What is the difference between Whole Life and Term Life Insurance?

This is a great question! A recent USA Today article stated that 37% of parents do not have life insurance. 

New Horizons will use Pluto's gravity to give it an additional speed boost to make its way into the outer solar system. Here it will observe Kuiper Belt objects, if there are any around, until 2020. The mission will officially end in 2026.

hours in the kitchen like Grandma did, with giant pots of boiling water, counters covered with canning jars, lids and rings, and a host of other devices needed to ensure there would be enough saved to last a year, there are numerous books and online resources to explain how that's done.

If you don't have time, there are shortcuts even the busiest of people can handle, shortcuts that will allow for the preservation of not only the produce, but also the quality and freshness.

There are packets of seasoning mixes on the market that will dramatically cut the time needed to preserve produce. One brand of these packets is "Mrs. Wages," which can be found at most grocery and department stores, normally in the area where canning supplies are displayed.

Mrs. Wages has seasoning mixes to make kosher dill, dill and bread and butter pickles for example. This brand also features seasoning packets to make homemade ketchup, different kinds of salsas and pasta sauces. All of these packets range between \$2.50 and \$3.50 each, depending where they are purchased.

One Mrs. Wages kosher dill pickle seasoning packet, for example, will allow you to preserve seven quarts of pickles.

With Mrs. Wages, or other brand seasoning packets, you don't have to wait weeks or months before the pickles and sauces are ready for consumption. They will be ready to eat in 24 hours.

Not a fan of canning

jars? Freezing your fresh produce for future use is another quick and easy way to guarantee tasty meals even after the snow starts to fall.

Zucchini and squash, for example, can be preserved and frozen a number of ways. By grating zucchini and storing 2 to 3 cups in a plastic freezer bag, you'll have enough to make two zucchini breads whenever you like. Sliced zucchini can be frozen in freezer bags or aluminum foil and used in soups and stews all year long.

Tomatoes are great for preserving and using throughout the year for chili, soup, stew, spaghetti sauce ... the list is endless. Sometimes the tastiest way to enjoy your fresh tomatoes is the simplest way to prepare. An easy, healthy way is to cut them

RECIPE

Zucchini bread

INGREDIENTS:

- 3 cups of all-purpose flour 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon baking soda
- 1 teaspoon baking powder
- 3 teaspoons ground cinnamon
- 3 eggs 1 cup vegetable oil
- 2-1/4 cups white sugar
- 3 téaspoons vanilla extract
 - 2 cups grated zucchini
 - 1 cup chopped walnuts (optional)

PREPARATION:

Grease and flour two, 8- by 4-inch pans. Preheat oven to 325 degrees. Sift flour, salt, baking powder, soda, and cinnamon together in a bowl. Beat eggs, oil, vanilla, and sugar together in a large bowl. Add sifted ingredients to the creamed mixture, and beat well. Stir in zucchini and nuts until well combined. Pour batter into prepared pans. Bake for 40 to 60 minutes, or until tester inserted in

the center comes out clean. Cool in pan on rack for 20 minutes. Remove bread from pan and cool completely before slicing. Source: allrecipes.com

into bite-size pieces, place them in a bowl, cover with a little salt (or salt substitute) and pepper to taste and put them in the refrigerator for a couple of hours before serving. Very simple and extremely delicious.

Another simple salad can be made using ripe cucumbers. Peel the cucumbers and slice them as thin as possible. Place them in a bowl with cut green onions, add salt and pepper to taste and about a quarter cup of milk. Mix thoroughly and refrigerate for an hour or two before serving. Like the tomato salad, the result is a fresh, healthy salad.

Whether you choose to consume your fresh produce right away, or preserve it for use at a later date, now is the time to take advantage of what Michigan gardens and farmers have to offer. Throughout the summer months, farmers markets take place every Thursday in Fenton, and every Wednesday in Linden.


On Sunday, July 19, Nathan Loersch was ordained and installed as the full-time pastor for Shep-





for numerous animals. With more than 225 attendees, Jody Maddock, the director of Adopt-A-Pet, said, "The event is more a community fundraiser than an adoption event. A lot of people who come here see the animals and then come back to adopt."

The money will go to cleaning supplies, vaccinations for the animals, food, spay and neutering costs, transportation fees, and other costs.

'We have amazing, committed volunteers," she said. "We have the sponsors that make it all possible."

Because of the hot weather, they set out pools for the dogs. Children raced in the bounce house, got their faces painted, and played volleyball and other games. People ate and listened to a local band, the Blue Hawaiians, who have been playing in Genesee County for more than 20 years, said Maddock.

Attendees could enter silent raffles to win gift baskets with various items like hair products, alcohol, lottery tickets, gift cards, Buffalo Wild Wings sauce, dog toys, lotions, and other things. "This helps to raise a ton because all the money goes to Adopt-A-Pet," said Michelle Carley, a volunteer who arranged the gift baskets.

Many volunteers worked the event, and a few brought their own pets.

One 6-year-old boy, Will Schmidt, attended with his family, and they were able to visit the kittens and puppies during the event. He turned 6 on July 3, and instead of asking for presents, he wanted to help the shelter.

"Instead of asking for gifts, we put on the invitation for all of his friends to bring food, toys or supplies that the shelter needed. The following week we made an appointment and presented all kinds of stuff," said his mom, Lindsey Connelly.

"We got our first dog here three and half years ago and we love her," Connelly said. "Our cat just died in February. One of the boys is a cat lover and one is a dog lover."

Linden schools sells bonds

■Will save district taxpayers nearly \$1.7 million

The Linden Board of Education announced Wednesday the successful sale of its \$13,515,000 2015 Refunding Bonds. The school district sold its bonds in the capital markets on July 13 and the financing will close on Aug. 5. The bonds refund the outstanding balance of the 2005 and 2006 Refunding Bonds.

"Linden schools is very pleased to report the results of this bond sale," said Interim Superintendent Russell Ciesielski. "As an infrequent participant in the municipal bond market, we are very pleased with the market response and the successful sale of these refunding bonds. This sale will reduce bond interest expense by more than \$1,690,000 over the next 12 years, directly benefitting all district taxpayers."

As part of the bond issuing process, Standard and Poor's Rating Services

(S&P) reviewed the school district's financial condition and assigned it "A+" credit rating (with a stable outlook), according to Ciesielski. In its report, S&P cited as strengths the district's access to the diverse southeast Michigan employment base, moderate debt burden and strong financial reserves.

Additionally, S&P applied its rating on the Michigan School Qualification and Loan Program (AA-). The bonds are qualified for the program and benefit by receiving the state of Michigan's credit rating, which offers additional security to investors.

The school district's bonds were sold at a true interest cost of 2.82 percent. Ciesielski said, "This is great news for the Linden community. The Board of Education has again demonstrated sound fiscal leadership by prudently taking advantage of the municipal bond market and reducing bond interest expense."

How a 23-year-old landed a job in California to work at one of the most popular websites

A 2010 Linden graduate went from making the Linden High School video announcements to making videos now seen by millions of people.

Kenny Moffitt started working at Buzzfeed in October. "When I was a senior in college, I spent a lot of time at work reading Buzzfeed posts," Moffitt said. "At the time I didn't know they had a Buzzfeed video team, it was still super new."

Buzzfeed is a pop culture website that creates lists, quizzes, and videos frequently shared on Facebook and Twitter.

He applied to the company and was called for an interview before he had even moved to California.

As an intern, he helped other video producers make videos. The company asked him to stay on and do a video fellowship. After that, and as July 13, he became a junior video producer.

At the end of the internship, interns make their own video as a resumé for the company. Moffitt made a video on tips and tricks you can do with your iPhone. The video received over one million views in one week, a benchmark for the company.

"I felt pretty good. It was very strange to think about a million people watching a little video you shot in a day and edited. I've kind of gotten used to that now because Buzzfeed has such a huge audience," Moffitt said. He said Buzzfeed encourages everyone to collaborate.

"Everyone here is really smart and really creative," Moffitt said. "It's motivating."

They're not limited to what types of videos they make. "I'd like to do more LGBT videos. I want to get more specific with the related sub groups and stuff like that," he said.

Moffitt started making videos when he was very young, making James Bond-type videos with his cousin using his mom's camcorder. He did video announcements at Linden High School and

Could it be Plantar Fasciitis?

Plantar fasciitis is a condition that occurs when the plantar fascia - a thick band of connective tissue on the bottom of your foot - becomes inflamed or irritated, causing heel and foot pain. Left untreated, it can cause significant long-term pain and make it uncomfortable to walk or stand. Certain factors can make you more susceptible to having heel pain. These include recent weight gain or obesity, low and high arch problems (flatter feet tend to put strain on the fascia while high arched feet have poor shock absorption in the heels), occupational hazards (people that have to stand on hard floors all day increase the chances of straining the fascia, exercise activity (long distance running or zumba enthusiasts increase the repetitive strain on their fascia during these activities). Does all this mean you have to change your activity or your occupation? No. You may just need a doctor's care. Here's how to tell if it's time to get help. After all, we know that the longer you have the heel pain the longer it takes to get better. Is your foot pain especially severe when you wake up in the morning?

sprained my ankle...How long before I can resume working out again safely?

There are varying degrees of ankle sprains, so returning to vour workout is heavily dependent on how severely you sprained your ankle. If you have a mild sprain, you may be able to return to your activity in as little as two weeks, whereas a severe sprain could take a few months. Regardless of the severity of your injury, it is always best to work back to your activity gradually, to help your body rebuild and to test your ankle without re-injuring it. For example, if you are a runner, I suggest starting with a brisk walk on level ground, and then building up to jogging or running pain free on level ground before running inclines and declines or trail running. Physical therapists are well equipped to treat ankle sprains and may be able to get you back on the road quicker then resting and rehabbing on your own.





DEAR STRESSED:

Your husband is working a night shift in order to support his family. This is "help" of the first order. Without his efforts, your lifestyle would not be possible. All the same, with two very young children, you more than have your hands full and you need some relief. You should develop some routines that include your husband. Choose a period in the late afternoon or early evening (schedule this around his most wide-awake time) where you leave the house DICKINSON and the kids stay with him.

You could schedule an exercise class, power-walk with a friend, or simply (as I used to do) sit in your car and read a magazine. The point is that it is a limited amount of time and the kids stay with him and you actually leave the house. If he grumbles, simply tell him, "I'll be back at 6:30. You can handle it. You'll be great." Come home promptly. Don't correct his parenting or complain about how he diapers the baby. If a friend or family member can watch the children occasionally, you two should de-stress together.

Man develops sudden hemorrhoid



DEAR DR. ROACH:

I am a 65-year-old man, and two weeks ago I developed a painful hemorrhoid almost overnight.

I had never had hemorrhoids before. My primary-care

doctor examined me and said I had a "thrombosed hemorrhoid." It is not very large and in the past week, the pain has diminished, but the bulging vein is still present, albeit less tender. Should I have this removed surgically, or will it eventually disappear? — S.D.



ANSWER:

A hemorrhoid, a normal vascular

exquisitely painful. Often, the clot is removed at the time of examination, giving immediate relief. In most cases, the clot will be reabsorbed within a few days. However, in very large hemorrhoids, occasionally surgery is necessary. There is some suggestion that thrombosed hemorrhoids may indicate a higher risk for colorectal cancer.

You should be sure that you have had a recent colonoscopy.



- · 2 pounds boneless, skinless chicken thighs, cut into bite sized pieces
- 2 cups pineapple chunks
- · 1 red onion, cut into chunks
- · kosher salt and fresh ground pepper

- 12 wooden skewers soaked in water for 1-24 hours

Instructions

1. In a small saucepan over medium heat. add the soy sauce, water, rice wine, brown sugar, garlic and ginger. Bring the mixture to a boil and then turn the heat to low. Simmer for 5 minutes. In a small bowl, whisk together the cornstarch with 1 tablespoon of water. Slowly whisk the cornstarch into the soy sauce mixture and turn off the heat. Set aside.

2. Preheat the grill. Assemble the skewers by alternating pieces of chicken, pineapple and onion. Brush lightly with olive oil. Season with salt and pepper. Place the kabobs on the grill over medium heat and cook for 3-4 minutes until the internal temperature of the chicken reaches 170. Turn the kabobs over and cook for an additional minute. Brush the kabobs with the teriyaki glaze and cook for one minute longer. Turn the kabob once more and brush the opposite side with the glaze. Allow to cook for an additional minute and then transfer to a serving platter. Serve immediately


