

Many choose to resist Black Friday deals

While many people will brave the cold and early morning lines Thanksgiving morning for highly promoted deals on electronics and other goods, there is a growing number of people who are purposely opting out of Black Friday shopping as a protest to shopping on holidays.

Readers sounded off on the Times' Facebook page on their opposition to shopping on Thanksgiving for Black Friday deals.

"My alternative plan is to stay home and spend time with my family. It's a shame that's considered 'alternative' these days," said Anna D'Angelo-Attard.

"My family had decided to set up our Christmas tree the day after Thanksgiving. After 10 years working retail, my husband is in a new role for the holidays,'

'Cocaine congressman' gets second chance

'Cocaine Congressman' Trey Radel, as headline writers have rebranded him, voted to allow states to drug test all food stamp recipients. Congress, it turns out, should have drug-tested him.

The 37-year-old former TV reporter and radio show host arrived in Washington this year from his southwest Florida district with the same broom-wielding, house-cleaning fervor as his fellow tea party-backed Republicans.

FBI and Drug Enforcement Administration agents swooped in to arrest him after he bought 3.5 grams of cocaine for \$250 in a late October sting operation in Washington's fashionable DuPont Circle neighborhood. Charging documents described Radel as having a frequent-buyer's reputation in the neighborhood.

After Radel pleaded guilty in D.C. Superior Court, he was sentenced to a year of probation and will undergo substance abuse treatment in Florida. House Republicans did not rush to escort Radel out the door, even though he reportedly waited three weeks before telling them about his bust. Speaker John Boehner said that the matter should be left up to the courts, Radel, his family and his constituents. I don't think Radel should have been sent to jail. Quite the opposite, I think his case offers a good example of why a lot of other nonviolent, first-arrest drug offenders shouldn't be in jail, either.

Contrast his case, for example, with another high-profile District of Columbia case, the arrest of then-mayor Marion Barry for taking a hit of crack cocaine in an FBI hotel room sting in 1990. He was sentenced to six months in a federal prison.

His sentence could have been worse if the video had not provided so much evidence to back the mayor's argument that he was a victim of FBI entrapment.

Radel is fortunate to have been sentenced in D.C., where enlightened attitudes led to a special 'drug court' in 1993 that is designed to funnel low-level addicts into rehab instead of long-term jail time.

With prison costs skyrocketing, even states with reputations for tough justice are turning to alternatives to prison for non-violent offenders. Drug addiction should be handled as a disease, not a crime. Trey Radel knows.

Personal JFK remembrance

My parents voted for Richard Nixon in the 1960 presidential election. I had not yet developed a political worldview, but as a freshman at American University in Washington, D.C., I stayed up late to watch the election returns slowly trickle in before going to bed at 2 a.m. with the outcome still undecided.

The following year I was hired as a copyboy at NBC News Washington bureau. White House correspondent Sander Vanocur invited me to accompany him to the swearing-in of Adlai Stevenson as the U.S. ambassador to the United Nations.

President Kennedy was there. It was the first time I had seen a president in person. My impression of the man was similar to that of many others: Kennedy looked so young.

Two years later on the way to work, Friday, Nov. 22, 1963, I stopped at a traffic light in Bethesda, Md. It was 1:30 p.m. Eastern Time. A bulletin interrupted the music on the car radio. President Kennedy had been shot in Dallas. I then raced to the bureau where it was controlled chaos for the next four days.

I saved copies of the wire bulletins and tucked them neatly inside the book 'Four Days,' a historical record of President Kennedy's death.

Included in 'Four Days' is an essay by the late historian Bruce Catton whose words written just weeks after the assassination gets to the true legacy of this personally flawed, but fascinating man: 'What John F. Kennedy left us was most of all attitude,' he wrote. 'To put it in the simplest terms, he looked ahead. He knew no more than anyone else what the future was going to be like, but he did know that that was where we ought to be looking. The future sets us free.'

Ronald Reagan would embrace a similar futuristic outlook.

What followed Kennedy's assassination was an era of growing and more expensive government, race riots, the divisive Vietnam War and social disintegration. It was not the hopeful future Kennedy envisioned, but Bruce Catton's words remind us we can always start over by using the future as an 'escape hatch.'

It's hard to explain how a boy I never met broke my heart so completely.

It's hard to understand why I feel so disheartened by the death of a young man that I never knew.

It's even harder to understand why someone who was widely described as smart would do something so shortsighted.

On Nov. 27, 2012, Linden High School junior Josh Pacheco, 17, com-

mitted suicide. Though the reasons surrounding his suicide remain somewhat cloudy, some members of his family, including his father, David, believe that Josh's crushingly low self-esteem is to blame for the suicide.

Sadly, no one will ever really know the reasons behind Josh's suicide. The answers to

that question died with Josh — but that should not stop us, as a community, from learning from this tragedy.

Every life lost to suicide is one too many. Whether Josh committed suicide due to bullying or due to low self-esteem does not matter. A young life was lost to a preventable death.

In Josh's case, he kept his problems locked up inside a personal journal that was only found after his death.

A journal serves a purpose, but is no replacement for the real-life management of problems.

Unlike a person, a journal cannot give advice. A journal cannot give a hug. A journal cannot offer an extended hand to pull the writer out of whatever dark chasm they have fallen into.

Nothing is ever so bad that suicide is the answer. No problem is ever so enduring that it will never get better. Hardships are temporary. Pain is temporary. But suicide is permanent. Irreversible. Forever.

And for Josh's family, the feeling of loss is just as permanent. When people commit suicide, they often do so thinking they will end the pain — but all they really do is pass that pain on to the loved ones they left behind.

'I only hope that people will communicate with their kids, and that kids will communicate with their parents,' David Pacheco, Josh's father, said in a recent interview. 'Whatever you do as a parent — do everything that you can to help your kids. This is a pain no parent should have to live with.'

Silence only breeds silence. So speak. Use your voice. Demand to be heard, because there are those who are too scared to speak up. And because there are those who no longer can.

Hopelessness is not a monster to be tackled alone — and there are always soldiers on standby, ready to jump to the front lines. Whether that be a school counselor, a friend, a parent, a co-worker or a complete stranger, there are people who care and who are willing to help. But they can only help if they are aware of the problem.

So, to those who are struggling: speak up. And to those who are not struggling: listen. Suicide and mental illness are problems that can only be solved by a com-

munity that actively works together to communicate and listen. Much like the candlelight vigil that was held shortly after Josh's death, each small light will do its part to illuminate the dark that oftentimes surrounds struggling individuals. Each act of kindness and

every step toward giving help to those who need it will make this community and this world a better place.

Before Josh took his life, he posted a status on Facebook quoting Bilbo Baggins, a character from the popular Lord of the Rings series. His status said, 'I regret to announce that this is the end. I'm

going now, I bid you all a very fond farewell. Goodbye.'

To that, I offer this rebuttal, similarly taken from the Lord of the Rings:

'The world is indeed full of peril and in it there are many dark places. But still there is much that is fair. And though in all lands, love is now mingled with grief, it still grows, perhaps, the greater.'

Stop and frisk searches (Part II)

What follows is a summary recitation of the Luckins opinion without citation of the case law.

An officer may order occupants out of a car, pending completion of a traffic stop, without violating the Fourth Amendment's rules involving unreasonable searches and seizures. However a pat down (stop and frisk) search of the occupants for weapons simply as a general precautionary measure is not allowed — there must be more.

First the investigatory stop must be lawful.

In a traffic stop situation the lawful investigatory stop condition is met whenever it is lawful for police to detain an automobile and its occupants pending inquiry into a vehicular violation. The police need not have, in addition, cause to believe any occupant of the vehicle is involved in criminal activity. To justify a pat down of the driver or a passenger during a traffic stop as is the case of a pedestrian reasonably suspected of criminal activity, the police must have a reasonable suspicion that the person is armed and dangerous.

A reasonable suspicion involves something more than a partial or unparticularized suspicion or hunch.

To determine whether information supplied by a citizen informant has sufficient reliability to provide reasonable suspicion a court looks at (1) the reliability of the informant, (2) the nature of the particular information given to the police, and (3) the reasonability of the suspicion in the light of the above factors.

Information from an unknown informant is not necessarily unreliable or incredible. Information provided to law enforcement officers by concerned citizens who have personally observed suspicious activities is entitled to a finding of reliability when the information is sufficiently detailed and is corroborated within a reasonable time by the officers' own observations.

In the Luckins case the Court held that although the supplied information generally described road rage and hand gestures that might indicate the presence of a weapon, because the officer did not observe corroborating evidence of either, the officer lacked a reasonable and articulable basis for believing the defendant was armed and dangerous.

Accordingly the pat down search was unlawful. Since the defendant admitted he had marijuana after the initial illegal search, the marijuana was excluded from evidence. The case was sent back to the trial court for further proceedings.

said Jessica Billings. "That means this is his first Thanksgiving off in a decade. We will be avoiding stores all week."

While Black Friday has been the traditional kick off day for holiday shopping in years past, consumers are beginning to show opposition to expanded retail hours. Big-box stores like Walmart and Target are opening as early as 6 p.m. on Thanksgiving. Kmart will be open for a full 42 hours straight, starting at 6 a.m. Thanksgiving day. Holidays generally reserved for family time are quickly morphing into prime-time shopping hours for the best deals possible.

A Facebook group 'Say no to Shopping on Thanksgiving' has accumulated 52,485 fans so far. A recent Huffington Post poll reveals that 62 percent of Americans think businesses should be closed on Thanksgiving. Only 27 percent said they think stores should feel free to stay open if there is a demand.


enough that the city may cease enacting moratoriums. "This is probably the last time we'll be extending the moratorium," said Schultz. These moratoriums so far have been updated frequently, and are a common stance for local municipalities.

He said the decision on the case is not out, but likely will be in the spring. This latest moratorium is for six months, after which he hopes to have more clarity

out of the courts.

Since the law was enacted in 2008, municipalities have struggled to understand the reach and scope of control they have over land use for medical marijuana. Many have chosen to enact moratoriums to avoid legislating on the issue until the framework of dealing with them becomes clearer.

The Village of Holly was one of the few local municipalities who have enacted an ordinance regulating medical marijuana dispensaries.

it is challenging, mentally and physically," said Tyler Blissett, who graduated from Fenton this past spring. "I wanted to get some discipline in my life because I wasn't the best at school."

Justin Peterson, also a Fenton area grad, recently completed boot camp along with Blissett and MacCaughan.

Mention Marine boot camp and people are likely to think of Stanley Kubrick's film Full Metal Jacket, which depicts Vietnam era recruits completing basic training. While the Fenton Marines did say boot camp included a great deal of yelling, running and training with guns, Kubrick's depiction of training is far harsher than

What's not depicted in the film is The Crucible, the final challenge recruits face before they earn the title of being called a Marine. The Crucible includes multiple team building activities and survival training, where recruits are given a limited number of Meals Ready to Eat (MRE) over the span of three days. The challenge is capped by with hiking up a mountain the Marines described as a 45-degree angle, with an 80-pound bag on their back.

"It's emotional. You get up there and the sun's starting to rise and you see how far you've gone up," said Anthony Wenzlick of Flint, who completed boot camp near the same time the Fenton Marines did. "There's a lot of things I could have done in my life. I still think becoming a Marine and finishing the hike is the most accomplished thing I've ever done."

Describing the Marines as "the few and the proud" is becoming accurate as the military is looking to downsize.

With the U.S. military looking eventually to leave Iraq and Afghanistan, qualifica-

tions to join are becoming stricter. Recruiter Sgt. Allen Sullivan said the Marines alone are looking to reduce its numbers from roughly 250,000 members to 174,000. Sullivan said on average, he has to turn away 90 percent of people looking to become a Marine.

"We're looking for

moral people who are staying out of trouble and individuals who are mentally qualified," Sullivan said. "The thing is now that whoever does qualify, they're grateful. Our standards have come down to where we're not taking everyone. We're only taking the most qualified."

For the three Fenton grads, being a part of the Marines is an opportunity for them to travel, grow personally and learn new skills. Though they're unsure how long they'll serve for or where they'll be stationed next, they are proud to be known as a Marine for the rest of their lives. Even with the downsizing and shifting the focus away from the Middle East, the Marines maintain that they are combat ready and looking forward to defending their country.

"You look at things a little differently after boot camp," Peterson said. "You start to appreciate the little things in life."

It was already a tradition before she had her son, and it continues today. Communications Assistant Lori Libka said the goal of the staff is a family-friendly experience through friendly customer service, "just to make people feel they've kind of come home for the holidays," she said. "(To) craft memory experiences with their family.'

Bronner's could be considered five businesses in one, though most sales come from the retail store. Bronner's has the store, a catalog business, Internet sales, municipal sales and small ornament shop customers. The city of Fenton hired Bronner's to refurbish the decorations that now adorn Owen Road. "Refurbishing has been really big since the economy took a

downturn," she said. "It keeps us busy and it still saves them a little money."

Libka said the sales floor is 98,000-square-feet or 1.7 football fields. The warehouse area to feed the sales floor, and the other parts of the business — 222,000 square-feet, or three football

fields. Altogether the complex is 320,000square-feet.

At any time there are 50,000 items on the sales floor, and Libka said two-thirds of them are less than \$20. The most expensive item is the large fiberglass Santa Clause for \$9,999, but that will be sold to a municipality for seasonal decoration. Bronner's has two airbrush artists to handle these large pieces.

Of the items for purchase, 30 percent are made in the U.S. Twenty percent are made in Europe and 50 percent are made in Asia. Libka said part of the reason is cost. The other issue is that there are few ornament makers in the U.S.; they also cannot keep up with the volume that Bronner's sells.

"We do work with as many American companies as we can," she said, adding that they do not bypass any U.S. ornament makers. Libka said ornaments were initially produced in Germany.

As mentioned before, gifts here can be very specific — is your husband a plumber? There is a matching ornament. Aside from licensed brands, Bronner's has what you want to hang on a tree. If they don't, shoppers can get an ornament customized. It's free if it involves a simple message or names. These "penners" number 32 on busy shifts, and Bronner's employs 64 of them.

This is the busiest time of the year for the family-owned business, where 750 employees will be on the books at once, and sometimes in the building during

the heaviest times, namely Saturdays in December. At the off season. which is the first quarter of the year, there are 250 yearround employees.

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WHAT YOUR LEGISLATORS VOTED ON THIS WEEK

The House and Senate are in the midst of a two-week recess, so rather than votes, this report contains several introduced bills, released on Friday, Nov. 22. Note: There will be no Roll Call Report Thanksgiving week. The next report will go out as usual on Friday, Dec. 6.

House Bill 4816: Require insurers disclose "Obamacare" price increase in customer bills

Introduced by Rep. Mike Shirkey (R), to require bills sent to customers for health insurance policies or HMO plans to include an estimate of the amount that any price increase was caused by mandates and regulations imposed by the federal health care law. Reported from committee, pending before full House.

Senate Bill 515: Declare blueberry as the official state fruit

Introduced by Sen. Tonya Schuitmaker (R), to establish in law that henceforth the blueberry shall be designated as the official State of Michigan fruit. At present, Michigan does not have an official state fruit. Past bills have proposed designating the cherry as the official state fruit, and apple cider as the official state beverage. Referred to committee, no further action at this time

House Bill 4778: Ban off-shore Great Lakes windmills

Introduced by Rep. Ray Franz (R), to prohibit electricity-generating wind turbines from being located in the Great Lakes. Referred to committee, no further action at this time.

Senate Bill 604: Mandate criminal background check to adopt a pet

Introduced by Sen. Steve Bieda (D), to mandate that animal shelters must check a government criminal records database before letting a person adopt an animal, and prohibit adoptions if the records show a person committed an animal cruelty offense in the past five years. Referred to committee, no further action at this time

Senate Bill 523: Authorize seizing delinquent child support payer's

Introduced by Sen. Mike Nofs (R), to allow assets in a delinquent child support paver's Individual Retirement Account to be seized to make up the arrearage. Reported from committee, pending before full Senate.

Senate Bill 552: Exempt oil and gas well machinery from business tools

Introduced by Sen. Jack Brandenburg (R), to exempt machinery, pipelines, tanks, and other equipment used in drilling and operating oil and gas wells from the state property tax imposed on business tools and equipment ("personal property tax"). Referred to committee, no further action at this time.

boards in the tri-county area who confirm the success of campaigns like Shop Local either. Economists, think tanks and researchers across the nation boast the benefits of spending dollars in your community.

Researchers with Civics Economics found that for every \$100 spent at a locally owned firm, \$68 of it stayed within the community. Comparatively, only \$43 out of every \$100 spent at chain stores stays within a community. The researchers reasoned that locally-owned restaurants tend to employ more workers and give them longer hours and higher pay than chain businesses.

Chris Douglas, an economics professor with the University of Michigan-Flint, said even if chain stores and smaller, independent stores employ the same locals within a community, shopping locally can improve a downtown area.

"Small, downtown atmospheres allows shoppers to 'window shop' and can create a mood," Douglas said. "The more people shop locally, the more likely people will push to keep that ambience to continue."

Shopping locally is not only good for your wallet, it may also be good for your health. Using data from the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) and environmental engineering firms, online company Custom Made report that nearly 60 percent of independent stores are more likely to recycle and reuse material. Recycling one ton of steel can conserve 1,400 pounds of coal, 2,500 pounds of iron ore and 120 pounds of limestone.

Corporations, on the other hand, account for roughly half the pollution in America. Custom Made found that every family in America spends \$110 a month at a locally owned business, more than \$9 billion would be returned to the U.S. economy.

The impact of consumer confidence

The University of Michigan releases surveys on consumer sentiment regularly. The October 2013 report found consumer sentiment down to 73.2. Last year it was 82.6.

Confidence was higher this summer, with an index of around 85, and has declined since. Because of this, news media is suggesting a decline in sales this Christmas, because Douglas said gifts are easy to cut down on.

But while out "Shopping with Sally" and meeting several local businesses at once, all six without prompting were optimistic about the coming holiday season, and report strong sales already. "People want local stuff," said Great Lakes Marketplace and Artisan Village owner John LaCroix. Looking over his stock he said, "Wow we were really picked over, geez." Ladies Night Out thinned out his shelves of Michigan-made food products.

The weak recovery, the healthcare law, government shutdown and the prevalence of part-time work, as opposed to full-time could have caused the low numbers. "Take your pick," said Douglas.

He said it's difficult to tell which type of business — big or small — will come

Douglas said that one indicator on consumers shifting to local faire, is the craft beer industry. He said in recent years the craft beer industry has doubled in size, indicating more of an interest in locally made items. "If you don't have a whole lot of money to spend, you might find something more unique for someone else," said Douglas.


Haaraoja was one of the expected contenders for a state championship in the 50-yard freestyle at the D2 event, and

Can the Tigers continue to push forward with the tradition they've created the last six seasons with the household names of the past? The Tigers think so. But Fenton realizes it isn't going to be easy.

"We definitely have to work more together this year," Claborn said. "We don't have that superstar I'd say. It's going to be more of a team effort. But it's definitely not a rebuilding year. We have a lot of potential and I wouldn't expect anything else but another league championship with the people we have on our team this year."

"It's going to be harder to start with," Lukas admitted. "We have to build chemistry. After we start playing together, everything should begin to work out."

There is at least one last name that Tigers' fans might recognize. The only other senior is a Mowery — Andrew Mowery. He's a solid point guard, but hasn't played on the team until this season. He is the brother of past Fenton player Eric Mowery.

There are a couple of transfers

as well. Dillon Gardner transfers from Holly, and was a big scorer for the Bronchos' JV team a year ago. Beau LePage comes from Durand. Both should see time at guard, while LePage could see time at forward as well.

In the post, the Tigers are going to have some decent size. Ross Ebert is a 6-foot-5 junior, while Nick Wyrick is only a freshman, but does have a 6-8 fram. Junior Evan Welch should see time in the post as well.

Others that will make up the roster are Ben Hijar, Mitch Coch and Austin Bossenberger. All three were on the JV squad a year ago. Another player who missed a lot of training camp due to illness is Alec Thomas. He also earned varsity experience a year ago.

"These guys are not used to the speed, size and strength of varsity basketball yet," Olszewski said. "It could take them some time to get acclimated. I love the group, but we'll see how long it takes to get used to the speed and strength of varsity basketball."

Fenton opens with road games at Clio on Dec. 10 and at Lapeer East on Dec. 13.

didn't disappoint. She competed with Holland's Holly Moren and Brimingham Groves' Hanna Pfershy for the state title, and came within .39 seconds of winning the championship, placing third with a time of 23.97 seconds. Morren won with a time of 23.59, while Pfershy posted a time of 23.62. The entire final eight finished within .94 seconds of each other, reflecting on how quick the 50 freestyle is and how competitive the field was as well. Haaraoja's time marked a new personal-best and broke her own school record. It also marked the first time she's posted a time below 24 seconds in the event.

"That was awesome. That's always been a goal and a huge deal," Haaraoja said about her time. "Coach (Brad) Jones knew I could do it, prove something and break the record again. It was awesome."

"She finished third, but easily could've been second or first. It's that tight of a race in a state final," Jones said. "She is a competitor, and any time she stands on the block, she has a shot. That's the type of kid she is. We knew in the prelims we just needed her to get in the top heat, and if she did that, she had a shot at it."

Haaraoja opened the meet seeded second with a time of 24.30, only behind Morren's seeded time of 23.51. In the preliminaries, Haaraoja earned her spot

in the finals by posting a fifth-place time of 24.34. The top eight make the final. In the final, she dropped her time by .37 seconds, earning the third-place performance.

"If I had any time under 24, I was going to be happy," Haaraoja said. "I normally breathe during the first 25, but I forgot to breath. I ended up taking one break for the 50, and everything worked out. It was so exciting."

Haaraoja was involved in one more individual event during the second day. She qualified for the consolation finals in the 100 freestyle on Friday with a 10th-place time of 53.68. She followed that up by convincingly winning the consolation finals with a time of 53.29.

"She swam the fastest time in the consolations," Jones said. "Who knows, if she was in the finals with the faster heat, she may have gone faster."

Haaraoja wanted to thank all the people who made her career possible.

"I'm grateful for coach Jones. He's done beyond and above what I could imagine. He's the greatest coach ever," Haaraoja said. "(Fenton assistant coach) Stephanie Olsen joined this year and was such a great addition. High school swimming means so much to me, and look where it has taken me today. ... I'm also thankful for everyone that as done so much for me over the last four years — my parents, family, teammates and coaches."

"She's had an outstanding season. Diving is like the 50 (yard freestyle). You don't have one good dive and you are out. There's not a big margin of error. From last year to this year she's head and shoulders better than she was last year. She raised her degree of difficulty in her dive list and everything. I know she wanted to get in the top 16. That's everyone's goal. But as a coach, I couldn't be any prouder of what she did to up her game."

The Tigers also capped Friday's day with a strong showing, and with a relay team that had a strong senior presence. The 400 freestyle relay team of Brianna Costigan, Haaraoja, Lauren Davis and Addison Ransom capped the season by besting their best time of the year with a 23rd-place finish in 3:48.51. The squad — of which Haaraoja, Davis and Ransom were seniors — entered the meet with a seeded time of 3:51.42, crushing their season-best marks.

"That was awesome," Haaraoja said. "We surpassed our taper (rest) already. I was the only one to taper (for the state meet), and for them to swim that well was amazing. ... I was proud of us."

"There were three seniors on that relay and that was nice," Jones said. "It was Addison's first year at the state meet, and it was a nice drop for her. It was Lauren's second trip, and for them to finish their senior year with that time drop was nice. That's the way to go out."

The other relays involved some youth as well. The 200 medley relay team of freshmen Elise Cassidy and Lauren Gruber, sophomore Costigan and Haaraoja finished the race in 24th with a time of 1:58.42. Finally, the 200 freestyle relay team also has some youth. The team of Costigan, sophomore Taylor Haaraoja, Davis and Gruber placed 28th with a time of 1:47.30.


