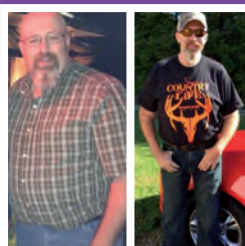

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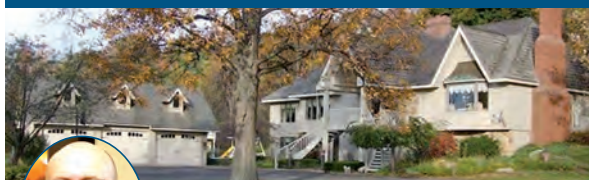

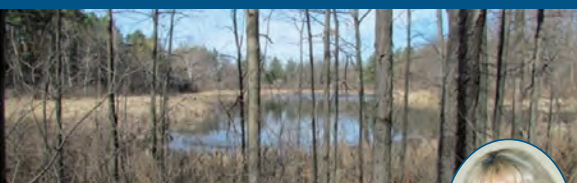

Notaries provide valuable service

■ Some will go to client's home or business for small travel fee

There's at least one activity that hasn't been replaced by modern technology — the need for a Notary Public.

According to michigan.gov, notary publics are appointed by the state to act as an impartial official and witness. They typically witness people signing legal documents and may administer oaths.

Each state has its own requirements for becoming a notary public. Typically, an individual must be 18 years old with a high school education.

Some states require written exams or other training, as well as conditions or prohibitions for convicted felons. These simple requirements qualify many people for consideration as a notary, allowing them to enhance their career prospects or earn extra income.

According to Les Beare, franchisee for The UPS Store in Fenton, signatures need to be notarized for wills, trusts, real estate documents, affidavits, land contracts, spousal consents on insurance documents, powers of attorney, sworn statements, quit claim deeds and more.

"We have four notaries and there is one here during all hours, Monday through Friday, from 9 a.m. to 7 p.m. and Saturday, from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m.

Some notaries, including those at The UPS Store, will travel to the home or business of a handicapped individual to provide notary services.

"Absolutely," said Beare of going to the client. "There is an additional travel fee of \$10 for the Fenton area."

The UPS Store charges \$10 per notarial act (signature), he added.

Beare said when a notary public takes a verification on oath or affirmation, or witnesses or attests to a signature, the individual signing the record must do so in the presence of the notary.

There is no exception to this requirement.

"If we do not personally know the individual who is requesting a notarial act, we ask to see a driver license, passport or state-issued personal identification card," he said.

Notaries are not prohibited legally from notarizing a document written in a foreign language.

However, there are numerous potential problems, including the fact that the term notary public, when translated into other languages, can refer to a markedly different office, with far greater authority than in the United States.

"A notary public should not proceed to notarize any document with which they are not comfortable doing so," said Beare. "The notary may recommend using a notary public familiar with the language in which the document is written."

Job possibilities are plentiful for notaries. Law offices have notaries on staff, as do banks, title companies, insurance

offices and government offices.

Other businesses, such as office supply, post office box and printing companies, postal services such as Goin' Postal in Fenton, may offer notary services to the public.

Michigan residents can apply to become a Notary Public at michigan.gov/sos.

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In the market for a \$2.4 million home?

■ You'll find it on Silver Lake, along with several others valued at more than \$1 million

Just how much are you willing to spend on a new home?

If you're willing to shell out \$2.4 million, you can be the proud owner of the most expensive home in Genesee County. Currently, one home on Silver Lake in Fenton, with eight acres of waterfront property, is on the market at this price.

Built in 2000, this colonial-style home boasts 4,578 square feet of living space, with four bedrooms and five bathrooms, plus additional square footage on the lower level, and a five-car garage.

"It's pretty unique to have eight acres of land on a lake," said Ken Brant of Brant & Associates Real Estate in Fenton. "Usually, waterfront property is one acre or less."

The home has been on the market since April 2015, which leads John Wentworth, of RE/MAX Platinum in Fenton, to believe it's over-priced. "It's priced about \$700,000 over what it should be," said Wentworth. "The Realtor handling the sale is from out of town, maybe that's why."

If this home sells for close to its listed price, it will beat all the high-end luxury homes sold last year in the tri-county area. "No homes sold for over \$2 million in 2015," said Brant. "Of all homes that sold for over \$1 million, 90 percent of them are on a lake."

Usually only one or two homes sell for more than \$1 million, but 2015 had five homes sold in that price range. "Three of them were on Lake Fenton, one on Lobdell and one on Ponemah," said Wentworth. "Of these five, we sold three of them."

At just under a million dollars, a home priced at \$999,000 is now pending, sold in-house before it even hit the market, said Wentworth. "There are quite a few homes priced at \$750,000 up to a million. These are just now coming into the market."

Not all of the area's luxury homes are located on the waterfront. Three exclusive neighborhoods boast high price tags and an exclusive market.

Probably the most exclusive area is Applewood, an upscale subdivision off Hartland Road, past State Road Elementary. Built around the year 2000, there are only about 20 homes in the neighborhood, with a few lots still available.

"These homes show the 'lifestyles of

the rich and famous," said Brant. "Priced between \$400,000 and \$2.5 million, they offer unique features, from in-ground

pools to home theaters, an extra garage or two, plus two to four acres of property."

Top of the Pines, with homes priced between \$500,000 and \$1.5 million, offers homeowners from two to 10 acres, plus many exclusive features. There are only about 20 homes in the neighborhood.

Hills of Tyrone, with about 100 homes, was built in several phases beginning in the 1990s, according to Brant. "These homes are priced from about \$400,000 to \$800,000, with the exception of one valued at closer to \$1 million."

Who buys these expensive homes? Business owners, doctors, sales professionals, to name a few, according to Wentworth.

Marketing these pricey homes requires a different strategy than just putting up a "For Sale" sign and holding an open house or two. "It's mostly where you market," said Wentworth. "You're tapping into a whole different clientele and you have to know where to find them."

"Drones and aerial photography are a big part of selling these exclusive homes," added Brant.

NOTICE is hereby given that at its regular meeting held on January 13, 2016, the Rose Township Board of Trustees adopted amendments to Rose Township Ordinance Number 53, to be effective 30 days after publication of this notice and summary. A true and complete copy of Ordinance 53, the Rose Township Ordinance for Cemeteries is available for inspection and copies may be obtained at the office of the Rose Township Clerk, 9080 Mason Street, Holly, Michigan 48442, during regular business hours from 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., Monday through Thursday, except holidays.

1.01	Purpose: The purpose of this ordinance is to provide maintenance and care of the Township owned cemeteries by establishing procedures, rules and regulations.		<p>two (2) adjoining plots, not to exceed the following dimensions, may be placed at the center head of the two plots. The overall height not to exceed thirty (30) inches by forty-eight (48) inches wide and eighteen (18) inches thick.</p> <p>Markers: A flush stone or metal marker may be used in place of a headstone, to designate the deceased or interment of cremains or the interment of an infant. Two (2) Flush stone or metal markers, each not to exceed thirty (30) inches by twelve (12) inches may be used on a single plot to designate two interments. One flush marker shared with two (2) adjoining plots, not to exceed forty-eight (48) inches by twelve (12) inches may be placed at the center head of the two plots. A flush stone or metal marker, not to exceed thirty (30) inches by twelve (12) inches may be placed at the foot of a plot to designate the second interment.</p> <p>Foundations: Foundations shall not be constructed or set between November 1st and April 15th each year. All foundations shall conform to the contour of the ground and in no case shall the ground be changed to conform to the foundation. Foundations shall be built two (2) inches wider than all monuments, headstones and flush markers. All foundations shall be installed under the direction of the Cemetery Sexton. The fee for this service is the responsibility of the heirs or family of the person buried in that location and shall be paid prior to the commencement of installation.</p>
1.02	Definitions: This section identifies the terms and phrases as provided for under this ordinance.		
1.03	Funding: “The Township Board shall periodically review the fees and shall annually budget and provide funds in an amount sufficient to maintain and properly care for the cemeteries.”		
1.04	Personnel: The Township Board shall establish and pay compensation to the cemetery maintenance personnel to be established by Township Board.		
1.05	Title to Property: Title to the real property, upon which the cemeteries are located, lies in the Township in fee simple, rendering any plots or rights of burial therein to be exempt from taxation.		
1.06	Township Clerk Duties: This section states: “The Township Clerk shall be responsible for the Certificates of Right of Burial, all records pertaining to the cemeteries. The Clerk will work with the cemetery personnel to direct duties in the cemeteries.”		
1.07	Township Treasurer Duties: This section states: “The Treasurer shall be responsible for deposits, in, disbursement from and investment of any and all cemetery funds transferred to or created by the township, in accordance with any conditions or restrictions of such a transfer or township action.”		
1.08	Cemetery Maintenance Personnel Duties: This section states: Cemetery maintenance personnel shall coordinate and reports to Clerk, assist with duties and tasks, implement compliance with cemetery ordinance, place Veteran flags in veteran flag holders per ordinance.	10.35	
10.9	Sexton’s Duties: Insuring compliance with the Ordinance adopted by the Township governing the cemeteries, overseeing the operation of interments in the cemeteries, personal contact with owners or prospective owners regarding the condition, purchase or other disposition of plots, keeping a current map and records of all purchased, used and unused rights of burial or cremains in the cemeteries, including names of persons interred, dates and place of death, identity of undertaker and crematory, veteran burial, branch of service and providing the township with all of the above listed information and all other requirements for records, as needed by the Township and required by state law, other duties and responsibilities to be covered in the sexton’s contract.		
10.12	Distribution of Fees and Charges: All collected fees and charges for cemetery services shall be deposited by the Treasurer in the general maintenance fund, unless designated otherwise by the Township Board, except for the fifteen (15%) Of proceeds received from the sale of burial plots for the perpetual fund and money collected for the Capital Outlay Fund.		<p>Rules and Regulations: The following rules and regulations apply to all township cemeteries to further the Township efforts to maintain the serenity, of the landscape and general care and safety of the entire grounds. No glass containers are allowed in the cemetery. All tripods, trellises, settees, benches, vine arches, glass cases, metal forms, ornaments, toys, crockery fruit jars, tin cans, wooden headboards, iron, wood or metal markers or standards, or other items, are not permitted upon any plot. The cemetery assistant will remove all such objects. No grading, leveling or excavating within the cemeteries shall be allowed without the permission of the township clerk, cemetery assistant or sexton. No cremains shall be scattered or dispersed within any of the township cemeteries. There shall be no carrying or use of firearms within the cemeteries, except for ceremonial use at military services. No person shall possess or consume any alcoholic beverages in any of the cemeteries. The size of a flower bed adjacent to a monument must not exceed the length of the monument or headstone or extend more than twelve (12) inches into the interment area. All flowers and plants shall be placed near the marker in such a manner as not to interfere with the mowing of grass. The Sexton or Cemetery Assistant may remove anything that interferes with cemetery maintenance. Potted plants and cut flowers may be placed on a plot on Easter, Mother’s Day, Armed Forces Day, Memorial Day, Father’s Day, Labor Day, Children’s Day and on special occasions by permission of the township. Plants and flowers remaining longer than seven days will be removed and disposed. At no time can the sod be disturbed for the placing of such potted plants or cut flowers. The Cemetery Assistant reserves the right to remove such plants or flowers when necessary. Flower urns may be placed on any plot within the cemetery. Urns must be made of bronze, aluminum or concrete. Any unsightly or neglected urns will be removed. All discolored silk and artificial flowers will be removed at the Cemetery Assistant’s discretion. A permit, signed by the Cemetery Assistant, is required to plant any tree, shrub or bush. The Cemetery Assistant reserves the right to remove such trees if they become neglected, to large, encroach on another plot or are planted without authority. A winter blanket or wreath may be placed on any occupied plot during the winter season from November 15th to April 1st at the discretion of the Cemetery Assistant. All refuge, rubbish and trash must be placed in the containers provided. No pets are permitted in the cemeteries. Horseback riding and snowmobile riding within the cemeteries is prohibited. Automobiles and other authorized vehicles operated in the cemeteries shall observe the following rules: Speed limit ten miles per hours, sounding of horns or other warning signals is prohibited, vehicles shall use roadways only; no driving on or between graves, passing of a procession is prohibited. The Township and the Cemetery Assistant shall not be responsible for any damage to plots, monuments, headstones or markers or for flowers or articles removed.</p>
10.33	Interment and Disinterment: All interments shall be accompanied by a burial permit or crematory document and a Certificate of Right of Burial. Certificates, permits and documents for interments will be accepted only by the Sexton, Cemetery Assistant or the Township Clerk, one of which must be in attendance and have full charge of all interments within Rose Township. Charges for all cemetery services must be paid in full or guaranteed by a funeral director, in case of a funeral arrangement or by a memorial dealer, in case of a memorial installation. Veteran Burials: Metal Veteran flag holders will be provided by the Township Board for those persons having served in the military. Flags shall be put out in each cemetery one (1) week before May 30th, each year. Flags are to remain on plots for Memorial Day, Flag Day, Independence Day, Labor Day and Veteran’s Day. Flags will be removed on or after November 15th, each year. Winter Burials: Additional fees may be charged due to inclement weather, frozen ground or similar winter conditions. No winter interments shall occur without the prior consent of the Sexton. Disinterment: No disinterment of an occupied plot shall occur until all permits, licenses and written authorizations required by law have been obtained from an applicable State or County agency or government unit of official jurisdiction and filed with the Township. The Township Clerk, Cemetery Assistant or Sexton shall have the authority to refuse to allow a disinterment if the disinterment is not done pursuant to a court order (issued by a court of competent jurisdiction). No person shall disturb, in any manner the remains in any grave except as provided for in this article.		
10.34	Monuments: A monument shall not be erected without first obtaining the written approval of the Township Clerk and the Cemetery Assistant. A monument will only be allowed in the center of four (4) or more adjoining plots. A monument shall not exceed the following dimensions; an overall height of four (4) feet by six (6) feet wide and one (1) foot thickness. Headstones One (1) headstone, not to exceed the following dimensions, may be placed on one plot. The overall height not to exceed thirty (30) inches by thirty (30) inches wide and eighteen (18) inches thick. One (1) headstone shared with	10.36	
			<p>Removal, Errors, Etc. The Township shall have the right to correct any errors that may be made, either in making interments, disinterment, or removals, or in the description, transfer or conveyance of any interment property, either by canceling such conveyance and substituting and conveying in lieu thereof other interment property of equal value by the Sexton, or by refunding the amount of money paid on account of that purchase. In the event the error shall involve the interment of remains of any person in such property, the Sexton shall have the right to remove and reinter the remains in such other property of equal value and similar location as may be substituted and conveyed in compliance with State Law.</p>

1. The world's largest snowflake was reported to be 15 inches wide and 8 inches thick. According to the Guinness Book of World Records, the snowflake was found at Fort Keogh, Montana on Jan. 28, 1887.

2. All snowflakes have six sides because of its chemical composition.

3. Despite all the songs and common sayings, snow is not white. It's clear and colorless, but the complex structure of snow crystals result in light reflecting from countless small surfaces. The sunlight is absorbed by the snow and over the wavelengths of visible light, making snow appear to be white.

4. The record for the most snow in a 24-hour period in the United States was at Silver Lake, Colorado in 1921 with 76 inches of snow.

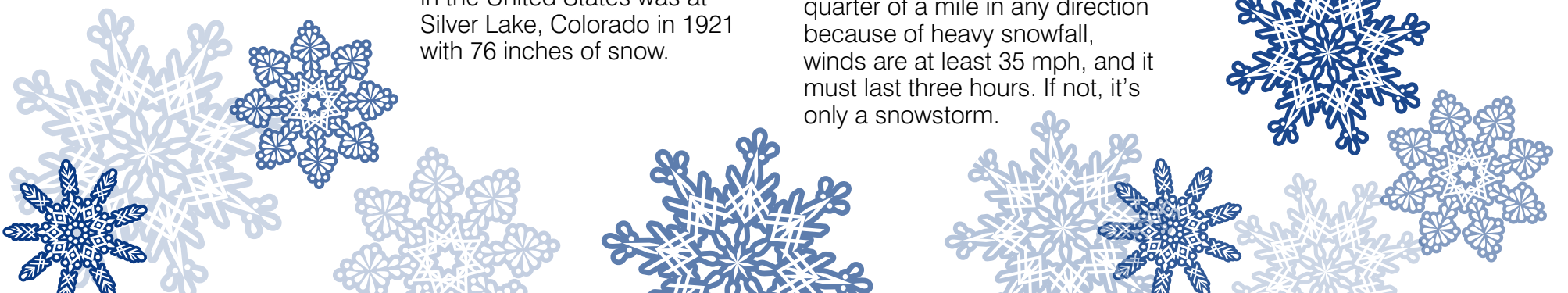
5. The record for most snowfall in a year is at Mt. Baker ski area in Washington State with 1,140 inches of snow in the 1998/1999 winter season.

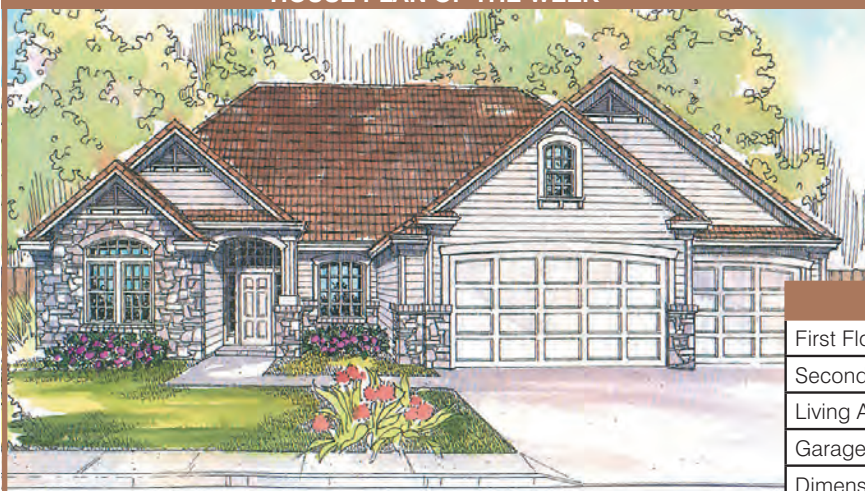
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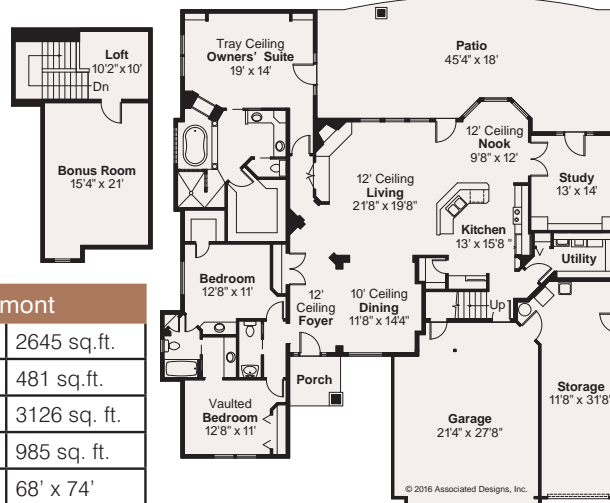
