Home inspections definitely worth the cost

Wise move to make it a condition of the sale



Buying a house is often said to be one of the most stressful events in people's lives — and it's one of the most expensive investments most will ever make.

Once people find the home they think will fit their needs, it would be wise for them to first get a home inspection as a condition of the sale.

When choosing a home inspector or home inspection company, buyers should do a little homework. Ask for referrals from friends and family. Real estate firms often have a concierge desk or table with the business cards of home inspectors that do work in the local area.



the business cards of home inspectors that Checking to make sure all electrical and mechanical components are working properly is part of the home inspection.

Since the state of Michigan does not require home inspectors to be certified, an inspector with the NAHI logo on their business cards indicate they have been accepted into the National Association of Home Inspectors.

Mike Hogan of Fenton is a former professional home inspector. He said the entire home inspection process depends on the age and size of the home.

"The bigger, older homes like the ones close to downtown areas in Fenton, Linden and Hollytake longer becauseof their size and potential for more problem areas than a newer, traditional home," he said.

The average inspection takes anywhere from two to five hours, he said. The cost of an inspection depends on the square footage, with the average price ranging from \$250 to \$400.

Home inspectors almost always work for buyers so it is important for sellers to See HOME on 6B

Since the attic and basement are key areas to be inspected, Hogan said it would be helpful for sellers to keep access to those areas free of obstructions.

He also said some people "for some reason" like to store toys or folded cloth ing and other laundry in the bathtub. Home inspectors need to fill each bathtub in the home as part of the plumbing inspection.

Some people are of the impression that if the home inspector finds a problem, he can repair it as well.

We only point out that there is a prob lem, we don't fix it," Hogan said. "We don't

Whether it gets fixed or not and who pays for the repair is usually negotiated between the buyer and seller, with the help of their agent.

"What it comes down to, is whether the buyer wants to pay for any needed repairs, or if the seller wants to take it of the price, that's up to them," he said.

Home inspectors do not determine prop erty values either, Hogan said. That is up to the appraisers.

"Everyone loves their own home," said Hogan. "Both buyers and sellers should remember that there is no such thing as

the perfect house. Each has its own quirks. "Houses age just like we do," he said. (Hogan is the husband of the writer

Vera Hogan.)

THE INSPECTION

The following are some typical problems or occurrences inspectors look for in the major components and systems of the home.

ROOF

Inspectors will check the roof to see if there is any sagging between the rafters or trusses. Are there any signs of deterioration of asphalt shingles, such as curling, warping, broken edges, rounded corners or key holes(slits) becoming wider that normal. The inspector will check to see if there are any loose flashings, at the chimney, roofto-wall connection or elsewhere. Does the wooden roof deck appear rotten or delaminate under the last row of shingles? Are there any roof vents visible?

CHIMNEYS

The inspector will check to see if the masonry cap is cracked or broken. Are any bricks flaking or missing? Is there any mortar missing? Is the chimney leaning?

SOFFITS AND FASCIA

An inspector will note whether the soffit and fascia are wood, aluminum or plastic. Are there any loose or missing sections? If wood, are there any paint problems? Is there any visible rot?

GUTTERS AND DOWNSPOUTS

Gutters should slope down toward downspouts. An inspector will note any rust or peeling paint, apparent leaks or loose/sagging sections. They will check to see if the downspouts extended away from the foundations?

WALL COVERINGS

The home inspector will look for missing mortar and if there are bricks that area flaking or cracking? They also look for loose, missing or rotten siding, deteriorated paint. If the siding appears new, does it hide the foundation wall? Are any exterior walls bowed, bulged or leaning?



WINDOWS AND DOORS

Inspectors look for problems with paint or caulking, and rotted wood components. Are the windows new or older? Are they the original windows? How old are they?

PORCHES AND DECKS

Is there any cracking or flaking masonry? Inspectors will check for paint problems, rotted wood, and woodearth contact. They will also note any settlement or separation from the house. They will inspect the underside, if it is accessible.

FOUNDATIONS

The home inspector will check for cracks, flaking or damaged masonry. They will note any water markings and efflorescence (whitish, chalky substance). They also will note bowing, bulging or other irregularities, and if there is any soft mortar.

LOT AREA

The home inspector will check to see if the grade slopes away from the house. Are there any settled or low areas next to the foundation, or cracked walks

and driveway. He will note if the property is lower than the street or neighboring properties?

BASEMENT

Any evidence of water penetration (stains, mildew/odors, efflorescence, loose tiles etc.) will be noted.

FLOORS

The inspector will check for deteriorated coverings or cracked ceramics. Is there any water staining or other damage, sloping or sagging?

WALLS

Inspectors check to make sure all windows and doors work. Are the walls straight vertically and horizontally? They look for cracked or loose plaster, stains, physical damage or previous repair evidence, and if any drywall seams or nails are showing?

CEILINGS

They check for cracks in the plaster or loose, sagging plaster. An inspector will also look for stains, mechanical damage or evidence of previous repair, and if any seams or nails are showing.

BATHROOMS AND KITCHENS

The home inspector will check to make sure all fixtures are secure, and that there are no cracks in the fixtures They will note the condition of the tiles and caulking in the tub/shower area. They will check for working faucets working and whether or not they leak, and if there is sufficient water pressure. They will look for staining and rot under the counter-tops and randomly sample the operation of the cabinet doors and drawers.

ELECTRO-MECHANICAL CONSIDERATIONS

The type, style and age of heating and cooling systems will be noted. and when were they last inspected or serviced. The type of water supply piping and drains will be checked as will any visible signs of rust and corrosion. The size and age of electrical service will be noted and whether the outlets are grounded. Is the visible wiring in good condition? Have there been any upgrades?

From old barns to 'Good Wood'

■Holly business tears down old barns and gives new purpose to wood

Aaron Mohr was a third generation craftsman in the entertainment industry in North Hollywood, California and New York City, using his hands to create products manufacturing center than a showroom, for the Grammys, on Broadway and music festivals around the country.

Now his home is in downtown Holly where he opened Good W ood Reclaimed Furniture in June 2015. "I had never been to Holly before opening this business, but I've been in Michigan for a number of years," said Mohr. "When the film industry here went bust, I changed direction."

Old barns are now his art medium, creat ing farmhouse tables, sliding doors, kitchen islands, countertops, hall trees, wall art, business signs and more out of the wood he reclaims from them.

'We deconstruct entire barns that are dangerous and in need of being torn down," business," said Mohr. said Mohr, 37, clearly enjoying the pace and rhythm of Midwestern small-town life. "W can make 100 to 200 products out of each

barn, working seven days a week for two months off the wood."

He employs two other craftsmen, Robin Watkins and Lars Dundas, to help him keep up with the huge demand for his work. "People hear about me, and ask me to cre-

ate something unique for them," said Mohr "They see things they like, and it takes of f from there."

His downtown business is more of a with each piece custom ordered. Mohr has surrounded himself with the pieces that he loves and has created a work space that's as much home to him as the home he shares with his young teen son on weekends. A guitar sits in one corner, where he can relax with friends after another long day of doing what he loves.

Mohr enjoys the creative collaboration he receives from working with other repurposing artists, including Cari Cucksey's RePurpose Shop across the street and N. Reding & Sons Vintage Industrial Antiques in Battle Alley.

MAY 1

1931: President Herbert Hoover officially dedicates New York City's Empire State Building, pressing a button from the White House that turns on the building's lights. Hoover's gesture was symbolic; while the president remained in Washington, D.C., someone else flicked the switches in New York. The idea for the building is said to have been born of a competition between Walter Chrysler of the Chrysler Corporation and John Jakob Raskob of General Motors, to see who could erect the taller building.

MAY 2

1933: Although accounts of an aquatic beast living in Scotland's Loch Ness date back 1,500 years, the modern legend of the Loch Ness Monster is born when a sighting makes local news on May 2, 1933. The newspaper "Inverness Courier" related an account of a local couple who claimed to have seen "an enormous animal rolling and plunging on the surface." The story of the "monster" became a media phenomenon, with London newspapers sending correspondents to Scotland and a circus offering a 20,000 pound sterling reward for capture of the beast.

MAY 3

1980: Cari Lightner, 13, of Fair Oaks, California, is walking along a quiet road on her way to a church carnival when a car swerves out of control, striking and killing her. Cari's tragic death compelled her mother, Candy Lightner, to found the organization Mothers Against Drunk Driving (MADD), which would grow into one of the country's most influential nonprofit organizations.

MAY 4

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1970: In Kent, Ohio, 28 National Guardsmen fire their weapons at a group of anti Vietnam war demonstrators on the Kent State University campus, killing four students, wounding eight, and permanently paralyzing another.

MAY 5

1961: From Cape Canaveral, Florida, Navy Commander Alan Bartlett Shepard Jr. is launched into space aboard the "Freedom 7" space capsule, becoming the first American astronaut to travel into space.

MAY 6

1937: The German airship "Hindenburg," the largest dirigible ever built, explodes as it arrives in Lakehurst, New Jersey. Thirty-six people died in the fiery accident that has since become iconic, in part because of the live radio broadcast of the disaster.

MAY 7

1998: The German automobile company Daimler-Benz, maker of the world-famous luxury car brand Mercedes-Benz, announces a \$36 billion merger with the United States-based Chrysler Corporation. The purchase marked the biggest acquisition by a foreign buyer of any U.S. company in history. Source: History.com


