A 'MARVEL'-OUS LINEUP OF **SUDUES UDA**

Three of this summer's top movies feature action greats

vhogan@tctimes.com; 810-433-6823 Action hero favorites will dominate the silver screen this summer as three of Marvel Comics' greatest are featured.

"Avengers: Age of Ultron," rated PG-13, was released on May 1 and remains a popular pick for this summer.

According to rottentomatoes.com, the story begins when Tony Stark jumpstarts a dormant peacekeeping program, and things go awry and Earth's mightiest heroes, including Iron Man, Captain America, Thor, The Incredible Hulk, Black Widow and Hawkeye, are put to the ultimate test as they battle to save the planet from destruction at the hands of the villainous Ultron.

Critics say the "Exuberant and eye-popping, Avengers: Age of Ultron serves as an overstuffed but mostly satisfying sequel, reuniting its predecessor's unwieldy cast with a few new additions and a worthy foe.

"Ant Man," which has not yet been rated, opens in theaters on July 17. The next

evolution of the Marvel Cinematic Universe brings a founding member of The Avengers to the big screen for the first time. Armed with the astonishing ability to shrink in scale but increase in strength, master thief Scott Lang must embrace his inner-hero and help his mentor. See MOVIES on 5B

Notice is hereby given that the City of Fenton Zoning Board of Appeals will hold a public hearing at 7:00 p.m., or as soon thereafter as the matter may be heard, on Tuesday, June 23, 2015 for the purpose of considering the variance requests below for Fenton Greenhouse at 130 Alloy Drive, Tax ID #53-34-526-032. The property is located on the west side of Alloy Drive, just south of Fenway Circle, and is zoned IND, Industrial, were medical marihuana growing facilities are special land uses.

- 1. A variance from Section 36-21.05(d), Design standards, of the zoning ordinance to allow a detention basin to be located in a front yard when the ordinance requires that it be located outside required setbacks; and

taco, with seasoned beer batter, Colby jack cheese, pico de gallo, spicy southwest sour cream sauce, cilantro, with locally grown sweet pea microgreens.

Moilanen likes making food that defies expectations. The tacos match the diverse culture, with customers ranging from students to people of different ethnicities. "That's what I love about Flint. It's such a diverse and vibrant community," he said.

Moilanen is passionate about supporting local farms. Starting this weekend, Vehicle City Tacos will have a place at the Flint Farmers Market every Saturday for the rest of the summer.

"I think a big problem with society is we're really disconnected from knowing where our food comes," he said. Food often travels hundreds of miles to get from a farm to a home. They work with a number of different vendors at the Flint Farmers Market and buy directly from local places, like the Flint River Farm.

Moilanen thinks the food is better with locally grown ingredients and people have "more peace of mind actually knowing where the food is coming from."

Flint has experienced an increase in community gardens, which Moilanen supports.

People often think running a food truck is easy, Moilanen said, but that's not true. "There are all sorts of things you don't know until you actually run a food truck. Water is a challenge," Moilanen said. The business relies on generators and they have longer hours than people think.

"Alot of people think

it looks easier," he said. Acquiring food also depends on seasonal availability. Location can also be an issue because the business is mobile.

> He said people will call to find the truck's location. Preparing for an event takes six hours.

> The business officially started last year in July, but the idea was conceived a few years ago. They received a grant from the Michigan Economic Development Corpora-

tion to start the taco truck. Since they've opened, there hasn't been a shortage of people asking them to cater events.

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

"Fantastic Four," also not yet rated, comes out on August 7. This movie features a contemporary re-imagining of Marvel's original and longestrunning superhero team. It centers on four young outsiders who teleport to an alternate and dangerous universe, which alters their physical form in shocking ways. Their lives irrevocably upended, the team must learn to harness their daunting new abilities and work together to save Earth from a former friend turned enemy.

Although it's not based on a Marvel comic, "**Mad Max: Fury Road,**" released on May 15 and rated R, is another action-packed thriller. With exhilarating action and a surprising amount of narrative heft, Mad Max: Fury Road brings George Miller's post-apocalyptic franchise roaring vigorously back to life.



Heritage Hills Church has made over 1,003 prayer quilts in 10 years

hball@tctimes.com; 810-433-6792 Linda Saylor of Heritage Hills Church firmly believes in the power of prayer, especially after she heard that a 55-yearold woman woke up from a coma after receiving the church's 1,003rd prayer quilt Wednesday, May 20.

"It's not about the quilt, it's about the prayers that are in the quilt," she said.

The 55-year-old woman, a Wyandotte resident, went to Henry Ford Hospital last week because she thought she had kidney stones. "She had a really high fever. She had some kind of an infection. We heard about her on Monday and then on Wednesday, she got her quilt. All of a sudden she just came out of her coma," Saylor said. The doctor asked the woman questions and she knew who she was. The hospital

is still doing tests to figure out the cause of the coma.

'We thought she was gonna die. That's why we immediately got a quilt to her,' Saylor said.

Saylor is a part of the Quilt Ministry of Heritage Hills Church, a group that makes prayer quilts for people going through tough times.

The group is working to set up a system for people to request quilts. The church has been making them for about 10 years. Members of the congregation tie knots on the quilt and say a prayer.

"People just really treasure them. They're just so happy and so pleased to get them," she said.

Church history

The church, formerly Haller's Corner, burned down in 1998 when Heritage Hills was first established. "Two teenagers just decided to come over and burn it," Saylor said. "It was just when everything was being finished. It was so devastating."

A note was delivered to the church that said, "Rebuild the church," along with a check.

Senior Pastor Tony Chick was associate pastor when the fire burned it down. "It was a shock to say the least," he said. "You look at it and think 'well this is gonna be a setback, but we got to push back and get through it."

He said it took three weeks to get everything going again and "It was pretty spectacular to see the community come together like it did."

Chick became senior pastor this

past July at Heritage Hills, the church he started attending when he was 23. He's been in ministry for the past 20 years and a pastor at a church in Flushing before returning to the tri-county area.

Church changes

"We're kind of reinventing ourselves," Chick said. "It's still a country church. We're targeting more of

the 18-48 age group." Among the changes to the church, they repainted and renovated the building with the help of Steven's Furniture and Twice

New Consignments. The church has all new leadership. "They're people who have been around but

are very innovative and contemporary," Chick added. They also hired their first youth pastor, Jeavon Dack.

"I'm in blue jeans every Sunday," he said. "It really opens the door up for me to minister to the younger crowd."

Fenton — An array of paintbrushes, colorful paints, drawings and buckets of water were set out for the first class in the new Art Classroom of the Fenton Community and Cultural Center.

Art teacher Denise Willing-Booher told the class "You want to get your brush wet, but not too wet." Local art enthusiasts in the room followed suit.

This class, a multi-generational watercolor class hosted by the Lakes Area Arts Council on Thursday, May 28, was the first class held in the classroom since the Fenton Community and Cultural Center was renovated. The room is modern and cool, walls full of paintings done by Willing-Booher.

The youngest in the class, Hannah Franks, 9, who attended the class with her grandmother, Susan Jarrett, started painting rocks at age 3. She's a member of the Lakes Area Arts Council. Her favorite thing about art is "being creative," she said, and it's evident she knows her stuff. Willing-Booher asked the class about what colors primary colors form when combined. Hannah knew all of them.

Also in the class was Mallory Scho-

endorff, 10, who loves to paint, draw, and sketch. It doesn't matter what she's drawing, she said, "as long as it's hard." She frequently draws faces.

Rachelle McCord, 20, with Willing-Booher taught the class a few watercoloring techniques, including a graduated wash. She's been in the Lakes Area Arts Council for about 20 years, but has been very active the past five years. She said the multi-generational class put everyone on the same level because they were trying something new.

"I do think it helps for everyone to have their own perspective and experiences that they bring to the table. When you are in a class like mine where you create on your own merit and not copy me, you see each individual's style and expression in their art come out," Willing-Booher said.

Renovations to the building include two art and cultural classrooms, an upstairs gallery, a new elevator, restorations to flooring, and handicap accessibility.

TIP #1 - Eliminate unwanted items



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There are many things that can make an upcoming move go smoothly — like packing ahead of time or have a moving sale.

Now's the time to get rid of unneeded clothes, appliances, tools, furniture and other don't-wants. Don't pay to have these unnecessary items moved, only to throw them out later.

TIP # 2 - Start packing way in advance

You will be amazed at how many items you've accumulated over the years. Pack non-essential items early to ease lastminute stress. When packing, mark your boxes with colored tape, stickers or a felt pen to indicate to which room the items should go at your new home.

"Whenever I list a home, I advise the seller to start packing a closet, room or drawers that aren't used very often," said Kim Rinks, a Realtor with Coldwell Banker Professionals in Fenton. TIP #6 - Verify authority of chosen mover

Go online at www.mimovers.org to determine if the company you have selected is a member of the Michigan Movers Association and as a result, has the authority to make moves in Michigan of over 40 miles one way (an intrastate move). You can contact the MMA directly at (517) 327-9207 to verify the credentials of any Michigan mover.

TIP #7 - Know how pricing works

Moves of fewer than 40 miles one-way within the state are called "local moves." They aren't regulated regarding price, so quotes you get may vary significantly. Pricing is based on the time needed to load, move and then unload your items, based on two to three men for X hours at X dollars per hour.

Intrastate moves are those more than 40 miles one-way within the state. All movers are required to use a tariff to compute the fee, based on weight of the items to be moved, distance traveled, plus a per-mile fuel surcharge. To compute the fee yourself, use the Tariff Calculator under the "Tariff" tab on the site, www.mimovers.org.

TIP #8 - Beware of scams

Some individuals will advertise on Craigslist or other Internet media, offering cheap or discount moves. They are often not licensed, insured or legitimate. They may offer a low price, and then hold your items, demanding a higher payment before unloading. If three movers give you similar prices for an intrastate move but a fourth quote offers a price that's half those amounts, be suspicious. They either missed some items to be moved or are operating "outside the tariff," which is illegal. Also, if you are moving over 40 miles within Michigan and are given an hourly quote that also is illegal. An intrastate quote must be based on weight, distance and the fuel charge.

TIP #9 - On moving day . . .

The big day is here and you'll be able to accomplish a lot more if you move pets beforehand so they won't be confused or scared by the activity. If you can take young children to a friend or family member's home, that will help in avoiding injury or distraction. If several days before your move you find that you can't get everything packed, contact your mover so they can send packers to help meet the moving day deadline.

TIP #10 - If there is problem, call MMA

Should something break during the move, inform your mover immediately. Some insurance is included in the moving agreement, but replacement of some items may need to be discussed and negotiated. For any concerns with service, pricing or other issues, contact the MMA to facilitate a solution.







DEAR DR. ROACH:

Medical advice is to reduce sugar consumption. Does this apply to 100 percent fruit juices, fresh fruit, sweetened cereal products or other fruit-sweetened products? — R.B.

ANSWER:

I think it makes sense to limit sugar intake, as most North Americans take in remarkably large quantities of sugar. This week, while giving a lecture at the medical school, I noticed that the carbonated sodas served contained 45 grams of added sugar per can. That's more than the American Heart Association recommends in a day (no more than 25 grams of added sugar per day for women, 40

grams a day for men)! Be careful of products that claim to be sweetened

PAW'S CORNER Summer Flea Control

DEAR PAW'S CORNER:


Temperatures are really warming up now, and with it, I know, will come the annual onslaught of fleas on my dog, cat and all over my house. Is there any way I can get rid of fleas for good? -- Charlotte

DEAR CHARLOTTE



Flea infestations are incredibly annoying and tough to beat --even when you think fleas have been eradicated, they often come back. Winter temp often send these pests into dormancy or at least reduce their activity, but they return with a vengeance in spring and summer. A pre-emptive attack could make a big difference in this summer's flea wars. While you may not notice adult fleas on your pets just yet, flea eggs or larvae may be present on their fur or

throughout the house. Start by talking to the veterinarian about the best treatment for your pets. Many owners swear by one-month topical treatments that are applied to the back of a dog or cat's neck, but others are leery due to potentially serious side effects. Consider alternatives if you're not sure. Next, treat your home for fleas -- using a carpet and upholstery treatment designed for both adult fleas and their eggs. You'll want to tackle not just the carpet and dusty corners of the house, but the furniture and any linens, such as curtains, that aren't frequently cleaned. Keep pets out of rooms until the treatment you're using has been vacuumed up or washed away. Through the summer, brush your pets' coats daily, checking for fleas. Vacuum and dust at least once per week.

Ingredients

- 6 fresh corn cobs with all the husk in tact
- 1 lime
- 1/2 cup Kewpie Japanese mayon-
- naise
- 1 t Spanish smoked paprika
- 1 t chili powder, plus more for sprinkling
- 4 ounces Cotija cheese, finely grated
- ¹/₂ cup chopped cilantro

Instructions

• Pull the corn husks back from each cob and remove silk, leaving the corn husks attached to the corn. Pull off a small ribbon of the husk and tie the husks back to form a handle.

• Fill a sink full of water and soak the tied corn for at least half an hour. This helps prevent the husks from burning when they are on the grill.

- While the corn is soaking, grate and juice the lime and mix it with mayonnaise, smoked paprika and chili powder. Cover and refrigerate until ready to serve.
- Clean and lightly oil your grill grates and heat to medium-high. Dry the corn and grill until charred on all sides, taking care to keep the husks away from the hottest part of the grill, about 10 minutes.
- When the corn is cooked, remove any lingering silk and generously rub each cob down with the lime-mayospice mixture. Sprinkle each cob with the grated Cojita cheese, chopped cilantro, salt and if you prefer, a little extra chili powder. Serve hot with plenty of napkins
