Now teaching 'life skills' through innovative 'Life Management' class

Fenton — Normally, high school classrooms don't smell like fresh-baked cookies made from scratch, but this is how life management teacher Janet Kidd prefers to kick off her child development class. "It's a nice way to start functioning in a kitchen, simply," she said.

This will build into making baby food, a fruit roll-up, pudding, and even teething rings, among teaching the changes that happen to the mother and child's body during pregnancy. Kidd teaches two food classes also.

When sportsmen behave badly — again

Again, the sports world is rattled by men behaving badly, but this time with a twist: NFL player Ray Rice tried to stay when he should have gone, while NBA team owner Bruce Levenson left despite good reasons for him to stick around.

The only good thing to be said about Rice's case is the argument it makes for security cameras.

The Baltimore Ravens terminated the 225-pound running back's contract - and the NFL suspended him 'indefinitely'-on Monday after video was released from an elevator security camera of Rice punching Janay Palmer (then his fiancée, now his wife) with his powerful left hook.

They could have done that months ago, after a video showed Rice dragging an apparently unconscious Palmer out of the elevator in Atlantic City. But Commissioner Roger Goodell only suspended him for a ridiculously mild two games in a desperate attempt to protect his image and playing eligibility.

Amazingly, Palmer stood by Rice in a later news conference and actually apologized for whatever role she played in Ray's downfall. This week, she blamed the media in an Instagram post, according to the Baltimore Sun, for her husband's dismissal and suspension.

The case of Bruce Levenson, who has led the ownership group of the Atlanta Hawks since 2004, sends very different messages. He informed NBA commissioner Adam Silver on Saturday that he intended to sell the team, ending a league investigation into an email written by Levenson. It detailed his thoughts to fellow Hawks executives on how the team could attract more white fans.

Indeed, it is hard for me to tell what Levenson did that was so wrong. It seems to me as an African-American that if anyone should feel insulted by his remarks, it might be white people,

What troubles me most is not that Levenson raised the issues, correctly or not, but that he's being punished for it. We need more frank discussions about race between reasonable people these days, even when some of the views expressed are wrong. That's how misguided views get exposed and, one hopes, corrected.

The sacking of Ray Rice

The 'indefinite suspension' of Baltimore Ravens running back Ray Rice for knocking out his then-fiancée, now wife, in an elevator at an Atlantic City casino has again provoked debate about domestic violence and what the National Football League tolerates when it affects a star player.

Ravens head coach John Harbaugh, who last spring testified to Rice's good character, says a new video has 'changed things.' Rice was initially suspended for two games after part of a video showed Rice dragging fiancée Janay Palmer from the elevator. When TMZ released the rest of the video, it showed Rice punching Palmer in the face inside the elevator, knocking her unconscious. The video also shows her spitting at him and both of them exchanging obscenities.

Hollywood once had its film stars sign contracts that included morals clauses. Maybe the NFL should consider an updated version of such clauses to project a better image and encourage players not to engage in self-destructive (and otherwise destructive) behavior.

While most NFL players are responsible citizens, and some have used social media to denounce Rice's behavior, the culture from which many players emerge ought to be indicted for its contributions to the violence that occurs too often off the field. The demeaning language applied to women in rap music has been chronicled for many years. Few of the words can be printed here, but 'bitches' and 'hos' are some of the milder ones.

Writing on the website SportsGrid. com, Jake O'Donnell commented: ' ... this is how abusive relationships happen. Woman gets beat unconscious. Somehow feels responsible. Apologizes.'

Players should be told they are part of a unique club and bad behavior will cost them more than fines and brief suspensions. They need counseling about money and especially about women.

If the NFL wants to help itself in this area more, women should be put in positions of power where they could not only provide a useful check on players, but on the predominately male management that has for too long made excuses for outrageous and even criminal behavior.

Aside from TV, radio and billboards, there will also be buses in Chicago wrapped with Pure Michigan imagery.

In the news release, Grinnell said advertising spots will run in regional markets like Chicago, Cincinnati, Cleveland, Columbus and Toledo, along with Indianapolis, Fort Wayne and South Bend, Indiana. In Wisconsin, Green Bay and Milwaukee will see ads and so will St. Louis and Southern Ontario.

Featured on this year's fall billboards are Lake Superior, Treetops Golf Resort and Lake Plumbago.

According to a Michigan Radio article, \$13 million was spent in advertising outof-state, which helped generate \$86 million in tax revenue from the four million trips created by the ads.

Debit and credit card facts, figures and security breaches

A couple of weeks ago I wrote a column about the good and bad of modern technology. Unfortunately, with the latest report of a payment (credit and debit) card breach at The Home Depot stores, the 'bad' part of the equation is once again raising its ugly head.

The fact of the matter is that generally the use of credit and debit cards is a good thing as long as consumers don't get in over their heads with debt.

Historically, the advent of the modern credit card system in the United States came in 1946 when John Biggins of the Flatbush National Bank in Brooklyn New York, introduced the 'Charg-It' credit card, which allowed customers to charge purchases at local merchants. The rest as they say is history, and since then the use of debit and credit cards has expanded exponentially. According to the United States Federal Reserve, there were more than 73 billion credit/debit card transactions in 2012.

Years ago, the state of the art as to credit card point of sale (POS) machines was the manual imprinter where the card was manually run through a machine using a carbonized slip. Technology then improved and in 1979, 'dial up terminals' were introduced using a phone line for credit card approval. Today there are also high-speed swipe machines (both 'wired' and 'wireless') which read magnetic strip cards and print out a receipt.

With the recent breaches at not only The Home Depot, but at least seven other major retailers, a reportedly more secure system called 'chip-and-pin' is to be introduced in the United States. These new cards have an embedded microchip and after the card is placed into the POS terminal, the customer enters a personal identification number to complete the sale. This system is widely used in Europe.

For now, card issuers and merchants recommend frequent checks of one's statements. If a card has been compromised, hopefully it will be cancelled and replaced without delay or loss.

Technology is a wonderful thing, but in this day and age caution and care should always be exercised.

Road rage is when those frustrated feelings are blown out of proportion. Recently, a man from Howell allegedly shot another driver in a road rage incident.

"The 'Road Rage' incidents we most commonly see involve both parties losing their temper over a frequently minor traffic incident," said Fenton Police Chief Rick Aro. "Unless one or both of the individuals remove themselves from the situation, it can spiral rapidly out of control."

Even the calmest driver has a chance of facing road rage from another driver. Simply honking the horn at someone that does something 'dumb' on the road can provoke his or her anger.

Instead of using obscene hand gestures, or the horn, to point out another drivers mistake, just let it go. Save the horn for alerting other drivers of dangers on the road rather than mistakes.

The same goes for the way you deal

with neighboring driver. If your sudden glance to the side, or rearview, looks angry or critical, it could evoke anger in the person next to or behind you. If there is an aggressive driver behind you, instead of slowing down or speeding up, it's better to just

switch lanes when it is safe. Turn on your blinker ahead of time to let them know that you plan to get out of their way. This could help ease their anger and it keeps them from passing on the right.

Just because there is heavy traffic doesn't mean it's OK to drive bumper to bumper. Back in the '90s, driver's education taught young drivers to keep three car lengths between them and the driver in front of them. While three car lengths might seem like a lot, enough space for another car to move into is enough. Not only does this space leave room for others, but it also gives you room to escape a sticky situation.

Doing something calming can help keep you from joining in on the road rage. Listen to some calming music, stay focused on your driving and safety, and avoid gripping the steering wheel too hard.

"We get road rage calls fairly often," said Fenton Police Chief Rick Aro. "I can't give you an exact number, but we probably average four to five per month.

"We haven't had any in the last year in which an assault occurred (or worse). Typically, one of the drivers leaves the area prior to our arrival."

If you find yourself in a road rage incident, Aro said, "My advice would be to turn or change directions from the aggressor if possible, stay in a public place and immediately call 911. Do not provoke, stop, argue or talk to the aggressor." It is also helpful to get a description of the vehicle and license plate number if possible, but do not follow or chase the other vehicle.

ROAD RAGE STATISTICS

• According to a survey done by AutoVantage Miami, Florida has the most aggressive drivers. The other four of the top five cities with the angriest drivers are New York City, Boston, Los Angeles and Washington, DC.

• Men experience road rage more than women, with 56 percent of guys admitting to anger behind the wheel and only 44 percent of women.

• 66 percent of traffic fatalities are caused by aggressive driving.

• 37 percent of aggressive driving incidents involve a firearm.

• Males under the age of 19 are the most likely to exhibit road rage.

• Half of drivers who are on the receiving end of an aggressive behavior, such as horn honking, a rude gesture, or tailgating admit to responding with aggressive behavior themselves.

 Over a seven-year period, 218 murders and 12,610 injuries were attributed to road rage.

• 2 percent of drivers admit to trying to run an aggressor off the road.

Ec used to include cooking, sewing, bal-

ancing a checkbook and other banal but important details about regular life. Home economics as it was doesn't exist

in most schools anymore. A lot of those skills can still be found, but not centralized in one class, or even school, or school district. Lake Fenton High School for example, only has an accounting class, which Principal Todd Reynolds said helps with checkbooks. "But other than that, we don't have cook-

ing classes, or sewing classes or any general studies," he said. Holly High School (HHS) Principal Peter LoFiego said that statewide, "Home Economics" was replaced by "Life Management Education," and finally "Family Consumer Sciences (FCS)."

Home Ec as it was known ended around 2003, but funding and core requirements pushed the majority of schools and students away from the traditional home economics-style curriculum around 2009, he said.

State funding is always geared toward what prepares students for jobs, versus sewing on a button, or cooking something.

The Michigan Department of Education (MDE) doesn't really require nor have any guidelines on life skills, except some health education requirements.


"Family and Consumer Science Education prepares students to evaluate, coordinate, and function in multiple adult roles of day-to-day living and working throughout the life cycle," reads the "Vision" section of the page, but again, has no course names, guidelines, or requirements.

Linden High School (LHS) Principal Russ Ciesielski said he took home economics at Linden Middle School, and he remembers learning about cooking and sewing. He said that the simple day-today things, like cooking is absent for the general student population. "We are relying on

the home for some of that help," he said. "Traditional home ec skills, I think some of those are missing."

Ciesielski said, like most schools, LHS doesn't have one single "home-ec" class for the general student population, but "life skills" classes are spread

over a few different courses.

In "Senior Portfolio" class, social functions like personal communications skills, proper dress for interviews, and even handshakes, he said, are discussed.

There are career-oriented courses like business management, and a personal finance literacy course. He describes those as the "math of daily living," where students learn about checkbooks, credit cards, car loans and home applications.

Back to the cookies at FHS. Kidd will also teach

how to make bread, along with entrées, a beverage, and the history behind the foods we eat. Did you know the snickerdoodle was the first cookie to arrive in North America? Or that the gingerbread cookie is the oldest?

She said she has seen courses like auto shop and wood shop, melt away, and despite all the options, there's no place to learn how to sew on a button in area schools.

"I know that the top schools do have it," she said, along with other top-notch indicators like a bigger gym or library.

She'd like to see students be able to run an account, balance a budget, understand how to budget money and time, and make best use of resources. "I think they should open it up so it's more accessible to more students," she said, because scheduling is often tight with all the required courses.

"I hope they learn to be self-reliant, and learn how to take a tomato from the bush, and do something with it," she said. "You need those basic skills just to be an adult and function independently."

HHS also has food and nutrition courses and even a class on interior design. Personal finance is taught through an economics section, and they cover those state-required health courses.

Although students can't really learn how to sew on a button at any area schools this year, HHS may be the first to bring that back for the 2015-16 school year, said LoFiego.

dtroppens@tctimes.com; 810-433-6789 Holly — Ben Thornton will be the first to admit it.


Last season, there was a period in time when he and his Linden varsity boys soccer team was ranked No. 1 in Division 2.

Eagles' defense keys 23-6 win vs Bronchos

And it was the Eagles' defense that had the biggest impact in the game, resulting in the Eagles' 23-6 Metro League victory at Holly High School.

"It starts with the line and our front three — me, Austin Mc-Neill, (Skyler) Stites and Ray (Ballard)," said Linden senior Kyle Korman, who had 14 tackles and three sacks. "Just getting the first push, pushing the pressure on the quarterback and getting the tackles in the back field — it sets the mood. And when you get pressure on the quarterback, passes go wild."

The Bronchos managed 148 rushing yards, but for large periods of the game they couldn't sustain a ground game. Two of their 32 carries resulted in 64 of those 148 yards. And there wasn't a passing game that could help compliment the ground game. While Holly's starting quarterback Matt Barnett was able to run for 84 yards on 15 running attempts, he wasn't able to complete any of his three pass attempts. Barnett was replaced by Alex Mazzone in the second half after an injury to Barnett and was able to complete 5-of-8 passes for 42 yards, leading the Bronchos to their only scoring drive, but his last three passes were two incomplete attempts and an interception by Linden's Trenton Strang. Zachary Kentish also collected a fumble recovery early in the second half setting up the Eagles' first of two second-half TD drives.

Linden's offense struggled

against Holly for the entire first half minus the Eagles' last drive. Starting with possession at the Holly 26, the Eagles took 10 plays to drive 64 yards and score on a 15-yard TD pass from Ethan Quesnelle to Michael Gold in the middle of the end zone. Bailey Davis made the first of his two extra-points and the Eagles led 7-0 with just eight seconds left in the half. They took that lead into the halftime break.

In the second half, the Eagles kept to their primary offensive weapon of the night — Kevin Bates. Bates was only able to run for 37 yards on 13 carries in the first half, but he wore down the Holly defense in the second half. He ran the ball 10 times for 56 yards and two scores. He also caught six passes for 61 yards during the contest, giving him 154 yards total offense.

"I love it. It's fun," Bates said about being Linden's workhorse on offense. "It's fun to keep the drive going, put my head down and get the yards."

Holly opened the second half driving the ball to the Linden 36 before a Bronchos' fumble was collected by Kentish. Starting at Holly's 49, the Eagles took 10 plays to set up Bates' two-yard TD run up the middle. Bates ran the ball five times for 19 yards and also caught a screen pass for 22 yards on the drive, converting two Linden third-down plays.

Barnett was sacked on Holly's next possession by Korman, forcing the Bronchos' best ground threat out of the game. The Bronchos took over the ball on their next possession on their own 5. Two plays later, an intentional grounding call in the end zone resulted in


The Fenton varsity football team was held scoreless at Swartz Creek for the first half Friday night.

It was kind of a short season and the weather in the fall was much better than the weather in the spring when I coached baseball."

Covert, a Fenton resident, made his mark primarily in one sport, wrestling. Covert coached Byron High School's wrestling program from 1978 until 2010, winning 403 duals in that period. He also had 14 district-winning teams and two individual state champion wrestlers — Jason Adams (1992) and Jason Jarvinen (1994). But, perhaps the wrestler who made the most impact while Covert was at Byron was his long-time assistant Mark Schaefer. Schaefer was a wrestler when Covert took over the program and wrestled for Covert. When he graduated, Schaefer became Covert's assistant coach.

"I got the job right off the bat when I came to Byron in the fall of 1978," Covert said. "I got a middle school math teaching job and was the JV football coach and varsity wrestling coach."

Covert, a Fenton graduate, wrestled in high school and for one season at Central Michigan University. He joined the Peace Corps for a couple of years and then earned a teaching job in Redford Township. While there, he noticed a classified ad in the Detroit News for a varsity wrestling coach at Redford Union. Covert came in saying he'd like to be an assistant. Redford Union athletic director Howard Kraft didn't like that response.

"He said 'Nope, I need a head coach and you are it," Covert. The response set

up Covert's long head coaching career. Covert is also a member of the Michigan Wrestling Association Hall of Fame. Covert was shocked when he heard about the honor.

"The MHSCA (shocked) me. I was not expecting it at all and I'm excited about it," Covert said. "It brought tears to my eyes to think people in the coaching profession looked at me in those terms."

Hajec has been inducted in several halls. He's in the Greater Flint Hall of Fame, the Fenton Athletic Hall of Fame and the Michigan High School Golf Coaches Hall of Fame as an individual. He's also in the Ball State Hall of Fame for being a member of the 1965 football team and also in the Greater Flint Hall of Fame for being a member of the Bishop Construction Baseball Team.

"I think they are all good," Hajec said about the Hall of Fame inductions. "You have to be old to get into them.

"It's the kids that really make it special. We had a lot of great years and some bad years, but you seem to forget those because the kids were still good. We didn't win, but they were still great kids. I really enjoyed it."

DEAR DR. ROACH: I keep getting little black splinters under my fingernails that disappear on their own. I also have little black splinters under both of my big toenails that have not disappeared and have been there for a while. What is this? — D.F.

ANSWER: These sounds like splinter hemorrhages. The most common cause of these is trauma to the nail bed, but some dermatologic conditions can cause this as well, such as psoriasis and lichen planus. However, the most worrisome (but unusual) condition is infective endocarditis, an infection of the heart valves. Any fever or fatigue should be promptly evaluated by an internist.
