



Fenton Community and Cultural Center breaks ground

► Renovations and additions planned to begin next spring

Fenton — Small events can signal big things for a community. On Wednesday afternoon, the groundbreaking ceremony for the expansion and renovation of the Fenton Community and Cultural Center was held on the south lawn at the center.

A ceremonial shovel and hard hat photo-op was held, along with light refreshments and unveiling of the fundraising plaque.

Before the ceremonial groundbreaking, several speakers briefly addressed the crowd, including Downtown Development Authority (DDA) Director Craig Schmidt. "I hope the community can get behind this project," he said. The first phase of the renovation is two new multicultural classrooms and improved wheelchair and elevator access. Southern Lakes Parks and Recreation (SLPR) Director Vince Paris said the plan for the facilities is still being designed.

So far, \$1.6 million out of the necessary \$2 million has been raised. Paris said he hopes to have real construction starting after the frost breaks in 2013. "This is a very historical day," said Paris. "It's a big deal for the community."

The event was also the culmination of six years of fundraising by co-chairs Patricia Lockwood and Bob Burek. The DDA contributed \$1.3 million and \$300,000 was raised from donations.

Lockwood is excited about the possibilities of the historical building. Aside from the classroom additions, See GROUND on 24A



ments and respects. Twitter accounts, meanwhile, can be simply closed by sending an email with the request, and the appropriate documents. Similarly, upon notification of your death, Yahoo! will close any of your accounts that you have.

If it is important for the email of the deceased to be accessed, it is possible in some cases. Both Gmail and Hotmail can be contacted to provide certain information, provided you can provide a copy of the death certificate as well as providing proof that you are the next of kin, or have power of attorney. The process can take a long time, and is not always guaranteed.

For those who really want to plan ahead, there are a couple of programs available that can help you get your online affairs in order.

Legacy Locker, available at www. legacylocker.com, will allow you to securely store all of your passwords in case you ever

forget them. Additionally, the program can store backups of important documents such as contracts and deeds. On the event that your death is confirmed by two different people that you have assigned as verified, they will be given access to your information. The program comes in free versions, an annual fee of \$30, or a one-time fee of \$300.

SecureSafe, which can be found at www.securesafe.com, offers similar

storage features to Legacy Locker for a monthly fee. No amount of planning beforehand may help you with transferring digital

products, such as music from iTunes or ebooks from Amazon. When you purchase these items online, you are not necessarily purchasing the song or book, but instead the license to use them.

Currently, the license to use those digital products is not transferrable—though that may or may not change in the future, as the matter is challenged in courts.

Evan James Wells, 37, was arraigned on Friday, Oct. 19 in Oakland County's 52-2 District Court. He is being held on \$1 million bond in the Oakland County Jail.

Wells was arrested near the scene for aggravated assault and parole violations and was taken to the county jail. He has been lodged since last Friday night on a parole detainer from Flint Parole and was arraigned Friday via video from jail.

Holly police responded to Martini's Bar & Grill at 10:20 p.m. on Friday, Oct. 12 after receiving a report that an assault had just occurred. Responding officers found the victim, Ronald Smith, 43, of Highland and formerly of Holly, unconscious outside the bar.

Police said that Wells allegedly punched Smith in the face, causing Smith to fall backward. Smith's head struck the concrete when he fell. He was transported to Genesys Health Park in Grand Blanc Township with severe brain injuries. Smith never regained consciousness and doctors pronounced him dead on Monday, Oct. 15.

The Oakland County Medical Examiner has determined that Smith's cause of death was homicide due to blunt force trauma to his head. Wells' next court date is Nov. 1 at 8:30 a.m.

Friends of Smith have organized a benefit spaghetti dinner for this Sunday at Martini's Bar & Grill.



not planning to vote by absentee ballot, here's what you need to know on Tuesday, Nov. 6, when you visit your voting precinct:

Be prepared to wait. Fenton Township Operations Manager Thomas Broecker said presidential elections historically have the highest turnout of voters. With six state proposals, three Genesee County

proposals, numerous state and local candi-



dates vying for positions and bond proposals all on one ballot, getting in and out of the voting booth may take some time.

"We're going to have as many voting stations as possible to keep things moving," Broecker said. After the first few hours, things settle down and it only takes voters about 15 minutes to vote.

Bring ID. Election workers will request

to see government issued photo identification, whether it is a driver's license, state ID card or passport. Don'thave a photo ID? Some precincts may allow you to sign an affidavit, swearing that you

ID? Some precincts may allow you to sign an affidavit, swearing that you are who you are. Bringing a photo ID will make the process smoother, however,

so bring it if you can. **Know how you'll vote ahead of time.** This year's ballot is two pages front and

back or four pages total. Know ahead of time who you're voting for and what the proposals are. The voting booth is not the best time to make split-second decisions.

"It's perfectly acceptable to bring notes, cheat sheets or campaign literature," Broecker said. Those who do bring notes must keep it to themselves while voting and are not allowed to leave it at the voting booth after they leave.

Know where your voting station is. Voting in Fenton will take place at the Activity Center of St. John's Church; in Fenton Township at the gym in Lake Fenton High School; in Holly at the Holly High School gym, and in Linden at Faith Baptist Church on Silver Lake Road.

Polls will be open from 7 a.m. to 8 p.m. Fenton City Clerk Jennifer Naismith said voters who are in line at 8 p.m. will still be allowed to vote.

View the ballot before you vote. For all other inquiries on voting, be sure to visit Michigan.gov/vote. Voters can type in their names and find out if they're registered to vote and where their precincts are. The website also shows which issues are specific to your local community, such as a school bond proposal or a millage. The website can also answer any other questions voters may have about the election process.

"It will show you a digital copy of what the ballot looks like," Naismith said. "Do some research and gauge how you're going to cast your vote."


One veteran actress he can always rely on is Yvonne

420," a character she made up herself, with her own back story. Her makeup was intentionally unsettling. Her face was dirty and she wore a rumpled hospital gown. Her head was shaved into stringy patches to make room for

the grossest part yet a patch of living butter worms secured to her stage makeup. They looked like giant maggots. "Sometimes they'll move for you if they get warm," she said.

If the timing is right, she'll pull one off her head and eat it in front of a guest. "It freaks 'em out honey, that's my job, to make them cry, scream, laugh, poop, pee, and run for cover."

Many actors do the job for fun, though most are paid for their work. Sometimes their work gets rowdy, when a frantic customer throws a punch out of surprise.

Aside from scheduling actors, the haunt requires a lot of upkeep to stay running. Excited customers break things, sometimes in Summary

the middle of a weekend run. On Friday, a mirror and a strobe light were broken by a guest.

An air line also disconnected and they had to shut down pneumatic animatronic props and close the haunt for 20 minutes. A staff electrician fixed the prop — the

"shovel girl" in the beginning of the show. "We want them to see the whole show," said Werner. Haunted attraction props have a short shelf life and maintenance and repairs begin early in the morning, sometimes running up to show time.

The shows are planned and coordinated by Werner with a five-person committee, who comes up with ideas and changes to the haunt. "There's a lot of feedback to it," he said. This can come from the committee or the public or the actors that feel like a sketch or scare just isn't working. They're already planning for next year, removing a room they feel has gotten stale.

With 70 or 80 groups running through the haunt every night, safety is an important consideration. The fire department inspects the haunt for safety, and Werner is part of the Haunted Attraction Association, and is certified through safety programs.

Freshman Mackenzie Kato, who came out about halfway into the cross country season, placed fourth overall with a time of 21:02.2. She was followed by Laura Carlson in 10th (21:48.8), Becky Fernelius in 15th (22:16.1), Kim Rowe in 45th (25:22.9) and C.J. Simon in 53rd (26:19.9).

"The girls went into the race in fifth place and took fourth place at the meet. You always like to see your team beat a team they didn't beat during the duals," Sobczyk said.

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
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Linden girls edge Holly for league crown

The Linden girls cross country team had its entire top five finish the Metro League's final meet in the top 12, and also had the race's top two finishers.

Meanwhile, the defending champion Holly Bronchos had their entire top five place within the top 10.

But when the points were tallied, it was the Linden Eagles who defeated the Holly Bronchos by just one point at the Metro League meet, earning the Metro League championship at Brandon Township Park on Wednesday.

Linden finished with 35 points, just one ahead of Holly's point total of 36. Meanwhile, the Fenton Tigers placed third in the nineteam field with 103 points. Holly won the first jamboree, while the Eagles won the second. With the teams tied entering Wednesday, that meant whoever won the meet took first. Linden won.

"It's awesome because our last two races we won by one point," said Linden's junior runner and Metro champion Sydney Elmer. "When you win by one point, every single person, every single thing they did, if they didn't do it, we would've lost. ... Every single person knows that if we didn't give it everything we got, we wouldn't have won, so it make it that more exciting."

"It's really inspiring because we've all worked so hard to win," Linden senior Karrah Varner said. "It's really encouraging and gratifying that we can win something like this."

"It makes me feel great that our whole team can work together and push each other so we can win," senior runner Aleighsha Engisch said.

While the Eagles were excited to get a Metro title for the first time since 2010, the Bronchos had to deal with looking at otherwise outstanding results and realizing it was one point short.

"We ran about as well as we could and still lost. It was one of those five percent of times when a team can be under 40 points in a championship meet and still lose," Holly coach Matt Weisdorfer said. "It's just a tough loss to take. I think the whole team, including myself, feels like we lost a championship basketball game by a last-second jumper with no time left on the clock. It just hurts."

And while Linden won the meet, the Eagles also had the top two runners as well. Elmer won the race (19:51.6) while teammate McKayla Guy placed second (20:01.0). The two ran together until about the final half-mile when Elmer, the defending individual Metro champion, took a lead and held on to it.

"It was really exciting. Me and Kckayla decided to run together for the majority of the race," Elmer said. "Toward the end we decided we'd race to the finish. ... Our main goal was to run together, finish 1-2 for league points, and that was huge part of (the team victory)."

"I think she motivates me to go faster," said Guy, a freshman, about Elmer. "I know when I'm a senior, people will look up to me like people look up to her now."

The top two Linden runners were followed by Courtney Davis in ninth (21:21.4), Engisch in 11th (21:49.1) and Varner in 12th (21:51.2). Kailee Corcoran also finished in the top 20, taking 19th (22:27.6).

Holly didn't have anyone in the top four, but then had five of the next six positions, starting with Maggie Schneider in fifth (21:04.4). The rest of Holly's scorers were Charlotte Ruffini in sixth (21:15.5), Shannon Westfall in seventh (21:27.6), Alex Matvchuk in eighth (21:29.4) and Abby Brown in 10th (21:41.4).

"Losing in the manner we lost is really difficult to digest," Weisdorfer said. "I mean, we put four runners ahead of their third and our fifth beat their fourth runner to boot, and we still lost. Basically speaking, when a team goes 1-2 in the meet, their fifth runner does not have that much pressure on them. In our case we had a lot

of pressure... knowing we had to put five in front of their third in order to win. We came just one place short."

Fenton swim's win streak kept alive after Brandon DQ, 93-92

It looked like the Brandon Blackhawks had ended the Fenton Tigers' 42-meet win streak in Metro League action was over after Brandon won the 400 freestyle relay, ending the dual meet at Brandon High School. It was a run that started when the Metro League started recognizing girls swimming as a conference championship sport.

However, during some of the Blackhawks' jubilation, someone jumped in the pool before the event was completed, resulting in a disqualification, and earning the Tigers the 93-92 verdict.

The win means the Tigers still haven't lost a dual meet in league history, but for Jones, it wasn't the way he wanted to see his squad win. Jones is good friends with Brandon coach Todd Duncan and works with him and some of the Brandon swimmers during the offseason through other programs.

"We were the (winning) recipients of a bad call. We lost last night," Jones said. "We did not swim our best and Brandon suffered from a pretty costly mistake. Unfortunately, it changed the outcome of the meet when they jumped in. After the meet I told Todd and his girls, 'You won the meet.' I feel as bad for their kids as I do my kids."

Fenton has been the dominant swim program in the Metro League since 2004, and have never been seriously threatened in any sort of league competition until Thursday night. The Tigers entered the final race, needing a win, and initially it looked like they didn't get it, as Brandon's team finished with a time just under two seconds better than Fenton's 400 relay team. However, then the celebration began with the jumping in the pool, resulting in the disqualification. It is a rule that members are not allowed to jump into a pool while an **See FENTON on 21A**

Fenton — The teams had faced each other three other times, each with a 1-1-1 mark.

So it shouldn't have been too shocking to see the fourth chapter of the Fenton-Linden boys soccer rivalry be decided by a goal.

But this year's election doesn't have to include idling in lines at voting precincts and fuming over ballot language at the polls. Registered voters have the option of obtaining absentee ballots, which can be retrieved from respective city or township halls.

We're anticipating 3,200 to 3,500 voters to vote absentee," said Thomas Broecker, operations manager for Fenton Township. "I would say there will be around 80 percent voter turnout at the polls. Historically the elections with the highest percentage are the presidential elections."

Broecker said voters registered in Fenton Township must fill out an application at the township offices before receiving their ballot. From there, voters can either fill out their ballots at the township office or take it home and complete it. Those who take home their ballots have the option of mailing their ballots to the offices or delivering it themselves.

For residents who live out of town, Broecker said absentee ballots can be mailed to them after calling or emailing township officials. Broecker said ballots can even be emailed to those who are currently residing outside of the United States.

'Voters should be requesting or filling out absentee ballots quickly, especially if done by mail. The election is almost three

weeks away," Broecker said. "It takes two to three days to get it to them and then two to three days to get it back to us. The more voters wait, the more there's a risk it might not come back to us in time."

Fenton City Clerk Jennifer Naismith said the last day absentee ballots can be mailed out is Nov. 5, the Monday before the election. Absentee ballots that arrive to township or city offices the day of the election will be counted. Anything later and absentee ballots become null and void.

Broecker and Naismith said one advantage of voting absentee is voters have more time to do research on proposals, candidates and other issues on the ballot.

"This ballot is obviously quite large, it's two pages front and back. Be conscious that there are two sides," Naismith said. "You need to send two pages back. Essentially, we have a four-page ballot. It will take some time to fill out."

For voters who know they will vote absentee in future elections, it may be worth their time to see if their municipality has a permanent absentee ballot list. Broecker said about 700 to 800 voters in Fenton Township are on such a list, where ballots are mailed out every election to a designated address.

"In the August primary, there's a spot to check off for an absentee ballot for the November general," Broecker said. "Checking that would eliminate the need to call (in November)."

She said the Fenton Artist's Guild can help provide direction in how to use the new rooms and she even


 mentioned including the Flint Cultural Center.

"I really didn't want our kids to leave home to get their education," said Holly, who is still teaching the two youngest at home. "I didn't want the world to be the ones influencing them by sending them out the door to school five days a week, up to eight hours a day."

According to many homeschooling websites, Michigan is considered a homeschool-friendly state that provides leniency to parents who choose



to teach their children at home. Based on census and school enrollment data, about 65,000 Michigan students between the ages of 5 and 17 aren't enrolled in either public or private school—about 3.5 percent of the state's school-age population.

While the Hoffmans

have chosen to homeschool their children, Holly's the first to praise local schools, including the Lake Fenton district, which helped them when Jacob was diagnosed with autism as a toddler. She attributes much of Jacob's success today

"Every child has different needs," explained Holly. "It's important with a special-needs child that you explore all the resources available, and don't assume that one style of education will be better than another. Some will do better in a public school setting, others in private school or homeschooled. Under our roof, we have

four kids who have four different learning styles."

She firmly believes that there are sacrifices each family must make, no matter which educational route they choose. "It is a huge sacrifice for me to stay home with the kids," said Holly. "We don't have things that most families have, like cable TV.

But I do love the close relationship we have because we spend so much time together."

One of the most challenging aspects for new homeschooling families is choosing a curriculum. "It can be overwhelming,"

admits Holly. "But you don't have to spend a lot of money. The library is a wonderful resource that we use every week. When looking for materials, I always try the library first, then a used book store, next online and my last option is to buy it new."

Lori Coeman, curriculum consultant at Mott Media in Fenton, estimates that it costs approximately \$200 per year for grade school curriculum and \$500-\$600 for high school curriculum — depending on what families choose. Mott Media is the curriculum provider for homeschoolingbooks.com, an online resource for homeschooling families.

In addition to teaching her own children at home, Holly and her husband Dave are also active in CHASE (Christian Homeschoolers for Athletic Sports Excellence), which provides sports programs for homeschooled kids throughout Genesee County, including girls volleyball, boys basketball and soccer. "There are lots of opportunities for the kids," said Holly. "We compete with other homeschoolers and Christian schools."

Holly coordinates a homeschool art program at Tyrone Covenant Presbyterian Church by bringing in a traveling artist for a three-hour art class once a month. She also insists that each of her sons take two years of piano instruction before they're able to "graduate" from homeschool.

"The benefits far outweigh the challenges for our family," said Holly. But she's also open to the fact that Michael will be off to college next year and Andy will be the only "student" left at home. Would it be possible that their family might decide for Andy to attend public school? "There would be a lot of discussion and prayer on that," said Holly.



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
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

Reagan was 73 years old at the time, and already held the record for being the oldest person to be inaugurated as the President from his previous term, a record that he still holds to this day. When asked during a debate if his age would affect his ability to lead the country, Reagan said it would not, then replied with a humorous quip.

"I will not make age an issue of this campaign. I am not going to exploit for political purposes my opponent's youth and inexperience," he said.

and finds himself being out run by his son in these outdoor activities. Gunner can sit patiently and wait while Page and his friends duck hunt. "He's more of an outdoorsman than I am," said Page. Gunner has reeled in his own 18-pound bass, and hunts for morels.

He is still too young for a real rifle, and Page is teaching him about hunter's safety.

Page sees hunting and gathering morel mushrooms as part of the American heritage. "In life, I think it's something we share together," he said. "It shows you take everything from Mother Nature you can, and not abuse it." So far, Gunner likes to try eating anything he can catch.

Jeff Polakowski of Holly Township has hunted since he was 16 and hoped to pass the experience onto his family. "I believe that families that hunt together stick together and we certainly have fun with it," he said.

His sons Jacob, 13, and Jeffrey, 16, are "nuts" about hunting. It was tough though for them to get over killing the deer, turkey or duck they were hunting, and also gutting the animal. "They understand they have to gut it and everything," he said. "It's tough for kids to break into that part too."

Polakowski's two younger daughters haven't expressed interest, yet. His wife doesn't hunt, but she enjoys venison and understands the culture and family ties of hunting. The family will eat all manner of chili and venison sloppy Joes after a catch. "I think it's great to be in the outdoors with nature, I just think it's a good life experience," he said.


of hunting. In the southern half of lower Michigan, hunters can only use shorterrange weapons, like bows, shotguns and slug guns, that have a maximum range of 100 yards. "We don't shoot anything past 30 yards, which isn't very far," said Polakowski.

They have to outsmart animals with keen vision and a sharp sense of smell. Both boys have already bagged bucks themselves.

Jacob took down his first big buck, a 15-pointer, with three arrows recently at a youth outing. "It felt pretty awesome, because I shot a bigger one than my brother," he said. Neither brother is too competitive when it comes to hunting, though. "It's nice having my dad by my side," he said. Jacob got into hunting because of family and would like to hunt for the rest of his life. "The adrenaline of seeing a deer and being able to shoot it is on of the greatest feelings in the world."

Jeffrey does it for fun, and to relax. "Being outside, out in nature, it's so peaceful outside," he said. While hunting, the pressures of school and life can slip away.

Kim Oliger of Fenton was proud when her daughter Kayla, 17, bagged a 180-pound bear in September. She said hunting gives her teenage daughter something to always have in common with her father. "I think it brings them closer together, kids get teenaged, some of them just don't have a lot in common," she said. "At this age, it's a one-on-one."

Mitchell Farms Celebrates 175 years, remains open for fall visitors through Oct. 31

In the fall, you'll find him dressed for work in denim overalls, a bright orange sweatshirt and a baseball cap. During the winter and spring, he'll don a suit, dress shirt and tie.

Glenn Mitchell owns Mitchell Farms — dating back more than 175 years — at 3404 Mitchell Rd. in Holly, with brothers, Howard and David and sister, Marilyn. "Our family came over from Ireland and settled here in 1837," said Mitchell. "I believe we're the oldest farm still operating in the area."

After Mitchell Farms closes for the season on Oct. 31, Mitchell will tackle his second job, as an income tax preparer and owner of The Tax Center in Holly. Once tax season is over, he'll begin the busy season of selling bedding plants and vegetable plants at the farm, while planting and harvesting acres of corn, soybeans and wheat.

For now, Mitchell's days are busy, reaping the rewards of a bountiful pumpkin growing season, and sharing his love of the land with more than 3,000 school children who visit the farm every October. "This year has been an excellent pumpkin year for us," said Mitchell.

The farm includes three different pumpkin fields. One is a pick-yourown field for school children, the other is for weekend farm visitors and the third field is to grow different varieties of pumpkins, squash, gourds, etc.

Weekends at Mitchell Farms are busy, too, with visitors stopping in to buy a fresh pumpkin, visit with J.R., the "watch donkey," or enjoy a number of farm-related activities.

"We spend about a month-and-a-half getting the farm ready for pumpkin season in October," said Mitchell, whose wife, Candy works alongside him. In addition to a farm store, there are many play areas for children to enjoy — from giant haystacks to climb on to wooden animals for play, seed corn to play trucks in, large plastic pipes to climb in, and more.

After Mitchell Farms closes for the season on Oct. 31, it will reopen May 1, 2013 for the spring season.

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Playing poker for a living

Former Michigan native reflects on playing in Main **Event in Las Vegas**

well chased the dream of every poker player. As a professional Texas Hold

'Em Poker player, Shotwell made it to the Holy Grail of poker games, competing in the Main Event of the World Series of Poker in Las Vegas. And although he didn't win, the experience has given Shotwell skills that he will use for the rest of his life.

Summary David Shotwell has played at the Main Event in Las Vegas, which pays millions of dollars to the top placers. Shotwell didn't make it to the top however, and now uses his experiences on the pro poker circuit toward writing

"It's very diffi-

cult to be good at the game, sustain it and balance it with a personal life," Shotwell said on playing poker professionally. "It's so different from any other job. Your hobby becomes your life."

Shotwell decided to pursue poker as a career after watching Rounders, a movie about high stakes poker. He developed his skills by reading and playing as much online poker as possible, winning as much as \$8,000 in a weekend from online tournaments. Shotwell grew confident enough to bet it all and try his luck in Las Vegas.

Shotwell played dozens of tournaments and competed in the Main Event once. After six hours of playing and going up against hundreds of players, Shotwell was eventually beaten by a Four-of-a-Kind hand, despite having a Full House. Still, he said he met the nicest people during the event, which isn't always the case in high stakes poker games.

"It was very fun, it's a

good group," Shotwell said. 'The tournament is like a lotto ticket. They know one of these people could become astonishingly rich.'

But no matter how good you are at the game and no matter how many friendships you develop, Shotwell said the game will wear you down.

"Poker is an isolationist life — your coworkers are your competitors," Shotwell said. "Your loss is their win. A lot of kids get jaded. I was jaded."

Shotwell described the 'regulars' of the poker circuit as 55-year-old obese unmarried men. Nerds, jocks, degenerates, ex-convicts and people with competitive personalities are some of

the players you can be sure to come across while running the gauntlet of big league Texas Hold 'Em. Shotwell developed a lot of friends who he couldn't stand speaking to.

"People go broke not because they're bad at poker. They go broke because they don't plan (their money)," Shotwell said. "Self

discipline is the number one attribute in poker."

So where does a professional poker player go after they fold their last hand? Ironically, Shotwell is now in the line of work that inspired him to play poker the movie business. Shotwell moved to Los Angeles and currently writes movie scripts. He is in the process of submitting a movie to film festivals, including the Sundance and Toronto festivals.

The five years of playing poker has influenced Shotwell's writing, particularly when it comes to a character's habits or delivery of speech.

"What I've learned from poker is that I definitely am a people reader," Shotwell said. "I know people's subtext more aptly than other people do. It translates over into how I write about people."

Would Shotwell do it all over again, knowing what he knew now?

"I would never say (anyone) shouldn't play it for a year. It's such a slim percentage for the long term path though."

How to become a professional

Shotwell's favorite quote on the game of poker is "In the time it takes to be a good poker player, you could have become a doctor." Mastering the game of poker takes dedication and hard work. Here's some advice from a former pro:

· Get involved in the online community. Shotwell recommends the website twoplustwo.com, where many users share strategies, former hands and other tidbits on the game.

· Play the game as much as possible. Visit the local casino or get regular games going. The more people you play, the better you become. Be forewarned though that regulars to the game are not always experts. Pay attention to the online community too.

 Read up on strategy. The more poker books you read, the more you can contribute to online communities and apply to your games.

Why appreciate your pastor?

October is 'Pastor Appreciation Month,' but some may wonder why pastors deserve an official time to be appreciated.

What's so special about the ministry? Frequently, I look back to my youth and give thanks for pastors who made positive changes in my life. Perhaps the primary reason for appreciating pastors is because of their important role of being life changers.

Some don't appreciate these servants of God and seize any opportunity to depreciate them and their work. These critics are always looking for some sign of hypocrisy in pastors that will provide an excuse for their absence at worship services intended to build faith and head troubled hearers in the right direction.

Pastors who pay attention to these critics may find themselves discouraged and unable to carry on their important work. In his book, 'The Tongue — Angel or Demon?' George Sweeting wrote, 'Contentious tongues have hindered the work of God a thousand times over. Critical tongues have broken the hearts and health of many pastors.'

On the other hand, the late A.B. Simpson, founder of the Christian and Missionary Alliance denomination, was convinced these fault finders are inviting self destruction, writing: 'I would rather take forked lightning or live electrical wires in my hands than to speak a reckless word against any

servant of Christ.'

But back to our question: Why appreciate your pastor?

The most important reason may be that pastors are gifts of God to the churches (Ephesians 4:11). These sermon makers and life changers are more than educated public speakers, trained counselors and apt administrators. They are people called of God to lead churches and draw individuals to faith that flows from believing the gospel.

Pastors are also guides for ascending the hills and going through the valleys of life.


board position and took employment elsewhere.



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Our Chamber's endorsement process For more than 15 years, our Chamber has been hosting a Meet the Candidates event. We are one of a growing number of Chambers in the state that also has an Endorsement Policy. Our Endorsement Policy has been part of our Chamber By-laws since Sept. 5, 2001.

Recently on Oct. 9, the Fenton Regional Chamber of Commerce held its annual Meet the Candidates event. While we appreciate the media coverage we receive on the actual happenings at the event, I thought it would be nice to share with you the process and procedures the Political Action Committee follows for this event each year. Whether we are featuring candidates running for City Council or for the 51st District State Representative, the process is consistent. Several months in advance, the date is set for the Meet the Candidates event. The committee then develops a questionnaire to be sent to each candidate being featured at our event. Once the questionnaire is returned by the candidate, it is then used to help the committee formulate business related questions that will be asked at the event. Other ballot candidates are invited to attend the event and granted a two-minute introduction. However, all questions through the moderator are directed at the featured candidates.

Once the moderator has finished asking the questions developed by the committee, the audience is welcome to submit questions on provided 3x5 cards, which are read by the moderator. During the event, the Chamber's Political Action Committee takes notes to refer to when they meet as a committee and score each candidate. According to the Chamber's Endorsement Policy, candidates will receive a score on a 100-point scale. The candidate's overall score will be derived from his or her score in each of the categories below. This score may be impacted by their participation in the process.

Their views/performance in certain areas will be weighted as follows: Business issues =

50 percent of overall score Community issues =

15 percent of overall score

Creativity and Policy Making expertise = 15 percent of overall score

Experience/Community Service = 10 percent of overall score

Public Speaking and Presentation = 10 percent of overall score

After the committee completes the scoring process, candidates receiving a score of 70 or more are recommended to the Board of Directors for endorsement. The Board of Directors holds a ballot vote at their October Board Meeting. If the endorsement passes, the Political Action Committee sends out a press release on behalf of the Board to the media. The endorsement objective is to identify candidates who best represent the Chamber's mission and values through a comprehensive endorsement process that is fair and equitable to all.

Local non-profit groups will be participating such as the Boy Scouts will be offering hot chocolate, a Mom2Mom bake sale, Kiwanis Club will serve hot dogs, and more. "We're inviting community groups to get involved, because 100 percent of the proceeds will go to the organization," said Lockwood.

Entertainment will begin at 2 p.m. with the Mott College Steel Drum Band in the Vek's parking lot downtown from 2 to 6 p.m.

DEAR DR. DONOHUE: Please give me information on Alzheimer's disease. I am very active. I would appreciate anything you can tell me about this illness. — H.N.

ANSWER: Alzheimer's disease is the No. 1 cause of dementia. Dementias are illnesses that lead to progressive loss of mental function. With Alzheimer's disease, memory loss is prominent, especially loss of memory for the recent past and a loss of the ability to retain new information in the memory bank.

Alzheimer's patients have great difficulty finding even simple words to express themselves. They become lost in familiar places. As the illness progresses, they find it difficult to perform simple tasks, like dressing themselves. Judgment becomes poor. In summer they might wear clothes suited for winter. Numbers lose all meaning to them. Frequently, they become confused and suspicious. They no longer recognize the faces of close family members.

The brains of those with Alzheimer's shrink because brain cells are lost. With microscopic examination of an Alzheimer's brain, deposits of amyloid, a protein material, are seen. They look like lumps of lava from a volcano, and they presumably kill off brain cells and block communication between them. Tangles of another protein called tau also are scattered through the brain. What leads to the formation of these proteins is as yet unknown.

No medicine cures Alzheimer's disease, but some medicines slow its progress. Three medicines increase the brain's supply of acetylcholine, a chemical messenger that permits brain cells to communicate with each other. Those medicines are Aricept (donepezil), Exelon (rivastigmine) and Razadyne (galantamine). Namenda (memantine) is a fourth medicine that works in a different way.

AN ORDINANCE TO ADD CHAPTER 15.28 TO THE LINDEN CITY CODE ADOPTING THE 2009 EDITION OF THE INTERNATIONAL PROPERTY MAIN-TENANCE CODE, REGULATING AND GOVERNING THE CONDITIONS AND MAINTENANCE OF ALL PROPERTY, BUILDINGS AND STRUCTURES; BY PROVIDING THE STANDARDS FOR SUPPLIED UTILITIES AND FACILITIES AND OTHER PHYSICAL THINGS AND CONDITIONS ESSENTIAL TO EN-SURE THAT STRUCTURES ARE SAFE, SANITARY AND FIT FOR OCCUPA-TION AND USE; AND THE CONDEMNATION OF BUILDINGS AND STRUC-TURES UNFIT FOR HUMAN OCUPANCY AND USE, AND THE DOMOLITION OF SUCH EXISTING STRUCTURES IN THE CITY OF LINDEN PROVIDING FOR THE ISSUANCE OF PERMITS AND COLLECTION FEES THEREFOR; **REPEAL CHAPTER 15.24.**

THE CITY OF LINDEN ORDAINS:

Section 15.28.010. Public Purpose. Section 101.1.City of Linden Section 103.5. Fees to be established by Resolution of the City Council. Section 112.4. \$100.00 and \$500.00 respectively. Section 302.4. 8 inches Section 304.14.March 15 and November 15, respectively. January 1 and December 31, respectively. Section 602.3. Section 602.4. January 1 and December 31, respectively.

Section 15.28.030. Savings Clause. That if any section, subsection, sentence, clause or phrase of this Ordinance is, for any reason, held to be unconstitutional, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of this Ordinance. The City Council hereby declares that it would have passed this Ordinance, and each section, subsection, clause or phrase thereof, irrespective of the fact that any one or more sections, subsections, sentences, clauses and phrases be declared unconstitutional.

Section 15.28.040. No Impact on Pending Matters. That nothing in this Ordinance or in the Property Management Codehereby adopted shall be construed to affect any suit or proceeding impending in any court, or any rights acquired, or liability incurred, or any cause or causes of action acquired or existing, under any Act or Ordinance hereby repealed as cited in Section 3 of this Ordinance; nor shall any just or legal right or remedy of any character be lost, impaired or affected by this Ordinance.

Section 15.28.050. Publication. That the City Clerk is hereby ordered and directed to cause a Notice to be published informing the public that the International Property Maintenance Code has been adopted.

Section 15,28.060. Repeal.Chapter 15.24 is hereby repealed.

Section 15.28.070. Effective Date. This Ordinance shall become effective fifteen (15) days after adoption and public
