Winter offers multiple outdoor activities

Many people opt to stay indoors more during the winter months, but others revel in the snowy weather, using the opportunity for athletic winter activities.

The winter months offer many activities from downhill and cross-country skiing, to snowshoeing and snowboarding, to backpacking and ice skating.

Millions of people go skiing or snowboarding every year. More than 10.46 million people went skiing or snowboarding in autumn of 2014, and more than 9.51 million went in spring of 2015, according to statista.com.

When the snow falls and the roads get icy, Kirk Bennett, a past Linden student and resident, puts away his water skis in favor of downhill skis and his snowboard.

"I've been skiing since I was 3," he said. "That's how my parents met, so it's

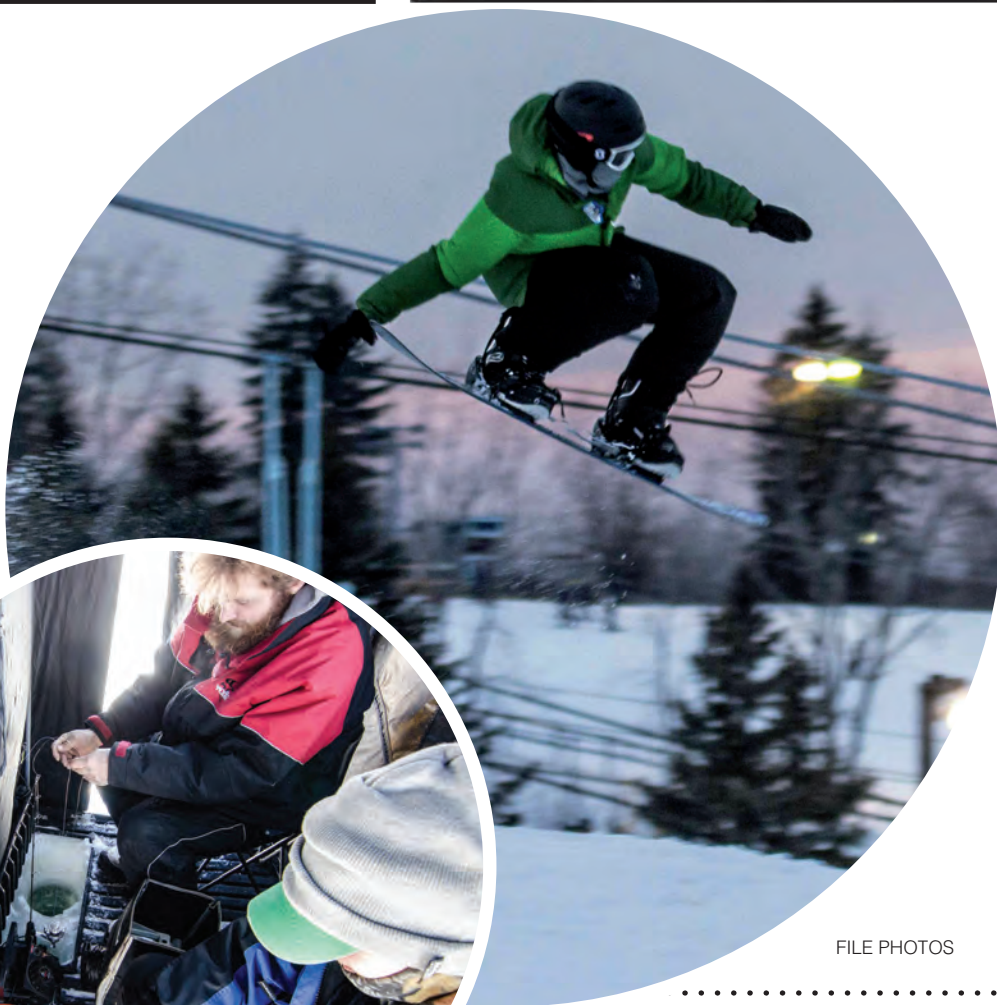
an important thing in my family.

He's also snowboarded since he was in sixth grade. He mainly goes to Mt. Holly to ski down the slopes, but he travels to Boyne or Schuss a few times a year.

These winter sports are not cheap. At Mt. Holly, lift tickets cost anywhere from \$35 to \$56 depending on the day, renting skis or a snowboard costs \$28, and renting a helmet costs \$10.

The man who made a name as "the Beaver" on the show made guest appearances on "Lassie" and reprised his role in the reunion show "Still the Beaver" in 1983.

Mathers is now a successful businessman who travels and speaks at conventions. As a Federal Communications Commission-licensed broadcaster, he appears on various national talk-radio shows.

BARBARA BILLINGSLEY

Cast as June Cleaver, the classic housewife who cooked and cleaned in a dress and pearls, Billingsley had a hard time finding work after the show ended. She didn't appear on screen again until about 20 years later in 1980 in "Airplane" as the passenger who could speak "jive."

She played Aunt Martha in the film version of "Leave it to Beaver" in 1997, and died of polymyalgia in October 2010 at the age of 94.

KEN OSMOND

Osmond played the smart-mouthed teen Eddie Haskell, and after the show, a few rumors circulated about his life. Some sources said he did pornography and some said he died in the Vietnam War.

In reality, Osmond served 18 years in the Los Angeles Police Department. After getting shot three times by a car thief he was pursuing, Osmond retired in 1988. He co-authored the book "Eddie: The Life and Times of America's Preeminent Bad Boy," which was published September 2014.

TONY DOW

After playing Wally Cleaver for years, Dow appeared on "My Three Sons," "Dr. Kildare" and "Mr. Novak." He also started writing and directing. Not many people know that Dow became a respected sculptor whose work has been shown in Louvre in Paris.

HUGH BEAUMONT

As father Ward Cleaver who gave his sons philosophical advice almost every episode, Beaumont retired from show business in the 1960s and became a Christmas tree farmer in Minnesota. He retired from farming trees in 1972 after a stroke, and died from a heart attack 10 years later at the age of 73.

FRANK BANK

After playing everyone's favorite bully "Lumpy" Rutherford, he appeared on "The Hollywood Squares," "Family Feud," and "Still the Beaver."

He finally left the acting world in 1972 and became a stockbroker. Former castmates Mathers and Billingsley were some of his clients.

He died in April 2013, one day after his 71st birthday. No cause of death was reported.

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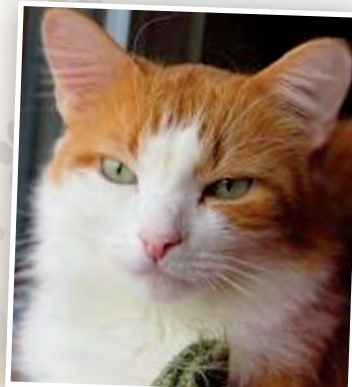

5 YEARS

Wednesday, Jan. 19, 2011

Nearly 50 apply for Holly police chief position. The village of Holly has received nearly 50 applications for the position of police chief. A new chief should be in place by February. Sgt. Michael Story has been filling in as police chief since former Chief Rollie Gackstetter retired in December.

10 YEARS

Sunday, Jan. 22, 2006

Linden to consider \$2.5 million loan for DPW facility. Linden City Council will consider supporting a \$2.5 million U.S. Rural Development loan application for a new Department of Public Works (DPW) garage. A year ago in the current facility, the Linden DPW generator, street sweeper and mower sat in three to four inches of water. The garage floor in the original portion of the facility has cracked and sunk through the years.

15 YEARS

Wednesday, Jan. 17, 2001

Community bids Hyde farewell. More than 200 people attended a reception honoring recently retired Royce Hyde, who retired as the Tyrone Township supervisor after 28 years of service.

20 YEARS

Sunday, Jan. 21, 1996

Psychic phenomenon? Fair cancelled due to threatening calls. A Linden ordinance instituted in 1980 that prevents people from telling fortunes for profit stopped a sold-out psychic fair scheduled at Bridge Street Gallery in Linden. The fair was cancelled due to threatening complaint calls.

25 YEARS

Sunday, Jan. 20, 1991

No license, still driving drunk. Judge sets bail at \$35,000. A Fenton Township man with multiple offenses is facing a possible five-year prison sentence. The man was also given a verbal tongue-lashing at his return visit before Genesee County Judge Gerald D. Snodgrass, who has twice before sentenced him to 90 days in jail for repeat drunk driving incidents.

30 YEARS

Sunday, Jan. 19, 1986

Alice Gray, editor, has retired. After 20 years in the newspaper business, Alice Gray, Tri-County News editor, has retired. Gray moved to Fenton in 1978 to become editor of the paper published by Rick Rockman. She succeeded Lucy Brabon, who had resigned the editorship because of a conflict of interest with her elective office as mayor of Fenton.

NATIONAL

JANUARY 17

1977: Gary Gilmore, convicted in the double murder of an elderly couple, is shot to death by a firing squad in Utah, becoming the first person to be executed in the United States since the death penalty was reinstated in 1976. In 1977, Gary Gilmore, a career criminal who had murdered the elderly couple because they would not lend him their car, was the first person to be executed since the end of the ban. Defiantly facing a firing squad, Gilmore's last words to his executioners before they shot him through the heart were "Let's do it."

JANUARY 18

1803: Thomas Jefferson requests funding from Congress to finance the Lewis and Clark expedition. Jefferson officially asked for \$2,500 though some sources indicate the expedition ultimately cost closer to \$50,000. Lewis was joined by his friend William Clark and 50 others on the journey, including an African-American slave and a female Indian guide named Sacagawea. The team first surveyed the territory that comprised the Louisiana Purchase, a vast expanse that reached as far north as present-day North Dakota, south to the Gulf of Mexico and stopped at the eastern border of Spanish territory in present-day Texas. The team then crossed the Rockies and navigated river routes to the Pacific coast of present-day Oregon.

JANUARY 19

1966: Following the death of Indian Prime Minister Lal Bahadur Shastri, Indira Gandhi becomes head of the Congress Party and thus prime minister of India. She was India's first female head of government and by the time of her assassination in 1984, was one of its most controversial.

JANUARY 20

1961: On the newly renovated east front of the United States Capitol, John Fitzgerald Kennedy is inaugurated as the 35th president of the United States. It was a cold and clear day, and the nation's capital was covered with a snowfall from the previous night. During his famous inauguration address, Kennedy, the youngest candidate ever elected to the presidency and the country's first Catholic president, declared that "the torch has been passed to a new generation of Americans" and appealed to Americans to "ask not what your country can do for you, ask what you can do for your country."

JANUARY 21

1951: Carl Dean Switzer, the actor who as a child played "Alfalfa" in the "Our Gang" comedy film series, dies at age 31 in a fight, allegedly about money, in a Mission Hills, California, home. Alfalfa, the freckle-faced boy with a warbling singing voice and a cowlick protruding from the top of his head, was Switzer's best-known role.

JANUARY 22

1998: In a Sacramento, California, courtroom, Theodore J. Kaczynski pleads guilty to all federal charges against him, acknowledging his responsibility for a 17-year campaign of package bombings attributed to the "Unabomber." Born in 1942, Kaczynski attended Harvard University and received a Ph.D. in mathematics from the University of Michigan. In the early 1970s, Kaczynski began living as a recluse in western Montana, in a 10-by-12 foot cabin without heat, electricity or running water. From this isolated location, he began the bombing campaign that would kill three people and injure more than 20 others.

JANUARY 23

1957: Machines at the Wham-O toy company roll out the first batch of their aerodynamic plastic discs — now known to millions of fans all over the world as "Frisbees." The story of the Frisbee began in Bridgeport, Connecticut, where William Frisbie opened the Frisbie Pie Company in 1871. Students from nearby universities would throw the empty pie tins to each other, yelling "Frisbie!" as they let go. In 1948, Walter Frederick Morrison and his partner Warren Franscioni invented a plastic version of the disc called the "Flying Saucer" that could fly further and more accurately than the tin pie plates. After splitting with Franscioni, Morrison made an improved model in 1955 and sold it to the new toy company Wham-O as the "Pluto Platter—an attempt to cash in on the public craze over space and Unidentified Flying Objects (UFOs).

Buying new gear costs even more. Good skis and a good snowboard can cost hundreds of dollars.

You can ski at many places in Michigan, including Mt. Holly, Brighton, Boyne, Higgins Lake, Traverse City, and many other places.

You can go ice skating at The Barn in Fenton, at the University of Michigan-Flint, at rinks made on area lakes, or in backyards.

Backpacking is also a popular winter activity, but it requires more planning and gear.

John Winder, 25, of Ypsilanti, is an active hiker who will often spend days on the trails during winter.

Lately, he's been training to hike the Appalachian Trail in March by hiking about 20 to 30 miles per week, often staying overnight in the wilderness and sleeping in a hammock. He'll hike through Ann Arbor and around Highland.

"It's appeals to me so much because it's really a different way of life, with your environment as your primary focus," he said.

Winder, a lightweight backpacker who

uses minimalist gear, started backpacking in 2012. He's had to work up to hiking 20 to 30 miles a week to avoid injuries from overuse.

"Naturally I like to take a slower pace in the winter, but sometimes the movement keeps you burning calories and creating warmth," he said.

Choosing the right clothes is challenging because you want something warm that won't hold in moisture. Backpackers need to wear the right clothes, wear sensible boots, pack protein-rich foods, and may need to plan for an overnight stay.

He said warmth is important and comes down to layering different materials correctly, added moisture and wind blocking are bigger concerns.

He is used to harsh winters in Michigan. "I had the typical Michigan upbringing with the outdoors as a family centerpiece," he said. "The usual — hunting, fishing, shooting."

He especially enjoys backpacking because "You see new things daily and get to experience people and places that will never happen that way again. It's really an exercise in deliberately living every moment," he said.

Yes, the outdoor sports can be costly, but the benefits are worth it

Regardless of what type of outdoor winter sports you enjoy, the initial financial outlay can be higher than you expected. The price of outdoor sports equipment varies greatly depending on style, brand names and where you buy them.

By doing a little homework and searching for sales and packages in advance, you should be able to save some money, and once you have everything you need, the subsequent costs will be minimal.

THE AVERAGE COST FOR NEW:

• **Downhill skis** ranges anywhere from **\$250 to \$1,000**. Add to that the average cost of equipment (bindings, boots, poles, etc.), which is about **\$300**.

• **Cross-country skis** and equipment cost about the same as downhill skis and equipment. This is one area where people can save by buying a package, which

includes the skis, poles, bindings, boots, etc.) The average cost of such a package ranges anywhere from **\$300 to \$1,000**.

• **Snowshoes** can be purchased for as low as **\$130** and as high as **\$200**. The **trekking pole** will cost you about **\$50**.

• **Snowboards**, depending on the brand and where you buy them will cost anywhere between **\$300 and \$600**. The required equipment, including boots and bindings will cost another **\$200 to \$300**, depending on type and brand.

• **Ice skates** can cost anywhere from \$50 to \$500, but the average cost is likely to be **\$80 to \$125**.

• **Outdoor backpacking equipment**, complete with necessary items, can cost anywhere from **\$500 to \$2,200**.

Sleepless nights

DEAR DR. ROACH:
How much good does it do for the body to just lie there with your eyes closed all night long when you can't sleep?

ANSWER:
It doesn't do much good at all; in fact, it causes harm, in that it makes it more likely for you to associate the bed as a place to stay awake. My advice is, if you are lying in bed and not sleeping, get up out of bed and do something. Listen to soft music. Read a book, as long as the light isn't too bright. Write in your diary. When you feel like sleeping, get back into bed, but don't stay there if you aren't getting to sleep in 15 minutes or so and know that you aren't going to. Getting a little high-intensity exercise during the day, avoiding caffeine after midday and staying away from naps are good ways to feel ready for sleep at bedtime.

DEAR DR. ROACH: I had my thyroid removed for a goiter 35 years ago. My doctor put me on 100 mcg of thyroid medication; however, when I took it, I got sick. My hands shook, and my heart beat

very quickly (over 100). So one doctor told me to split it, and take 50 in the morning and 50 in the afternoon. I felt better, and I took it twice a day for 30 years. After menopause, a different doctor changed it to 88 mcg and said to take it one time a day. This what I have been taking for five years, but I was feeling better and happier when I split the dose. My question is, can I split this medication? Does it make any different for the body if the TSH is normal? Does it make any difference what time of the day I take it? — H.T.

ANSWER: Many people do split the dose of thyroid hormone, especially if they are taking a type of thyroid, such as Armour, that contains T3. If 88 mcg is the dose that has the right amount of TSH (a hormone made by the pituitary that helps determine whether the dose is correct as far as your body is concerned) for you, then the TSH shouldn't be affected by taking half the dose in the morning and half at night. Most people don't find that it matters, but if it relieves your symptoms to take it twice a day, that's OK.

- INGREDIENTS:**
- 1 C. white sugar
 - 1 C. brown sugar
 - 3/4 C. vegetable oil
 - 1/2 C. unsweetened applesauce
 - 3 large eggs
 - 1 3/4 C. pumpkin puree
 - 1 1/2 C. all-purpose flour
 - 1 1/2 C. whole wheat flour
 - 2 t. ground cloves
 - 4 t. ground cinnamon
 - 2 t. ground nutmeg
 - 1 t. baking soda
 - 1/2 t. salt
 - 1/2 t. baking powder
 - 2/3 C. pumpkin seeds

- PREPARATION:**
1. Preheat the oven to 350°F. Lightly spray two loaf pans and set aside.
 2. Beat together the sugar and oil until fully combined. Mix in the eggs, pumpkin and applesauce until fully incorporated.
 3. In a separate bowl, mix together the flour, cloves, cinnamon, nutmeg, baking soda, salt and baking powder until fully combined.
 4. Slowly mix the dry ingredients in with the wet ingredients until just combined.
 5. Split the batter into the prepared loaf pans. Sprinkle 1/3 cup pumpkin seeds on each loaf, and place in the preheated oven for 1 hour, or until a toothpick inserted comes out clean.

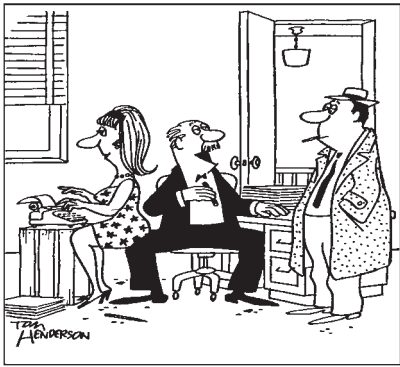
