

CARROT

Consider adding carrots to your diet. A study out of the Netherlands found that carrots are one of the best vegetables to fight against



Carrots are best raw or steamed. They make a great snack or side dish. Slice some carrots up and add them to your salad or soup.

CUCUMBER

Not all cucumbers are created equal. There are two basic types; pickling cucumbers are meant to be turned into pickles and slic-

ing cucumbers are meant to be eaten fresh. Cucumbers are related to the squash family and melon family. Cucumbers have three lignans, chemical compounds high in antioxidants that are believed to fight several cancer types.

Slice up some fresh cucumber for salads or eat them alone.

CABBAGE

Kristen Steele and Cortney Gwaltney have been friends since the seventh-grade at Fenton Middle School, and 25 years later, have created an even stronger bond through the doors of two local businesses, The Retreat Salon & Skin Spa and The Yoga Retreat & Boutique.

These women didn't grow up dreaming about being in business together; in fact, their professional lives took them in two different directions, Gwaltney as a pharmaceutical rep and Steele as a hair stylist.

When Gwaltney missed a chance to open a medical spa for local physicians she knew professionally, she regretted not jumping at that opportunity. A chance comment from her husband, Kevin, "Why can't you do it now?" led her to turn to her long-time friend, Kristen. "We went for a long car ride and talked about it," said Gwaltney. Within 24 hours, Kristen called me back and said, 'Let's do it!"

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▶There are no quick fixes, but 'slow and steady' will win your race to a better credit score

With lower interest rates on conventional mortgages and FHA monthly mortgage insurance, it's pretty tempting to buy a home right now or refinance your current home.

However, in order to take advantage of these new rates, you have to make sure your credit is up to par to qualify for these new rates and programs.

"To qualify for an FHA loan, you have to have a credit score of at least 620," said Lori Rock, mortgage manager for Dort Federal Credit Union, with an office in Fenton Township. "A conventional 30-year mortgage also takes a 620 credit score, but as a credit union, we'll look at lower scores on a case-by-case basis."

Time is your best ally when it comes to repairing your credit. The best advice for rebuilding credit is to manage it responsibly over time, according to myficoscore.



To help with the frustration of applying for a mortgage or refinancing your home, be vigilant with monitoring your credit card accounts and any other bills that could potentially affect your credit score. Financial lenders suggest checking credit reports regularly to make sure everything is accurate.

com. If you haven't done that, then you need to repair your credit history before you see credit score improvement.

HERE ARE A FEW THINGS YOU CAN DO RIGHT NOW TO GET STARTED.

• Check your credit report. You can get one free credit report from each of the three major credit bureaus (TransUnion, Equifax and Experian) once every 12 months from annualcreditreport.com. Check it for errors on all your accounts and report any errors to the credit bureau and reporting agency.

• Pay your bills on time. Your payment history contributes 35 percent to your credit score. The good news is that older credit problems count for less, so the longer you pay your bills on time after

being late, the more your credit score will increase.

• Set up payment reminders, so you make your credit payments on time. Some banks offer reminders through their online banking portals that can send you an email or text when a

payment is due. You can also consider enrolling in automatic payments through your credit card and loan providers, but this only makes the minimum payment on your credit card.

• Reduce the amount of debt that you owe. Stop using your credit cards and determine from your credit report how much you owe on each account and at what interest rate. High outstanding debt will affect your credit score. Keep balances low for a better debt-to-income ratio.

According to Rock at Dort Federal Credit Union any delinquency or judgment needs to be taken care of before you can apply for a mortgage. "FHA requires them to be paid off," she said. "The more you pay off and wait over time, the better your score."

> Hold off on any major purchases once you apply for a mortgage. Lenders re-check your credit before closing, and if your credit report reveals additional or new debts, this could stop the closing. Avoid financing a new car, buying home appli-

ances or furniture with a credit card or co-signing someone else's loan.

In general, having credit cards and installment loans (and making on-time payments) will rebuild your credit score. Someone with no credit cards tends to be considered higher risk than someone who has managed credit cards responsibly.

Whatever the season, it's still important for home sellers/ buyers to gather as much information as possible

Snow and ice may cover the roof, the driveway and sidewalks, but that's no excuse to skip one of the homebuyer's most accurate tools for gauging the condition of a house they hope to buy.

Whatever the season, it's a smart financial move to have a home inspection

done if you have a real estate transaction in your future. As a seller, knowing the condition of your property prior to listing will help you determine a fair price. As a buyer, it can help you avoid costly sur-

prises down the road. It may also serve as a negotiating tool that could result in a reduction in the price of a property.

spections are very important, especially for major issues like roofs, foundations, etc., according to John Wentworth of Re/ MAX Platinum in Fenton. "Buyers do need guidance through an inspection so they aren't alarmed by issues that aren't really that big. Choose a home inspector that is not an alarmist with words or pricing. An inspector should give the results of the findings, not offer a cost for repairs which may or may not be accurate."

Mark Mustola, owner of ValueCheck Home Inspections in Fenton Township

for 22 years, said that the majority of prospective homebuyers do opt for a home inspection of the property they hope to buy. "The homebuyer has the right to have a home inspection," he said. " A Realtor often

recommends an inspector they have successfully worked with before, and the buyer is the one who pays for it."

From a Realtor perspective, home in-

Winter presents its challenges for home inspections, but they are still worthwhile tools for assessing whether a property is a sound investment.

He says that the biggest things people are concerned about when looking at a house's condition are the roof and basement water seepage.

"The roof is second only to septic systems as the most expensive repair in a house, and not everyone has a septic system to worry about," he said. "People always want to know about possible water in the basement, as many people have plans for using the basement as living space."

Winter presents a special challenge for roof inspections, with snow and ice often covering the shingles, flashing, etc. "When it's nice out, I like to walk the roof," said Mike Cemazar of Cemazar Home Inspections in Fenton. "I can't do that in the winter. However, I can document in your report that I couldn't get up on the roof, but did look at photos from other seasons to see the condition of the shingles, etc. I can also look in the attic and if it's wet or moist, you know the roof has an issue."

Snow and ice build-up also affect an inspector's ability to check on the grad-

ing of the soil away from the home, the foundation, driveways, sidewalks, underneath porches and decks. It's also not a time inspectors can check on termites or other insect infestations. "Every season has its challenges, when it comes to home inspections," said Cemazar. One of the advantages of a winter home inspection is that a home inspector can more easily detect drafts, energy leaks, insulation, etc.

"We also can't check whether the air conditioning actually works by turning it on if it's less than 60 degrees outside,' said Mustola. "We might damage it by turning the actual unit on. But we can still look at it, knowing its size, brand name and age, all of which will provide valuable information. We can also reference the National Association of Home Builders building components' life expectancy chart to see what a homebuyer might likely expect down the road for repair or replacement."

Mustola said it's still better to learn about the 80 percent of the home that is accessible for a home inspection during the winter.

BEER-SOAKED CHILI CHEESE FRIES

1. Place the fries and salt in a large mixing bowl, pour over the beer, and then fill the bowl with water until the fries are completely submerged. Soak in the refrigerator for at least two hours, but preferably overnight.

Cook Time:

35 mins

- 2. Preheat oven to 425 degrees. Drain the fries, rinse thoroughly, and then pat dry.
- 3. Whisk together the oil, paprika, and garlic powder in a large mixing bowl, add in the fries, and toss to coat. Spread the fries out on a large baking sheet, making sure fries are only in one layer.
- 4. Bake in preheated oven for 20-25 minutes, flipping once halfway through baking. The fries will be golden brown on the outside, and soft and tender on the inside
- 5. Meanwhile, begin preparing the chili by browning the ground beef in a medium-size saucepan over medium-high heat. Add in the onion and garlic and cook until just fragrant and tender, about five minutes.
- 6. Add in the diced tomatoes with chiles, salsa, chili powder, cumin, water, beans, salt and pepper. Bring to a boil, reduce heat and simmer for 15-20 minutes.
- 7. To assemble the fries, preheat the broiler. Pile the fries in the middle of a baking sheet, spoon on the chili (you might not need it all), and then sprinkle with cheddar cheese. Place under broiler for 2-3 minutes, or just until the cheese is melted. Top with sliced green onions and serve.

Patient fights doctor's advice

DR. ROACH:

I am 95 now and take no medications. My primary-care doctor wants me to take aspirin, even just the baby aspirin, twice a week. Some of the supplements I take do have bloodthinning characteristics, and for that reason I am fighting the aspirin recommendation. In general, is it OK to refuse the recommendation of one's doctor? — F.V.

ANSWER:

It is your body, and you have every right to make decisions about your treatment. However, you should be very circumspect about overruling your doctor, and you should be doing so for very good reasons. Your doctor has the obligation to tell you why he or she is recommending a treatment and what the downsides are from not

taking it. You, on the other hand, are obliged to tell your doctor the truth. In your case, it sounds like you don't want to take the aspirin because you feel the supplements you are taking have a similar effect to aspirin. Very few supplements, if any, have been studied as well as aspirin has. Aspirin has a clear risk of side effects, especially bleeding, but most evidence shows that it reduces the risk of heart attack more than it increases the risk of bleeding. It also might reduce


cancer risk. The higher the risk of heart disease, the better aspirin is, in terms of risks versus benefits. At 95, your risk for heart attack is higher than a 50-year-old's, and so it would be expected to have more benefit than harm. So while I agree with your doctor to take it, I also respect your decision not to. Be sure you discuss your supplements with your

Hugh Stanley Powlison - Huanta, Peru with a new age 87, was called Home on January 24, 2015. Hugh was born to Kenneth and Pansy (Fitch) Powlison, missionaries in Bolivia, on

November 26, 1927. His father died of typhoid when Hugh was only seven, and when he was nine, his mother and siblings left Bolivia, taking

up residence at the Westervelt Home in Batesburg, SC. Here he earned his high school degree in 1944 and degrees from Summerland Junior Bible College (1947) and Columbia Bible College (1950). He married Berenice Johnson, also a CBC graduate, on February 10, 1952. Additional studies included pre-med, linguistics, and electronics. He gained experience as a transmitter engineer with WCOS Radio and TV Station and with the installation of WOIC Radio Station in Columbia, SC before moving with Berenice and son, Paul (1954) to Los Angeles to serve as a studio technician with Gospel Recordings. During the California years, Keith (1956), Reina (1960), and Valerie (1962) joined the family. Hugh's employment/service positions and activities included secretary/treasurer for Bolivian Indian Mission, studio technician at Mission Aides, production of foreign language records for the American Bible Society, assistance in building Pasadena Christian Schools' campus, and, finally, engineering aide at Consolidated Systems Corporation, where he was involved in cutting-edge engineering and tech-nology. In 1964, Hugh's life-long dream of foreign missionary service began to realize, and in 1965, transmitter and generator for Radio Amauta, a small gospel radio station. In 1968, he and the family moved there where

he served as radio engineer until 1973. Thus began more than thirty years of missionary service in Peru, Guatemala, Ecuador, and Honduras before retiring in South

Carolina. 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
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
