# How long is too long to wait for an ambulance?

### **▶**Concerns about system for student athlete injuries

Genesee County Commissioner Tony Brown is seeking to improve emergency response times for student athletes after a recent injury at the Lake Fenton versus Beecher football game. Brown said after the first call, it took an ambulance from STAT EMS more than an hour to arrive on scene at Lake Fenton High

School and came after he called

911 directly. "From the time I made my phone call to the time they arrived, there was an 18 minute response time. They're 3.4 miles away," Brown said. "There were no parades in town, no buildings that were burning. There was no reason for an 18 minute response time for my call."

Unlike surrounding school districts, Lake Fenton does not have a contract with any entities for emergency services. And, since the student athlete's injury was considered a tier two injury, STAT EMS Chief Operating Officer Joe Karlichek said ambulances were unable to use emergency lights on their way to the scene.

### Early Childhood Center transformed into mini-Disneyland

**Fenton** — Though several Disney princesses, 100 live goldfish, hundreds of lights and flowers are still missing, the Enchanted Princess Ball in the gym of the World of Wonder (WOW) Early Child Center is coming along on

Friday afternoon.

Nearly complete is the 60-foot-wide castle, which serves as the backdrop for what already looks like an impressive Disney-themed party. Nearly 1,000 tickets have already been sold for four weekend performances.

On Thursday, the crew of

six and high school volunteers were hard at work bringing the childhood magic of Disney to Fenton, converting the WOW gym into a mini-Disneyland.

"Ithas grown into quite a story," said Director Linda Mora. At press time, nearly 1,000


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

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# New state-of-the-art downtown anchor on the rise

►At 47,000 square feet, building will be downtown Fenton's biggest structure

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**Fenton** — The foundation for what could be a game-changer for the city of Fenton is materializing before residents' and motorists' eyes. The idea hatched in 2011 is coming to life at one of the busiest corners in Fenton.

Subcontractor Tom Byczynski of Fenton and his crew are with Baruzzini Construction out of Brighton. He and four other laborers enjoyed mild weather on Wednesday as they worked installing footings under a benevolent sky. A small generator ran power tools and a guitar amp that was rigged up to tune to an '80s rock station.

Byczynski is happy for the rare occasion to work near home, and also to be a part something he has seen work for communities before — a large new building to help anchor a downtown. He has seen a building like this go up in Northville, and it attracts more interest to the city. "It's nice to see (Fenton) actually grow a little bit," he said.

Northville City Manager Pat Sullivan said that in his experience, buildings like these are a plus for downtowns, especially when it holds both residential and commercial tenants. "When you add residential, those are typically people who want to shop downtown," he said. "Adding residential is a good thing."

He points to a 25,000-squarefoot mixed-u se building completed in 2006 that is currently full. He said the city is even working to concentrate more residents in their downtown.

Another positive aspect of adding a new commercial space to a downtown is catching the interest of businesses who cannot, or do not want to exist in smaller, historic spaces, he said.

Cornerstone project super-

intendent Rohn Smith with Sorensen Gross Construction said the project will use around two dozen different sub-contractors to do the work, and it's his job to schedule and coordinate them. The project is at 100 pages of blueprints and growing, and 500 pages of specifications for their part of the project.

The first floor of the building will be steel and iron with preformed concrete sections, and the upper four floors wooden frame.

To make the ground stable, and able to handle the required 5,000 pounds per square foot, stone aggregate was set in 210 separate columns, at 10-15 feet deep to give the building a base.

"It will be a state-of-the-art apartment building," he said. "It'll bring more people down to the city center. It'll be the biggest building in the area."

Smith hasn't personally built a commercial/residential structure like this, and it takes a lot more engineering than erecting a fast-food restaurant with 15 pages of plans. "It's not a huge building, but there's a lot of detail and a lot of materials," he said.

The next step for the building is masonry work, and onlookers will begin to see vertical columns for the first floor.

He said the location of the building, with access to the work site from the west only, adds to the logistical difficulties not only with contractors, but with bringing larger materials like concrete sections into the building by crane.

He's not looking forward to a significant amount of work being done in the coldest months of the year, but he expects the building to be done by this time next year, barring major problems.

tickets have been sold and an additional performance had been added.

The show is called the "Enchanted Princess Ball," though Mora prefers to drop the "princess" part to appeal to boys as well.


In the gym, a 60-foot wide Disney castle has been erected. "Fenton's never seen anything like this. They will feel like they're in Disneyland," said Mora.

The Enchanted Princess Ball is a Disney-licensed live-action performance of Disney classics that only performs at schools. They utilize top-notch talent and visuals to immerse children in the experience. The company is based in Port Huron, comprised of a husband and wife team at its core.

Two performances on Saturday, and two on Sunday were scheduled. Each show would use 200 audience participants.

Set-up began Thursday afternoon, and took 12 hours, which included setting up the castle and 6-foot-tall wishing well. A crew of six, along with staff volunteers, handled immeasurable details, not much different from setting up a reception for a wedding or huge social event.

Mora pursued using the WOW gym as a venue for the program under a parent recommendation. Because the Disney license is only for educational facilities, the performances are inter-



### **EYE TURNS**

All too often children are put through eye muscle surgery prior to having a proper vision assessment. Most children with eye turns have nothing wrong with the eye muscles, but rather a problem within the eye muscle control system in the brain. In other words, most eye turns are a software problem not a hardware problem. The main goal of eye muscle surgery is to make the eyes cosmetically straight.

I choose to address eye turns from a visual function standpoint, asking the questions, "WHY did the eye turn in the first place? What made the brain decide to control the eyes differently?" Once we learn this we target correcting the "vision software" with therapy to reteach the visual system how to use both eyes together. Doing this can cosmetically straighten the eyes and allow the person to function with better binocular vision, not just getting the eyes to cosmetically look nice. The majority of children that have eye turn surgery do not have (post-surgically) normal two-eyed depth perception "3-D" (ex. magic eye pictures require normal "3-D" Vision). If you are considering eye turn surgery (strabismus surgery) you owe it to yourself and the patient to learn about other non-surgical ways to straighten the eyes and improve visual function and coordination.

active, and more of a strolling dinner theater than a sit-and-watch stage performance.

Adults take the children, who are encouraged to wear costumes, and sit at linen covered tables for refreshments, as the performance happens around them. The performances are intended to entertain, and educate.

Mora describes the whole event as a "face-to-face educational program," which will include creativity, movement, fine motor skills and coordination. An hour before each performance, there is free story telling in the media center, and \$5 face painting and glitter tattoos.

The WOW is guaranteed \$2,000 for hosting the production, and the goal is showcasing the school itself. Mora hopes to make the production an annual event.

"We're World of Wonder, it's always about that sense of magic," she said. "It's such a short time in life that they have that sense of magic."

Lake Fenton currently has 19 mills approved for the millage renewal and Fenton's non-homestead seven-year millage

renewal is for 21 mills.

The Foundation Grant for each child edu-

cated equals state aid plus Non-Homestead Tax. If the non-homestead tax is not renewed by voters, the Foundation Grant is decreased by the amount lost in non-homestead rev-



enue. This tax amounts to 11.4 percent of the annual revenue for the Lake Fenton schools or approximately \$1,900,000.

For Fenton schools, this non-homestead millage gen-

erates revenues of approximately \$4.2 million annually.

"The district depends on this revenue for the day-to-day operations," said Timothy Jalkanen, superintendent of Fenton Area Public Schools. "It supports each and every aspect of the entire school district. Without this renewal the district budget would dramatically be impacted."

According to Jalkanen, under Proposal A, the state of Michigan contributes the majority of local school funding dollars, but to receive full funding, school districts must levy 18 mills on non-homestead property within the school district.

Byron Area Schools is proposing to borrow up to \$5,350,000 for the purpose of partially remodeling, refurnishing, and equipping school facilities, updating technology, upgrading the running track, purchasing school buses and improving the sites. This 25-year bond proposal is for 1.87 mills (\$1.87 on each \$1,000 of taxable valuation).

### **FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS**

Q: How will the taxes on my home be affected if the renewal is successful?

**A:** Taxes on residential homes are not affected by non-homestead

### Q: Why is the millage proposal for 19 or 21 mills if only 18 mills may be levied?

A: The 1 or 3 mills above the 18 mills would protect the districts from loss of future revenue due to the Headlee Amendment

### Q: What causes a Headlee rollback to take place?

A: If the taxable value of property increases more than the cost of living, the millage rate is reduced. Lake Fenton has not had a Headlee rollback in several years.

### Q: Does the renewal mean a tax increase for anyone in the district?

**A:** This renewal represents no change from the current millage rates being collected on operational

#### Q: What happens if the millage is not renewed?

A: It will cost the Lake Fenton Community Schools approximately \$1.9 million or 11.4 percent of the operational budget beginning with the 2014-15 school year. Fenton schools would lose \$4.2 million annually.

### MCC proposal would borrow up to \$50 million

On Nov. 5, residents will vote whether they favor Charles Stewart Mott Community College borrowing up to \$50 million and then issuing bonds in one or more series for the purposes of making permanent improvements to, renovating, remodeling, improving, equipping and reequipping MCC buildings and sites to be used by the college for instructional purposes.

Additionally, the funds would be used to acquire buildings and sites for new buildings, as well as constructing buildings and additions to existing buildings.

Per the proposition, the bonds may be outstanding, exclusive of refunding, for 20 years. The estimated millage that would be levied to pay the proposed bonds in the first year of the authorized levy is 0.08 mills, or approximately \$.08 per \$1,000 of taxable value of real and tangible personal property in the college district.

The estimated simple average annual millage that will be required to retire the bonds is 0.25 mills or about \$.25 per \$1,000 of taxable value of real and tangible property in the college district.

"Our group took the direct route but we were challenged with heavy traffic that evening," said Karlichek, adding that access to the football field itself was restricted due to its location behind the high school. "We could not get to the football field and had to be guided in by a golf cart."

Athletic directors at Fenton and Linden high schools said they have ambulances on standby at football games. Trainers are on site to examine any potential injuries.

Schools are not required to have ambulances on call for sporting events. Brown said having an ambulance present at football games could cost school districts \$60 to \$200 per game.

Lake Fenton Superintendent Wayne Wright said the school district does not have a contract for medical response services or have an ambulance on standby for football games. He said dispatchers asked if the student athlete was alert and responsive,

which classified his injury as a tier two call.

"I would think that anyone who would call for an ambulance would be responded to," Wright said. "We had discussions with different individuals and response times will be stepped up."

Brown said he also has an issue with how injuries for student athletes are classified. The injured student athlete had a cervical injury in his neck, but was still classified as a non-emergency run.

The level of urgency to

medical emergencies is set by the Genesee County Medical Control Authority. Brown hopes to meet with the board soon in order re-evaluate emergencies and improve response times.

Karlichek believes the tier levels for emergencies are adequate as they stand and said if the school district wants better emergency coverage, they should contract with emergency responders.

Fenton Fire Chief Bob Cairnduff said ambulances that are not contracted to a specific area follow guidelines set by the county and are not obligated to perform services in non-contracted areas. Cairnduff

said it's ultimately up to the schools to decide what type of coverage they want and to agree to a contract with emergency responders.

"The days of getting free coverage for services has gone by the wayside," Cairnduff said. "It's a hotbutton issue. There are

injuries all across the county and I can see this expanding. It's up to the schools to decide if they want coverage."

Brown hopes updating the parameters for tier one and tier two emergencies will improve response times with ambulances in the county.

"We need to upgrade the tiering level on sports related injuries. The taxpayers and kids deserve more," Brown said.

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
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### **BATTLING CANCER**

# **Eagles keep playoff hopes alive, 17-13**

**Linden** — Linden co-head coach Denny Hopkins never knows who will be his starting quarterback from week-to-week.

This week it was Noah Sargent, and the sophomore signal-caller did just fine. Sargent completed 16of-20 passes for 187 yards and two scores. He also rushed for 94 yards, helping lead the Eagles to a 17-13 home victory against Lapeer East, the first of two wins Linden (5-3) needs to end the season if they want to make the playoffs.

"It felt good," Sargent said. "At the beginning I was a little shaky, but I got comfortable as I got going."

"We have two good (quarterbacks)," Hopkins said. "Noah got a chance to start tonight and did a very nice job. But I can't tell you who is going to start next week. It's a weekto-week process."

While Sargent was solid, the defense was strong as well. East collected 335 yards total offense but Linden forced two turnovers and held East to just two touchdowns. One came late on a pass that bounced off one player and into Alex Esser's hands for a 67-yard TD catch, cutting Linden's lead to just 17-13 with 4:06 left in the contest.

East had one more chance on offense, but Linden's defense forced three incomplete passes, the last being broke up by Marshael Ryan. After a 39-yard run by Sargent, the Eagles were able to run out the clock.

The Eagles never trailed, breaking a scoreless tie midway through the second quarter. A completion

of 18 yards to Jacob Marshall and a 22-yard run by Sargent set up Sargent's 28-yard TD reception to Zachary Kentish. Kentish broke a couple tackles en route to the end zone. Cameron Cook's first of two extrapoints put Linden up 7-0 with 5:32 left in the half.

Set up by Ryan's 26-yard reception, the Eagles scored on a 35-yard TD catch to Kentish in the endzone with a defender draped all over him. Linden led 17-7 with 11:39 remaining.

East drove to the Linden 28 on its next drive, but a fourth-and-9 play went for just a three-yard completion, stopped by Jacob Klocek and Ryan. Linden's offense was unable to score on its next possession, giving East the ball back, and setting up their final score on the fluke TD pass. However, the Eagles held on down the stretch, earning the key win.

"It was probably, by far, the best effort we've had all year long," Hopkins said. "I'm proud of the kids."

Linden probably needs to win a home game against Swartz Creek on Friday to make the playoffs.

The Railroaders found their only touchdown on a quarterback run by junior Jacob Patsey.





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
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# Holly boys, Linden girls finish atop Metro League XC standings

### ▶Bronchos' Cantu earns individual victory

**Davisburg** — It wasn't a good start for Vincent Cantu and the Holly varsity cross country team.

While at cross country camp, Cantu broke his wrist and elbow while on a bike. But Cantu and the Bronchos overcame that incident to capture first at the first two Metro League jamborees.

Cantu had some more issues to overcome on Wednesday at the Flint Metro League Meet at Davisburg's Springfield Oaks County Park, when he was clipped in the back of the foot — almost falling — near the mile mark. And even late in the race, he was still in fifth place, looking a bit too far behind to compete for his first Metro League championship.

But just as the Holly varsity boys squad rose to the top this fall during the team season, Cantu did the same down the stretch, capturing the individual title and leading the Bronchos to their first Metro League team championship since 1996.

Cantu ended up winning the race relatively easily with a time of 16:10.7, about four seconds ahead of Linden's Dave Doyle, who placed second (16:14.5).

"After the two mile I think I was in fifth place and my coach told me to get after them," Cantu said. "It was a pretty big goal, but I was determined to get them, to catch my teammates (Dilon Lemond and Nate Frasier who was in the lead pack). I thought (one of my teammates) was going to win, but we needed to get the win."

Cantu was equally excited about the team's title.

"My first year we were fifth at the FML so this is a big change," Cantu said. "That's our coach (Rich Brinker). He's definitely turned the program around.

"It's great. We have a great group of teammates to push each other, to get faster and to work out mileage. It's just an honor to be on the team. It's great."

"We haven't won a league championship since 1996, so as a team we all ran great," Lemond said. "It was the first time we won in a very long time, so it's amazing, really exciting. It was our goal coming in and now we are league champions. It's cool."

The Bronchos broke Linden's six-year run on top of the Metro League, scoring

41 points to Linden's 48. The Eagles finished second in the overall standings with the placing on Wednesday. Meanwhile, Fenton placed fourth with 109 points.

Holly had three runners in the top six and all five of their scorers in the top 18. Lemond finished in third (16:17.70), while Nate Frasier, who won the first two Metro races, took sixth (16:31.60). Kurtis Cooley (16:51.70) and Zac Felix (17:25.00) placed 13th and 18th, respectively.

bounced off the keeper around the farside post. Ferguson was right there and pounded in his game-winning goal.



• Educate your teen. Teach your child the basics about drinking and driving

and distracted driving. Set ground rules about how many passengers are allowed in the car at one time.

• **Spy on your teen.** Monitoring your teen's driving habits will not only keep

your teen safer, but may even lower insurance premiums. Monitoring can include a camera installed in the vehicle that provides video and audio of what your teen is doing behind the wheel, or a GPS system that shows your teen's whereabouts. It may also be set up to alert you when your teen drives to a specific address or takes the car after curfew.

• Choose the right vehicle. Spend some time writing a list of the different features you feel are very

# Your windshield serves far more importance than just visibility

When you're driving your vehicle and getting a clear view through your windshield, you likely think that this is the

most important feature of your windshield — if you even give it any thought at all.

But your windshield is much more than a "window" to the road. While most drivers are more concerned

about a "dirty windshield" or dings and cracks that make it look less pristine, the windshield actually serves many more functions than just visibility.

#### Safety

The windshield is part of a vehicle's safety restraint system (SRS) that also includes air bags and seat belts. The SRS is designed to keep vehicle occupants within the relative safety of the passenger compartment during accidents, head-on collisions and rollovers.

The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration reports that more than 40,000 Americans are killed and more than five million are injured every year in highway crashes. Thirty percent of the fatalities occur when vehicle occupants

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are either ejected from the vehicle or injured during rollovers.

A cracked windshield may fail to support the roof if the car flips over, causing severe injury or death to its occupants.

"Cracks or a broken windshield affect the structural integrity of your vehicle," said Todd Petty, operations manager of Fenton Glass. "If you're in a crash or rollover, the windshield helps keep your car together and you in your vehicle."

In many vehicles, the windshield supports the passenger side airbag during deployment. If a windshield is replaced improperly, the windshield could become detached from the vehicle in an accident, causing the passenger side airbag to not deploy properly.

Windshields also cushion the blow if a vehicle occupant is thrown forward in a crash. Its two layers of glass sandwiched around a layer of polyvinyl material offer flexibility and cushion upon impact.

### Protection from the outside elements

Your windshield keeps heat and cold, wind and rain, bugs, pebbles and stones and other airborne debris out of your face. Because the windshield protects

the occupants of the vehicle from these elements, it becomes pitted and scratched from minute dirt and sand particles, as well as dinged and scratched from flying pebbles and stones.

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
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# A car checklist for winter

► Adequate fluids and new tires are some things that can keep you safe this winter

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Like it or not, the cold weather and frigid white snow will descend upon Michigan in the next few months. Winter puts new stresses on automobiles that are unique to the season. Here's a checklist to go over with your car before the end of the year.

#### Coolant

Check to make sure you have the right amount of fluids. Chances are you probably haven't had to use your car's heater too much this past summer and fall, so you probably haven't thought too much about antifreeze. Make sure your car has the correct level of 50/50 coolant and water inside your radiator.





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Also, be sure to have your oil changed, especially if it's been nearly three months or you're getting close to the 3,000-mile mark. Colder weather makes oil thicker, which could affect your motor's performance.

### **Battery**

Make sure your battery is charged and ready to go. Posts and connections can start to wear out and corrode after a few years. Make sure your battery is fully charged and that its connectors are clean so you won't have to jump-start your car during a whiteout this winter.

#### **Tires**

Have the right tires equipped for tougher environments. Can you see Lincoln's head when you run a penny through the tread? Are they starting to look depressed because they're slowly leaking air? If so, now's a good time to get new tires. Driving through snow and ice with treadles, under-inflated tires can lead to accidents and bursts. As a rule of thumb, tires lose about 1 pound per square inch for 10 degrees Fahrenheit the temperature drops. So be sure to check up on your tire pressure periodically.

### Wipers

Make sure you can see out of all your windows and mirrors. If your wiper blades do more smearing than clearing when you turn them on, it's a good indication you need to get them changed. Make sure your vehicle is stocked up on windshield washer fluid too, since it will keep your windshield clear of salt and other debris.

### Window defroster

Lastly, check your defrosters and heaters are still working since they'll be a main component of keeping your windows clear this winter.

### Lights

Review all of the outer lights on your car. This isn't necessarily limited to just the winter months but it is important to check, since November through March are the darkest months in Michigan. Check your low beams, high beams, turn signals and brake lights.

Like other maintenance on your car, it's always easier to change things when

Obviously a clean windshield is important to safety on the road, as even small smudges can block a driver's view of pedestrians, other drivers and dangerous obstacles. Also, keep your glass clean so that you can see new cracks or dings in your windshield. Clean windshields will also help nighttime visibility, when glare from oncoming headlights makes it difficult to see.

Make sure your wiper blades are working properly. Most major windshield wiper manufacturers recommend changing wiper blades every six months. After six months, there is frequently a noticeable deterioration in windshield visibility. To make it easy to remember, vehicle owners should consider changing their wipers each time the clock is changed for Daylight Saving Time or Standard Time.

Regardless of the time frame, if you notice streaking, chattering, work or split rubber or bent rubber frames, change the wipers immediately. Any of these conditions can distort the driver's view of the road and create a driving hazard.

## **Q:** When should you repair or replace your windshield?

**A:** "If a chip is in your line of vision or is larger than a quarter, you need to have the chip repaired," said Todd Petty, operations manager of Fenton Glass. "The most important thing is, don't wait. The sooner you get a chip repaired, the better it will turn out, because less moisture will have gotten inside."

# How to help your teen buy their first car

Here are your three options, according to financial expert Dave Ramsey:

- 1. Buy a car for them.
- 2. Let them pay for the car on their own.
- 3. Do a combination of both.

Ramsey totally disagrees with option one and believes that option two is an acceptable alternative if parents are already in debt and simply can't afford to help pay for a car

If parents can afford it, Ramsey recommends a combination plan he called the "401 Dave."

If your teen saves \$5,000, then you match them with \$5,000, and they can buy a \$10,000 car. If you have a workaholic teen, you may have to cap the match, in case your teen saves up \$20,000! A teen who works 10 hours a week for two years at \$8 an hour will have \$6,000 to put toward a nice, used car or if their parents can afford a match, then \$12,000 to make the purchase.

• Share the cost. While you don't want your teen to be deep in debt over the purchase of a used car, he or she needs to take responsibility for some of the costs of its operation and upkeep. Keep in mind that most insurance companies offer discounts for students who maintain above-average grades in high school or college.



By now, most people know status updates and certain pictures can potentially get you fired from a job or disqualify you for a new one. What most people might not consider is their Facebook 'Likes' reveal more personal information than they might realize.

Researchers at the University of Cambridge in the United Kingdom could accurately predict a person's race, gender, religion and other personal details simply by analyzing likes from 58,000 different Facebook users. The National Academy of Sciences recently published the results of the study and reveal that likes can give people just as much insight on a person as comments and pictures.

Volunteers gave researchers access to their accounts and took various personality and IQ tests. The results of the tests were linked up to the Likes, allowing researchers to attribute some topics to intelligence, political affiliation and other aspects of someone's personality.

According to the findings, Likes that are attributed to high intelligence include





"Thunderstorms," "The Colbert Report," "Science" and "Curly Fries." Likes that indicated lower intelligence, based upon the report, included "Sephora," "Lady Antebellum," "I Love Being a Mom" and "Harley Davidson."

Researchers found most users did not Like most items that were explicit in explaining a part of their personality. Instead, analyzing and linking multiple Likes gave researchers a clearer understanding of someone's personality. For example, "Curly Fries" aren't necessarily

associated with intelligence yet the study found the food was often "Liked" by people who were interested in science and politics.

So what does this mean for Facebook users?


Authors of the study theorized marketing companies could get a clearer understanding of someone's personality. For example, if companies found a link between left-handed people and

tennis, advertisements for racquets may show up more for a lefty than someone who is right handed. Another likely consequence researchers found is that hiding aspects of a personality online is becoming harder, especially when people and companies can begin to link certain traits to topics that are vague or unlikely to reveal anything.

"There is a risk that the growing awareness of digital exposure may negatively affect people's experience of digital technologies, decrease their trust in online services, or even completely deter them from using digital technology," the report concludes. "It is our hope, however, that the trust and goodwill among parties interacting in the digital environment can be maintained by providing users with transparency and control over their information, leading to an individually controlled balance between the promises and perils of the Digital Age.'

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# Do you need to get a shingles vaccine?

▶Debilitating disease with severe pain can be avoided

You may not have ever heard of shingles, unless you've seen the TV commercial advertising the shingles vaccine or if you are one of the "one in a million" to get the virus in the U.S. each year.

If you've ever had it, however, you cer-

tainly will remember it, as it's a debilitating condition that can cause severe pain.

### What is shingles?

Shingles is a painful skin rash, often with blisters, caused by the Varicella Zoster virus, the same virus that causes chickenpox, according to Mark Valacak, of the Genesee County Health Department.

It is also called Herpes Zoster, or just Zos-

ter. A shingles rash usually appears on one side of the face or body and lasts from two to four weeks. Its main symptom is pain, which can be quite severe. Other symptoms of shingles can include fever, headache, chills and upset stomach. Very rarely, a shingles infection can lead to pneumonia, hearing problems, blindness, brain inflammation or death.

### Who is most likely to get shingles?

Only someone who has had the chickenpox or, rarely, the chickenpox vaccine, gets shingles. The virus stays in your body, and can cause shingles many years later. Shingles is far more common in people 50 years of age or older, or those whose immune systems are weakened because of a disease such as cancer, or drugs such as steroids or chemotherapy. **Is shingles contagious?** 

You can't catch shingles from another person with shingles.

# Who should get vaccinated with the shingle vaccine?

The Centers for Disease Control (CDC) recommends the vaccine Zostavax for people 60 years and older, regardless of whether they can recall having had chickenpox. It is a one-time vaccine. "This vaccine is very effective," said Valacak.

### Who should not get the vaccine?

According to Valacak, those with severe allergic reactions to

gelatin or the antibiotic neomycin, should not get vaccinated. People with compromised immune systems should seek the advice of their doctor before getting the vaccine. No serious problems have been identified with the shingles vaccine, according to the CDC.

### Where do I get the shingles vaccine?

It is available in most pharmacies, including VG's Pharmacy, Walgreens, Target, CVS and doctor's offices. In most cases, it is covered by insurance.





# How to buy the perfect mattress MATTRESS SALE

▶You don't have to spend as much as you might think

Memory foam, pillow tops, coil counts and more. Buying a mattress to comfortably spend almost 24,000 sleeping hours of your lifetime seems a bit daunting, given all the options. But there are ways to simplify the process, by knowing a few traps, pitfalls and insider hints in the world of mattresses.

Trap #1: It's very difficult to compare mattress prices from store to store, because each retailer uses product names and numbers you won't find anywhere

What to do: When you "test-drive" a mattress you like, jot down everything about the inside of the mattress — its coil count, coil wire gauge, firmness (based on 1-10), materials used, and what position the list price occupies compared with other mattresses at the store from the same manufacturer. When you visit other mattress retailers, look at comparable mattresses in the same price scale until you find a close match.

Bottom line: You should be able to find a good queen-size mattress for between \$800 and \$1,400, according to John Winglemire of Winglemire Furniture in Holly. "You can pay even less if it's for a

mattress you won't use every day, for example in a guest room."

Trap #2: "Pillow top" softness may not last. While they feel great when you lie on them at the store, these thick layers will soon develop deep, annoying body indentations. Opt for a "plush top" instead, and you'll save \$100 to \$300. Wing-

lemire says that pillow tops aren't as popular as they used to be, because people are opting today for firmer mattresses.

"Many people like thermo-cool memory foam mattresses with gel, which pulls heat from the body," he said. His store sells the Restonic TempaGel mattress brand.

Trap #3: Warranties and satisfaction guarantees are less impressive than they seem. Find out exactly what these guarantees mean, from returns to restocking fees, exchanges, etc. Typically,



manufacturers' mattress warranties cover only major defects, not whether you find it comfortable or not when you get it home. **Trap #4: New foundations (box springs)** often are unnecessary. If your old foundation has no obvious problems, such as sagging or cracking, and is the same size as the new mattress, you can continue to use it. If your old spring-type box flexes when you push down on it, you don't want to use it with a new "no flip" single-sided mattress. If you do need a new foundation, buy one that's the same brand as your new mattress. Trap #5: A higher coil count doesn't necessarily mean higher quality. While it's true that having more coils is better than having fewer coils, it also matters how the coils are constructed. Independent coils, each made from a separate piece

of wire, will conform better to the contours of your spine than a mattress made with continuous strands of wire, even with a lower coil count. Independent coils also do a better job of isolating movement, abonus for people sharing a bed. Trap #6: Delivery/

removal charges. Ask about delivery charges and removal of the old mattress. Are these fees extra when you buy the mattress? Be sure to count any extra fees

in when you're comparing prices from store to store.

Trap #7: An expensive specialty mattress might have drawbacks. For example, memory foam mattresses conform well to the body and provide support, but make some sleepers too warm. Options that are more comfortable might be a Restonic TempaGel mattress or a natural latex foam mattress.

### **HOW TO TEST A MATTRESS**

- Lie on a mattress for at least 10 to 15 minutes in the showroom to make sure it is comfortable and properly supports your spine.
- To support your back, choose a mattress that allows your spine to be straight and supported while you sleep. When you lie on your side on a too firm mattress, your shoulders and hips don't sink in far enough for your spine to be straight. When you lie on your back, your hips don't sink in far enough for the mattress to support your lower back.
- A medium-firm mattress is the best choice for the vast majority of sleepers. An exception to this rule: side sleepers prone to hip or shoulder discomfort might do better on a soft mattress.
- The mattress industry uses terms like firm, medium-firm, plush and pillow-soft. It may be more helpful to use a 1-10 firmness scale, with 1 as the firmest and 4-6 as medium. Learn which "number" you like best, then specify this number when comparing other mattresses.

Helpful tip: Bring someone with you while mattress shopping so they can see that your spine is straight as you lie on your side. They can also confirm that there's no gap between your lower back and the mattress when you lie on your back.

What has been the biggest change in the pharmacy industry in your 30-year

career? I'd say the sheer number of new drugs on the market, plus the expanded role of insurance companies in determining for a patient what's covered and what is not.

I bet fall is a busy time for pharmacists. It has been very busy since kids went back to school. With 20 to 30 kids in each classroom, they're always transferring germs back and forth. We see a lot more respiratory disorders this time of year and of course, it's the start of flu season.

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The No Problem People

It seems like there is always something in the news about 'super bugs' or flesh-eating diseases. Is there more of this than there used to be? The 'super bugs' are a virus or bacteria that don't respond to traditional therapy because they have developed resistance to it, or it's a new virus or bacteria.

The best way to avoid this is to know your body and get yourself to a doctor if you've had a lingering bug that hasn't gotten better in two weeks. At that point, your body gets tired of fighting and is more susceptible to other bugs going around. If your cold is lasting two to three weeks, rather than the average 7 to 10 days, you had better have it checked out.

We're hearing more about flesheating diseases because of our instant communication, but they've always been around.

What's the best way to protect yourself against getting sick? People need to take good care of themselves by eating and sleeping well, exercising and washing their hands multiple times during the day. Cough into your sleeve or shoulder, not your hands, to prevent the spread of germs.

What are the vaccines you feel most adults should get? Certainly the flu shot every year, everyone from 6 months on up. The shingles vaccine is very effective for adults over 50 who can get it one time to protect themselves against shingles. It's estimated that one in three adults may develop shingles, if they've had the chickenpox. I'd also recommend the one-time booster for pertussis (whooping cough) for adults in their 30s, 40s, 50s on up, plus the pneumovax, which will protect older adults from certain strains of pneumonia.

How much prescription drug abuse do you see on a regular basis? I see it every single day. If it's a controlled substance like many pain relievers or stimulants, the state of Michigan maintains a website where we can chart a patient's dispensing history. We watch for patterns and behaviors. With experience, you can just tell certain things about a patient. We'll always try to verify a prescription with a doctor before dispensing it.

How will the Affordable Healthcare Act affect you as a pharmacist? I believe it will require more of us, getting more involved between doctors and patients. I feel positive about it, as we need something to help people who haven't been helped before. We're going to have to give it a chance to see how it works.

What is your greatest reward and your biggest challenge as a pharmacist? I love interacting with people, helping them with questions about insurance, the health care system as a whole and with a particular question, they may have regarding a prescription. The challenge is in working with insurance companies, which call all the shots about patient care. You'd think a person's doctor would have the last say about a patient, but it's really the insurance company. We're in the middle.

It's also difficult to multi-task all day long, sometimes for a 12-hour shift. In addition to dispensing prescriptions accurately and quickly, we're also fielding phone calls, patient questions and have to make callbacks. We all work together in a very small space, so it's important we all get along well.

# City OKs parking lots, water and sewer for Cornerstone

# ► Cost of \$494,622 for construction, engineering, testing

**Fenton** — Before fun stuff like eating at Sagano, getting coffee at Café Aroma or living in a cool new loft can happen at the Cornerstone building, a lot of dry, boring, but important things have to happen first — like water mains and parking lots.

These important elements are part of the agreement the city has with the builders for the historic project at South LeRoy Street and Silver Lake Road.

Footings are currently being installed. On Monday, Dan Czarnecki, the Department of Public Works (DPW) director asked for Fenton City Council to approve purchases and agreements related to the city's responsibilities during construction, which are tying in water and sewer mains, and building two parking lots, one to the south of the building, and one to the east.

The construction will cost \$445,672, for Jack Fick Excavating out of Swartz Creek. Engineering will cost \$40,950, and handled by OHM engineering out of Saginaw that will essentially help oversee construction, and ensure the projects are completed to specification by Jack Fick Excavating.

OHM recommended the city work directly with Schleede Hampton Associates Inc. for material testing, which is important to make sure all materials that are used for the project are correct. These include the gravel base, asphalt for parking lots, concrete, and water mains, which have to be the right materials to ensure the city is getting what it's paying for. This will not exceed \$8,000.

All told, the council agreed to allow City Manager Lynn Markland to sign contracts for the sum of \$494,622.

With parking lots, Czarnecki said the south lot will be constructed first, as it's currently empty grass/dirt, and the east lot will be constructed once contractors are done using the former Republic Bank spot for staging equipment.

The water tie-in will come from the nearest hub at Caroline Street; sanitary sewer will come from Silver Lake Road.

Construction on the water/sewer and parking lot project is expected to start in spring of 2014.

Councilwoman Cheryl King expressed concern that roads would be torn up more than necessary for the project.

Kent Early of OHM said caveats can be added that road damage be mitigated — within reason.

Councilman Les Bland said boring under the road is possible, when needed to lessen damage to roads.





DEAR DR. DONOHUE: My nextdoor neighbor turned yellow ... bright yellow. I had never seen that before. Her husband says she has jaundice. What exactly is that? How is it treated? — C.M.

**ANSWER:** Jaundice indicates that the skin and the whites of the eyes have turned yellow. It's not an illness. It comes from the French word for yellow. Jaundice indicates liver trouble. When the liver is functioning normally, it clears the blood of bilirubin, a byproduct of worn-out red blood cells. If the liver's not up to par, bilirubin levels in the blood rise, and that turns the skin and whites of the eyes yellow. Your neighbor's doctor has the task of finding the cause of jaundice. Only if the cause is identified can the liver be properly treated.





Six questions were asked of the candidates — three developed from questionnaires collected in advance by the Chamber and decided upon by their Political Action Committee, and three were from the audience.

# **Because** — that's the way we've always done it!

Just like many of you, I too receive a lot of information through the Internet and mailed to me daily. Every once in a while something will really catch your attention and cause you to stop and read. Recently I received an email newsletter from Jim Mathis, a keynote speaker at one of the annual Michigan Association of Chamber Professionals conference I attended. It was entitled, "Have You Always Done It 'That Way?' If what you do doesn't stand out; neither will you."

Being employed now for more than 20 years at the Chamber, I have to be very careful not to let myself 'become too familiar with the phrase because we have always done it that way.' The Chamber's Board of Directors, Ambassadors and many committee volunteers help keep us from falling in the rut. That is the beauty of having committees — to allow the ideas to flow and discover new ways to add value while generating revenue.

In his newsletter, www.jimmathis. com, Jim told a famous story he heard while working in a church many years ago. A young bride was cooking a roast for herself and her new husband. As she was preparing the meat to place into the oven, her groom noticed that she had cut both ends off the roast.

'Why did you cut off the ends?' he asked. 'Because that is the way my mother taught me to prepare a roast,' she said. 'I don't know why, but I will ask her.' A phone call to mom rendered this response, 'Well that is the way your grandmother taught me to fix a roast.'

You can see where this is going — so the mother called grandma and asked her why she always cut the ends off. 'I don't know honey. My mother taught me to always fix a roast by cutting off the ends that same way.' On a trip to the nursing facility, the grandmother asked her mother why she always cut the ends off the roast before cooking it. She responded, "Because, I had a small oven and a large roast wouldn't fit in it without cutting it down to size!

While allegorical, four generations had been preparing a roast the same way, but only one for a practical reason. The outmoded method was taught, and taught and taught, but no one asked why.

What are you doing in your business right now for no apparent reason other than, "We've always done it that way before...?"

This story also reminds me of this famous saying: What is the definition of insanity? 'Doing the same thing over and over and expecting different results!'

I hope you find this as helpful as I did to keep an open mind and remember it's OK to ask questions. It could result in saving time or money or both!



# This ain't your daddy's deer blind anymore

► Latest models — easy to carry, roomy, tons of features

Remember back in the good old days when hunters built their own hunting blinds and were done with it? A little plywood, some old tarpaper and maybe a few leftover shingles, some rusty old nails and you'd begin your project. As it came together, you'd disguise it using some outdoor-colored paint left over from several picnic tables of the past.

Pretty soon, you'd have to enlist several of your buddies to help you haul the heavy thing out into the woods. You'd pains-

takingly pinpoint the perfect location, making sure all your pals agreed — then you'd spot it there for the season. Location was of paramount importance, because once it was there, it was there. No moving it again, at least until you could rally the troops again next year.

We still have a few of those types of hunting blinds hanging around on our property — and they still work. They're a little worse for wear, but my husband and brothers don't seem to care. The yellow jacket hives are abandoned by late fall, anyway. They don't mind the fact that something — presumably, a porcupine — has been chewing on the door, nor do they mind the company of a few mice.

Better-camouflaged, lightweight, portable, roomy and versatile, today's deer blinds are reason enough for many hunters to put away the construction supplies and visit their local outdoor store. The choices are endless, giving hunters some fantastic options to consider before purchasing the blind that fits their specific needs.

With my daughter and my husband often hunting together, we decided to upgrade from the Ameristep Doghouse to an Ameristep Bone Collector ground blind.

Don't get me wrong — the Doghouse served its purpose well, but eventually, they just needed more room.

The new Bone Collector hub-to-hub is 75-inches by 75-inches, or a foot and a quarter bigger either way than the Doghouse. The ceiling height is 67-inches giving them plenty

of headroom. Along with the sizing upgrades come other perks — a heat-release roof venting system for better air flow, NS3 fabric to cut down on scent, shine and noise, as well as stakes and high-wind tie-downs for those windy fall and winter days in the woods. Weighing 6 pounds heavier than the Doghouse — just 20 pounds or so, it collapses into backpack and is still light enough for easy carrying.

have owned one.

With plenty of windows of varying sizes, shoot-thru mesh and a gun port, it's versatile enough to be used for archery or gun hunting. You can find the Bone Collector at any major outdoor store, and they normally go for \$200 or so.

If you want even a little more room than that and are willing to double the cost, you could always get a Primos Double Bull Double Wide ground blind. It's still the general hub-to-hub style, but it's bigger — by a couple

inches either way, and has 3-inches more of headroom. But what many hunters really like is its 180-degree full front view window system, and a non-zipping double door for silent entry. It's got everything else, too — shoot-thru mesh windows, and a blackout interior, stakes, base flaps and a bag to carry the

22-pound set-up into the woods. Not too shabby, but again, twice the cost of the Bone Collector.

With literally hundreds of portable ground blinds from which to choose, the choices are endless. One thing is for sure — if today's types of deer blinds had been around when my Dad hunted so long ago, I'm positive he would have owned one. Better-camouflaged, lightweight, portable, roomy and versatile — it definitely ain't your daddy's deer blind anymore!

Summary

► Hunters have so many more options today as they decide on what type of hunting blind to use. While some might stick with their trusty old homemade blind, others are opting for store bought ones that are lightweight and easy to carry to multiple locations.

# Why some women have mustaches

**DEAR DR. DONOHUE:** I watch a lot of TV news. Without naming names, there are two very attractive women reporters, dark-haired, who have prominent mustaches. I find this distracting. Is unwanted hair removal so very painful or costly that they would not have it done? We have a niece with the same problem, but I would never mention it to her. What's going on? — D.B.

**ANSWER:** Many women have hair growing in places usually reserved only for men — the mustache area, the chin, the chest, the upper back and the arms. It's called hirsuitism (HER-sue-tizm), and it's not uncommon. About 5 percent of women in the childbearing years have it, and more women develop it after menopause. It has to do with the balance between male and female hormones. Women make male hormones. Some make slightly more than normal, and other women might have hair follicles that are more sensitive to male hormones than they should be. In either case, hirsuitism is the result. It might be the only sign of male hormone production, or there may be other signs of hormone excess. For many, this is nothing more than a family trait. For others, it can be a sign of trouble in the adrenal gland, the thyroid gland, the pituitary gland or the ovaries. One somewhat-common condition that produces such an imbalance is polycystic ovary syndrome. Not every woman with mustache growth needs an exhaustive investigation, but women should mention it to their doctor to see if the doctor thinks further pursuit is in order. A number of options are open to women who want the hair removed. Shaving and bleaching the hair are two cheap ones. Vaniqa cream — relatively new — can be effective. Electrolysis and laser treatments destroy the hair follicles. Electrolysis is somewhat painful, but not so greatly painful that it's unbearable. Women reporters can afford either procedure. Male hormone excess can be treated with a number of medicines, and that can rid women of unwanted hair.



But ask yourself: Before you got your dogs, did you know how having them would affect you? Did you know how much you would grow to love them? Nobody knows for sure how having a baby will affect them; for many women, the human biological drive to have children overrides this anxiety. If you do the work of trying to imagine your life with a child and still decide against it, you should be honest with her; she will then have a tough choice to make.

DEAR AMY: I recently changed jobs. During my search for new employment, my boss encouraged me to use her as a reference, which I did. She was contacted by two companies, but gave one a terrible recommendation and did not return repeated calls from the other. At the time of my departure, she was barely speaking to me, which I found hurtful and confusing since I had been a good employee for five years. My former boss lives down the street from me and we occasionally cross paths. I'm not sure how to interact when we see each other in the neighborhood. How should I handle this?

**DEAR CONFUSED:** What your former boss did was unprofessional and unkind. She offered (begged) to give a recommendation and then betrayed this offer in her response (and lack of response). Because she has given you no reason to doubt your performance, you can only assume that she is retaliating because you chose to leave. You have to determine if you could learn something useful by confronting her. If so, then you should be brave enough to ask her to explain her behavior. If you don't want to do this, the way to respond to her when you cross paths is to be cordial, neighborly and as if you are unfazed by her behavior. Behaving well is (most often) the best revenge.

Automatic updates is a handy new feature in iOS 7 that will install all app updates, you guessed it, automatically. The major downside to this feature, however, is you may not want to install a specific update. Luckily, the feature is optional and can be turned off.

# To turn off automatic app updates:

- 1. Open the Settings app
- 2. Tap iTunes and App Store
- 3. Turn off Updates (it will have the App Store icon located on the left)

#### Wish list

There may be times when you'll come across an app of interest, but may not want to install it immediately. The App Store now includes a wish list, allowing you to save apps to be downloaded at a time of your choosing.

# To add an app to your wish list:


- 1. Tap the Share icon at the top
