the Christmas tree.



ARE CONSIDERING

The Legislature is on a two-week break with no voting. Therefore, this report contains several recently introduced bills of interest. Note: There will be no Roll Call Report Thanksgiving week.

Senate Bill 440 and House Bill 4748: Require health department inspection of privatized prison kitchens

Introduced by Sen. Tom Casperson (R) and Rep. John Kivela (D), respectively, to give local health departments the authority to inspect prison kitchens that are run by employees of a private contractor, and require the contractor to pay for these. Prison kitchens operated by government employees would not get health department inspections. Referred to committee, no further action at this time.

Senate Bill 445: Ban local "sanctuary city" policies

Introduced by Sen. Mike Kowall (R), to prohibit local governments from adopting or enforcing a policy that limits officials or police from communicating or cooperating with appropriate federal officials concerning the status of illegal aliens. Referred to committee, no further action at this time.

Senate Bill 450 and House Bill 4726: Repeal 2012 legalization of small fireworks

Introduced by Sen. David Knezek (D) and Rep. Henry Yanez (D), respectively, to repeal the 2012 law that legalized the sale and use of "consumer fireworks" including firecrackers, bottle rockets, aerial spinners, Roman candles, etc. Referred to committee, no further action at this time.

Senate Bill 459: Decriminalize fantasy football betting

Introduced by Sen. Curtis Hertel, Jr. (D), to decriminalize betting on "fantasy football" and other "simulation or educational" games and contests. Referred to committee, no further action at this time.

Senate Bill 465: Authorize legislative vote on EPA-mandated electric generation plan

Introduced by Sen. Mike Shirkey (R), to require the Department of Environmental Quality to submit to the legislature its plan to comply with recent federal greenhouse gas emissions mandates, and prohibit the DEQ from submitting the plan to the feds if the legislature votes to disapprove it within 30 days. The recently imposed federal mandate would reportedly require 60 percent of the state's coal-fired generator plants to be shut down and replaced. Referred to committee, no further action at this time.

House Bill 4698: Authorize drivers license, state ID gender change

Introduced by Rep. Brian Banks (D), to require the Secretary of State to change the gender indicated on the drivers license of a person who requests this if the individual has

obtained a sex change operation, or produces a court order authorizing the change in designation, or other official identification to that effect. Referred to committee, no further action at this time.

Senate Bill 476: Authorize higher cigar tax Introduced by Sen. Wayne Schmidt (R), to repeal

the Oct. 1, 2016 sunset on a law that caps the tobacco tax imposed on cigars at 50 cents per cigar. Referred to committee, no further action at this time.

House Bill 4706: Let state enforce city income taxes

Introduced by Rep. Wendell Byrd (D), to authorize cities and the state Department of Treasury to enter agreements under which the Department could use its full state income tax enforcement powers to enforce the city's income tax (including Detroit). The bill has been reported from committee and is pending before the full House.

House Bill 4714: Require more corporate subsidy cost disclosures

Introduced by Rep. Jim Runestad (R), to require the Department of Treasury to notify the legislature of the number of claimants for tax credits granted under the former Michigan Economic Growth Authority law, listed by size of the final liability to the state and the amount of foregone taxes attributable to particular firms. It was recently revealed that tax breaks and subsidies granted under this program represent a nearly \$10 billion unfunded liability that will not be extinguished almost nearly 20 years. Under current law, key information about these special deals is kept secret. Referred to committee, no further action at this time.

House Bill 4750: Authorize state job training subsidies through **ISDs**

Introduced by Rep. Phil Potvin (R), to authorize another government jobtraining subsidy program for particular employers at intermediate school districts, similar to the one allowed for community colleges. Under the scheme, an ISD could borrow to pay for training a particular employer's new hires, and with the loans paid by the state in the form of an income tax earmark. ISDs statewide could borrow up to \$50 million for this. Referred to committee, no further action at this time

Note: Earlier this year the Legislature passed and the Governor signed an eight-year extension of the community college version of this scheme, and also eliminated a \$50 million annual cap on the subsidies.

Bills to ban drones in various places

Several bills have been introduced to ban remote control drones from flying in various specified places. They include:

Senate Bill 432: Ban drones near the Mackinac Bridge, introduced by Sen. Tom Casperson (R)

Senate Bill 487 and House Bill 4866: Ban drones near prisons, introduced by Sen. Darwin Booher (R) and Rep. Kurt Heise (R) House Bill 4868: Ban drone interference with public safety, introduced by Rep. Kurt Heise (R) Senate Bill 549: Ban drones over Capitol, introduced by Sen. Rick Jones (R)

Samaritan's Purse is an organization that works in crisis areas of the world by volunteering to spread the word of God. One program is Operation Christmas Child, where they put toys in shoeboxes and send them to children around the world.

For the Women's Christmas Gala, she'll be speaking on praising God in all circumstances, according to Lynch.

"I'm excited to spend time with other

women especially this time of the year with Christmas. It's important to spend time with one another and learn to praise God in all circumstances," she said. "I've known Pastor Wes Morris for years. I'm excited to see what God's been doing in the church."

Morris said members of the church are excited about her talk. "We're just hoping God will use it in a big way," Morris said.

Lynch will speak at approximately 7 p.m., followed by worship songs and then coffee and dessert. Food will be provided. The Rock Church urges attendees to

register so they have an accurate count of how many guests to expect.

"They need to tell us ahead of time to make sure they get a seat and can be assigned a table," Morris said. Women can register by calling The Rock Church at (810) 629-2444.



Glubzinski says you have to listen to your friends and family during the year, so you don't miss any hints.

"Be a detective and keep a notebook in your purse or car to remember your observations," she said. "Lots of clues are sent your way: favorite clothing colors, furniture styles, a mention of always being cold, or losing the car keys. Little notes are a big help with scouting for that perfect gift."

SHOP

You can get much better bargains when you shop outside the December Christmas rush, according to Glubzinski. "Shopping for Christmas (and birthdays) during the year spreads out the total cost and allows you to discover real bargains."

For example, if hubby's coat looks a little shabby and will need to be replaced by next winter, you know it will be half price in early March. "You just have to find a secure place to keep it during the summer months," said Glubzinski.

She recalled one time when a friend had to search for a coaster to set her iced tea on when she was visiting one time. "She's a biking enthusiast, and when I was on vacation this year. I found beautiful bicycle coasters in a small shop. Her birthday wasn't 'til October, but she was prepared with a very thoughtful gift. "These were probably one of the least expensive gifts I have given, but she knew I was thinking of just her when I found them," said Glubzinski. "She loved them so much she made an art project out of them ... and now she's in the market for coasters again." LOOK

Look at your gift package from the recipient's perspective. It doesn't matter how much time, money or consideration was put into the gift; if it doesn't have "curb appeal," it has lost some of its luster.

"It takes an extra minute to spruce up a package and make it really special," said Glubzinski. "Tie a candy cane or tinsel to a package wrapped in red paper. Put a huge bow on a tiny box. There are now prank boxes available your friends with a good sense of humor."

She says that her daughter, Angel, makes fun of the effort she makes in matching a greeting card envelope to the wrapping paper used, but she noticed.

FOR THE PERSON WHO HAS EVERYTHING

If you're really stuck for ideas, or have on your list a person who really does have everything, head for the bookstore. "There's something there for everyone," said Glubzinksi. "You're not limited to books there, either. A senior might enjoy a reading light, a 'tween almost always gets excited about a diary and a busy mom would appreciate an organizational calendar that features one of her favorite hobbies."

Lastly, never underestimate the value of something homemade or personalized in some way. "They are gifts from the heart," said Glubzinski. "After all, it's usually not the presents we remember and cherish, but the warm feelings one gets from getting — and from giving something special."







DEAR DR. ROACH:

I am taking Zetia and niacin for extremely high cholesterol and triglycerides. Exactly what type of diet should I be on to lower my cholesterol

and triglycerides? Many of the processed (cheese, ice cream, cookies, etc.) fat-free, cholesterolfree foods are high in sugar. Should I be on the South Beach Diet or a strictly vegetarian diet? How many calories, carbohydrates and fat grams should I consume daily to lose weight? I am a 5-feet-4-inch-tall female who weighs 160 pounds. When I was on the Atkins diet for more than 20 years,

I was always slim and had no health problems. Thank you. — J.D.

ANSWER:

You are asking how to lower cholesterol, but I think what you really want to know is what diet reduces risk of heart disease. The right question is: What diet should you be on that will help you be healthier in the long term? All of the diets you mention have their strengths and weaknesses. Almost everyone agrees that avoiding sugar and processed
