

Native American proud of his heritage

■Bob Geroux talks about Chippewa membership

There are about 44,000 members of the Sault Ste. Marie Tribe of Chippewa Indians. They are a third-world nation, within a nation, located primarily in Michigan's Upper Peninsula counties.

Hartland resident Robert (Bob) Ger-



oux is a proud, cardcarrying, member of this Chippewa tribe.

Although most people today are fascinated with and enjoy their Native American friends and neighbors, it wasn't always that

way. "My father lived in the Mullett Lake area of Cheboygan County," said Geroux. "His parents moved the family down this

way for jobs when he was 11 years old. "My grandfather never told my father that he was a Native American," Geroux added. "Back then, it was a bad thing. People got into fights over that."

Native Americans were treated as badly then as some ethnic groups are unfortunately still treated today.

"He was in his 50s before he found out he was Native American," Geroux said of his father. "I was 9 years old at the time."

Geroux's family settled in the Dearborn Heights area, where he remained throughout his growing up years. He relocated to the Hartland area, where he resides with his wife, Sharon, about 15 years ago. The couple has two adult children and two grandchildren, who are elementary students in the Fenton school district.

Geroux said his children and grandchildren also are members of the Sault Ste. Marie Chippewa Tribe, himself having completed the necessary docu-

ments as soon as each was born.

Although Geroux admits he is more modern-day than traditional, he embraces the privileges afforded to his family by his being federally recognized as a Native American.

Geroux and his family have often enjoyed attending tribal events, including ceremonial pow-wows, which are held throughout the year. They also are able to

receive funds for minor and preventative dental and medical care.

"Once you turn 62, you receive 'elder payment," Geroux said. "But it's not much, only like \$800 to \$1,200 a year."

Native Americans who reside on the reservations receive far more benefits, Geroux said, adding that those living "under the bridge" are often referred to as "trolls."

The greatest privilege Geroux enjoys, however, is being able to legally possess bald eagles, of which he has three at his home.

In order to obtain a deceased bald eagle, Native Americans must complete

an application and have it approved by a federally recognized tribal chairman, who must sign the paperwork, Geroux said.


Once a dead bald eagle becomes available, U.S. Fish and Wildlife will ship it on ice, next day to the recipient, who then takes it to a taxidermist. Bald eagles, according to Geroux, die of a variety of causes. "Windmills do a lot of damage," he said.

It is against federal law for anyone who is not a Native American to possess a bald eagle, or any part of a bald eagle, such as a feather or talons, for example.

"Hillary Clinton almost got in trouble for accepting a gift with bald eagle feathers on it," Geroux said. "The lady who gave it to her really got into trouble."





She was subsequently arrested and convicted, but later pardoned by President Bill Clinton.

When asked why some Native Americans object to being called "Indians," Geroux said it is not necessarily that word that bothers them. The term "red skin" is offensive because in the early days of this country, bounty hunters were paid to kill Native Americans, and as proof of the kill, presented the "dead skin" or "red skin" from the body.

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

"They're rare beers, the kind you can hardly get your hands on," Stephanie said Wednesday, just before the third tap takeover was scheduled to take place.

One concern the Evans' had before they signed their lease was parking. They have not had any issues yet, but there are currently no tenants occupying the top floors.

Stephanie believes the Streetscape project will help in the long run to make downtown more walkable.

"We're hoping that once Streetscape is completed, it will encourage people to park elsewhere and want to walk," she said.

Stephanie said the fluctuating hours of the other three first-floor tenants complement each other.

"It's not too bad on weekends because not all businesses in this area are open," she added. "We think going into the future, downtown parking will work itself out."

People enjoy walking in the summer when it's nice out, she added. "We are looking forward to a walking friendly community."

The Rough Draught Coffee and Barroom opened on Nov. 25, 2014. It serves craft cocktails, craft beer, wine, and a light dining menu giving customers an opportunity to have a meal that's fast and fresh.

Toni Widing, owner of Salon 416, said it was worth the wait to get into the Cornerstone building.

Widing said she remembers well when she signed her contract as the first tenant of the Cornerstone building three years ago, when it was in its first initial stages of development in downtown Fenton.

"I got to pick my spot," said Widing,

Parking resolved for now

Cornerstone parking has been a major topic of discussion among city leaders and administrators. In February, the Fenton City Council requested that a parking consultant review the proposed parking plan to see if it was the most suitable. At the time, council members discussed leasing parking spaces to Corlin Builders for them to distribute to their tenants. At the May 26 City Council meeting, Ghassan Saab of Corlin Builders commented that the biggest concern of potential tenants is parking. According to the minutes of that meeting, Saab said he doesn't see the building being as successful if parking is not provided for tenants and stated he is losing reservations for the residential units due to the parking issue. David Goldstein of RE/MAX Platinum also addressed the parking issue. He said he feels anyone investing money in one of the residential units will want a guaranteed parking space and encouraged the council to approve a parking agreement. The council approved a resolution at that meeting to lease 23 parking spaces to Corlin Builders for tenants at a lease rate of \$100 per parking space. The money would be used to pay for reserved parking signs. Because of concerns over the redevelopment of 132 North LeRoy Street, the property just south of the Cornerstone building, an agreement has been made between city administration and Corlin that the leased spaces will be moved if that development begins within the next year.

who had no idea at the time that it would take three years to get the project literally off the ground.

Now that Sawyer Jewelers is in its new store, longtime customers say that they love the colors and ambiance of the new space. "Some customers were afraid our new store would be really modernistic or ostentatious, and they were pleasantly surprised," said Mary Ann. "We also have a lot of new 'walkby' customers who have found us while walking to restaurants and other shops. It's amazing how only two blocks away, it's a different crowd of people."

Three times the size of its former location, the "new" Sawyer Jewelers can now offer more lines and services. "Now we have a private Diamond Room for a more discreet shopping experience," said Mary Ann.

However far they've come, the Beltincks don't want to forget where they came from. "We're still who we always were, just a little bigger," said Mary Ann.

Sagano Japanese Bistro and Steakhouse also enjoy doing business in the Cornerstone building.

That goal is to do what it takes to stay together for another practice and another game.

It's worked. The Tigers will be playing in their first state championship game in school history on Friday after edging out Trenton 1-0 in a Division 2 state semifinal contest Tuesday night at West Bloomfield High School.

The win earns the Tigers a spot in the D2 state championship game at Michigan State University against Richland Gull Lake at 4 p.m. at DeMartin Stadium.

'This feeling we have is indescribable because we've never been here before," senior Carly Granger said. "Making it this far, especially as a senior, is so precious. I think it's awesome to be here."

"That's all it means. I get to play another game with my dad as our coach and another game with my team," senior Brennan Sullivan said. "Honestly, I can't describe it. It's pure joy. Gratefulness we get to keep playing because there are only two teams that get to keep playing and we are one of them."

Gilbert was one of three who went through the interview process. Bakker said many of the people who initially showed interest were also looking for a teaching position to go with the coaching spot. However, with Gilbert that wasn't an issue since he's already a teacher within the district.

"Having John, who is a teacher in our district, is such a benefit," Bakker said. "He can keep closer tabs with the kids and he can build a rapport within our faculty in the building. He can bridge that gap.

... Don't get me wrong. There are great coaches who are not inside the school, but it is a huge advantage to find someone who can coach as well as teach."

Gilbert said he's met with the future sophomores, juniors and seniors within the program and is working on getting caught up.

"We are a little bit behind, trying to get the summer organized," Gilbert said. "That's the big push, trying to get that thing going. We only have three weeks before the dead period."

Gilbert spent almost two years with the Fenton program during his first tenure. After winning three contests his first year, the program was showing signs of progress during his second season, posting a 6-13 record before he resigned his position. He resigned before the team's last regular-season game at Lapeer West. Gilbert removed a player from his varsity team because the player was disgruntled about his playing time. The removed student brought up the issue about his playing time in a column in the school's newspaper. After Gilbert removed the player from the team, Fenton athletic director at the time, Scott Thurlow, reinstated the

player. Gilbert was upset that his views weren't addressed before Thurlow reinstated the player, and felt compelled to resign the position. Gilbert said what happened in the past is just that — the past. He's moving forward.

"I'm not concerned about it. It was a long time ago," Gilbert said. "I've been away long enough. Things are different now. We all wish we could do things slightly different. ... The decision I made cost me 10 years in the gym. That part I'm not getting back, but I'm looking forward to the new challenges. I want to move forward."

Bakker said Gilbert's first tenure as coach was examined during the interview process.

"That was something we took into consideration," Bakker said. "He resigned originally and we talked to him about it in the interview process. ... Throughout the interview process he cemented himself as the top candidate. He didn't shy away from any of the questions we had for him. ... Everyone felt comfortable with John being our head coach."

Gilbert, a Fenton graduate, was a pretty outstanding player during his playing days. He continued his playing career at Lake Superior State from 1984 to 1988, scoring 1,329 career points. In fact, he was inducted into the Lake Superior State University Athletic Hall of Fame on the same date his wife, Teresa, was inducted for her outstanding basketball career as a Laker. During most Fenton varsity basketball games, Gilbert could be seen watching the games from the stands.

"I've been playing basketball and involved with basketball since I was 4-years old," Gilbert said. "I can't get it out of my blood. I love to watch it. It's fun to watch when it is played right."



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Tigers' defense leads the way to Fenton's first-ever state title trip

West Bloomfield — There are a lot of reasons why the Fenton varsity girls soccer team played in its first-ever state championship game on Friday afternoon.

But one of the biggest reasons can be seen on Fenton's defensive side. In short, the Tigers' defense has been strong all season long, and particularly outstanding since the D2 state tournament series began.

Fenton captured a regional title against Regina by not scoring a goal during regulation and two 10-minute overtime periods. Yet, they advanced during a shootout penalty kick because the Tigers' defense kept

Regina, a squad that scored 15 goals in its first four tournament games, scoreless. And during Tuesday's 1-0 semifinal victory against Trenton, the Tigers' defense posted another clean sheet. This time they did it against a Trojans' squad who had scored 35 goals in five previous state tourney games. In fact, no one is scoring goals against Fenton during the postseason. The Tigers have recorded five shutouts in six tourney games. The only team to score on Fenton's defense in the postseason was Linden, in the Tigers' 3-1 district title victory.

"We always give it our best. It's unbelievable how we work together," sophomore defender Miranda Campbell said. "I wouldn't want to play back there with anybody else. We have a strong defense. We come from strong travel teams. We have a strong team all together. We always have everybody's back no matter what. And we couldn't do it without Abby (Quesnelle)."

"It's just the communication and the love we have together," freshman defender Margaret Berry said. "It's incred-

ible. I don't even know the words to describe it. We weren't concerned about them at all. It was all about us – keep it about us, work together as a team – and all we have to do is keep looking at each other as a team and looking at the love, the love."

The Tigers are accomplishing the task with a young group in the back. Berry and Sophia Crews are freshmen starters on defense, while Campbell is a sophomore. Alexis Brissette is the veteran among the starters on the defensive line, and she's a junior. The Tigers rotate frequently and the players who rotate in are young as well. Lucy Foguth and Madison Wood are freshmen as well. Hannah Beauchamp qualifies as the only consistent senior within the unit.

"We held up. It's amazing the kids keep doing it," Fenton varsity soccer coach Matt Sullivan said. "They are literally kids back there — a couple freshmen, a sophomore and a junior. I'm so proud of them back there."

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

Then, about four minutes later, a lead pass to Costigan set up a good shot for the junior from around one of the top corners of the 18-foot box. Her shot sailed to the far post just wide.

The Trojans had only one decent scoring chance in the opening half. It came on a direct kick from about 30 yards out with about six minutes left. Initially a shot didn't get on target, but eventually Sara Vinca took a shot that was saved by Quesnelle. While Fenton controlled action, the game was in a scoreless tie at the half.

Trenton came out early in the second half and had its best period of offensive play during the first 15 minutes of the fi-

I replace my ignition coil twice with 2 brands, my spark plugs twice and my wires once. It fixes it for a few hours and then the check engine light comes back on. When this happens, my car loses half its power and will come back but it's a constant battle with it, especially on the highway. Please help what could this be?

Noah, You need to check the connector where the coil plugs in. It is possible that it looses contact inter-

mittently, or has opened up like a wall plug in your house that is old and does not have a tight fit any longer. When this happens it will cause this type of issue and it is an easy fix. If that is not it, you may have a bad powertrain control module or a wire from it to the coil shorting out or opening up somewhere. This type of problem is better diagnosed at a repair shop with specialty tools that will aide in an accurate diagnosis.






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
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

Research shows there have been only two crashes at Bishop since 1935. According to the Aviation Safety Network, on May 18, 1935, three people were killed when the Ford 4-AT-E Tri-Motor plane they were flying on through Knowles Flying Services,

crash-landed at Bishop Airport. Of the 12 people onboard, two were pilots and 10 were passengers. One of the pilots and two passengers died, while the other pilot and eight passengers survived.

According to the Aviation Safety Network report, the airplane, which was nearly seven years old, was used throughout the day for local flights during dedication celebrations. It apparently ran out of fuel causing two of the three engines to lose power immediately after takeoff. The airplane crashed and nosed over.
