House Bill 5105, Extend Medicaid health insurance claims tax

To extend until 2020 the 2017 sunset on a 0.75 percent tax on health insurance claims, which is designed to game the federal Medicaid program in ways that result in higher federal payments to Michigan's medical welfare establishment.

To waive liability for damages caused by an individual who breaks into a locked car to rescue a child or animal he or she believes to be in danger, subject to limits and conditions specified in the bill.

House Bill 4493, Mandate Holocaust and genocide instruction

To require public schools to provide high school students with instruction about genocides, including the Holocaust. Also, to create a new government commission to research and make recommendations on how to teach this better.

House Bill 5219, Permit local tax hike electioneering if "reasonable"

To repeal the prohibition established by a 2015 law on governments and school district communications referencing their own property tax hike or other ballot measures in a taxpayer-funded communication during the 60 days before the election. The bill instead would permit mailings and other communications with "factual and neutral information concerning the purpose or direct impact" of a proposal as long as a judge or state elections bureau official has not decreed that the language can be "reasonably be interpreted as an attempt to influence the outcome."

Disney World is a magical place where you can meet Cinderella, the snow queen herself, Elsa, and all the other Disney characters. Families flock to the attraction, bringing their kids to visit the gift shop and go on the rides. While it's well-known that Disney hires people to play these characters, the amusement park has many other secrets.

The story goes that Walt Disney himself visited other parks and observed other people to find out how long they held onto trash before dropping it on the ground. He counted about 30 steps, and **now there's a trash can every 30 steps in Disney World.**

1. There are **tunnels under the park** that let employees and cast members move between the different areas. This is why you never see Princess Anna in Pocahontas's territory.
2. Have you ever wondered why there isn't any gum stuck to the ground or under picnic tables? **None of the shops sell gum** to avoid sticky situations.
3. Years ago, the parking lots for the Magic Kingdom were named after six of the seven Snow White dwarves. **Doc was left out because designers didn't want them to be confused with ferry docks.** The lots were renamed after heroes and villains.
4. Even though it's illegal, **people often try to spread the ashes** of the deceased loved ones from the rides at Disney World.
5. Mickey Mouse is the most common character at the park, people just don't realize it. **There are thousands of Mickey Mouse heads placed throughout Disney World.** Some are hidden in the frames of art work.

5 YEARS

Wednesday, March 9, 2011
Pot growing operation discovered during mobile home fire. A 56-year-old Argentine Township man and possibly his 36-year-old nephew are facing drug charges after police and fire departments responded to their mobile home for a reported structure fire. While extinguishing the flames, firefighters discovered a large amount of marijuana in a back bedroom. Police seized 58 marijuana plants, a separate jar and three plastic bags of marijuana. The back bedroom also was equipped with grow lamps, heaters and chemical fertilizers.

10 YEARS

Sunday, March 12, 2006
Pilot, passenger walk away from plane crash. An experienced 45-year-old pilot and his 37-year-old passenger, flying in a 1968 Piper Cherokee single-engine plane, walked away from the wreckage after it made an emergency landing on I-75 Tuesday afternoon. The crash occurred just north of the East Holly Road overpass at about 4:10 p.m.

15 YEARS

Wednesday, March 7, 2001
Orchard Hills barricade may come down. But through-traffic will still be prohibited. After two years of planning and negotiating, the homeowners in Phase I of the Orchard Hills subdivision were successful a couple of years ago in getting the State Road entrance to the development closed off to through-traffic. As part of Phase II, approximately 82 more homes are on the drawing board and it looks like the State Road entrance will be reopened.

20 YEARS

Sunday, March 10, 1996
Snowy roads cause major pileups. Whiteout conditions that restricted motorist vision to just a few feet, resulted in various pileups along U.S. 23 last weekend. Approximately 40 cars collided in a two-mile stretch of the north and southbound lanes of the expressway on March 2, between the White Lake road and Center Road exits in Tyrone Township.

25 YEARS

Sunday, March 10, 1991
Linden woman is attacked in Hartland area. A Linden woman was abducted at gunpoint and sexually assaulted Tuesday in Hartland, along U.S. 23 south of M-59. According to the Livingston County Sheriff's Department, the victim's car broke down around 11:35 p.m. She crossed the median and began walking north to obtain help when a car pulled up by her. She opened the door to tell the driver she didn't need help. The male driver then pulled a steel revolver out and ordered the woman into his car.

30 YEARS

Wednesday, March 12, 1986
Gas prices falling, falling, falling. Gasoline prices are the lowest in Michigan since October 1979. Over the past two months some area service stations have seen a drop of 25 cents per gallon of unleaded fuel. The lowest known gas price in the area can be found at the Penzoil station on North Bridge Street in Linden, where unleaded gas was 86.9 cents per gallon Thursday.

NATIONAL

MARCH 6

1899: The Imperial Patent Office in Berlin registers Aspirin, the brand name for acetylsalicylic acid, on behalf of the German pharmaceutical company Friedrich Bayer & Co. Now the most common drug in household medicine cabinets, acetylsalicylic acid was originally made from a chemical found in the bark of willow trees. In its primitive form, the active ingredient, salicin, was used for centuries in folk medicine.

MARCH 7

1876: Alexander Graham Bell, at the age of 29, receives a patent for his revolutionary new invention — the telephone.

MARCH 8

1993: The Music Television Network (MTV) airs the first episode of the animated series "Beavis and Butthead," which would go on to become the network's highest-rated series up to that point. Beavis and Butt-head offered audiences rude and crude buddy humor in the tradition of The Three Stooges, Cheech and Chong, and Wayne and Garth.

MARCH 9

1959: The first Barbie doll goes on display at the American Toy Fair in New York City. Eleven inches tall, with a waterfall of blond hair, Barbie was the first mass-produced toy doll in the United States with adult features.

MARCH 10

1988: With his knee-buckling good looks and his brothers' songwriting talents backing him up, 19-year-old Andy Gibb staged an unprecedented display of youthful pop mastery in the 12 months following his American debut in the spring of 1977. With his heart greatly weakened from years of cocaine abuse, Andy Gibb succumbed to an inflammatory heart virus on this day in 1988. He was only 30 years old.

MARCH 11

1818: "Frankenstein" or, "The Modern Prometheus" is published. The book, by 21-year-old Mary Wollstonecraft Shelley, is frequently called the world's first science fiction novel. In Shelley's tale, a scientist animates a creature constructed from dismembered corpses. The gentle, intellectually gifted creature is enormous and physically hideous. Cruelly rejected by its creator, it wanders, seeking companionship and becoming increasingly brutal as it fails to find a mate.

MARCH 12

2003: Elizabeth Smart, at the age of 15, is finally found in Sandy, Utah, nine months after being abducted from her family's home. Her alleged kidnappers, Brian David Mitchell, a drifter who the Smarts had briefly employed at their house, and his wife, Wanda Barzee, were charged with the kidnapping, as well as burglary and sexual assault.

"Definitely utilize the web to make the most of your trip," advised Sarah (Rummel) Green, formerly of Fenton Township, now of Bay City. She has visited Disney dozens of times during her childhood and now, as a mom, to her two young children.

"Disney constantly changes its deals, and you can try to take advantage of a package with a free dining plan or savings on your resort," she said. "Consider using a travel agent who specializes in planning Disney trips or call (407) 939-5277 or visit www.disneyworld.disney.go.com."

Here's how to start your planning:

STEP 1: When to go

Consider going in "value season," which are the months of September, early December, January and February.

"These are good months to enjoy fewer crowds and lower prices," said Green. "This is especially beneficial now that Disney has adopted a new pricing scheme that offers the lowest ticket rates on multi-day passes when coming during slower times. Keep in mind that prices are also now higher during peak seasons, especially Christmas, spring break, other school breaks and holidays, and summer."

You can fly nonstop to Sanford/Orlando on Allegiant Air from Bishop International Airport in Flint, if your schedule fits their Thursday and Sunday only flight times. United, American or Delta all offer one or two-stop flights.

Whether you fly out of Bishop or Detroit Metro Airport, you can expect to pay for about \$250 per ticket, plus fees.

STEP 2: Where to stay

You can stay on a Disney property or off site at hundreds of hotels, condos or vacation rental homes (www.vrbo). Disney offers value, moderate and deluxe resorts, each with an appropriate price tag.

There are a number of advantages to staying at a Disney resort. You can use the Disney Express from the airport and your bags will actually arrive in your room, bypassing baggage claim in Orlando. You can use the Disney buses to get you from your resort to all the parks and Disney Springs.

On-site guests can take advantage of "extra magic hours," allowing you into the park early. Staying on the property gives you an opportunity to go back to your room and relax or hit the pool, then head back to the park later in the day.

"Magic Your Way" vacation packages are available on Disneyworld.disney.go.com. If you're on a budget, mousesavers.com has a useful page showing the dates when Disney hotels are discounted.

STEP 3: Buying the right tickets

Disney has dozens of admission options to choose from, including one-day admissions to Magic Kingdom, one-day tickets to Epcot and multi-day tickets.

Consider purchasing your park tickets through Undercover Tourist, an authorized Disney ticket agent. Visit undercovertourist.com for more details.

Buy your tickets ahead of time, and you'll be able to make Fast Pass reservations for three attractions per day.

"Definitely take advantage of this," said Green. "There really aren't many great deals to be had on park tickets. If it sounds too good to be true, it probably is."

The same goes for dining reservations, character meals, dance parties, princess tea parties, etc. "Be sure to book early as the popular restaurants and times book quickly," said Green.

STEP 4: Save money on food

If the prices of flights, hotels and park admissions aren't already hitting your wallet hard, eating and dining at Disney surely will.

Watch for "free dining dates," usually offered from September to December (with some block-out dates), or plan your own dining strategies, which may include a late character breakfast and an early dinner 4 p.m., enjoying lunch pricing.

The Disney Dining Plan offers generous meals and snacks for Disney Resort Hotel visitors, but you may find less expensive options by sharing meals, bringing in your own snacks, etc.

"You are allowed to bring a cooler into Disney parks, so consider bringing

in your own food, drinks and snacks," said Green.

If you're staying on a Disney property, look into using Garden Grocer (www.gardengrocer.com), suggested Green. For a small delivery fee, this reputable grocer will deliver groceries of your choosing straight to your room upon your arrival.

"It's a great way to have essentials on hand from the start," she said.

OTHER TIPS

If your kids love Disney characters, don't miss the afternoon parade, typically at 3 p.m.

"It's a great way to see several at a time without the lines," said Green. "Don't forget to bring autograph books and pens for other times when you meet characters in person. Cheap notebooks work, too."

Stock up on cheap light-up wands, glow bracelets, Disney hats and souvenirs at dollar stores and Target before you go. You'll save a ton of money and will be prepared for potential melt-downs, advised Green.

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


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Neighbor should pay for dog duty

Is prostate to blame for sluggish bladder?

DEAR DR. ROACH:

I would like your opinion on enlarged prostate. My primary-care doctor sent me for a blood test and said my PSA number was too high, then sent me to a urologist. He said my bladder is not emptying and that I am having urine retention in the bladder. After one week of medication (Rapaflo), I had a catheter inserted for another week. He measured the urine in the bladder, and it was 880 ml. Now he is suggesting surgery. Is he going too fast? What are your thoughts on the procedure and side effects? Will this correct the problem?
— D.G.

tion is an emergency, since the kidneys will fail within a few days of being unable to drain urine at all. But the obstruction does not need to be complete in order to cause kidney damage. It's the high pressure in the urethra, bladder and ureters (the tubes that allow urine to flow from the kidneys to the bladder) that causes kidney damage. Placing a catheter allows the urine to drain at low pressure if the problem is in the urethra. Normal bladder capacity is between 300-400 ml. At 880 ml, you would experience very abnormal bladder drainage and would be at high risk for ongoing kidney damage. Thus, I completely agree with your urologist that something, probably surgical, needs to be done quickly. It's not completely clear to me whether your inability to drain the bladder is due to obstruction from enlarged prostate, even though an elevated PSA suggests that this might be the case. It also is possible that there is something wrong with the nerves that go to or from the bladder. I suspect your urologist has done additional bladder tests to help sort this out.

The bladder is drained via a tube called the urethra, and in men, the urethra runs right through the middle of the prostate. As men get older, the prostate commonly enlarges, and this can cause resistance to flow. The symptoms can range from mildly annoying to complete obstruction. Complete obstruc-
