

#### Severe winter weather using up snow days

All Michigan school districts allotted six snow days per year

tjagielo@tctimes.com; 810-433-6795 By late February of 2013, all four local school districts had burned through their six-day allotment of "snow days,"

#### Summary

The Michigan Department of Education sets the maximum canceled school days at six, before districts must start making up days, or risk losing funding. Fenton, Holly and Linden schools have two "snow" days left, and Lake Fenton has one. meaning any additional snow days would cause school to extend into the summer. As it stands, Fen-

ton, Linden, and Holly schools have used four of their allotted cancelled days, and Lake Fenton schools have used five.

Fenton has one. The Michigan Department of Education (MDE) has set a maximum of six

canceled class days. Each district is required to provide "the greater of 170 days... each district shall also provide at least 1,098 hours of pupil instruction." According to the pupil accounting manual, six days may be forgiven, which can be made up in the end of the year.

Failing to meet those minimum requirements and rescheduling lost days can result in more than \$60,000 in lost state funds.

Lake Fenton was out a total of 20 days at winter break. Superintendent Wayne Wright said schools were closed Dec. 20 for icy conditions, and then Jan. 6, 7 and 8 in the snow and cold. "I do drive the roads in the morning on any day where we could be closed for poor road conditions, and I make a

judgment call," said Wright in an email. "We also use a 20-degree wind chill factor as a guideline to close school for cold temperatures."

Lake Fenton Middle School was closed an additional day in November while a transformer was replaced and the district as a whole was offline without power as well.

Holly students missed the same three days the first week of January, and Dec 20. for icy roads, totaling four "snow" days. When deciding when to close schools,

"my transportation director drives the roads and makes a recommendation regarding student safety," said Superintendent Dave Nuss. "Student safety is our number one priority when closing school." Holly schools use a similar wind-chill test for closing schools.

Linden schools were closed the same amount as Holly, with four. Fenton Area Public Schools (FAPS) mirrored holly and Linden with closures.

Caller poses as IRS, sheriff, demands money from residents

Oakland County Sheriff Michael J. Bouchard wants to make the public aware of a scam that is occurring in Oakland County related to callers posing as the IRS and as law enforcement, and making demands for money.

Farmington Hills Police Department has received a complaint from a resident claiming that he received a call on Jan. 9 from someone claiming to be the Internal Revenue Service saying he was being

charged with crimes unless he paid \$3,854 in green dot prepaid money cards. The resident paid the amount, and then subsequently received another call from someone claiming to be "Sheriff Bouchard" who advised he owed an additional \$4,560, or he would be charged with a crime. At this point, the resident became suspicious and made a report. It is important to note that the caller masked their phone number on caller ID

masked their phone number on caller ID to look like the call was coming from the sheriff's office. The Oakland County Sheriff's Office

wants to remind residents that neither the sheriff's office nor Sheriff Bouchard would demand money from any resident related to a debt or for any other reason. "Any entity asking for payment or

money in the form of a prepaid green dot money card is suspect," said Sheriff Bouchard. "If you suspect you are being scammed, there is a very good chance you are. Trust your instincts and report suspicious behavior to

your local authorities."

# Gender gap growing in teaching profession

#### ▶Nearly 75 percent of teachers across nation are female

A National Education Association (NEA) report indicates that there are 785,151 male teachers in public elementary and secondary schools across the nation compared to 2.4 million women.

While middle school and high school may have brought a few more male teachers into the mix, the truth is, the teaching profession was and really still is, dominated by women.

Most states report that less than 30 percent of all teachers are male, with the average coming in around 25 percent. The survey revealed that Arkansas had the least amount of male teachers at 17 percent while Kansas led the pack with more than 30 percent.

To go a step further, male educators make up 2.3 percent of the overall pre-K and kindergarten teachers, while male elementary and middle school teachers constitute 18.3 percent of the teaching population. It evens out a little more at the high school level with men representing about 42 percent of the teachers overall.

As other occupations began to open to educated women in the 1980s, women entered other professions, and teaching became slightly less-feminized.

But why are male teachers still few-andfar-between in the U.S.? Expert analysis insists that sexism and status play a big role in the issue.

An article published by mit.edu says that while girls have been encouraged to engage in typically male-dominated fields like math and science in recent years, boys have been given nearly no incentive to engage in female-dominated professions like teaching.

Author Bryan G. Nelson held many other jobs before becoming a teacher. In his book, "Why Schools Need More Male Teachers," Nelson blames a lack of male teachers on several factors including stereotypes, fear of accusation of abuse, and low status and low wages.

"Some people believe that working

with young children is 'woman's work,' that men are not nurturing, and that there must be something wrong with any man who would want to teach," he wrote.

Nelson went on to say that some people fear men will harm children or be accused of abuse, and that for men, working with young children is perceived to come with low wages and low status.

A 2006 study by Thomas Dee, now a professor at Stanford, suggests that boys do better in classes that are taught by men, while girls are more likely to thrive in classes taught by women. The study found that girls were more likely to report that they didn't think a class would be useful to their future if taught by a man, and boys were more likely to say they didn't look forward to a particular subject if it was taught by a woman.

Many scholars suggest that other variables like a teacher's experience and the number of students in his or her class are much more important to a student's success.

Patterson Elementary School teacher Jay Silvey has been teaching at the elementary school level for all of his 15 years in the Holly Area School district.

At 43, Silvey said he always wanted to teach at the elementary school level, having chosen to major in elementary education in college. "I love seeing the excitement on a child's face during the learning process — when they 'get it,"" he said. "It's awesome."

Contrary to Nelson's theory, Silvey



said he has never felt "judged" by men in other professions for being a teacher.

"I believe that a teacher is one of the most important professional roles a person can hold," he said. "Because of this belief, I have never considered if other men in other professions look down on me," he added. "People are often surprised to hear that I teach first-grade, but I've never inquired into their reasoning."

As for school administrators, the genders are more equally weighted. In fact, a 2009 report released by the National Center for Education Statistics suggests when it comes to becoming a principal, women are right on par with men.

The report shows that 50 percent of public school principals and 53 percent of private school principals were female that year. That's quite a change from 20 years earlier when 75 percent of all principals, both in private and public schools, were male.

And while the gender gap appears to be narrowing in the principal profession, so too, does that appear to be happening among superintendents.

According to mit.edu, by the early 1970s, less than 1 percent of school superintendents were women. Over the years, the number has greatly increased, although the positions are still primarily occupied by men.

A national study conducted in 2011 says the percentage of female superintendents has increased nearly four times, from what it is in 1992. The study, released by the American Association of School Administrators, found that of approximately 2,000 surveyed superintendents nationwide, 24 percent were women – up 13 percent from the 1992 data.

#### **DOES GENDER MATTER** WHEN IT COMES TO YOUR **CHILD'S TEACHER?**

Female elementary school teachers' comfort with mathematics has an effect on the girls they teach, according to new research.

In a January 2013 article by Sarah D. Sparks in Education Week, Sparks said, girls taught by a female teacher got a learning boost if that teacher had a strong math background, but had consistently lower math performance by the end of the school year if she didn't, according to a study presented at the American Economic Association's annual conference.

By contrast, boys' math scores were not affected by having a female math teacher, regardless of the teacher's background in that subject, and there were no differences in math performance among male and female students of male teachers of different math backgrounds.

The study adds to growing evidence that children's gender biases can significantly affect their own ability.

"Children's perceptions of gender start emerging between the ages of 7 and 12," said the study co-author I. Serkan Ozbeklik, an assistant economics professor at Claremont McKenna College in Claremont, Calif. "Positive or negative, the primary school experiences may shape the academic course of students, leading to long-term consequences like choice of study, choice of major, and occupation.'

Also worth noting, the researchers found no evidence of differences in teaching styles between the women and men teachers.

a monopoly rather than being forced to buy from a single company.

Ask a spokesperson from the Michigan Cable Telecommunications Association (MCTA) about the current state of cable and Internet providers however and they will tell you that options have never been so diversified as they are today.

"Everyone has at least two satellite providers (Direct and Dish networks) and you can get Internet services without having cable TV," said David Waymire. Online services like Hulu and Netflix only require Internet access, allowing viewers to consume shows without having to pay for a monthly cable service. **Continued from Front Page** They have come a little early though, usually we start patching in February," said Dan Czarnecki, DPW director. "The potholes range in all different sizes. Anything that becomes a hole, we put material in it."

That material in the winter is called a cold patch, which Czarnecki described as a sticky, tarry substance. While a cold patch is effective for covering up potholes, it isn't a permanent solution. He said the cold patch is subject to crack from the freezing and thawing process, just like concrete. Hot patches, made of similar material and heated up during the summer, fare better but aren't a permanent solution either.

Czarnecki said potholes are simply a part of life in Michigan. "This is standard procedure for potholes this time of year. There aren't a whole lot of other options for paved roads," he said. "It happens in this part of the United States.' **Anything that**



any other home gadget. Do you want an upright with changeable bags, or a bagless model? How about a canister-style vacuum, which maneuvers well on stairs? If you're into fashion, even your vacuum cleaner can make a statement in sleek shapes and trendy colors.

Choosing the perfect vacuum goes somewhat by trial and error, or what has worked

well for you in the past. Sherri McArthur, owner of The Cleaning Authority in Fenton, uses Hoover commercial vacuums for her residential cleaning crews. She



grew up with that brand and has been well satisfied in the past 14 years she has used Hoovers both at home and at work. "We use bags with 99.7 percent

filtration to trap microscopic particles and allergens," said McArthur.

Start by matching a vacuum type to your cleaning needs. Uprights, especially with a bag, do best overall on carpets, according to Consumer Reports. Whether you choose a bagless or not, the Good Housekeeping Institute says that both clean equally

well and that the choice boils down to personal preference. Bagless vacuums save you the trouble of keeping bags on hand, but they can be messy to empty, and may cause trouble for allergy sufferers in your home. While vacuums with bags keep dust and dirt contained, it can be tricky to retrieve an earring or small object that gets accidentally sucked up in the vacuum.

A canister vacuum is generally more versatile, handling carpets and bare floors with ease. They're also good at vacuuming stairs and sucking up dirt from corners.

Check the vacuum's special features, which may make this weekly chore easier for you. A brush on/off switch helps protect bare floors and avoid scattered debris. A motorized brush cleans carpets better than only suction. Also helpful is a manual pileheight adjustment, which can be matched to carpets better than with automatic.

Suction control is an important feature, helpful when cleaning delicate fabrics with tools. "Good suction is the most important feature to me," said McArthur. "You've got to try it out before you buy it."

Be careful not to judge the vacuum suction quality strictly by the highest amps, horsepower or wattage. These are simple measurements of the electrical current used by the motors. A vacuum cleaner's performance depends on airflow, the amount of suction it produces and other factors, including the overall design of the vacuum and its attachments.

Check out the vacuum's attachments, as they will make your weekly cleaning chore much easier. When you're vacuuming pile carpets and rugs, use the motorized power nozzle. But when you're cleaning bare floors and walls, it's best to use the wall/floor brush. To get dust out of drawers, air vents and from under large appliances, try the crevice tool. For mattresses, upholstered fabrics, curtains and car interiors, use the upholstery attachment. To remove dust from blinds, lampshades and moldings, use the dusting brush.

Having a vacuum that's easy to use is also important. That means you might not like having to drag a canister around if you have a lot of wide open floor space. If you've got several staircases at home, a canister might be easier to use than an upright.

Check the length of the cord on the vacuum cleaner and make sure it's long enough to vacuum your living space without having to re-plug it all the time. "It should be at least 30 feet long," said McArthur. The newest models even have a retractable cord to make storage a snap.

Try out several models first before you make a selection. Push, pull, turn and lift models you're considering, and check out the controls and features. After all, you'll be the one using it once or twice every week.

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

This report contains several recently introduced bills of interest, as published on Friday, Jan. 10.

#### House Bill 4856: Authorize charges for rescuing negligent emergency victim — Introduced by Rep. Brandon

Dillon (D), to charge a person for the cost of providing rescue and emergency services during a state of emergency, if the rescue was due to the individual acting in manner deemed "grossly negligent" as defined in the bill. **Referred to committee, no further action at this time.** 

#### House Bill 4868: Let Flint impose

higher city income tax — Introduced by Rep. Woodrow Stanley (D), to allow Flint to raise its city income tax to 1.5 percent on residents and businesses, and 0.75 percent on nonresidents who work there. Under current law, cities are not allowed to impose individual income taxes higher than 1 percent for residents and 0.5 percent for non-residents (except for Detroit, which can and does impose a 2.4 percent/1.2 percent income tax rate). Referred to committee, no further action at this time.

#### House Bill 4881: Make marriage name change provisions gender neutral

— Introduced by Rep. Phil Cavanagh (D), to explicitly state in statute that the parties in a marriage are not required to use the same last name, and in general make this law "gender neutral." A man could adopt the woman's last name, a woman could adopt the man's, either party could adopt a hyphenated name, or everyone could just keep their original last name. **Referred to committee, no further action at this time.** 

House Bill 4885: Cut tax on gas and oil "fracking" — Introduced by Rep. Aric Nesbitt (R), to reduce the 5 percent "severance tax" or royalty paid to the state on oil and gas extracted from state land to 3.3 percent for oil and 3 percent for gas if these are produced using "enhanced recovery" technology, presumably including hydraulic fracturing (fracking). Referred to committee, no further action at this time.

#### House Bill 4897: Use state agency to "facilitate" creating Detroit futures exchange — Introduced by Rep. John

Olumba (D), to require the state financial and insurance regulation bureau to collaborate with other government agencies to "facilitate" creation of a Detroit "Mercantile and Commodities Exchange." **Referred to committee, no further action at this time.** 

#### House Bill 4899: Impose new regulations on gas and oil "fracking" —

Introduced by Rep. Sarah Roberts (D), to require the Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ) to hold a public hearing before issuing a permit for the extraction of natural gas or oil using "hydraulic fracturing," if local politicians or residents request a hearing. **Referred to committee, no further action at this time.**

seemed unseasonably colder than past summers, when in fact it was on par with other average summers. Fahrenkrug calls the shock to different conditions as "weather amnesia," where people compare

current weather conditions to memories of past milder seasons.

Michigan did accumulate record snowfall for this winter so far, giving plausible cause to labeling this winter as unusual. According to the National Weather Service, Flint has had 39 inches of snow for the winter so far, which is 21 inches more than normal. Detroit has also had 39 inches of snow and Saginaw has had 31 inches of snow, all above average for winter.

Record snow or not, any longtime Michigan resident will attest that the weather can change multiple times in one week. Fahrenkrug attributes the variety of weather to the Great Lakes, which can drastically change temperatures and precipitation. According to the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration, lake effect snow forms in the winter when cold air brushes over

> warmer lake waters. The warm air is evaporated into the colder air, forming clouds and bringing snow. During the summer, hot air brushing against the colder air above the lakes can create wet, humid days.

"I would say the Great Lakes definitely play a part. We do have a lot of quick changes to weather patterns," Fahrenkrug said. "It is pretty unique to Michigan but it happens in other states too."

Fahrenkrug said mountains in a state could have a similar effect, causing drastic changes to the weather.

Love it or hate it, Michigan is known for snowy, cold winters and hot, sunny summers. If the winter is giving you the blues, cheer up — spring will be here in a few short months.



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

According to the complaint, on Sept. 30, 2013, a Michigan State Police lieutenant, assigned to work with the Flint Area Narcotics Group (FANG), was contacted by Fenton police who requested that an investigation be initiated.

On Oct. 23, 2013, a Michigan State Police trooper was assigned to enter Lake Spa in an undercover capacity with pre-recorded currency to request massage services and to determine if he would be solicited for prostitution services. When the trooper entered the business, he was met by an elderly woman of Asian descent, known as "Mama" who ushered him into a small private room where he purchased massage services for \$60 from a masseuse who went by the name of "Angie."

Angie gave the trooper a 15-20 minute back and shoulders massage and then asked him if he would give her a good tip. The trooper motioned to the end table where he had placed some tip money. Angie then touched the undercover trooper's genitals as well as lifted her shirt to expose her breasts, according to the complaint. At this point, the trooper told Angie he needed to leave. She told him to come back later when he was more comfortable and to be sure to bring more money.

According to the complaint, Angie showed the undercover trooper what he would receive if he returned with \$240.

On Nov. 13, 2013, a Flint Police Department lieutenant working undercover entered Lake Spa and requested massage services to determine if he

room. He agreed to pay his masseuse "Lee" \$60 for a 15-20 minute massage. When she was finished, she asked him if he would like anything else. She told him he could get whatever he wanted and asked him how much money he had.

Similar to Angie, Lee touched the undercover lieutenant's genitals and lifted up her shirt to expose her breasts. At this point, the lieutenant told Lee that he had to leave with the excuse of having

to pick up his children.

Based on these incidents, a search warrant was executed on Lake Spa on Dec. 5, 2013. During the raid, FANG

team members located five people, including the masseuses Angie and Lee, and the elderly woman known as Mama. There were also two customers at Lake Spa at the time of the raid, who both admitted to paying for sexual acts.

Both masseuses admitted that sexual activity for cash was available at Lake Spa and they recounted the costs for specific acts. Both also indicated that Mama ran the spa.

Mama reportedly gave officers several false names and claimed that she only cooked and cleaned on the premises. She reportedly provided the name of a Fenton resident as the proprietor of Lake Spa.

Through their investigation, the prosecutor's office learned that the lessee of the building space since March 2012 is a man, with a last known address in Ohio.

This case remains under investigation. If criminal charges are filed, this information will be made available.

# Claborn's late trey shocks Holly, 66-64

**Holly** — Down by 14 at the half courtesy of three Holly three-pointers in the final minute of the second quarter, the Fenton varsity boys basketball team had to play a perfect second half to defeat the Bronchos in Holly's own gym.

James Claborn and the Fenton Tigers did just that. Claborn hit the game-winning three-point shot with 38 seconds left, made the defensive stop on Holly's Jake Daniels' potential game-winning layup and then iced the game with a free throw, earning the Fenton Tigers a shocking 66-64 victory at the Horseshoe Friday night.

"By the end of the season, we should be pretty solid. And we have guys out of the lineup right now, too. We are missing out on three weights."





When it comes to replacing car parts, there are two options for customers: purchasing aftermarket parts or original equipment manufactured parts (OEM). Aftermarket parts are usually cheaper than OEM and if purchased through the right vendor, just as high quality.

Robert Koppen, assistant parts manager for Vic Canever in Fenton, said he always tries to sell his customers GM aftermarket parts because they come with a warranty. It isn't always guaranteed that an aftermarket part will perform just as well as the OEM so customers should see if they can obtain a warranty for their new part as well.

"GM pretty much covers the gamut for what you would need or put onto a car," Koppen said. "A lot of the products are superior and are backed by the designs of GM themselves."

Koppen said an aftermarket part from GM that a customer installs comes with a one year warranty. If done at a dealership, the customer's warranty extends to three years.

Aside from quality and warranties,

customers should also check out price. While aftermarket items are usually cheaper than OEM, that is not always the case. Plus, low quality aftermarket parts may end up costing more in the end if they affect another piece.

"With some aftermarket parts, sometimes there is a quality issue as far as workmanship," said a worker at Lasco Ford of Fenton. "Sometimes the OEM may be cheaper and there's no real reason why."







She eats right, she works out and takes care of herself every day. She wants her face to reflect this same youthful vitality that the rest of her body shows.

That's why one local 69-year-old woman, who asked to remain anonymous, is in the pre-op area of the Skin and Vein Center in Fenton for "The Hour Lift," a mini-facelift procedure that's becoming more and more popular.

"We've been doing these for about 15 years, but they've become much more mainstream now since makeover shows on TV began to glamorize them about 10 years ago," said Dr. Eric Seiger, board certified dermatologist and cosmetic surgeon. "It's not a 'taboo' thing anymore."

Dr. Seiger estimates he has done between 2,500 and 3,000 of these procedures, on women as young as 24 and for a couple who was each 86 years old. "I'd say the median age for this surgery is about 58, and 95 percent of my patients are women. The results will last between five and 10 years, depending upon the patient."

The difference between The Hour Lift and a regular facelift is that The Hour Lift involves cutting the skin and tightening the facial muscles, rather than moving the facial muscles. The areas primarily improved by a facelift are the jowls, cheeks and neck. There's a huge difference in recovery time and price. "It's the difference between a three-day recovery and a two-week commitment," said Dr. Seiger.

The price is also a huge factor in a per-



son's decision to undergo this procedure. Dr. Seiger says he used to charge \$3,800, and he cut the price to \$2,900 when the economy changed a couple of years ago. A full facelift will cost between \$6,000 and \$15,000—depending upon the scope of the procedure. These elective cosmetic procedures are not covered by insurance.

"The number one thing that patients say to me is, 'I don't want to look 20 years old again. I just want to look in the mirror and be able to look as good as I feel inside. I want to feel refreshed,"" said Dr. Seiger.

For the 69-year-old patient who was waiting for her procedure, The Hour Lift was not only for her own self-esteem, but also for her success in the business world. "A youthful appearance validates your professionalism," she said. "This is how we get measured for our success."

# Thinking about having 'The Hour Lift'?

#### Here's what to expect: **Q: What happens before**

#### the procedure?

A: Prior to surgery, you may be given a medication to help you relax. Local anesthesia is then administered to minimize discomfort.

#### Beat fear this year

John Wesley, the founder of the Methodist Church, saw a link between swearing and worrying; seeing them both as acts of unbelief. Yet many people of faith fret continually over present problems and fear the future. They worry about family members, financial security, health and a number of other supposed impending disasters. If you are one of these anxious ones, try evaluating your fears.

Of the things you fear, how many are really likely to happen to you today? If you can feel safe for the remainder of the day, that is enough for now. 'Do not worry about tomorrow,' said Jesus (Matthew 6:34). And that is good advice for every day of the year.

Think of the cares that would be canceled if we would escape anxiety about

tomorrow. Most feel fairly safe about today, but the tomorrows are tough.

Tomorrow the house payment is due. Tomorrow is the final day of grace on the insurance premium. Tomorrow is the day of your appointment with your doctor to find out the results of the medical tests you took last week.

But what if tomorrow does hold unknown trials? Is worry likely to change anything?

Ian McClaren wrote: 'What does your anxiety do? It does not empty tomorrow of its sorrow, but it empties today of its strength. It does not make you escape evil — it makes you unfit to cope with it if it comes.'

Which of your concerns tormented you yesterday?

Last year?

Have you been down this road before?

How many times have you been troubled by the same thought patterns that upset you today only to find that your expected tragedy didn't occur? Can you trust God to continue to protect you?

While writing this column, the phone rang and upon answering, I was reminded of the negative effects of fear on our health. This caller told of his difficulty in trying to sleep because of the number of people he knows who are losing their jobs, including his son. 'I sleep about two hours,' he said, then wake up and am unable to unwind.'

'Worry is like sitting in a rocking chair,' I said. 'It keeps you busy but you don't go anywhere.'

Most of us have known people who were serene when everything seemed to be crashing down around them. In the most trying of circumstances, they have remained calm. Those going to comfort them have come away comforted. They have been living examples of the peace of God. The secret of peace in troubled times is being willing to let God carry our burdens for us, which is precisely what He has offered to do.

Urging his worried readers to take advantage of this invitation, Paul said: 'Be anxious for nothing.' (Philippians 4:6). That's worry free living. And Peter cinched the guarantee by inviting us to be care free... because God cares for you and me (1 Peter 5:7).

Students' observations are backed up by reasoning. This approach improves learning in math and science, she said. "You get kids to look more deeply." Because there's no wrong answer when digesting a painting, she said students are more likely to speak up in class.

Last year, 54,000 students visited the DIA, taking guided or self-guided tours. This amount is over 39,000 that visited the previous school calendar year. In 2013, the DIA had 619,000 guests, a 24-percent increase according to Marcil.

On Thursday, the marble walls of the DIA echoed with the voices of the children, who excitedly took photos with various digital devices, which no one discouraged.

The museum and all its assets are owned by the City of Detroit, and run by non-profit organization, Detroit Institute of Art, Inc.

#### **DIA and the bankruptcy**

The DIA has been in the news because of the city's bankruptcy, where questions regarding whether they should sell assets to pay for underfunded pensions. Marcil said that technically, art can only be sold for the procurement of more art, and the non-profit would be in breach of contract if that happened.

There is currently a plan to raise \$330

**Holly**—With 2014 underway, members of the Holly Area School Board of Education elected new officers during the Jan. 13 meeting.

In the wake of Tony Mayhew's December announcement that he no longer wished to continue as president for his final year on the board, two nominations were made for president.

In an initial vote of 4-3, Deahl's nomination of Sharpe was denied. In a second vote, board members elected Carne as vice president with a vote of 4-3. Deahl, Sharpe and Newcomb again cast the dissenting votes.

Board members unanimously elected Deahl to fill the secretarial position left vacant by Carne, while Newcomb was unanimously elected to continue in his role as the board's treasurer.

"I'm very pleased to serve as the new president of the Holly Area Schools Board of Education," Julian said Wednesday. "We made steady progress under the leadership of Tony Mayhew, and I hope to continue that tradition."


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# Holly village and school district form partnership

Holly — It's a win-win for the village of Holly and Holly Area Schools as the two entities made it official this week, entering into a partnership where this year, the village of Holly will make administrative offices on the Karl Richter Campus its new home.

In July, local businessman John Colucci struck the deal with the village of Holly, purchasing the historic downtown building for \$411,000 over the course of a 48-month land contract.

Since that time, village officials have been planning where to relocate. The Holly Board of Education's October decision to move middle school students back into Sherman Middle School opened the opportunity of possibly striking a deal with the school district by occupying office space on the soon-to-be vacant Karl Richter Campus.

Village Manager Jerry Walker said he was approached by Superintendent Dave Nuss late last summer, asking if the village of Holly might have any interest in setting up shop at KRC.

The Facility Use Agreement, which was approved by the Holly Board of Education Monday night, is an agreement for shared office space on the Karl Richter Campus. In June, village staffers will move into the administrative wing where the current middle school offices are now located.

Per the agreement, the village will pay \$1 for a 25-year lease, and will also be responsible for all utilities for the 9,000 square foot office space — a cost estimated to be approximately \$11,000 per year.

"The village would then just be responsible for utility costs for the first 15 years," Walker said. "In addition to this, if we decide to make any changes to property or to the space we occupy - paint, carpet or whatever-furnishings basically, then we are responsible for that."

Beginning in the 16th year of the lease, should any major capital improvements be necessary, Walker said the village would participate in the cost of those

improvements based on the space the village is occupying at the time.

"From a personal standpoint, administratively, it's been a great team effort and the school has been very good to work with," Walker said before the vote. "I think for a community perspective, this is a great asset for the Holly community and it should prove to be very beneficial if approved by council."

Superintendent Dave Nuss agreed. "We appreciate the opportunity to build a partnership with the village and want to see that grow," he said. "Perhaps as Mr. (Jesse) Lambert pointed out at the last meeting, we could expand on the

idea of a Community Center."

In a vote of 7-0, council approved the Facility Use Agreement. "While I believe

that the village and the school district Dave Nuss have always had a

very good working relationship in sharing the community, at least in my time here in the village, this is the first real truly collaborative effort in terms of buzz words like 'sharing services' or 'joint efforts' that we've undertaken," Village President Ryan Bladzik said. "Holly Area Schools is our biggest employer in our community, and it is our community schools which prepare our children for their future, so I'm really excited about this opportunity as well."

Walker said the village of Holly will begin relocating to the new office space on June 13 and expects to be open for business a week later on June 20, 2014.

Bill Wood, 50, is the second generation owner/operator of Woody's Towing in Tyrone Township, started by his father, Gaylord Wood, in 1972. His brother, Mike, handles the convenience store portion of the family business. Wood and his staff of seven are often out in the middle of the night, rescuing stranded motorists. He also specializes in heavy recovery (semis, trucks and trailers) and water recovery. When he's not working, he enjoys spending time with his 5-year-old daughter, Chloe. What kind of winter has it been for you at Woody's? Really busy, because of the weather. It reminds me of the winters we used to have back in the '70s with such cold temperatures and lots of snow.

What are the worst driving conditions for most vehicles? Deep snow and ice. This last storm was the deepest we've had in a long time. I remember back in '78 when we had 4 feet of snow.

How many customers do you have on a typical day? It depends on the season. In the winter, usually 20 to 50 a day. In the summer, it varies according to the temperature. Sometimes summer is busier than winter when there's extreme heat, or in a rain when the roads slick up.

What's the most important thing every person should have in their car? Warm clothes and a cell phone. You never know what's going to happen out there.

What's the most dangerous thing you've ever seen anyone do on the road? When people break down, then walk around on the highway. They take a chance at being hit. You're better off to stay in the car and call for a tow. Be observant about what's happening around you.

What makes you good at doing your job? Definitely my experience. I've been doing it for 35 years at Woody's.



# One document every person needs

► A simple estate plan, including a will, will protect you and your family

news@tctimes.com; 810-629-8282 If you are 18 years of age or older, you owe it to yourself and your family to have an estate plan. At this young age, you might think that you don't have any assets to distribute and besides, death is the furthest thing from your mind.

But the reality is that once you're 18, your parents no longer have the right to make medical decisions for you. If you become incapacitated due to illness or injury, your fate will be in the hands of a probate court judge or doctor, not your family.

Those are the words of experience spo-

ken by attorney Sharon Miner, of Miner Law Office, P.C. in Fenton. What is an estate plan?

It is a package of documents that should include a health care power of attorney, a financial power of attorney, a will, beneficiary designations and perhaps a trust. "These are each a different tool that can be used in a variety of circumstances," said Miner.

Young adults should have financial and health care powers of attorney and a will. When they marry and have children, the will should be changed to include the appointment of a guardian who

would raise their children in the event of their death. They also need to desiginate a person to manage the children's money until they become adults. If you want to protect their inheritance past the age of 18, you would create a "testamentary trust" in your will, or do a living trust.

If you have not yet worked with an attorney to write a will, here is how to get started:

• Begin with the basics. Start by getting organized, then outline your objectives, determine the value of your property, inventory your major assets, estimate outstanding debts. Prepare a list of family members and other beneficiaries to whom you want to pass assets. Ask yourself these questions: "how do I want to divide my assets among my family members, other loved ones and favorite causes? Do I need to make special provisions for any of my heirs?"

• Choose guardians. If you have minor children, or an adult child/parent/ spouse, or a spouse with special needs who is your dependent, you must think about who will care for them when you're gone. Talk with a proposed guardian in advance, and understand that if you don't name a guardian, the court may end up doing it for you.

• Choose a personal representative. This person will gather up assets, pay outstanding bills and distribute your assets according to your will. If you don't have a will, the Probate Court Judge will appoint a Personal Representative. Your assets will be distributed according to the statute we think of as your "next of kin." This may not be how you want things to be distributed, so it is important to have a will.

news@tctimes.com; 810-629-8282 With a new year just beginning, now is the time to resolve to get your finances in better shape for 2014. For most Americans, that means tackling debt first. Getting out of debt will be your first step toward financial independence.

First, you need to know where you are financially, so that you can figure out where you need to go.

"We do an overall assessment of your entire financial situation," said

Sarah Duncan, for Fentura Financial Partners at The State Bank. "This assessment will include your debt management, net worth, cash flow, investment strategy, tax strategy, insurance, etc."

It also helps to understand where the debt has come from, so you can avoid it in the future. Do you spend more money than you make on "wants" instead of "needs?" Has your debt resulted from a life circumstance like job loss or medical bills? Are you a young

person saddled with huge student loans?

Margie Shard, of Shard Financial Services in Fenton, says that the beginning of the year is the perfect time to look at your whole financial picture and put a strong plan together. "This is especially important if you are nearing your retirement years and need to reduce debt so you can increase your retirement savings.

"Start with the basics — your expenses," said Shard. "Take out all your expenditures not related to your basic food, shelter, clothing, etc. People are always surprised to learn that they can get totally out of debt in 12 to 36 months, if they put a plan in place and stick to it. It's also important that couples are on the same page when it comes to having a goal of getting out of debt."

People who are serious about getting out of debt need to set a realistic budget that they can live with, also including some discretionary spending in the plan. "Don't be so strict with your budget that you can't stick with it," advised Duncan. "It's just like a diet. You're more likely to stick with it over the long haul if you allow a few 'treats' now and then. It's important that these 'extra' expenditures are planned within the budget."

Many financial experts are on board with Dave Ramsey's Financial Peace University, which offers individuals and families a "package plan" for getting out of debt and onto strong financial footing.

A series of nine classes, each with a topic and goal, is led by a facilitator, who goes through the program with the participants in a group setting. The main tenant of the program is the "debt snowball," where each individual or couple takes their smallest debt, pays

> it off and uses those funds to pay down the next debt. The classes also include lessons on investing and charitable giving.

Locally, The Freedom Center in Fenton is the site of Financial Peace University, which started Jan. 12 this Sunday, Jan. 12 at 6:30 p.m. For more information, visit financialpeaceuniversity.com or call the church at (810) 629-5261.

Working with a financial planner is key to accomplishing many of these goals for debt reduction. "It helps to have someone hold you accountable," said Duncan.

#### 5 STEPS **TO ELIMINATING** YOUR DEBTS

1. Figure out what you really owe in total debt, not just in monthly payments. Make a list of all your debts, with the total outstanding payments and current interest rates.

2. Find savings wherever you can. Dedicating every spare dollar in your budget toward reducing your debt will get you out of debt as fast as possible.

3. Apply any extra money toward paying down your highestrate debt. If you can double your monthly payments on just a single credit card, you'll chop off well over half the time it'll take you to get that card paid off.

4. When you've paid off one debt, apply that money to your next highest-rate debt. Once you get rid of your credit card debt, you can move on to student loan debt, car debt, then eventually, mortgage debt.

5. Once you're done, keep saving. This time, you'll start paying yourself toward saving goals like a rainy-day fund, building up a down payment for a home or saving for long-term needs like retirement. This will get you ahead and prevent you from falling back down the debt spiral at the first sign of financial difficulties in the future.


As people age and acquire more assets, the financial side of their estate plan becomes more important. If you've built up IRAs and one of the couple becomes incapacitated, it's important that the spouse have access to those funds through a power of attorney document.

When you've reached senior status in your 60s, the health care portion of a person's estate plan becomes espe-

cially important. Medical decisions can be made in response to the person's wishes. A health care power of attorney has the authority to make life support

decisions in Michigan, where a Living Will isn't recognized.

Once you've put an estate plan in place, remember that it's a document that needs to be reviewed every time there's a new circumstance in your life - whether it's a new grandchild, you've retired or your spouse has passed away. "You can't plan ahead for more than about 10 years, because your life situations will definitely change over that time period,"

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# **Boost your retirement savings in 2014**



#### Summary

The beginning of the New Year is a good time to meet with your financial planner to review your portfolio of retirement savings. The rise in interest rates and subsequent fall in bond values will be the unique challenge of 2014.

news@tctimes.com; 810-629-8282 Picture yourself in a retirement lifestyle doing what you've always dreamed of doing. Then figure out how you will fund that lifestyle with retirement savings throughout your working life.

"It's good to have an idea of what you want your retirement life to look like, so you know how much you'll realistically need to achieve those goals," said Margie Shard, of Shard Financial Services.

Shard and other financial planners agree that the New Year is an excellent time to review your portfolio.

"You need to make sure that you're putting in enough money to meet the goals you've set for retirement," said Kevin Messing, financial advisor at Edward Jones, with an office in Fenton. "We can help you do that at Edward Jones with a goal system that calculates the money you have invested versus the money you'll need for retirement."

If you hope to retire at age 65 and start saving at 35, a May 2013 Bank of America survey found it would take 15 to 19 percent of your income saved to hit the numbers you'll need to retire comfortably. If you decide you'd like to retire at age 60, those rates grow to 23 to 29 percent. Since life tends to get in the way (braces, college, weddings, health issues, etc.) it can be hard to hit those targets each year. But smart savers will work to live on less to gain ground when they can (see sidebar on easy savings strategies). New challenges for 2014 will be the rising risks in the bond market, according to Jim Barone, director of investments and insurance for Flagstar Bank. "The world has changed so dramatically," he said. "As interest rates in general rise, the value of bond portfolios goes down. Our strategy is to review portfolios with our clients and base investing decisions on the number of years they still have in the market."

Shard added, "We've had to reposition our clients' portfolios, especially those nearing retirement. Usually we advise our clients to move out of the more volatile stock market and into bonds, but we're in a different time right now. A lot of people aren't aware of the risks in the bond market. People need to look at the income in their bond portfolio. We have solutions for this at Shard Financial."

She advises people to take full advantage of tax deferred savings vehicles, like 401(k), 403(b), 457, etc. "Depending on your tax bracket, you can put more money away in these accounts because they are tax deferred."

In addition to making wise investments, getting rid of debt can be one ticket to a more comfortable retirement. "Consider downsizing your home, or paying your mortgage off early with weekly or bi-weekly payment plans," said Shard.

Living below your means is another excellent retirement savings strategy. Planners typically suggest you aim to replace 70 to 80 percent of your pre-retirement income, which doesn't require a dramatic lifestyle change when you eliminate the money you were saving, plus Social Security taxes, commuting costs, etc. If you can make it on 50 percent, you need to save 11.8 times your income by age 60, vs. 17 times if you hope to live on 70 percent, according to money.com.

Wherever you stand with regards to retirement, it's better to start late than not at all. "Clients really should have diverse portfolios so they can take advantage of opportunities, while avoiding some of the pitfalls that are out there," said Barone of Flagstar Bank.

#### 5 EASY RETIREMENT SAVINGS STRATEGIES

- Make increase automatic. Many 401(k) retirement plans allow for automatic increase in the amount employees contribute.

- Save part of a raise. If you save 100 percent of your pay raise, takehome pay will still rise if the savings goes into a tax-deferred account. Saving less than the full raise allows for an increase in retirement savings, while further increase after-tax income at the same time.

- Increase savings after debt repayment. Once the debt is paid off, increase your retirement contributions by the amount of your former debt payment.

- Lower your bills and funnel the savings to retirement. Look at car insurance quotes, cable/internet/ cell phone bills, etc.

- Save one-time gifts, bonuses and tax refunds. Consider putting at least some of the windfall into a retirement account.

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



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

- 1 large clove garlic, minced
- 2 cups chicken broth
- 1 (10 3/4 oz.) can cream of chicken soup
- 1 (15.5 oz.) can great northern beans, drained 1 (15.5 oz.) can cannelli beans – seasoned w/ garlic, rosemary & sage; drained
- 1 (15.5 oz.) can butter beans, drained
- 1 (4 oz.) can diced green chiles
- 1 (14 oz.) can diced tomatoes chili style, drained
- 1 (11 oz.) can shoepeg corn, drained
- 1 T. chili powder
- 2 t. onion powder (you can substitute a small chopped onion – add it in with the garlic)
- dash of red pepper
- salt & pepper to taste

#### 🗧 DIRECTIONS

- 1. In a large sauce pan, heat olive oil over medium heat for one minute. Add minced garlic and cook for 1-2 minutes, stirring occasionally.
- 2. Whisk in chicken broth and cream of chicken soup till blended. Stir in remaining ingredients. Simmer for at least 20 minutes – a little longer is better though. Taste and adjust seasonings as desired.

DEAR DR. DONOHUE: My husband is 6 feet 4 inches tall and weighs 170 pounds. He is a competitive distance runner. He loves Kool-Aid and calculates that in a year he drinks 150 pounds of sugar in Kool-Aid alone. A friend told him if he continues this habit, he might develop diabetes. Can a skinny, athletic person develop diabetes from consuming sugar? - S.B.

ANSWER: Although "sugar" is half the name of sugar diabetes, sugar doesn't cause diabetes. It's a popular belief that it does, but it doesn't. People with diabetes are careful to watch their sugar intake, and they watch their total carbohydrate intake, but diabetics don't have to eliminate sugar completely from their lives. Careful monitoring of sugar and carbohydrate intake is essential for their control of blood sugar. Type 1 diabetes, the kind that requires insulin for control, often has its onset in younger years. It's due to a destruction of the insulin-making cells of the pancreas. The destruction is believed to be the work of the immune system. Sugar has nothing to do with it. Type 1 diabetes accounts for 5 percent to 10 percent of all diabetes cases. Type 2 diabetes, the much more common kind, comes about from a decline in insulin production along with a decline in the effectiveness of insulin. Ninety percent of Type 2 diabetics are overweight, and weight loss helps them control their blood sugar. Physical inactivity also contributes to Type 2 diabetes. So do genes. Again, it's not the sugar intake that produces this common type of diabetes. But monitoring the intake of sugar is important for control of this variety of diabetes.




#### Teen's virtual relationship worries parents

**DEAR AMY:** We have recently become aware that our 14-year-old daughter has been in very close contact with an 18-year-old boy who lives half way across the country, thanks to the magic of the Internet. We are not aware of all of the details of their communications (which is primarily by texting), but there is definitely a strong emotional bond. This has been going on for several months, and we noticed that our daughter has been very secretive and texting constantly in any spare time. Naturally, we as parents are very concerned about this and unsure of what to do. Any advice for parents in this modern age of communication? - Parents in the New World

DEAR PARENTS: Realistically, you will not be able to eliminate contact, and you might not even be able to monitor it thoroughly, though you should check her texts (unannounced) to make sure they are not sexual and follow her presence on social media. At her age, you as parents should make every effort to meet and get to know all of her friends, real world or virtual. This is non-negotiable. Communicate with him via Skype, phone or email, with your daughter present and with an open attitude. Verify that he is who he says he is. (And does he know that she is 14?) Basically, you want to demonstrate to both that you are present and involved.

DEAR AMY: I have a son-in-law who is 37, 5 feet 9 inches tall and weighs about 250 pounds. I love him dearly because he treats my daughter like gold. The problem is his diet. He loves and craves cheese and eats cheese on everything. I think he's an emotional eater, and I don't want to make waves, but if he continues with this diet he's going to make my daughter a widow and their children fatherless real soon. We get along very well, but I just don't know how to approach him about this. — Father-in-law

DEAR FATHER-IN-LAW: According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, only 52 percent of men 18 years and over met the 2008 federal physical activity guidelines for aerobic activity. Your son-in-law most likely knows how unhealthy his diet is. Don't confront or criticize. It would be great for you to be a friend in his corner, encouraging him toward a healthier lifestyle by being active with him. Also, encourage him to get regular medical checkups. Too few men visit their doctor regularly; seeing a physician could be a lifesaver for him.

weight of the world is on your shoulders, when in reality it's on your feet.

With some 26 bones and a complex framework of muscles, tendons and ligaments, your feet absorb the impact of your full body weight with each step, keeping you balanced and upright in the process.

No wonder your feet sometimes hurt. From blisters to bunions and corns to calluses, your feet take the brunt of what you throw at them, including uncomfortable shoes, lack of proper support and sometimes, even

less than perfect foot hygiene. Winter is espe-

cially hard on your feet," said Dr. James Hirt of Fenton Foot Care. "With the cold, dry air your feet dop?

dry air, your feet don't get much moisture. But you can use just about any

t over-the-counter moisturizer, or buy
one of our stronger medicated moisturt izers for severe dry skin at our office."

UGG boots are another problem for your feet. "They're cozy, like slippers, but offer zero support," said Hirt. "Wearing them occasionally is fine, but

not for long periods of time standing on your feet."

The dry skin of this season also causes more foot issues like corns and calluses, caused in part by dry skin rubbing together in shoes that don't provide enough breathing room. "Don't let your toes rub against each other in shoes that don't have a wide enough toe box," said Hirt. "That can contribute to corns on the top of your toes or calluses on the bottom. They're basically the same thing.

Corns and calluses are usually a symptom of a larger problem with your feet, either a deformity of the foot or the misalignment of a joint.

Bunions are another foot issue that often bring patients into Dr. Hirt's podiatry practice. A bunion is an unnatural, bony hump that forms at the base of the big toe, when the big toe joint moves out of alignment. Genetics play a big role, according to Dr. Hirt, but so does footwear. Women tend to be more prone to developing bunions, mostly because of wearing tight, poorly fitting shoes, especially high-heeled pointed shoes. These shoes gradually push the foot bones into an unnatural shape.

Because a bunion occurs at a joint where the toe bends in normal walking, a person's entire body weight rests on the bunion at each step, making them extremely painful. They're also vulnerable to excess pressure and friction from shoes and can lead to the development of calluses.

"The only way to fix a bunion is to do surgery to re-align the joint," said Dr. Hirt. "It's best to prevent a bunion from happening in the first place by wearing a supportive shoe with an arch, not cramming toes into a shoe. That will speed up the formation of a bunion."

# Five steps to happy feet

The best way to keep your feet healthy is a simple regimen of daily care that will keep the skin, bones and muscles of your feet functioning properly.

#### 1. Wear comfortable shoes.

Make sure they fit well, as shoes that are too tight can cause hammer toe, corns, ingrown toenails and general foot pain. Shoes that are too loose can cause blisters and calluses, sore heels and excessive shoe wear. Shoe style matters too, as wearing high heels frequently can cause damage to the bones of your feet. Shoes made of natural synthetics like leather and cotton allow your foot to release moisture.

#### 2. Take a walk

The muscles of your feet need exercise to stay strong. The best way to exercise them is just to take a walk.

#### 3. Wash your feet daily

Since your feet spend most of every day trapped inside a pair of shoes, they need to be washed to get rid of moisture and sweat so that bacteria doesn't grow. If it accumulates, that will lead to unpleasant foot odor and/or fungal issues. Just give your feet a thorough soaping in the shower, especially between your toes, and dry your feet well. Foot powder can keep them dryer longer, too.

#### 4. Moisturize your feet

The wear and tear endured by yourfeet often results in areas of dry, cracked or scaly skin, especially in the winter. Rub a lotion containing cocoa butter into the skin of your feet every day. You can also get in the habit of an overnight moisturizing routine. Simply coat your feet in cocoa butter, then put on a comfortable pair of cotton socks. In the morning, the skin on your feet will be much softer.

#### 5) Wear socks

Socks not only protect your feet, they also absorb and wick away moisture. For basic daily wear, use socks made with natural fibers like cotton or wool. For high performance socks, synthetic materials made for athletes are better at wicking moisture away than natural fibers are.

# A glass of wine a day?

It may keep the doctor away, but it's better to drink in moderation

It all depends whom you ask, but it appears from recent research that one or two glasses of wine a day (depending on whether you are a man or a woman) may actually help your health, within reason, according to foxnews.com.

The key word is moderation, which means one five-ounce glass for women and one to two five-ounce glasses for men, per day. Other sources of alcohol may share some of the positive effects of red wine, because all sources can increase the cardio-protective blood marker, HDL cholesterol. More research is needed to know for sure whether red wine is better for the heart than other forms of alcohol, such as beer or spirits.

#### **Reduces risk of diabetes**

The source of red wine's health benefits is found in the red grape skins. That is where the polyphenol resveratrol is found. Resveratrol may prevent fat accumulation and reduce insulin resistance, which lowers the risk of diabetes. Lowers heart dis-

#### ease risk

Resveratrol also prevents blood clotting and plaque formation in arteries, while improving vascular function. It raises highdensity lipoprotein (HDL) cholesterol, the "good" cholesterol, and it reduces the formation of blood clots. It helps prevent artery damage caused by high levels of low-density lipoprotein (LDL) cholesterol, the "bad" cholesterol.

#### May lower cancer risk

Studies have also shown that resveratrol can reduce tumor incidence by targeting different stages in cancer development. Reduces stress

The high concentration on polyphenols, including resveratrol,

in red wine, also can slow down the aging process by reducing stress. Drinking wine can be part of a healthier lifestyle through a Mediterranean diet, which also emphasizes fish, fruits and vegetables, legumes, etc. Other sources of wine's health benefits

If you don't drink alcohol, you'll be happy to know that you can get the same health benefits from other sources. Flavonoids are found in fruits and vegetables, cocoa and some juices. Grapes and red grape juice also have many of the same com-

ponents as red wine. In fact, neither the American Heart Association nor the National Heart, Lung and Blood Institute recommend that you start drinking alcohol just to prevent heart disease. Alcohol can be addictive and can cause or worsen other health problems.

#### **Risks associated with alcohol**


Drinking too much increases your risk of high blood pressure, high triglycerides, liver damage, obesity, certain types of cancer, accidents and injury and other problems. In addition, excess drinking may cause cardiomyopathy, a weakened heart muscle causing symptoms of heart failure in some people.

According to mayoclinic. com, if you have heart failure or a weak heart, you should avoid alcohol completely. If you take aspirin daily, you should avoid or limit alcohol, depending on your doctor's advice.
