Find a specialty store. A consignment shop that sells mostly antiques might not be interested in modern day items, just as a shop that specializes in children's clothing probably won't be interested in selling adult clothing items.
 Know what sells. Consignment shops are looking for items that sell

quickly and easily. They also want
items that are in season (no one wants
to buy a bathing suit in the middle of
winter). Examples of items that sell
— new or gently used baby items,
designer clothes, and furniture that is

After Ferguson's fires, vote next time

Televised scenes of fires and looters ravaging storefront buildings in Ferguson, Missouri brought flashbacks in my memory to other urban riots a half-century ago and to lessons that Ferguson officials failed to learn.

Among them: Never underestimate the power of police brutality to enflame black communities.

Local governments and police departments got smarter. Racial and ethnic diversity expanded in police ranks and community policing strategies stressed good neighborhood relations as an effective crime-fighting and community-building effort.

But not everybody got the news. You could see that gap in the contrast between events in Ferguson, where a police officer fatally shot unarmed 18-year-old Michael Brown, to nearby St. Louis, where police later fatally shot 25-year-old Kajieme Powell, who was wielding a knife at police.

Coming 10 days into the stormy protests over Brown's death, the St. Louis case similarly attracted international attention but notably less public outrage. A cell phone video that St. Louis police released the next day made a big difference — and a great argument for more police dashboard and body video cameras. But the candor and transparency with which the city's police chief Sam Dotson responded probably was more important.

About 90 minutes after the incident, Dotson was on the scene to offer a detailed explanation and take reporters' questions. That's less than the several hours for which Brown's body was left in the street, according to news reports.

Worse, when the town greeted peaceful protestors with full riot gear and armored military vehicles, even prominent conservatives were divided over whether that was too much.

While 45 percent of blacks said they have experienced racial discrimination by the police at some point in their lives, almost no whites said they had. When asked whether police forces should reflect the racial makeup of the communities they serve, nearly six in 10 blacks said yes while whites are about evenly divided.

In Ferguson, which is two-thirds black, the police force and city government are close to allwhite. Perhaps now that will change. Nothing gets the attention of politicians like a big turnout.

It was in a college theater class that I learned about a genre called 'Theater of the Absurd.' These were plays written mostly by European playwrights between the 1940s and 1960s, as well as a certain style that flowed from their work.

What reminded me of this is now 'playing' in Ferguson, Missouri, following the shooting death of 18-year-old Michael Brown, who was — select one — a) innocently walking down the street when a police officer shot him to death without provocation, or, b) walking with a friend in the street and told by a police officer to get on the sidewalk, whereupon a physical confrontation occurred and Brown allegedly tried to grab the officer's gun and was shot by the cop, now identified as Darren Wilson. This after Brown allegedly robbed a convenience store of some cigars and was seen on a store camera intimidating the clerk as he walked out.

The rioting and looting that followed and the pundits who weighed in with the familiar narrative about slavery, discrimination, stereotyping, joblessness, lack of education and absent fathers, are familiar scenes we have watched in incidents dating back to the race riots of the 1960s.

The Theater of the Absurd, as defined by The American Heritage Dictionary, is 'A form of drama that emphasizes the absurdity of human existence by employing disjointed, repetitious, and meaningless dialogue, purposeless and confusing situations, and plots that lack realistic or logical development.'

Doesn't this sound like Ferguson, Missouri, in recent days?

One more question that adds to the absurdity: Why is so little attention paid to African-Americans who have overcome difficult circumstances to become responsible citizens and committed husbands and fathers? Possible answer: It doesn't play into the media's stereotypical portrayal of the black man as a frightening, threatening, menace to society. Blacks who loot stores make for more dramatic pictures than those who are law-abiding. To their great credit, Brown's parents have repeatedly called for calm in Ferguson, to little avail. Don't the major media have a bias of

their own in these matters? It's all so absurd.

at a cost that would ultimately come out to an estimated \$5,000 per space, or a quarter of a million dollars for the entire project.

Whether anything is done with the currently empty parcel by the DDA is first up to the city council, as it is the city of Fenton that currently

owns that parcel of land. At last Tuesday's DDA meeting, DDA Director Michael Burns presented

his own research he had conducted into a potential parking structure after hearing the DDA's interest in the idea. Burns reported

that financially, a parking garage may not be feasible at the time, and would be likely to cost more in upkeep and maintenance than the amount of revenue it could bring in.

The question the DDA must answer is, when will parking need to expand?

announcement in September," he added.

This group, which has been working together for a year-and-a-half, includes school superintendents from Fenton, Lake Fenton and Linden districts. members of the Fenton Clergy Association, local government officials, the Fenton Regional Chamber and local business representatives. Dr. Mark Fisher of Transfiguration Lutheran Church in Fenton Township has been serving as a facilitator at meetings to bring back the original goals of the FARR organization.

Penny Fausey, one of three community members who incorporated the organization in 1990 along with Jack Winegarden and Andy Schmidt, serves today as vice president of the FARR organization. She's pleased that the direction of FARR is moving back toward its original roots of being a community resource for people in need.

"We are connecting with a very powerful resource for people who really need help," said Fausey. "That's why we can't make a formal announcement until we have final approval. I've never liked the idea that FARR was primarily viewed as a thrift store. That was never its intended purpose."

She acknowledged that the thrift shop income was not enough to cover its overhead expenses, and the board needed to re-direct FARR back to its original purpose of resources and referrals.

She also mentioned that the FARR truck that was used for deliveries is now more than 15 years old and will be sold to raise funds for FARR. "We still have it, but we're going to sell it," she said.

"Good things are coming out of all this reorganization," said Hopper. "It's just moving more slowly than we'd like."

Several members of the DDA agreed that Fenton has not reached the point where it is in need of a parking structure, although some members did not rule out that the downtown area could reach such a point in the future.

While the DDA believes it has enough parking spaces for the downtown as it currently exists, it was agreed that

as downtown development expands, parking will have to expand as well to accommodate expanding needs.

"It is an issue that affects everyone downtown, restaurants, stores, even city hall," said DDA Chairman Craig Schmidt.

A discussion relating to the land parcel is expected to take place at the next city council work session in September, with more discussion amongst the DDA taking place at next month's DDA meeting.

"We're not going to forget about this issue," Schmidt said.

There will be a few traffic snags on the main north/ south highways. AAA projects a busy travel weekend, while the National Safety Council warns that 400 could be killed in auto crashes the same weekend.

Safety Council (NSC) estimates that 395 will die in auto crashes Labor Day weekend, as part of a projected 42,300 personal injury crashes. The projection is done by comparing estimates, versus actual crashes

each year. In 2012, 378 were killed, compared to the estimated 405. Locking seat belts will save 144 lives, the NSC reports.

Construction on U.S. 23 and I-75 is not expected to be too extensive. U.S. 23 will be down to one lane just south of I-96, where traffic will slow during construction. From Lee Road, to 6 Mile Road, traffic is expected to inch by at around 15 miles per hour, according to the Michigan AAA route map.

Heading north on I-75, there is ongoing construction on the Zilwaukee Bridge, where one side of the highway will be closed, and traffic diverted to the north, or southbound lanes, depending on the day.

I-75 is clear until south of Detroit, where the southbound side of the highway is closed through November as a bridge is being built. Exit 43 is closed nearby as well.

downsize - why not make a few dollars by consigning the items that just don't fit.

Good Health

DEAR DR. ROACH: How long do shin splints last? Is there anything besides ice that will make them go away faster? My left shin started hurting a little more than three weeks ago, and I ran once or twice on it, then I stopped, but it still hurts. Is this normal? When do you think I can run on it? I don't think it was increasing my distance that did it, but I did a longer run on a flat path that I normally do with hills, so I thought maybe that was the problem — but three weeks seems like too long. — H.O.

ANSWER: Pain in the shin bone (tibia) is common in runners, but the hard part is distinguishing between 'shin splints,' properly called 'medial tibial stress syndrome,' and a stress fracture of the tibia. A stress fracture usually has a discrete area of tenderness, but MTSS has more diffuse tenderness. An X-ray may be needed to be sure it isn't a stress fracture, since the treatment is very different. A runner with a stress fracture needs to avoid impact activities like running, whereas MTSS usually gets better with just lower running mileage. In your case, the degree of pain is higher than I would expect after three weeks. I'd recommend an X-ray.
