## The big transition to middle school

► Students grow up quickly — ready or not

**Fenton** — At 10:30 a.m. the bell rings and sixth-graders pour into the hall near the main office at Andrew G. Schmidt (AGS) Middle School. They open lockers and stuff binders in, and

in this case, head off to eat lunch.  
For three of the four local districts, sixth grade is a time of transition — to a different class each period, a locker and sometimes meeting students from different schools. Add to the new infusion of hormones for many students, and it can make the transition a challenge.

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## Modern robots forcing more workers into service careers

Your greatest competition in a few decades probably will not be human. Instead, job applicants will most likely have to compete with tireless and efficient robots, which are aggressively transforming the American labor force.

That transformation has been clear here in Michigan for decades, as car companies have utilized more automation on assembly lines rather than hiring people. According to the Robotics Industries Association, robots filled 225,000 jobs in America last year at 22,598 companies in the United States. The number of robots in the workforce increased 17 percent between 2011 and 2012.

Along with the Internet, many jobs that were once considered irreplaceable are being done with minimal human interaction. Self-checkout lanes at the grocery store have replaced smiling and communicative

cashiers. Checks can be deposited via smartphone, eliminating the need to interact with a bank teller.

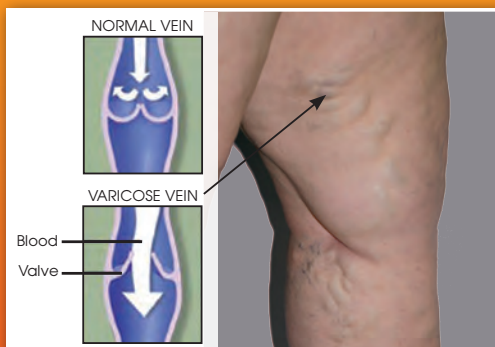

Amid the gaudy colors of Broadway show signs in Times Square, one stark and stately nine-story billboard stands out in bold black, white and red: 'WARNING: Obamacare may be hazardous to your health.'

Unfortunately, disinformation about Obamacare can be hazardous to our health, too. The Times Square billboard, posted by the conservative Heritage Foundation, is only one of the more visible signs of an all-out, last-ditch, by-any-means-necessary push by conservatives to undermine the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act before it launches on Oct. 1.

If making health care affordable to more Americans is good for our health, Heritage's Times Square billboard is about as well placed as a furrier in Hawaii. ## Rick Koester appointed to Fenton school board

►Veteran board member played a role in starting FAPS Foundation, bringing IB Program

**Fenton** — Rick Koester was selected to fill the vacant seat of Nora Kryza at the Fenton Board of Education meeting Monday night after board members interviewed three candidates.

Koester served on the board in the last decade, rising to the rank of president. He was heavily involved in bringing the International Baccalaureate Program to Fenton Area Public Schools (FAPS), as well as passing bonds and establishing the FAPS Foundation. Koester was selected over two other candidates, Rick Orlowski and Rachel Perantoni.

While board members expressed that each candidate would be a great addition to FAPS, Koester's experience was a main factor in securing votes from Lynn Hopper, Brian Horton and Tamara Valley.

"I'm blown away by the three quality candidates," said Valley. "I will say the reason why I'm choosing Rick (Koester) is because you have worked on getting a

bond passed before and we need all the experience possible in the next 14 months."

Last year, the Fenton school district attempted to pass a school bond twice in order to update technology, security and infrastructure. The bond proposals were voted down both times by residents.

Trustee Drew Shapiro cast the lone vote for Orlowski. When asked what he thought of the IB program, Orlowski said

he has seen good things from the program but has heard some criticism of IB from parents and teachers. Orlowski added that he would have to learn more about the program before forming a full opinion on the IB Program.

"I feel like if the community voted today and not the board, Rick Orlowski would be elected. He offers an objective opinion about how people in our community think right now," Shapiro said. "Having some new, fresh perspective would be helpful for all of us."

Perantoni received votes from Rick DesJardins and Daniel Carter. Koester said he won't seek re-election at the end of his 2014 term.

"I would like to help you guys through the next 14 months. Honestly the Founda-

tion is a really good mechanism for us to be able to help with some of the challenges we face in this district," Koester said. "After this, I will spend more time working with the Foundation."

Board members encouraged Perantoni and Orlowski to run again in November, when four seats for the board will be up for re-election. Kryza stepped down from the board earlier this month, citing an increased workload at her job as the main reason. Kryza served on the board for more than a decade and told the Times in a Sept. 15 article that bringing the IB Program to the Fenton school district was her proudest achievement.

## Council saves city \$12,400 with new contractor

►CJ Callaghan and Son to maintain 40-acre Oakwood Cemetery

**Fenton** — The Fenton City Council, and Cemetery Board Chair Doug Tebo love the job TNT Outdoor Services has done at Oakwood Cemetery over the past three years through their contract with the city. "The cemetery has looked beautiful all summer," said Tebo. "It's gonna be harder to live up to their job."

The city of Fenton sought bids for the upcoming three-year contract term, which begins Nov. 1, and received bids from three companies for the maintenance of Oakwood Cemetery.

This company would be responsible for the 40 or more acres and up to 10,000 burial sites in the cemetery, which aside from mowing the hilly property, includes leveling settled graves and garbage, weed and leaves removal.

CJ Callaghan and Son came in at

the lowest, with \$27,000 in 2013, and \$28,000 for 2014 and 2015. TNT bid \$31,800 for all three years, or \$12,400 more than CJ Callaghan and Son over that time.

The Fenton City Council agreed in a unanimous vote to sign with CJ Callaghan and Son, who already handles mowing all city lawns, and also handled cemetery maintenance when the city was between contracts for nine months in 2009.

The cemetery board also voted in support of CJ Callaghan and Son, but it wasn't unanimous. "It's going to be hard for anyone to top them, and do a better job there," said Tebo.

He said the Cemetery Board felt obligated to take the lowest bid — though they were conflicted over the stellar job TNT has been doing. Tebo mentioned that TNT has gone above and beyond their contract when needed, without extra pay.

He pointed out though that the savings of not renewing the contract was more

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## Veterans from 101<sup>st</sup> Airborne Division reunite

Veterans of the 101st Airborne Division Association, Michigan chapter, are used to serving, as one of the most highly decorated units in the U.S. Army.

But the tables were turned last weekend when 56 members attended a reunion in Fenton, bringing together former paratroopers, glidesmen and assault troopers from World War II through the Gulf War.

This elite group from the U.S. Army was activated in August 1942 as a light infantry division trained for air assault operations. Members of the World War II division parachuted into Normandy behind enemy lines on D-Day, June 6, 1944 — hours before the land invasion began in Europe.

### Holly DPW announces hydrant flushing schedule

Village residents are reminded that the Department of Public Works (DPW) will be flushing village fire hydrants beginning at midnight Thursday, Sept. 26 and into the morning of Friday, Sept. 27. ### Michigan's Right to Farm Act

Michigan is one of the most beautiful states in the Union. Indeed our state motto is ‘If you seek a pleasant peninsula, look about you.’

Sometimes we may not fully appreciate all of what is about us. For example in Michigan there is an industry that produces billions of dollars annually for our economy, that doesn't get as much publicity as others, but without it, we literally could not survive. Of course, I'm referring to farming.

Farming is Michigan's second largest industry with more than \$90 billion in yearly revenues. According to the Michigan Farmers Care website, there are more than 56,000 farms in Michigan spread out over 10 million acres, with about 95 percent of these being family owned farms. Michigan produces more than 330 kinds of farm products and ranks in the top 10 nationally in production for almost 50 commodities.

There are numerous state and federal laws governing agriculture with the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) and the Michigan Department of Agriculture and Rural Development (MDARD) being two of the primary oversight agencies.

Among our laws is a significant but perhaps not very well known statute in the agriculture area known as Michigan's Right to Farm Act (RTFA), which was effective July 11, 1981.

The idea behind this law was to recognize that as people moved out of urban areas into rural areas where there were existing farms, the dust, odors and other components of farming had been not well received and in some cases resulted in nuisance lawsuits against the farmers.

In order to protect farms and farmers, the RTFA was enacted which gives a form of immunity to farmers from such suits as long as they are a ‘farm’ or ‘farm operation’ and that the farm or farm operation conforms to the relevant Generally Accepted Agricultural and Management Practices (GAAMP).

These terms are all defined in the RTFA. Now that the Act has been with us for more than 30 years, case law has developed as to just what is and isn't protected activity.

Zdlenek, Barletta's daughter. She has worked side-by-side with her father for almost two decades. "It just happened. We're trying to figure out first how to take care of the family, and then the restaurant."

Barletta was truly a fixture in the community for the past 54 years, even though he spent his first 22 years growing up in his native Italy. He came over here in 1959 when he married his wife, Vilma, with whom he raised three children. He started out working for General Motors in Pennsylvania in 1961, and when GM transferred him to Michigan, he bought Johnny's, bringing with him jobs for 29 family members, all of whom opened up their own restaurants in the U.S.

The Fenton community soon became Delio's family away from his own family, laughing and joking together during long restaurant hours, making his customers

feel right at home. He liked the close-knit, small size of Fenton, in contrast to a big, tourist city in Italy that was his birth home.

"He was the first person we met in Fenton," said Penny Fausey, of Fenton Township. "When Don and I were moving here from Mason and bought a house, the Realtor took us out for lunch to Johnny's. Soon, it became 'our place' to go. When I opened my business (Fausey & Associates, CPA), Delio brought in all sorts of food as a gesture of goodwill, and wouldn't let us pay for any of it."

The Fausey family celebrated their happy occasions at Johnny's, like Don's 40th birthday, almost 30 years ago, and years later, their daughter Amanda Fegan's

40th birthday. The couple spent most Friday and Saturday nights at Johnny's when their kids were growing up, dancing and closing the place down. "Delio would be right there with us, to the end," said Penny. "It's going to seem really strange to not see him there."

When it was time to shed tears together as a family over the untimely passing of Amanda's husband, Mike Fegan, at age 37, it was Johnny's where they chose to go to remember Mike's life and grieve together. "It's always been Johnny's, through the good and the bad," said Penny.

Sharon Benner Grindel lived near Johnny's Pizzeria when she was growing up on the corner of LeRoy Street and South Long Lake Road, where K&H Garage stands today. "When we were 15, my friend Lynda Hayes and I would walk across the street and literally 'move into' a booth," said Grindel, now of Middleville. "We had

enough money to buy a soft drink and an order of garlic bread. We would sit there for two or three hours, getting free soft drink refills and sometimes a second order of garlic bread. Delio never once complained. He just let us sit there deep in girl talk."

Grindel says she was a cheerleader at Lake Fenton High School from 1975 to 1978, graduating with Delio's son, Delio. "These wonderful memories just bring me to tears. I am so grateful I got to see Delio in August."

and smoking, these lifestyle habits accelerate the degeneration of collagen and elastin fibers. Little lines around the mouth are one example of superficial wrinkles. "Lines are caused by what you are not giving your skin, primarily balance and hydration," said Adam. "It's all in the delivery of these back into the skin."

A deep line, or wrinkle, is caused by the degradation of the structural components of the skin, including elastic, collagen and fat. Deep wrinkles extend through the upper dermis into the mid and lower dermis. "You don't need to sandblast your face," she said. "Plump up your skin with the proper moisturizer over time. It's not what has to be removed from your skin, as much as it is what has to be delivered to your skin. That's what will define your complexion and diminish your lines."

"I prefer to keep it simple, with a skin care regimen using natural products from Jelene," said Adam. "What these

"Step 1 is cleanser, Step 2 is balancing with a pH spray, and Step 3 is moisturizing cream. Exfoliation is an important extra step as people age."

Psychologist Darryl Douglas is a professor at the University of Michigan-Flint. He said in his practice, he helps children deal with transitions like these frequently.

### Summary

► For many 11-year-olds, the change to sixth-grade means different classes, lockers, students and probably some anxiety, which schools try to alleviate.

"A number of (children) are not emotionally ready for that kind of transition," he said. Suddenly, "you have to be much more mature, much more responsible. It's a very different

model."

Zach Schulz, 11, came to AGS from State Road Elementary. "Here you have lockers, you have to go to different classes, it's just weird because there, you were the biggest kids," he said.

Meg Wolosonowick, 11, came from Tomek-Eastern Elementary, and agreed with Zach in that the kids are a little more mature here.

Before coming over, she was nervous about not being able to get into her locker,

and taking all the different classes. Zach echoed her concerns with the lockers.

At AGS, sixth-graders eat together, and are generally separated from the other grades. A group sits together on the outskirts of the cavernous cafeteria. For

them, there is a change from a smaller group of mixed grades in elementary, to this large and loud lunchroom.

Still, the good seems to outweigh the bad because of the new experiences.

Lauren Bacon, 11, said she likes meet-

ing new people and her class schedule, though she was nervous when classes began.

All the students said it took a while to get used to their classes, and admitted they still get lost on occasion. Lily Sanchez, 11, said she enjoys the variety introduced at the sixth-grade level and Nikolas Hager, 11, enjoys gym. Noah Stombaugh, 12, is brand new to the district, and likes the tech lab.

Students like Meg and Zach were able to try out their lockers and map out their classes with parents before school started, and felt the district did a good job preparing them.

Sue Hinton is counselor for Linden Middle School. She said incoming students participate in activities to make them feel included, and a little more familiar with the school.

"Their hormones are starting to go crazy when they get here," said Hinton, which can add to regular student drama. "I think they're more excited to learn," she added. New building, new and changing classes, and of course using lockers are all big and new for students.

Hinton said that staff had their master keys out the first few days, to help students get into lockers if they had trouble.

Meg and Zach notice a difference in the treatment from the teachers, but they can't put it in words. At 2:13 p.m. the bell rang, and they both jetted off to find their rides.

Many children in sixth-grade are 11 years old. Between 10 and 11, many changes take place, said Douglas. At this time, the frontal lobe begins to develop and mature and thought processes become more logical.

He said a setting like in Holly where sixth-grade is still part of elementary school, is better for the student. "You can't force some kind of psychological and emotional change that our brain isn't wired for," he said, adding that the setting instead should be changed to meet the needs of the student.

For the American worker, future careers will venture into fields that most likely didn't exist just a few decades earlier.

"Automation makes everything more efficient. Where it may have taken a whole shift to change a whole die on the press line, we now have the ability to change that die in 10 to 15 minutes," said Brenda Crampton, director of operations at Atlas Technologies in Fenton. The company creates large manufacturing parts for the automotive industry and it has been diversifying its work into other industries such as appliances, agriculture, and heating and cooling. While efficiency is increased, Crampton acknowledges having robots replace human workers does have its consequences.

"Unfortunately, this does mean there's fewer jobs for specific tasks. Skill levels may have to shift from operator to robotic programmer," Crampton said.

Just because robots are replacing more menial jobs however doesn't necessarily mean humans will be completely out of work. Massachusetts Institute of Technology (MIT) professor Erik Brynjolfsson theorizes we are currently undergoing a transition period, much like the Industrial Revolution, where workers shifted from farms to factories. Brynjolfsson hails this generation of work as "The New Machine Age," where workers will have to work alongside machine rather

than competing against them.

"The full implications of the new machine age are going to take at least a century to play out," Brynjolfsson said in a TED Talk earlier this year. "The answer is to not try to slow down technology. Racing with the machine beats racing the machine."

So what does an economy look like where humans are racing with robots instead against them? For Brynjolfsson, jobs of the future will involve thinking and problem solving rather than manufacturing and repetitive work. Service jobs that can't be outsourced will see the biggest growth in the next few decades. The Bureau of Labor Statistics estimates that by 2020, five million jobs will involve healthcare, construction and retail. Office jobs like

IT and administrative jobs are expected to make up 10 percent of the workforce while a third of workers will be perform some sort of health related job. Manufacturing, agriculture and government jobs are all expected to see significant downsizing by the next decade.

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## Legal battle over land winding down

►Smith v Holly Township back  
in court tomorrow, Sept. 26

**Holly Twp.** — It's been a long and difficult road for Holly Township residents Timm and Maria Smith as they have struggled through a three-year battle with the township over the plight of their 1031 South Holly Rd. property, but as of this week, it appears to be winding down.

For the last three years, the Smiths have been embroiled in a lawsuit with Holly Township regarding ownership of a 10-acre portion of the 20-acre property the Smiths once entirely owned. A legal land split of the parcel was never performed, and the Smiths maintained that the mortgage on the 10-acre parcel on which they defaulted in 2008 was fraudulent.

The township claimed ownership of the parcel, but because a legal land split never occurred, the Smiths maintained that the township violated the Land Division Act, the fraudulent mortgage should have been null and void, and that the property should

have reverted back to them.

In February 2012, Judge Kelley Kostin of the 52-2 District Court evicted the Smiths from the home they once occupied on the 10-acre parcel in question. The Smiths relocated into a makeshift camper on one of the two adjacent five-acre parcels they still own, as they awaited a decision on the land dispute from the Michigan Court of Appeals this last August.

In August, the Michigan Court of Appeals reversed the circuit court's original decision that denied Holly Township's request to have the title to the 10-acre parcel quieted in its favor. The court held that the Smiths failed to bring their action within the redemption period — or even within a reasonable time following expiration of the redemption period — and that the township's position with respect to the property was materially changed due to the passage of time. Additionally, the court found no support in the Smiths' claim that the township acted "without a clean conscience, in bad faith, or with unreasonable delay."

Even so, the court remanded the matter back to the circuit court where Judge Colleen O'Brien is expected to quiet the title in the township's favor, and legally divide the property into three parcels — the township's 10-acre parcel, and the two five-acre parcels still belonging to the Smiths.

By dividing the property, the Smiths maintain the Land Division Act will be violated as the process then land locks their remaining two 5-acre parcels, and is something they say the township should be required to remedy.

"Dividing the property will then force the township into doing what they originally asked us to do — put in a \$120,000 road so that our parcels are not land locked," Timm Smith said.

"The appellate decision to subdivide the property by mortgage and then follow the Land Division Act is a new way of subdividing land," he added. "Now you can get a mortgage on a piece of a parcel, default on it, and the judges are forced to subdivide the property by judicial means — not necessarily by the Land Division Act."

The case is scheduled to be heard by O'Brien at 9 a.m. on Thursday, Sept. 26 in the Oakland County Circuit Court in Pontiac.

Aubuchon, 35, who co-owns Holly Lanes with business partner, Derrick DeMeritt, 36, said the suspects entered through a hole they made in the roof around 5:30 a.m. and proceeded to take approximately 40 bottles of liquor, five flat screen TVs, \$700 in candy, and an undisclosed amount of cash from the safe in an hour's time. Additionally, Aubuchon said the pair used a crowbar they found in his office to smash anything and everything in their path, including a several vending machines, anything that was affixed to the wall, and flat screen TVs that were too heavy to carry to their awaiting vehicle.

"These guys have to be the world's dumbest criminals," Aubuchon said. "At one point, our security video shows one guy swinging the crow bar into the Pepsi machine and accidentally hitting the other guy in the head — if it ever makes it on Facebook or YouTube, it's going to go viral for sure," he added.

Aubuchon's iPad and Apple computer were left untouched, he said. "These guys were definitely amateurs," he said. "Derrick and I were laughing that they stole all that candy, yet left behind some pretty expensive computer equipment — it just shows how dumb they are."

The security video, Aubuchon said, gives law enforcement a very clear picture of the suspects. "Facial recognition on the video is unbelievable," he said. "They might as well have smiled for the camera — it's that clear." In addition, Aubuchon said state police were able

to collect fingerprints as well as DNA samples from the scene.

To make matters worse, the suspects left officers with a trail of candy to where their vehicle — a black-colored truck, had been parked. The suspects are described as two white men, thought to be in their mid-20s.

"I want them to be caught, and I believe they will be," Aubuchon said. "The beauty of it is, it's a 20-year felony if someone is convicted of breaking into a safe — and when they're brought to justice, I'm going to be in the courtroom watching it all happen."

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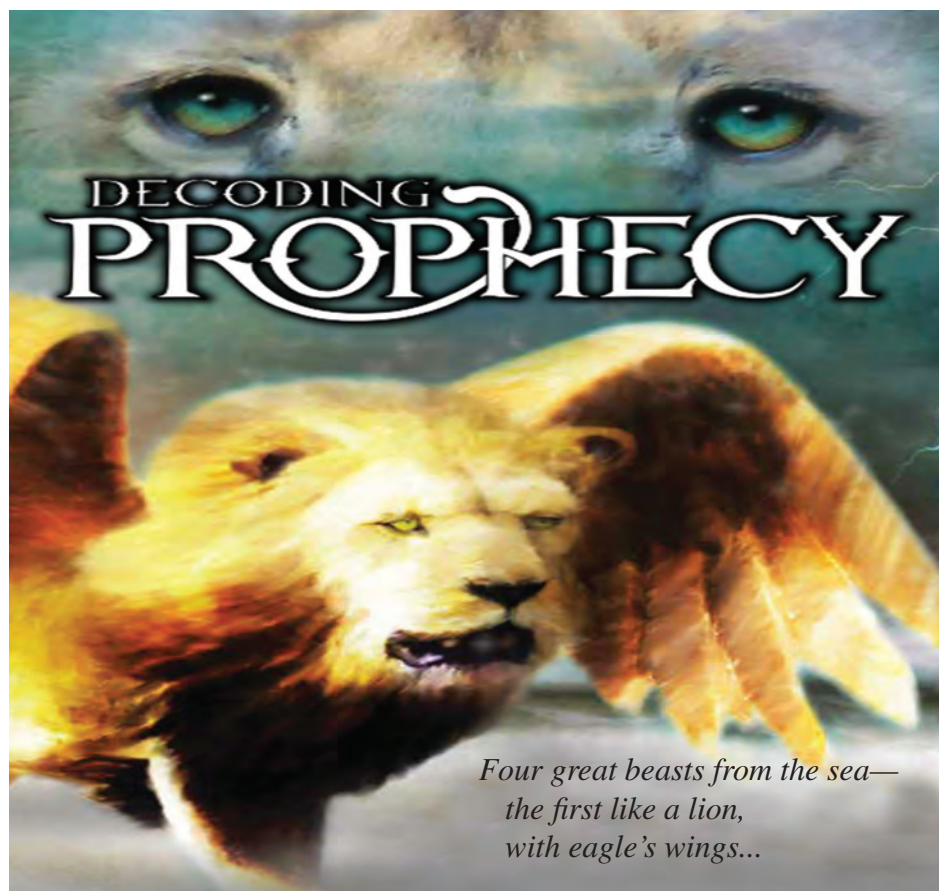

None of the area teams dominated like the Lady Eagles did. Despite

the fact their No. 1 runner, Sidney Elmer, didn't compete, the Linden girls easily beat the field.

The Lady Eagles earned four of the top-five finishes and had their entire top five finish in the first nine spots, earning just 22 points. Brandon was second with 52 points, while South Lyon East was third with 90 points. Linden's 'B' squad also performed well, placing fourth (102).

"I was extremely proud of my team's performance at the classic," Linden coach Teresa Wright said. "The cool and damp weather made for a great racing day. Scoring 22 points was phenomenal considering the fact that our top runner, Sydney Elmer, was unable to run due to ill-

ness one hour before the start of the race."

Linden's McKayla Guy was the only Division II runner to finish the event in under 20 minutes, winning in 19:59.89, about three seconds before second-place Paige Arney of Brandon. The next three placers were Linden runners — Courtney Davis in third (20:30.32), Savannah Ferrara in fourth (20:37.13) and Jordan Holscher in fifth (20:37.96). Maya Gossett was the last scorer, placing ninth (21:40.40).

"All five ran strategically, knowing they didn't want to let Sydney down," Wright said.

Finishing just outside the top 10 were Taylor Ganger in 11th

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# Fenton residents' summer job is a daily adventure

►Whitewater rafting guides Reed, Lega love spending time on West Virginia's Gauley River

Most people enjoy a little adventure in their life.

Fenton graduates Jamie Reed and Shana Lega aren't like most people — adventure and danger are a part of their working lives during the spring, summer and fall outdoor seasons. They may just qualify as adventure junkies.

Ever since the pair graduated in 2008, they have spent their summers as whitewater rafting guides down some of the most dangerous rivers in the United States. They are guides for Adventures on the Gorge, an adventure resort that takes groups of people looking to satisfy their adrenaline needs down the Gauley and New rivers in West Virginia, the home of two class five whitewater rafting trips, the highest rating there is for commercial rafting. Dealing with high water levels, strong currents, large rocks, branches and extreme declines is just their way of punching the time clock on a daily basis.

"I love it," Reed said. "I love how it's different every single day. You meet some of the craziest people. It's opened the world to a whole bunch of new opportunities for me because I do meet so many people. It's a challenge

and the adrenaline is there every single day. It's really fun."

"I love being outside and hanging with the people," Lega said. "More than anything, I like being outside and being in the water. My summer job involves being in the water."

### The start of a career

Reed has been whitewater rafting since she was a kid, going on trips with her dad, Bill Reed.

"We'd go to West Virginia during the summertime and go whitewater rafting," Reed said. "We became friends with the river manager and he offered me a job."

Reed accepted a summertime

job, but just as quickly she came back home to get her friend, Shana. Lega got a job with the company as well reuniting the two friends for the summer.

"I went with Jamie after my first year in college, went down there, trained and I ended up loving it," Lega said.

Trips usually include a 14- to 16-foot inflatable raft. They seat up to eight people. Reed said they train customers on the essentials of whitewater rafting and then take groups down the river for trips that can range from one-half day to a complete day.

In order to be a guide, there is

training, but it seems experience is your best training.

"We have to learn how to read the water. We have to learn different techniques," Reed said. "You have to learn all of the things you possibly have to do in order to get out of a dangerous situation."

### The dangers of adventure

The Gauley River includes

six Class V rapids, which are the highest difficulty rated rapids for commercial use. For that reason every day brings a new challenge. Rainfall can alter the depth of the water by inches or even many feet within days. Fallen trees and rocks also make the job different on a daily basis.

"I've had people (going See **ADVENTURE** on 15

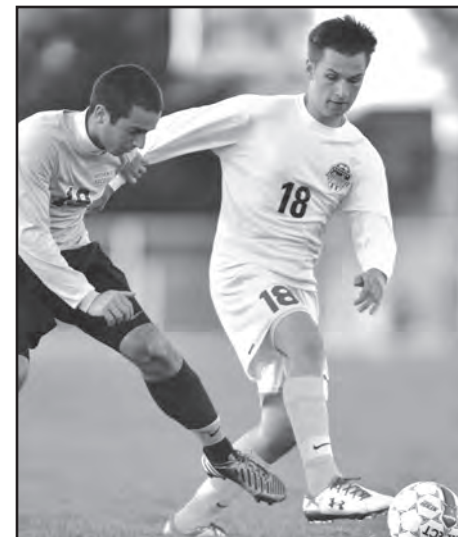
Fiebertz was pleased with some aspects of the team's play against West, but he said the game reminded him of another recent contest.

down (the river) taking little kids, but that's when the water is zero or two feet, and the waves are much smaller and more manageable," Lega said. "Being in water that's six feet, you don't know how much of a game-changer that is."

"It's more dangerous when the water levels are higher," Reed said. "The river changes all the time. The older guys say the day you think you know a river is the day you should stop rafting it. That is the day something is going to happen."

Trips range from rides that are about 2 1/2 hours long to others that last about four hours, and include a meal. A trip could include as many as 12 boats. And with each group there are different challenges.

"It depends who you are with," Reed said. "But things can happen even if you have experienced people."

"Sometimes people don't know how to swim or can't speak English. But we always manage to do it, but it does get challenging. It's pretty tough."

And dangerous situations do come with the territory. People do end up overboard or rafts flip, among other dangers. Before every trip, customers must sign a waiver and the possible dangers are addressed.

"Trees and rocks are a big thing," Lega said. "Trees act as strainers. And undercut rocks are a really problem. ... It's always changing. Every trip is a whole different ball game because you never know what is around the corner."

"I've been in some predicaments that I didn't think I'd make it, but that comes with the job," Reed said. "I've seen horrible things. I've helped pull bodies in the rocks. It's sad, but it comes with the job and you hope experience (eliminates the bad trips)."

And what do the girls do with their days off? Well, they whitewater raft, of course. They even live in a three-person tent during the summer.

"I love it," Lega said. "I'd much rather be in the sun and water than waiting tables."
