## Freezing temps delay Cornerstone

Downtown project set back three to four weeks

**Fenton** — The Cornerstone building's construction isn't immune from the weather.

#### **WEATHER TIPS** FROM THE CDC

If you're spending anytime outdoors, be aware of the wind chill factor. Work slowly if you're doing outside chores and be sure to have a phone with you. If you're going to be outdoors for a significant amount of time, bring a friend and an emergency kit with you.

If you plan on spending most of your time indoors, make sure your heating system has been checked by a professional and that it is properly ventilating to the outdoors. Also, you should have safe, alternative heating sources in case power is cut off from your home. Install smoke and carbon monoxide detectors to alert you to fires or deadly, odorless gas. Check the batteries regularly.

Be prepared for power outages with an up-to-date emergency kit, which should include: battery-operated flashlights, radios and lamps; a first-aid kit, cat litter or sand and extra batteries and

If you must travel on the roads, be sure to inform a family or friend of your proposed route and expected time of arrival. Avoid traveling when the weather service has issued advisories.

Young children, older adults and the chronically ill are especially at risk from cold weather hazards. Be sure to check on them regularly.

The Midwest was hit by nearly a foot of snow over the week, blanketing the

roads in endless white powder.

Fenton Express Towing Dispatcher Aaron Flood said the company he works for responded to more than 500 calls this past Saturday and Sunday.

Here's some things to keep in mind before you face the winter storm on the road and how to be prepared before you end up in a ditch.

Have an emergency kit inside your car before you head out on the road. Since multiple things can happen to you on the road, having a kit stored in your car can literally be the difference between life and death in chilly weather.

Ready.gov recommends having enough water for one person to survive for three days; a supply of non-perishable food, a flashlight with extra batteries, blankets and a first aid kit. Maps, jumper cables and battery-powered radios should also be kept inside a car, in case smartphones and car batteries die and leave drivers without power.

During the winter months, a bag of sand or cat litter should be kept in a vehicle in case you become stuck, along with a shovel to help dig the vehicle out.

Contact the nearest police department first if you find yourself in a ditch. Flood said before calling a towing company or any other entity, roadside drivers must call the police first.

When contacting 911, the Federal Communi-

cations Commission (FCC) says callers should tell operators the location of the

A smoked turkey breast with Vermont cheddar is "Ron's Lifesaver," #28. A fellow named Floyd

is honored forever with his namesake sandwich, "The Floydian Slip." The kitchen knows it as a "number 40."

Owner Mark Hamel said people find it interesting, and the names end up being a conversation piece. "There is a little story behind every sandwich," he said.

#### The 'War on Poverty' at 50

In his State of the Union address on Jan. 8, 1964, President Lyndon Johnson declared a 'war on poverty.' Today, with roughly the same number of people below the poverty level as in 1964 and with many addicted to government 'benefits,' robbing them of a work ethic, it is clear that the poor have mostly lost the war.

In 1964, the poverty rate was about 19 percent. Census data from 2010 indicates that 15.1 percent are in poverty within a much larger population.

The lack of government programs did not cause poverty, and spending vast sums of money has not eliminated it.

Anti-poverty programs have cost \$15 trillion over the last five decades but have had little effect on the number of people living in poverty.

Unfortunately, the war on poverty neglected a key component: human nature. Substantial numbers of people came to rely on government benefits and thus lost any sense of personal responsibility. Teenage girls knew they could get a check from the government if they had babies and so they had them, often more than one. The law discouraged fathers from living with, much less marrying, the mothers of their children and so legions of 'single mothers' became the norm, and the lack of male leadership in the home contributed to additional cycles of poverty, addicting new generations to government.

When President Clinton signed the welfare reform bill in 1996, liberals screamed that people would starve in the streets. They didn't. Many got jobs when they knew the checks would cease.

One condition for maintaining tax-exempt status should be for these faith-based institutions to help people get off government assistance and find jobs, becoming self-sufficient. If people need transitional money for daycare or transportation, it can be provided, either temporarily by government or by the thousands of churches, synagogues and other faith-based groups.

There is no undiscovered truth about the cure for most poverty: stay in school; get married before having children and stay married; work hard, save and invest.

The 'war on poverty' can be won, but it must be fought with different weapons, not the ones that have failed for the last half-century.

## Where does Michigan rank in the world of bad driving?

## ▶Louisiana drivers worst in the U.S.

The good news is, Michigan isn't among the top 10 states having the worst drivers. The bad news is, Michigan isn't among the top ten states having the safest drivers, either.

Michigan ranks closer to the middle of the pack, having ranked 35 on the list.

The latest data on this topic is derived from a statistical survey published by Carinsurancecomparison.com, which looked at five key statistics from 2011 through 2012, breaking them down into ratios per million miles driven. The statistics that were reviewed included deaths, citations for traffic signal and seat belt violations, citations for drunk driving, and citations for carelessness in driving and moving violations.

The website states all of the data can be verified through the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) and state reports compiled by the National Motorists Association, (NMA) a non-profit drivers' rights group.

The general lesson to be learned – stay off the roads in the south, as the top six states are all members of the "Deep South."

The worst drivers were found in Louisiana, followed by South Carolina, Mississippi, Texas, Alabama and Florida. The remaining bad drivers are located a little

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further north in Missouri, North Carolina, Montana and North Dakota.

Incidentally, the fine folks of Louisiana also pay the highest auto insurance premiums in the U.S. Insure.com reported last spring.

Vermont was found to have the safest drivers, followed by Utah, New Hampshire, Minnesota, Oregon, Maine, Connecticut, Washington D.C., Iowa, and Massachusetts.

But what does the data mean?

Alower ticket rate could indicate more drunk driving occurs, the report said. North Dakota wouldn't have made the Top 10 without ranking as the second-highest in drunk driving. In fact, 10 of the 15 states least likely to give you a ticket ranked in the top half of offenders for drunk driving. You might not want to hear it, but perhaps knowing that they're more likely to get a ticket helps deter drunk drivers.

Additionally, the report stated careless

American Red Cross Genesee-Lapeer Chapter in Flint. "We're all responsible for helping each other out. We can offer help with shelters if there's a need in a concentrated area and if someone from a municipality lets us know. Citizens can also call us at (810) 232-1401."

Fenton Police Department. "Check in on your neighbors. It's a good idea to have a phone number of a family member of an elderly neighbor, so if you think there might be something wrong, you can check with the family first."

Reasons to be concerned about an elderly neighbor

may be if they need life-saving medication and have run out during the storm, if they don't have power or enough food or water to sustain them for several days. "We had plenty of notice about this snowstorm," said Slater. "Watch the news, pay attention to weather reports. Make sure you have plenty of water on hand and non-perishable food."

Needing a driveway plowed is not an emergency situation, unless it prevents someone from getting out of their house during an emergency. "Our DPW guys can't plow private property unless in the case of an extreme emergency," said Slater. "Years ago, someone needed very important medication and couldn't get out

to get it. In an emergency, we can step in."

Slater recommends that if a person is concerned about a neighbor, that he or she goes and knocks on their door to check on them. "If you're unable to reach them, we'll go do a 'welfare check' on them," said Slater. "Oftentimes, a family member picked them up so their car is still in the driveway, but no one is actually at home. If you are concerned about a neighbor, do call (810) 629-5311, our non-emergency police number. If it is an actual emergency, call 911 in the local area."

Beauchamp reminds people that they can also call 211, an information resource

center that provides referrals to county-wide services in the event there is a need for food, shelter or other services.

She also explains the difference between shelters and warming centers, and the need for each, especially during a cold weather power outage.

"Shelters are overnight stays, with cots, beds and food needed," said Beauchamp. "They require authorization from the American Red Cross. There has to be enough room to set-up beds and cook. Warming centers can be anywhere, a church, a home, a mall. It doesn't require the Red Cross to open a warming center. Churches often open their doors if they have a community center."

She adds that there's always a need for more shelters and that any church or facility that wants to can apply to be a shelter. "What we need are bathrooms, handicap accessibility, a place to prepare food and a certain square footage for a certain number of people," she said.

ago, that are now married and have kids," he said. "I had so many interesting people come and go through this place. I get a lot of people that work four to five years and move on."

Each sandwich gets named after, or by its inventor, or is dedicated to a favorite customer.

"C'est Grace" was named after a favorite customer, who passed away from cancer. She ordered the sandwich with her husband every time she came in. "We just really liked her a lot, so we named it after her," said Hamel.

That sandwich is assigned a number and a name that will forever be associated with that sandwich creation — even if the

sandwich is retired. The #2 ham sandwich was retired, and that number will never be used again. Hamel guesses there are 15 sandwiches that have been retired. Ingredients are archived so they can be brought back if wanted.

Classic standards like "The Reuben" are just The Laundry's version of a popular favorite, and therefore doesn't get a unique name.

Some names are silly, some are simply named after the people, like #42, "The Kenny Witzgall," which has

remained popular enough to keep on the menu for 10 years.

Some, like "The Downriver," a liverwurst sandwich has been on the menu for the entire 17 years. "We actually go through

emergency right away, as well as provide a wireless phone number in case the call is disconnected.

If your vehicle is stuck but you're not in a ditch, Michigan's Department of State says drivers should never spin their wheels since it will only dig tires more deeply into the snow. Instead, a shovel should be used to dig around the wheels and undercarriage and the vehicle should be gently eased out of its position.

If you do happen to end up in a ditch, Flood said motorists should call someone who can come pick them up after calling a tow company. If no one is available, the motorist should remain in their vehicle until a tow truck arrives.



#### STRICT LIABILITY CRIMES

Generally speaking the law requires that for a defendant to be found guilty of a crime there must be a showing of both what is called 'actus reus' (a wrongful act) and 'mens rea' (a guilty mind).

This has been the law for many years, and when one considers the proposition, it makes sense because people normally shouldn't be punished for doing something that they didn't actually know was wrong.

However as seemingly clear cut as this proposition seems to be, there is an important exception to the rule which is found in what the law characterizes as 'strict liability crimes.'

As opposed to requiring a showing of a wrongful act and a guilty mind, a strict liability crime requires only a showing that a defendant performed the wrongful act irrespective of whether he or she intended to perform it. In other words no showing of intent is required at all in order to obtain a conviction.

Generally speaking, strict liability crimes are designed to protect the public welfare by placing the burden of protecting society on a person otherwise innocent, but standing in a position of responsibility as concerns public danger.

In 1952 the United States Supreme Court in the case of Morrissette v United States (which was a case that originated in Michigan) the Court provided some general categories of public welfare offenses: (1) illegal sales of intoxicating liquor, (2) sales of impure or adulterated food or drugs, (3) sales of misbranded articles, (4) violations of anti-narcotic Acts, (5) criminal nuisances, (6) violations of traffic regulations, (7) violations of motor-vehicle laws, and (8) violations of general police regulations, passed for the safety, health or well-being of the community.

Although strict liability crimes are not favored, the legislature has long been held to have the authority to enact them. For example in 2012 the Michigan Supreme Court held that felony nonsupport is a strict liability crime. As a general rule, strict liability crimes have a less severe punishment but there are exceptions.

There aren't many of these types of offenses on the books, but when you hear of one hopefully you'll now know more about them.

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

there's been a lot of overtime," Czarnecki said. "It's been a trying winter. The guys worked until 1 a.m., working steady. They came back in at 8 a.m. and probably working until 7 p.m."

Czarnecki said the temperature has to be between 20 and 15 degrees for salt to be effective and since it's much colder outside, the city has been using salt sparingly.

According to a February 2013 Times article, the Fenton DPW used at least 631 tons of salt last winter. Holly Village used at least 200 tons of salt and Linden City used at least 150 tons.

In Fenton Township and other municipalities in Genesee County, snow plowing on the road is conducted by the Genesee County Road Commission. Manager director John Daly said the road commission is responsible snowplowing for 16,000 miles of road and more than 100 bridges within Genesee County. For perspective, Daly said a trip from Bangor, Maine to San Diego is equal to the amount of road that the commission clears in the county.

"It takes us about 36 hours to get through it all. The dicey part is the weather operates on a 24-hour schedule," Daly said. "You'll have different snow fall in different portions of the county. The priorities start with roads that have higher volumes of traffic."

Both Daly and Czarnecki said for now, they are unsure how much the snow and ice storm have impacted their budgets.

With the recent ice storm and this

week's blizzard, Holly Village Director of Public Works Brian Klaassen said his department has spent nearly half of the \$82,000 budgeted from the village's Major/Local Roads Winter Maintenance line item on maintenance and labor costs.

Additionally, Klaassen said the brutal winter weather has already caused the department to dump 400 tons

of salt on the roads, two thirds of what is normally used during an entire winter.

"It's been a rough winter so far," Klaassen said. "For now, we're keeping the roads clear, but we don't plan to salt until Wednesday at the earliest, after it begins to warm up again."

Czarnecki said while the DPW will continue to plow the roads and keep them clear of snow, it may take city workers up until spring to clear all of the branches left after the December ice storm. The director said all snow in downtown Fenton is piled up and then hauled away to another location.

"When I first came here we had a real bad snow storm come through," said Czarnecki, who has been the DPW director for three years. "We get about 40 inches of snow every winter and we're closing in on that."

Service are 16.2 inches for Flint, and 13.1 in Linden. There are drifts that have buried cars like Masaoka's, and large parking lots are now mazes of snow piles. Temperatures sunk to -13 Monday, beating the historic low for that day — which was -9, in 1981.

The cold temperatures are for the record books — WJRT ABC 12 Meteorologist John McMurray said the -13 temperatures beat previous records of around -9 for Flint in the 1980s.

The snowfall he said, is in the "top five" for history. The 17 inches received in the Flint area is in the top three of all time. He said Genesee County was hit with both the most snow, and the most cold.

Though the term "polar vortex" is being shared around, McMurray said what is causing the low temps and snowfall is there all the time, and normally called a "semi-permanent low in the polar regions."

This cold, low pressure pattern usually hanging out in the polar areas, was pulled down by the jetstream into our area.

The good news is this is a temporary dip by that low-pressure system into our region. He said by Friday, temperatures will be back into the 30s.

Michigan was under a winter weather advisory, wind chill advisory and hazardous weather outlook. Residents were encouraged to stay indoors, and avoid exposed skin outside.

Schools are closed, along with many businesses and government meetings, like Fenton City Council, Fenton Township Board of Trustees.

Many main roads are passable, but

side roads can still be clogged with deep snow, although local departments of public works (DPW) have plowed through the night.

Residents prepared by grabbing up necessary items like food, but also hardware.

At Taylor Hardware in Fenton, around 12 snow shovels have sold, and all 24 snow blowers (technically called snow throwers) in stock are gone. "Usually we carry them over from year to year," said service manager Brian Edwards. They can only order a truck's worth, one time per year, so they will not be getting any

more machines in. More shovels will arrive before this weekend.

He said this is the first time he's seen the store sell out of snow throwers so early in the season.

Local grocery stores may experience shortages of staple items because of the rush of purchases this weekend, and the poor road conditions.

Some bread trucks, and everything from Frito-lay called off for the VGs on Silver Parkway on Monday. The bread aisle itself was half empty. The produce area was wiped out the day before.

Statewide, 884 in nine counties were

out of power as of Monday morning, but that number quickly dropped to 356 by the late morning. Genesee County had the most outages, with 173, according to Brian Wheeler, spokesperson for Consumer's Energy.

These were usually caused by failing equipment or tree limbs taking down power lines. "For the moment, things have largely been holding their own," he said.

Brian Klaassen, director for Holly's Department of Public Works, said crews began plowing village streets and parking lots at 5 a.m. Sunday, Jan. 5, only knocking off at 10:30 p.m. Sunday night. Crews were back at it on Monday morning, beginning their day at 4 a.m. As of Monday afternoon, Klaassen said crews were putting the finishing touches on area streets, performing necessary clean-up duties.

"Everything is open," Klaassen said. "We got around 16-inches of snow, and now with the wind, our crews are working on keeping the streets open."





Neither of these structures can go up without heavy steel support which cannot be installed without the cinder block structure around it.

The temperatures make it difficult, if not impossible to work with water-based materials, like mortar to hold the structure for the stairwell and elevator lobby together. Smith said the mortar must be maintained at warmer than 30 degrees to set properly.

If they had to work in subfreezing temperatures, they would have to keep the heat up with propane-powered heaters, which adds to the expense of the

project, which already needed a loan from the Downtown Development Authority (DDA) to continue.

Smith said the delays are purely based

on the weather, and funding

## Have we built a better mousetrap?

► How to get rid of the pesky rodents in search of warmth

You may hear more scurrying feet in your home this winter as you stay indoors and try to avoid the cold. Like people, mice find warm places to survive the winter and unfortunately, that includes people's houses.

James Atkinson's 1897 little nipper mousetrap is still used today, despite advances in mouse capturing technology. Here's how humanity has attempted to build a better mousetrap since the 1900s.

The mouth mousetrap is living proof that you can improve beyond the spring-loaded mousetrap. While mouth mousetraps don't have as much power as springloaded traps, they can be reset by foot and have minimal injury to the user.

Electric mousetraps send a shock to mice just powerful enough to kill them. Bait is placed at both ends of the trap and the electrodes are surrounded in plastic, reducing potential shocks to people and pets.

Glue traps can also be used to catch mice however, these traps have

caused some controversy because they do not cause immediate death. The trap is an adhesive on a strip of paper,

causing the mouse to be immobilized. The mice either die from starvation or it is up to the trapper to end the mouse's life.

For those who want to remove mice but don't want to kill them. live traps are available. These traps are bigger than other traps and are triggered once bait is taken.

> The live traps are generally wire meshed and allow the trap-

per to relocate the mouse once it is captured.

Sonic pest control doesn't kill mice but it does emit a low frequency that re-

pels them. Some websites don't see these devices as effective and recommend sticking to a mousetrap. Poison can also be used to get rid of mice but people run the risk of potentially killing pets.

he'd take.

"My high school career meant a lot to me because I chose high school over academy (soccer)," Bakos said. "I knew high school soccer would be a lot of fun and I knew we would have a great chance this year. This season was everything I thought it would be with the exception we didn't go all the way (and win a state title)."

But the Linden Eagles, led by Bakos, did do quite a bit despite not reaching that ultimate team goal. The squad completed the season with a 25-2 record, earning status as the No. 2 team in the state for a good stretch during the season. And Bakos was the top offensive threat on that squad, helping pave the way. It also earned him the 2013 Tri-County Boys Soccer Player of the Year award. It's an honor he won in 2012 as well.

"I was set on playing in high school," Bakos said. "I didn't want to do the academy thing. I wanted to be able to look back at my high school experience as a varsity soccer player."

And what a career he gets to look back upon. Bakos earned Division 2 First Team All-State honors as well as Dream Team honors. To make the Dream Team one must be among the top 11 players in the state regardless of division. Bakos earned that designation because, in part, he was a pretty proficient goal scorer during the fall of 2013. On a squad that was filled with offensive talent, he scored a team-best 29 goals, on 106 shots, including 56 of those attempts being on goal. Those stats also earned him status as a Regional IV All-American honors.

He also helped lead the Eagles to an undefeated Metro League season, and a district crown. In that district title game the Eagles defeated their tricounty rivals Fenton for a third time during the season. The squad advanced in the regional semifinal with a 2-0 victory against Petoskey, before bowing out to eventual state champions East Lansing 3-0 at Fenton High School in the regional chamionship round.

Linden coach Kevin Fiebernitz was happy to have him.

"He's a once-in-a-lifetime kid," Fiebernitz said. "He's a kid that came in with a tremendous amount of talent from a club team out of Detroit (the Michigan Wolves). He's a great kid and he's very coachable. He's a great leader on and off the field.

He has a great work ethic and he loves to play soccer. Every accolade he's gotten, he's deserved."

Bakos didn't just score, he made everyone on the Eagles' team better. He also dished off 14 assists, second-highest on the team, and was a steady ball handler whether if he was passing it or dribbling it himself. He was the Eagles' floor general in many ways.

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#### More the snow, the better for Saturday's Ididarun event

At a time when the cold weather and snowfall forces most of the sporting activities indoors this time of year, as the race director of The Ididarun 8-Mile Challege, he's loving what he's been seeing from Mother Nature recently.

"The first year we had a 10inch snowstorm, and it make the event pretty fantastic," Skinner said. "It's neat to run it in the snow. People have a kindred togetherness because of how tough the conditions can be."

For those who haven't figured it out, The Ididarun 8-Mile Challenge isn't your typical road running race. In fact, it's not really a road race at all. It's more like a cross country run done during the night with runners wearing headlights, helping create some light to where they are going.

The sixth-annual event is slated for Saturday, Jan. 11 at 6:30 p.m. at Linden Middle School. The cost is \$25 for each individual running and \$40 for each two-person relay team.

The race is run on a twomile course, with those willing to run the entire distance doing

the same route four times over. Another special twist with the event is that it also hosts a "relay" division where two runners team up, each running a pair of the two-mile laps in alternate fashion. It is run in the dark, with the exception of the lights used by the runners.

Skinner admits the race is a bit different than most.

"Years ago I was in a run in Omer, Michigan," Skinner said. "It was run at night and was a trail run. You had to wear a headlight and a taillight so you could see where you were going.'

The event has grown reasonably well. Skinner said there were about 70 participants at the first race. Last year had 220 in attendance and he expects about that many this year. He suspects the post-race soups and chilli might have something to do with that.

"It started out with about 70 people and we fed everyone hot chilli and stuff like that," Skinner said. "And now we need 30 to 35 crock pots to feed everyone. It's mostly cross country and track parents who provide all the food."


