Groveland Twp. — Few things in September are as immersive as walking through the gates of The Michigan Renaissance Festival. Bagpipes and otherworldly drum music, street performers who kindly harass you and maybe a walking, talking tree, or Knight of St. Ni are all part of the day.

On Saturday, 22,000 came for that richly

visual and auditory experience, the weather breaking just as it ended around 7 p.m. Sunday saw more rain, but that didn't keep too many away from the seven-weekend event.

If you'd like that experience too, the festival is still happening this Saturday and Sunday.


Each weekend at the Renaissance Festival has a theme. Saturday and Sunday are "Sweet Endings," with a dessert theme.

HOW TO

TAKE CARE OF YOUR GARDEN TOOLS

▶ Quality garden tools that are properly cared for will last longer, and clean, sharp blades will make garden work easier. In addition, cleaning tools removes disease inoculum that can be in soil and plant debris left on the tool.



CLEAN TOOLS

Before storing tools for the winter, first remove soil and debris. Use a strong spray of water, wire brush or putty knife to remove caked on soil. Don't forget the back of the neck. Remove small soil particles and rust spots with sandpaper or steel wool. If tools have

rust, clean with a product such as Loctite Naval Jelly Rust Dissolver. Lubricate tool pivot points and springs with machine oil.



Sharpen larger tools such as hoes and shovels with a #10 bastard mill file or power drill with a coarse grinding disk or wheel. To prepare for sharpening, place the tool in a vice, wear a pair of leather gloves and don't forget your safety glasses. The cutting edge should be sharpened to maintain the same angle as the original bevel. Start with the top edge of the tool, file away from you, and only file one way maintaining a 45-degree angle. File the opposite side lightly to remove metal burrs. If you haven't sharpened a tool before, it takes practice. If you regularly file your tools, this job will be much easier. Finally, wipe or spray metal parts with a petroleum-based lubricant and rustinhibitor such as WD-40.

INSPECT HANDLES

Now that the metal parts are clean, the handle needs some attention. Fiberglass handles simply need to be washed and dried. To prevent splinters, sand any rough spots on wooden handles with a fine to medium sandpaper. Replace weak or broken handles. Most hardware stores carry replacement handles.

OIL THE WOOD

Remove dust and rub linseed oil into wooden handles. Let it soak in. Apply until it doesn't absorb into the wood anymore, then dry off any remaining oil. Tighten nuts, bolts and screws. Replace them if they are worn or rusty. Last but not least, apply a band of bright colored paint or tape to the handle. This will help

the handle. This will help you to find tools that have been left out in the yard or in your neighbor's garage.



HAND TOOLS

Bladed tools should be disinfected after each use with rubbing alcohol or a 10 percent bleach/water solution. Lubricate moving parts of clippers and pruning shears with oil. Once a year or as pruners become dull, sharpen the blade. Many pruners can be disassembled for sharpening (just remember how to put it back together). Use a whetstone to sharpen beveled blades and be sure to maintain the original shape of the bevel.

These should be cleaned after every use. Before storing for the winter, thoroughly wash and rinse all parts. Most chemical manufacturers recommend triple rinsing of sprayers. Check the owner's manual for other maintenance suggestions such as applying oil to all moving parts. Hang the sprayer upside down until thoroughly dry.

WHEELBARROWS, carts and wagons should be thoroughly cleaned. Touch up chipped paint surfaces with spray paint to prevent exposed steel from rusting.





◄GARDEN HOSES are often forgotten in the fall. Odds are we haven't used them lately and therefore, we forget to store them properly. Be sure to drain all water from the hose and store it in a dry location. In the winter, water left in plastic hoses will cause the hose to freeze and crack. Store hoses on hose reel supports or coil loosely.

Chris, this sounds most like a wheel bearing making noise to me. You can sometimes check this by jacking up the wheel in question. Try moving the tire in and out from top to bottom. If this does not show any movement then you may need a stethiscope and a partner to rotate the wheel while you listen for the noise. If you do not find the cause; most repair shops have specialty equipment like a chassis ear to find these types of noises while driving. You may need it diagnosed by them. I hope this helps.

Your list of jobs tires me out. How do you do all that you do? Most people ask me how, and then they ask me why!



► Local athletic boosters combine fun with fundraising

On a typical football Friday night, you'll find Todd Wilkinson helping with the busy job of concession sales at the stadium at Lake Fenton High School, passing along Blue Devil school spirit along with burgers, popcorn and candy.

He's the president of the Lake Fenton Athletic Boosters, and just one example of the busy role that athletic boosters play in the lives of local school districts.

The biggest job of athletic boosters is to support school sports with volunteerism and fund-raising.

Lake Fenton Athletic Boosters raise most of their money through concessions and a Silent Auction Dinner Dance, set for March 14, 2015. Boosters also support their child's school through making phone calls and volunteering at events, and attending monthly booster meetings.

Ticket sales to sporting events also generate funds. Generally speaking, most sports events cost \$5 for admittance, with pre-kindergarteners and senior citizens attending for free.



FENTON

Fenton High School Athletic Director Michael Bakker calls his district's sports boosters "vital" to the success of the athletic programs of the Fenton Tigers.

"We have individual athletic boosters for each sport," he said. "They all give support through volunteerism and funds, providing equipment, uniforms, supplies, etc., that our General Fund wouldn't be able to do. Each sport also has its own thing they do to raise money. Golf outings are one example."

FHS football and track concessions are

managed by the Athletic Department. "I ask different teams and/or groups every week to help out, and they get a portion of the proceeds," said Bakker. "The other money stays in the Athletic Department for things like refurbishing the weight room equipment or team supplies.

One of the biggest athletic fund-raisers at FHS in the 5K the Athletic Department holds in May. "Last year that actually brought in more money than concessions" said Bakker. "It just depends on the year and the weather."



LINDEN

Athletic boosters are just as important for the Linden High School Eagles teams. "As a result of financial constraints to our athletic department's budget, the support of the boosters has become even more important to our student-athletes and teams," according to the Linden Athletic Boosters' link on their school website.

Funds raised through the LHS boosters helped purchase a portable AED (automated external defibrillator), a new golf cart/ambulance, a training machine for wrestling, new rain suits for the boys' golf team, new uniforms and equipment for soccer and an indoor shot put ring for the track team.

The boosters added to individual team accounts through concession stand pro-

ceeds and a golf outing fundraiser. The Linden Athletic Boosters meet monthly to organize and make plans.



HOLLY

The Holly High School Bronchos have an all-sports booster club that distributes funds back to all sports, mostly through concession sales, according to Holly Athletic Director Deb VanKuiken.



Michigan-Michigan State is tops, but there are many other good athletic rivals

Rivals. All colleges have them.

What makes a good rivalry? Answering such a question isn't a precise science. Most good ones have a few qualities that create the rivalry. First, the distance between the schools can enhance any battle. The closer, the better. Second, the more evenly matched the teams, the better as well. Third, a long history is another

nice mixer. Finally, another good ingredient is what the game usually means to both teams. Does the game usually determine a league champion?

With it being college football season, we thought we'd look at some of the state's best

rivalries among other state schools (sorry Michigan and Ohio State).

A state divided -U of M vs. MSU

This is easily the state's biggest rival game. The teams first played in 1898 and have played every year since 1945. For decades, Michigan fans would be quick to mention this wasn't even their biggest rival during the course of a football season. Let's be honest, the Wolverines' fans were probably right. After all, Michigan holds a decisive 68-33-5 record advantage against the Spartans. Recognition of this fact cre-

ated what has become the most famous term used in this battle over the last decade when past Michigan player Mike Hart called the Spartans Michigan's "little brother."

However, since Hart's comment, how

life has changed. The once dominant Wolverines have become a meek program, while the Spartans are now looked upon as one of the top 10 football programs in America. Michigan State has won five of the last six games, with three of those wins by at least 14 points. The Paul Bunyan Trophy, the hardware given to the winner of the annual contest, has spent a lot of time in East Lansing lately, and Michigan fans are fed up. Now, this game is Michigan's most important on the schedule.

The Mid-American Conference's biggest rivalry — CMU vs. WMU

Being a Central Michigan University

grad, it's my favorite rivalry, and it's the unquestioned best rivalry among the Michigan MAC schools. The Chippewas and Broncos have done battle 88 times and have played consecutively since 1974. Western holds a 45-37-2 overall record against the Chippewas, but since the end of World War II, Central has the edge, earning 36 wins to Western's 28.

The GLIAC match-ups

With eight Michigan-based teams in the



gest, we'll go with the Northern Michigan vs. Michigan Tech game. Why? Both are located in the Upper Peninsula. The rivalry has been around since 1920, with the teams facing 87 times. And guess what? They've both won 41 times (five ties). You can't find a more balanced rivalry.

Another good one is the battle of the Valleys — Grand Valley State University and Saginaw Valley State. For over a decade, the student bodies have found a way to use the rivalry to compete in a charity fundraising competition, meaning many good causes also benefit from the annual

contest.

MIAA's biggest rivals don't even play football — Calvin vs. Hope

The biggest rivalry in the Division III Michigan Intercollegiate Athletic Association (MIAA) is an

easy answer. It's Calvin-Hope. Yet, Calvin doesn't even have a football team. How can this be? The Calvin-Hope men's basketball games routinely draw the largest Division III game attendances of any given season.

In fact, in 1997 the teams drew 11,447 fans to one game, a Division III record. In 2005, ESPN did a poll to find the largest college basketball rivals, and Calvin-Hope ranked fourth on the list. The schools are located about 30 miles apart and considering one of the two schools have earned at least a co-MIAA title for 34 of the last 35 years, the games always have great league title significance.

Tigers, Eagles looking for a league crown

▶Three area football teams still looking to make the playoffs

It's hard to believe, but after this upcoming weekend, the prep football regular season will be more than halfway over. Each tri-county team has four games under their belts, and it's now possible to give a sense of direction of what concrete goals each team should have for the rest of the season. It's time to look at what each team has done thus far and what their future may bring through October.

Fenton Tigers

Record: 2-0 in the Metro and 4-0 overall. What's happened so far: The Tigers entered the season as at least co-league champs each of the last three seasons and were predicted to be the league champions again this year. It looks like that prediction could happen. As week five approaches, the Tigers are tied with Linden and Flushing for the top spot in the Metro at 2-0, and three of the four Fenton victories have been decisive wins. Fenton is second in the league in scoring points (128), but it's been the Tigers' defense that has been the big story so far this year. Fenton's defense has allowed 28 points, 47 less than any other Metro team so far this year. Twice they've posted shutouts.

Rest of 2014: The Tigers will enter the final five regular season games as the favorites. The last two weeks of the season should determine the Metro title. Fenton hosts Flushing on Oct. 16 and travels to Linden on Oct. 24. Finishing 9-0 would have another perk — it should lock up at least one home game in the playoffs.

Holly Bronchos

Record: 0-2 in the Metro and 0-4 overall. What's happened so far: The Bronchos entered the 2014 season with what was expected to be a rebuilding season with many young and inexperienced faces dotting the starting lineup. Four weeks into the season, those thoughts have become true. It's fair to say the Bronchos will be the underdogs

in most, if not all, of their final five games of the seasons. Holly's greatest struggles have come on offense. Holly has scored seven or fewer points in three of their four contests so far. Until Holly figures a way to create more possession and score more points, it's going to be hard to win games.

Rest of 2014: Holly will look at the rest of this season as building toward next year. Getting a few victories down the stretch is possible, but nothing will come easy.

Lake Fenton Blue Devils

Record: 2-1 in the GAC Red and 2-2

What's happened so far: The Blue Devils entered the year as a young team, and as one might expect, Lake Fenton has been up and down. In the Blue Devils' two losses, they were outscored 69-12. In their two victories, they've outscored their foes 93-33. We should be fair. Lake Fenton has two losses, but they came against undefeated squads Freeland and Montrose. When Lake Fenton is going good, the Blue Devils are what they've been for at least a decade now — a squad heavily dependent upon their running game on offense. Defensively, the squad has struggled, allowing at least 27 points three of their first four foes.

Rest of 2014: Making the playoffs won't be easy, considering four of Lake Fenton's last five foes have either a 3-1 or a 4-0 record. Lake Fenton will be the underdog in many of those games. Success will depend on the youth gelling.

Linden Eagles

Record: 2-0 in the Metro and 3-1 overall. What's happened so far: The Eagles entered the season with a lot of talented experience coming back and were projected to finish second in the Metro. After taking some lumps against DeWitt in the season opener, the Eagles have rattled off three wins in a row and are one of the three undefeated teams in the Metro. Life hasn't been easy so far this year. Injuries are mounting, and the Linden offense hasn't looked like their usual self until a week four 48-16 victory against Swartz Creek. The defense has been strong, however, allowing 16 or fewer points every game minus the DeWitt what most would've guessed at this time. contest.

Rest of 2014: It's probably fair to say the Eagles haven't been as strong out of the gate as some expected, but when one looks at their record (3-1), that's exactly

It's a team which is gradually progressing, and remains a league champion threat. The Eagles should make the playoffs and should be in a battle for the league crown at home against Fenton on Oct. 24.

Diet can cut risk of prostate cancer

DEAR DR. ROACH:

Do you believe that lycopene, which is found in certain foods such as cooked tomatoes, can help prevent prostate cancer? — C.R.O.

ANSWER:

Lycopene, a vitamin A-like substance found in tomatoes and watermelons, was indeed thought to help prevent prostate cancer. Unfortunately, further studies failed to support this. What has been shown more substantially is that a diet of fresh fruits and vegetables helps reduce risk for and even helps treat prostate (and other) cancer. So it may be that lycopene by itself isn't enough, but that all the different healthy substances found in fruits and vegetables are. This diet certainly reduces risk of heart disease as well.

INGREDIENTS:

- 1/2 t. olive oil
- 1 lbs chicken breasts (about 2 breasts)
- the juice of 1/2 lemon
- sea salt
- freshly ground black pepper
- 4 large pita bread or your favorite wrap
- 1 1/4 cups hummus
- 4 t. za'atar (see note)
- 1 large yellow bell pepper
- 1 large green bell pepper
- 1 cup fresh cilantro leaves, chopped

NOTE:

Za'atar is a delicious Middle Eastern spice blend. You can find it in some supermarkets and in Middle Eastern stores. You can also make your own by mixing together 1 T. oregano, 1 T. sumac, 1 T. ground cumin, 1 T. sesame seeds, 1 t. kosher salt and 1 t. freshly ground black pepper.

GRILLED CHICKEN AND HUMMUS WRAPS

DIRECTIONS

- 1. Start with the chicken. Heat a grill pan over high heat with olive oil. When pan is hot, add chicken. Cook breasts for 10 to 20 minutes (depending on thickness) without moving them, then flip them using tongs and cook the other side for 10 to 20 minutes or until no longer pink inside. Remove from heat and transfer on a cutting board. Let cool slightly. Cut into chunks (size isn't very important). Drizzle with lemon juice and season with salt and pepper. Set aside.
- 2. While chicken is cooking, prepare bell peppers. Cut in half, deseed and cut into long thin stripes. Set aside.
- **3.** Spread hummus on pita bread (about 5 tbsp per pita).
- 4. Sprinkle with za'atar (1 tsp per pita).
- Add a few bell pepper stripes in the center of the pita. Add chicken chunks. Top with fresh cilantro and roll.
- 6. Cut wraps in half and serve immediately.
