Lack of distinguishing weather patterns make predictions difficult

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Should you get out the boots and heavy coats early this year, or expect another mild winter? You may have to play it by ear.

ABC-TV Channel 12 Meteorologist J.R Kirtek said that seasonal forecasting is already a difficult task, and this year it is made harder by the lack of any distinguishing characteristics.

"Typically the best winter forecast is when there is something obvious going on like a strong el Niño," said Kirtek. "There is not really anything obvious going on."

Despite the difficulty in making accurate predictions, Kirtek did hazard a guess as to what we may be likely to see. "At this point I think we will probably have more than

we did last year. The odds are in our favor to have a little above average now," he said.

Those who don't particularly enjoy the snow do not have to be afraid. Kirtek also said, "Idon't

see us having an especially brutal winter."

A winter assessment done by National Oceanic and Atmosphere Administration (NOAA) agrees with Kirtek, saying that this year's winter forecast is one of the hardest they have had to produce. Their forecast for the Mid-west area though is drier than average conditions for the Midwest.

On the other hand, while the Farmers Almanac forecasts that while the west coast will be warm and dry — it also calls for a cold, snowy winter to return to the east, including those states around the Great Lakes.

With conflicting information and predictions, the best case this winter may to be to simply hope for the best, and prepare for the worst.

You don't want to wait until snow has started piling up in your driveway to prepare yourself for the winter season. If you have a snow blower, you will want to make certain that it is ready to throw some snow, especially after last year's mild winter.

"If it's been sitting, you should definitely check the gas, make sure the gas is still able to run and that it doesn't have a bad odor to it. The next thing they should do is check the spark plug, and make sure it doesn't have any ash or black

residue on it that is super thick," said Matt McKay

of McKay's Hardware in Holly. It is also important to check the oil on your snow blower before starting it for the season.

North Flint Social Security Office announces changes in office hours

Effective Nov. 19, the North Flint Social Security office will be open to the public Monday through Friday from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. – a reduction of 30 minutes each weekday. In addition, beginning Jan. 2, 2013, the office will close to the public at noon every Wednesday. While agency employees will continue to work their regular hours, this shorter public window will allow them to complete face-toface interviews and process claims work without incurring the cost of overtime. Carmen Moreno, regional communications director, said the reduced funding provided by Congress under the continuing resolution for the first six months of the fiscal year makes it impossible for the agency to provide the overtime needed to handle service to the public as it has done in the past. In addition, on Nov. 23, the day after Thanksgiving, all Social Security field offices will be closed to the public. Most Social Security services do not require a visit to a local office. Many services are available at www.socialsecurity. gov or by dialing their toll-free number, 1-800-772-1213. People who are deaf or hearing impaired may call their TTY number, 1-800-325-0778.

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
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Holly Academy director wins awai

Julie Kildee, director of Holly Academy was recently honored with the Michigan Charter School Administrator of the Year Award. The Michigan Association of Public School Academies, the state's united voice for charter schools, selected Kildee as their 11th winner of the Administrator of the Year Award

at the annual Michigan Charter School Conference in Detroit.

More than 1,100 school principals, directors, and superintendents were in the running for this prestigious award. The top five finalists came from charter schools in Detroit, Grand Rapids, Spring Lake and Holly. Criteria for the award included academic achievement and growth, innovation and staff development.

Reducing stress on pets

- Keep pets away from table scraps. While rich desserts and treats may be enjoyed by guests, they can wreak digestive

RESTAURANTS VICTIMS OF COUNTERFEIT \$100 BILLS

At 3:30 p.m. on Wednesday. Nov. 15. Fenton police responded to a restaurant in the 3400 block of Owen Road to investigate a report of a counterfeit \$100 bill. An employee said a customer came in and ordered a \$4 bowl of soup for take out and paid with a \$100 bill, receiving back \$96. The restaurant later realized the bill was fake. Someone had manipulated a \$5 bill to look like a \$100 bill. The customer was described as a black female, in her late 40s or early 50s, heavy set and wearing a winter hat and black coat. Lt. Jason Slater said detectives will be reviewing the restaurant's surveillance video to help identify the woman. A similar incident occurred just down the road at another restaurant on Owen Road about one half hour prior to the other incident. The owner said a woman entered and ordered garlic cheese bread at \$4 and paid with a \$100 bill. The woman's description matched the suspect from the other restaurant incident and employees said the woman was not one of their regular customers. The owner of the second restaurant said the bill looked real and the special pens used to detect fake bills did not detect a problem since it was a real \$5 bill, manipulated to look like a \$100 bill. Businesses are urged to be on the look out for counterfeit bills and make sure the small print matches the correct photo.

WEDDING RING MISSING

On Nov. 13, a Fenton police officer responded to a residence on Dauner Road to investigate a theft of a diamond wedding ring. A 22-year-old female resident said her \$3,000 white gold, 1/2-carat diamond wedding ring had been removed from her purse. She said friends and family members had been over for a birthday party and she noticed the ring missing following that party.

WINTER PARKING ORDINANCE IS **IN EFFECT IN HOLLY VILLAGE**

The Village of Holly ordinance, which prohibits parking on the streets of the village between the hours of 3 a.m. and 7 a.m., went into effect on Thursday, Nov. 15 and runs until April 15, 2013. During this time, vehicles may be parked in the grassy area between the sidewalk and the street if necessary, but such parking is prohibited at all other times. The Village of Holly prohibits parking in village-owned parking lots between the hours of 3 a.m. and 7 a.m. except in the following designated areas:

- The 11 parking spaces designated as "Overnight Parking" in the municipal lot at Civic Drive and West Maple Street.
- The nine parking spaces designated as "Overnight Parking" in the municipal lot at South Broad and Battle Alley.
- The entire Crapo Park parking area.
- The parking area found between the Village offices and the railroad tracks on the west side of South Saginaw Street, known as "Parcel B."

Those violating this ordinance may be subject to a parking citation, a fine and the vehicle may be towed. The ordinance is clearly posted at the side of every roadway entering the Village limits.

HULLI MAN SUPER DRUNK

At 4:50 p.m. on Friday, Nov. 9, Holly police responded to a tire store on North Holly Road on a report of a suspected drunk driver. The driver of a Jeep, later identified as a 62-year-old Holly man, was about to leave the parking lot. When police made contact with him, they detected a strong odor of intoxicants. Field sobriety tests were administered and the man blew a .29 percent on the preliminary breath test, more than three times the legal limit. The man was arrested and taken to the police station where a chemical test revealed a blood alcohol content of .21 percent. The

man initially denied drinking, however, he later confessed to drinking a pint of vodka that afternoon. The man face's a charge of operating a vehicle while intoxicated "super drunk," since his blood alcohol level was above .16 percent.

HOLLY WOMAN REPORTS DAMAGE

At 2:33 p.m., on Nov. 11, Holly police responded to the 4200 block of Grange Hall Road to investigate a report of a residence being shot at. The 52-year-old complainant said earlier in the day she noticed damage, holes, to the aluminum siding and damage to her kitchen window. She had no idea who caused the damage. Police observed the damage, which appears to have been from a BB gun.

LARCENY OF GAS

At 6:30 a.m. on Thursday, Nov. 8, a gas station in downtown Linden reported to Linden police that someone pumped \$31 of gas into their vehicle and failed to pay. The gas station manager could not provide a description of the vehicle.

DAMAGE TO CAR REPORTED

On Thursday, Nov. 8 the owner of a 1988 Chrysler reported to Linden police that while their car was parked at an elementary school in Linden, someone damaged and scratched the door locks on both sides of the car. The damage occurred sometime between 10 a.m. and 3 p.m. on Nov. 7.

Neil, I am not very familiar with this car, but this sounds like a front end component that is loose or damaged. You should have this looked at at a qualified repair shop as soon as possible, as this could cause you to loose control of the vehicle if it is a steering or suspension component.

• Together, visit the non-profit website www.Wonderopolis.org, voted one of TIME magazine's 50 Top Websites of 2011. Wonderopolis is an effective way to teach nonfiction reading, which the Common Core State Standards identify as a critical skill. The site's feature, "Wonder of the Day," is aligned with these standards, examining a new topic daily.

• **Is your** child interested in baseball? From historical accounts like "Baseball: A History of America's Favorite Game" by

George Vecsey to a book that explains how bats are made, such as "Good Wood: The Story of the Baseball Bat," by Stuart Miller, you can help kids score an academic homerun.

• Inspire the inner-chef in your children and test their ability to follow instructions with "Kids' Fun and Healthy Cookbook," by Nicola Graimes. Or

opt for a picture-book biography like, "Bon Appetit! The Delicious Life of Julia Child" by Jessie Hartland.

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Kan Rock Tire CEO is heavy lifter

► Earns second place overall in world powerlifting competition

Tim Roche is not only a powerful business executive as CEO of Kan Rock Tire — he's also the second most powerful man in the world.

Roche competed Nov. 5-11 at the WPC $World \, Power lifting \, Championship \, in \, Las \,$ Vegas, against 1,500 other powerlifters from around the world. He set the world record in Pause Press (bench press) by lifting 385 pounds. He placed second overall as a representative of the U.S. team, participat-

ing in three different events: squat (second place), pause press (first place) and dead lift (second place).

Roche is a relative newcomer to the sport, having begun serious training just three years ago. While he had started weightlifting in junior high school, he only recently began working with a bodybuilder trainer, and the rest is now history.

turkeys for the past eight years. "Before the shelter, they'd just pile on each other and suffocate." Roeske anticipates selling most of her 375 turkeys by Thanksgiving next Thursday, with a few left over for the Christmas season.

Still, Roeske enjoys the birds, walking and feeding them every day.

In an age where turkeys are processed, packaged and await patiently on a grocery shelf, getting a fresh, free-range turkey may seem unnecessary or even extravagant. But Roeske's turkeys are all handfed and taken care of on site, where she and her husband Eric are responsible for their nutrition and care. There are no extra ingredients or preservatives added to the Roeske turkey. Where other companies and people may pick the more familiar dark Heritage Turkey, Roeske said she chooses to raise Franklin Turkeys for their taste.

'The skin is more appealing. The flavor and texture is richer," Roeske said. "There's nothing wrong with Heritage birds. They're just not the

Norman Rockwell turkey." Roeske breeds her turkeys for 16 weeks, which she said is the peak time for flavor. The birds can range from 15 to 30 pounds and cost \$2.95 per pound. Roeske starts receiving calls for turkeys as early as August. By the first week of November, Roeske has

most of her turkeys reserved for a dinner. On Wednesday, Roeske walked alongside the electric fence that barricades the free-roaming birds, where they followed her every movement. Male turkeys, called Toms, puffed up their chest and

chirped at other Toms, showing off for the females. Roeske said the turkeys can be mean but they're not as vicious as Geese. Generally, they'll pick at bright

objects and travel in packs. A steer, pigs and chickens also populate Roeske's farm and are kept in separate pens.

Roeske isn't sure why she started raising turkeys. She raises them in the summer and fall and said her business is ran on a wordof-mouth basis. The turkeys are processed at Munsell's

Poultry Processing in Fowlerville and are available for pickup the week of Thanksgiving.

"We want to provide good food. This is all hands on," Roeske said. "The turkeys are used to people."





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


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
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
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

If all else fails, McKay said, take it in to have it prepped professionally.

If you don't already own a snow blower, perhaps now is the time to consider buying one. First, you will want to look at the snow blower that does what you need. "You really should buy what is going to suit your needs. There is no sense in buying a heavy duty snow blower if you only have a small driveway," McKay said.

When looking to purchase one, you will have to select between a single-stage and a two-stage snow blower.

"If you have a paved driveway, you can get away with a one-stage, but they are not self-propelled," said Jeremiah Sloan of Sloan's Hardware in Linden. "Two stages are self-propelled, they do better on hills and if you have longer driveways. Also if you have a gravel drive, the two-stage snow blower works better because you

should buy what is going to suit your needs. There is no sense in buying a heavy duty snow blower if you only have a small driveway.

Matt McKay McKay's Hardware in Holly can pick it up so it's not actually dragging along the ground and sucking all the gravel into it and throwing it around your yard."

Sloan said that single stages will do well with the light fluffy snow, though if you are dealing with the heavier and deeper snow, you will want a two-stage snow blower.

If you are looking for a cheaper alternative to snow blowers you can look

into electric shovels. Brad Caruso of Taylor Hardware in Fenton said that they have been out for a few years, but have become a lot more popular in the last two years.

"They're really nice for wood

decks, because they are not going to hurt the wood as they are light," said Caruso. "They are narrow, only 12 inches I believe – so you aren't going to go out and do the driveway with it. They are for the deck or the sidewalk maybe. The downside is you are obviously going to draw the power cord along with you, and some people may not like it."

If you are looking to pick up a normal, non-electric shovel, your options are

somewhat limited. Jeff Stone of Sear's Hometown Store in Fenton has an ergonomic shovel for people with back issues, and a Craftsman shovel that boasts a lifetime warranty.

"The best thing to know is to not shovel in heavy snow," said Stone. In those cases, you may be better off for your health to have a snow blower. If that is the option you go with, Stone's advice is still the same as everyone else's.

"See a local dealer and tell them what you are trying to accomplish, and they can put you in the right snow blower," Stone said. There is a size for every need."



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

Sparked by winning the first triple crown in baseball since 1967, the Detroit Tigers' Miguel Cabera was named the American League's Most Valuable Player on Thursday. It marked the second straight season a Tiger was named MVP. In 2011, pitcher Justin Verlander won it. Seven other Tigers have earned the honor. Here is a list of those previous winners.

TY COBB - 1911

All Cobb did in 1911 was bat .420 with eight home runs and 127 RBI. He also scored 147 runs and stole 83 bases. Cobb batted over .400 collectively from 1911 to 1913.

MICKEY COCHRANE - 1934

He was given the job playermanager and led the Tigers to the World Series. Charlie Gehringer (second), Schoolboy Rowe (fourth) and Hank Greenberg (sixth) also collected MVP votes

HANK GREENBERG - 1935/40

In 1935, Greenberg hit .328 with 36 home runs and 170 RBI. In 1940, he hit .340 with 41 home runs and 150 RBI. The Tigers won the World Series both seasons.

CHARLIE GEHRINGER - 1937

The "Mechanical Man" (.371 batting average) edged out the Yankees' Joe DiMaggio by four votes to win the honor.

HAL NEWHOUSER - 1944/45

During the two seasons, Newhouser had a 54-18 record and a 2.01 ERA, pitching 615 2/3 innings. The Tigers won the 1945 World Series.

DENNY MCLAIN - 1968

In between organ concerts, McLain won 31 games during the Tigers' World Championship season. Teammate Bill Freehan finished second in the voting, while Willie Horton was fourth.

WILLIE HERNANDEZ - 1984

The lefty's screwball led him to 32 saves in 33 chances. He pitched 140 1/3 innings in 80 relief appearances

Tigers tourney run ends in state quarterfinals

Davison — The Fenton varsity volleyball team's strong run in the Class A state tournament came to an end against Northville in the state quarterfinals Tuesday night.

The Tigers lost to Northville 25-23, 25-13, 25-21 at Davison High School.

Fenton (46-18-4) played strong defense for most of the night, but eventually couldn't keep up with the hitting power of outside hitter Symone Abbott and some of the team's own mistakes. She collected a match-high 14 kills and four block kills. In terms of kills, the match was actually pretty close. Northville managed a slight 31-30 kill lead. However, the Tigers had also had 20 hitting errors. Combined with six service errors, the Tigers made it hard to win the close games.

"(Abbott) was the least of my worries today, kind of," Fenton coach Linda Rusaw said. "She was a worry, but we didn't take care of our own side. We will give her her kills. Let her have them, but we have to get our own back.

"We had two balls off the antenna. We had a ball out of bounds over there. We rolled two balls out of bounds and we missed four serves. Those are unforced errors. But that's all right. We are celebrating. We had a great year and we're going to celebrate."

Indeed it was a great season. The Tigers captured their first Class A regional title this season, while breaking a school record with 46 wins. And while some were momentarily upset after Tuesday's game, it quickly became a time for celebration for the squad.

"We all know that we played our best," said Fenton senior Megan Cockin, who had an outstanding game in the back row, collecting a team-best 22 digs. "We had noth-

Lake Fenton — During his three seasons at Swartz Creek, Jake Erway gradually progressed through the boys basketball program.

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Wright begins new era in Linden hoops

Linden — It looked like a typical prep boys basketball practice at Linden High School Wednesday.

Players shot basketballs until they did their stretches and then some sprints. The number of sprints was dictated by the success a designated player had while trying a free throw before the sprints. With each shot that was made, an enthusiastic clap came from the players, who understood they would be doing less sprints.

However, while the activities weren't much different from many prep basketball drills, what was different was the head coach. Since the 1979-80 season Denny Hopkins led the team. But with-Hopkins' resignation last year, new coach Anthony Wright's era at the helm has begun.

"Coming in as a coach af-

ter someone who has been here for decades is very humbling," Wright said when he accepted the job in early May. "He was coaching here before my parents even met"

"The biggest thing I've had to adjust to is just getting the gym time," Wright said. "Finding a gym and getting in a gym is the challenge. But everything else is pretty much what I've expected."

Wright knows what good basketball looks like at the prep level. He played high school basketball at one of the best programs in the nation, Oak Hill Academy. Last year he spent the season as

the associate head coach at Ann Arbor Prep High School. This is his first experience as a head coach. He said he's learned a lot about his team in that short time.

"I learned that we are a very athletic team," Wright said. "We are going to be a bit bigger than I thought we were. I pulled up two sophomores, Kyle Korman and Cory Green. Cory has shown me a lot in the past month. He should be able to contribute right away."

Right now, the Eagles are just working on their basketball IQ.

"I just want them to have an increased basketball sense," Wright said when asked what he wanted to see out of his team during the opening week. "Just being in the gym, period, is a big thing for me. But I want to get them not only be better basketball players, but to be smarter ones as well."

Linden's first game is at home on Dec. 3 against Lapeer East.

Tigers established new standards for volleyball program's future

Davison — There were a lot of sad faces immediately after the Fenton varsity volleyball team's 25-23, 25-13, 25-21 Class A state quarterfinal loss to Northville Tuesday night.

However, those tears didn't last long. Sure the Fenton Tigers saw their season end against the Mustangs that night. But, quickly after the match, the Tigers realized they had a lot of reason to celebrate. And in a way, it was a ground-breaking season.

The Tigers have gone farther in the state tourney than they did this year with head coach Linda Rusaw as the mentor. In fact, they've advanced to the state championship match three times in school history – 1983, 1990 and 1992. They've won district and regional titles as well. But this season was different than all those past ones in one way. The past accomplishments came in Class B.

Since 2001, life in the state postseason has meant the Tigers have had to be one of the smallest Class A teams in the tourney. And it's made life tough. Entering this year, the Tigers had won just three districts since their move into Class A. There hasn't been any regional hardware. However, that all changed this season. En route to a school-record 46-victory season, the

Record-breaking season

It's been a record-breaking type year for the Fenton varsity volleyball team. Here are a few of their top highlights from this season

- Won Metro League title by sweeping every opponent in three games.
- Broke a school record by winning 46 matches.
- Won program's first-ever Class A regional title.

Tigers won their fourth Class A district crown and then won their first Class A regional with a 25-22, 25-21, 18-25, 25-23 championship victory at home against Flushing on Nov. 8. So even in defeat on Tuesday in the state quarterfinals, there was a lot to be proud of indeed.

"I thought we had a great season," senior Maizie Martin said. "I am a little upset that we lost, but we had a great season and had so many records we beat. I'm just so proud of our team."

"This year meant a lot because we weren't supposed to go this far, so it's just been amazing," senior Payton Maxheimer said. "We are so happy we've gone this far. And our team is so close. It's been incredible."

The Tigers' lack of success in Class A tourney play has nothing to do with the caliber of play within the program. In fact,

the Tigers have a run of five straight Metro League championships, and haven't lost a league match in that period. The Tigers took it a step better this season, not even losing a game against a league opponent.

However, being one of the smallest schools in the Class A event has been tough, particularly because in many seasons the Tigers have been in the same district as state-power Clarkston.

However, Clarkston wasn't in the bracket this season and that opened up greater

possibilities. And the Tigers took advantage of those possibilities. They beat Metro foes Brandon and Holly in district action, before defeating the Grand Blanc Bobcats in a five-game thriller in the district championship match. It took a come-frombehind 17-15 victory in the fifth game to earn the title.

For many of the team members the win against Grand Blanc was the start of something big.

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

However, many pieces return from this year's ground-breaking squad as well. The Tigers have setters returning, juniors Kayla Stiles and Ashley Bearden. Rich Ramsey of the Michigan Association of School Boards (MASB) is conducting the search for the next superintendent, who should be chosen by the board by the end of March 2013.

He said that the community contributes up to 75 percent of the questions the superintendent candidates are asked, as they are vetted by the board for the job. "I think boards of education pay a lot of attention to

what they hear from the community and staff," said Ramsey. He met with HAS staff and community members this week to offer the

timeline the superintendent search is going to follow and to facilitate surveys.

This input has been rolling in, via an online survey, as well as written copies that were returned at the meeting on Tuesday at the Karl Richter Campus where the board of education usually meets. The majority of the input will come from online surveys, with a deadline of Nov 26. They can be filled out at www.has-k12.org.

Ramsey explained to community members that narrowing that field for the biggest job for HAS is done based on input from the board, but also the staff and the community. "The board is seeking your input," said Ramsey as he presented his timeline

to the audience that included the board, parents and representatives from township government and police.

The survey has six multiple choice/ weight questions and a few fill in the blanks. Ramsey pointed out that if they are too stringent on these areas, they may unnecessarily limit their field of candidates. "There are lots of great superintendents who have specialist degrees," said Ramsey, as opposed to a doctorate.

Bill Disessa of Holly Village had chil-

dren go through Holly schools and he offered his input. He admitted that he was a big Kent Barnes fan and would like to see someone with

similar qualities. "I appreciate that he's inclusive of people," he said. Disessa would like the next superintendent to also have a personable approach with the public.

Ohla Dunbar of Holly Township had a list of qualities she would like. "I think this person almost has to have a zen personality, always focused, always on, always available to the people, listens, is respectful, is very well respected in the community."

Ramsey said close to 100 surveys have been turned in, including those from staff. He projects up to 35 percent of HAS staff will return the survey and a smaller part of the community will give their input. The deadline to turn in the survey is Monday, Nov 26.

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
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

Major said they stopped to help at the beachfront communities of Breezy

Point and Rockaway in Queens, which were devastated by the hurricane.

"Everyone was happy to see us," said Major. "We were even able to give the Rockaway firefighters a break. They had been working non-stop.'

What really impressed Major through all of the devastation was the fact that the firefighters they were helping were always making sure that Major and his group were being well taken care of. "They worried about us even though they were the ones who lost their homes," he said.

Major described one area along the coast as appearing as if an atom bomb had gone off. "The whole neighborhood

> Matt Hadfield, a five-year veteran of the Fenton Fire Department said without a doubt, this trip was a lifechanger. He said he and the other firefighters had a lot

more energy on the drive out to the East Coast and the conversations while driving home focused on just how bad things were in areas damaged by the hurricane.

"We didn't really know what to expect," he said. They were told of the devastation and saw news stories, but to see it in person was beyond anything. "There were only a handful of homes in the Breezy Point neighborhood that were inhabitable."

For the most part, driving through the all-but destroyed neighborhoods was like a movie. "Entire towns were wiped off the map," he said.

Firefighters that this local group met recalled how they initially felt like they were in a dream and everything would be ok. After a few days, however, the devastation began to sink in. Hadfield said those fire departments lost everything they had and they were beyond appreciative of the equipment and supplies that this trip provided.

This was Hadfield's first opportunity to respond to this type of catastrophic situation and when asked if he thought his fire department would be prepared for an emergency, he said the 2007 tornado was a wake-up call. That event prompted additional planning within the department and procedures are in place should something big happen in this area.

Victims of the hurricane told Major that they don't know at this point how they will rebuild. Many are waiting for insurance to come through and they will move forward after that. "A lot of them are sleeping at the fire stations while their families are stay-

ing elsewhere," he said.

Major said he is now putting together a plan, as a non-profit, to be prepared to respond to any future emergencies.



I've always done a lot of different things, but they all come back to the same process — whether it's sewing, planting, cooking, or whatever. I got married, had two kids and eventually got divorced, so I went back to school for my nursing degree. For the next 20 years, I worked as a registered nurse. I was director of nursing for a nursing home here in town, worked on the medical floor at Hurley and the oncology floor at St. Joe's in Flint. own questions in books she keeps at the store. **your own business with Yard 'N Garden?** That's too long of a story. Let's just say it was time to move out of Flint and back to Fenton to be closer to family. This property had once been a greenhouse and florist,

What are the most common questions that people ask you about gardening? Basically it all comes down to the same questions over and over, but in different versions, depending upon the weather, etc.

so I returned it to its original purpose

when I opened up shop.

What stumps people the most about their yard and garden? Definitely, it's the weeds. Whether a certain plant is a weed or a flower, how to get rid of them. In different cultures, different plants are considered weeds. For example, a poinsettia is considered a weed in Jamaica and Mexico, and tomatoes are a jungle weed in South America. It's all in your perspective.

Do you ever get asked a garden question you can't answer? I

expect to get completely stumped two or three times a year. I encourage people to bring in leaves or a plant that they don't know anything about. I used to hit the library all the time, now I use a combination of the library and the Internet. I also have a lot of my own reference books. I've used them all.

Which season is your favorite? I like all the seasons. I like to watch things change every season. There's always something different to look at. Even though I'm not into winter sports, I love to shovel snow and use a snow blower.

Do you have a favorite flower or plant? I love a fern leaf peony and a toad lily. I also like a mix of perennials and annuals in the garden. I look at perennials like they're my 'old friends' — the backbone, dependable part of my garden. I look at annuals as my 'new friends,' bringing in a shot of color during their life cycle in one season. The very best gardens have both.

What is your favorite and least favorite part of your business? That's easy. I love talking to customers and I hate paperwork.

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

Though barbers have to be proficient in a variety of cuts, they each have their own specialties and cuts that may be more challenging for them, though Marshbanks didn't want to reveal which cuts challenged him.

Marshbanks said a typical men's cut starts with the clippers around the back and sides and is finished with the shears up top. Longer hair may require using the clippers over a comb,

instead of guards that set the length. The approach a barber takes to a hair cut depends on the length.

Barbers use precision equipment like professional shears and clippers that are maintained and sterilized regularly.

O'Guinn said his shears cost around \$50, but have lasted more than 15 years.

O'Guinn said business has slowed with more chain shops like BoRic's coming in that are open later than most family-owned barber shops. He said a major advantage to a barber shop is the clientele building, which is so important to barbers who only are paid off the fees and tips they receive.

Many local barbers trained at the Flint Barbering Academy. For one year, learning the craft was like a full-time job, literally cutting hair for eight hours per day.

> Barbers also have to keep up with the trends of the day. "It can go from high and tight fades, to long and shaggy," said O'Guinn. Barbers help each other out when implementing new styles. Barber Gary Williamson of Linden said it's not

too difficult to figure out what a client wants. "When they don't know what they want, you ask them what they don't want," he said.

Snippers coined a haircut of their own, called the "Snippers Cut," which is a tight fade on the back and sides up to a longer side-parted cut on top.

Haircuts at both locations cost \$13 and \$11 for retirees. Many smaller shops are closed on Mondays.

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

God often works in the dark

The Bible begins with God at work in the dark: 'And the earth was without form and void; and darkness was upon the face of the deep' (Genesis 1:2).

Out of the darkness, God called for light... and there was light.

You may be experiencing a dark time in your life. Take heart. On the darkest day, God makes a way.

My work has placed me with people in the most trying times of their lives. I have been there when tears were flowing, when all the castles had tumbled, when the feared and unwanted had become reality. At the age of 17, a friend of mine was involved in a serious automobile accident. He suffered injuries that required 137 stitches in his head and in addition to the multiple cuts and bruises, he lost four front teeth. But there was another bruise that was more difficult to bear...a financial bruise. The car he had been driving was not insured and he found himself facing a huge debt.

Concerned about the overwhelming financial obligation, he returned to work within two weeks after the accident. Soon he added a second job and asked for all the overtime he could get. Through hard work and disciplined spending, he paid off the entire debt in

less than three years.

Later, my friend became an extremely successful building contractor and land developer. Interestingly, he views the automobile accident that took place in his youth as one of the key factors that led to his success and is thankful for that dark time when God was at work in his life, teaching him discipline that would equip him for tasks ahead.

Sometimes God works in the dark time by proving the promises He gave in better days are true.

Never question in the dark what God gave you in the light.

A man with whom I spoke had reached nearly 90 years. His clear witness for his Lord was well known in the community where he lived, as was his consistent life.

Our conversation turned to the subject of heaven. At first mention of that promised place, tears came to his eyes, quickly spilling over their wrinkled barriers and washing down his weather-

'The days are getting brighter all the time!' he said.

He had spent his life believing the promises in the Bible about heaven and now that health was failing and strength was departing, he found them sufficient. God was leading him safely through the valley of the shadow of death with light He had given to him in days of strength.

HELP! Puppy thinks shoes are chew toys

DEAR PAW'S CORNER: Help! Our new puppy, "Elwood," is getting into everything, chewing up my kids' shoes and tearing the stuffing out of stuffed animals. Any advice on getting him to

DEAR JESSICA: Getting a puppy to completely stop exploring and chewing is a job that requires time and patience. Invest in toddler safety gates to limit Elwood to parts of the house where he's less likely to find shoes, toys and other objects. In that gated-off area, remove kids' toys, clothing, stuffed animals and other chewable objects. Lift potted plants out of his reach (the leaves of many houseplants are poisonous to pets). Make sure Elwood has access to his pet bed and to appropriate

chew toys, and check on him frequently. Puppies should not be left alone for long periods of time, for many reasons.

Next, grab a book or three on dog training, all of which will cover important basic commands like "sit," "stay," "come" and "heel." Spend at least 30 minutes every day working with Elwood, in addition to twicedaily walks and generous amounts of playtime. Anxiety or other issues can be at the root of longterm chewing problems.

PAUL G. DONOHUE, M.D. To your good health

DEAR DR. DONOHUE: Three or four months ago, the ring finger on my right hand started making popping noises when I bent it. Now it's still doing that, and it catches in a bent position from time to time. I work as a carpenter, and I can't afford to take time off. What do you think this is? — R.B. **ANSWER:** My guess is trigger finger. The tendons that bend the fingers travel from the forearm into the palm and then onto each finger and the thumb. On their way to the fingers, a sheath of tough tissue encircles them.

Repetitive movements of the fingers irritate the protective tendon sheaths, and they swell. The swelling squeezes the tendon, and the popping noise you hear is the tendon freeing itself from its swollen sheath. That snapping noise sounds like the noise heard when cocking a gun's trigger.

As time goes by, the finger might become locked for some time in the bent position.

You don't want to hear this, but rest is essential to permit the tendon to move smoothly. If you must work, padded gloves afford some protection for the finger. Gripping a tool like a hammer is particularly hard on the tendon and its sheath. Tools with a larger-than-normal handle are less of a problem. The best protection is wearing a metal splint so that the finger can't move.

Your doctor can give you a cortisone injection into the problem area, and that often reduces the swelling quickly. You must rest your finger after the injection for at least three days.

If two injections fail to free the finger, then you need to consult an orthopedic surgeon for an opinion on surgical release of the tendon.

Our daughter feels it could be viewed as rude to "unfriend" her. We think it is weird that she is following our daughter on Facebook and commenting on her page. What are your thoughts on this sticky situation? — Upset Parents

DEAR UPSET: If your daughter doesn't want this woman to see her posts, she can "unfriend" her, and if this is seen as rude, does she care? Otherwise, she can adjust her privacy settings and prevent this mom from seeing her posts without unfriending her. If the mother notices this and sends her a message to ask

why, your daughter can simply be honest and say, "It makes me uncomfortable sharing my personal posts with you.

DEAR AMY: My future in-laws have offered to pay for our rehearsal dinner, and I am so grateful! I am severely allergic to nuts and can't be close to nut products without having a reaction. My future mother-inlaw is demanding that a nutfilled dessert be served (it's

Amv her favorite). My fiance and I have politely tried to explain this issue and have

told her we would pay for the dinner ourselves, but she says she is not willing to even attend the dinner "when the bride is being so selfish." Amy, I have been polite and grateful, but I feel it is reasonable to ask not to be around something that could hurt me. How do I fix this? This has become a huge ordeal. — Allergic Fiancee

DEAR ALLERGIC: Your future mother-in-law's statement is extremely rude. You and your fiance need to sit down with her for a firm reality check. You (and he) will say, "I can't have any nuts or be around any nuts at any time. I know you don't like this, but that's the way it is. Do you understand how serious this is?" Wait for her answer. Print out some information for her about your allergy, and ask for her help to keep your celebration safe.

Sweet Potato Casserole

INGREDIENTS

- 4½ lbs. of sweet potatoes
- 1 cup of granulated sugar
- 1/2 cup of butter, softened
- 1/4 cup of milk
- 2 large eggs 1 t. of vanilla extract
- 1/4 t. of salt
- 11/4 cups of cornflakes cereal, crushed
- 1/4 cup of chopped pecans
- 1 T. of brown sugar
- 1 T. of butter, melted
- 1½ cups of miniature marshmallows

DIRECTIONS

- 1. Preheat oven to 400 degrees. Bake sweet potatoes at 400 degrees for 1 hour or until tender. Let stand until cool to touch (about 20 minutes); peel and mash sweet potatoes. Reduce oven temperature to 350 degrees.
- 2. Beat mashed sweet potatoes, granulated sugar, and next five ingredients at medium speed with an electric mixer until smooth. Spoon potato mixture into a greased 9"x13" baking dish.
- 3. Combine cornflakes cereal and next three ingredients in a small bowl. Sprinkle over casserole in diagonal rows 2 inches apart.
- 4. Bake at 350 degrees for 30 minutes. Remove from oven; let stand 10 minutes. Sprinkle marshmallows in alternate rows between cornflake mixture; bake 10 minutes. Let stand 10 minutes before serving.







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Dr. James Hirt what can you tell me about hammertoes?





You don't have to live with foot pain.

What is a hammertoe?

A hammertoe is a contracture or bending of the toe at the toe joints. Any toe can be involved; most commonly the second through the fifth toes. This is more common in women and likely due to tighter fitting shoes. There are two different types of hammertoes:

Flexible Hammertoes: This is the early stages in the development of a hammertoe. The joints are still flexible and the toe can be manipulated back into a correct position with pressure. At this point they may or may not be painful and rubbing on shoes.

Rigid Hammertoes: This is the later stage of hammertoe development when the toe joint becomes misaligned and immobile. This is more serious, as the toe usually begins to rub in shoes and develop painful corns and calluses on the skin. Rigid contractures are seen in patients who have waited too long to seek medical treatment of the toes. They can still be fixed at this time, but the fix is more involved. It is common to see complications such as sores, ulcers, abscesses and infections when the rigid contracture of the toes rub on shoes, which can create more problems than just a sore toe.

What causes a hammertoes?

A hammertoe is formed due to an abnormal balance of the muscles in



the toes. This abnormal balance causes increased pressures on the tendons and joints of the toe, leading to its contracture. Heredity and trauma can also lead to the formation of a hammertoe. Arthritis is another factor, because the balance around the toe in people with arthritis is so disrupted, a hammertoe may develop. Wearing shoes that are too tight and cause the toes to squeeze can also be a cause for a hammertoe to form. This abnormal balance can make the muscle and tendons that attach to the bottom of the toe pull too hard and make the toe "hammer" or contract.

Can hammertoes be prevented?

"At home fixes" include wearing proper fitting shoes that do not crowd your toes. Protecting the toes from rubbing in shoes with protective sleeves or non-medicated pads. Avoiding long term use of high heels, as this puts all the pressure on the toes and often squeezes the toes.

Our office treatment includes: Evaluating the feet so we can make a specific plan to prevent and treat the hammertoes. With hammertoes, treating early is the best medicine as it is much easier to fix and prevent, if caught early before the toes become rigid and immobile. Often early treatment includes using devices to protect and straighten the toe, or using orthotic devices to balance the pressure and forces on the toe joints. If orthotics are considered, it is particularly important to have a mold taken of your foot while it is held in the correct position to make a Custom Functional Orthotic, as this will allow the foot to be completely balanced. The scanners that people stand on do not provide an "orthotic", they provide a soft insole without the needed functional support to balance joints. The supermarket "orthotics" are best used for some cushion in your shoe, but won't give any functional correction of the foot.

Can hammertoes be fixed?

Yes, all hammertoes can be fixed. The worse they get the more work they take to

correct, but I have not found a hammertoe deformity yet that I could not correct. As discussed above early evaluation and treatment is beneficial.

With flexible hammertoes, a small painless procedure is done in the office that takes about 15 minutes and has minimal recovery and little to no pain. This procedure rebalances the tendons and straightens the toes. There are no crutches or casts needed for this procedure, you can walk on your foot the same day the in-office procedure is done and full recovery is expected within a week.

For rigid hammertoes, the bone at the joint usually needs to be realigned. There has been significant advancement in surgery over the last few years, which make it much easier and quicker healing, with the ability to immediately walk on the foot without crutches or casts. For this correction it is usually an hour procedure, done at an outpatient surgery center with a few weeks of recovery expected.

Do the gimmicks in the magazines like toe splints work?

For the most part they will not. We have a few medical grade hammertoe splints in the office that do help when they are worn. Most gimmicks seen in magazines don't address the root problem of the joints being out of balance.

What should I do if I suspect hammertoes?

We evaluate people with hammertoes on a daily basis. We can give recommendations as to how severe it is and explain different treatment options available. We will work out a treatment or prevention plan that works for you.

Remember that foot pain is not normal. At the first signs of pain, or any noticeable changes in your feet, seek professional help by our trained foot doctors and surgeons, early treatment and prevention is the key to lifelong healthy pain free feet.

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
