A look at what LGBT- based laws have meant around the state

While Fenton has a non-discrimination law protecting the LGBT community, it's unlikely the law will be used that often.

Today, if someone is lesbian, gay, bisexual or transgender (LGBT) and they feel they've been discriminated against in areas of housing, employment of public services, there is a process they can follow at the city.

East Lansing was the first in the U.S. to pass a law including gender identity and sexual orientation to an anti discrimination law in 1972. are some things to keep in mind for photos in the summer season. **Back lighting**

During the summer, there is much less cloud cover, and therefore, less even light for outdoor photos. This means that if you aren't facing the sun for a photo, it's likely your subject will be in shadow.

Unless your camera has a powerful flash, back lit subjects will be too dark in the photo, or the rest of the image will be too bright.

If the sun id behind them, move until the sun is on the subject's face. Sunlight from the side will lessen the squinting.

If you are taking pictures of a group activity outside, shoot with the sun to your back — just watch out for your own shadow.

If you are close enough, your flash might be powerful enough to light your subject, especially if you are using an actual camera versus a smartphone.

Advanced tip: If your subject is backlit, you can put light on their face by reflecting intense sunlight back at them, with a large white sheet of paper, or anything reflective. I actually use See PHOTOS on 7

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Give killers coverage, not a soapbox

Who deserves more attention in news coverage of mass killings: the victims or the killers? The question has risen after the recent rampage in Isla Vista, California, which resulted in six murders and 13 injuries.

After Elliot Rodger's mass shooting many families of victims and law enforcement officials have urged journalists and public officials to avoid using the gunmen's names and photos in public.

The New York Times, among other outlets, was criticized for posting Rodger's rambling manifesto and YouTube videos. Margaret Sullivan, the New York Times' public editor, was willing to go halfway on the idea of playing down a killer's 'manifesto' as, 'at the very least,' worth consideration, on a case-by-case basis.

It is quite proper in public ceremonies to avoid giving the killers any more publicity that might bring further pain to the families of survivors.

We look to news media to give valuable insight and spark discussions, hopefully with psychiatrists and other knowledgeable sources.

For example, Rodger's apparent hatred of women, boldly displayed in his hours of video monologues, touched off a new national conversation about the male-centered culture that may have fed his delusions on top of his record of mental health issues.

Significantly missing, compared to other mass shootings in recent decades, was much serious discussion about new gun safety legislation. One wonders how many more massacres it will take to move that needle of public opinion. Of six dead in the incident, Rodger shot three and stabbed three.

Police were called to Rodger's apartment last month after his mother alerted authorities to her son's YouTube videos. They later left without looking at his videos, which Rodger later said in one of his videos would have exposed his intentions.

A special 'co-response' unit like those in some other California counties, consisting of both police officers and mental health workers, might have made a crucial difference in that visit. Sometimes it is through tragedies that we learn the value of such services the hard way. That's another reason for us to honor the victims, but also pay serious attention to the perpetrators.

Prior to the book's official release June 10, the 'journalists' on CBS 'This Morning' spent nine minutes of barely restrained excitement promoting Clinton's book. Casey Kasem dies at 82 years old

► American Top 40 radio host worked at family-owned store in Fenton, substitute taught at Lake Fenton

American radio legend and voiceover actor Casey Kasem died Sunday. He was 82.

Kasem, whose career included hosting American Top 40 and being the voice of

Shaggy on Scooby Doo, had numerous ties to the Fenton area. Kasem was born in Detroit in 1932 to Lebanese immigrant parents. After attending Wayne State University and working as an announcer on WJLB in Detroit, the radio personality made his way to the tri-county area.

Before Kasem came to rule the airwaves, he worked as a substitute teacher at Lake Fenton High School. He also helped at a family-owned party store called Larry Hamady Pure Food Market, located at the corner of North LeRoy Street near Kellogg Drive.

According to a March 2008 Times article, Kasem left for New York in 1957 to pursue an acting career. It only took six months for Kasem to discover acting wasn't his calling, so he moved to Cleveland to work as a disc jockey. His career included being on air in Buffalo and Oakland before landing in Los Angeles. The ra-

dio personality originally started out in comedy radio but switched to celebrity news and songwriters when he arrived in Los Angeles.

"My new career was actually found in a trash can," Kasem told the Times when he visited Fenton in 2008. "I came into the studio about a half hour before the show and I had no idea what I was going to do. Wedged in the door was a tall trash barrel full of news copy. On top of this trash was a magazine titled, "Who's who

in Pop Music 1962.' It was like God was looking over my shoulder and wanted me to find it. I then knew what I would do."

In addition to founding and hosting American Top 40, Kasem voiced characters on cartoon shows such as 'Super Friends,' 'Mr. Magoo,' 'Transformers' and 'Ses-

ame Street.' Kasem also guest-starred on several TV shows including 'Charlie's Angels,' 'Alf' and 'Saved by the Bell.'

Kasem's debilitating health toward the end of his life caused tension in his family. The star suffered from Lewy Body Dementia according to National Public Radio. Kasem had expressed that he did not want to continue to live if he had no cognitive function. Some of Kasem's family wanted to continue life-sustaining support; others wanted to honor his wishes.

A judge ruled in favor of Kasem's wishes and life support was eventually discontinued.

American Top 40 Trivia

Battling mosquitoes in Fenton Township

►Larvacide, aerial dusting done every year to cut down on bloodsuckers

There's a good chance that you've been a buffet for bloodsucking mosquitoes if you've spent any nights outside this spring.

The increased rain and water levels from melted snow this past winter has provided ample breeding grounds for mosquitoes.

Within Fenton Township, APM Mosquito Control is contracted to wipe out the summer pests. The process starts as soon as the winter's snow melts and continues into the fall. For residents who live spring out on the water, mosquito control is a must.

"Without mosquito control, people wouldn't be able to enjoy the outdoors," said Fenton Township Deputy Clerk/Operations Manager Tom Broecker. "APM has an integrated approach, including larvacide and barrier spraying."

As carriers of the deadly West Nile Virus, eliminating mosquitoes could be viewed as a public health service. Last year, the deadly disease killed two people and caused 36 illnesses. According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), 70 percent of people who become in-



fected with the disease won't develop symptoms. Headaches, body aches, joint pains, vomiting, diarrhea and rashes are some symptoms of the disease.

In Fenton Township, residents can contact APM and have their property barrier sprayed for mosquitoes for events like open houses or general parties.

Broecker said one misconception about mosquito control is that APM crop dusts chemicals over the township as part of their mosquito control.

"The spray from the plane is a naturally occurring spore put on crushed up corncob," Broecker said. "It's dropped into the swamp area and is only harmful to mosquitoes and black flies."

According to APM's website, the company's larvicide contains VectoBac and VectoLex, which occur naturally in the soil. The products can be processed by mammals, birds, reptiles and most aquatic life. "There have been no notable implications associated with application of these larvacides to the natural environment," the pest control company posted on their website.

To help combat mosquitoes, the CDC recommends wearing long sleeves and pants at dusk or dawn, which are peak mosquito hours. Using repellant is also advised. If a dead bird is sighted, the CDC urges people to report it to the local authorities, at it could be a sign of West Nile virus.

Continued from Front Page state-protected groups like age, marital status and race.

Fenton City had a dozen other municipalities to look to for guidance in drafting its ordinance — cities as close as Linden and as far away as Traverse City have laws, or policies that include sexual orientation and gender identity as protected groups.

In their research though, city attorney Stephen Schultz and City Manager Lynn Markland discovered that issues with discrimination involving sexual orientation and gender identity in East Lansing has churned out few complaints - none, actually. Neither has Linden, Pleasant Ridge nor Ferndale. Grand Rapids has had five issues since 1994.

Ferndale has had the law in place for at least 15 years, and according to Police Chief Timothy Collins, there has been no action, or investigation based on the law.

"Ferndale is very open and diverse, all that good stuff," he said. "If you live down here and you've got anti-gay bones in your body, you better keep it to yourself around here.'

This is what Schultz and Markland found in their research — few complaints are ever lodged, enforced or punished in these municipalities. Markland said that most people seemed to assume that it was already illegal.

Although these cities received few complaints, it doesn't mean that issues don't arise. While the issue of the ordinance was being discussed at city work sessions, residents brought painful stories of mistreatment, and discrimination, whether they experienced it themselves, or it was someone they knew.

The city's process

Should complaints of discrimination be brought to Markland, he'll investigate the facts and if he thinks discrimination occurred, he'll try to bring the two parties together in mediation. If that doesn't work, the case may be referred to Schultz. The worst-case scenario is a civil infraction against the accused party.

What is discrimination?

Schultz wasn't able to speculate on the kinds of scenarios that could trigger a discrimination complaint, but he points to decades of case law where discrimination was argued with the already protected groups.

Of course a simple test to Schultz, is that if a person is acting in good faith, they're probably not discriminating against someone.

A possible scenario with discrimination would include denying housing to a person who is perceived as, or open about being part of the LGBT community, and denying them for that reason alone.

The city of Kalamazoo passed its ordinance in 2010, and had two complaints, but neither were determined to be discrimination. One involved housing that was not within the city limits, and another, a shop owner who happened to be kind of surly to everyone, not just the gay man who bought magazines from him.

City attorney Clyde Robinson's process is similar to Fenton, and there is no fee schedule in place should someone be found to have broken the ordinance. In some cases, he could see the city asking for a court injunction, which means the court orders the individual to cease any discrimination.

Schultz believes state law will eventually add these groups to race, age, marital status, and others: even Gov. Rick Snyder asked congress to take up the issue after roads are taken care of. If this happens, enforcement will happen at the state level instead of the local level.

So why the ordinance?

If they've never had cases, why have an ordinance? Clyde said it's a better reflection of what communities are, and a message of inclusion is being sent. This was the theme at the city council while the law was being discussed.

in Grand Rapids, five issues have come up under their policy since 1994. It's Diversity and Inclusion Manager Patti Caudill's job in part, to get the word out that there is a process in the city. In Grand Rapids, housing discrimination is a civil infraction, while a non-discrimination policy handled by a committee mediates issues of employment and public services.

The issues that have arisen had to do with insurance benefits for a same-sex couple, and another was mediating a dispute between neighbors.

Straw buyers of guns - Part I The Second Amendment to our United States Constitution states as follows:

'A well regulated militia, being necessary to the security of a free state, the right of the people to keep and bear arms shall not be infringed.'

The issues surrounding the right to 'keep and bear arms' as provided in this Amendment have been litigated and discussed by our courts since its inception. Normally, the validity of an entire law or a part of it is challenged and the court must then make a ruling.

The final answers to the questions involving these laws are given by our final legal authority — the United States Supreme Court.

On June 16, 2014, the Supreme Court released its latest opinion on a gun law in the case of Abramski v United States which interpreted a provision of the federal Gun Control Act of 1968. Under this Act, there are a number of requirements including the truthful disclosure of the true identity of the buyer of a firearm.

The facts in Abramski are fairly simple.

Mr. Abramski is a former police officer who offered to buy a Glock 19 handgun (using his police discount) for his uncle for the sum of \$400. Mr. Abramski went to a federally licensed firearms dealer to purchase the gun (the uncle had already given him a check) and filled out a questionnaire form that included the following question:

'Are you the actual transferee/ buyer of the firearm(s) listed on this form? Warning: You are not the actual buyer if you are acquiring the firearm(s) on behalf of another person. If you are not the actual buyer the dealer cannot transfer the firearm(s) to you.'

Mr. Abramski answered 'yes' to this question and purchased the gun. He then gave it to his uncle and gave him a receipt. Ultimately this was discovered by federal authorities and Mr. Abramski was charged with giving a false statement. He subsequently entered a conditional guilty plea to the charges reserving his right to challenge the law.

In a deeply split five to four ruling, the Supreme Court upheld the convictions. In next week's column, I will discuss the reasoning of both the majority and dissenting opinions.

2016, \$8.90 by 2017 and then \$9.25 by 2018.

Workers under the age of 18 will receive 85 percent of the boost.

Minimum wage has been a contested issue in the past few years, with fast-food workers and other low-paid workers striking for a raise. While the boost in pay will help workers, some economists see the


boost as a temporary fix rather than an overall effective approach to improving the livelihood of the poor.

"The biggest benefit is if you are a worker earning minimum wage and you don't lose your job or hours, you do see an increase and your standard of living goes up," said Chris Douglas, an economics professor at the University of Michigan-Flint. "But there are several drawbacks. Low-skilled workers can have a hard time finding a job, since they have to justify the pay increase. You're going to get more employers automating

jobs that were once done by people, such as pop-bottle returns and cashiers."

Douglas foresees employment for teenagers becoming tougher, especially with a surplus of unemployed adults. The economics professor estimates teenage employment is currently around 20 percent, based on numbers from the Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS).

Unemployment has been dropping slowly since 2010 when it hit 9.9 percent. The BLS reports the unemployment rate has varied between 6.6 and 6.3 percent so

While the increase in minimum wage may negatively impact some businesses, it's other costs that some owners are more worried about. Nick Sorise, owner of the Fenton Hotel, said that he pays his employees more than minimum wage and doesn't see Snyder's increase taking a chunk out of his profits. Instead, Sorise is keeping an eye on rising food costs, which will affect nearly every aspect of his restaurant.

> "If something happened around here like what happened in Seattle, that would be a different story," Sorise said.

Earlier this month, the Seattle City Council unanimously voted to increase the city's minimum wage to \$15 an hour. According to the city's website, the increase is to be implemented in the next 3 to 7 years, depending on employer size. Washington's current minimum wage is \$9.32.

For Douglas, increasing minimum wage is more of a political ploy by lawmakers rather than an effort to permanently improve lives.

"A better, long-term solution would be better education that increases a worker's skills," Douglas said. "For a short-term goal, economists would like to see the expansion of the income tax credit, a subsidy for low-skilled workers to help them into the middle class."

Tipped workers will also see an increase, as the current \$2.65 an hour minimum will reach \$3.52 by 2018.

Washington D.C. and six other states have also raised their minimum wage this year.

Use the 'scenes' setting on your camera

Especially around the camp fire the "night portrait" setting will make an artsier photo with fires, fireworks, and dim, outdoor light.

Play around with all the different scene settings and see what works the best. "Portrait" should blur the background to isolate your subject, and "sports" will help you catch movement with a faster shutter in brighter light.

Advanced tip: With the night portrait setting, try taking a picture of a moving subject in dim light. Follow the subject with the camera, even as you are pushing the shutter to take a photo. It could be an interesting image with lots of movement.

For the smartphone

I finally have one, so I feel I can ethically give this advice.

Smartphones under the right conditions take great photos — but you have to give it the best conditions.

With smartphones, with a few exceptions, you have to get close to the subject, lest the image lose quality as you zoom. It's even more important to make sure the subject has light on them with a phone, or smartphone camera, because the image sensors are so much smaller than a regular digital camera.

If the light is dim, there's a good chance the photo will be rough and grainy, and you'll have to turn some lights on.



Continued from Page 3 She's a barefoot gardener, which might scare some of the podiatrists out there. However, she likes the feeling of being "grounded" in her garden, where her feet can actually connect with the earth.

That's the spiritual part of gardening, which is as important to Taylor as the physical. "As soon as my feet hit the dirt, it takes my stress levels down immediately. It's the coolness and richness of the dirt," she said.

Taylor admits she likes to do all the work in her garden "the hard way," without the use of many modern amenities. "My favorite tool is my Amish rototiller," she said. "I don't know how I'd ever get another one, if this one breaks down. It was given to me, and I use it at least once a week. (Husband) Dan gets the soil ready with it and plants the garden with me on Memorial Day weekend every year."

She waters the garden by hand with rainwater collected in a huge wooden barrel that Dan made for her, so she's able to save money while being environmentally responsible.

Many aspects of the Taylor's garden are also recycled, from bricks that make pathways around the beds from Fenton's old downtown square to a limestone bench re-purposed from the old Assembly of God Church.

Taylor also savors the "giving" aspects of gardening, sharing all the bounty of her garden with her family, neighbors and friends. "I give away a lot," she said. "People really enjoy all the canning we do. I make huge baskets at Christmas, filled with the bounty of our garden. It makes me feel really blessed that we can share."

Gardening also provides social benefits with next-door neighbors Mike and Carrie Moore on Caroline Street, with whom the Taylors share garden's yield back and forth, ideas and friendship.

It all happens over the "relaxing" work of growing tomatoes, squash, asparagus, herbs of all kinds, etc., and the bounty of a giant apple tree that spills over to both yards.

Although the image of regular people walking around with what probably looked like machine guns to most people seemed strange or alarming, they weren't doing anything illegal.

Michigan is also an "open carry" state, but there really isn't an "open carry law." According to a Michigan State Police (MSP) memo, there just isn't a law in Michigan making carrying a firearm openly illegal.

It is illegal to conceal a weapon without a CPL (concealed pistol license), and there are restrictions as to where a gun can be carried.

To carry a weapon openly within legal parameters, the gun of course, must be completely unconcealed, and be carried with lawful intent.

Carrying a concealed weapon, whether it's a gun or knife without a CPL is a felony, punishable by up to five years, and \$2,500.

A gun is also restricted from being carried openly in several places, and is a 90-day misdemeanor if this is violated. Movie theaters, financial institutions, a church or other place of worship, court, sports arena, daycare center, hospital, or business regulated by Michigan liquor control are not legal open-carry places. Also included in this list is any private land where the owner restricts firearms.

These places are legal with a CPL, and if you are a peace officer or hired as security. With these parameters, one can carry a legally licensed weapon openly. "However, it can be very intimidating or frightening to people who encounter this type of activity," said Fenton Police Chief Rick Aro.

If the police are called because someone is carrying a weapon openly, Fenton police have to investigate. "We have the duty to determine if this type of situation is a crime in progress, or merely someone exercising their right to open carry," said Aro, though this seldom happens in Fenton.

It is also illegal to brandish a weapon, which is not clearly defined by Michigan law, but does not include a weapon that is properly holstered. It carries a 90-day Penalty.

WHAT CAN BE CARRIED **OPENLY, LEGALLY?**

Any fire arm that is legal to possess, can be carried, according to Fenton Police Chief Rick Aro. Short barrel rifles/shot guns and automatic weapons are not legal.

House Bill 4630: Increase vehicle registration taxes

To eliminate the current 10 percent annual reduction of vehicle registration (license plate) tax rates for a new vehicle's second, third, and fourth years of registration. This would represent a \$145 million annual tax increase on vehicle owners. The bill would also increase the drivers license renewal fee from \$18 to \$25, and increase a number of other fees on different kinds of vehicles and trailers. However, with the Senate's unwillingness to pass a related \$1.2 billion gas tax increase the bill's future is in question. Introduced by Rep. Michael McCready (R). Passed 21 to 15 in the Senate


House Bill 5313: Senate vote on state budget

The state government budget for the fiscal year that begins on Oct. 1, 2014, not including education spending (see House Bill 5314 below). This bill authorizes \$37.4 billion in spending, compared to \$34.4 billion originally authorized for the current fiscal year (which was prior to adoption of the federal health care law's Medicaid expansion). Of this, \$17.6 billion comes from state tax, fee and other revenue, compared to \$16.9 billion the previous year. The rest is federal money (\$19.8 billion, compared to \$18.1 billion the previous year). When education spending is added, the total state budget for the next fiscal year will be \$53.15 billion, up \$3.63 billion (7.3 percent) from the \$49.52 billion budget originally enacted for the current fiscal year. The state portion of this will be \$31.45 billion, up \$1.25 billion (4.1 percent) from the \$30.18 billion originally approved for this year. Introduced by Rep. Joseph Haveman (R).

FirstTry Triathlon preparing for its fourth event

When it comes to triathlon fans, Paul Zieske can consider himself one of the sports elite enthusiasts.

The Linden resident started doing Ironman events in 1984, when most people would've thought about a comic book character when the word popped up versus a sporting event.

And now through his position as President of CycleFit Sports Club, he's trying to give back to others for the rewards he received from the sport.

And that's why Zieske is the event

The Fenton resident was one of 84 participants at the U.S. Senior Open qualifier held at Spring Meadows Country Club on Friday. The top two qualifiers earned a spot in the U.S. Senior Open held later this summer, but the other 82 would leave without an invitation.

Finishing early, Husse was tied with two others with a 72 for over an hour as he waited for other scores to come into the clubhouse. But, eventually four scores better than Husse's 72 entered. "I've been hanging on since 12:30 p.m., just waiting," Husse said at 2:30 p.m. "Finally, two guys came in with lower scores.

"I didn't really think (72 would qualify). I heard some chatter that there were some guys going pretty low. We heard at the turn how people were doing. I heard a couple of people were doing pretty well, but I thought maybe 72 would be a good chance to be an alternate, but I guess that's out the door now, too."

became tough. However, thoughts about a triathlon never went away.

"Our mission with CycleFit Sports Club is to grow the sport and contribute to the community and we came up with the idea of doing something for the first-timers," Zieske said.

"It works well for us. It's not a huge production company, it's smaller in scale but we try to have the same attention of detail you'd get at a much bigger race."

The race is created for, as the name suggests, those wanting to attempt a triathlon for the first time. The distances are much shorter than most triathlon events. Contestants start by swimming in Byram Lake about 400 yards. When they return to land, they bike for 9.1 miles around Linden's streets. The FastTry Triathlon also remains. It's set up for those who have already run the FirstTry event, but want to continue competing in the local race.


"The FastTry race is getting a steady following," Zieske said.






