■ Customers drive shift toward more natural grocery products


Linden — If you're buying bottled water instead of pop, you're part of a national, healthier trend.

Out of 52 packaged food and beverage companies, 12 of the major companies announced lower revenue this past year than in 2013, according to a USA Today news article.

The biggest decrease in revenue was Mondelez, which split from Kraft, with a 5.5 decrease from 2013. Mondelez produces brands like Oreos, Kraft Philadelphia Cream Cheese, Nutter Butters, Gevalia coffee, Honey Maid graham crackers, Sour Patch Kids, Trident gum, Wheat Thins, and many other brands.

Kellogg's cereal, which makes Pop Tarts, Nutri-grain bars, and a wide variety of cereal, dropped 2.7 percent from 2013.








"I have asked the board of education not to extend my contract," Jalkanen said. "Starting tomorrow, I will be working as a consultant for the district until a new superintendent can be hired."

Jalkanen's contract was not set to expire until June 2016. He has been the superintendent in Fenton for five years. On Tuesday, he started working for the district as a consultant, which he will do through mid-February 2016, if necessary.

On behalf of the board, Shapiro thanked Jalkanen for his service to the Fenton Area Public Schools district. The vote to accept

the superintendent's resignation was approved, with Lynn Hopper casting the lone dissenting vote.

"Actually to me that whole vote was a vote just to be voting," Hopper said Wednesday morning. "If someone resigns or wants to leave, there's nothing anybody can really do whether you say 'yes' or 'no.'

"Ibasically said 'no' because I like the gentleman and think he was doing a good job for us,"

Hopper added.

Jalkanen denied having been asked to

"No, I'm leaving voluntarily," Jalkanen said. "My family and I will be pursuing other options. I live in Troy and still have two children in high school. I want to pursue other opportunities. I am, after all, still a young man."

Jalkanen has been seeking other opportunities for the past few months. He has been among the top contenders, interviewing for superintendent positions in the Avondale, East Detroit, Hazel Park, Romeo and Waterford school districts.

Hopper said the Fenton board knew of Jalkanen's plans to leave.

> "He has been keeping us posted that he has been interviewing," he said. "He loves Fenton and loves everything about Fenton. But he wants to be closer to his family and his twin boys, and not have to drive as far as he's driving."

Shapiro said the board will be accepting applications for interim superintendent through July 6. On July 20, they expect to name the person to take over that interim position.

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Area schools doing repairs, construction over summer

■Security to be ramped up at Fenton schools

With tri-county schools on summer recess, school leaders are overseeing multiple improvement projects that will benefit students when they return in the fall.

Fenton Area Public Schools

Fenton schools are upgrading security over the summer, installing cameras and entry vestibules. The high school is getting new lockers and a new energyefficient pool cover. Construction for the projects began on Monday June, 15.

For security, the renovated entry vestibules will have new locks, said Doug Busch, executive director of personnel and finance at Fenton Area Public Schools (FAPS).

"There's going to be a computerized entry system," Busch said. Staff members will have swipe-card access. The school will be able to electrically lock down all the doors or unlock certain doors, and put the locks on a timer. Visitors will need to be buzzed in during school hours.

'It just gives us a lot more flexibility in terms of security," Busch said. The district will install 200 total security cameras throughout the buildings.

'This will allow us to have cameras in every building," Busch said. The number of cameras per school varies based on the school size and layout of the building. "That's something that we have always wanted to do as a district is upgrade our safety and security," he said.

Money for the security systems came from an \$11 million bond initiative that was approved by voters in May 2014, which also is paying for new buses, computers, and other technology.

Construction on State Road Elementary is also going on over the summer. "This will allow us to have a safer and easier traffic flow and allows us to have more parking," Busch said. Construction will also fix the draining issue and install energy-efficient light posts. Construction started June 15.

Other construction includes new lockers in the varsity locker room in the high school, and a new energy-efficient pool cover.

Lake Fenton Community Schools

A few projects will be completed at Lake Fenton schools, and most are paid for by the district's sinking fund, which is a little over \$400,000, said Wayne Wright, superintendent of Lake Fenton schools.

West Shore Elementary will receive a new roof that should be completed by the Fourth of July. "It has a lot leaks," Wright said. The old roof was a ballasted rubber

roof, and the new one will be made out of Duro-Last.

Construction will also be done to help correct traffic flow during pick-up and drop-off time. There's "major backup. It's backed up all the way to the hill on Torrey," Wright said.

A new driveway entrance to Torrey Hill Intermediate off Torrey Road is being paid for by the sinking fund. People will be able exit onto Torrey as opposed to exiting only on Lahring Road.

Ceiling tiles and lights will be replaced in a few classrooms at the middle school. "The ceiling tile is very old, very stained, lights are very dimmed. They've been there for many years," Wright said. The drain issue will be fixed.

Other funds will pay to fill in the cracks and seal the blacktop at West Shore Elementary and Torrey Hill Intermediate. New parking lot lines will be painted.

Linden Community Schools

The driveway at Linden Elementary will be expanded, said Ed Koledo, superintendent of Linden schools. It will include an individual right-turn lane and left-turn lane to fix the crowding issues during drop-off and pick-up times. Repairs will also be done on an underground storm drain. These projects cost around

Central Elementary is getting a new roof, costing around \$200,000. The current roof, made of asphalt, is past its life expectancy, Koledo explained, and has been patched multiple times with limited success. It will be replaced with newer materials, single-ply PVC, which is what most of the roofs in the district are made of.

The parking lot by the administration building will be repaved and expanded.

Holly Area Schools

Steve Lenar, assistant superintendent of administrative services, said Holly schools are doing basic summer cleaning and fixing some bad pumps and compressors.

Throughout the high school, middle school and elementary, the air circulation will be improved by fixing the bad compressors. A few boiler tubes will be replaced, as well as circulating pumps that send hot water throughout the buildings. The pool heater will be replaced.

Lenar said each project will cost around \$5,000 to \$10,000, and they're probably not going to spend more than \$50,000.

When troopers arrived, they found the car burning in a ditch. When the fire was put out, investigators discovered Marsha Wilfinger's burned remains in the back seat.

Marsha Wilfinger's death has been investigated as a homicide. Troopers learned the vehicle was registered to a leasing company. They found several car parts scattered along the road that led to the fire scene. They also believe the vehicle had been towed to the location.

According to a 9and10.com report,

troopers followed the trail of parts and marks several miles to a house on Mc-Cormick Lake in Briley Township. They made contact with the man there and determined the burned body in the vehicle was his spouse. Troopers reported there were signs that a domestic assault had recently taken place in the home.

Marsha Wilfinger owned and operated a cleaning business for many years. She is survived by three adult children, two sons and a daughter, and three grandchildren.

ASK THE MECHANIC Chris Wilkinson,

I have a 2000 Dodge Neon which recently started a humming noise. It didn't affect anything on the driving, just the noise. However, after pulling out of my house it started jumping and making a loud sound, almost like something was falling off the car. Nothing is hanging down, nothing is falling off. It doesn't matter if I'm hitting the gas or brake. It will only do it once in a while. Today, while driving around town, it only did it once. I noticed that if I'm pushing the brake when it happens, the pedal does jump a little. The whole car jumps but doesn't seem like its shutting off or anything. I cant get it into a mechanic until next week and wondered if there is something I can do myself. Please help. -Crystal

Crystal, This sounds like a wheel bearing to me, but could be other things like an axle shaft, steering, suspension or brake problem. The way it sounds I would not recommend driving the car untilyou are able to have someone look at it. To check for a bad wheel bearing, you will need to jack up the front end and support with jack stands. Then, grab the top and bottom of the wheel, trying to move it in at the top and out at the bottom. Go back and forth, you will need someone to look behind the wheel to see where the movement is and confirm that the lower ball joint or tie rods are not loose. Sometimes a wheel bearing will not show any movement and we need to run the vehicle in drive while it is jacked up, listening with a stethoscope for noise. Be very careful if trying this, as we need to get the wheels spining up to 60 mph sometimes to hear the noise.



Coca-Cola saw a decrease of 1.5 percent in revenue. The company produces Minute Maid, Vitaminwater, Sprite, Fanta, Fresca, Powerade, Fuse Tea, and many other products. Coca-Cola Enterprises in Europe saw a decrease of 2.5 percent.

The nation is buying healthier food and one local store is proving that.

Marv Yono, owner of Alpine Marketplace, said he sees a healthy trend. Alpine customers are buying more local and Michigan-made products as opposed to canned and processed foods.

"I definitely see more of a trend toward natural and organic," he said. "Customers are educating themselves more, reading labels more." He thinks the pressure from this trend pushed Kraft to announce that it's not putting any artificial ingredients or color in their macaroni and cheese.

"I think it's a very good thing," Yono said. "It puts pressure on manufacturing to offer the highest quality."

Alpine purchases produce mostly from Spartan and from other local places.

"There's been a big boon in locally made Michigan products like sausages, homemade snacks, that type of thing. Natural and organic snacks are really taking off. Local and organic produce is a really big thing, too. I'm always looking for produce with the best quality," Yono said. Fewer people are buying canned meats and processed foods, he added.

Sincepurchasing Alpinein 2007, he said the store has changed a lot, including better food.

"For the most part, we offer such better quality now and our customers really respond to that. That's been the biggest change.

"We always make sure we get the newest products in that are available," Yono said.

Looking forward 10 years, he thinks people will buy less and less processed canned meats. However, Alpine doesn't align with the 1.5 percent decrease in Coca-Cola revenue.

"I haven't seen a decrease in pop sales. I don't know if fewer people are drinking it, but our numbers are up from last year but that doesn't mean as a whole the population has gone down. We just might be getting more customers," he said.

Customers are buying more craft beer that's locally produced, though. "The whole locally-made movement has really gotten big. They appreciate local products," Yono said.



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

Sweet Variations will not be open on the Fourth of July, a Saturday, but only because of previously made plans.

"The parade isn't coming down this way anyway, so there's no point (in being open)," she added.

Because of the ongoing Streetscape project, the parade has been rerouted to start farther west than in previous years, at Industrial Way, which leads to the industrial park and Owen Road. It will travel east and take a turn left on Adelaide, avoiding much of the downtown.

Tara Wakeman, co-owner of The Iron Grate, will also be closed on Saturday, July 4, but will be open on Sunday, July 5, from 12 to 4 p.m.

"We're anxious for it to get done," said Wakeman of the project. "They're actually pouring cement (Wednesday) right in front of our shops," she said. "They're getting closer. It's going to be nice when it's all done."

Most of the downtown businesses have back doors, which customers may use to enter their establishments. They also remind customers that parking is permitted on South LeRoy Street, south of their establishments. The municipal parking lot can be accessed easily by going in the back way.

In his weekly Streetscape update, Assistant City Manager Mike Burns said, "We are starting to see the Streetscape Project take shape."

Burns was unsure of what day in the next week or so when work will occur at the bridge, but when it does, the bridge will be closed.

"The public will be notified prior to the work beginning," he said.

Burns said the contracting company has apologized for the recent road closures but believed it was necessary to expedite the curb installation and lining of the sewers.

There was signage indicating the road closures, however, barricades were kept open due to the large number of construction trucks entering and leaving the site for

the "tedious work required installing the curbs," Burns said.

"They understand this caused confusion, but they utilized their work force to keep construction moving rather than stationing them to keep the construction zone closed," he said.

Burns asks that the public be safe and mindful of their surroundings in the construction zone.

Despite the construction project, regular Fourth of July activities near the downtown and at the Fenton Community Center will continue as in previous years.

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

RULES FOR FIREWORKS IN TYRONE TOWNSHIP

Residents in Tyrone Township must abide by state law and township ordinances when it comes to setting off fireworks. These rules come from the township's zoning ordinance. Consumer or personal use of fireworks, as defined and permitted by the Fireworks Safety Act, are allowed between the hours of 8 a.m. and 1 a.m. the day before, the day of and the day after a national holiday. Consumer fireworks are also allowed seven days before and days after the Fourth of July – between the hours of 8 a.m. and 1 a.m. to accommodate reasonable use associated with this holiday and permitted display fireworks events. Consumer fireworks outside of these times must comply with the noise limits specified in Zoning Ordinance Section 21.16. This means exploding fireworks outside of the times above are generally not permitted in residential areas.

"Thirty-five carriers and they are trying to get in and out of this building. It's been a zoo," Phillips said. The 8-ton, 20-foot trucks have to get in and out, too, but they've been having problems. They make the best of what they can."

A few customers, on the other hand, are getting to the post office despite the construction, even if it means not following the rules. "We've got customers trying to cut through our back parking lot, which is just for our federal employees," he said. "It becomes a hazard to our carriers." He's concerned about people's safety and getting the mail out on time.

"A lot of people are driving the wrong way to get in here," he said, adding that he's been wondering if the police are going to intervene. "Tampering with federal mail is a federal offense so I'd rather take my state ticket than delay the mail."

He also said there are problems coming in the back at the intersection of Shiawassee and LeRoy. "Even when it says it's open, you've got trucks blocking the one lane," he said.

Although he doesn't want to deter business, Phillips recommended that if customers have a package they need delivered, they can go online to usps.com and request a carrier pick it up.

"If their whole purpose is just to drop off letters, by all means use the available drop boxes," he said. When people call and ask for directions, he recommends they park at the Fenton Community Center and walk to the post office.

Holly summer tennis is a big hit

■ Pre-K to adults enjoy the month-long summer program

Holly — One minute, prekindergarten kids are running to a net, trying to avoid tennis balls while trying to place other balls on their rackets, which happen to be next to the net.

Minutes later the children have to balance tennis balls on their racket and see how many they can drop in a bucket in a given amount of time. Later, they sandwich tennis balls between two campers' rackets, race them to the end and drop them in a bucket. At another time they are popping up tennis balls into a cone-like cylinder.

The action is brisk when the tot tennis players invade the Holly Summer Tennis program on Mondays and Wednesdays for about 30 minutes, but everyone also is having fun.

Success breeds success for Holly hoops camp

Holly — Lance Baylis has learned something this summer.

He's learned, success breeds success.

The Holly varsity boys basketball coach enjoyed his best season with the Bronchos last winter, capturing a perfect Metro League championship season, and finishing the season with a 22-3 overall record and the school's first-ever Class A district crown.

So maybe it shouldn't have been that shocking when he hosted his 10th-annual Holly Basketball Camp, t osee it enjoy record numbers.

"It keeps going up," Baylis said. "I cap it at 80, but I can't say no to anybody. I get requests all the time. We sold out last year at 80 and this year we are somewhere between 90 and 100."

The Holly Basketball Camp, was a busy time. The event was three days from 8 a.m. until 1 p.m. at the Holly High School. The camp included kids ranging from ages kindergarten to eighth-graders. And while most are boys, there were a handful of girls at the event as well.

There's always activities going on. There are several stations where players learn specific skills. Then, after lunch there are games.

"I tell them in the three days you spend here you are going to be better than what you were," Baylis said. "We have some kids that are playing basketball for the very first time and then we have some very experienced basketball players. We try to put those with the same skill levels together."

One great benefit of the camp is who helps teach it. Baylis uses the players in his boys basketball program. They are the ones that help run and teach the ses-

sions. It's a huge plus since these are the players the kids know from Tuesday and Friday nights during the winter. Most volunteer one shift during the week, but some stay longer. One of those players who help for most of the three-day camp is Kyle Woodruff.

"It's a lot of fun," Woodruff said. "A lot of these kids you'll see at our basket-ball games and it's fun to com here during the summer and coach them, teach them what you can.

"I really enjoy it. I like teaching the little kids. They are from our community so that's even better."

Woodruff said he's learned about himself through coaching the camp.

"One thing I've learned is how much of a tolerance I have because sometimes they don't listen," Woodruff said. "But then you get the message through to them and it's rewarding."

The kids also get periods of time when they can have some fun by playing a little one-on-one with some of their heroes from the varsity team between sessions. For instance, on one day after lunch, varsity player Paris Partee played a game against one of the younger campers.

"They are learning from the older guys, there's some great mentorship going on," Baylis said. "The older guys are learning leadership and maturity. It's a win-win relationship for everyone. Everyone gets better."

Baylis said many kids come each year.

"It's fun to watch them grow from year to year. It's amazing how many names you get to know," Baylis said. "You really get to know the young ladies because there are only five to six of them. However, they come here and compete just like the boys. ... It's great to see the girls compete with the boys."

Teams of the 2014-15 school year. This is the seventh year we've done the poll.

As is the case each year, we'll bring the rest of the top 16 in small doses to add some suspense. And if your favorite team isn't in the poll or is lower than you hoped, remember, it's just the wacky sports staff's opinions that are involved with this poll. Others can agree or disagree. Many teams had great seasons who are not on the list. Teams who won league titles and advanced to state meets aren't on our list. We just don't have room for every squad. But to the best of our ability, these are the 16 we felt stuck out.

Honorable Mentions: Two stick out. The Lake Fenton varsity softball team won another GAC Red title, but lost in a district-opening contest to the Linden Eagles. A district title probably would've jumped them comfortably into the top 16. Fenton softball looked poised to capture another league crown, but lost its last three league contests and then lost in the districts. Either winning a league title or a district crown would've given them a shot at getting in the top 16.

No. 16 - Fenton volleyball: A new era began when Linda Rusaw resigned the position and Jerry Eisinger took over, and the program didn't miss a beat. The Tigers did see their string of six straight Metro League championships end due to the addition of Flushing to the league, but the Tigers made up for it by winning their third straight Class A district title. Fenton ended the season with 38 victories.

The Tigers have found themselves somewhere in the top 16 in all seven polls. Now that's consistency.

No. 15 - Fenton football: The Tigers were absolutely dominating during the Metro League season, finishing with a 7-0 mark. They

outscored opponents in the Metro by a 279-74 mark. The scoring differential was only that close because the majority of games ended in continuous clock mercy-rule victories.

The Tigers entered the postseason with a perfect 9-0 mark, but lost to Farmington Hills Harrison 35-10 in the opening round of the playoffs. That's what kept the Tigers from finishing higher on this poll.

This is the first time since the 2011-12 school year the Tigers have finished within the top 16. Fenton was No. 6 that year, tied for the highest ranking of any football team during the seven years we've created this poll.

No. 14 - Fenton boys swimming and diving: The Tigers dominated the Metro League, capturing their fourth straight league crown. They did so by going undefeated in duals and winning the Metro Meet by 58 points.

The Tigers also had a nice group of competitors qualify for the state meet. However, once there, only the 400 freestyle relay team advanced to the second day, placing a respectable 12th place. Considering swimming isn't one of the strongest sports in the Flint area, the Tigers needed to do more at the state event to improve their credentials. Still, finishing at No. 14 is impressive. It is the fourth straight season the boys have finished the season somewhere in our top 16 poll.

No. 13 - Linden baseball: The Eagles posted an impressive 31-11 record, won a district crown for the third straight year and also won the Flint baseball tourney for a third straight season. It was an outstanding season for the Eagles. The only knock against the squad is not winning the Metro League crown. In fact, the Eagles finished tied for third with a 9-5 record.

Linden baseball finished No. 12 on this poll a year ago, so the Eagles have remained pretty consistent.

Katherine Skubik said. "They are a lot of fun to play with."

"We don't do too complex of things," Holly varsity girls and boys tennis coach Will Sophiea said. "A mistake done too often with little kids in tennis is they get frustrated too often. So we are using low compression balls so the kids can find success when they are doing certain activities. Hopefully, they enjoy tennis, stick with it and the next thing you know they are 15or 16-year old and playing varsity tennis at their respective high schools."

Those prep careers are well in the future right now, but the fun the kids were having was apparent on Wednesday. All the activities involve tennis equipment, but they aren't used to practice backhands from the baseline. Instead, some agility is taught through the game with the bouncing balls. As the instructors bounce the tennis balls, the students nagivate around them and try to place as many tennis balls as they can on their rackets. It's sort of a version of tennis dodge ball. Other activities get the kids to experience balance by keeping the tennis ball on their own racket while racing to a bucket. Once there, they drop the tennis ball into the bucket, run to the start and pick up another one. They also learned teamwork through the sandwich game. It took a teammate to help get as many tennis balls as a team of two could to a certain destination point as the pair of runners sandwiched the tennis balls between their rackets.

All of the activities taught some physical ability about tennis, while keeping the games simple, active and fun.

"I hope they have fun," Skubik said.

"I hope it just gets them outside in the sunshine doing a little bit of exercise and playing a sport that they love, hopefully, as much as I do."

"It's a nice break," Sophiea said. "You are just there to entertain, smile and give high fives. I really enjoy it"

But the program is much more than just the tot tennis players. The tennis program began in mid-June and continues through July 23 on weekdays from Mondays through Thursdays. There is a beginner class for all ages at different times of the week and there is competitive play as well. There are adult tennis classes as well. The only week the event isn't held is from June 30 to July 6 due to the Michigan High School Athletic Association's rule that there must be one week of a dead period for each school district.

Many players have started in the tennis program and have enjoyed the cap so much they progressed to Holly's varsity teams. However, not all of the students are from Holly. Sophiea said there are players from places like Clarkson, Lake Orion and Fenton as well. And many of the instructors are from the varsity program's history. For example, Skubik is a 2014 graduating currently enrolled at Lake Superior State University. Erik Kahn recently graduated from Michigan State University, but still found time to coach as well.

"I like to give back to the program, that's really all it is," Kahn said.

"It's fun to see the slightly older kids," Skubik said. "You know they will end up playing for Holly and the team and you get to watch them grow. You come back and a couple of years later they are not the little kid you were helping out any more, and they are doing really well."

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

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
