught and his two male accomplices are still sought.

Mundy Township Police Chief James Petres said his police officers responded to the AmericInn at Hill Road and U.S. 23 to investigate a robbery in progress. Employees provided the description of the suspects' getaway car and a Mundy

Township officer pursued it after spotting it on the highway.

The suspect driving the car lost control and crashed the vehicle in the area of Clyde Road and U.S. 23 in Livingston County. The three men fled on foot; however, police apprehended and arrested one suspect. Police are still searching for the other two male suspects.

The two unknown suspects were last seen in the Parshallville area. Roads near Clyde Road were closed to through traffic as police searched for the suspects into the early morning hours of Friday.

Holly Township Clean Up Day

What rights do news photographers have? Believe it or not, in the U.S. the press and the individual have the right to take pictures of anyone, anytime, anywhere in public without their permission. Being a press

photographer merely legitimizes being closer to the scene, giving us a purpose instead of just 'gawking.'

Press photographers have the right to take images from outside an accident scene, at a reasonable distance, as long as they don't disrupt the police, paramedics or fire

crews. A tactful photographer doesn't press their luck and the police's patience by getting too close. Some photojournalists will argue their rights until they are arrested if they feel it is necessary.

We cannot take photos inside a school without permission from a teacher, nor are we allowed inside a hospital without permission from the specific patients.

Photojournalism is about getting a genuine image, which often means we introduce ourselves moments after the photo is taken, instead of disrupting the moment. Sometimes we introduce ourselves first and make sure you don't mind. Just because we're allowed to be there legally, doesn't mean it is ethical, or would make a good image if we're being glared at by an individual just trying to go about their day.

'Ethics' are the rules that govern a particular profession. Something what is unethical might not be illegal, but it can harm the credibility of the news organization.

This photo, shot by Stanley Forman on July 22, 1975, in Boston, Mass., earned the photographer a Pulitzer Prize. The controversial image filled most of the front page of the Boston Herald American and a hundred other newspapers across America. The two girls were trying to escape a fire in their apartment building when the fire escape collapsed. The 19-year old girl died on impact, but the younger girl survived. The immediate impact of the photo was negative — the paper was accused of sensationalism, but the national outrage ignited by the publishing of the photo resulted in the passing of much-needed updated fire escape legislation across the country.

The Society of Professional Journalists said the first ethical responsibility is to 'seek truth and report it,' said Lewis. It also directs us to 'minimize harm.'

Where there are victims of accidents or crime, there is almost always a family member who would rather a news camera not be there. "Grieving should be a private moment, if that family were to choose it that way," said Lewis. "By circumstances they're trapped out there where people can see them."

In moments like these, the news photographer has to decide if their image will serve a purpose. "Does the public need to see this? You need to be able to articulate an answer," said Lewis. He said that sometimes, the victims and their families do want to share their stories.

Lewis pointed out the Colorado theater shootings this summer featured unnumbered grieving family members in the center of a news event.

A potent local example is the two drownings in the Fenton area and near drowning in Holly this summer. The parents had just identified their son who had drowned in Lake Fenton, and were making their way back to their car. It was the most difficult image to capture of my career. I tried to be as discreet as I could. I got one image, and left quickly.

It was a private moment, in a public place, and it ran on the front page. So what is gained from that image? "Those pictures really affect people," said Lewis, adding that a story with no photo wouldn't have the same emotional impact as a photograph. In the newsroom we debated whether to run the photo. I argued that a greater good is served and the image of the grieving relatives sent a far more powerful message to the readers — many of whom would realize that a single moment of carelessness on a lake could cost you your life — in a year where our area experienced two drownings within a week of each other. In the end, our publisher made the decision to run the photo.

"News isn't a popularity contest, someone needs to make a call," said Lewis. "That's a tough call, sometimes it's right, sometimes it's wrong."

Bruce Edwards teaches photography and photojournalism at Mott Community College in Flint, and was a long time photographer for the Flint Journal. He said ethics requires a balancing act, between the greater good and a person's privacy.

He believes that when pain is shown to the world, it may add value to human life.

"Particularity in a world where kids kill 50 people in a minute (in a video game), maybe they lose touch with real people involved," said Edwards. "If we can reflect the pain a victim's family is feeling we may add value to life because of it."

But we can never be cavalier in our decisions and we have to ask ourselves, how would we feel if it were our parents, friend, brother or sister, we were grieving?

That's a photojournalist's job, and I'm proud to do it.

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Dr. Felice, what is the best way to treat Ankle Injuries?

Ankle sprains are one of the most common injuries in the whole body, and while some sports are higher risk, an ankle injury will be experienced by almost every active person at one time or another. Ankle pain from sprain injuries, arthritis pain, fracture, or joint instability is something that I treat nearly every day. The best treatment will depend a lot on the severity and timing of the injury. For example, my retired neighbor's first time ankle sprain, which happened a week earlier, would get treated much differently than a grade III sprain, which happened yesterday, in a competitive athlete with a long history of similar problems. I need to do a thorough office evaluation of each injury, the patient's history, and their activity level in order to develop an optimal care plan.

What exactly is a "sprain"?

A sprain is the medical term for excessive forces and stretching of a ligament band. The ligaments are anatomic fiber structures which cross joints to help stabilize them. If there's enough force or if the ligaments are weak to begin with, then the energy from an injury sometimes tears all of the fibers. That's referred to as a rupture. More commonly, though, minor sprains just weaken the ligament, the joint is not as stable afterward without proper recovery, and arthritis can gradually occur.

Won't ankle sprains usually just heal on their own after time?

They can heal, but it's highly unlikely that the best healing will occur without some treatment. When individual ligament fibers are torn, they begin to fill in with scar tissue. The keys early on are to limit the pain and swelling, minimize the stretch on the fragile new fibers, and to keep a natural position of the joint while the body attempts ligament repairs. This is where ankle compression wrap, splinting, bracing or even casting in select cases can be very useful. We tend to find the most success when we treat ankle injuries promptly, which is why we always leave a few daily appointment slots open for any urgent cases which might come up. That will save patients hundreds of dollars when compared with going to an ER or urgent care clinic, and they get to see the ankle specialists in our office right from the beginning.

If I injured my ankle years ago but never got treatment, is it too late?



I would say that it's never too late! Some damages, including ankle cartilage loss or badly stretched out ligaments are difficult to improve without surgical repair. Fortunately, our office's ankle and foot surgeons have completed years of surgical residency

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training and perform many advanced techniques – including ankle arthroscopic "angle scope" inspection, ligament repairs or reconstructions, and even cartilage transplants. In persons who are no longer highly active, help for ankle pain after "old" injuries can commonly be achieved with just some quality bracing or the latest injection therapies. Additionally, I can often provide at-home or professional physical therapy recommendations which will gradually help restore ankle function and stability - even years after the original injury.

What puts people at risk for an ankle sprain injury?

The number one risk factor for an ankle sprain is actually having a history of a past sprain which was never treated and never rehabilitated correctly. Unfortunately, it's common practice for most people – even some fairly competitive athletes – to just "walk it off" or try to finish the season before seeking treatment for ankle injuries. That sort of approach can lead to repeated injuries, chronic swelling, serious instability in the ankle joint, and early onset of arthritis. Other risk factors tend to include jumping sports such as volleyball and basketball or activities with quick side-to-side movements, like racquetball and football. We do tend to find that persons with a high arch foot type or wearers of unstable and highly flexible shoe types also suffer more ankle injuries.

How should I treat an ankle sprain?

The first treatment is stopping stress on the ankle immediately to minimizing the pain and swelling which will occur rapidly after the injury. This means "P.R.I.C.E.": protection, rest, ice, compression, and elevation. An ice pack, propping the injured leg up on pillows, and an anti-inflammatory tablet is a good initial treatment in most cases until you can get to the office. Elastic stretch wrap might be useful, but use caution since they can actually increase pain if applied too early or too tightly. Definitely minimize any walking on the sore ankle and stop any impact sports until you are given an exam and the "ok" by a qualified specialist. In our office, we utilize high resolution digital x-rays to first make sure there is no bone fracture or cartilage chip in a sore ankle and foot, and then we get to work with methods to quickly

resolve swelling so that our patients can begin optimal rehab and return to activities.

Why do I see so many different types of ankle braces marketed?

There are different flexibilities, various materials, and different levels of ankle support. I will recommend different braces based on the severity of the injury and person's daily activity level. While bracing can be very useful for short term protection, our ultimate goal is always to teach the ankle to brace itself once again. Braces sometimes don't fit comfortably into certain shoes or cleats, and while sports taping around the ankles can add stability, tape has been shown to become stretched out and lose its effect very quickly once the athlete starts any ankle motion.

What other injuries get mistaken as a simple ankle sprain?

Since ankle sprains are so common, some rare – but very serious – injuries tend to get misdiagnosed as "just a sprained ankle." The more serious injuries can include tendon injury, broken bones, ligament ruptures, fractured cartilage on the ankle joint surface, or a severe injury to the ligaments and bones in the middle of the foot arch (called a "Lisfranc" foot injury). The initial examination can be difficult after a bad injury due to the amount of swelling and pain, but a qualified foot and ankle specialist can fully evaluate each injury and make the proper recommendations.

What can I do to prevent an ankle injury when I play sports?

The best ways to minimize the risk of ankle injury is to promote adequate balance, flexibility, and muscle strength. This means that stretching and balance training could be added to an athlete's typical routine of sports practice and weight lifting. Additionally, wearing properly fitting shoes which are good quality and designed for the sport you are playing can go a long way. During practices, you will also want to limit the explosive jumping and lateral movements once your muscles are feeling fatigued. In individuals who are at high risk based on foot type or those who have history of ankle sprains, we tend to see great success with custom casted orthotics or bracing for increased stability.

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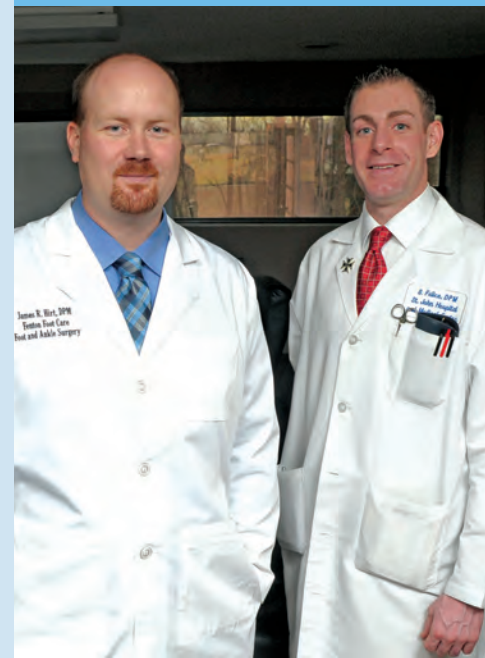

"People that focus more on things that are more lighthearted are generally more positive overall." Douglas uses laughter, and even sees a correlation between a healthy therapy session and doses of lighthearted media the client reports watching.

When we laugh, several things happen at once with our bodies. Our blood pressure goes up, we use muscles in our face and elsewhere. We breathe faster, sending more oxygen to our tissues.

One study showed that laughter can bring up the heart rate faster than 10 minutes on the rowing machine. Ten to 15 minutes of laughter can burn 50 calories.

Douglas said that an explosion of dopamine also occurs, giving one the similar to having sex, recreational skydiving or illicit drugs.

Studies also cited on webmd.com claimed that watching a comedy instead of a tedious lecture increased blood flow and lowered blood sugar levels. All of this can add up to a better-protected heart.

"There's plenty of research to support that laughter acts as an antidepressant," said Douglas. He said the affects on the brain aren't quite as profound as a brisk walk,

Benefits in brief

Laughter relaxes the whole body. A good, hearty laugh relieves physical tension and stress, leaving your muscles relaxed for up to 45 minutes after.

Laughter boosts the immune system. Laughter decreases stress hormones and increases immune cells and infection-fighting antibodies, thus improving your resistance to disease.

Laughter triggers the release of endorphins, the body's natural feel-good chemicals. Endorphins promote an overall sense of well-being and can even temporarily relieve pain.

Laughter protects the heart. Laughter improves the function of blood vessels and increases blood flow, which can help protect you against a heart attack and other cardiovascular problems.

but there are measurable benefits.

If stress weakens the immune system, then laughter strengthens it. It has also been linked to a better night's sleep.

Even scholars like Robert Provine who was unconvinced of the physical benefits of laughter, admit that it can dull pain. This is because laughing releases endorphins, the body's "feel good" chemical.

Provine said that a person who is laughing more, may also have surrounded themselves with a better environment — they are close to family and friends, naturally healthy and more prone to laughter.

Provine said that people are 30 times more likely to laugh, when they are with other people.

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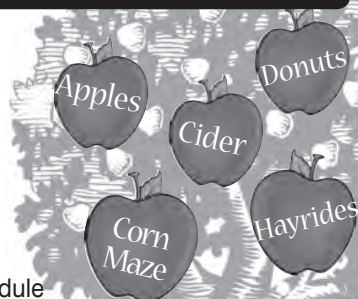

VanDuser, Blue Devils run over Beecher, 54-14

Beecher — Nick VanDuser couldn't wait to get back on the field.

After missing almost two full games due to an ankle injury, the Lake Fenton running back returned to the starting lineup against Beecher on Friday night.

Beecher (2-3) wishes he didn't. VanDuser, racked up 247 yards and four TDs on the ground, leading the Blue Devils (3-0, 4-1) to a 54-14 GAC Red road victory at Beecher.

"When it comes to the running part, I've been out for two weeks. I've been excited to get back in," VanDuser said. "It's always, always, always about the offensive line. They do everything. They work their butts off. I've never had a better offensive line than them."

Really, it was a show by everyone involved with the running game. Lake Fenton ran for 412 yards on 54 carries behind the Blue Devils starting offensive line of Tyler Begley, Mark Kotula, Brandon Keen, Tyler Smith and Logan Readdy.

"It's cool because all week in practice we push and push," Begley said about the rushing yards.

"We work so hard at perfecting our trade, and when we come together and do something like this, it's really nice."

The Blue Devils trailed 7-0 early when Beecher quarterback Marcus Wright hit Tyrone Southward with a 30-yard TD pass on Beecher's first possession, but from that point on, Lake Fenton dominated.

VanDuser collected 59 yards of a 70-yard drive, scoring on a 15-yard run up the middle with 6:39 left. Lake Fenton trailed 7-6. On the Blue Devils' next possession it took just one play for VanDuser to score, this time on a 14-yard run. The missed extra point kept Lake Fenton's lead at just 12-7 with 4:04 left in the opening quarter.

Lake Fenton upped the lead to 20-7 on a 20-yard interception return for a TD. Beecher scored on Wright's second TD pass, a 35-yard TD reception to Kermit Craig, but the Blue Devils responded with a 58-yard scoring drive, capped by VanDuser's 10-yard TD run with 4:45 left in the half. Lake Fenton led 28-14 at the half.

In the second half, Beecher's offense couldn't score against Lake Fenton's defense. Meanwhile, the Blue Devils had three different

runners score. Lance Hasenfratz and VanDuser scored from two yards out each in the third quarter. In the fourth, Joe Fisher scored on a five-yard run. Finally, the Lake Fenton scoring ended with another interception return for a TD. This one came from Nick Elson on a 40-yard return.

Lake Fenton hosts Goodrich for

a GAC Red game on Friday.

"It's a huge game," Begley said. "It's obviously a rival. They are a great team. They are solid. It's at home so that's good for us. We are going to play our tails off and see what happens."

ASK THE MECHANIC

Q: I recently bought a used Nissan Altima 2005. It runs great, but I hear a grinding noise coming from the passenger rear side. I have asked Pepboys to inspect and they said that the back tires are sloppy. When I asked the meaning of that, they showed me that one side of the tire has more wear than the other side and it's not even. I am not a mechanic, but I don't understand how this is making the noise. There are no bump or alignment problems while driving. The noise comes only when I drive and it increases when I increase the speed, and it stops when I stop. I am sure it's not from my engine. Mechanics are telling me to replace the tires. Before investing \$500 to replace all 4 tires, front 2 tires are not that good either, I want to double check with you to get your opinion.

A: Thyagarajan, I suspect that you may have a bad wheel bearing. The way to check this is to jack the suspected wheel up and rotate the tire. Listen for any unusual noise. Grab the tire at top and bottom then try to move it in and out. If there is any movement, then you most likely have a bad wheel bearing. If none of this shows any problems try rotating the tires to see if the noise moves with the tire. If so, then I suspect that the tires are the problem.

have in their mind that heckling is part of it, and somehow they are helping the show," he said. "They're not helping the show."

McCree said while he loves performing on stage, the difficult part is getting to the stage in the first place.

One difficulty includes booking shows and dealing with agents, and convincing them you are funny, McCree said. And after that, physically getting to the stage — traveling from club to club — can be difficult.

Norm Stulz, a comedian who lives in Holly, shares McCree's sentiment about travel. "The road is hard. It's lonely," said Stulz. At the same time, the job has offered Stulz many opportunities to travel with his family.

Stulz has performed at the Holly Hotel many times over the years and said he enjoys that venue in particular. "Many comics enjoyed working the small room, and I still do," he said. "The energy from the audience is more immediate and closer."

Stulz describes himself as a storytell-

er by trade, utilizing callbacks instead of just telling set ups and punch lines. As his life has changed, so have some of his stories.

For example, Stulz said while in the past he talked about his children, some of the focus now has shifted to his grandchildren.

efficient and allow for more parking spaces to be built in downtown Fenton.

However, the DDA has found that leaving the building up may offer its own set of advantages for the city.

The State of Michigan's Community Revitalization Program (CRP) has designated a fund of \$100 million to provide financial assistance for economic development projects. To qualify for the CRP, a project must share a border or be adjacent to an obsolete building.

The first building being developed in the Cornerstone project meets this criteria as the Republic Bank is considered an obsolete building.

Due to the proposed location of the second building the DDA will look to build in the future, keeping the building at 111 South LeRoy intact could allow the second phase qualify for money for the same program.

DDA Director Mike Burns said that money from the CRP could be used as an incentive to attract a developer to work on the second phase of the development project.

"There is potential for a million dollar incentive right there," Burns said. "If you tear it down, there goes the incentive. I don't know if that is an option we want to give up on, especially since our revenue is going to be much less after these projects are complete."

The issue is expected to be reviewed again by the DDA in six months.

designer at Haddon Nursery in Fenton. "We were really lucky here in the Fenton area. Even though it was a terrible drought, rainfall came at a critical time and gave us 2-3 inches. Those heavy August rains really saved our trees."

The temperatures in coming weeks will make a huge difference, according to Petts. "It all depends on the weather in the next 30 days. If it's really hot and dry, fall colors will be early and short. If it's a wet fall, the colors will come a little later. Trees are amazingly resilient, however. The trees that were stressed from the drought will likely change color early, and then drop their leaves quickly. Other trees that withstood the drought will be as bright as usual."

Bert Cregg, Michigan State University horticulturalist, agrees. "Based on what we're seeing so far, I'd say that color will arrive one to two weeks earlier than in prior years. In Alma (mid-Michigan), we're already seeing Sassafras and maples beginning to turn. Any rain we get this fall will help the leaves to hold on the trees longer. That's one of my concerns this year, that the color season will be shorter than usual."

Typically, the Keweenaw Peninsula debuts the state's

fall color show in mid-September. This northernmost point of the state juts into Lake Superior

in the western Upper Peninsula. The central U.P. and northern Lower Peninsula then get into the act with their own color show from late September until mid-October. The eastern U.P. and most of the rest of Michigan then follow from early to mid-October. A few shoreline pockets around the Lower Peninsula offer the final

show of Michigan fall color from mid- to late-October.

For weekly updates on Michigan's fall color, you can sign up on the home page of puremichigan.org.

Here are a few scenic tours to try:

CIRCLE LAKE CHARLEVOIX

Depart Boyne City north on Lake Street, passing Young State Park and on to Horton Bay (population 49 and former haunt of young Ernest Hemingway). Continue straight on C-56 to the stop at U.S. 31. Take a left for about one mile and then right on Mercer Boulevard, just before the golf course, and continue down to the last street. Take a left to the end and then take another left. You will pass, on the right, the turn into Mount McSauba Park (sand dunes, hiking trails and beach). Continue on to McSauba Road at the ski area, and take a right to the stop sign and then right again to U.S. 31. Continue straight over the "singing bridge" into town. Depart Charlevoix on U.S. 31 south to the blinking light junction of M-66. Take a left to Ironton. Turn left and board the ferry (\$2.50). Continue straight along Ferry Road back to Boyne City. Trip is 35 miles and approximately 50 minutes drive time plus possible waits for the bridge and ferry.

TRI-COUNTY TOUR

Depart Petoskey east on Mitchell Street (C-58) along hilly, winding countryside, passing Wildwood Road (turn for hiking and cross-country ski trails), to Wolverine. Take a right at the stop onto Straits Highway, following the Sturgeon River seven miles to Thumb Lake Road (C-48) and take a right. Continue on to U.S. 131, take a left to Boyne Falls and turn west on M-75 to Boyne City. Stay on M-75 (East Street to State Street) turning north through Walloon Lake Village to stop at U.S. 131. Turn left and return to Petoskey. Be sure to take a moment and enjoy the view cresting the hill entering town. Trip is 62 miles and approximately 1 1/4 hours drive time.

TUNNEL OF TREES

Depart Harbor Springs north along M-119, to Cross Village. Continue straight several miles to the stop sign and take a left to follow Lake Shore Drive to Lakeview Road at Sturgeon Bay (sand dunes and beach area). Continue straight on Lakeview, which becomes Gill Road. On Gill Road, continue three miles toward Bliss and the junction with Pleasantville Road (C-81). Continue on Pleasantville Road back to M-119 where a right will return you to Harbor Springs. Trip is 50 miles and approximately 1 1/4 hours.

Jeff Setzke is head coach for the Fenton High School varsity football team. He's also a Human Resources professional during the day. He is in his seventh year at FHS, after being head varsity coach at Bendle High School. Before that, he was a defensive coordinator for five years.

You try to build them up to be better players, but do they learn about life outside of football through your coaching? Oh, sure. We are teachers of football, but at the end of the day, we're teaching life skills, from leadership, to accountability to discipline, whether it's their first job after college, or if they get married. We'll get one or two that go on to college football, but most will be done after high school, so the skills have to be applied to other things.

pep assembly and the bonfires, the parade, but what it really is about is the football game. It can be a fun dance, but 'did you win the game?' That's what the question's going to be.

What can you tell me about Wounded Warriors? We started a project two years ago to raise funds and awareness for the Wounded Warriors Project, which is an organization that supports wounded veterans that have come back from war. The last two years we've raised over \$50,000 for the Wounded Warrior Project. We are again, on Oct. 12, at 7 p.m. playing our third annual Wounded Warrior game in Swartz Creek and we're out actively trying to raise funds and awareness as we speak.

She eats right, she works out and takes care of herself every day. She wants her face to reflect this same youthful vitality that the rest of her body shows.

That's why one local 69-year-old woman, who asked to remain anonymous, is in the pre-op area of the Skin and Vein Center in Fenton for "The Hour Lift," a mini-facelift procedure that's becoming more and more popular.

"We've been doing these for about 15 years, but they've become much more

Thinking about having 'The Hour Lift'?

Here's what to expect:

Q: What happens before the procedure?

A: Prior to surgery, you may be given a medication to help you relax. Local anesthesia is then administered to minimize discomfort.

Q: How long does the procedure take?

A: One to 1½ hours.

Q: What actually happens during the "One Hour Lift"?

A: A short incision is made in front of the ear. The surgeon gently lifts the tissues under the skin, removing any extra skin. The surgeon re-drapes the overlying skin, leaving the patient wrinkle-free with a firmer, more youthful jaw line.

Q: What can I expect during recovery?

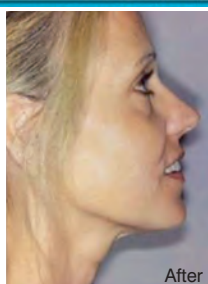
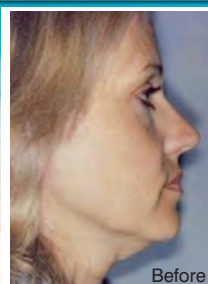
A: Post surgery, patients wear an ice-containing head garment for 24-48 hours. They are likely able to shampoo and wear make-up the day after surgery. Sutures will be removed in six to eight days.

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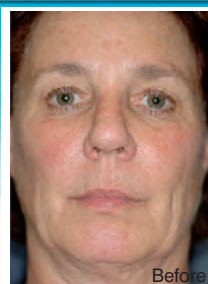

mainstream now since makeover shows on TV began to glamorize them about 10 years ago," said Dr. Eric Seiger, board certified dermatologist and cosmetic surgeon. "It's not a 'taboo' thing anymore."

Dr. Seiger estimates he has done between 2,500 and 3,000 of these procedures, on women as young as 24 and for a couple who was each 86 years old. "I'd say the median age for this surgery is about 58, and 95 percent of my patients are women. The results will last between five and 10 years, depending upon the patient."

The difference between The Hour Lift and a regular facelift is that The Hour Lift involves cutting the skin and tightening the facial muscles, rather than moving the facial muscles. The areas primarily improved by a facelift are the jowls, cheeks and neck. There's a huge difference in recovery time and price. "It's the difference between a three-day recovery and a two-week commitment," said Dr. Seiger.

The price is also a huge factor in a person's decision to undergo this procedure. Dr. Seiger says he used to charge \$3,800, and he cut the price to \$2,900 when the

economy changed a couple of years ago. A full facelift will cost between \$6,000 and \$15,000—depending upon the scope of the procedure. These elective cosmetic procedures are not covered by insurance.

"The number one thing that patients

say to me is, 'I don't want to look 20 years old again. I just want to look in the mirror and be able to look as good as I feel inside. I want to feel refreshed,'" said Dr. Seiger.

For the 69-year-old patient who was

resuming normal activities within three days.

Q: Does it hurt? Will I bruise or swell?

A: Approximately 85 percent of patients experience no bruising. There is minimal pain, controlled with oral medication.

Q: How long will the results last?

A: Look five to 10 years younger, with results lasting usually five to 10 years.

Q: Can I talk to anyone who has had the procedure?

A: The Skin and Vein Center can arrange for a contact with someone who has had the procedure and agrees to speak to prospective patients. Carol Beale, interviewed below, is one such person.

waiting for her procedure, The Hour Lift was not only for her own self-esteem, but also for her success in the business world. "A youthful appearance validates your professionalism," she said. "This is how we get measured for our success."

Meet Carol Beale

Carol Beale, 63, had a "One Hour Lift" when she turned 60, traveling from her home in Canton to the Skin and Vein Center in Fenton for the procedure.

She said the procedure was painless and she returned to work for a half-day just two days after surgery. "I laid-low the day I had the procedure done, and the next day," said Beale. "When I went back to work, I made sure not to bend over or lift anything."

Her face was a little bit bruised, but it wasn't very noticeable and was easily concealed with make-up and her hairstyle. "You wouldn't notice if you didn't know I had the procedure done," said Beale. "Once I was healed, though, people noticed all the time, because my skin really does look a lot smoother and more youthful. It's softer, too."

Beale advises people considering the procedure to use good quality skin care products on their skin afterwards, plus sunscreen.

The Pet Rock debuted in 1975 at \$3.95 — about **\$16 in the current economy. In just six months, Dahl sold more than 5 million pet rocks, raking in a profit equivalent to \$56 million in 2011.**



The Singing Fish

At some point, just about everyone has had an animatronic fish like Big Mouth Billy Bass, Boogie Bass or Rocky Rainbow Trout. **Sales of the fish (\$34.99) topped \$1 million in the year 2000 alone.**

Slinky

Somehow if the song had gone: "A spring, a spring, a marvelous thing! Everyone knows it's Industrial Equipment Stabilizers," it wouldn't have been quite as catchy.

Yet that was the intended use of the springs naval engineer **Richard James** was developing in 1943. The sensitive springs were meant to keep fragile equipment steady on ships. Then James knocked one of his new springs from a shelf and, like a kid on Christmas morning, watched it do that famous Slinky walk down instead of just hitting the ground, as Time noted in its all-time greatest toys list last year.

That's not all, either: The Slinky has found other uses, including as an antenna by soldiers in Vietnam and as a therapy tool. Whatever the use, everyone knows it's Slinky.

Corn Flakes

Dr. John Kellogg and his brother **Keith** would have fit right into today's world of new agey health fads. In 1894, however, they were probably laughed at as weirdo health freaks who put visitors at their hospital and health spa in Battle Creek, Michigan, through strange health regimens that included abstaining from meat, alcohol, tobacco, and even sex. One part of that regimen was eliminating caffeine by using a coffee substitute made of a type of granola. After cooking some wheat, the men were called away, as happens when you're running a busy sanatorium. When they came back, the wheat had become stale, but, ever the budget-conscious hippies, they decided to force it through the rollers anyway.

Instead of coming out in long sheets of dough, each wheat berry flattened and came out as a thin flake. The brothers baked the flakes, and, boom, a new breakfast cereal fad was born, as the Kellogg's official website points out.



Post-it notes

You know how when you're done with a Post-it note, you throw it in the wastebasket? Yeah, that was pretty much what **Spencer Silver** almost did when he was trying to develop a superstrong adhesive for 3M laboratories in 1968 and came up way short. Instead, he had invented the opposite: an adhesive that stuck to objects but could be easily lifted off.

Silver proselytized the potential uses of his new, sort-of-weak glue around 3M for years, all to deaf ears. Finally, a colleague named Art Fry attended one of Silver's seminars in 1974 (3M has long been known for encouraging employees to step outside of their own departments to see what people in other areas of the company are doing). Fry saw a use where no one else did: holding his page in his hymnbook, which his bookmarks kept falling out of. And when you added Silver's mild adhesive to paper bookmarks, a rudimentary Post-it note was born.



Pacemaker

Wilson Greatbatch made a classic dumb move: pulling the wrong part out of a box of equipment. It was a major act of numskullery that became a major part of saving millions of lives.

In 1956, Greatbatch was working on building a heart rhythm recording device at the University of Buffalo. He reached into a box and pulled out a resistor of the wrong size and plugged it into the circuit. When he installed it, he recognized the rhythmic lub-dub sound of the human heart. The beat, according to his 2001 obituary in The New York Times, reminded him of chats he had had with other scientists about whether an electrical stimulation could make up for a breakdown in the heart's natural beats. Before then, pacemakers were hulking machines the size of TVs. Greatbatch's implantable device of just 2 cubic inches forever changed life expectancy in the world. Now, more than half a million of the devices are implanted every year. Not bad for a numskull.



Potato chips

Inventor: George Crum, a chef at the Carey Moon Lake House in Saratoga Springs

What they were trying to make: A plate of fried potatoes.

How it was created: One day a customer sent back his plate of potatoes many times and kept asking for them to be more fried and thinner. Crum lost his temper, sliced the potatoes insanely thin and fried them until they were hard as a rock. To the chef's surprise, the customer loved them and wanted more!



Silly Putty

Inventor: James Wright, an engineer at General Electric

What he was trying to make: During World War II, The United States government needed rubber airplane tires, boots for soldiers, etc. Wright was trying to make a rubber substitute out of silicon, since it was a widely available material. **How it was created:** During a test on silicon oil, Wright added boric acid to the substance. The result was a gooey mess that bounced. Although no one could find any real use for it, it became a fun toy!



Penicillin

Like anyone eager to go on vacation, **Alexander Fleming** left a pile of dirty petri dishes stacked up at his workstation before he left town. When he returned from holiday on Sept. 3, 1928, he began sorting through them to see if any could be salvaged, discovering most had been contaminated — as you might expect would happen in a bacteria lab in a hospital.

As has been well-documented in history books and on the Nobel Prize website, Fleming dumped most of the dishes in a vat of Lysol. But when he got to a dish containing staphylococcus, something odd caught his eye. The dish was covered in colonies of bacteria, except in one area where a blob of mold was growing. Around the mold was an area free of bacteria, as if the mold had blocked the bacteria from spreading. He realized it could be used to kill a wide range of bacteria — and penicillin was identified.

From that minor act of scientific sloppiness, we got one of the most widely used antibiotics today.

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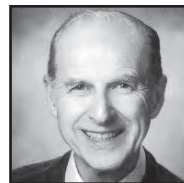

Alone in a traffic jam

The accident ahead had closed one lane of the expressway and slowed traffic to a crawl. As far as I could see, the line of cars before me snaked its way southward at a snail's pace entirely ignoring my fast approaching appointment.

Common questions raced through my mind resurrected from memories of other similar situations: Why hadn't I left earlier? What would those who were depending on me do if I didn't arrive on time? How much time would this traffic tie-up cost me?

Then a glance to my right changed everything. In the distance, on a hillside, stood a white steepled church, nestled in a grove of trees clothed in gorgeous autumn colors.

This was a time to worship, not worry, a time to give thanks for a slowdown that had called my attention to the beauty that surrounded me in this rolling, multicolored, Lake Michiganside terrain that silently spoke so eloquently of its Creator.

That was when I heard Steve Green, one of my favorite recording artists, filling my car with a moving song of praise. Steve had been singing all the while I had been stewing but I had been so occupied with my predicament that I hadn't been tuned in.

Now reality broke through: being delayed was no great tragedy after all. Here I was surrounded by breathtaking beauty that spoke of the plan and power of my Lord with far more eloquence than I would be able to muster when I reached my destination. And even if I never arrived, another would take my place, empowered by the one who schedules this divine display of

color every year.

I'm not the first to be moved to worship by the wonders of creation. 'The heavens declare the glory of God and the firmament shows His handiwork. Day unto day utters speech, and night unto night reveals knowledge. There is no speech nor language where their voice is not heard,' said the Psalmist (Psalms 19:1-3). My favorite commentator on the Psalms says of this text: 'Any part of creation has more instruction in it than human minds will ever exhaust. Every moment God's existence, power, wisdom and goodness are being sounded abroad by the heavenly heralds which shine on us from above.'

According to the Bible, this continuing sermon by God's handiwork leaves every person on earth without excuse (Romans 1:10). In other words, nature's long lecture about God's love is intended to remind us that the One who created everything according to His eternal plan has a special place in it for you and me and that we are accountable to Him for what we do with our lives.

Now I'm convinced that my expressway slowdown was no accident. I nearly missed creation's sermon that Sunday while hurrying to deliver my own. Without that traffic jam slowdown, I might have missed God's great sermon in splendor.

This is not to say we ought to choose nature walks and color tours over public worship. The same Book that declares the glory of God is found in creation, warns us not to forsake gathering with others for worship and praise (Hebrews 10:25).

In spite of my divinely ordered delay, I was able to get to the church on time, arriving enriched by the scenic sermon along the way.

If you're in jam today, look for evidences of the Creator's design in your slowdown. God wants to do beautiful things in your life.

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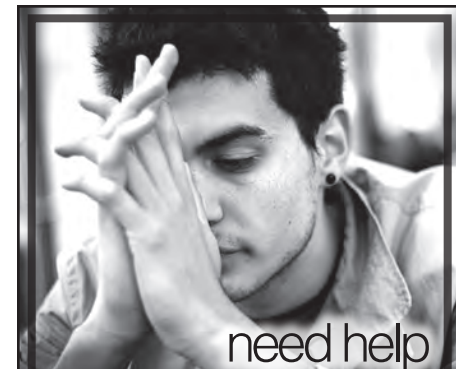

DEAR DR. DONOHUE: I have suffered with restless leg syndrome for 25 years. What causes it? Is there a cure? I do take Requip. Some say that having the veins in your legs stripped helps. Does it? — C.K.

ANSWER: Stabbing pain, a burning feeling and a creepy-crawly sensation in the legs are some of the ways people describe restless leg syndrome. The sensation mostly comes on in the evening when sitting in a chair or, more often upon going to bed. The night is punctuated with interruptions of sleep, as the sensations wake a person. They drive the person to get up and walk about until these annoying feelings go way. Walking does get rid of them, but the respite is only temporary. The attacks reach peaks at midnight and again around 4 a.m.

For most, a cause cannot be found. Sometimes it's a family affair, passed by the parent to the children. In a few instances, iron deficiency anemia, renal failure and Parkinson's disease are associated with it. The anemia connection is worth checking out, since it has a definite cure — iron tablets.

The medicine you mention, Requip (ropinirole) is one often prescribed for this problem. If you've been taking it for some time without relief, you ought to try some of the other medicines used for it. Mirapex (pramipexole) and Neurontin (gabapentin) are two others. A new variety of gabapentin called Horizant comes as an extended-release tablet, so medication is delivered to the body throughout the night.

A warm bath before going to bed, coupled with a leg massage afterward, often can cut down on the number of attacks and their intensity. Restricting alcohol and caffeine works for some people. Removing leg veins will not help.

Paranoid mother-in-law infuriates family

DEAR AMY: My father-in-law told my mother-in-law he wanted a divorce. My mother-in-law ended up with the house, and accuses her former spouse of entering her home and helping himself to her possessions. She has had the locks changed at least four times (she insists he has a "master" key). She has reported specific days when she "knows" he was in her house, even though we know it was impossible because he was hundreds of miles away on those days. She is driving my wife crazy, with screaming matches taking place over the phone that inevitably end with my wife in tears. I told my wife that her mother is manipulating her, trying to get her to declare exclusive loyalty. I don't know what to tell my wife to put an end to this nonsense. — Had it Husband

DEAR HUSBAND: I think it's possible that your mother-in-law may have some sort of cognitive impairment. Her paranoia and confusion should worry, rather than enrage, you. The first and most important response she should give is to take her to get a thorough medical checkup. Your wife should disengage by saying, "I don't want to talk about this with you, mom. Let's talk later."

DEAR AMY: My unmarried niece is expecting a baby in late January. My sister says it is OK to give unwed mothers a baby shower. I realize it is done all the time, but I am unable to get excited about the baby. I feel it is in bad taste to give my niece a shower. What do you think? At what point in the pregnancy should a baby shower be given? — Upset Aunt

DEAR UPSET: You don't need to get excited about this baby. Nor do you need to attend a baby shower. However, you should know that this baby is joining your family, regardless of your attitude about it.
