Sweet corn may take a lot of fertilizer to grow, but you're unlikely to end up with any pesticides on the kernels.

Choose: There is nothing — we mean nothing like fresh corn on the cob from a local farm stand in late summer. Buy it fresh and local, and boil it that day for the best results.



Broccoli and onions don't see as many pest threats, which means less pesticide spraying.



Choose: Try not to buy broccoli if their little yellow flowers have opened. Color-wise, they should be deep green with firm stalks.

Choose: Look for onions that are firm, have a distinctive "oniony" smell that's not overpowering, and show no visible signs of damage or soft spots.

Tomatoes were on the Dirty Dozen list of foods with the most pesticide residue for years, but the latest update finds them cleaner than most. Why? The Environmental Working Group isn't sure.

Choose: If you



aren't growing your own, look for fresh in-season tomatoes at local farmers markets and farm stands. Look for glossy, firm skin.



Asparagus face fewer threats from pests, so fewer pesticides need to be used.

Choose: Look for firm spears with bright green or purplish compact tips. For more uniform cooking, select spears of a similar thickness. Store in the refrigerator vegetable crisper and give them a good rinse before using.





Maybe it's the thick skin, but eggplants are among the least likely to be contaminated by pesticides.

Choose: Look for firm and glossv eggplants to know they're ripe and undamaged. Because they grow to various sizes, choose one proportionate to the dish you're preparing.

With that rind, watermelon has a natural defense against the onslaught of any chemical.

> Choose: Look for a firm whole melon without any soft spots.


Avocados have thick skins that protect the fruit from pesticide build-up.

> Choose: Look for avocados that are still somewhat unripe and firm to the squeeze; they'll ripen nicely on your kitchen counter in a couple of days. Although you'll be using only the meat of the avocado, it's always a good idea to rinse them before you slice them open.

SWEET POTATO

Not only are sweet potatoes unlikely to be contaminated with pesticides, they're also a superfood, packed with Vitamin A and beta carotene.

Choose: It's hard to go wrong choosing a sweet potato. Just make sure it isn't beaten up or rotting, and choose a size that matches the meal you're preparing.



Four.important.letters.for.the.holidays

If you are "all dressed up with many places to go" this Christmas/New Year's season, chances are you have several holiday invitations posted on your refrigerator or in your smartphone.

Have you read the invitation carefully and followed the host's instructions for an RSVP? If not, you need to do so right away, so that they can make their plans for a memorable event, including enough food and drink for all the guests they are expecting to come.

If you have ever hosted a wedding or other special event, you have likely changed the way you handle your own RSVP etiquette with family and friends. You have experienced, first-hand, the importance of knowing how many guests to plan for, as well as the excitement of getting responses back as you "countdown the days" to your own special occasion with the thrill of knowing who's coming.

According to etiquette experts at the Emily Post Institute, people who receive an invitation for a party or special event should reply in the manner indicated on the invitation.

RSVP and no response card

Write a handwritten response to the host at the return address on the envelope. **Response card**

Fill in and reply by the date indicated and return in the enclosed envelope. **RSVP** with phone number

Telephone and make sure to speak in person – answering machines can be unreliable.

RSVP with e-mail

You may accept or decline electronically

Regrets only

Reply only if you cannot attend. If your host doesn't hear from you, he is expecting you!

No reply requested? Unusual, but it is always polite to let someone know your intentions. A phone call would be sufficient.

RSVP stands for the French phrase "Répondez, s'il vous plaît," or, "Please reply." It's on an invitation for a reason and should be responded to promptly because your hosts are telling you that they want and need to know if you will be attending. The most polite thing to do

is to reply promptly, within a day or two

of receiving an invitation or certainly in advance of the RSVP date listed. The lack of etiquette many people

show in not telling the host their plans to attend or not to attend make hosting a party a challenge — when it needn't be that difficult.

Why do some people not respond? Some people are unsure of their plans for that date, and then forget to respond altogether. Days and weeks go by and the event is "out of sight, out of mind." Some people may think that their attendance at a party will not be noticed one way or the other, when in fact, it can be very expensive to have paid a caterer for a certain number of guests and then have them be a "no show." It can also be awkward for unexpected guests to arrive, and not have enough food or drink on hand.

Even if the event is a Holiday Open House, a quick call to the host to let them know that you are pleased to have received the invitation and are planning to stop in during the open house hours will always be appreciated.

Once you have responded, can you change your mind or make a change in plans?

'A date which will live in infamy' — Pearl Harbor Remembrance Day

► World War II veterans dying at a rate of 555 per day

Seventy-three years ago today, on Dec. 7, 1941, Japanese planes attacked the United Stated Naval base at Pearl Harbor, Hawaii just before 8 a.m. According to the Library of Congress, the surprise attack, which led to the U.S. entering World War II, killed more than 2,400 Americans. Another 1,178 military and civilians were wounded.

During the attack, which lasted about two hours, the U.S.S. Arizona was destroyed and the U.S.S. Oklahoma capsized. A total of 12 ships sank or were beached in the attack and nine other vessels were damaged.

In an address to a joint session of Congress the following day, President Franklin Roosevelt called the attack "a date which will live in infamy." The United States declared war on Japan and within days, Japan's allies, Germany and Italy, declared war on the U.S.

To put that fateful event into perspective, a 20-year-old naval officer in 1941 would be 93 today.

According to the National World War II Museum, approximately every three minutes a memory of World War II — its sights and sounds, its terrors and triumphs — disappears. Yielding to the inalterable process of aging, the men and women who fought are now mostly in their 90s. They are dying quickly — at the rate of approximately 555 a day, according to U.S. Veterans Administration figures.

There are approximately 34,088 WWII veterans living in Michigan, according to the National WWII Museum.

According to etiquette expert Emily Post, changing a "yes" to a "no" is only acceptable in the event of an illness or injury, a death in the family or an unavoidable professional or business conflict. Call your hosts immediately, she advises.

Canceling your plans to attend because you receive a "better" offer is never acceptable, nor is being a "no show."

If your plans do honestly change and

you're able to say "yes" to an invitation to which you previously declined, you can make the change with a phone call, if it will not upset the hosts' arrangements.

Also, a person receiving an invitation should never ask to bring an uninvited guest with them. If a guest or date is invited (including children), that information will be extended on the invitation.

Once at the party, make sure to thank the hosts before you leave, and then again by phone or note the next day, according to Emily Post.

a wilderness area where several Indian trails came together on the White Lake Trail. Dibble was so awestruck by the beauty of this land that he enticed several families to settle here, building up a community of people in a town named "Dibbleville" that became the roots of today's Fenton.

The borders for Dibbleville at that time included the area

from South Street (today known as South Holly Road) to Roberts Street and from East Street to West Street, according to Fenton historian Ken Seger, and the official history of Fenton that is on the city's website. Its borders included a big and bustling

business district as

well as residential area, which started with just a sawmill and two small houses. Many families came to make their homes here after the land was platted in 1839.

Today, the term "Dibbleville" is used to loosely describe Fenton's downtown area (business and residential) from South Holly Road to Silver Lake Road, south to north, and from East Street to West Street. This area serves as a historical backdrop to many community events, including Jinglefest, Fenton Freedom Festival, ArtWalk and Taste in Fenton, to name just a few.

here, the term "Dibbleville" adds a quaint touch to modern-day entrepreneurs, from The Iron Grate, one of the oldest retailers downtown to Red Fox Footwear, one of the newest. In this downtown mix, you'll find everything from service businesses including restaurants and food purveyors from The Laundry to Round Town Cupcakes and the new Rough Draught (pronounced 'draft') Coffee and Bar Room in the Cornerstone building, to retailers like Sweet Variations, Billmeier Camera, Fenton Flowers & Silks and more.

Experts advise homebuyers to look beyond emotions when finalizing decision

You wouldn't likely choose to marry someone after only one date, and you should feel the same way about looking for and buying a house.

The average homebuyer checks out at least 10 homes over an eight-week search before making an offer, according to HGTV. The experts advise people to compare at least three homes before making a decision.

• **Consider a home's curb appeal.** Does the one you're looking at reflect your lifestyle and personality? If you're

laid back, you might not want a formal Victorian home. If you prefer a more contemporary style, a country ranch might not suit your taste.

• Check out the home's exterior features. A brick home is easier to maintain than a cedar shake home, for example. Is the roof in good condition? What about the foundation, windows, etc.?

• Size and floor plan. Decide how many bedrooms and bathrooms you really need, and only look at homes that meet your criteria. A large home may seem like your "dream home," but higher heating bills, taxes, maintenance re-

> sponsibilities and furnishings can quickly eat away at your home's budget.

Likewise, a cozy charming cottage may not provide enough room for your family and other interests. An extra bedroom can be used for a home office, craft room, guest room, etc.

• Look at the kitchen closely and make sure it's

a space that will work well for your family. Will an inexpensive makeover be enough to make your kitchen your own? Yes, you can remodel in the future, but that's a costly renovation. Experts suggest you not be as concerned about appliances, as they can easily be replaced.



One of the worshippers stopped to ask if I might consider writing a book to help those struggling with negative attitudes. 'I'm so negative,' he said. about everything.'



Smartphones at a smart price

Super functional phones that won't break the bank

Some smartphones, such as the Galaxy S5 by Samsung, are considered some of the best phones available, but they can be prohibitively expensive. Fortunately, this holiday season, people with tight wallets have plenty of options for phones that are both effective and affordable, with a price tag under \$300.

Perhaps the first to consider is the Motorola Moto G. Website Digital Trends listed it as one of last year's best bargain phones, which has carried over to this year. The phone has a 4.5inch touchscreen and is available for about \$180.

The main positive of the phone is its fast Snapdragon 400 processor, which runs at 1.2 GHz and has 1 GB of RAM to accompany it. Its battery life is also excellent. Normal phone use will see the Moto G going nearly three days

without charging.

The Moto G is far from perfect, however. The camera is basic, and buyers are looking at a small internal memory of either 8 or 16 GB. Still, the phone is more than worth the purchase for budget buyers not worried about taking tons of pictures.

Apple fans should consider the iPhone 4S, priced at \$150 at Sprint and Verizon. Unlike the Moto G, the 4S takes very good pictures with its 8-megapixel stills and 1080p quality videos.

A significant drawback of the 4S is the glass back. It's fragile and it means you'll probably need a case, adding cost.

Last is the OnePlus One. It is not nearly as cheap as the Moto G or the 4S, at \$300. For that price however, you get a 2.5 GHz Snapdragon processor, power on the level of the Galaxy S5. Internal storage is 16GB, which can be expanded to 64 GB for \$50 extra.

The battery life is good, though not

on the same level as the Moto G. The phone can last as much as two days if you aren't using it too often.

Of the three smartphones listed, the Moto G is perhaps the best for most needs for the cost, with the iPhone Apple well in the lead if you are looking for a phone that takes good pictures.



Breast development in men not uncommon

To your

DR. ROACH:

I am a reasonably healthy 62-yearold male. During a recent checkup, my doctor observed that I have "abnormal breast development" and suggested that I see an endocrinologist. Besides being embarrassed to take my shirt off in public, are there other reasons I should be concerned

about this? What treatment would an endocrinologist be likely to recommend? - Anon.

ANSWER:

The appearance of breast tissue in men (gynecomastia) is common, and can have several causes. KFITH ROACH, M.D. In adolescents, some transient gynecomastia is normal and usually resolves by itself. In middle-age and older men, medications (such as spironolactone,

a common diuretic), liver disease and abnormal hormone levels (both sex hormones and thyroid) are the most common causes, but much of the time, no cause can be found. Since gynecomastia in rare circumstances can be a symptom of a serious disease, and endocrinologists are commonly expert in this evaluation, I would

agree that you should get evaluated. It is important to be sure you do not have male breast cancer, and a mammogram may be to look for hormoneproducing tumors are part of the evaluation. Treatment is of any underlying cause that may be found. If no cause is found, many






