Cardiac disease kills more women than all cancers combined

Many women do not realize that as they age, they become more likely to develop heart disease. An upcoming discussion at the Loose Center in Linden is designed to alert women 65 and over to their increased risk

and over to their increased risk and provide resources to fight it. Teams from Brookdale Se-

nior Living Solutions in the area are also fanning out to visit women in their homes this month to alert them to the problem and ways to combat it. The local discussion and home

visits are part of a nationwide Brookdale initiative called "10,000 Heart to Hearts," which seeks to reach 10,000 senior women across the country. The 10,000 Heart to Hearts program is taking place during American Heart Month.

A "10,000 Heart to Hearts" discussion will be held from 10:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. this Monday, Feb. 23 at the Loose Senior Citizen Center at 707 North Bridge Street in Linden.

Staff and clinicians from Clare Bridge of Grand Blanc will discuss heart-healthy foods, exercise and measures for healthier lifestyles. They will also provide Brookdale's heart-healthy cookbook and assist the public with additional resources. Topics will include the importance of stopping smoking, eating a diet low in saturated fats, exercising moderately for half an hour a day, limiting alcohol consumption and maintaining a body mass index under 25. Watching television for no more than seven hours a week is also associated with better cardiac health.

"Cardiac disease kills more women than all cancers combined, but a lot of older women don't realize how dangerous it is," said Kevin O'Neil, M.D., F.A.C.P., Brookdale's chief medical officer. On average, women develop

heart disease 10 years later than men do, with their first heart attack occurring at the age of 70. This cardiac disease risk begins rising during menopause, when the body reduces production of estrogen, a hormone believed to benefit the arteries. By their 70s, most women have high blood pressure.

"Aging makes it harder to cope with the impact of cardiac disease," said Dr. O'Neil. "Three-quarters of senior women who survive heart attacks are not able to resume their normal lives. However, women can dramatically reduce their cardiac risk regardless of their age by embracing healthy habits." He noted that a study recently published in the Journal of the American College of Cardiology shows lifestyle changes can reduce a woman's likelihood of heart disease by 90 percent.

"Our goal is to have a candid, heartto-heart discussion with women about the importance of the issue and help them take the steps needed to address it," June Nadolny said.

There are high fives, cheering parents, and a lot of confidence-building going on. "We're teaching sportsmanship instead of winning," said coach and parent Lisa Deering.

This is true, but the girls seem to love it when they win also.

If you're reading this on Saturday, there's a good chance there's an Upward Basketball game, or several games, happening near your community. Games take place from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. The program is currently in the middle of its season.

Nearby, there are four churches that host league play. Tyrone Covenant

Presbyterian in Tyrone Township, Fenton United Methodist Church in Fenton, Linden Free Methodist Church in Linden and The River Church in Holly all host Upward Basketball.

Upward Sports is a Christian-based program that also includes baseball,

CHILDREN'S DENTISTRY FIRST DENTAL VISIT

Parents of young children often ask me at what age they should bring their son or daughter into the dental office for the first time. When I was in dental school at the University of Michigan we were taught that the best time to see kids for the first time was age 3. By age 3 the child was usually mature enough to "cooperate with the dental team and he or she could have regular preventative dental cleaning. The problem has always been that sometimes by age 3 major dental problems have already developed necessitating major dental treatment With this in mind The American Pediatric Dental Association recently came out with new recommendations. The new recommended age for a child's first dental visit is age 1. Age 1 dental visit's, what we like to call in our office, "well-baby check-ups", are very important. Realistically, we are not going to be able to do a full dental cleaning with x-rays on a 1 year old but I am able to determine that all the teeth are developing normally and can catch problems very early, well before any major trouble. Just as importantly, this gives me and my team an opportunity to educate mom and dad about proper dental care for their child. Dental office fears and phobias in adults are very common and can be so extreme that a person will avoid going to the dentist all together. This can lead to major dental problems and poor oral and overall health. When I question these people about their dental fears they almost always relate some traumatic childhood experience that has scarred them for life. I am committed to ensure that the children I see will not suffer this same fate. By seeing kids early in their life before major dental problems I am helping them to maintain good dental health and avoid dental fears. Age 1 dental visit's, is key to a long and healthy life with good teeth.

His pediatric specialties include genetic syndromes, behavioral pediatrics and sports medicine.

Paul Chrenka, M.D., 48, became a doctor because he likes helping people, and enjoys learning and problem solving. He is fascinated by the dynamics of childhood development, and the fun of interacting with babies, kids and teens.

Mike Cemazar, 50, of Tyrone Township, doesn't take life sitting down. When he's not patrolling the streets of Ann Arbor as a full-time police officer or attending court when required, he's inspecting homes as owner of Cemazar Home Inspectors or teaching a class. As a father of six in a blended family, he spends many hours driving his teen daughter to dance events and 12-year-old son to basketball as part of Flint's Finest Basketball Program. He's a busy guy.... Which is busier, your job as a police officer or your job as owner of your own home inspection company?

They both keep me busy, but my main responsibility is my work as a police officer. I've been a police officer for 27 years, the last 18 in Ann Arbor. I work the long shift, from 7 p.m. to 7 a.m., six times in a two-week period, plus one eight-hour shift. It gives me a lot of time to do home inspections, too. I'd estimate I work about 55 to 60 hours a week with both jobs.

What do you like best about being a police officer? I like the freedom of being able to get in my car and go. I'm not an in-the-office kind of guy. They put a lot of trust in me. I've been shot during a bank robbery in the city. There's an unknown risk every time I go to work. I try not to think about that every day.

What is the biggest misconception people have about police officers? That we have ticket quotas to meet (we don't) and that we eat doughnuts all the time. There can be 20 people in a doughnut shop, and they'll always single us out.

What's the worst part of your job?

Seeing people killed. I lost a very good friend in the line of duty. I've been shot at. It's hard today with the labels people put on us, especially the media. People have changed in the 27 years since I've been an officer. They've lost the trust and respect

for police officers. It's sad. What do you think about body cams? They're definitely coming. It used to be my word against theirs. Now, it's all on

my word against theirs. Now, it's all on a wire.

How did you get into the home inspection business? I've been doing it for 12 years. I thought it was a good way to make extra income. No one's going to hand you anything in life. You've got to earn it. I work for about 25 real estate agents and go all over this part of the state. I do about 160 a year. You have to be very selfdedicated to be a good home inspector and you better know exactly what you're doing and what the boundaries are. It's a good fit with being a cop. I also teach a home inspections class for Grand Blanc and Brighton community ed programs.

Your kids keep you busy, too, I bet. My wife, Julie, works full time as manager at FirstMerit Bank in Holly, so I do a lot of running with our youngest two, Emily, 15, and Michael, 12. She dances with Broadway (Dance Academy) and he plays in Flint's Finest. It's a ton of running around. We travel all over, especially in the sum-

mer with Gus Macker tournaments. I'm excited we'll have one in Linden this summer.

What's something most people don't know about you? I played Triple A Hockey for Little Caesar's in high school, and lived at the dorms at Cranbrook. I also played junior hockey at EMU. Not anymore, I'm too busy.



Q: My 2002 Chevy Impala 3400 V6 is making a squealing noise near the front of the engine when i start the car. When I shut the car off it continues to squeal for about 10-15 seconds before running down and shutting off. I think the sound is coming from the fan but I'm not sure. - Ridge

A Victor, This happens quite often and is usually caused by the tires being worn differently from front to back. When you rotate them the noise will generally go away after some driving, but if the wear pattern is excessive it may not go away and might indicate that you need a front end alignment.

The 2014 event, hosted by comedian Ellen DeGeneres, was the biggest audience for the

original branches: actors, directors, producers, technicians and writers. The Oscar was originally made out of gold-plated bronze. Today, they're manufactured from a metal mixture called britannium and plated in gold.

Oscar winners are not able to sell their "golden guy" for a profit. Since 1950, recipients have been required to sign an agreement promising that neither they nor their heirs will sell their statuette without first offering it back to the Academy for \$1.

How is Best Picture selected by the Academv of Motion Pictures Arts & Sciences?

The 6,292 voting members of the Academy are asked to rank the movies in order of preference. Ballots are collected by the Tuesday before the Oscars at 5 p.m. at PricewaterhouseCooper's office in downtown Los Angeles, when staffers print out the ballots completed online and add them to the paper ballots.

Two accountants sort the ballots based on members' #1 votes. They eliminate the movies with the fewest first-place votes, giving these votes to each ballot's second rated film. The process continues, the smallest stacks eliminated, and votes redistributed to the next choice down until one movie has at least 50 percent-plus-one of the vote. The only people who know the winning names are these two accountants, who are sworn to secrecy until the awards show five days later.

In addition to watching the Oscars, technology provides additional complements to the show itself. Oscar content for this year will include The Oscars Backstage on the WATCH ABC app, presented by Samsung Galaxy. Fans can select from three channels that will pull from more than 20 live cameras strategically placed on the Red Carpet and throughout the backstage areas of the Dolby Theatre, providing fans with insider views to the most memorable moments of the night.

In addition, the 10th annual Jimmy Kimmel Live: After the Oscars will air Sunday at 12:05 a.m., featuring viral comedy bits and guest appearances by Oprah Winfrey, Tom Cruise, Kevin Spacey, Ellen DeGeneres, Meryl Streep, Tom Hanks, Jon Stewart, Ben Affleck, Jamie Foxx, Channing Tatum, and Robert Downey Jr., to name just a few.

DEAR AUNT:

I agree that it is rude and hurtful. I agree with your husband that you should express yourself now. Simply say, 'I have a nagging question I hope you can help answer. Why is it that you and the kids never include my name on any family invitations or announcements?' Listen to her explanation and respond, 'I want you to know that it bothers me. I consider myself very much

a part of the family. I do all of the card buying and gift giving for John and me. I love all of my nieces and nephews, and think it would be great if you could keep that in mind.'

Sleep medications linked to falls

DR. ROACH:

You've discussed sleep aids and your belief that it is best to get off all of this type of medication. I am healthy, 75 (take no meds), exercise with weights, do swimming and running regularly, and since 2007 have been taking an over-the-counter sleep aid called doxylamine nightly with no apparent side effects. Do you see a problem with continuing? — A.B.

ANSWER:

Unfortunately, I do see a problem. Odds are that you won't have a problem taking this medication; it's cheap and is effective for you. However, there is unequivocal, abundant, incontrovertible evidence that antihistamines like doxylamine or diphenhydramine increase fall risk. If you drive, they increase accident risk. They



also can cause confusion. Although the benefit to you from quitting is small, if I can get enough people to minimize their sleep medications, I know I will prevent some falls. Falls are so often the first step in a progression from health to disability that I want to do all I can to prevent them. Adequate lighting in the house at nighttime, especially between the bedroom and bathroom, avoiding obstructions like area rugs and the addition of stairway railings and tub grab

bars all help reduce fall risk. Exercise programs

- like the kind you are doing, but also tai chi are great at preventing falls. So is getting your eyes checked. No single one of these interventions can prevent all falls. All of them together will prevent many. Your medication list, even a simple over-the-counter sleeping aid, is the best place to start looking to reduce risk of falls.

- 1 T. olive oil
- 2 lbs. chicken, in 1-inch pieces
- 4 c. chicken broth (or water) • 1 (12 oz.) package egg noodles
- 4 cloves garlic, minced • 1 (14.5 oz.) can diced tomatoes
- 2 (14.5 oz.) cans crushed tomatoes
- 1 T. Italian seasoning
- Salt and pepper, to taste
- 2 c. shredded mozzarella
- 1 c. panko bread crumbs
- 1 t. Italian seasoning
- 2 t. olive oil

DIRECTIONS

- **1.** Heat olive oil in a large skillet over medium heat. Add chicken, and cook until no longer pink. Remove chicken to a plate.
- 2. Add chicken broth to skillet, and heat until boiling. Add egg noodles, and cook until al dente. While noodles are cooking, preheat oven to 350 F.
- 3. When noodles are al dente, add garlic, diced tomatoes with juice, crushed tomatoes, seasoning, and salt and pepper. Add chicken, and stir to combine.
- 4. Remove from heat, and top with mozzarella. Toss bread crumbs with seasoning, and sprinkle over cheese. Drizzle olive oil over bread crumbs.
- 5. Bake for about 10 minutes, or until cheese has melted.
