Tarkleson, 60, grew up in Houston, and had the opportunity to catch a glimpse of the President as he left the airport the day before his visit to Dallas.

Three injured in Holly crash

Police say alcohol does not appear to be a factor

news@tctimes.com; 810-629-8282 **Holly** — A crash along North Holly Road Monday afternoon sent three people



to the hospital - two having been released with minor injuries and the third having sustained a fractured pelvis in the crash.

The crash occurred around 3:30 p.m. on Nov. 12 on North Holly Road near the intersection of Quick Road.

According to the Holly Police Department, a 29-year-old Holly man was southbound on North Holly Road when he swerved across the centerline, crashing head-on into a northbound pick-up truck driven by a 53-year-old Birch Run man.

A third vehicle driven by a 48-year-old Fenton woman rear-ended the pick-up truck, pushing her vehicle underneath the pick-up.

All three individuals were transported to Genesys Health Park in Grand Blanc Township for treatment.

Holly police reported that traffic was re-routed around the crash scene for an extended period of time until the investigation could be concluded, and the scene could be cleared. Although alcohol does not appear to be a factor in the crash, the crash remains under investigation.

Senate Joint Resolution V: Call for U.S. balanced budget amendment convention

Passed 26 to 12 in the Senate To submit an application to Congress calling for an "Article V" constitutional convention, limited to proposing an amendment to the U.S Constitution that prohibits the federal government from spending more in any fiscal year than it collects in tax and other revenue (balanced budget amendment). Legislatures representing two-thirds of the states must request this to get a convention, and three-quarters of the states must approve any amendment proposed by an "Article V" convention for it to become part of the constitution. Senate Bill 652: Establish state Appeals Court as venue for suits against the state

House Bill 5050: Ban credit card fraud "skimming" devices Passed 109 to 0

To authorize criminal penalties for the use of a "skimmer" device to gain access to a person's financial accounts (for example, when using an ATM machine). the new changes to shine through. The building's upgrades are being funded by the Downtown Development

Authority (DDA) to the tune of \$1.3 million, and the rest from private donors. Unlike the Cornerstone building, streetscape or Fenton Fire Hall, this is not technically a city of Fenton project, but Osborn sees it as part of the greater revitalization of the city.

These other projects will likely increase demand for a community space. It will serve as a meeting space and a place for parties, weddings receptions and other events as well as classes.

"The DDA and the city want to see more activities down there to draw more people downtown," she said.

Lockwood said that while the \$1.8 million allows for general construction, another \$400,000 needs to be raised to actually furnish the new classrooms being built. A pottery class, for example, needs a kiln to bake projects, and programming itself costs money. At least one donor wanted their money to be put toward a sculpture garden, and Lockwood said an enclosed dumpster area is also being researched.

Continued from Page 3A quite as well, containing 8 oz. water and 6.25 oz. of beans alone. But when comparing house brand corn with Freshlike corn, the cheaper brand won. The house brand contained 9 oz. of actual corn packed in 5.5 oz. of water, while Freshlike contained 8.5 oz. of corn in 5.75 oz. water.

Obviously, this was an unscientific experiment done in a home kitchen with rudimentary measuring tools, but the point was clear: house brands of canned vegetables don't differ enough in weight or quality (we ate the corn for dinner!) to justify paying so much more.

Before you dismiss canned vegetables as a lowly form of nutrition, you should know that they are usually picked and processed on the same day, taking only a few hours from harvest to processing. There is no need for preservatives because the heat and pressure in

the canning process preserves them. Yes, you may have to read labels carefully for sodium content, but note that there are many low-sodium, no-sugar options that cater to almost any nutritional need.

While you might not think of opening up a can of green beans or corn for Thanksgiving dinner, you might want to think again. When used with a proper recipe, you will find them to be an economical, "dressed up" alternative to more expensive vegetables that are out of season.

SALLY'S PERSONAL FAVORITES:

Better-than-average canned green beans

(Recipe courtesy of allrecipes.com)

INGREDIENTS:

2 (15 oz.) cans green beans 1 T. instant minced onion 1 t. bacon bits (fresh is best!) 1⁄4 t. salt 1/4 t. pepper

PREPARATION:

Drain one can of the green beans. Empty both cans into a medium sauce pan and add onions, bacon bits, salt and pepper. Cover and cook on medium heat for about 10 minutes. Tip: let the ingredients bubble and DO NOT take the lid off. The bacon bits and onions soften and enhance the flavor of the beans. Serves 3-4.

My Aunt Mary Lou's Easy Corn Casserole

INGREDIENTS:

- 1/2 c. butter. melted 2 eggs, beaten 1 (8.5 oz.) Jiffy corn bread mix
- 1 (15 oz.) can whole kernel corn, drained 1 (14.75 oz.) can creamed corn 1 cup sour cream

PREPARATION:

Preheat oven to 350 degrees and lightly grease a 9x9 baking dish. In medium bowl, combine butter, eggs, corn bread mix, whole and creamed corn and sour cream. Spoon mixture into prepared dish. Bake for 45 minutes, or until the top is golden brown. Do not overbake.

"It's taxation without representation," said Stewart, who has been involved with water issues in Genesee County since the early 1980s. "Residents should be aware the Karegnondi Water Authority (KWA) is potentially getting into their property taxes and using it as a line item to pay off the bond."

Stewart became suspicious of the new pipeline and the bond to pay for it after reading a legal notice in The Flint Journal. Stewart interpreted the words "If the city of Flint fails to fulfill its payment obliga-

tions under the Contract, the County of Genesee has covenanted and agreed to make any such missed payment" to mean residents within the county will pay for the costs not covered by the city.

'The KWA is doing this pipeline, that's fact," Stewart said. "But the fact is, how are they going to fund it?"

Genesee County Drain Commissioner and CEO of KWA Jeff Wright said the new water pipeline will not increase taxes for Genesee County residents. Wright also added that the water pipeline will most likely cost near \$265 million rather than the limit of \$300 million.

"Payment for the pipeline will come from existing revenue we collect from our

citizens. It does not include property taxes at all," Wright said. "We have about 250,000 people on the system right now, out of 422,000 residents in Genesee County."

Currently, water in Genesee County comes from the city of Detroit, which Wright said the county purchases for \$25 million a year. The money spent paying Detroit for water will be diverted into paying for the new pipeline from Port Huron.

Switching Genesee County's water

supply from Detroit to Port Huron has drawn strong feelings and arguments from supporters and critics. The Detroit Water and Sewerage Department (DWSD) issued a press release April 1 denouncing the pipeline, stating, "The insistence of Flint officials to pursue construction of the KWA pipeline can only be attributed to a 'political' objec-

tive that has nothing to do with the delivery or the price — of water." DWSD claims to have spent \$44 million in 2012 on improvements to stations that serve Genesee County and that the department attempted to negotiate new water rates for the

county, only to be refused by county officials.

Wright said the existing pipeline that transfers water from Detroit is crumbling and that it would cost county residents more to rebuild the existing pipeline, rather than construct a whole new one. Fenton resident

Add increasing water rates from DWSD, Wright said building a new pipeline will save residents more money.

"Detroit has publicly said they would have to rebuild the pipe if we don't do it. We've had shutdowns and were once out of water for three days," Wright said.

Stewart is still convinced however that residents will be on the hook for up to \$300 million.

"Fresh water is Michigan's best resource. The water authority has stolen Flint's gold," Stewart said. "KWA is asking for money and they're going to put it on the taxpayer."

That evening, Tarkleson said she remembers hearing her parents discuss how odd they thought it was that the President was virtually unprotected.

The next day at school, Tarkleson remembers learning that Kennedy had been assassinated in Dallas. "They sent us home from school," she said.

"When I got home, both my mother and my grandmother were bawling their eyes out—I remember it being very upsetting to see the grown-ups crying so hard."

While Holly resident Pam Krantz didn't have a specific connection with JFK's assassination, her family had a special connection to JFK, as her uncle's brother was a secret service agent for Jackie Kennedy.

Krantz said all her family knew was that her relative had been sent to Texas to set up the communications aspect of the trip, but didn't know if he had been involved in the shooting. "The secret service didn't do things on a routine basis — each day he had a different responsibility."

Krantz said her relative learned the President had been shot on his flight back to Washington D.C. "He thought the world of JFK," she said. "I wish he would have lived long enough to share some of his stories with us - I'm sure I heard some, but as a teenager, I didn't pay attention."

Former superintendent for Holly Area Schools, Kent Barnes, 62, said he was a seventh-grade student at Sturgis Elementary School in Sturgis, Ky., when he learned of Kennedy's assassination.

"I remember it was after lunch that our principal, Mr. Bowers Wallace, came over the PA system to let us know that President Kennedy had been shot," Barnes said. "As a seventh-grader at the time, my classmates and I were concerned that our president had been shot, but had no understanding of the immense significance of the event."

Oakland County Commissioner Bob Hoffman also remem-

bers the day Kennedy was shot "like it was yesterday."

A seventh-grade student at the time, Hoffman said students were notified of the shooting on the school PA system after a student's mother called the school to deliver the bad news.

"It was a really sad time," Hoffman said. "Most of all, I remember being scared," he said. "With so much on the news about Russia being the U.S.' biggest foe, we were all just really scared of

what would happen without Kennedy's leadership.'

Five decades of conspiracy theories

Just a little more than a thousand days into his presidency, two bullets struck and killed John F. Kennedy - one in his head, and one in his neck — while his motorcade wound its way through Dealey Plaza in Dallas, Texas. Kennedy was the youngest man ever elected President, and was also the youngest to die.

Having been seen with a rifle on the sixth floor of the building where he worked, Lee Harvey Oswald, 24, was accused of assassinating Kennedy. After the shooting, Oswald was spotted leaving the scene, and was confronted by J. D. Tippit, an officer on the Dallas police force. Oswald allegedly shot and killed

Tippit, and was later arrested at the Texas Theater.

Oswald never got the opportunity to tell his side of the story, as he was shot and killed by Dallas nightclub owner, Jack Ruby, just two days after Kennedy's assassination, and as law enforcement officers were transporting him to the county jail.

The presidential commission headed by Chief Justice Earl Warren concluded that Oswald acted alone,

having single-handedly fired three shots, two of which hit and killed Kennedy end of story.

That conclusion, however, didn't pass the sniff test with the public, and in 2003, an ABC news poll found that 70 percent of Americans believed that Kennedy's death was the result of a much broader plot.

More recently, the numbers have slipped. An AP-GfK survey conducted in mid-April revealed that 59 percent of Americans still think multiple people were involved in a conspiracy to kill the President, while 24 percent believe Oswald acted alone, and 16 percent are

on the fence.

Among the initial conspiracies was that the trajectory of the bullets didn't "square" with Oswald's posi-

tion from the sixth floor of the Texas School Book Depository. Other theories suggest that a second gunman may have been involved — perhaps taking a shot from the infamous "grassy knoll" at Dealey Plaza. A third theory buys into an even broader conspiracy — that Kennedy was killed by CIA agents acting in anger over the Bay of Pigs

incident, at the command of the Vice President, or maybe even under the direction of KGB operatives. Another suggests that mobsters were responsible for Kennedy's assassination in retaliation for his brother Robert Kennedy's role in initiating prosecution of organized crime rings.

More on the Grassy Knoll theory

The "grassy knoll" theory got more press in 1979 when an investigation by

the Congress' House Assassinations Committee disagreed, saying that a fourth shot, which missed, had been fired from behind a picket fence on the grassy knoll. In 1982, a special panel of the National Academy of Sciences (NAS) disagreed, insisting that the fourth shot was just "random background noise."

JFK assassination researcher, D. B. Thomas, published a 2001 article in Science and Justice Magazine, saying that the NAS study was flawed, and that the

House committee was correct — four shots were fired.

Determining whether three or four shots were fired came down to technology, and in 1963, audio and video technology left a lot to be desired.

Researchers used the famous silent home movie of JFK's assassination filmed by Dallas dressmaker. Abraham Zapruder, coupling it with a sound recording from a Dallas police transmission channel, recorded when a motorcycle patrolman inadvertently left his microphone on. Using these two mediums in tandem, members of the house panel were able to use an audio filtering

technique to isolate "audible events" during a 10-second timeframe, and believed they heard four shots, not three.

In addition to Kennedy's murder, Stone blames LBJ for his alleged complicity in at least six other murders including a Department of Agriculture official who had been investigating a close associate of

Forty-three years later in 2006, Jackson revealed for the first time after the shooting that he didn't see a single speck of blood on Oswald's body or at the crime scene.

"I sure did think it was strange not to see any blood whatsoever," Jackson told listeners of the Greg Szymanski radio show, "The Investigative Journal." "I stayed on the scene well after Oswald was taken away in the ambulance and I never did see any blood — not one drop." Jackson's startling revelation backed up other researchers who claimed that Oswald and Ruby faked the shooting as part of an undercover operation designed to eventually eliminate Oswald's knowledge of the real JFK assassination team, as well as his part played as the government's "patsy."

Conspiracy theorists further believe that Oswald was most likely told to fake the shooting only to be later doublecrossed by CIA operatives who killed him in the ambulance in order to eliminate loose ends in the Kennedy assassination.

The 50th anniversary of President John F. Kennedy's assassination and the end of an era posthumously christened as "Camelot" has been discussed for a half century. With very little closure over the demise of a hugely admired President, chances are, the world will still be discussing the circumstances surrounding Kennedy's death for the next half century to come.

It may be off-putting to some photographers, but this is important, especially for a wedding — ask about looking at a recent wedding, in its entirety. You will need some rapport with the photog to make this request. If you are paying thousands of dollars for a wedding, it's a fair request.

This is important to see how they handle low light, and movement in low light, like the church or the dance floor, not just sunny outdoor portraits.

Mike Naddeo is studio manager for Billmeier Studios. He shoots on location, and he works in the studio.

• Good rapport with photographer — "If you guys aren't getting along, you just won't get good results." he said. "You just won't be happy with what you get in the end."

• **Established** — Naddeo suggests also going for a photographer with a reputation, and ask to see a client list. For him, he wants to see a photographer holding the camera correctly, which is the left hand under the lens, and the other holding the camera.

• Interesting compositions — "I can tell if someone is a pro or not just by the way they're standing," he said. A photographer should be moving and changing the point of view for their photos.

• Versatility — Naddeo prefers a photographer be able to work in different styles, while also offering consistent color in the photos.

Experience does, repeat, does count — a lot

The family-friend may not be the best choice for big events or milestones. Of course, more choices come with more of a budget; starting out, I was that kid with the camera taking the pictures, almost for free.

Experience does count. It means being able to handle your event quickly, and stress free, which in turn lowers your own stress. They'll get it right the first time and have fun doing it. If they have fun, you can more easily have fun. Who can smile at a scowling, stressed out photographer?

People skills

You have to like the photographer, and like their work, too (see the bit about scowling, above.) If you don't like the person behind the camera, it will show on your face. This is where references will be useful.

On the photographs themselves

Ask if your photographer shoots RAW (pronounced "raw") images they should enthusiastically say "yes."

RAW is a file format that indicates a slightly more advanced photographer, and also promises better images with more depth and detail. Most professionals shoot RAW today, because it's like having a film negative saved away, instead of a print.

Really look at how the photographer handles inside lighting. This can separate the student from the professional. Does an image look too yellow, green, blue? Are they creative with their flash? Their photos should not evoke "heck, I could do that," more often than not.

While fresh turkeys have an appeal to certain cooks, most local meat managers agree that the Spartan frozen brand turkey offers superior results.

"I get more compliments on the turkey every time I serve a Spartan one," said Mark Russell, meat manager at VG's Grocery on Silver Parkway. See TURKEY on 8B

How to carve your **Thanksgiving turkey**

To prepare for carving, have the following ready: warm serving platter, kitchen scissors, sharp 10-inch slicing knife, carving fork to arrange, serve the meat.

Step 1: Preparation

Let the turkey stand at room temperature for 20 to 30 minutes; then transfer turkey from roasting pan to a carving board, using your hands protected with paper towels or kitchen towels. Remove all the string with scissors

Step 2: Remove, sever drumsticks

Place the knife against the thigh, and cut down to expose the leg's second joint. Apply pressure at the joint with the knife and cut through. Repeat with other drumstick.

Step 3: Slice neck cavity

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Use an oval incision that allows you to remove the stuffing while leaving skin intact.

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Abraham Zapruder's amateur footage of the John F. Kennedy assassination is one of the world's most instantly recognizable clips. Zapruder himself doesn't get quite as much press, so let's take a look at five things you might not know about the cameraman and the odd journey his film has taken.

FAQ: ZAPRUDER FILM

Will computer enhancement bring out more details of the shooting? Perhaps, but it is not likely. The amount of detail recorded on film depends on the type of film, whether the exposure and focus were set properly, and the technical quality of the lens. Computers cannot sharpen what isn't there

Is the Zapruder film C.H the only film of the assassination?

Yes and no. It is the only film known to exist showing all of the shooting. Three other home movies show part of the assassination, and as many as five still photographers took at least one picture while shots were fired.

Did Kennedy's limou-• sine driver turn and fire the fatal shot?

No. The "driver did it" theory started with a poor-quality copy of the film in which the image was very unclear. What was thought to be a pistol was actually the top of a passenger's head.

Has the Zapruder film C H been altered to hide evidence of a conspiracy? No. Most alteration theories originate with people who have little, or no, technical experience with motion picture special effects and who do not realize there are obvious, telltale signs of such work.

Are some of the Zaprud-er frames "missing"? Yes. Six frames, from two different parts of the original film, were accidentally damaged by Life magazine personnel while they were preparing pictures for publication. Fortunately, three duplicate copies were made of the original film before the damage occurred

Why was the Zapruder film not shown on tele-

vision right away? When Abraham Zapruder sold his film to Life magazine the day after the assassination, it was with the understanding that the magazine not exploit the graphic details of the president's death. Life executives agreed to with-hold the film from public exhibition until emotions cooled down.

Can you hear the shots • on the Zapruder film? No. Amateur 8mm home movie cameras in those days did not have sound capability.

HE WASN'T A PROFESSIONAL CAMERAMAN His real work was

in the dress game. Zapruder, who had immigrated to New York from the Ukrainian city of Kovel as a

teenager, found work in the garment industry and eventually opened Jennifer Juniors in Dallas. His offices were in the Dal-Tex building located across the street from the Texas School Book Depository from which Lee Harvey Oswald fired the fatal shots at the presidential motorcade.

HE DIDN'T EVEN WANT TO TAKE HIS

CAMERA The famous film might not even exist if not for the persistence

of Zapruder's secretary. Żapruder had originally planned on bringing his camera, a Bell & Howell

Director Series Model 414 Zoomatic, to work with him to film the motorcade. When he woke up on the morning of the assassination, though, he thought it was too gloomy outside to get decent footage, so he left the camera at home. Zapruder's secretary convinced him that it was worth the trouble to go home and retrieve the camera.



THE FILM EARNED HIM A LOT OF MONEY

Zapruder quickly contacted authorities and let them know that he had footage of the assassination. The Secret Service and FBI

asked Zapruder for copies, but they told him the original was his. Whether he kept the film or sold it was up to him. Zapruder was open to selling the footage, but he wanted to make sure it ended up in the hands of a group that would treat it with dignity. Life magazine swooped in and bought the print rights of the film for \$50,000. The magazine then realized that it would be smart to buy all of the rights, so it renegotiated a deal in which Zapruder would

receive six annual payments of \$25,000 in exchange for the print and motion picture rights. Zapruder didn't hoard the money, though. His lawyer worried that the story of a Jewish man cashing in on the assassination might incite anti-Semitic sentiment around Dallas, so Zapruder gave the first \$25,000 payment to the widow of policeman J.D. Tippit, one of Oswald's other victims.

HIS FAMILY GOT



Inc. sold the copyright and the original film back to the Zapruder family for \$1. (Abraham Zapruder had died of stomach cancer in 1970.) Zapruder's family really capitalized on the film after reacquiring the copyright. His son rented the film out for one-time viewings, and although estimates of the exact fee vary, Oliver Stone allegedly paid at least \$40,000 to use the footage in his film JFK.



...AND THEN LOST **IT AGAIN**

A 1997 decision by the Assassination **Records Review Board** took the original copy out of the Zapruder family's hands. The Justice Department ac-

tually had the task of acquiring the film and compensating the Zapruder family for its loss, and that's where things got interesting. The government offered \$1 million. The Zapruder family countered with \$30 million. After a couple of years of haggling, a federal arbitration panel awarded the Zapruders a \$16 million payment for the film in 1999. That fee only paid for the physical copy of the film, though. The Zapruder family maintained ownership of the copyright. Not for long, though. On Dec. 30, 1999, the family donated the copyright, along with its collection of films and photographs, to the Sixth Floor Museum at Dealey Plaza.

'You saved my life,' said the woman on crutches.

Surprised, I asked what I had done. 'You once said nothing takes God by surprise,' she replied. Then she explained how she had felt while waiting in an emergency room to learn whether her leg would have to be amputated as the result of a serious auto accident.

Meanwhile, young John had climbed up on a clothes chest in the bedroom and was looking out the window. Neighbors, who saw him there, quickly rescued John by hoisting one man on the shoulders of another. A few moments after the rescue, the roof fell in.

Samuel Wesley, John's father, was overcome with gratitude. 'Come neighbors,' he said, 'let us kneel down and give thanks to God. He has given me all my children. Let the house go. I am rich enough.'

Wesley's childhood rescue from the flames so impressed him that under one of his portraits he wrote: 'Is this not a brand plucked from the burning?'

John Wesley could not be lost to the fire because God's purpose in his life must be fulfilled. His powerful ministry would transform England and the Wesleyan revival would impact the entire world. It still does.

During the Reformation, a man tried to frighten Martin Luther by telling him if he did not change his ways, he would lose all of his support.

'And where will you be then?' the doubter taunted.

Luther's answer proved his faith: 'Where I am now,' he said, 'in the hands of Almighty God.'

There are many things to trouble us in life, but God is greater than them all, even those that have discouraged you today.

We cannot escape the news of developments that pose threats to our future, especially in this age of instant communication. But we can remember the Lord knows all about our trials before they arrive and is able to bring good out of them, no matter how impossible that seems to us when we are going through them (Romans 8:28).

Cable, Wi-Fi and DSwha

▶The pros and cons of different forms of Internet connections

Internet access is by far the most dominate form of media in America and arguably the world. The Pew Research Center estimates 85 percent of American adults have some form of access to the Internet, which amounts to approximately 200 million people.

But as people who have fought with Internet providers over slowdowns and interruptions, not all Internet connections are created equal. Here's a breakdown on the strengths and weaknesses between wireless, cable, broadband and other Internet connections.

Wi-Fi — Often mistaken as a wireless Internet network, Wi-Fi stands for Wireless Fidelity and is the technology that allows computers, phones and other devices to connect to the Internet wirelessly. A wireless local area network (WLAN) is the actual wireless Internet network and gener-

ally uses radio waves to connect technology to the Internet. Wireless networks can be established with nodes, ports that connect to cable or DSL modems, cellular towers and other devices. WLAN has now become synonymous with Wi-Fi, though the two mean separate things. While wireless networks are great for freeing up space, factors like the weather, other electronics and even the number of people in a room can disrupt connection. Thankfully, companies are constantly updating their products, minimizing the amount of interference with each new model.

Cable — Cable used to refer to the provider of television shows. These days, it's been broaden to the Internet, with cable companies now offering connections. Cable works through a modem, a device that converts digital information into wireless signals, according to explainthatstuff.com. If you used the Internet in the 1990s, you're probably all too familiar with dial-up Internet, where users got online through telephone lines. Cable Internet works in a similar fashion however, instead of accessing the Internet through a single line cable is comprised of multiple lines. Cable, either wirelessly or through direct hookup up via chord, is faster and more reliable than Wi-Fi. As such, Cable Internet access is generally more expensive in price.

Digital Subscriber Line (DSL) — Just because phones have gone mobile doesn't make old phone lines completely obsolete. DSL is a type of broadband Internet connection that uses phone lines instead of cable hookup. Unlike dial-up Internet, DSL allows users to stay online while receiving phone calls. DSL has less bandwidth than cable, which can cause slower connections. However, cable connections are more affected by a high concentration of Internet users than DSL. If you live in a densely populated neighborhood, DSL may be a smarter choice than cable.

Fiber Optics — The future of the Internet is speed and no connection is faster than fiber optics. Instead of radio waves, fiber optics utilize light waves and has been used to establish long-distance communication with phones, radios and televisions. Fiber optics in computers would bring an unseen speed and strength to Internet connections.

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Holiday disasters

► Readers recount stressful holiday moments, while local experts help solve them

If your holidays resemble National Lampoon's "Thanksgiving Family Reunion" or "Christmas Vacation," you're

in good company. Not many people slide through the holidays unscathed, but there are a few ways you can prepare in advance to avoid some holiday disasters.

Disaster scenario #1

Pamela Raymond responded to the Times' Facebook request for holiday disaster stories, writing, "One year, our refrigerator broke on Thanksgiving, so we bought a new one on Black Friday. Another year, we dropped the

raw turkey on the floor, but waited until after dinner to share this with the family. Last year, we had a fire in our oven. As we rushed to get kids out of the house, the lack of air in the oven put the fire out. The oven suffered no damage and our meal was spared."

Another reader, Mary Webber Carsten, also suffered an appliance disaster. She wrote, "A couple of years ago, my pan

of cheesy potatoes ran over in my lower oven, and started a fire. My son, thinking he would save the day, grabbed the fire extinguisher and started spraying! Well, he put the oven fire out all right, and ruined the potatoes, and the overspray got on much of the other food, too!"

EXPERT TIPS: Rick Taylor of Mr. Appliance in Linden said, "If an appliance is giving you signs of an issue or prob-

lem, don't wait until the last minute to call for service, because appointments fill up quickly this time of year." He also added, "Cooks shouldn't self-clean their ovens the day before a big holiday. Sometimes that causes the oven to quit unexpectedly."

Jeff Stone, owner of the Sears Hometown Store in Fenton, said, "You'll want to buy a new appliance before you have an emergency situation with an old one. If you're buying in a hurry, because you are in a desperate situation, you'll likely pay more than if you are able to plan your purchase ahead of time."

Disaster scenario #2

Nancy Donlon, formerly of Linden, now of Queen Creek, Ariz., certainly remembers New Year's 2009. She and Dennis' daughter, Sarah, was about to be married on Jan. 3, and her mother-in-law and two sisters-in-law were coming in from Florida on New Year's Day. "On New Year's Eve about dinner time, we noticed the house was cooling off," she wrote. "It became clear that the furnace wasn't working, so we had to search for someone to repair it. We paid a premium for the repair, but by midnight (Happy New Year!), it was humming right along. Mom and sisters arrived to a toasty warm house and certainly appreciated it!"

EXPERT TIP: Dan Lamb of D & T Heating & Cooling in Bryon, advises homeowners to maintain their furnace equipment well, with filter changes monitored and changed as needed. "Preventive maintenance is key," said Lamb. "For equipment 12 years and older, have an annual maintenance check, which we'll do with a full inside inspection. For newer

equipment, every two years is recommended."

Disaster scenario #3

Mary Ann Podjun, formerly of Linden, now of Casper, Wyo., recalls a year when she was planning for a women's cookie swap at her house. She wrote, "I was making my poor family nuts by holding them hostage in keeping everything clean and immaculately decorated as I prepped and cleaned. One week before the gala event, the Christmas tree,

loaded for bare, toppled to the floor in all its Christmas glory! You could have heard a pin drop in that house and then, I began to wail! Yes, I am sitting here remembering with a chuckle under my breath, but I thought I was going to explode at the time. By the way, that party was so much fun, and my family was so happy when it was over!"

Podjun also recalled during that same

event that her daughter, Adrienne, dropped the red Christmas Punch out of the microwave all over the kitchen floor, just ahead of the guests' arrival."

EXPERT TIP: Perhaps try a bigger, more durable tree stand with stronger screws to keep your tree upright, especially if the trunk is crooked. Another suggestion is to use a hook from the ceiling (preferably white) and attach clear fishing line from the top

of the tree to the hook. This could work well in a household with pets and/or small children.

As for floor spills, Candace Jordan of Lil House of Carpets suggests this foolproof method for mopping up stains from carpet: Blot the liquid up as much as you can with paper towels, clean rags, etc. Use just water first, don't overwet the area. Keep blotting it up and get as much of the spill transferred on to the cloth or towel. Then use a few drops of liquid dishwashing soap like Dawn or Joy, and

clean the spot without rubbing too hard. 'That will break down the fibers," she said. "Then rinse with plain water.' Disaster scenario #4

Slippery roads aren't the only hazard of winter's treacherous weather conditions. Icy sidewalks can be very dangerous, even for simple jaunts outdoors to get the mail. First, shovel snow frequently to prevent icy build-up, and then spread with sand to help pedestrians maintain their traction.

Rock salt may be inexpensive, but it's the worst thing to use on concrete, stamped concrete or brick pavers, according to Glenn Haege, American's Handyman on the radio.

Sand is the safest, cheapest thing to use, but it provides traction, not de-icing. Haege recommends the use of a 50/50 mix of sand and calcium or magnesium chloride to melt the ice, while continuing to provide traction. On pavers and decorative concrete, he also suggests homeowners use a plastic shovel rather than metal, to eliminate the potential for scratching and damaging it. Another option is to use electric snow-melting mats, from a company like HeatTrak.com.

A quick look at Pinterest showed a homemade de-icer, containing 1 t. Dawn Dish Liquid, 1 T. rubbing alcohol, 1/2 gallon hot/warm water, poured over walkways.

In addition to fresh and frozen turkeys, Alpine also offers a Butterball fully-cooked turkey. "It's frozen, so it has to be thawed before re-heating," said Hawk. But he agrees that nothing beats a home-cooked turkey.

Once you've decided what kind of turkey you'd like to serve, you'll have to determine how big of a bird to buy. Real Simple magazine makes it easy: For just enough turkey for Thanksgiving dinner with no leftovers, buy ³/₄ to 1 pound per person.

· For enough leftovers to enjoy during the long weekend aim for l to $1 \frac{1}{2}$ pounds per person.

Russell advises customers to go with a larger turkey for the best value. "The size of the carcass of a 12 pound turkey is about the same as an 18 pound one, so what you're getting is more meat," he said.

Real Simple also suggests that if you need an extra large turkey to feed a crowd, consider buying two smaller birds at 12 pounds each, because they will defrost and roast faster, retaining their moisture better, than a huge turkey.

Other options for Thanksgiving are Jenny-O Turkey Store direct from freezer to oven turkeys in full size, half-size or breast portions. "They are a little pricey, but a wonderful option," said Russell at VG's Grocery. "We've used them at home ourselves." If you really don't want to cook or are hosting just a small family event, you can also grab Thanksgiving dinners-to-go at all local stores, complete with all twhe trimmings.

Cooking your turkey

Here's how to cook the perfect Thanksgiving turkey, according to Rick Rodgers, a cooking teacher and author of numerous Thanksgiving cookbooks. • Buy a fresh turkey.

• Remove the giblets and set aside.

• Rub the bird with a stick of softened butter, or half a stick for a bird smaller than 16 pounds.

• Season the inside and outside with a light coating of salt and pepper. Don't add any other seasonings, as they'll just burn.

• Stuff the turkey, if desired, but stuff

Step 4: Scoop stuffing Use a long-handled spoon to remove stuffing and transfer to a serving bowl.

Step 5: Slice thigh meat

Slice the thigh meat from the bone. It should be very tender from resting in the juices.

Step 6: Slice breast

Place the knife horizontally at the bottom curve of the bird's breast and slice in toward rib cage to create a "guide cut." Then make a slice from the top down alongside the rib cage, cutting carefully.

Step 7: Create slices

Cut vertically through the breast meat to create medallion slices. Repeat steps 6 and 7 on the other side of the breast.

Place the knife at the first wing joint; insert the knifepoint and twist it to sever the wing. Repeat with other wing.

it loosely, as it will expand. Don't make stuffing ahead and put it in the refrigerator, as it will be like a cold ball inside the turkey and might never cook enough. • Cover the turkey's open end with

foil, crumpled up a bit so it stays in place.

• Cover the turkey's breast with foil to deflect some of the oven's heat so it slow cooks in this area. Remove the foil for the final hour or so to let the skin brown.

• Pour two cups of chicken or turkey broth into a roasting pan. Then put a metal rack in the pan and place the turkey on this rack so it's above the broth. The broth creates steam to help the turkey cook evenly. This broth will also reduce to a glaze that will improve your gravy. Don't use a disposable aluminum foil roasting pan for this job.

• Cook at 325 degrees F. for about 15 minutes per pound of turkey. This is just an estimate — the turkey is ready when it reaches 175 to 180 degrees on a meat thermometer inserted into the meatiest part of the turkey's thigh. Baste the turkey a few times during that last hour to help brown the skin.

• Let the bird sit, uncarved, for about 30 minutes after it comes out of the oven, to let the turkey's juices redistribute throughout the meat.

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Holly's Sherman Middle School to reopen next year

► Village and Holly schools to discuss shared services

Holly — Holly's sixth-, seventh- and eighth-grade students will be heading back to Sherman Middle School next year after members of the Board of Education voted unanimously to reopen the school, they closed in 2011.

The matter was discussed during the Nov. 11 Holly Area Schools (HAS) board meeting.

During the Oct. 28 board meeting, Superintendent Dave Nuss told board members if the district expands its early childhood programs, he believes enrollment can increase and at least sustain itself, estimating an increase of 42 students or more, or approximately \$294,000 in additional student revenue.

Expansion of the early childhood programs, Nuss said, would mean reopening

Nuss anticipates increasing early childhood enrollment from 112 to 176 students for an additional \$227,392 in student revenue. "The foundation of our proposal or recommendation is that we expand our feeder program that involves early childhood and develop a well-articulated program for the early-on program," Nuss said during the Oct. 28 meeting.

By recruiting more students at the early childhood program level, Nuss believes the district will be better able to retain the students over the long haul.

"I believe that the real future lies in getting those kids into our programs earlier to meet our wonderful teachers and to see what we have to offer, then they'll stay," he said.

After having two weeks to consider Nuss' proposal, board members revisited the matter on Nov. 11 before voting on it.

"After listening to what the administration has presented and analyzing and taking time to see what that would do for the district, I'm very much in favor of going with (Nuss' recommendation)," Board Member Robin Carnes said. "But I would like to also add an addendum on there that the district and the community as a whole needs to know — and I would covet their support — for the decision that we make.

"Because it may not be as easy as it appears on paper, and there may be hard times yet to come, but at least we're proposing to open up the building, and giving our students and our district the opportunity to shine."

Board President Tony Mayhew agreed. "We're in a different position than we were three years ago where now the elementary schools are full, and we're working on building the feeder program, as we call it," he said. "We're not reversing the decision we made to close Sherman Middle School, we're adjusting <image>

DEAR DR. DONOHUE: The thought of colon cancer makes me cringe. My father died of it. Colonoscopy wasn't done in those days. I'm interested in learning all the ways to diagnose colon cancer in its early stages. Can you give me the rundown? — N.C.

ANSWER: Colon cancer makes everyone cringe. It's the third most common cancer in men, being surpassed only by prostate and lung cancer. It's the third most common cancer in women, with breast and lung cancer coming in first and second place. Colonoscopy, the inspection of the colon with a telescope-like device, has greatly reduced deaths from colon cancer. Not only does this exam give doctors a comprehensive view of the colon, but it allows them to biopsy suspicious areas and suspicious polyps. Almost all colon cancers start out as polyps. A polyp looks a bit like a small plant breaking through the soil. A simple test for colon cancer is examining a stool specimen for occult (hidden) blood. Even early cancers can cause minor bleeding. Another stool test is FIT, fecal immunochemical test, a way of detecting hidden blood by a different method. Both of these tests are done yearly. A test that detects altered DNA ---cancerous changes in colon cells — is a third test done on feces. It is constantly being fine-tuned. Double-contrast barium enema was the chief test for colon cancer detection until colonoscopy was widely adopted. It's still a useful test. Barium is introduced into the colon through the rectum, and then the barium is drained. What's left is a thin coat of barium on the colon wall. Next, air is passed into the colon. The result is a clear picture of the colon lining and a clear picture of any incipient cancer. CT (computed tomography) colonography, also called virtual colonoscopy because the procedure produces pictures similar to what's seen by the naked eye in a colonoscopy, is a scan after air is pumped into the colon. If you're deciding which test is most appropriate for you, depend on your doctor's judgment.

DEAR MAKEUP: You should assume, kindly, that — like an amateur musician learning to play a new instrument or someone learning woodworking — she will improve. Be completely supportive and urge her to translate her interest into professional training. There are some amazing YouTube channels showing makeup techniques; research this, and send her links. Tell her, "You know me — I will always think that less is more, especially with you. I want our son to see mom's natural gorgeousness. But I also understand you are practicing."

DEAR AMY: My husband and I recently moved and found a lovely place to rent. Every month when we get paid, I write out the check for the next month and mail it faithfully. I ask my landlord to notify us when he receives it, so I can be sure it doesn't get lost in the mail. However, after receiving the check, he waits around two weeks to cash it. How do I get him to deposit it right away? We are tight on money, and I need to be sure I can get the food and diapers my baby needs. — Tight Tenant

DEAR TIGHT: You are a very responsible tenant, but your budgeting issues are not your landlord's problem. Even if you request that he deposit your rent checks promptly, you will not be able to guarantee that he will always do this. You could set up a separate account only for rent, or you could contact your bank and your landlord to establish a monthly transfer directly from your account to his each month. This would ease your anxiety about the mail and his banking schedule.

Senior's goal to play softball with Golden Gophers will start next season

Ever since Fenton senior Ellie Cowger was little she never cheered for Michigan or Michigan State, because her allegiance was University of Minnesota and she dreamed of playing softball there.

And now her life-long dreams have become a reality. When Cowger starts her college softball career next fall, she'll be a Minnesota Golden Gopher. Cowger verbally committed during her junior year, but can now make it official.

"I chose the University of Minnesota because it has been my dream school from the time I was little," Cowger said. "Once I was older and beginning to seriously search for a college, not only did I love the University of Minnesota coaches and the way they ran their softball program, but the school offered everything I was looking for academically. Their business school is one of the top in the nation so I hope to be admitted to that college within the University and have the chance to study finance or marketing."

Minnesota is also the home to many of Cowger's family members, including her sister, Kate.

"I also chose Minnesota because a lot of my family lives around that area," Cowger said. "My sister lives 10 minutes from campus and other relatives live close as well. Having visited often, Minnesota has always been like a second home to me."

Although playing at Minnesota has always been her dream, Cowger did keep her options open, but always came back to Minnesota.

The squad qualified for the NCAA regionals last spring and finished the season with a 36-19 record, the best mark by the team since 2003. The squad finished third in the Big Ten Conference with a 14-6 record.

Cowger led the Tigers in innings played and stolen bases in both 2011 and 2012 and was All-Metro in 2011, 2012 and 2013. She holds the Michigan High School Athletic Association record for single season stolen bases (65). She led the Tigers with a .515 batting average and 47 runs scored. She also has a 24-game hitting streak she'll take into next season. On the pitcher's mound, Cowger had a 9-10 record with a 2.86 earned run average. Along with Fenton's varsity team, Cowger will

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Fenton coach Linda Rusaw said. "They are good, but when they serve, I don't care what the color of (the other team's) uniform is. We should be able to servereceive. We should be able to hit."

The Mustangs' dominance started from the opening moments in the first set. Abbott took control from the start, posting kills during the match's first three points and during Northville's first four points. Later, she even earned an ace at the service line, dropping the Tigers to an 8-2 deficit. The Tigers (40-17-2) fought back. A kill by Fenton's Cassidy Rourke cut the gap to 11-8, and it got as close as 11-9 on a service point by Amanda Carty.

A failed tip kill gave Northville the service back, and the Tigers struggled with service reception on three straight volleys. A Fenton hitting error followed, putting the Mustangs up by a 23-16 score. Later, the Tigers were called for a violation, giving the Mustangs the 25-16 victory.

In the third set it looked like the Tigers might give the Mustangs a challenge. Bearden opened with a kill, putting Fenton up 1-0. Northville scored the next five points, but the Tigers cut their deficit to just 6-5 after a Carly Granger kill. With Abbott losing her service with Fenton trailing just 8-6, it looked like the Tigers had a chance to possibly win the third set. Instead, the Tigers had several free balls, overpasses, service reception miscues and hitting errors, allowing Northville to go on an 8-0 run, raising their lead to 16-6.

The Tigers were able to cut the gap to just 16-8 after a shared block kill by Rourke and Granger, but a kill by Chloe Kiple, two Fenton service reception errors and a hitting error, raised Northville's lead to 20-8, effectively ending any hope of a Fenton come back. Northville eventually earned match point on a Fenton hitting error.

Tuesday's results can't erase what the Fenton varsity senior class has accomplished. Back-to-back Class A district titles, which included one trip to the Class A state quarterfinals their junior season may make the senior class the most successful Fenton team in terms of Class A postseason success.

"It's been a great four years," Bearden said. "It's been a great experience, great girls. I am just happy to be part of the Fenton volleyball program, for sure."

"I am mostly going to remember that I was on the team that went the farthest (in the Class A tournament) so far," Eastman said. "It is a cool feeling.
