Flint Twp. — Firefighters with the Fenton Township Fire Department weren't fighting raging infernos on Monday. Instead, they donned air tanks and masks, practicing scuba safety in a swimming pool while it rained and thundered outside. The five firefighters are training to be a part of the department's dive team, which will be put to use in lakes all around Fenton Township this summer.

Trading axes and fire hoses for flippers and snorkels required specialized instruction for the dive team in training.

“It's a real eye-opener. I didn't expect it to be as extensive as it is,” said firefighter Mike Cross. “I thought it was just putting on the tank and breathing air.”

The dive team was prompted after two drownings in Fenton Township last summer. Fire Chief Ryan Volz and Lt.

BRASS LANDSCAPING FITTING STOLEN

On Friday, May 17, Fenton police received a larceny complaint from a restaurant in the 3200 block of Owen Road. Chief Rick Aro said sometime between November and May 17, unknown suspects cut through copper piping to remove a solid brass valve attached to the building. It appeared that the suspects also used a ladder to gain access to air conditioning units, however, nothing was stolen. Aro said the brass was most likely sold for scrap.

GREEN DOT CARD SCAM

Fenton Police Chief Rick Aro said his department has received several complaints from residents falling victim to a scam involving green dot cards, a prepaid gift card purchased from local stores. He reminds residents that when they have the store load an amount onto the card with their funds, there will be authorization number printed on the card. The scam involves a suspect requesting that the resident load money onto the card for a made up reason. To verify that they have the card, the suspect will ask for the authorization number. Aro said suspects can then use that authorization number and remove all of the money from that card.

“It just about gave me a heart attack,” said Atherton, manager of U Storage. “I had to open the storage unit for an auction and its huge teeth were eye level with me.”

Thankfully, the grizzly bear was stuffed. It caught her off guard because of its attack-like pose.

While the television show ‘Storage Wars’ has brought more attention to potential hidden treasures locked behind steel doors, storage units in the local area typically house less exciting items. According to Atherton, most people rent a storage unit from U Storage while they’re in the process of moving or if they have a parent that is being placed into a

A \$28,400 wedding can push \$42,600 into economy

►The biggest lifetime event creates big economic boost for local businesses

As the temperatures rise, so do the number of vows exchanged at big expensive parties known as “weddings.”

Your wedding could include more than 20 vendors and different services and expenditures to make that big day happen. According to CNN Money, the average cost of a wedding in 2012 was \$28,400.

Caterers, planners, entertainment and photographers are all part of the wedding equation — and when they are paid, that money is put into motion to create more economic activity.

In general, University of Michigan-Flint Assistant Professor of Economics Chris Douglas said that weddings boost economic activity, at least locally. He said that roughly every dollar spent ends up creating \$1.50 of economic activity. This is an average amount, because money doesn’t im-

part equally. For example, lodging generates roughly \$1.86 of economic activity, while entertainment creates \$2.09, according to the Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS).

Douglas said that the service industry makes 70 percent of the U.S. economy, and weddings are a service-heavy event.

A spending table by “The Knot” wedding magazine laid out 21 different categories of services

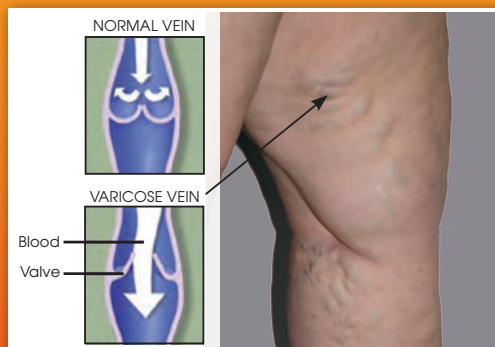

In the new security state, not even garbage will have privacy.

Clear plastic trash bins are coming! They cost up to \$900 apiece. 'The deadly bombings at the Boston Marathon demonstrate a need for the bins at events like the Bank of America Chicago Marathon,' a company salesman said, and I marveled at the security minutiae that is now called news. We are kept informed of everything except what matters.

Ho hum, we're in mortal danger every second of the day, terrorists might strike at any moment, but we've got surveillance cameras and metal detectors, body scans, the USA Patriot Act and now, see-through trash bins, though maybe we also need see-through backpacks . . .

And I started to think, we're chasing infinity here. We're ceding ever more ground to the Watching Authority but aren't the least bit safer than we were a decade or a half-century ago. Every high-profile act of violence is followed by some new security procedure and market opportunity, which imperceptibly increases the fear, suspicion and social alienation that characterizes American society.

Thus the Tsarnaev brothers 'appear to fit the biographical pattern of those involved in domestic terror plots since the Sept. 11, 2001, attacks,' according to the LA Times article. As Jenkins pointed out, they are 'young, male, disaffected consumers of radical Internet propaganda.'

America's Army, a videogame site maintained by the U.S. Army, which sanitizes and romanticizes war for kids aged 13 and up, is a recruitment tool — one of the most effective the Army has — with eight million members. Like all violent videogames, it reduces war and violence to a glorious, consequence-free adventure, with the goal of convincing adolescents to surrender their futures to the military bureaucracy.

I'm not even suggesting that we repress or condemn this universal tendency toward violence, simply that we acknowledge it, and then ask how we can reorganize ourselves around a principle such as, for instance, the Golden Rule. Maybe it can't be done, but I know this much. Any discussion of security that ignores it is a bitter farce.

I'M HOPING ALL the octogenarians still in the workplace will take a hint from Barbara Walters, and retire. No one has the heart to tell you that you are a laughing-stock, but, really, you are. The community needs young people, and their fresh ideas, in your jobs.

IT'S CLEAR THAT your outrage over the dead in Benghazi is just anti-Clinton witch-hunting. If American lives lost because of lies was your real issue you would have called out Bush for the phantom WMDs.

IF YOU ENJOY local eating establishments, using cheap gift certificates that you get for pennies online is a surefire way to close them down. They are strong armed into accepting them, and it costs them money, so instead of supporting them, you are putting them out of business. Spend local.

columnist**Tyranny is no longer 'lurking'**

Given last week's revelation that the IRS targeted conservative groups seeking tax-exempt status, it's worth recalling President Obama's Ohio State University commencement address. The president decried 'voices' warning 'that tyranny is always lurking just around the corner.'

It's no longer lurking. It's here.

Testimony before the House Ways and Means Committee by the outgoing acting IRS commissioner, Steve Miller, as well as numerous statements by individuals claiming they have been harassed and intimidated by IRS agents, reveal a government agency out of control. Russell George, the Treasury inspector general for tax administration, testified he knew as early as June 2012 that the IRS was targeting conservatives, but did nothing to stop it during the presidential campaign.

There is a simple way to restrain the IRS so this type of intrusion doesn't happen again: get rid of it. That's what Steve Forbes proposed in his run for president in 1996 and 2000. Forbes proposed a flat tax of 17 percent and a simple tax code. Individuals could file their tax returns on a post card.

I'm willing to wager that if nonessential government agencies and programs were eliminated and those remaining were reformed, or privatized, the savings would more than make up for the revenue loss.

Congressional Democrats — and some Republicans — will be reluctant to propose such a 'radical' solution, because too many focus on revenue and not enough on misspending and dysfunctional agencies and programs.

Like most tyrannies, this one is being ushered in with a smile. The public is told it is for our 'security' and that it's good for us. If we complain they are taking too much and wasting it, we're thought to be 'greedy' and 'unfair.'

Thomas Jefferson foresaw what can happen when power corrupts: 'Experience hath shown that even under the best forms of government those entrusted with power have, in time, and by slow operations, perverted it into tyranny.'

Jefferson would see the IRS scandal as a prime example. Repeal the 16th Amendment, eliminate the IRS, put the government back within its constitutional boundaries and tyranny will be defeated.

Area teen dies in rollover crash

►Excessive speed and marijuana use believed to be major factors in rollover

The teen killed last Friday in an automobile crash in Gaines has been identified as Matthew VanKuren, a 16-year-old student at Swartz Creek Academy. Four others in the 2003 Pontiac Aztek that VanKuren was a passenger of were injured, two critically.

Michigan State Police troopers responded to the crash, which occurred on County Line Road, just south of Demond Road in Shiawassee County at 4:40 p.m. on Friday, May 17.

According to state police, the Aztek, driven by a 16-year-old Gaines resident, was traveling southbound on County Line Road at a high rate of speed when they disregarded a stop sign at an elevated railroad crossing. The Aztek became airborne and

when it landed, the driver lost control of the vehicle.

The vehicle skidded off the gravel roadway and crashed into a large tree, causing the Aztek to spin and roll. Three teens, a 14- and 16-year-old from Byron and VanKuren were ejected. Two other passengers, a 16- and 18-year-old from Gaines were injured in the crash with the driver, but were not ejected.

All of the teens were taken to Hurley Medical Center in Flint. VanKuren was pronounced dead at the scene. Both teens from Byron were listed in critical condition.

State troopers that investigated the crash believe that marijuana use and speed appear to be the most critical factors in the crash. State police did not release the names of the other teens in the vehicle.

Sharp Funeral Homes, Fenton Chapel, is handling VanKuren's funeral arrangements.

Freedom of Information Act not just for the media

►New legislation could streamline request process

If knowledge is power, then the Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) brings power to the people.

As a citizen, you have the right to request information and documentation from one of the many public bodies that make up our government.

Michigan's FOIA defines a "public body" as a state officer employee, agency, department, division, bureau, board, commission, council, authority, or other body in the executive branch of state government. This applies to counties, cities, townships, and villages, and is one tool used by the Tri-County Times when it requires information about our local or state government.

Within the last year, the city of Linden has seen 20 different FOIA requests.

"I would say a lot of the time information being requested is by attorneys from the police department," said Deputy Clerk Marti Donnelly.

Almost all records are able to be requested for disclosure. These records could be minutes of open meetings, official's voting records, staff manuals, written statements. It does not matter what state the record may be in or what form it may take, such as a handwritten report or a typed out report, or even more obscure mediums such as microfilm.

There are some exceptions, which allow a public body to withhold some information from disclosure. Major examples of these exceptions include specific personal information about an individual that would result in an unwarranted invasion of that person's privacy and investigation records for law enforcement purposes if released information would interfere with

law enforcement proceedings.

While they have the option to keep the information private, the FOIA does not obligate them to do so and may release it should they wish to honor a request to do so.

"We are not required to create documents," Donnelly said. "They have to be specific as to what they want, and it has to be something that we already have."

New legislation is to be discussed this week in Lansing that could make obtaining information a little easier in the form of two new bills. If passed, one of the bills would place a cap on how much agencies can charge for FOIA requests, placing a cap of 10 cents a page.

Currently in Linden, city hall charges 25 cents per page if a copy of a document is requested. If the request requires research and looking through back records, the city charges by the hour. "The law says you can only charge the rate that you pay your lowest paid clerical employee on staff," Donnelly said.

The second bill up for discussion calls for the creation of a commission to hear the cases of those who want to challenge denials of FOIA requests.

If a request is denied, the public body has five business days to alert the requester and provide them with a full explanation of the reasons for the denial. A requestor can then submit a written appeal to the head of the public body, or seek judicial review in circuit court.

The burden of proof

In all court cases, the person bringing the action is required to meet an evidentiary standard in order to prevail. This evidentiary standard is commonly called the burden of proof.

The required burden of proof always depends on the type of case or action that is being brought. For example in a criminal trial (before either a judge or a jury), the burden of proof is on the prosecuting official to establish the defendant's guilt "beyond a reasonable doubt."

In Michigan, a reasonable doubt is defined as a fair, honest doubt growing out of the evidence or lack of evidence. It is not merely an imaginary or possible doubt, but a doubt based on reason and common sense. A reasonable doubt is just that — a doubt that is reasonable, after a careful and considered examination of the facts and circumstances of the case.

In a civil case it is the burden of the plaintiff (the person or entity bringing the lawsuit) to establish the right to a judgment against the defendant(s) by establishing the merits of their case by a preponderance of the evidence. Generally speaking, this means that the plaintiff must establish their claim by showing that it is more likely than not that what is claimed to have occurred actually did.

There are other burdens of proof in both criminal and civil cases. For example in Preliminary Examinations in criminal cases, the burden is on the prosecution to show probable cause to believe a crime was committed and probable cause to believe the defendant committed the crime. Probable cause is a reasonable ground of suspicion supported by circumstances sufficiently strong in themselves to warrant a cautious person in the belief that a person charged is guilty of the charged offense.

There are a number of other burdens of proof standards that depend on the type and stage of the case, which I won't go into here.

Suffice it to say that knowing the proper burden of proof is vital to all parties concerned.

Local principal in 'top 50' of U.S.

►Heidie Ciesielski surprised by Michigan's 'Middle School Principal of the Year' award

The staff and parents of AGS Middle School in Fenton knew that their principal, Heidie Ciesielski, was "one in a million," but she's actually one of 50 in the entire United States.

Ciesielski, 38, was named "Middle School Principal of the Year" by the Michigan Association of Secondary School Principals (MASSP). Notified of her win on Monday, May 6, Ciesielski will receive her award June 17 when the MASSP holds its annual educational conference in Traverse City.

"I didn't have a clue this was happening," said Ciesielski, now in her third year as AGS principal after a long career as a high school teacher and assistant principal at Owosso High School.

"When I took this position in Fenton, I didn't know if I'd enjoy the middle school years as much as I did the high school years," she admitted. Not only has she embraced these years, but her students and their parents have embraced her. "I found out right away just how important the middle school years are. Middle school students

have a unique complexity that I love. They grow up and mature so much during these years."

She believes she was nominated for the award because of her vision for consolidating the middle

school into three grades in one building, after her first year as principal.

"Before that, we were a little unsure who we were as a school community," she said. "We had sixth graders by themselves at the Ellen Street campus and seventh and eighth graders at this building. It took a lot of moving things around, but it was a tremendous success. We couldn't have done it without the full support of our staff, including my assistant principal Eric Rettenmund, and my other colleagues in the school district."

She believes that changing to block scheduling at the middle school level was another reason for her success. "It made our students' transition to high school much

easier to be on the same schedule," she said.

Ciesielski is now in the running for the national competition, which will take place in July in Washington, D.C. If she is named America's "Middle School Principal of the Year," she'll be able to meet President Obama and take home \$3,500 in grant money to be used for projects at AGS Middle School.

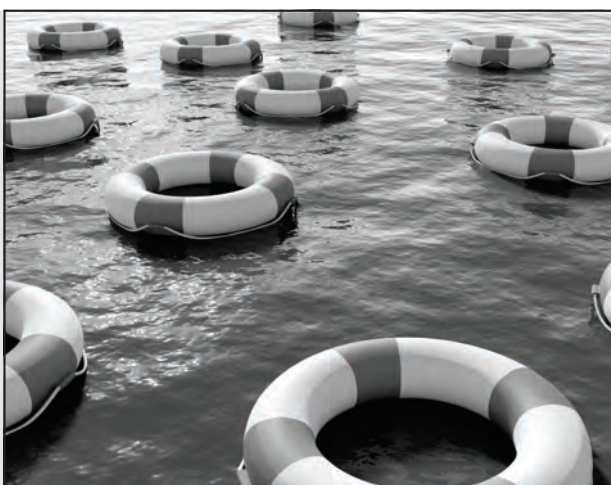

Squad said this year is already worse than last year.

"I am already getting a lot of calls from people saying they haven't had a problem this bad in years," he said. "I've been to some places that is just scary how many mosquitoes there are."

The enemy of a mosquito free yard is standing water. To keep the uninvited bloodsuckers out of your property, Myers recommends the five T's – tip, toss, turn, tarps, and treat.

"You tip over anything that is holding water, a little kid's bucket, or even a bottle cap," Myers said. "If you have a bottle cap full of water, it can hold up to 300 mosquito eggs."

Tossing piles of leaves out is another recommendation of Myers, who said that leaf piles can be another breeding ground for mosquitoes. Myers also says to get into the habit of turning over objects like wheel barrows, bird baths, or any place that is holding water regularly.

Tarps can be another infamous source for mosquitoes, as if they are not pulled tight they can hold pockets of water that will soon be made home to mosquito eggs.

If all else fails, the next step in the process of trying to make your yard pest free is to resort to the last T – treat.

Bug zappers are one common solution, though Myers said they can also attract mosquitoes themselves, and if not placed properly can do more harm than good. Instead, he recommends using sprays like Off, saying they are the most effective.

These are not guaranteed to work however, and sometimes you may just have to call in the professionals if you want to enjoy your summer instead of spending it battling the legions of flying biters.

Mosquito Squad offers two different options, a barrier spray to repel the pesky mosquitoes from your yard, or a self-controlled mosquito mister that will repel mosquitoes for six hours at a time when used.

"For some people it can be well worth their time to look into," Myers said.

While they can be pests, there is a small element of danger offered by mosquitoes too. "They can carry disease that can hurt people. It doesn't happen very often, but it can happen," Myers said. "West Nile is in Michigan right now, it's not real big but it is getting worse every year. Learning how to protect yourself is getting to be more and more important."

Not every property can be treated equally, said Mike Casacali, owner of Casco Pest Control. For the best results, a property needs to have a green fence around the perimeter bushes and trees.

Roger Atchley, owner of Phoenix Pest Services said that people can get a onetime spray for special events, such as open houses or weddings, or a seasonal spray. "We treat all the vegetation around the home like the shrubbery and trees and things like that. As mosquitoes come around and settle into the shady areas, they are exposed to it there."

Residents who live in Fenton Township and cities of Fenton and Linden can receive a free mosquito spray for special occasions such as open houses as part of the company's contract with

local municipalities. It is a good time to make use of it as well — as owner Tamara Seago said that many people who enjoy the outdoors will soon come to realize.

"We got a lot of rain. It's a bad year, it's going to be a very bad year for mosquitoes," she said.

MOSQUITO FACT OR FICTION

"Know your enemy" is a phrase likely heard — it is derived from Sun Tzu's 'The Art of War.' The same is true about mosquitoes — the more you know, the better you can deal with those annoying creatures.

• **You can repel** mosquitoes with lemon dish soap or Listerine.

False. While this is a very common myth, they simply do not work to deter the bloodsucking pests. The Centers for Disease Control (CDC) recommends products that have ingredients including DEET, Picaridin, or oil of lemon eucalyptus to successfully deter mosquitoes.

• **You can use** meat tenderizer to treat an itchy mosquito bite.

True. According to the Mayo Clinic, mixing a tablespoon of water with a tablespoon of meat tenderizer will form a paste that you can apply to a bite to ease the itchy sensation.

• **Only female mosquitoes** will bite you. **True.** Female mosquitoes will suck your blood, and use protein from it to develop eggs. Male mosquitoes meanwhile feed on nectar from flowers.

• **A mosquito will** die after biting you. **False.** Mosquitoes are capable of annoying you with multiple bites. A single blood meal is enough to allow a mosquito to create up to 200 eggs — so that their progeny can continue to annoy you for generations.

and their cost, on average. The biggest expense was the reception hall at around \$12,000. The biggest service expense is the food, which cost \$63 per person. The photographer cost around \$2,300, the DJ just under \$1,000.

Jen Kniivila is a Fenton resident and Visual Poetry photography studio owner. Weddings make up about 70 percent of her yearly business income. When she is paid for a wedding, she is able to pay for the necessary expenses to keep her studio open.

Directly, Kniivila's expenses are limited to stationary, DVDs for the photos and postage. Another expense is her assistant.

Depending on their experience, photographers can pay assistants between \$100 and \$400 for an evening. One wedding creates work for the photographer, or DJ, and also the assistants and suppliers the vendors use.

Kniivila also always has studio space overhead, insurance, equipment and various services like phone and Internet.

Shelly Day, executive director of the Fenton Regional Chamber of Commerce sees services like photographers, caterers and event space become difficult to book for chamber events, along with volunteers because of big summer events like weddings.

She said that anecdotally, she has seen weddings generate business for

local establishments. Out of town visitors will lodge locally and eat at local restaurants.

To Kniivila, using local wedding vendors has an impact on the community the same as shopping for anything else local. "Not only are you keeping the money

and business in your own area for circulation, but you're contributing to the success of a small business owner," she said. "The small business rule is universal in every aspect of consumer purchasing. By contracting a local professional, you are most likely to enjoy a more personal experience and less likely to feel like a number among the masses."

Douglas said that it's hard to tell if a wedding in Fenton affects the economy as a whole because whenever money is spent on one thing, it could mean it's withheld elsewhere.

For example, if the average wedding is \$28,400, the person footing that bill may pass on a new car, vacation, or down payment on a new home. But all things considered, one average wedding could generate \$42,600, much of that money staying with your local vendors.

Reading between the leaves

►Not all tea has the same health benefits, nutrition

Teas come in all colors and kinds, and nearly all of them are rumored to have health benefits. According to Marjie Andrejciw, a holistic nutritional counselor at Marjie's Gluten Free Pantry in Fenton, not all teas are created equal.

"Black, green and white tea all come from the same plant," Andrejciw said. "The only difference is in how they are processed."

Black tea has the greatest amount of caffeine, while green and white tea has less caffeine, but more antioxidants, which help to detoxify chemicals in the body.

Rooibos tea, more commonly known as African red tea, comes from a sepa-

rate plant that is known for its alkalizing properties which helps people who consume many acidic foods. This tea also helps relieve nervous tension, allergies and digestive problems.

Tulsi, or holy basil tea, is a botanical tea that is naturally made without caffeine, like African red tea.

Tulsi is recognized as a sacred herb in India due to its vast healing properties, including protecting cells from free radicals that come from pesticides, pollution and radiation.

"You can drink all you want of Tulsi and African red tea, there are no negative side effects," Andrejciw said. "Teas that come naturally without caffeine are always better than decaffeinated teas, because those teas are put through a chemical process to remove the caffeine, leaving behind chemical residue."

said she typically encounters household furniture and vehicles like vintage cars and motorcycles.

In recent years, Flannery has seen more people use storage facilities because they are moving from a bigger house into a smaller living space and cannot fit all of their belongings into their new home. In one instance, Flannery encountered a woman who moved from a 15,000-square-foot home to a 1,800-square-foot home.

"Some people will be renovating their home and they'll be yanking stuff out," Flannery said. "There's plenty that have lost their home, too."

Any regular watcher of 'Storage Wars' will tell you the most exciting part of the show is when people battle for the highest bid while the auctioneer blurts numbers as quickly as possible.

Atherton said auctions at U Storage are rare. Flannery does her best to avoid auctions, sending what she calls a '20 day letter' to those who are delinquent on their payments and then a certified letter when she doesn't receive a response.

And, just like the show, the auctioneer who conducts auctions at Fenton Storage attracts people looking to snatch up unknown treasures from unassuming storage units.

"We have a private auctioneer named Randy who comes and does a number of auctions on storage facilities," Flannery said. "He's got kind of a little entourage that follows him around."

The most popular items Flannery

sees people bid on are motorcycles or snowmobiles. This is a far cry from doubloons, old newspapers announcing Elvis' death or a BMW mini car, which have all been found on the television show.

Overall, both managers of the storage unit facilities will tell you finding such items in a storage unit is rare. In fact, Dave Hester, a former prominent member on the television show, told several media outlets that some of the findings on 'Storage Wars' is staged by the producers.

"There's nothing at my place that's out of the order," Flannery said. "We try our hearts out to contact these people. The last thing we want to do is sell their belongings."

Tom Howley proposed that residents could benefit more from having local divers who could react to emergencies faster. The Fenton Township Board of Trustees agreed, authorizing equipment and training in March.

Inside the pool at The Dive Shop in Flint, firefighters practiced securing and releasing their equipment, breathing underwater and sharing air with another diver. While the pool only reached depths of 12 feet, Trainer Kimberly Collingham watched each diver carefully, instructing them along the way on proper breathing techniques and signals for communication.

"It's important being comfortable, familiar and to not panic," Collingham said. Improper diving can lead to adverse

affects such as decompression sickness, where bubbles can form under a diver's skin due to sudden change in pressure around the body. "We teach the safety aspects. Scuba Schools International says divers should go out four to seven times a year. Rescue teams do monthly training dives, which is good for the rescue teams."

Volz said the dive team will begin open water diving by June 8. The team will conduct recoveries and work with the Genesee County dive team, if necessary.

While the training was serious and may potentially save lives this summer, the firefighters enjoyed learning new skills and working with each other.

"This is real rewarding. Hopefully, we'll serve our community in this capacity this summer," Cross said.

"I didn't expect it to be as extensive as it is."

counter, Scott Avendt of Fenton along with daughter Anna, 10, and son Jacob, 13, season a large bucket of popcorn, before seeing Star Trek. To the theater, they're the perfect customers — Avendt bought \$15 in concessions, and IMAX 3D tickets for a grand total of \$55 for the three of them. He would have preferred to catch the matinee, but still, he said movies "are a good value."

In 2013, theaters nationwide collected \$9.54 billion, selling 1.2 billion tickets. You could guess the highest grossing movies each year: 2013 is expected to be "Iron Man 3." "The Avengers" took the most at \$623 million for 2012.

Pat O'Boyle is Promotions and Marketing Manager for NCG Cinemas, which owns Trillium in Grand Blanc. He said the ticket pricing structure depends on time of the show, and what market the theater is in.

In Grand Blanc, the lowest ticket is \$5 during matinee hours. The most expensive is an IMAX evening ticket at \$12.50, which is what Avendt bought. Real-D 3D tickets are \$7 for adult matinee or \$10.50 for the evening.

O'Boyle said the majority of that ticket money goes back to the film distribution studio. He couldn't comment on what a movie like "Iron Man 3" would cost to run, but said that each company and movie is different. According to Nash Information Services LLC, Warner Bros, Walt Disney, and Sony are the top three grossing distribution houses.

He said there is not necessarily a direct correlation between the budget of the movie, and the cost to play it at the theater.

If most of the ticket price goes to simply playing the movies, the profit is made up by concessions. "If it wasn't for individuals purchasing concessions, the multi-plex theaters wouldn't exist," he said.

Staff, the building itself and other expenses are all paid by that large \$5.50 popcorn, and \$3 bags of candy.

It doesn't hurt when a movie has a blockbuster weekend either. "It's tough for us, because we don't necessarily control the product," said O'Boyle. Distribution companies spend a lot of money promoting the next big film, and he compares the theater to the arena that houses either a winning or losing team. The better the movie, the more seats they sell and the more concessions are consumed.

"I'm a big fan of keeping a movie product as diverse as possible," he said. More movies mean more people, even if it's a small crowd.

By diverse, O'Boyle means he would prefer a variety of movies. To hit every age group, he has a dream lineup: "Monster University," "Iron Man 3" and "Lincoln." He said it's also important to always have a "kids" movie to give families a reason to come out.

In January and February, O'Boyle said there were no new kid-friendly movies being released. To fill that gap in the market, Trillium held weekend showings of "Shrek," which brought in the families

though it wasn't a new film.

Although the money isn't made from tickets, theaters do need the big movies to bring the big crowds. O'Boyle said that already "The Hobbit: The Desolation of Smaug" is slated for Dec. 13, 2013, and the next "Hunger Games" movie hits in mid-November.

Staffing will be set according to the expected crowd, which O'Boyle said is "fluid" — always changing to meet the expected crowds. On Monday, there was more than enough staff to handle the trickle of patrons. He also said that there isn't an "average" weekend at a theater because it varies so much. He can count

on a blockbuster bringing in exponentially larger crowds, though.

He knows that the holidays and summer are the busiest seasons, which include the months of May, June, July, November and December.

Sometimes, a March release like "The Hunger Games" or "The Passion of the Christ" will create an unseasonal spike in business.

O'Boyle said three things bring people back: low ticket prices, free drink refills and cleanliness. "If you can do those three things well, that's paramount in theater success," he said, because essentially, all theaters are showing the same movies.

the tree and its equally tall counterpart gone, because of the storm that caused partial damage to the trees, and more importantly, threatened the house should one or both fall.

The tri-county area only took a light lashing from the brief, but potent storm that arrived Monday night around 7 p.m. It rained 1/3 of an inch, with wind gusts up to 32 mph, and lasted about 30 minutes.

ABC-12 Meteorologist John McMurray said these numbers were reported from Flint Bishop Airport, and may have been heavier in other areas. "We didn't have nearly the same combination of factors," he said, referring to other heavier-hit areas.

The storm was part of a broken line of storms that moved east, and was part of the larger system that tragically struck the city of Moore, Okla. Monday night, killing at least two dozen people.

Herman Ferguson, owner of Ferguson Tree Service has been busy with calls of fallen branches, which began Monday night. "We're working all around Lobdell (Lake) since late last night," he said, as he headed out to another possible job in the area. He had three so far, which at the most included removing 35-foot pine trees from the driveway to at least let the client get to work.

He received eight calls from the Swartz Creek and Gaines area, but said he tries to stay in the area. "The storms are great for business, but you can only do so much," he said.

Fenton and Holly homes seemed to have suffered less. The Fenton Fire department reported no significant damage or downed trees. In Holly, Terry Connell reported "10 minutes of light rain," via Facebook. According to Times Sports Editor Dave Troppens, it poured out in Linden.

The Metro League Girls Championships soccer game in Fenton, between Fenton and Lapeer West only played 11 minutes before it was rained out. Fenton and Linden baseball and softball completed only one game of a (double header) before being rained out.

According to NOAA.gov, showers and thunderstorms are likely until Thursday this week.

UPS AND DOWNS WITH CURLING

When people reach their 40s, some realizations usually hit their minds.

I reached that age a few years back, and it has positively changed how I look at life. For me that meant satisfying some of my 'bucket list' items. For most bucket list items involve great adventure. For me, it meant joining a curling league.

Eventually the rocks stopped somewhere inside a target that looked like an archery circle. It totally intrigued me and I had to become a curler.

Last fall I did just that. Starting in November I spent my Sundays driving to the Midland Curling Club to compete on Team Sandoval. I had my good days. Unfortunately, I also had more than my share of bad as well.

I started the year as the lead on my team. That meant I was the person who threw our first two of eight stones. Each person throws two stones, with your skip (your best player) throwing the last two. As the lead, I spent most of my time as one of those people with the brooms, sweeping. The sweeping does one of two things. The more you sweep, the longer distance the rock will travel. Also, while the stone travels it 'curls.' Sweeping takes some of the curl off the stone's path. It was my job to influence the rock's path based on our needs.

My team started out well. We won our first two matches. I thought it was clear I was a natural and our team was going to contend for the league title. But then we hit a rough patch and fell to last place. Being the rookie on the Team Sandoval (your team name is your skip's last name), it would be fair to say I contributed significantly to that demise into last. I was terrible during some of those matches. But for the most part my teammates stuck behind me helped me through those rough patches.

When I was at my all-time low for confidence, I actually competed in a tournament, or a bonspiel as curlers call it. I was paired with three pretty strong players, meaning if I played well, we were going to have some success. I was the second which meant my throws were going to have a bit more significance than when I played the lead spot. During the first day of the tournament, I had my best day of curling ever. I felt like Canadian gold medalist skip Kevin Martin. In fact, our entire team played as though we were gold medalists and we swept right through the first day of competition. I went home that night realizing I could earn my first curling championship, and could actually get my name engraved on a trophy listing all of the previous winners. Yes, I was confident, and probably a little cocky.

That cockiness ended up crushing me. The next day I played as though it was my first time on the ice. I was awful. My teammates tried to keep me confident. It was reassuring, but it did nothing for my performance. We ended up taking second place.

I capped the year having more decent days than bad and my regular team won its last match to stay out of last place.

Did I have fun? Will I join again next year? Without a doubt, the answers to both questions is yes. And, for certain, I have checked something off that bucket list.

To your good health

DEAR DR. DONOHUE: I lift weights seven days a week. I see that I am making progress. My arms are much bigger than they were. I've been told I'm overdoing it by lifting every day. Am I? — R.S.

ANSWER: It's not a good idea to perform the same weightlifting exercises on consecutive days. Muscles need a full 48 hours to recover, rebuild and grow after an intense exercise session. A day of lifting and then a day of rest is a good schedule. You can lift weights daily if you want to. Just don't work the same muscles on consecutive days.

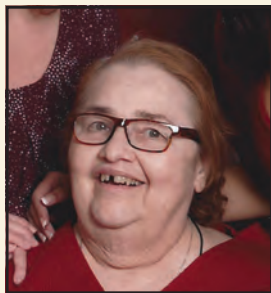
