mong the privileges that come with being a high school senior, like taking fewer end-of-theyear exams, getting out of school early, and having seniority over the rest of the school, seniors also get to attempt a prank that will hopefully make them go down in their school's history.

Local schools are no exception.

This year, Linden High School seniors organized a last-minute prank where they drove lawn tractors to and from school.

Approximately eight tractors of all shapes and sizes sat in the front row of the student parking lot on the south side of the high school throughout the school day.

After school, students gawked as they started the engines, creating a lot of noise in the parking lot. Nason Haenlein, 18, led the pack of tractors out of the lot, halting traffic for a few minutes.

A few years ago at Fenton High School, seniors placed a sign in front of the school that read "For Sale" with a number to call, said Doug Busch, interim superintendent of Fenton schools.

"The sign included the building telephone number for anyone interested in 'buying' the high school to call the main office," he said. "I believe they also put the high school up 'For Sale' as a classified ad on Craigslist."

Busch said this prank is a good example of smart, witty, and humorous joke that did not cause any damage or cleanup work.

State Sen. Tom Casperson (R-Escanaba) introduced a bill this week that would require students to use the bathroom corresponding to their body parts unless parents give written permission, in which case they could use a staff toilet or unisex bathroom.



It's pretty clear Casperson finds the whole idea of transgender students and their selfish need to go to the bathroom to be icky. But of course

Instead Casperson claimed his bill is weirdly enough - primarily about parental rights: 'The fact that they would allow a child to say, 'I don't want my mom and dad to know' that they're taking such a big leap in life ... is unacceptable.'

'They' is the state Board of Education, which is in the process of developing a voluntary policy to guide districts on how to make schools safe and supportive for gay and transgender students. (What an awful goal, right?)

The policy as outlined in a February memo isn't specifically about the bathroom issue, nor does it talk about 'allowing' or encouraging students to say, 'I don't want my mom and dad to know.

In fact it doesn't deal with parental notification or permission at all. What it says is 'The unique needs and concerns of each student should be addressed on a case-by-case basis with a student-centered approach that includes the ongoing engagement of the student, the parent/ guardian, as appropriate, and school personnel ... per the Family Education Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA).'

It also says districts should 'provide appropriate and meaningful family engagement and support. Since parental acceptance and family support are key determinants of LGBTQ student health, student support teams, staff, and community partners should provide resources to help families and students locate information,

affirming counseling, and support services.'

And it also mentions this: 'Research indicates that LGBTO students, nationally and in Michigan, are targeted with physical violence and experience a hostile school environment more frequently than their non-LGBTQ peers' and that the state board is 'committed to promoting a safe, supportive, and inclusive learning environment for all students.'

Casperson says his bill is about the wellbeing of all students, too, or as he put it, 'I'm concerned about all the kids.' But that's obviously not true. By all

students, he clearly means those who aren't transgender, since his bill - as I mentioned - says that even with parental permission transgender students could only use a unisex bathroom, single bathroom or staff bathroom.

And for off-campus activities students could only use facilities that correspond with their biological sex.

In other words, transgender kids won't be treated equally at all.

But of course he doesn't come right out and say that.

#### Lincoln's Gettysburg Address



November 19, 1863 F our score and seven years ago our fathers brought forth on this continent, a new nation, conceived in Liberty, and dedicated to the proposition that all men are created equal. Now we are engaged in a great civil war, testing whether that nation, or any nation so conceived and so dedicated, can long endure. We are met on a great battle-field of that war. We have come to dedicate a portion of that field, as a final resting place for those who here gave their lives that that nation might live. It is altogether fitting and proper that we should do this.

But, in a larger sense, we can not dedicate — we can not consecrate we can not hallow — this ground. The brave men, living and dead, who struggled here, have consecrated it, far above our poor power to add or detract. The world will little note, nor long remember what we say here, but it can never forget what they did here.

It is for us the living, rather, to be dedicated here to the unfinished work which they who fought here have thus far so nobly advanced. It is rather for us to be here dedicated to the great task remaining before us — that from these honored dead we take increased devotion to that cause for which they gave the last full measure of devotion — that we here highly resolve that these dead shall not have died in vain — that this nation, under God, shall have a new birth of freedom — and that government of the people, by the people, for the people, shall not perish from the earth.

# **Gettysburg Address 1863 and Memorial Day 2016**

#### What do they have in common?

Memorial Day have in common? The roots of the Memorial Day holiday are in the words that Abraham Lincoln made so famous, not in May, but in November 1863. These words pay homage to the ultimate sacrifice made by those fighting for their cause in the deadliest conflict ever in American history — the Civil War.

The words of the Gettysburg Address should remind all Americans to remember those who gave "the last full measure" of devotion, just as President Lincoln did in those darkest days of the Civil War. . . . "that we here highly resolve that these dead shall not have died in vain, that this nation, under God, shall have a new birth of freedom, and that government of the people, by the people, for the people, shall not perish from the earth.'

The Gettysburg Address, so powerful in its brevity with only 272 words, was delivered by President Lincoln on Nov.

19, 1863 on the battlefield near Gettysburg, Pennsylvania. The war had been long, people were tired, and the previous speaker was Edward Everett, a congressman, educator and diplomat. He spoke for two hours, followed by Lincoln's speech, which was only about 1 percent of Everett's in length.

Lincoln's passionate words so represented the spirit and purposes of all such commemorations that it has been committed to the memory of almost every school child throughout the generations since 1863.

there is crime, drugs, junk left on people's lots, and the dumpster continuously overflows.

Garfield said there was a frenzy for the first few weeks to get things cleaned up when they first went to the township, but now it's bad again. He said the ordinance enforcement officer, Tom Hosie, wasn't doing everything he could.

"Is it really not possible to at least get that cleaned up?" he said at the May 16 meeting.

Supervisor Bonnie Mathis said Hosie has been doing everything he can and "We are doing what we can do."

She said neighboring residents want the whole park cleaned up so it doesn't look like it does now. "That's going to be almost impossible," Mathis said.

Neighboring residents of the park organized a meeting with State Rep. Joe Graves, Genesee County Commissioner Tony Brown, and State Sen. Ken Horn.

Graves, Brown, and Horn saw the conditions and shared their thoughts. (see sidebar)

Hosie said the land is zoned for a mobile home park, and that some people who live near the park prefer it wouldn't be there.

"It's being appropriately used," he said. When they get complaints, he talks about it with the residents to resolve the issue. If the violation isn't handled in two weeks, he issues a warning.

Mathis said people exaggerate the conditions of the park, and think certain ordinances are being violated when they actually aren't. She said many residents who live in the park are proud of their homes.

'They have a right to live there," she said. "You'll walk in there and you'll see gardens."

Mathis said that when there is a complaint about something in the trailer park, the problem is handled. The owner has been in contact and has complied with the township's requests.

Argentine Twp. — Two Argentine police officers and one detective were recognized Monday at the Argentine Township Board of Trustees meeting for their work in stopping the

alleged school shooting plot at Linden High School last fall.

Police Chief Dan Allen read a press release congratulating and thanking Det. Doug Fulton and officers Paul Brooks and Tony Matthews for their work on the case.

School Resource Officer Paul Brooks came across the school shooting threat in October 2015.

Argentine police coordinated with the FBI, and more undercover officers were put in place.

The officers obtained more information and apprehend the three suspects, Ryan Stevens, 18, Lamarr Dukes, 15, and Kody Brewer, 15.

Brooks and Fulton located Stevens at an undisclosed location in the city of Linden, and he was placed into custody. They were able to obtain more information from there and connected the two other suspects to the case.

Officers also discovered how specific people were targeted.

> Allen said the actions taken on the first day, the coordination with the officers at the school, the apprehension of the three suspects, and the discovered information merits the awards for Fulton, Brooks, and Matthews.

They were each given a certificate and a round of applause from audience and board members.

Allen also honored Jeff Mulnix, a new officer, for putting himself through the police academy and graduating the top of his class, and receiving an award from the Michigan Commission on Law Enforcement Standards, the governing body for Michigan officers.

won't be in it." According to military.com, the following are the top 10 things you need to understand and consider while you prepare to meet with a recruiter:

1. **MOTIVATION**: If you are considering the military, it is your responsibility to be motivated to serve your country. Your motivation to serve should be a calling to join a profession that offers invaluable experiences and skills. To join the military because you have nothing better to do could lead to a miserable experience.

2. **FITNESS**: Make sure you understand that going to boot camp with the mindset that it is the military's job to get you in shape is going to lead to failure, injury or being dropped from a program.

You need to be able to surpass the mini-

This means finding out what the fitness requirements are and practicing those events. Typical weight loss goals to meet military standards are in the 15 to 20plus pound range these days. Get in shape now, not a few weeks before joining.

3. **INITIATIVE**: Taking the initiative is a skill you will be taught when in the military, but you can start practicing now. Research important things about your future profession. Where could you be living after basic training? Where could you be deployed? How long are the deployments? Learn the geography of the area you are likely to deploy to and its customs and culture.

Learn about current events around the world — they affect your potential travel. Sometimes you will be asked to do something, and you will have no idea how to accomplish that task. But you will have to figure it out. You may also have to do things without people telling you to do them. That is taking the initiative. Read a great book on many military reading lists, "Message to Garcia."

4. **RECRUITER**: Call your local recruiter and make an appointment to meet. Sometimes getting him or her on the phone may be difficult, but try to speak with someone to arrange an appointment. Walking in cold typically results in you leaving to track down your Social Security number and card, birth certificate, other IDs, transcripts from high school and college, and more. Know what you need to bring and what you want to do in the military before visiting. Going in and asking what you qualify for could place you in a bad position. Do your homework and do not leave it up to the recruiter to find a job for you.

5. **MEDICAL RECORDS**: The military will screen you medically, but if you have any prior surgeries, broken bones, or major illnesses, they need to know about it and file the proper paperwork as some of these may require medical waivers. Know the disqualifying ailments. Make copies of all your records when you submit them.

6. **ASVAB** (Armed Services Vocational Aptitude Battery): Learn how to take this test. Take a few practice tests at www. official-asvab.com and read a book on tips and strategies for taking the ASVAB. There are many ASVAB study guides in bookstores and online. Your score on this test can determine where you will live and what you will be doing in the military.

7. **TROUBLE**: Your criminal record will be checked in a background investigation, and it can be an issue in your attempt to join depending upon what you have been arrested for. Inform the recruiters of any arrests. They will find out one way or another and an omission on your part may be detrimental to progressing further.

8. **DISCIPLINE**: If you have issues with dealing with authority, you must know that you will be disciplined and forced to change your way of doing things, especially in basic training. Learn to suck it up, learn from the negative feedback and move on. Soon, your deeds will be what separate you from your peers, which can lead to speedy advancement within the ranks. But you have to do your time at the bottom.

9. **TRAVEL**: Expect to be gone from home and family while training and deploying throughout the year to just about anywhere in the world. There are hundreds of bases around the globe.

10. EDUCATON AND SKILLS: The experiences you have in the military will shape you formany years to come. You will learn how to react quickly during high stress and life and death situations, and rely on your training to help people through traumatic events.

There are many educational opportunities available in the military from occupational training courses to full college tuition paid in

# Home on Linden golf course destroyed by fire

Homeowner escapes without injury, cause of fire is likely electrical

A home on the 14<sup>th</sup> hole of Spring Meadows Country Club in Linden was destroyed by fire on Tuesday, May 24.

Numerous fire departments were dispatched to the scene after the 911 call came in shortly after 3 p.m. Linden Fire Chief Brian Will said with so many of the area fire departments using paid volunteer firefighters, several departments were requested to obtain enough manpower since many of the firefighters have other full-time jobs.

Will responded immediately to the home in the 1300 block of Meadow Green Lane and police were already on scene telling him that the roof was melting.

After talking to the homeowner, who escaped without injury, Will said she had been cleaning out the attic and bringing items down to the main floor of the ranch-style home. Because of the warm outside temperatures, the attic was warm already and she went downstairs where it was cooler.

While she was on the main floor, she told the fire chief that she heard popping sounds above. She went to investigate and realized the attic was on fire.

Due to the quickly spreading flames, Will believes the fire was electrical in nature and guesses that the homeowner might have bumped something when she was working in the attic. "But, we're still investigating though,"he said. "There were no other items in the attic that would have caused a fire."

Assisting Linden City, were fire departments from Fenton City, North Oakland County Fire Authority, Grand Blanc City and the townships of Argentine, Fenton, Gaines and Mundy. Linden Fire Department was on scene until approximately 7 p.m.

The fire chief said a crew returned briefly at 8:30 p.m. when they learned some mulch near the home ignited.

The fire chief said the homeowner had insurance and that her insurance provider is taking care of her immediate needs. Former Linden family saddened by fire

A former Linden family was saddened when they heard the news of this house fire as it was once a place where many happy family memories took place.

They shared their sentiments when the

Times posted the photo of the house online. The home once belonged to the late Keith Opperthauser, the father of Lee Knorr of Flint and Sherry Smith of Holly.

"Seeing the pictures makes me want to cry," said Knorr.

Opperthauser's grandson, Jeremy Hogan, who is serving in the Navy in Hawaii, wrote, "I always loved that house."

His brother, Devon Hogan of Fenton, said, "The thing I liked the most about that house was the pine tree in the back left hand corner of the property. I used to climb up as far as I could between the branches, climb out on said branch, and slide down to the base of said tree. Great times."

The police chief said, "Obviously no police department collects for the IRS and at no time does the IRS accept payments in that manner. My concern is that my PD's number and someone claiming to be an officer here are conducting these activities." The chief suggests that anyone receiving such a phone call to hang up.

Twenty seniors applied for Brad's \$10,000 college scholarship. Our committee ultimately chose two seniors — Mason Rinks and Allison Muenzer. They each are receiving a \$5,000 college scholarship. I'd like to extend a heartfelt thank you to all of the seniors who took the time to apply. Their essays, especially those who knew Brad's story, always tear at our heartstrings. I'd also like to thank Duanita Elford, the high school counselor, who works so hard with these scholarships and organizing a very special evening. The Stone family finds much comfort in providing these scholarships in Brad's memory to such incredible young men and women.

"They're working on the roof now, then will be getting the interiors done," said Mike Reilly, Fenton's building and zoning administrator.

Ashmark Construction of West Bloomfield broke ground on the project on Nov. 30, 2015, after a year and a half of delays. "They had to wait for commitments from tenants, then there were construction delays over the winter in laying masonry," said Reilly.

The project is now moving forward quickly, with a construction completion date of September. "Everyone seems pretty excited," said Brent Bogle, construction superintendent for Ashmark.

"Everything that they've asked, we've done it," she said.

Residents are also worried the park will decrease their home values, which Mathis said isn't true.

"The assessor said absolutely not. They're lakefront property, desirable pieces of property, it hasn't pulled their value down," she said.

Hosie said they deal with these issues often. "We have people who buy a house near a horse farm and then they decide those horses smell terrible, the township should do something about that," he said. "Or they buy a house near the airport, and they decide 'wow,' those planes are loud."

He said people who moved next to the

factory on Thompson Road complain about the odor and noise.

"Those people are angry and they want the township to do something about the factory," he said. "As long as the work that's being done there is legal, and that's what the property is zoned for, there's not a whole lot we can do."

#### State representatives visit

After seeing the conditions of the trailer park, the state officials shared some thoughts with neighboring residents.

State Rep. Joe Graves (R-Argentine Township) said, "Neighbors were all in agreement the park is now the cleanest it has been in years, but they are concerned it will be more blight as soon as attention is no longer on them. They also agreed the current compliance officer is doing a good job and spends a great deal of time in the park addressing issues."

Graves told the residents that the township is doing all it can without raising standards.

"But there is a process in statute that allows for local governments to apply to the mobile home commission for review," he said, adding that the condemnation process is a legal action that requires a judgment.

"This leaves a health and safety issue, which would have to come from individuals renting in the park and it is my understanding they are not willing to do so," Graves said. "It is a difficult situation with limited options.

Genesee County Commissioner Tony Brown (R-Fenton Township) said the park is in need of "major rehabilitation.

"From what I have been told, many prospective buyers just turn around once they see the condition of the trailer park and cross the homes for sale on Eastview off their list," he said.

Brown said the township only has authority for blight, but that doesn't do enough to improve living conditions. He said cleaning up the park would require intervention from the Depart ment of Licensing and Regulatory Affairs (LARA).

"Pressure needs to be applied on this regulatory agency to see to it that the residents of the park have suitable living conditions and that the residents within the area don't have to lose home values as a consequence of blighted conditions," he said. "I wish the county health department had authority, but that has been removed by the state. So unfortunately, the county has its hands tied."

# **Can 911 locate you?**

■Many dispatchers have difficulty locating 911 callers in rural areas

hball@tctimes.com; 810-433-6792 If you call 911 from a landline, the dispatcher can locate you easily.

If you call from a cell phone, your location might not transmit at all.

Chances of dispatching services getting a fix on your location if you call from a cell phone ranges from 10 to 95 percent, according to USA Today.

If you have an emergency in Livingston County or Fenton, your chances are promising.

The city of Fenton has its own dispatching unit, and rarely experiences this problem.

Dispatcher Supervisor Samantha Sturgis said, "We are fortunate and we aren't in a very rural area so most of the time it's just a matter of asking the caller what businesses or landmarks they are near."

She said the dispatchers are familiar with the area and they use GPS coordinates.

'We always receive some sort of information when the call is answered. How good that information is can vary," she said. Some calls come in with "phase 1" information, which means the address of the cell phone tower appears. With "phase 2" information, they receive latitude and longitude coordinates of the estimated location within 300 meters.

This all happens in a matter of seconds.

Genesee County Central Dispatching regularly receives more than 20,000 911 cell phone calls a month, according to geneseecounty911.org.com.

Genesee County 911 Operations Manager Dave Plumb said about one in 10 emergency 911 cell phone calls have this problem. Of the approximate 20,000 cell phone calls they receive a month, about 2,000 calls don't automatically transmit location.

"It depends on how they have their phone set up," he said.

As long as the caller has their GPS set up, operators should be able to locate them.

"If they get in an accident, they go off the road, in any type of abduction situation..." he said. "It's very important."

Plumb said in most cases, callers have their GPS on, but it's a problem with older phones because they might not have GPS capability.

At Livingston County dispatching,

Deputy Director Chad Chewning said it is not a problem because their system is phase 2 compliant. This means when someone calls 911, it gives them the address of the tower, and

then it sends the signal back to the phone and obtains the coordinates. The location is then mapped on the dispatcher's screen.

"If they're in a house, we get the general area, but not the address per se," he said.

He said cell phones manufactured after 2008 have to be compatible with GPS.

"Occasionally you might have an issue if the tower is programmed wrong," he said, adding that rarely happens.

Dead zones affecting cell phones can be an issue as well.

Another issue is accidental calls. Chewning said people often accidentally call 911 and then just hang up.

"At most dispatch centers we have to call back. It ties up our operators," he said. Chewning said if someone accidentally calls 911, they should not hang up. Instead, let the operator know it was accidental.

Sturgis said some businesses often accidentally dial 911 because they press "9" to make an outside call.

She said the most important piece of information when calling 911 is your location. "If I have nothing but a location I can start with that, it gives me somewhere to send help to," she said.

Sturgis said those who make a 911 call need to remember that dispatchers ask certain questions for certain reasons. "We have other concerns like who to

we need your help to fill in the blanks," she said. "Just because we're still on the phone with you does not mean help isn't coming. We're often sending the help while still talking

to you or we have a partner who is doing it across the room."

The last thing people need to know when calling 911 is that your mailing address or school district doesn't necessarily coincide with what jurisdiction you are in for emer-

#### National tragedy

Dispatchers not being able to locate someone if they call from a cell phone has caused tragedies all over the U.S. Near Atlanta, Georgia, Shanell Anderson, 31, died in her SUV when she crashed into a pond and her doors were stuck. She called 911 but the call was routed to the wrong dispatching location in a neighboring county.

Dispatching units have been criticized for not being able to locate people in need of help, but Uber drivers can find customers anywhere, according to USAToday.

New rules were recently drafted by the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) and cell phone carriers requiring carriers to increase the number of cellphone calls to 911 that transmit location data. These new rules state that by 2017, 40 percent of cellphone calls to 911 must transmit location data. By 2021, that percentage increases to 80 percent, according to USA Today.
