Because approximately 400 millions cups are consumed everyday, coffee is one of America's favorite beverages.

Coffee is popular partly because of its ability to adapt to most people's tastes with cream and sugar, iced or hot, and caffeinated or decaf options.

There are many different types of coffee blends, from dark roast, to light roast, to pumpkin spice, and you can get coffee from a variety of chains like Starbucks, Tim Horton's, and Biggby. The perfect cup of coffee starts with beans. See COFFEE on 7B



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Q I have a 2002 Dodge Dakota 4X4. When driving straight and/or turning right I hear a rumbling/ growling noise. The noise goes away when turning left. It sounds like it is coming from the front end and more on the right side, I think. What could this be?

A: Jeff, this is most likely a bad wheel bearing causing this noise. You will need to jack up the front wheels. Check for any movement in the wheel by trying to move it in at the top and out at the bottom, going back and forth. Sometimes we have to run the vehicle on the hoist and listen with a stethoscope to pinpoint the exact cause when there is no obvious play in the wheel bearing. They can be tricky as far as sounding like a right side when it is actualy the left or vise versa. That is why we double check them with the stethoscope.

Hanukkah begins Sunday at sunset

Local couples share their faiths in blended Jewish and Christian traditions

While many local residents will spend

their Sunday evening eating popcorn and watching TV, Drew Shapiro of Fenton and his fiancée, Jamie Benedict, will share an evening of religious significance for Jewish people worldwide as they begin their eight-day celebration of Hanukkah.


Known as the "Festival of Lights," Hanukkah begins at sunset this Sunday, Dec. 6 and ends on Monday, Dec. 14.


Every year, the first day of Hannukah falls on a different day, usually sometime betweenlateNovember and late December.

Hannukah commemorates the victory of the ancient Israelites over the Syrian Greek army, and the subsequent miracle of restoring the menorah (seven-branched candelabrum) in the Holy Temple of Jerusalem.

Considered a lesser festival than Rosh Hashana and Yom Kippur, Hanukkah has become more festive because it is very close to Christmas. Children receive gifts for Hanukkah, often one gift for each of the eight nights. But the main celebration is lighting the menorah, spinning the dreidel and eating special fried foods.

Many Hanukkah foods are deep-fried in oil, symbolizing the oil from the menorah used in the temple. The miracle of Hanukkah is that only one vial of oil was found with just enough oil for one day, and

yet it lasted for eight full days.

"We always do a traditional Jewish dinner of brisket and potato latkes (potato pancakes) with my parents," said Shapiro, 27, who grew up in a household that celebrated both Jewish and Christmas traditions.

His mother, Dawn, was raised Catholic and converted to Judaism when she married Steven Shapiro. "We always celebrated Christmas, too, but more in the spirit of the season with its traditions, not religiously,"

said Shapiro. "I enjoy the entire season," he said. "I think it's wonderful that everyone gets to enjoy the holiday in their own way."

As a child, Shapiro was immersed in many Jewish traditions, attending Hebrew School, having a bar-mitzvah at age 13, and visiting Israel in 2013 as part of a free educational birthright trip to Israel for young adults age 18 to 26. "It was really a powerful experience for me in re-enforcing my Judaism," he said.

Now planning to marry Benedict in September 2017, the couple is talking about how they will worship and raise children. "Jamie is considering converting to Judaism," he said. "It's a big step. I definitely want our children to be raised in the Jewish faith."

Dollar General approved for additional driveway

Estimated build date of Thompson Road store is June 2016

Fenton Twp. — The Board of Trustees voted unanimously to rezone part of a parcel on Thompson Road to allow an upcoming free-standing Dollar General store to have an additional driveway.

Engineers for Dollar General still must receive preliminary and final site plan approval from the township's planning commission.

The approximately 9,000-squarefoot store would be located next to Thompson I.G., which is just east of U.S. 23. Original site plans included 30 parking spaces.

Owner of the site, Thomas Miller, has a purchase agreement with Dollar General. of Midwest V LLC.

With the original Planned Unit Development (PUD) only two driveways were allowed on Thompson Road, but now Dollar General will have a third.

At the Nov. 2 board meeting, Site engineer Jim Milanowski of Milanowski & Englert Engineering and Surveying Inc. presented the project. The board spoke in favor of the project, but questioned if the 30 parking spaces would be enough.

"We're not in favor of over paving Americaif we don't need to," Milanowski said, adding that amount of parking spaces is standard for that type of freestanding Dollar General.

Milanowski said their build date is June 2016. He did not yet have an estimated cost.

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

5 YEARS

Wednesday, Dec. 8, 2010 Local officials to decide on Sun-day morning liquor sales. Unless the Michigan Liquor Control Commission hears otherwise from local governments regarding the sale of liquor on Sundays, it will begin issuing the early morning Sunday Sales Permits to licensees on Thursday, Dec. 16.

10 YEARS

Wednesday, Dec. 7, 2005 Fountain Village rezoning fails. The Fenton Township Board of Trustees voted against the rezoning request for the proposed Fountain Village, which would have been developed at the southwest section of Thompson and Fenton roads. The original concept included 125 single family homes and 41 detached single family condominiums. Homes were expected to be priced in the \$250,000 to \$399,000 range.

15 YEARS

Wednesday, Dec. 6, 2000 Computer crash 'bytes.' City employees work to restore financial records. An investigation is underway to determine how the computer hard drive containing the city's financial records could have failed for the second time in just over a year. In addition to the hard drive crash, the backup system also failed.

20 YEARS

Sunday, Dec. 10, 1995 Battle at the border: Fenton Township accuses Linden of aggressive annexation attempts. Taking measures to maintain land ownership is not a new concept, and Fenton Township plans to fight attempts to annex its properties bordering the city of Fenton. Property owners who are said to be considering getting out of Fenton Township include the Linden Free Methodist Church, Price Aviation and Silver Chase Apartments, at Owen and Jennings roads.

25 YEARS

Sunday, Dec. 9, 1990 Fenton Recycling Incentive. Per bag city trash charge? Fenton residents may soon have an added incentive to recycle. A Fenton City Council committee has proposed a solid waste plan that will encourage residents to separate paper, plastic, tin and other recyclable items in approved containers. The plan would encourage residents to recycle because they will be charged for their garbage on a per-bag basis instead of the current fixed rate of \$74 per year.

30 YEARS

Sunday, Dec. 8, 1985 'Another tool' says Fenton artist. Art by computer. An artist's tool can be anything that will fit the mood and expression that the artist wishes to convey. Those tools may be conventional brushes, palette knives, sponges, stones or even blow torches and computers. Sandy Berra, a member of the Fenton Artists Guild has temporarily put away the precious metals used in the making of distinctive jewelry and turned her talents to art by computer.

NATIONAL

DEC. 6

1992: Jerry Rice of the San Francisco 49ers catches his 101st career touchdown reception, breaking the record for most career touchdowns previously held by Steve Largent. Drafted in 1985 out of Mississippi Valley State University, Rice became a star wide receiver for the 49ers. Rice's goal was getting his team to the Super Bowl, which he did in 1988.

DEC.7

1941: At 7:55 a.m. Hawaii time, a Japanese dive bomber bearing the red symbol of the Rising Sun of Japan on its wings appears out of the clouds above the island of Oahu. A swarm of 360 Japanese warplanes followed, descending on the U.S. naval base at Pearl Harbor in a ferocious assault. The surprise attack struck a critical blow against the U.S. Pacific fleet and drew the United States irrevocably into World War II.

DEC. 8

1980: Former Beatle John Lennon was shot and killed by Mark David Chapman, 25, on Dec. 8, 1980. Lennon and his wife, Yoko Ono, were returning home at approximately 10:50 p.m. He was shot when they exited their limousine onto the West 72nd St. sidewalk just outside their apartment building, the now-famous Dakota. On nearly the same spot some six hours earlier, Lennon had signed his autograph on a copy of his new album, "Double Fantasy," for the man who would soon shoot him dead.

DEC. 9

1992: British Prime Minister John Major announces the formal separation of Charles, Prince of Wales and heir to the British throne, and his wife, Princess Diana. Major explained that the royal couple were separating "amicably." The report came after several years of speculation by the tabloid press that the marriage was in peril. On July 29, 1981, nearly one billion television viewers in 74 countries tuned in to witness the marriage of Prince Charles, heir to the British throne, to Lady Diana Spencer, a young English schoolteacher.

DEC. 10

1967: A plane crash in Madison, Wisconsin, kills soul singer Otis Redding, known for the song "Sittin' on the Dock of the Bay," and members of the Bar-Kays band. One survivor, Ben Cauley, later reported that he had been asleep until just before the crash. He saw his friend in the band, Phalon Jones, look out the window of the small plane and exclaim "Oh no!" and, before he knew it, he was in a frigid lake holding onto a seat cushion. The following day, the lake was dragged and the bodies of the victims were recovered. A storm in Madison that day was a factor in the crash but the exact cause was never determined.

DEC. 11

2008: On this day in 2008, financier Bernard Madoff is arrested at his New York City apartment and charged with masterminding a longrunning Ponzi scheme later estimated to involve around \$65 billion, making it one of the biggest investment frauds in Wall Street history. Madoff pleaded guilty to the 11 felony counts against him and was sentenced to 150 years behind bars

DEC. 12

1917: In Omaha, Nebraska, Father Edward J. Flanagan, a 31-year-old Irish priest, opens the doors to a home for troubled and neglected children, and six boys enter to seek a better life. Flanagan, who previously ran the Workingmen's Hotel, a haven for down-and-out workers in Omaha, understood that mistreated or orphaned children were at high risk of turning to delinquency and crime in later years. The location of what would become known as "Boys Town" rapidly filled up with the arrival of additional children. In the spring of 1918, no space was left in the drafty Victorian mansion, so Father Flanagan, assisted by sympathetic citizens, moved Boys Town to a building 10 times the size on the other side of town.

FRENCH PRESS COFFEE AT THE LAUNDRY

The Laundry in Fenton is known for its French Press coffee, which needs a coarser grind.

Ryan Petty, an employee at The Laundry, said the French Press is a popular option for customers.

The coffee is put at the bottom of the press and hot water is poured in. After waiting two to three minutes, you push the divider down and pour the coffee.

French Press coffee is known for being intense dark roast coffee. "The residue on the bottom

is going to make it really really potent," he said. "It's a very dark roast. A lot of people have to dilute it with hot water."

Making French Press coffee at home is easy. Petty recommends getting a metal press, not a plastic one because plastic presses don't last as long.

Dark roast coffee is commonly used in French Presses, but light roast can be used too. He recommends Folgers or Maxwell House coffee, and using half the amount of grounds you would use in a normal pot of coffee into the press.

"Do four to five tablespoons of grounds in the press than fill it with the water," he said. If you don't like dark roast coffee, Petty recommends simply using light roast coffee, but it will be darker than usual.

"Starbucks makes a really good light coffee," he said. "If you've never had French Press coffee, it's going to taste more acidic than regular but that's the traditional way to drink coffee."

Aaron Brooks of Linden, owner of online coffee store Mason Jar Coffee Co., found that people liked coffee from Guatemala and Ethiopia.

"I roast them and do sample cups of coffee and see which ones people liked the best. People really like Guatemala," he said. He uses three small roasters to roast cof-

fee about twice a week. "In order to roast coffee you need heat

and agitation," he said. "I roast to sound and smell, sound especially. Coffee cracks, that's how you know it's done."

With medium roast coffee, he keeps the beans in the roaster for a minute after he hears the first bean crack. For dark roast, he waits to hear two cracks.

A light roast coffee roasts for a shorter period of time, but Brooks doesn't have as much demand for that.

Brooks then grinds the beans. He makes pour-over coffee, which needs a finer grind.

After grinding the beans, the next important thing is the amount of time water spends in the grounds. He usually uses his favorite pour-over machine, a Hario.

"You're looking for proper extraction level," he said. "If it's in there too long, it's going to be over extracted. If it's too quickly, it's under extracted. Grind time is really important."

Another factor is time. He knows his pour-over coffee should take about two minutes and 30 seconds for all the water to pour through the system.

He recommends people taste it black.

"If people want to put cream and sugar in their coffee, that's their prerogative. One of my favorite things to hear is 'I don't even need to put cream and sugar in my coffee'," Brooks said. "That's what happens when you make coffee the right way."

For the best cup of coffee, Brooks said you need two things: good coffee and the right moment.

"It's a good cup of coffee with a memorable situation," he said. He remembers the first cup of coffee he had was in Grand Haven with his wife, Sonja. "That first cup was very memorable because we were on vacation and I was getting to spend time with my wife."

Brooks said he wants to help people have that moment with his coffee.

"I want to provide good coffee and be a part of that family experience," he said. "That's one of the things that means the most to me."

ply Coffee in Holly said, "You have to know origin of beans, acidity and soil levels and all different things to do a really good roast of beans. I roast my own beans so you start with the highest quality and you roast to perfection."

It takes about 20 minutes to roast twoand-half pounds of coffee beans with her roaster.

Instead of using oils and syrups for flavor, she uses different flavored beans to make different coffees.

"I buy coffee from all over the world and then I roast it here. It all comes raw and unprocessed," she said.

Her Michigan Cherry blend and regular blend are very popular.

"I have a zanie blend that's really flavorful. It's a low acid coffee that people buy all the time," she said.

To make the perfect cup of coffee, Slagell said, "I roast it and brew it for them and then they doctor it up the way they like."

To freshen up the air in your home to create that natural, neutral smell:

· Wash all bed covers and wash or dryclean drapes.

• Have the carpet cleaned or replaced. • Mop hard-surface floors with a lightly

• Store old shoes in plastic boxes with lids.

RE/MAX Platinum in Fenton. "However, some sellers still want to continue on with their same strategy over the holidays."

He said that deciding to take your home off the market depends on the property and the motivation of the seller.

"If your home is on Lake Fenton and it's been on the market for a few months, take it off 'til February and let it breathe a little. A longer time on the market reflects poorly on the house, and snow isn't going to help that. If you're moving out of state and have priced your home to sell, then keep it on the market. Each situation is unique. It's a conversation to have between the seller and me.'

Tremaine agrees that it depends on a seller's motivation. "For folks who don't need to sell, we're advising them to take their home off the market. It's just being realistic, rather than fighting this time of year. The weather and snow only works against us."



FENTON COUNCIL RECEIVES MINIMAL STIPEND INCREASE

The city of Fenton's Compensation Commission has recommended a pay increase of \$6 per meeting, from \$69 to \$75, for members of the City Council. The meeting stipend limit also has been increased from 40 to 45 in order to cover the special meetings necessary throughout the year. According to Mayor Sue Osborn, the increase became effective with the new council elected Nov. 3. Unlike neighboring townships, Fenton City Council members are not paid a salary, but rather a stipend twice a year, in May and November, to cover expenses. With this increase, each of the seven council members will receive an additional \$615 per year for a total increase of \$4,305 per year.

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



Widow wonders what to do with uncashed checks

DEAR AMY:

When my wonderful husband passed away two and a half years ago, I set up an educational fund for my children —

for those who wished to provide gifts in his memory. People were overwhelmingly generous. At the time, it was very hard for me to read all the kind cards and letters I received (it still is). Last night I found three checks I had missed: two for \$50 and one for \$500! These are from people I don't see on a regular basis, if ever. I know it's far too late to deposit the

Can heart surgery cause hot flashes?

DEAR DR. ROACH:

I have had hot flashes, similar to those

experienced by post-menopausal women, ever since my coronary bypass in 1990. I can be sitting quietly in a chair reading or at my computer, and suddenly I find myself dripping with perspiration. I also have had panic attacks, with increased heart rate and other physical symptoms. A few years ago, a 24-hour **EKG showed heart**rhythm irregularities and that my heart

stopped briefly while asleep. If these idiosyncrasies of my autonomic nervous system are a consequence of my time on the heart-lung machine for the bypass, I'm not complaining -- just curious. You said that studies have been done on almost everything. Is this one? - W.S.B.

ANSWER:

I found that a lot of people complain of

similar symptoms. I also found that, indeed. the autonomic nervous system (the part of the nervous system that regulates temperature. sweat, blood pressure and many other critical aspects of body function without our being consciously aware of it) can be adversely affected by cardiac surgery. Some authors have suggested that the autonomic nervous system changes are one mechanism by which people are more likely to have depression after

cardiac surgery. I found several possible explanations why the ANS changes with bypass surgery, but no clear consensus. I would want to be sure that there are no other causes of these symptoms. It sounds like you have had an extensive evaluation, but I certainly would be concerned about a sudden fast heart rhythm, such as atrial fibrillation.
