TAHQUAMENON FALLS STATE PARK

In Paradise, Michigan, stretching across 48,000 acres, the Tahquamenon River runs off into the middle of the park, where two waterfalls are located. The water runs off into the Upper Falls, with a drop of 50 feet and more than 200 feet across, and then the Lower Falls, a series of five falls which aren't as big. This state park, the second biggest in Michigan, has more than 40 miles of hiking trails, and is popular for camping, fishing and canoeing.

LELAND

Located between Lake Michigan and Lake Leelanau on the Leelanau Peninsula, Leland is known for its beautiful scenery around the water. MANITOU ISLANDS

Both are popular for hiking, swimming and camping. The north island is a wilderness area, except for one village. It's great for solitude and backpacking.

South Manitou Island is home to Manitou Passage State Underwater Preserve, where over 50 known shipwrecks rest. Ferries travel from Leland to the islands.

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Memorial Day 2015

Facts about Memorial Day

1. It started with the Civil War

Memorial Day was a response to the unprecedented carnage of the Civil War, in which some 620,000 soldiers on both sides died. The loss of life and its effect on communities throughout the country led to spontaneous commemorations of the

2. General Logan made it official

May 5, 1868, Logan issued General Order No. 11, which set aside May 30, 1868 "for the purpose of strewing with flowers, or otherwise decorating the graves of comrades who died in defense of their country during the late rebellion.



The orders expressed hope that the observance would be "kept up from year to year while a survivor of the war remains to honor the memory of his departed comrades.'

3. It was first known as **Decoration Day**

The holiday was long known as Decoration Day for the practice of decorating graves with flowers, wreaths, and flags. The name Memorial Day goes back to



1882, but the older name didn't disappear until after World War II. Federal law declared "Memorial Day" the official name in 1967. In 1971, the Monday Holiday Law shifted Memorial Day from May 30 to the last Monday of the month.

4. It was James Garfield's finest hour

Of course then it was still called Decoration Day, and at the time, Garfield was a Civil War General and Republican Congressman, not yet a President. On May 30, 1868, he addressed the several thousand people gathered at Arlington National Cemetery.
"If silence is ever golden," Garfield said, "it must be beside the graves of 15,000 men, whose lives were more significant than speech, and whose death was a poem the music of which can never be sung."

5. The 'Unknown Soldier' is no longer unknown

Unknown soldiers from World War II and the Korean War subsequently were interred in the tomb on Memorial Day 1958.

An emotional President Ronald Reagan presided over the interment of six bones, the remains of an unidentified Vietnam War soldier, on Nov. 28, 1984. Fourteen years later, those remains were disinterred, no longer unknown. Spurred by an investigation by CBS News, the defense department removed the remains from the Tomb of the Unknowns for DNA testing.

The once-unknown fighter was Air Force pilot Lt. Michael Joseph Blassie, whose jet crashed in South Vietnam in 1972. Lt. Blassie was reburied near his hometown



of St. Louis. His crypt at Arlington remains permanently empty.

6. Vietnam vets go whole hog

On Memorial Day weekend in 1988, 2,500 motorcyclists

rode into Washington, D.C. for the first Rolling Thunder rally to draw attention to Vietnam War soldiers still missing in action or prisoners of war. By 2002, the ride had swelled to 300,000 bikers, many of them veterans. A national veterans rights group, Rolling Thunder takes its name from the B-52 carpet-bombing runs during the war in Vietnam.

7. Memorial Day has its customs

General Orders No. 11 stated that "in this observance, no form of ceremony is prescribed," but over time several customs and symbols became associated with the holidav.

It is customary on Memorial Day to fly the flag at half staff until noon, and then raise it to the top of the staff until sunset.

In December 2000, Congress passed a law requiring Americans to pause at 3 p.m. local time on Memorial Day to remember and honor the fallen. But this doesn't appear to be common knowledge, or if it is, by 3 p.m. most people seem to be too deep into a hot dog-induced food coma to officially observe the moment.

8. There is still a gray **Memorial Day**

Several Southern states continue to set aside a day for honoring the Confederate dead, which is usually called Confederate Memorial Day. Texas, South Carolina, North

Tradition, honor, and dignity are the hallmarks of a military funeral. While most of the ceremonial aspects are usually performed at the grave site, an honor guard may be present and have some part in the funeral itself. The most important elements of the service are standard. whether the service member died while on active duty, was honorably discharged, retired, whether he or she attained the rank of admiral or was newly enlisted.

Here are the elements you are likely to see at a military grave site service held at a national cemetery:

- The flag-draped casket arrives at the cemetery by hearse or horse-drawn caisson.
- A six-man honor guard carries the casket to the grave site.
- The chaplain or pastor (if applicable) reads a committal service.
- The honor guard lifts and holds the American flag taut over the casket.
- The seven-person firing party fires three volleys. A spent shell may be picked up and later tucked into the folded memorial flag.
 - A bugler sounds "Taps."
- The honor guard ceremonially folds the American flag.
- The highest ranking officer presents the folded flag to the family with a brief statement of gratitude and a salute.

Members of the Fenton Beautification Commission are getting ready to

plaster the city with a riot of color, and they're hoping many volunteers show up for the "2nd Annual Fenton Community Planting Day."

The event will be held on Saturday, May 30. Because of the ongoing downtown Streetscape construction, volunteers are asked to meet this year at 9 a.m. in the parking lot behind city hall.

According to Beautification Commission Chair Dawn Overmyer, coffee and doughnuts will be available. Volunteers don't really need to bring anything except some gardening gloves and a small shovel, if they have one. There will be extra shovels available.

This year, the group will be planting 19 pots and 10 flowerbeds at

Fenton City Hall, the police and fire departments, at the gazebo, O'Donnell Park, Freedom Park, the museum, and for the first time, the library.

Again, because of the downtown construction, the bridge boxes will be coming off, Overmyer said. "Once the construction project moves further north on LeRoy, and if there's time, we will put the boxes back up and plant them," she added.

Last year, 33 volunteers showed up to help plant. "It only took two hours," Overmyer said.

They are hoping that many more will come out to volunteer this year. "It's a fun time," she added. "All of the volunteers are great."

All of the flowers planted come from Gerych's Distinctive Flowers & Gifts in Fen-

"They help us in so many ways," said Overmyer of Gerych's. One way they help is by providing maps and instructions on how to plant the

"The flowers we get from them are beautiful," said Overmyer. "There is nothing skimpy about them."

Overmyer is praying for good weather. "It would really have to be nasty for us not to plant," she said. "We will plant even if it is

raining." In the event the weather does prevent

the planting day to occur, they will likely do the planting the following weekend, Overmyer said.

Senate Bill 3: Repeal "prevailing wage" law

To repeal the state "prevailing wage" law, which prohibits awarding government contracts to contractors who submit the lowest bid unless the contractor pays wages based on pay scales that local union officials represent as prevalent in a particular area, but which tend to be above the market rate. Senate Bill 1 would repeal the law for schools, and passed by the same margin. The Senate added a modest appropriation, which has the effect of making the bill not subject to a referendum.

House Bill 4163: Ease residential lift licensure restrictions

To permit a licensed residential homebuilder to install residential stairway lifts without being subjected to the much more rigorous licensure provisions that apply to elevator contractors. The residential contractor would have to carry \$2 million in liability insurance and be certified by the manufacturer of the lifts, which are one-story stair-climbing machines for elderly or handicapped individuals.

Senate Bill 165: Authorize pedalpowered beer bars

To establish in statute that a "commercial quadricycle," which is a pedal-powered mobile beer bar, is not considered a "motor vehicle" even if it has auxiliary power, and instead would be subject to much less onerous regulations. Under this and Senate Bill 166, passengers would be allowed to have open beer or wine containers, but the driver would be required to have a blood alcohol level of zero.

Tempura Asparagus:

- 15-20 asparagus stalks, cut and
- 1 cup flour
- 1 tablespoon cornstarch
- 1½ cups club soda
- 1 teaspoon sesame oil (optional)
- vegetable oil for frying
- sea salt for sprinkling

Wasabi Ranch:

- 1 cup ranch dressing
- 2 teaspoons wasabi paste

(Wasabi powder mixed with water)

Instructions Asparagus Tempura:

- Fill a large, metal pot with about 4 inches of vegetable oil. Heat on medium-high heat until the oil reaches a temperature of 375°. Using a kitchen thermometer, make sure the oil remains at 375° during the frying process.
- In a bowl combine the flour, cornstarch, club soda and sesame oil (if using). Mix well. The batter will be slightly lumpy. Coat 3-4 pieces of asparagus at a time in the batter. Drop carefully into the hot oil. Fry for a minute to a minute in a half. Remove the asparagus from the oil with a slotted spoon and drain onto a paper towel-lined plate. Sprinkle with salt immediately. Repeat with remaining asparagus.

Wasabi Ranch:

• Combine ranch and wasabi paste in a bowl. Whisk together well. Serve with the fried asparagus.

Does MSG deserve its reputation

DEAR DR. ROACH:

I have been using MSG on my

food as a flavor enhancement about all of my life. Some of my health-conscious friends say that using MSG is like putting "rat poison" on your food. I respond by saying putting salt on your food is worse than putting MSG on it. Does MSG deserve its bad reputation? — K.T.



ANSWER: Some people have a sensitivity to monosodium glutamate, an amino acid normally present in

food that is used as a flavor enhancer. Symptoms can include headache, muscle aches, nausea and other symptoms. It is particularly well-absorbed in liquid form, such as soups, especially those in Asian restaurants. If you don't have a sensitivity to MSG, it is a very safe food additive. It does have some sodium, but in the usual amounts used, does not deserve its reputation.

Camping with your Dog(s)



DEAR PAW'S CORNER:

We've been invited on a camping trip with several other families. We don't have kids, but our dogs "Sarah" and "Jake" are like kids to us. Is it OK to bring them along? — Frank J

DEAR FRANK




Here are three questions you must ask in order to determine whether you can bring along Sarah and Jake:

- 1. Does the campsite allow pets?
- 2. Are the other families OK with you bringing pets?
- 3. Are Sarah and Jake well socialized to children and to other pets?

While many state and federal parks allow pets at campsites, others don't. Some have specific restrictions, such as, pets are allowed at campsites but not in certain areas of the park where there's an ecological risk. Check the campsite or park's website for specific rules about pets. Also, check the park's safety advisories: Are you camping in bear country, or are other hazards present? Second, since it's your first time camping with this group, ask the other campers if they are comfortable with pets coming along. It's up to you to make sure they are well behaved and will swiftly obey your commands when offleash. If everything checks out, then start planning. Make sure Sarah and Jake have their needs met — food, toys, leashes. Bring sweaters and booties just in case. Carry cleanup bags and a large trash bag for disposal at the campsite. At night they will need to be kept in the tent or in a portable kennel.

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
