You're either thanking your mom and dad for your golden tresses, or wishing you hadn't inherited your mom's coarse, frizzy hair or your dad's receding hairline.

Either way, your hair says a lot about where you came from and who you are today. Although your hair characteristics may seem to physically favor one side over the other, you get the same amount of genetic information from both parents, according to genetics.thetech.org.

For each hair trait — texture, color, hairline, etc. - both parents contribute equally, four hair-color genes for a total of eight.

Mary Clark of Tyrone Township receives a low-light and partial color from master stylist Brigette Baker at Serendipity Wellness Spa in Linden on Wednesday afternoon. Baker said subtle

highlights and low lights are more in style than they were in the past decade.

In general, dark hair is dominant over light. But parents can pass on a number of ranges of shades, depending on the pigments they have in their hair and how they mix.

A dark brown pigment, eumelanin, can result in light blonde hair in small amounts, or produce black hair, in large amounts with tightly packed See HAIR on 6B

This was Murphy's fifth time competing in the championships. He placed sixth overall this year while earning a bronze medal in both the pommel horse and vault as well.



A. Sydney, I would need to know more information about your truck. For example year, make, model, and engine size. However, I have seen this type of problem on several Chevrolet and GMC model trucks with a 4.3 vortec motor. It usually ends up being leaky fuel lines or fuel pressure regulator under the upper intake manifold. If this is the case, you should replace both while you are in there. This way you don't have to open it up again if the part that is not leaking goes bad after you repair the current leaking part.

watches for the holiday. The shaving creams, after shaves, and cologne are also popular Father's Day gift ideas.



pigment granules. People with large amounts of pheomelanin have red hair, ranging from "strawberry blonde" to bright red to reddish brown. Very blond hair has the least amount of pigment and the fewest pigment granules spaced farthest apart.

Your hair's texture, straight, wavy or curly, as well as the thickness of individual strands of hair, is determined by multiple genes. Different genes influence hair texture and thickness in people of different ethnic backgrounds. It is the interaction among these genes, not any single gene, that determines the character of your hair.

People with fine hair are always looking for ways to add volume and people with coarse hair are always trying to "tame their mane" and keep the frizzies at bay. "The ideal hair texture seems to be somewhere in the middle," said Brigette Baker, master stylist at Serendipity Wellness Spa in Linden.

It is not only your genetics that can influence your hair texture and thickness. Hormones, certain medications and chemicals, such as hair

But you can maximize the hair you've been born with, by taking good care of your locks. Baker suggests regu-

lar hair cuts to keep split ends at bay and shampooing every three days to maintain your mane's natural oils. Your hair grows at an average rate of one-quarter to one-half inch a month, so it requires patience if you're trying to grow it out. Still, it's important not to skimp on regular hair cuts and trims.

"If you don't get your hair trimmed often enough, we end up having to take off more length because of the damaged split ends," said Baker. "Also, don't overdo chemical treatment, because that can really damage your hair.'

Today's high-tech color, relaxers, flat irons, Brazilian Blow Outs, extensions and other treatments can change your hair from brown to blonde or frizzy to straight, but they're all temporary fixes.

"To straighten your hair, you have to use heat, either a flat iron or a round brush and blow dry," said Baker. "Relaxers also involve heat and chemicals, which can be very damaging to your hair month after month. The Brazilian Blow Out is less damaging because it combines keratin with amino acids rather than chemicals."

Keratin is a protein that is naturally in your hair, so keratin-based treatments are more restorative than damaging. Smooth-

If you want to see how well you'll sport your own gray hair someday, just look at your parents. They are the best indicators for when your hair will turn gray and whether it will be a beautiful silver mane or less distinct salt and pepper.

Graying is age-related. As we age, hair follicles produce less melanin, the pigment that gives your hair its hue. Naturally occurring hydrogen peroxide can also build up in the hair, bleaching the color.

Typically, Caucasians start going gray in their mid-30s, Asians in their late 30s and African-Americans in their mid-40s, according to WebMd.com. Half of all people have a significant amount of gray hair by the time they reach 50.

"People with dark hair tend to get gray hair faster than soft blondes and browns," said Brigette Baker, master stylist at Serendipity Wellness Spa in Linden. "Gray also blends in better with blonde hair, so it doesn't show as much."

A Caucasian is considered to be prematurely gray if his or her hair turns gray by age 20.

You can choose to embrace the gray with a sleek new cut and highlights to make the transition, or you can conceal the gray with highlights, permanent color or spray-on airbrush hair makeup.

Redheads – are a unique few

If you have red hair, you are a rare breed. Less than 2 percent of the world's population has red hair. Of the approximate 7.4 billion people on earth, that's approximately 140 million redheads.

Here are some interesting points about natural red hair and those who have it: • Red hair is a genetic mutation. Both parents must be carriers of the mutated MC1R gene to be able to produce redhaired children, of which there is a 25-percent chance if they don't have red hair themselves.

• Scotland boasts the highest percentage of natural redheads at 13 percent. Ireland comes in second with 10 percent.

• Red hair can occur in any ethnicity. It occurs more frequently (2 to 6 percent) in people of northern or western European ancestry, and less frequently in other populations.

• It is a r eal chore to try and dye red hair. Because it holds its pigment tighter than any other hair color, red strands need to have their pigment stripped before being dyed by bleaching which, of course, damages the hair. • Each strand of red hair is generally thicker than other shades, which compensates for the fact that redheads have less hair. Redheads are said to have on average 90,000 strands, while blondes have 110,000, and brunettes have

140,000. • Red hair will never turn gray. It simply fades to white via rose gold when the time comes.

• Blue eyes and red hair forms the rarest combo on earth. Most (natural) redheads will have brown eyes, followed by hazel or green shades.

• Redheads can change temperature quicker because, according to research, they are more sensitive to hot and cold pain. It has nothing to do with their mythical "fiery temperament."

• Redheads are more likely to develop skin cancer. Because of their commonly fair skin and sensitivity to ultraviolet light, redheads are more likely to develop skin cancer. The International Journal of Cancer reported in 2010 that natural redheads are approximately two and a half times as likely to develop the dangerous cancer as people with other hair colors. • Redheads can produce their own Vitamin D. They can't sufficiently absorb

Vitamin D because it's down to their lower melanin-concentration. Redheads internally produce their own Vitamin D when they're exposed to low light conditions. • People with red hair are more likely to be left-handed. Recessive traits often happen in pairs so commonly people with the gene for red hair also possess the trait for left-handedness.

• Climate change is threatening the gene. Given that red hair doesn't adapt to warm climates, the gene could, at some point, become extinct.





Losing weight, exercise best options to delay surgery

DEAR DR. ROACH:

I am a female in my 60s, and for the past couple of months I have been having

some discomfort and swelling in my right knee. I am slightly overweight and have osteoarthritis. I have no pain when walking, but when leaning over, I get a tight pain in the front of the leg, below the knee. I saw my orthopedic doctor, who told me that the cartilage is worn away, and said that I would need a knee replacement. I was given a cortisone shot, which helped the pain. Would losing weight help me avoid

surgery? I take an anti-inflammatory and rubbed Bengay on the knee, which helped. I went for another opinion from a second orthopedic surgeon, had more X-rays taken and was given the same diagnosis. Is there anything more I can do to avoid having a knee replacement soon? — C.W.

ANSWER:

Osteoarthritis of the knee can cause permanent loss of the cartilage. Once the cartilage is gone, the knee replacement is by far the best option to reduce pain and improve func-

to feel better. Losing weight is important, if you are carrying more than you should. Your body weight is multiplied when you are going up and down GOOD stairs, so losing even a few pounds means much less pressure inside the knee. do to delay the need for surgery, as well as

topical anti-inflammatories and capsaicin creams help some people. Steroid injections are a good option for some: Hyaluronic acid shots, such as Synvisc, help many as

well. Exercise, however, definitely improves both pain and function. Walking a little bit farther each day means being able to walk still more without pain. A joint-replacement surgery shouldn't be undertaken lightly. Not everybody has a good outcome, and an infection in an artificial joint can be devastating. However, it has been my experience that most people who have gotten a joint replacement wish they had done so sooner, so don't suffer for too long if these treatments aren't helping. The arthritis booklet discusses osteoarthritis, along with rheumatoid arthritis and lupus.

- 5. Goes great with jasmine rice sprinkled with cilantro and a squeeze of lime.


