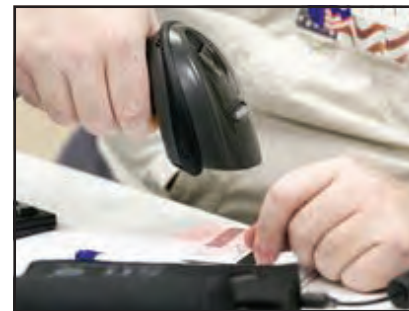

Accident scene first responders

►Police and fire departments work together to help victims, create safe situation

When a call comes in reporting an emergency, the police and fire departments have no time to waste. A set of protocols allow them to respond as quickly as possible so they can get to the scene of the accident and provide help to those who need it.

That first call, and the information it provides, determines how the police and fire departments react.

"We have a protocol set here for a 911, exactly who to send depending on what the call is," said Fenton Police Chief Rick Aro. "Typically we have a caller and we keep that caller on the line and get as much information as possible. Where it's at, what kind of car, if anyone is injured, things like that."

Aro described three different scenarios

that a call could fall under — a personal injury, a property damage and an unknown accident. Each of these scenarios calls for a different set of actions.

In the case of a personal injury accident, Aro said that police and fire departments

will get there as quickly as possible and an ambulance will be called.

"We respond to all injury accidents, unless the information we have deems that they are minor," said Fenton Fire Chief **See RESPONDERS on 15A**

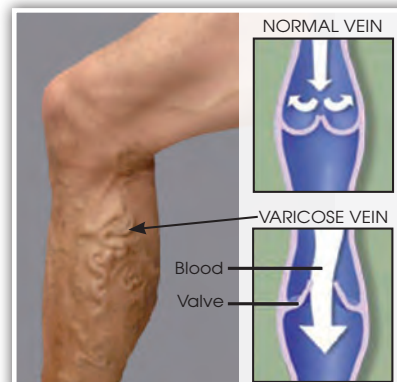

'No matter what you do, concussions can happen'

►New law mandates awareness and stricter management for student athletes

The expression "seeing stars" was literal for 2011 Fenton High School graduate Dalton Wallace. After sustaining four concussions over his high school football career, and three in a period of just two weeks, Wallace found he was hardly able to walk straight because of his dizziness. After a big hit during practice, his coach sent him to be evaluated by Fenton High School's Athletic Trainer Mitch Smelis, who directed him to a neurologist.

"The neurologist told me I had to quit playing or I was risking my life," Wallace said. "I had played football ever since I can remember. And there I was being told I could never do something I loved again."

Last Tuesday Gov. Rick Snyder signed into law a management policy and awareness program for concussions in student athletes. Before this law passed, Michigan was among only 19 states that had no state mandated concussion policy to protect student athletes. This law, known as Senate Bill 1122, requires all youth sports coaches and employees to complete a concussion awareness program, as well as educate athletes on symptoms and prevention.

In addition, all student athletes suspected of having a concussion must be immediately removed from the competition and only allowed to return with a doctor's written permission.

"I think these laws are going to help a lot of students in the future," said Fenton High School senior Carl Coster, who sat out from the first two weeks of last year's varsity football season due to a concussion. "A lot of students won't report their symptoms because they're afraid to be benched. They don't think about how it will affect them in the future."

Summary

►Gov. Rick Snyder signed into a law a management and awareness policy for concussions in student athletes.

Prior to this legislation, Michigan High School Athletic Association (MHSAA) already had concussion management policies in place, which all members were required

to adhere to.

"Schools should not need to change their practices in regards to concussions in light of the new law," said Deb Vankuiken, athletic director of Holly Area Schools. "The health and safety of our athletes has been and will always be a top priority."

Smelis advises coaches and student athletes to be aware of warning signs, which range from headache and dizziness to memory problems and loss of consciousness.

"No matter what you do, concussions can happen. But using proper equipment and technique can reduce your vulnerability to head trauma,"

Smelis said. "If you have symptoms, let someone know. A concussion is not an injury you can tough out."

"I never told anyone when I started feeling dizzy after a helmet to helmet contact during practice, I wanted to keep playing. Eventually I couldn't hide it after taking a few more big hits."

Lake Fenton marching band heading to Disney World

► Music director hopes band can raise more than \$100,000 for trip of a lifetime

The marching band will host fundraising efforts through this holiday season in hopes of covering the costs for students.

"Disney is an experience (students) will remember for the rest of their life and we didn't want a student to miss the trip because of cost," said Lake Fenton Music Boosters member Barb Gallamore. "Since the Disney trip may happen only once during a student's marching band career, we

wanted to make sure students had ample opportunities to help pay for their trip."

Selling pizza kits, coffee and raffle tickets have been some of the ongoing fundraising efforts by the band.

On Nov. 3 and 4, there will be a scrap metal drive at the high school and a book fair fundraiser at the Barnes and Noble bookstore in Flint on Friday, Dec. 7, with students playing music.

On Dec. 18, students will be gift-wrapping at the Genesee Valley Mall. The band will also be selling pies, cookie dough, fruit and pasta through the holidays toward the trip.

In the past 10 years, Gonder said the Lake Fenton school band has performed in 10 Lake Fenton Homecoming Parades, nine Jinglefest Parades, two Michigan State University Homecoming Parades, two Holland Tulip Festival Parades and one performance of the Star Spangled Banner at a Detroit Tigers baseball game.

The Lake Fenton marching band has performed twice at Disney World in the past decade, once in 2005 and again in 2009. This year's trip is planned during spring break so students will not miss instruction.

This is his second time as interim chief after Rollie Gackstetter retired in 2010. "It's a different experience," said Story. "I'm learning." He said he's busy, but keeping things rolling.

Village Manager Jerry Walker asked the village council if he could enter into discussion with the police union, the Police Officers Labor Council (POLC). Walker said the current level of supervision over the entire department is currently "not satisfactory," considering the department has nine officers under Story.

He said that he would attempt to begin with one officer, in a one-year contract and go from there. They could promote another officer as needed.

President Jeff Miller said

there were no upcoming plans to begin searching for a permanent police chief. Walker also asked the council to allow him to schedule a finance committee meeting to discuss employee compensation. He wanted to give Story a bump in pay.

Miller also discussed a pay increase for clerk/treasurer Cathrene Behrens, which council member Pauline Kenner questioned. Walker emphasized her hard work and positive performance review. "Everyone works hard," said Kenner, adding that other office workers had been laid off and weren't being called back.

The village council approved both motions, to discuss a promotion with the POLC and a finance meeting to discuss employee compensation.

ASK THE MECHANIC

Q: I have a '84 S10 1/2 ton 2wd pickup 350 with the 350 tranny. It won't shift unless above 2500 rpms, but closer to 3000. It normally shifts by 2000 rpms at about 15 mph but now it won't shift until 35 mph which is a little much. Also, if I go wide open throttle it acts as if I was in neutral until I use a little gas, then it will accelerate again. It down shifts perfect but when shifting up it has to be high rpms. When it does shift, it is a smooth shift. - Jason

A: Jason, The first thing that you need to look at is the vacuum modulator on the rear of the transmission. It has a vacuum hose going to it and when you pull the hose off, make sure it does not have any transmission oil in it. Also make sure that it is getting vacuum when the engine is running. Next thing to check is the governor valve, which is located on the side of the transmission under a small round metal cover. You will need to take the cover off, then the governor will pull out. Next, hold it up and clean it with brake cleaner and shop air while moving the small metal wings on the side in and out. Also make sure the valve in the center moves freely while you are doing this.

►Incoming and outgoing Michigan Film Office directors share local roots, commitment to promote Michigan

Some of Hollywood's famous films have been produced here in Michigan, from George Clooney's "Ides of March"

to Will Ferrell's "Semi Pro."

It's just one short leap from Fenton to Hollywood, if you ask the state of Michigan Film Office in Lansing.

Maybe it's just a coincidence that the position of Michigan Film Commissioner has been filled the past 2½ years by former Fenton resident Carrie Jones, and her successor, Margaret O'Riley, is a current Fenton resident. O'Riley began her duties at the Lansing office this week and Jones has accepted a new position as Executive Director of the Michigan Venture Capital Association.

Jones came to the Film Office after three years as the executive director of the Granholm Leadership Fund, and had served as finance director for her successful re-election campaign. She started her career working for U.S. senators Debbie Stabenow and Carl Levin.

In another twist of fate, O'Riley's most recent position before this one was in Secretary of State Ruth Johnson's office, where she reported to former Fenton city manager Mike Senyko, Johnson's chief of staff.

Previously, she served as founder/president of O’Riley Consulting, which provides tax consulting, marketing strategies and government relations counsel to businesses and municipalities. She was also founding

partner of the Sterling Corporation, and served under Gov. John Engler as Michigan Business Ombudsman and Senior Vice President at the Michigan Economic Development Corporation.

“There’s a big Fenton-Lansing connection here,” said O’Riley, who moved to Fenton in 1994 and still resides here. “Now it’s Fenton to Hollywood!”

The Michigan Film Office is responsible for administering film incentives to bring movie production into the state, which both women say offers the infrastructure and skilled workforce to support the industry.

The film industry is still alive and well in the state of Michigan, according to Jones. “Since Oct. 1, our office has \$50 million allocated to use for film and media projects. We can award these incentives based on a project’s investment in the state.”

Their office is also responsible for working directly with production studios once they’re working here — helping them find locations, props, etc. “Requests

have ranged from helping producers find warehousing facilities to finding a trained raccoon!” said Jones.

One of the biggest projects to come out of their

office is the Disney movie, “Oz: The Great and Powerful,” the story of how Oz became Oz. “It’s the largest film Disney has ever done on stages,” said Jones. “They used the Michigan Motion Picture Studios in Pontiac. For all of us, the ‘Wizard of Oz’ holds a special place. The movie will be released in March 2013.”

Both women agree that their work as a Michigan Film Commissioner is “the best job in the state,” working with very creative people, promoting Michigan and getting it to the big screen.

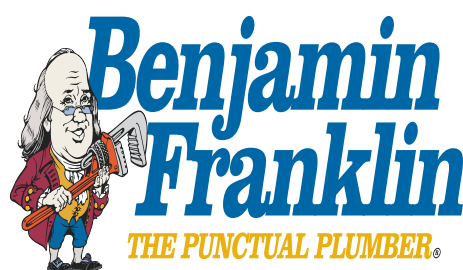

Fenton author uses Stephen King's publisher

► Ilene Lasco's children's book now available

Everyone has best friends who come and go throughout one's lifetime.

"Who's Your Best Friend?" a newly published Christian children's book released by Bardolf and Company, was penned by Ilene Stephanie Lasco of Fenton.

While Lasco's family isn't mentioned in the book, two of her children are "front and center" on the cover, in a drawing taken from one of her all-time favorite family photographs. "It's an illustration of a photo taken of two of our children,

Todd and Kelly when they were 3 years old, watching an air show at Bishop Airport," said Lasco.

Lasco and her husband, Phil, are the parents of four grown children and eight grandchildren: Todd and his wife Molly with children Jack, Luke and Finnegan, all of Texas; Kelly with trip-

lets Emma, Grace and Morgan; Matt and his wife Jamie with son, Maxx, and Jay and his wife, Jennifer, with their daughter, Olivia, all of Michigan.

The Lascos attend The Rock Church in Fenton and own Lasco Ford, where Matt is General Manager and Jay serves as Chief Operating Officer.

"Who's Your Best Friend?" is for sale on Amazon.com or from BardolfandCompany.com. "Signed copies will be available through Bardolf and Company with a reference to whom the book is for," said Lasco.

The book will also be for sale at Fenton's Open Book, where Lasco will conduct a book signing on Saturday, Dec. 1 from 11 a.m. to 2 p.m. She will also hold a book signing at Lockwood Independent Living of Fenton on Friday, Nov. 30 at 3 p.m.

Lasco hopes the book will be a resource for home-schooled families, churches, Sunday school programs, Christian schools, camps and bookstores.

While Lasco originally did not intend to write another children's book, her editor at Bardolf believes otherwise. "He told me now that I'm a published author, I should begin to think about a second book."

Fenton Township Operations Manager Tom Broecker said this fear is unfounded as no extra information is stored when a driver's license is scanned.

"It's much faster to scan (the license). If someone insists they don't want to scan it, we won't," Broecker said.

Broecker, who has overseen many elections in Fenton Township, insists the new electronic polling system is much faster overall. The old system included a lengthy process where voters were broken up alphabetically and had to visit various stations before being issued their ballot. The electronic system requires two button clicks and a ballot is issued.

"We need fewer workers and there's less congestion," Broecker said, who used the same system for the primary election in August.

Voters will most likely value the efficiency of the new system given that this year's ballot is four pages. The presidential race, six statewide proposal and three millages in Genesee County are a few of the numerous items on this year's ballot.

Voters do not have to vote upon every item, however, both pages must be turned in for the ballot to be considered cast.

For those who want to avoid the polls, they can enter the township offices on Monday and vote absentee on the spot. Voters who may have accidentally torn their ballot or voted in a manner they did not intend to can return to the township offices and be issued another ballot. Broecker said 3,100 absentee ballots have been issued already in Fenton Township and that nearly two-thirds of them have been returned.

"Generally, we have a 99 percent return rate. If they've gone through the trouble of getting it, they'll return it," Broecker said.

Voting in Fenton Township will take place at the Lake Fenton High School where shuttle services will be available from the parking lot to the main entrance.

Although the electronic system does shorten the waiting line, voters are still encouraged to study up before heading to the polls. Voters are allowed to take literature to the polls provided that they take it with them when they are finished.

"The best advice we can give people is to study up on the proposals and candidates," Broecker said. "Know how you want to vote before you come in."

Argentine Township

Argentine Township Clerk Denise Graves wants to remind residents who vote at the Argentine Township Hall that if the parking lot is full on Election Day, additional parking is available across the

street at Argentine Care Center and two doors down at Janelle's Banquet Center.

"We expect a high turnout, between 76 and 80 percent," she said. "We expect long lines." Based on the time that residents took when they came in to the office to fill out their absentee ballot, Graves estimates residents could spend as much as 20 to 25 minutes to fill out their ballot.

Graves suggests residents bring in their own personal "cheat sheet" to expedite the voting process. These cheat sheets cannot be left behind in the voting stations, however.

Residents with special needs are reminded that they should ask for parking assistance if they arrive and the parking lot is full, according to Graves. She wanted to announce that no campaign vehicles will be allowed to park in the township hall

parking lot — this lot is strictly for voters.

As clerk, Graves said Argentine has three precincts, 50 residents can vote at the same time and election workers will be processing ballots as quickly as possible. E-poll books will also be used to scan drivers' licenses.

As of Wednesday morning, 959 or about 20 percent of Argentine Township residents have already voted absentee, said Graves. If someone still needs to vote absentee, the township office will be open on Saturday from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m. when absentee ballots may be requested, filled out and immediately turned in — ballots cannot leave the office. The township office will be open again on Monday until 4 p.m. for this same process.

More voting information from the Michigan Secretary of State's Office

Secretary of State Ruth Johnson reminds residents that the polls are open Tuesday, Nov. 6 from 7 a.m. to 8 p.m. If you still need to see a sample ballot for your particular area, go online to www.michigan.gov/vote where you can confirm your registration status, find your polling location, learn about absentee voting, Michigan voter ID laws and contact information for your local clerk. Emergency absentee ballots are available under certain conditions through 4 p.m. on Election Day. Voters will be asked to present photo ID at the polls, such as a Michigan driver's license or identification card. Anyone who does not have an acceptable form of photo ID or failed to bring it with them can still vote. If the voter does not have a photo ID, the voter may sign a brief affidavit attesting to their identity. Their ballots will be included with all others and counted on Election Day. Voters who don't have a Michigan driver's license or identification card can show the following forms of photo ID, as long as they are current:

- **Driver's license** or personal identification card issued by another state.
 - **Federal or state** government-issued photo identification.
 - **U.S. passport.**
 - **Military identification** card with photo.
 - **Student identification** with photo from a high school or an accredited institution of higher education, such as a college or university.
 - **Tribal identification** card with photo.
- A specially equipped voting station called the AutoMARK Voter Assist Terminal is also available at each polling location for use by voters with disabilities.

Total Money Makeover. In other words, you should direct where each of your hard-earned dollars goes before you spend them. This is especially true during the holidays when emotional issues can cause overspending. This type of plan can be as simple as listing a budgeted amount for gifts, food/entertainment, etc., so you know how much you have allocated in these categories.

Fausey suggests that you start to track your spending with a sheet of paper, writing the months and weeks at the top, listing the bills you pay and the money you spend on the side of the paper. "Every time you spend any money, even if it's just for coffee or snacks, list it in the proper category," she said. "The only way you can make a budget is by first knowing how you're spending your money."

People who are more computer savvy may want to use a personal budgeting program like Microsoft Money or Quicken, she said. "You can also use an Excel spread sheet so you have all your information right in front of you."

Either way, Fausey advises people to start this process right now, before the holidays. "By the time the New Year begins, you'll be ready to plan your budget for 2013."

4. If using software, concentrate on categories of spending that should be cut back on or expanding, rather than every single detail.

5. Watch out for cash leakage, for example, your ATM withdrawals. If you find yourself returning to the ATM more than once a week or so, you need to examine where that cash is going.

6. Spending beyond your limits is dangerous. Government figures show that many households with total income of \$50,000 or less are spending more than they bring in. This is definitely a sign you need to make some serious spending cuts.

7. Beware of luxuries dressed up as necessities.

8. Tithe yourself. Aim to spend no more than 90 percent of your income, leaving 10 percent to save for your big-picture items.

9. Don't count on windfalls. When projecting the amount of money you can live on, don't include dollars from year-end bonuses, tax refunds or investment gains that may not happen.

10. Beware of spending creep. As your annual income climbs from raises, promotions and smart investing, don't spend on luxuries until you're sure that you're staying ahead of inflation. Use those income increases as an excuse to save more.

Robert Cairnduff. "We provide first aid, check for injuries."

Sometimes before responding, the fire department has to neutralize possible hazards that threaten not just their own safety, but those of the people they are trying to help. These hazards are sometimes caused by features intended to save lives, such as air bags.

Responders also have to be mindful of the situation they are dealing with. Cairnduff said that hybrid cars that have been in an accident, for example, can be a high voltage danger.

A property damage scenario is when information is received that there has been an accident, but no one is injured, though a police report is necessary. In this case, a police officer would be sent to write up an accident report.

An unknown accident scenario is called that for just the reason you would expect — because nothing is known about the accident. "In that case we send fire and a police car until we have further information about injuries," Aro said.

Once the police and fire departments arrive on the scene, each side knows their roles and responsibilities so they are not stumbling over each other's feet. "At least here in Fenton, we have a really good working relationship with the fire department," Aro said.

The first responsibility of the police is to stop traffic on the scene of the accident if it is still going through. Once the scene is safe, the police go to help the injured, until the fire department arrives. "A lot of them have much higher training in treating the injured," Aro said. "They would take care of the injured and we would help where we could."

Once the injured have been treated and

the scene has become stabilized, the role of the police shifts, according to Aro. "We start getting all the information, look for witnesses, and investigate the accident to see what happened," he said.

When responding to accidents on the highway, Fenton Township Fire Chief Ryan Volz said their reaction is determined by what they are dispatched to. If there is a possibility of a fire starting, an engine will be dispatched. In the case of a bigger scale accident, a hazmat trailer could be sent.

One thing that is key is being able to work with departments in other areas. "They might have something we don't," Volz said. Or in some cases, in major accidents, the more likely problem is just not having enough of something.

There is an endless amount of possible scenarios, and preparing for each one of them is impossible.

"You try to train for what's going to happen, though it's always different," Volz said. "Always plan for the unexpected. Sometimes you get there and it's not as bad as you expected. Other times you get there, and you have to get creative."

Tough Friday night for Tri-county football teams

Linden Eagles fall in sixth OT to DeWitt Panthers, 45-44

Linden — It took six overtimes, but a blocked extra point by DeWitt's Benjamin Zamara ended the Linden Eagles' playoff run in a Division 3 district championship game at Claude Cranston Stadium Friday night.

Linden lost 45-44 in the sixth overtime. DeWitt opened the sixth extra session with a 10-yard TD pass from Jacob Johnson to Ryan Anderson and got the extra point when Cameron West converted the extra point. DeWitt led 45-38.

Linden (9-2) responded with runs of 6 and 4 yards by Mitch Juhl, cutting the gap to just one. However, the extra-point was blocked ending the game.

Johnson hit Anderson on three 10-yard TD passes during the overtime sessions.

Linden failed to score on its first OT possession, but Juhl forced a fumble by Johnson and Mitchell Ryan recovered, keeping the game tied 21-all after one overtime.

In the second OT, Justice Shankel caught a 10-yard TD pass for DeWitt and Juhl scored on a four-yard sweep to the left side. Both extra points were made making it a 24-all game enter-

ing the third OT.

In the third OT, Juhl scored on a three-yard sweep and Cameron Cook made his extra point, while Anderson had one of his 10-yard TD catches for DeWitt. It was tied 31-all.

In the fourth OT, Anderson had his second OT TD catch and Eddie Walterhouse scored on a six-yard run for Linden. Both kickers made extra points, making it 38-all.

In the fifth OT, both kickers missed field goals. Juhl blocked DeWitt's attempt forcing the sixth extra session.

DeWitt scored right away and got its extra point in the sixth session, Linden scored on Juhl's four-yard run. However, the extra point was blocked.

In regulation, the Eagles led most of the game. First-quarter TD passes of 10 and 9 yards from Shaye Brown to Patrick Ryan led Linden to a 14-7 lead with 3:34 left in the first quarter. With 5:04 left in the half, Cook kicked a 43-yard field goal, putting the Eagles up 17-7.

DeWitt cut the gap to 17-14 with a 30-yard TD pass to Noah Evans with 8:22 left in regulation. Then, the Panthers tied it with a 27-yard field-goal by West with 19.4 seconds left in regulation. DeWitt scored its first

TD on an Anderson completion of 47 yards to Christopher Ruby for the first score of the game with 8:33 left in the

first quarter.

Walled Lake Western's Joshua Jones scored three touchdowns, helping lead the Warriors to a 49-27 Division 2 district championship victory against the Fenton Tigers at Fenton High School on Friday night.

"They did a little bit of everything," Fenton coach Jeff Setzke said. "No. 1 (Jones) scored three touchdowns. We didn't really have much

of an answer for him."

Fenton tied the game up at 7-all in the first quarter on a Brennen Clarke 25-yard TD run. However, Walled Lake Western scored 14 more points in the first quarter and then another 21 points in the second quarter, taking a 42-7 lead into the half.

In the third quarter both teams scored TDs.

Fenton's came on a Mitch Shegos 54-yard TD reception from Connor Davidson.

Fenton scored the fourth quarter's only 13 points. The first TD came on a Davidson 14-yard TD run. The second came on a 70-yard interception return for a score by Damon Thomas.

Shegos made one extra point, while Jonathan Blalock had two extra points.

Fenton cruises to district finals, defeats Holly Bronchos

Ortonville — If given a choice, Ashley Bearden doesn't know if she'd rather make a good set or get a crushing kill.

Fortunately for the Fenton varsity volleyball team, she doesn't have to choose one or the other. She gets a chance to do both.

Bearden had 22 assists and shared team-high honors with nine kills in the Tigers' 25-12, 25-18, 25-10 Class A district semi-final victory against the Holly Bronchos Thursday night at Brandon High School.

The win put Fenton in the district title game Friday night. Check www.tctimes.com for that match's results.

"I like them both, I really do," Bearden said when asked if she liked hitting or setting better. "I like hitting because I like the feeling of getting a huge kill, but I like setting because I like the feeling of my teammates getting a kill as well. I like both of them."

Holly didn't have much of a chance against the Metro League champions on Thursday. In the opening game, Holly was still as close as 12-7 when the Tigers got consecutive kills from Bearden, helping establish a decent lead. Fenton ended the first game by scoring eight of the last nine points.

In the second game, Fenton was tied 6-all but took the lead for good with a Cassidy Rourke kill. Fenton's Dori Carpenter then rattled off four straight service points,

giving the Tigers a comfortable lead. Carly Granger got game point with a kill.

In the third game, Bobbie Eastman got a kill, sparking a nine-point run for the Tigers. Bearden served eight of those points.

The Tigers' offense was too much for the Bronchos, as Fenton had 44 kills to Holly's 11. Maizie Martin and Bearden shared team-high honors with nine kills, while Eastman had eight. Payton Maxheimer added six kills while Rourke had five kills.

Martin and Eastman had two blocks each, while Maxheimer also had 14 digs. Megan Cockin had 15 digs and was a perfect 13-for-13 with service reception.

"We came out and executed because we really knew what we wanted to do," Bearden said. "We came out and showed what we want to bring to the table on Friday as well."

Holly was paced by Lauren Fultz and Kate Nitowski who had three kills each.

"My goal was to have the girls go out playing well and I feel like we did that in the second game," Holly coach Jaime Jones said. "We had some great moments, but we can't string them consistently against a team like Fenton. They are a good team."

Fenton defeated Brandon 25-17, 24-26, 26-24, 25-20 during Tuesday's opening round match. Cockin led the team with 28 digs, while Jaime Hansen had 17 digs. Bearden had a team-high 13 kills and 16 assists, while Eastman had 11 kills. Maxheimer had 10 kills and 12 digs.

Linden battles Grand Blanc tough, but loses

Ortonville — Playing in their first Class A district tourney game, the Linden Eagles did themselves proud during Thursday's semi-final contest against Grand Blanc.

Going against a school that has nearly triple the enrollment of themselves, the Eagles lost an entertaining 25-27, 17-25, 25-21, 26-28 verdict to the Bobcats.

"We played so good but we didn't win it," Linden coach Cori Mason said. "It's a good way and a bad way to end the season, right? I don't know."

So much good happened for the Eagles during the match, but they fell just short of earning the victory.

In the first game, the Eagles played strong, collecting 12 kills. On defense, the blocking game, led by Rebecca McDonald and Taylor Ovington, was strong, earning five block kills as well. However, the Eagles had eight hit errors and were called for a controversial rotation violation, helping Grand Blanc earn the slight first-game win.

Linden trailed by as many as 23-19 late in the first game, but Kelsey Brecht got a kill and then went to the service line to record four straight service points. In the mix, McDonald had a block kill and an overpass kill, while Rachel Maxheimer added a kill as well. With Linden having a chance at game point, Grand Blanc's Maressa Miller provided a kill, tying it up at 24-all. Finally, Grand Blanc got back-to-back kills earning a 27-25 Bobcat win.

The second game was Linden's weakest of the night, collecting just nine kills and having three service receptions that they never returned. However, the Eagles bounced back with a strong third game.

Linden jumped to an early 7-3 lead with a Kelsey Brecht kill off a Grand Blanc overpass. From there, the Eagles worked on holding on to that lead, and never did lose it. Grand Blanc cut the margin to as close as 22-21 after a kill by Grand Blanc's Halie Vanitvelt, but Ovington provided a tip kill, putting Linden up 23-21. The Eagles captured the third-game

win with a Niki Sargent kill off a service reception overpass by Grand Blanc.

In the fourth game, the two teams tangled in another close battle. Linden pulled out to an 8-5 lead after an ace by Ashley Klavitter, but Grand Blanc roared right back, scoring nine of the game's next 12 points, creating a 14-11 Grand Blanc lead.

From there, the game remained close. Linden took a 24-22 lead after a kill by McDonald, but the Bobcats staved off game point after two Linden hitting errors.

Trailing 25-24, Linden staved off a match point with a McDonald kill. After an ace by Klavitter, Linden (30-13-14) had another game point, but a Linden kill tied the game back up and set up a run of three points for the Bobcats, earning them the match win.

McDonald led Linden with 13 kills, while

Those from the 1930s and athletes from the 2000s will be represented in this year's Linden Athletic Hall of Fame Induction class.

Meanwhile, a legendary coach also is being added to this year's class.

Athletes Desi Mayner, Kate Dolata, Ryan Norman and Stephanie Smethwick; coach Bill Landrem and the 1937 boys basketball team are being inducted during Nov. 10's 6 p.m. induction ceremony at Spring Meadows Country Club. Mayner, who teaches and coaches on the football staff, is excited.

"This community is my home

and it is what shaped me into who I am today," Mayner said. "To be invited to be a member of this elite group of athletes is a true honor. While having the opportunity to be a teacher and coach in the district where I grew up only sweetens the situation."

Mayner, a 2004 graduate, earned 10 varsity letters in football, basketball and baseball. He was a standout football player and a member of the 2004 D2 state runner-up baseball team. Mayner ended up playing football at Eastern Michigan and later transferred to Saginaw Valley State University.

"(The baseball team) entered the playoffs with a 17-13 record

and ended up making a run all the way to a state runner-up," said Mayner when asked about his biggest memory. "Playing the catcher position with my little brother Dustin playing second base made this an unforgettable experience for me as an athlete and captain of that team."

Smethwick was a three-sport athlete who graduated in 1987. She played basketball, softball and volleyball, earning 10 varsity letters. She was first-team All-State in volleyball and was an All-Metro recipient in all three sports at least once. Smethwick played all three sports at Mott Community College, and

Tri-county prep football getting better every season

Once upon a time being a tri-county prep football fan wasn't all too exciting during late October or early November.

Why? Well, because usually none of the teams were playing.

Certainly, Linden usually made the playoffs. The Eagles have every postseason since 2002. And, of course, Lake Fenton earned a district championship in 2006. But, for the most part postseason success was, at best, pretty limited.

That has changed in recent seasons. It

took until 2009 for Linden to win its second postseason game in school history. But since then, the Eagles have gone 4-3 in the playoffs. The Eagles also won their first district title last year. Meanwhile, Fenton got its first playoff victory in 2010, and didn't stop there, winning district crowns during that season and in 2011. This season, Lake Fenton pulled off one of the first-round shockers in the state playoffs, defeating state ranked Jackson Lumen Christi handily, 41-20. And even the Holly Bronchos are making some waves, making the playoffs in back-to-back seasons during the 2010 and 2011 seasons.

Last year represented the first time two tri-county squads won district titles in the same season, and last week represented the first time ever that three tri-county teams won their first playoff game of the season. Since 2009, all four tri-county squads have qualified for the playoffs at least twice and the schools are a combined 10-11 in those games. And let's not forget Flint Powers. While the Chargers' campus might have a Flint mailing address, many of the players that led Powers to a state title a year ago are from one of the tri-county school districts. Indeed, it seems, overnight, the tri-county area has become a football hotbed.

"We play good football here," Lake Fenton coach Eric Doyle said. "You have Denny (Hopkins) at Linden, Jeff (Setzke) at Fenton and us here. Even though they are not in the playoffs this year, (Holly coach) Ryan Culloty has them playing great football. That's a lot of kids playing good football in this area. It is a little bit of a pride thing. We're all in this tri-county area and playing good football."

"Fenton, Linden and Lake Fenton are all within about a five-mile square, all three advanced to the second round and that's awesome," Fenton's Setzke said.

All three coaches say they pull for each other this time of year.

"I think it's a pride thing. I hope all the teams do well, that's for sure," Linden's Hopkins said. "I like to see Fenton and Lake Fenton make a run. I think everyone is pulling for one another to do well. It's a tribute to the kids in the area and all the schools working hard."

For Setzke, when he first came to Fenton, he used the other area football teams' success as a measuring tool for his program. During his first year (2006) Lake Fenton won a district title, while Linden captured its first playoff victory in school history. Holly also made the playoffs for the first time in school history. Meanwhile, the Tigers experienced a 1-8 season.

"I asked the kids do they put something in the water (at Linden, Holly and Lake Fenton)," Setzke said. "If they can do this, then there's no reason why you can't do it."

It's obvious the caliber of tri-county prep football has elevated in the last 10 years, making for higher goals.

"Those expectations are now here for the programs in this area," Doyle said. "And now we have three teams going for district finals. It's a nice problem to have when our local sports editor has to figure out where to go in the second week of the playoffs."

Isn't that the truth.

Brecht had 12 kills. Sargent chipped in seven. McDonald and Ovington provided five and four blocks, respectively, while Klavvitter had 24 digs. Callie Murphy had 22 assists.

"We wanted it. You could feel the energy," Mason said. "You could feel their intensity. ... Tonight, we played consistent and that's what we've been looking for all season. They gave it all they had."



Q. My freezer door pops open every time I shut my refrigerator door. Any suggestions?

A. There are a couple of things that might cause that. Have you checked your refrigerator to see if it's level from front to back? The freezer side cools the fresh food side by sending freezer air through a duct to the fresh food side. LF ready for rematch with Gabriel Richard

A lot of times once a football team gets to the district finals, they may be facing a squad they've never seen before.

That's not the case with Lake Fenton.

While Ann Arbor Gabriel Richard may not be in the Genesee Area Conference, the Blue Devils have seen them each of the last three seasons. So when Lake Fenton travels to Gabriel Richard for their D5 district championship football game for Saturday's 1 p.m. game, both teams will know each other rather well.

"We do know them," Lake Fenton coach Eric Doyle said. "We are familiar with them and they are familiar with us. It's going to be more about executing."

Lake Fenton (8-2) has had some classic battles with the Fighting Irish, but there has been one other constant with each game — the Blue Devils have lost all three. That said, all three were close games, with Lake Fenton losing them by a combined 11 points. This season the Blue Devils opened the year against Gabriel Richard, dropping a 42-39 verdict. But despite Lake Fenton losing, the 39 points remains the most scored against the Fighting Irish all year by 11 points. The 39 points also represents one-third of the points scored against Gabriel Richard. The fact that Lake Fenton lost all three games doesn't bother Doyle too much.

"To their credit they know they can beat us because they have," Doyle said. "But I was showing the kids a little film from the first game and the kids couldn't believe the mistakes they made. If we execute like we can, we'll be OK."

"It's one of those things that the kids are excited about because you don't get an op-

portunity like this often. We were disappointed with the first game because we realized we didn't play well. So we are excited to get an opportunity to play them again."

In the first game this season, the teams amassed 887 yards total offense combined. Gabriel Richard quarterback Joe Kendzicky completed 9-of-14 passes for 218 yards and two scores. His top receivers were Steve Tracy and Patrick Wolf. On the ground, Ashton Hundley is the primary weapon. The running back also can catch passes from the backfield, as evident by his 17- and 43-yard

receptions in the opening game.

While the Blue Devils struggled with Gabriel Richard's offense, the Fighting Irish struggled with the Blue Devils' running game as well. Nick VanDuser became a household name for Lake Fenton fans in the contest, collecting 204 rushing yards and two TDs. Neil Allor also returned a kickoff 87 yards for a TD.

"They are really well coached," Doyle said. "Coach (Brian) Lemons does a fantastic job and is a Linden guy. They are big and strong up front and got some nice skilled athletes. It's going to be a battle."

LF volleyball staves off 10 match points, beats Corunna

Lake Fenton varsity volleyball will be looking for its second Class B district title in as many years today when the Blue Devils face Durand in the Flint Northern district final.

And they did it in the most improbable way. Lake Fenton faced nine match points in the fourth game against Corunna in Thursday's semifinal before bouncing back to incredibly win the game 27-25. Lake Fenton then won the final game, earning a spot in today's 10 p.m. district title match. Lake Fenton won the match 16-25, 25-19, 19-25, 27-25, 15-0. Earlier in the week, Lake Fenton advanced to the semifinals, defeating Goodrich 13-25, 25-20, 25-22, 21-25, 15-10 in Tuesday's opening-round match.

Trailing the fourth game 24-15 and needing to win to keep their season alive against Corunna, Sidney Scott had eight straight service points with Trudie Bruce earning three kills during the run. After tying the game 24-all, Corunna enjoyed another match point at 25-24, but a hitting error tied it up and allowed Lake Fenton to score the last three points of the game, forcing the fifth, and deciding, game. Lake Fenton controlled the final game with strong ball control and strong passing.

"We put nine balls on the ground for kills and had two aces in the 15-point game," Lake Fenton coach Angie Del Morone said. "We played very quiet and apprehensive (early)."

Scott led the Blue Devils with 25 kills, 19 digs and five blocks, while Bruce had 13 kills and eight blocks. Megan Somers had 26 digs and three kills, while Shelby Beckman had 19 digs. Autumn Beardsely had

seven blocks."

"It should be a tough final on Saturday," Del Morone said. "We have to respect Durand since they beat us during the regular season. The team feels better prepared to go at Durand fast and with confidence given the tough opponents that we have already faced at this district. The players are enjoying the pressure and playing some of their best ball."

In the victory against Goodrich, Bruce had 13 kills and four blocks, while Scott had 12 kills and three blocks. Beckman had 16 digs, while Somers had 15. Setters Sophia Sahouri and Alyssa Rodgers combined for 36 assists.

"They played their best match of the season against Goodrich," Del Morone said. "They created some opportunities for them-

selves and then executed the game plan. That was big for us. In previous matches we have not been able to generate that kind of performance. They had only three practices to learn a new defense and correct the mistakes from last week."

Meet Ray Leppert

When you go and vote in the election this Tuesday in Fenton, you will probably see Ray Leppert there. Leppert has worked the elections for 10 years and will be there for this presidential election, which has the largest ballot he has ever seen.

How did you get your start as an election worker?
I got started just by being interested in going into city hall and applying for the position as a precinct worker. Then I was promoted to precinct chairman, and now I am election

commissioner. I just wanted to be involved in the city. I am on the Oakwood Cemetery board, I have a part-time job. It keeps me active. I enjoy working at the election precinct.

What sort of work is involved in being a precinct worker or chairman?

The precinct worker takes care of registering voters, passing out the ballot, and making sure the ballots are secret. The chairman does all those duties and oversees the operation of the precinct, and the people who work there.

What do you do now as an election commissioner?

I help the city clerk in any way that she needs. The other commissioner and I set up the room as far as getting things ready for the election, and we are there to help the other precinct workers if they have any questions. And then when it's done, we tear everything down.

What happens to our ballots after we vote on them?

After they get their ballot and vote, they take the ballot back. There is a stub on the end of the ballot that has a number on it. That number is detached, and at that point, there is no way of tracing that ballot back

to the person that voted. The ballot is scanned and the way the person voted is registered in the machine. At the end of the day, the machines are closed and the ballots are taken out, and then put into a container that

goes to the city. A tape is printed that registers the votes. With this election, it is two pages, two sided. It is the largest ballot that I have ever seen.

Is there anything people should know about this election before going to vote?

This time when people are in there, they might see this is the second election we are using a laptop computer that scans your ID. Everyone is required to have a state ID, whether it is a state driver's license, college identification, or something that is approved by the state. The only information that is scanned from the license is the voter information.

How many people vote with an absentee ballot?

We've got about 9,300 registered voters in Fenton and maybe 300 usually vote with absentee ballots. This time though the city clerk told me we might have between 1,500 and 1,600.

Why do you think there is an increase in absentee ballots this year?

The proposals and the presidential election are two reasons. Of course, people have already gone South this season so they are out of state. There is more interest in this election than there has been in the past. This is the biggest election we have had since the last presidential election. The city is always looking for more precinct workers. Anyone who is interested in being a worker can stop by City Hall and fill out an application.

Terrorists' bombs detonate early

In September 1999, the West Bank was on Daylight Saving Time while Israel had just switched back to standard time. West Bank terrorists prepared time bombs and smuggled them to their Israeli counterparts, who misunderstood the time on the bombs. As the bombs were being planted, they exploded — one hour too early — killing three terrorists instead of the intended victims — two busloads of people.

SIX THINGS YOU DIDN'T KNOW ABOUT

DAYLIGHT SAVING TIME

Officially, it's "daylight saving time," not "daylight savings time." But don't feel bad if you thought there was a final "s" on "saving"; far more people Google the incorrect phrase than the correct one.



Births and birthdays

While twins born at 11:55 p.m. and 12:05 a.m. may have different birthdays, Daylight Saving Time can change birth order — on paper, anyway. During the time change in the fall, one baby could be born at 1:55 a.m. and the sibling born 10 minutes later, at 1:05 a.m. In the spring, there is a gap when no babies are born at all: from 2 a.m. to 3 a.m.

In November 2007, Laura Cirioli of North Carolina gave birth to Peter at 1:32 a.m. and, 34 minutes later, to Allison. However, because Daylight Saving Time reverted to Standard Time at 2 a.m., Allison was born at 1:06 a.m.

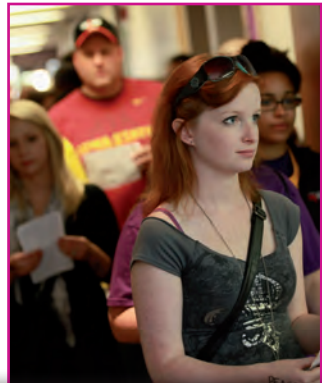

More heart attacks due to daylight saving time

There's a spike in heart attacks during the first week of daylight saving time, according to another study published in 2008. The loss of an hour's sleep may make people more susceptible to an attack, some experts say. When daylight saving time ends in the fall, heart attacks briefly become less frequent than usual.

Voter turnout in elections

Through 2006, the Daylight Saving Time period has ended on the last Sunday in October, about a week before Election Day, which is held the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November. The extension of Daylight Saving Time into November has been thought to encourage greater voter participation, the theory being that more people would go to the polls if it was still light when they returned home from work.

Draft status, Vietnam War

A man, born just after 12 a.m. DST, circumvented the Vietnam War draft by using a daylight saving time loophole. When drafted, he argued that standard time, not DST, was the official time for recording births in his state of Delaware in the year of his birth. Thus, under official standard time he was actually born on the previous day, and that day had a much higher draft lottery number, allowing him to avoid the draft.

Bars and daylight saving

One question people always ask about Daylight Saving Time regards the time that restaurants and bars close. In many states, liquor cannot be served after 2 a.m. But at 2 a.m. in the fall, the time switches back one hour. So, why can't they serve for that additional hour in November?

The answer: the bars do not close at 2 a.m. but actually at 1:59 a.m. So, they are already closed when the time changes from Daylight Saving Time into Standard Time.

and saw first hand what the three-day program can do for men. "You see them come in, they're down, they're really down. They leave happy as a clam, they're bubbly, they can't stop talking about it," he said.

Everything for attendees is free, but the cost is about \$700 per person. Fewer than 20 men are accepted to attend annually.

The attendees have the opportunity to fly fish with a one-on-one guide, should they choose to. They can also partake in "courageous conversations," where the men have an opportunity to open up about their experience through a professional facilitator. "The big tough guys by the end will all be in tears, he gets into their heart and soul

and get's them talking," said Tidball.

Many of the Michigan participants are referred by McLaren Health Care. Roxanne Caine, vice president of the McLaren Foundation learned about Reel Recovery from cancer survivor Greg Snyder, of the University of Michigan-Flint.

"This is an important healing effort," said Caine. "There's not a lot of activity and support groups for men with cancer. Our physicians loved it, our staff loved it, our board loved it."

The McLaren Foundation has raised and donated around \$15,000 for Reel Recovery in Michigan.

Mary Joan Dunlap also works at UM-Flint, and for Reel Recovery. She pointed out the need for caregivers to also get a brief reprieve from the daily care their family member needs.

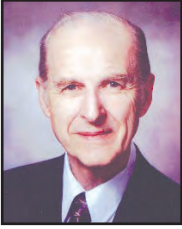

The world upsetters

When 120 believers met to pray in an upper room in Jerusalem following the ascension of Christ, they had no way of knowing the impact they would have on future generations. As a result of that prayer meeting, the world would never be the same again.

The task of evangelizing assigned to these people of faith by their Lord must have seemed impossible to carry out. But in a matter of months, they would be known as world upsetters (Acts 17:6).

Those first-century Christians should be an example to us all. They had none of our tools for evangelism or aids to worship, but they were far more effective in carrying out their commission than we are today. Without printing presses, parachurch organizations, radio and television ministries, or even church buildings, they planted churches all over their world. By the end of the first century A.D., they had increased from a tiny, timid, minority to millions of dynamic evangelists. Churches exist throughout the world today because that unlikely company was faithful, even in the face of fierce persecution.

When religious or governmental authorities tried to stop them through political pressure, or laws intended to limit their outreach, these bold believers replied that they were compelled to obey God rather than men. Execution seemed to be the only way to silence them, but when their enemies took this route, the church flourished more than

ever. Their courage and commitment puts most of us to shame.

In some areas, however, the world upsetters were powerless. They had no financial power. If they had waited until they had accumulated money enough to launch their historic missionary venture, the task would never have begun. Most successful church outreach has started in faith and funds have followed.

They were also without political power. Their leaders couldn't pull strings in high places, and there is no evidence that these courageous souls ever sought influence among the politically powerful of their time. Higher hands were guiding them and this enabled them to attempt and accomplish great things without politically powerful people being able to take credit for the results. Actually, this seeming lack then may have been one of their greatest strengths.

Political ideas and convictions come and go. Sometimes they even float from one political party to another so that over time one group has switched positions with the other. The message of the church (the Gospel) remains the same. And the church that forgets this is in danger of trading its lasting message for a passing one, a change of direction that will always bring decline.

Of all the periods of history, ours may cry the loudest for churches to return to their God-given task. It is time to get back to Biblical basics.

A minister who had given enthusiastic support to a politician who lost the election groaned, "What am I going to do now?"

"I guess you'll just have to go back to preaching the Gospel," one of his members replied.

That advice could make the churches world upsetters again.

doing something interesting, such as playing an instrument or skydiving.

The art of conversation — The first message is the breach into finding out if someone is potentially interested in you. According to the article 'Exactly what people look for in a first message,' the first thing people look for is literacy. The more words you spell incorrectly, the less likely someone will respond to your message. Ok Cupid also found that unusual greetings such as 'How's it going,' 'Howdy,' or 'What's up?' get more responses than 'hi' or 'Hello.'

Stating specific interests such as 'tattoos' or 'jazz' also results in a higher chance of responses. Other strange findings: women respond more to men who use words like 'awkward,' 'sorry,' 'kinda' and 'probably.' Also, avoid giving physical compliments, as Ok Cupid has found most people don't respond to them.

Don't get discouraged if you don't get a message back: researchers found only 32 percent of sent messages receive a response.

What people are interested in — After surveying 526,000 profiles, researchers on Ok Trends found, unsurprisingly, that men and women have different tastes in activities, music and other aspects of their

lives. Men are more likely to listen to rock music, enjoy horror or war movies and outdoor activities like hunting and fishing. Women, on the other hand, are bigger fans of country music, the wellbeing of their friends, careers and appearances. But there were some instances where interests overlapped, particularly when it came to sports teams and traveling.

The lesson: men and women are usually interested in completely different things. Success in dating is equal parts give and take.

People lie, a lot — The Internet removes the physical aspect of dating and unfortunately, lying online can be easier than in person. The biggest thing people lie about? Their height. Men usually list their height as 6 feet, even if they're as short as 5-feet 8-inches, researchers wrote in the article 'The biggest lies in online dating.' Women lie about their height too, adding a few inches. Interestingly, shorter women and taller men get the most attention.

Researchers also found the more attractive someone is in a picture, the more likely it is an older picture. That super attractive picture? Add a few years to that person and you might get a closer idea of what they actually look like.

Best advice for online dating — don't lie. The truth will come out eventually and lies are never attractive qualities to have.

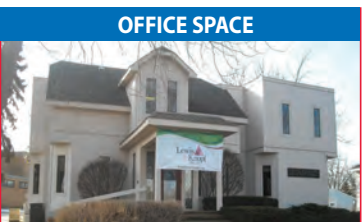

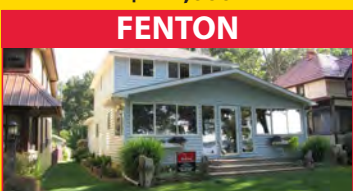
