**Fenton** — He's warm, friendly, and quieter than a dog. He is house trained, and doesn't make any messes. His name is Eli, and he is a pot-bellied pig.

But does he belong in the city of Fenton? Wolfgang Zientek thinks so.

Zientek and his wife had adopted Eli over a year ago as a therapy animal for their daughter. He said that his daughter, who has autism, is responding well with Eli. They chose to withhold her name to protect her privacy.

Zientek recently received a nuisance violation letter from the city, and was told that he has to get rid of their beloved pig.

"Eli is most certainly not a nuisance. He does not bark, he does not bite, and he will not chase you or run at you when you pass by our home. In fact, if you did not know we had him, you would never know he was there," Zientek said.



Even though he knew Washington, D.C. was a partisan environment, after living it in person, he knows it is a very serious issue. "It's a problem," he said. "I was sent there to get things done." He believes it's imperative to work across party lines.

Despite how partisan it is, "I see a glimmer of hope, especially of the new members," he said.

Kildee is taking a strong role as a freshman legislator, and he is involved with a bi-partisan group of new members that meet regularly. His first bill that he introduced was bipartisan. He and Republican

# Mom's hands

Reprinted by request – originally published in 2007 For me, Mom's hands are the first

thing that comes to mind when I think of her. Some days I can recall them more clearly than her face. Often they were red and raw from hot dishwater, wrinkled from bathwater, and they were battle-scarred from years of accidental burns from scorching skillets and hot irons. But they were the most important hands in my life and, to me, they were beautiful.

Mom's hands reached out from the delivery room for me and each of my six brothers and sisters in the first few moments of our life and never really let go until the day she died.

Mom's hands spent countless hours

spoon-feeding a seemingly endless parade of babies from endless jars of Gerber strained vegetables and fruits. They changed our diapers, washed our faces, combed our hair and wiped our

runny noses. They reached out and caught us when, as toddlers, we crashed to the floor while learning to walk. They held our trembling bodies when we awakened from bad dreams in the middle of the night.

Mom's hands dried our tears and applied Band-aids to our scraped knees and elbows. They buttoned our coats, pulled on our mittens and taught us to tie our shoes.

They waved a finger an inch from our noses when we misbehaved and washed our mouths out with Ivory soap when we were disrespectful.

Mom's hands prepared an incalcula-

ble number of meals to feed her family. They took thousands of photos of birthday parties, graduations and weddings. They clapped at hundreds of plays, little league games, award ceremonies and ballet recitals. They tied bows on countless birthday and Christmas gifts.

Mom's hands proudly displayed her wedding ring to show the world that she had married the love of her life. They shook in fists of anger when she was hurt or angry. They trembled when she wrote weekly letters to my older brother serving his country in Vietnam. They folded in prayer each night before she slept.

They shook when she buried a son, her parents and her baby sister. They lovingly cradled each of her dozen grandchildren.

Mom's hands held the hands of countless relatives, friends, neighbors and patients who sought her comfort in times of need.

When, near death, she couldn't walk,

couldn't see and couldn't speak, her hands could still weakly squeeze our hands in acknowledgment of our presence right up until mere hours before she died.

And it was these same hands that God reached out and took hold of when He took her home.

If you're fortunate enough to still have your mother in your life, do something really special for her — something from the heart. Write a letter telling her how much she means to you. Make a photo album of your family for her. Stop in unexpectedly for coffee some morning. Hold her hands in yours and tell her how much you appreciate all that she's done!

I'd give anything I possess if I could, just for a moment, hold my mom's hands in my hands again.

## Fenton Township spends \$6,000 for mere 680 voters to cast ballots

### ► Ananich elected as state senator

With a mere 6.47 percent voter turnout, Jim Ananich has been elected as state senator for the 27th district during the special election on Tuesday, May 7.

The term for this senate seat ends Jan. 1, 2015. He will replace John Gleason, the former state senator who vacated the seat after he was elected as Genesee County clerk in November 2012.

Ananich, 37, (D-Flint) defeated Republican candidate Robert Daunt, 77, of Flint with a vote of 8,728 (75.3 percent) to 2,640 (22.7 percent). Libertarian candidate Robert Nicholls received 143 votes (1.2 percent) and Green candidate Bobby Jones received 80 votes (.7 percent). There were four write-in votes. Results of the election are unofficial.

Overall, in Genesee County there are 227,069 registered voters. In this special election, 14,692 voters cast ballots, for a 6.47 percent voter turnout.

Ananich has taught at Carman-Ainsworth schools, worked for Priority Children and has served as a state representative. He has his bachelor's degree from Michigan State University and a teacher's certificate in secondary education.

The newly elected state senator has said that bringing jobs and opportunities to this community is a major focus of his.

He has a track record of working across the aisle to get things done.

#### **Fenton Township**

Operations Manager/Deputy Clerk Thomas Broecker said the election cost Fenton Township approximately \$6,000 to hold. Of the township's 12,905 registered voters, 680 (5.3 percent) cast ballots on Tuesday.

Of Fenton Township residents, Anan-

ich received 362 votes (53.2 percent), Daunt received 304 votes (44.7 percent), Jones received nine votes (1.3 percent) and Nicholls received five votes (.7 percent). While 217 votes were cast at

the polling station — Lake Fenton High School — 463 residents cast their vote by absentee voter (AV) ballot.

#### **Fenton City**

Fenton City Clerk Jenny Naismith said of Fenton's 9,419 registered voters, 144 of them voted in person and another 24 voted with AV ballots, for a total of 2 percent voter

turnout. Of those that voted, 109 voted for Ananich, 54 voted for Daunt, two voted for Jones and one voted for Nicholls.

The special election cost Fenton City about \$4,000.

Clerk Lynn Henry said Ananich won the election with Linden residents with 165 votes. Daunt received 145 votes, while Nicholls received 12 and Jones received three votes. Of the 3,021 registered voters in Linden, 54 voted in person and another 271 voted with absentee ballots. Of the local area, Linden had the best voter turnout, with 11 percent. The election cost Linden approximately \$1,500 to hold.

#### **Argentine Township**

Clerk Denise Graves said Ananich won the election in Argentine Township. She said 84 residents from the township voted in person on Tuesday and another 194 voted absentee ballot. Of the 5,086 registered voters, there were 278 ballots cast, which is 5.46 percent voter turnout. This special election cost the township more than \$2,000 to hold.

If Fenton Township had not automatically sent AV applications to voters on the permanent AV list, the number would have undoubtedly been even lower, according to Broecker.

"I believe that most voters were unaware of the election since there was very little publicity and it appeared that none of the candidates did any campaigning. Idon't even recall seeing a single political sign in recent weeks.

"I think the legislature needs to look at alternative ways to fill office vacancies. These unplanned elections are a 'pain in the budget."

Argentine Township Clerk Denise Graves said, "The turnout was dismal.

"We staffed the election at the minimum number per precinct. Many people said they did not know we were having an election."

Graves added that she has found that many people do not take time to research positions of the candidates or learn anything about them.

# The ever-shrinking dollar

### ▶Buying power of a dollar is not quite what it used to be

There has been a lot of talk about doing away with the penny — it currently costs the U.S. Government more than one cent to make the iconic coin. Obviously, this was not always the case, but as costs and expenses have gone up across the board, that one cent does not stretch as far as it used to.

Neither does the dollar, in fact — just last year, there was talk in Congress on the topic of eliminating the \$1 bill. While this may seem unlikely to us now, thanks to inflation it is not difficult to imagine a future where this could happen.

"Inflation is defined as an overall increase in prices across the board. As

opposed to an increase in price of a particular thing," said Christopher Douglas, associate professor of economics at University of Michigan-Flint.

If an incident somehow impacts the supply and demand of a product like gasoline, this is not a case of inflation.

With inflation, there is no change in scarcity — just prices in general will rise as more money enters the economy. "The

typical phrase that you will hear is that there are more dollars chasing the same number of goods, so each dollar commands less purchasing power," said

Though we currently live in troubled economic times, inflation is not one of our many concerns as a country. According to Douglas, inflation is currently sitting at between 2-3 percent a year, which is low. "The last time infla-

**Christopher Douglas** University of Michigan-Flint associate professor of economics tion was a problem was probably in the 1970s, when inflation was in the double digits, between 10 to 15 percent."

Inflation becomes problematic when it is not anticipated. If inflation rises unexpectedly, people find they have less money to go around to buy the things they need. When inflation is anticipated however, wages tend to keep up with prices Douglas said.

Even with anticipated

inflation, there can be some problems. "One thing is it is just annoying to see prices constantly on the rise, because you can never really form a reference price in your mind about what things should cost as it is constantly changing."

#### WHAT DID IT COST, THEN AND NOW?

While inflation affects the prices of all products, there are other factors that can influence what you pay for a particular item. Supply and demand, the difficulty to produce a product, and more all have an effect. Even in the last 30 years, prices have fluctuated greatly — below you can see some examples as average costs have

Bemus is currently assigned as the Investigations supervisor.


When she learned she was getting the award from the American Legion, Bemus was shocked. She didn't know that she had been entered for the state award.

# ASK THE MECHANIC

Hi Chris I just noticed a hissing sound at the back of my 05 impala I don't know if its the fuel pump going bad? When i turn off the car it stops!

—Aurther

Aurther, This could be a few things and you might want to have a mechanic near you listen to it, the fuel pump will make a steady humming noise when the car is running and one thing you could do is listen while someone turns the key on and see if the sound is the same, (when you turn the key on the pump should run for 10 seconds or so to prime the fuel system) if this is the sound try changing the fuel filter first as it could be clogged causing the pump to work very hard to produce enough pressure and volume to keep the car running, next thing to look at is if the hissing sound is coming from the fuel cap or the vent valve under the car in the evaporative emissions canister, these valves can become inoperative at times causing the fuel tank to pressurize or have a vacuum, if this is the case you will need a professional to diagnose this as the cost can go very high if you replace the wrong part.



Both styles work well, and can save you water and energy. The question is what type of floor do you plan on setting the machine on? First floor laundry's can present a problem for front loaders. When the machine goes into high speed spin (1200 RPM) and the load gets out of balance, a weak floor will magnify the vibration and cause the unit to bounce around. This is not the fault of the machine. To test your floor, put a glass of water on your dryer, observe it while a load of clothes are spinning in your current washer. If the water has large ripples in it, go with the top load!

Fenton — Cancer, obesity and leukemia are subjects generally tackled by medical students who have completed years of higher education. On Wednesday, fifth graders, at Tomek-Eastern Elementary School presented research on these topics and more at the third annual International Baccalaureate (IB) fifth-grade exhibition.

The exhibition is the capstone of the Primary Years Program (PYP) and each presentation required in-depth research

listened to different presentations. For the presentation on head injuries, students contacted the Michigan State University and University of Michigan athletic departments, getting professional advice on how to recognize concussions and how to treat

The students presented their findings through a slide show that included video, animation and sound effects,

as well as through traditional media such as poster board and pictures.

The students who researched head injuries plan to present their findings to the Fenton High School football team.

"The kids learn how to work in a group,

as well. "It's one thing to talk about it. It's another thing to do something about it."

The students who presented facts about child car seats made a public service announcement about safety and a video, in addition to having Michigan State Trooper Thomas Vaughn attend class and answer questions. Vaughn fielded inquiries amongst enthusiastic students, ranging from when it was OK for them

to ride in the front seat and what happens if there are no seat belts in a car.

"You should be in a booster seat if you're under 8 years old or smaller than 4-feet, 9-inches," Vaughn told students. "And you should always wear your seat-

Middle school students honored for overcoming obstacles in academics and behavior

When Chase LeJeune was in elementary school and the early years of middle school, he was an angry young man.

#### **Summary**

The Fenton Optimist Club recognizes middle school students that have overcome obstacles to achieve academic, social and behavioral success at the annual Turn Around Achievement Awards.

He'd throw fits about homework, people making fun of him and would even break tables and get into fights. His grades were Ds and Es, if he even finished the work.

The difference between that young man

and the 14-year-old student LeJeuene is today is nothing short of a miraculous turnaround. He has Aspergers Syndrome on the autism spectrum, making social interaction difficult, resulting in frustration, inappropriate emotions, anger and sometimes even violence.

Now he's an all-A student, a leader in his autism spectrum class at A.G.S. Middle School in Fenton and a member of the eighth-grade baseball team, playing left field. He's also a voracious reader and a competitor in

mixed martial arts.

His teacher, Hannah Rodenbaugh, was so emotional about his turn around at the Fenton Optimist Club Turn Around Achievement Award on Wednesday, May 8, that she could hardly speak more than a few words.

"I'm going to miss him so much next year when he goes to high school,"

she said. "It's hard to believe that just last year we were having conversations about where he was headed if he didn't make some changes, both at school and at home. With some guidance, he totally turned his life around. Now he's a role model to others for making positive changes."

Jaydin Bellant, an eighth grader at Lake Fenton Middle School, also hit a rough patch during her middle school years, getting bad grades and finding

herself in trouble at school. "I didn't see the need for working hard in school and I didn't think I could accomplish much anyway." She also has several medical issues, from major heart surgery at only 5 weeks old to seizures caused by microlepsy.

"I take eight pills a day and get bad headaches," she said. "Now I have a heart murmur."

An accomplished dancer, she decided to try out for the competitive Academy at Fenton School of Dance, and realized for the first time how closely related success at dance and success at school were. That desire created a 360-degree turn around in her attitude and grades at school.

Even though she didn't succeed in getting into the Academy the first time she tried, she entered her eighth-grade year with a whole new mindset for success. "I was speechless and really proud," said Bellant, when she was nominated as one of two Lake Fenton Middle School "Turn Around" students. "I've never gotten anything like this before. Now I have something to be really proud of."

These students were two of the 12 students honored Wednesday at Spring Meadows Country Club in Linden. There's a story of failure and triumph for each of these students, who were hand selected by their teachers and administrators for their dramatic turn around.

This program has as much meaning for teachers and administrators as it

does for the students.

"This is my second favorite event of all of our activities during the school year," said Lake Fenton Middle School Principal Dan Ferguson, also a member of the Fenton Optimist Club.

"Everyone then wants to know my first favorite event, and it's the eighth grade

celebration at the end of the school year.

"The fact that three of our local school superintendents representing more than 8,000 students give up part of their day to celebrate Turn Around with their middle school students says just how important this event is to them."

Eli, Zientek has started two online petitions, one of which has more than 100 signatures.

"We've spoken to all of the neighbors surrounding us and no one has a problem or believe that he is a nuisance," he said.

Zientek said that his family had called and received approval of adopting Eli from the city council office over a year ago, and now feels like his family is being targeted and harassed.

Brad Hissong, the city's building and zoning administrator, said that the city is not targeting specific people out of malice, but that his department received a complaint about the pig, and therefore had to act on it.

We've got an ordinance that says they can't have it. I don't want to make a big deal out of it," he said.

If you let it stay there knowingly that it's in violation then you can't enforce that ordinance at all," Hissong said. "We have no choice."

Hissong said that despite Zientek's claim, he had never granted permission for a pig to be kept as a pet.

Should Zientek wish to appeal the decision, Hissong said that he can go to the zoning board of appeals (ZBA) to argue his case. However, Hissong said that the zoning board would probably either have to turn down the request, or suggest that the ordinance regarding what pets are allowed in the city be changed.

Zientek plans to continue fighting to keep Eli, and said that he would go before the city council if he has to. "I'm going to fight the issue," he said.

"This is a very fast-paced job," she said during a lull Wednesday afternoon.

The shop isn't alone in needing help — a quick search of monster.com, or corporate websites reveal that people are hiring — albeit modestly.

The Michigan Department of Technology, Management and Budget (DTMB) released two consecutive reports this spring, reporting job growth, and decreased unemployment in Michigan.

The report dated April 17 reported a three-tenths of a percentage point drop over the previous month, and the April 25 report a decline in joblessness in 17 of the major labor markets including Flint. The Flint area dropped from 9.8 percent to 9.1 percent.

To an economist like Chris Douglas, of the University of Michigan-Flint (UM-Flint), the numbers look like a "mixed bag." He said Michigan lost some jobs this spring, and some of the decreasing jobless numbers were because people left the labor force.

He said the good news, is that there was still positive job creation this year. "We're still up quite a bit," he said, from January and February 2012, "better than anything last year."

Another bright spot is that Michigan is performing better in job creation compared to the national average. Michigan historically has had an unemployment rate 1.5 percent higher than the national average. Currently Michigan is less than one point above the national average. "We're over performing our historical average, so I think that's some good news," said Douglas, adding that Michigan is mirroring the national trend of slow but steady job growth.

Slow growth may only mean a few extra jobs here and there. But these jobs make a

big difference to the one who gets it.

At the Village Ace Hardware in Linden, they've recently added at least two to their staff for seasonal help, said manager Greg Sander. With the heat turning up in Michigan finally, "we've been slammed," he said.

He hopes to keep the seasonal workers longer if possible. In the hardware and home improvement industry, he said the general sense is that things are improving, using lumber sales as an indicator.

A search for jobs within a five-mile radius of Fenton on Monster.com reveals

several positions in Fenton. Some are outside sales and temporary staffing, others include a local computer shop and an engineering internship in Holly.

Suburban Propane in Fenton recently hired a customer service employee to Fenton, and they also have an ad up for another position on the website.

Halo Burger, owned by Dortch Enterprises is hiring at all locations for positions including management. The company sent out a mass text this week.

A large employer in downtown Flint, UM-Flint, also has dozens of positions at the Flint campus.

University Human resources Director Diana Carran, said the university hiring is steady over the years, because there is very low turnaround for full-time university positions. On the website there are currently 23, regular full-time jobs, like lecturer, assistant professor and multi-media designer.

UM-Flint hiring is a little less than last year — Carran said 63 staff member positions were listed last year, with 61 this year. More lecturers were hired last year to meet student enrollment. Last year they sought 72, this year 61.

On the other had, restaurants have a 300-percent turnaround, said Mancino's of Fenton owner Mark Rummel. "We've

hired three people this year which is rare," said Rummel via email. "Some years I don't hire anyone."

"We're actually busier than in the past, but we're working a deal with our current part-timers to give them more hours for their bigger commitment to summer work," said Rummel.

On the VG's Grocery website, spartanstores.com, there are a variety of jobs listed like grocery clerk, barista and cashier. A click on one of them leads to the posting that leads with "NOTE: This part-time position may be available at some of our retail locations."

At Alpine Marketplace in Linden, owner Marvin Yono said they will pull from their available applicants for entry level jobs like stock workers.

**Linden** — It's been a pretty good week to be a Holly Broncho baseball player.

The week began with a doubleheader sweep of the team's rivals, Fenton, on Monday. And on Thursday the winning trend continued against Metro contenders Linden.

The Bronchos allowed an early lead to evaporate, but then scored three runs in the top of the eighth inning to capture a 9-6 victory. The Bronchos improved to 5-6 in the Metro and 9-8 overall. While the Bronchos feel they are getting into a mid-season groove, the Eagles were frustrated by what coach Steve Buerkel considered some of the team's worst baseball of the season. The losses drop Lin-

den to 7-5 in the Metro and 13-6 overall.

"We played poor baseball," Buerkel said.
"Not to take anything away from Holly, but we didn't play like the quality team I think we are. That's the bottom line. Defensively, at times, it was a mess. Baserunning was a mess. It was lethargic. We made mistakes Linden baseball doesn't make."

In the first game, Austin Jennings doubled to start the contest for Holly. He scored on an bad pickoff throw by Linden hurler Bryce Benedict. Holly led 1-0. The play was symbolic of Linden's defense effort during the game In the second inning two Linden errors allowed Holly to score two more runs. In the fourth Hunter Lewis walked and scored on Perry's RBI-single. Holly led 4-0.

Linden cut the gap to 4-1 in the bottom of the third on Benedict's RBI-single, and then tied it with three runs in the fourth. The key shot was a two-run single by Brady Sarkon.

Linden scored single runs in the fifth and sixth, while Holly scored single runs in the sixth and top of the seventh, forcing extra innings tied at 6-all.

In the top of the eighth, Holly's Lance Copley singled and Chandler Price walked.

# Holly girls tennis returns back to the top of the Metro League

**Mt. Morris** — Holly's girls tennis team entered the Metro League tournament Tuesday at Flint Kearsley in an unusual position.

For the first time in 32 years, the Bronchos were the hunters, not the hunted. Holly had been a dominating force in the Metro, having won or shared a league-record 29 straight titles from 1982-2011.

The Bronchos' reign ended last year when arch rival Fenton swooped in and won the outright league championship. Tuesday represented the first time Holly entered the Metro tournament not as the defending champion since 1981.

The Bronchos took full advantage of their new role, winning five of the eight flights to easily capture the tournament title with 61 points. Defending champion Fenton took runner-up honors with 49.

Congressman Michael Turner of Ohio introduced a bill to help counties deal with abandoned properties, which he has much experience in due to his years with the Land Bank.

While his work at the local level focused on community work and developments, he is finding the span of issues for congress is enormous. "It's interesting, but all-consuming," he said.

Throughout his first year and beyond,

Kildee's goal is to fight for his district. He wants to be part of revitalizing America and to get a federal budget that makes sense. "Lack of a budget process is frustrating," he said.

With this new group of members, Kildee is optimistic that they are taking steps toward bipartisanship approval of manufacturing, trade, health care, etc.

Believing in bi-partisan approval, he voted in favor of

relief for the victims of Hurricane Sandy and he was one of 41 who voted against the leadership with the Federal Aviation sequester cuts. "My view, you can't take a piecemeal approach to fix the problems," he said. "You should not just answer to the interests."

Kildee believes that so often if a Democrat introduces an idea, it is automatically rejected by Republicans, and vice versa. "We shouldn't be afraid to agree."

Beginning his workday before 8 a.m. and usually working beyond 8 p.m., Kildee has long days, which likely includes 15 to 20 committee meetings and going back and forth from his office for

voting purposes. Every opportunity he gets, he also heads back home to Flint to be with his family and to stay connected with his district.

As he gets to know other members of congress, Kildee believes that, "Most people in congress try to do the right thing for their country." Acknowledging that although there might be philosophical disagreements, he has quickly become friends with a Republican congressman from Montana and expects that they will be working together in the future to in-

troduce legislation.

Since President Barack Obama was elected, Kildee has met with him a handful of times. "We don't see eye-toeye on everything but I generally support his policies. I try to be respectful of his role.

day to avoid bad sellers," he said. If someone has a bad experience with a seller, they're likely to be vocal about it online — and you can probably find the feedback.

Steigler said it's usually worth it to spend a little more to buy from a reputable seller, than with someone without any researchable experience. It's also important to look at terms used to describe the item. Seeing "as is" should prompt more questions as a buyer. Unless it's Ebay, buy from someone local.

If an item seems very inexpensive compared to other similar items, it could also be a scam. Sometimes online sellers will steal legitimate vehicle photos, and create their own post, with a much cheaper price. Upon contacting them, the vehicle may have been moved to another state, according to the seller, who will ask for payment without actually being able to see the vehicle.

A red flag to sellers is also a buyer who is offering more than the item is worth.

In buying, Steigler suggests using a credit card to pay. This way there is a way to track the money, and also to dispute payment if the seller breaks the contract by selling faulty goods.

The Michigan Attorney General's (AG) Office also recommends Paypal.

Even if you've done your research, bad deals can still happen. The item, big or small, is not what you thought you were buying, or it didn't perform as planned.

You've been ripped off. What can you do? According to the Michigan AG, there is a statewide uniformed code which protects consumers with an implied warranty when buying from a merchant — it's called "implied warranty of merchantability," which

assumes the goods should be fit to perform the purpose for which they were built, whether there is an expressed warranty from the merchant.

This law protects consumers who have bought a product from a "merchant" which is defined as a "person who deals in goods of the kind or otherwise by his occupation holds himself out as having knowledge or skill..." and so on.

This warranty may cover you if the person has an actual business, but not someone selling a motorcycle, computer or automobile that they own.

Joy Yearout, director of communications for the Michigan AG office said there may be other options when it is a private personto-person sale.

If the seller withheld important information or a defect they knew about, or should have known, there may be recourse for the buyer. The buyer could seek civil action if direct negotiations fail.

This important step of disclosure goes both ways — a seller can also protect themselves from a bad sale by being completely honest about the features and problem of what they're selling. "Consumers would have to consult a private attorney to determine whether their case warrants this type of action," she said. Action, meaning a legal claim against the seller.

For vehicles, the Michigan motor vehicle code imposes basic disclosure requirements from a seller. The seller must provide accurate mileage, and major damage to the vehicle, and accurate title status. Not disclosing this information could help a buyer bring action against a seller if a problem with the vehicle arises.

Michigan's "Lemon Laws" apply to new car sales, and may also be a tool for the buyer

of 2007, Walsh admits that the process of pregnancy and the fact that humans come from other human beings always fascinated her.

While birthrates overall are declining due to economic reasons and other factors, Walsh said Hurley sees a steady amount of newborns, as the hospital is one of the few places in the Flint area that performs high-risk deliveries. According to the Hospital's website, nearly 3,000 babies are born at Hurley every year.

According to the American Pregnancy Association, midwifery is "a philosophy of care — one that is directed toward women and their individual reproductive needs." Midwives offer a variety of options while seeking to minimize unnecessary interventions. Midwives

are involved from the beginning of the pregnancy, teaching expectant mothers how to upkeep their health and providing family counseling. Even after the baby is born, a midwife is employed to make sure newborns remain healthy while assisting new mothers.

One of the biggest difficulties as a midwife for Walsh is balancing new technology while still paying attention to natural signs.

"We get away from trusting women's bodies when we rely too much on technology, so we want to keep a medium approach," Walsh said. "Sometimes people in public will say your baby is so big, you'll have to have a (cesarean section), but women's bodies are built to

birth. Just trust that you will build a baby you can birth."

But for as much joy as a newborn baby can bring, Walsh has seen expectant parents experience heartache. The midwife once had to deliver a baby that had passed away in the womb. Walsh described helping the family afterward as "the most difficult and rewarding experience of my life." Walsh said most pregnancies are healthy and the experience of a stillborn away is rare.

The best way to get through a pregnancy and delivery is through exercise and nutrition.

"If she could eat well and exercise through the pregnancy then she would be more prepared for the marathon of birthing and parenting," Walsh advises. Swimming or walking for 30 minutes a day during pregnancy can make things easier once it

comes time to deliver.

Although women are the ones giving birth, men are not off the hook. Expectant fathers will have to adapt to a pregnant woman's sudden change in appetite, which Walsh said can happen in a heartbeat. Husbands should also compliment their wives — 'You're beautiful!' or 'You're doing great!' — rather than reminding them to breathe during the delivery.

When it comes to newborns, Walsh said mothers and fathers should cherish the time they have with them.

"It goes so fast, you turn around twice and your baby is turning 10," Walsh said. "Enjoy every moment and don't feel guilty — you're doing the best you can at the moment. Just enjoy it."

- 4.1 million women between the ages of 15 and 50 gave birth in the past 12 years.
- 53 percent of women between the ages of 15 and 44 were mothers in 2010.

# AMAZING MOMS KINGDOM



Successfully raising a chick is a truly remarkable accomplishment for this mom and dad. Courtship for a typical couple starts in March and April when temperatures in the Antarctic are around -40 degrees Fahrenheit. Emperor Penguins are also serial monogamists and will wait for their previous year's mate before breeding again. The female produces one egg and leaves it in the care of its father while she makes the nearly 74-mile journey back to sea to capture the fish that she will need for feeding. Upon returning to the nesting site, she must relocate her mate and chick. Then, the pair switches off caring for their offspring, while the other makes the same long journey to the ocean and back for food.



#### **Harp Seal**

As if raising a child on a moving sheet of ice patrolled by Polar Bears and fur poachers wasn't hard enough, the harp seal mom nurses her pup on 48 percent fat seal milk continuously for 12 days without eating. Her pup will gain an average of 5 pounds per day during this 12-day nursing period, while mom herself will lose about 7 pounds per day.



#### Orangutan

The only exclusively Asian living genus of the great ape, the orangutan is considered "critically endangered" but with a reproduction cycle of about 6 to 7 years between offspring, repopulation has proved difficult. It does not help that orangutans reconstruct their homes of leaves and sticks every single day, meaning that a typical mom lives in about 30,000 new homes during her lifetime.

#### **African Elephant** The largest land

mammal also has the longest pregnancy in mammals, averaging a staggering 22 months. Elephants usually give birth to one calf, who will rely on the mother's milk for around 4-6 years. One would think that years of devotion to her calf and the protection of the herd would lead to a healthy adult elephant, but in reality, very few calves live to adulthood.



# Octopus

A female Octopus has only one goal, to have one successful brood of eggs in her lifetime. A female octopus will lay around 200,000 eggs in her lair and defend

them at any cost. During the one month of caring for her eggs the female is starved almost to death and may even ingest one of her own arms before she will leave her eggs for food. Once the eggs hatch, the offspring float around in blooms of plankton while their mother wanders out of her lair, too weak to defend herself, often falling prey to predators.



#### Koala Bear

Relying almost entirely on eucalyptus leaves for her diet, the Koala Bear mom rarely leaves the safety of her treetop home. The mom gives birth to a quarter-inch long joey, a hairless, blind, and earless version of herself. The joey stays in her unique pouch for about six months where it slowly grows from a diet of only her milk. After six months, the joey crawls out of the mother's pouch and takes up a place on to her back, where it will remain for another six months.


