## New priest describes himself as a 'fixer'

St. John Catholic Church welcomes Fr. Robert Copeland

Copeland, 44, became the new pastor on July 1.

The St. John parish numbers more than 3,100 households, serving the people of Fenton, Lake Fenton, and Linden with families on the roster from Flint, Hartland, Holly, Grand Blanc, Swartz Creek, Byron, Davisburg and Clarkston.

When asked what his initial thoughts were about the Fenton parish, Copeland said, "I came from St. Pius X in Flint, and if I had to describe the attitude of the parish in one word it would be 'relaxed.' That is not how I would describe St. John's. Everything seems so much more 'dramatic.'" See PRIEST on 6A

### **SkyPoint land** purchases help to move Fenton forward

Downtown redevelopment is only part of upcoming business ventures throughout the city

The purchase of six downtown Fenton properties by SkyPoint Ventures is more evidence of how business is booming in the city of Fenton.

SkyPoint Ventures, an organization owned by Phil and Jocelyn Hagerman, closed on the sale of properties at 225 W. Caroline St., 229 W. Caroline St., 125 S. Adelaide St., 116 Mill St., and 108 S. LeRoy St.

The 229 W. Caroline St. house was once the home and office of the late Nancy Stockham, long-time social worker for the city of Fenton.

According to Peter Hughes, director of real estate for SkyPoint, the sale of the properties closed on Friday, Aug. 19 for an undisclosed amount.

Republic Services is taking its services to some Tyrone Township residents.

The 25 homeowners in the Shannon Glen subdivision created a special assessment district to consolidate their trash collection and limit the amount of trucks on their road.

"They were concerned about having so many waste haulers using their roads every week so this will limit it to one truck per week," said Tyrone Township Clerk Marcella Husted.

Residents circulated petitions and they re-

ceived the required number of signatures needed to move forward.

"Two public hearings were held and the special assessment roll was prepared against the parcels in the subdivision benefiting from the service," she said.

Of the 34 parcels in the Shannon Glen subdivision, 25 are residential structures and nine are vacant.

The special assessment will last for

10 years. "In the first year residents with residential structures will be assessed \$220 and vacant parcels will be assessed \$0," Husted said. The first year includes legal and administrative costs, she added.

In the second year, residential structures

will be assessed at a lower rate of \$166 and vacant parcels will again, not be assessed.

The residents entered into an agreement with the waste hauler and selected Republic Services as their service provider. "That is not to say people are not good here," he added. "Those I have met have been great. St. John parishioners have a deep faith that is very uplifting for a parish priest. They are intent on taking care of their priests, they rightfully expect a lot from us, but they go out of their way to take care of us."

Copeland said his first challenge is to get a feel for how things are done in the Fenton parish.

"Every parish has a method and rhythm in how it operates and I want to respect that," he said. "That doesn't mean that I won't change things. I want the whole parish to work toward a common vision and to make sure that vision is in line with our Diocese and most of all Jesus' plan for our parish.

"We have a lot of good things going, but we have to make an intentional choice to work together," Copeland said. "We have to balance our budget, while not sacrificing our ability to accomplish our mission.

"Each priest has something he is known for — some are builders, some are known for growing parishes, some excel at bringing harmony to a parish," he said.

## Need a New Roof?

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"I am known for fixing and maintaining parish campuses. I was given a list of things that need repair and have added to that list. I believe in honoring those who sacrificed to build our parish and I am determined to leave it in better shape than when I arrived."

Copeland said he and his pastoral team are working on improving people's experience of weekend Masses.

Mass, but be engaged in celebrating Mass," Copeland said. "Music should not only be of good quality, it needs to encourage everyone to sing. Preaching should challenge, affirm and lead to some expression of faith in each person. Above all, we need to be family friendly.

"My first pastorate was in a small inner city parish that had almost no children," Copeland said. "The first time I heard a baby scream I was almost moved to tears in gratitude. In such a large parish we lose the sense of family and start to see ourselves as an 'operation.'

"It is impossible to know everyone, but it is not impossible to love each other and work toward a shared vision," said Copeland.

Copeland said he taught religion part time at Powers Catholic High School for two years, and then was appointed pastor at St. Mary on the east side of Flint.

He was then assigned to St. Pius X parish where he remained for almost a decade.

Copeland describes himself an "introvert by nature" and can seem distant because of it.

"I am told I have a dry sense of humor and can be considered sarcastic at times," he said.

Copeland has three dogs. Lulu is a Portuguese water dog. Lana is a Labradoodle, and Ally is "a very destructive and so expensive Portuguese water dog puppy.

He said jokingly that he follows the old school hierarchy of rectory living where the pastor's dogs outrank the associate pastor.

## A bittersweet goodbye

Sweet Variations closes its doors on Dibbleville: to reopen in Fenton Township

tjagielo@tctimes.com; 810-433-6795 Fenton — When Carol Schuler began selling chocolate from her Dibbleville shop, Ronald Reagan had recently been sworn in as President.

But, 34 years later, on Tuesday, Aug. 23, she closed those doors for good and started the next chapter of her business in Fenton Township, near Sagebrush Cantina.

Last week, everything but the display cases with select chocolate items were packed into boxes. That Friday, friends, family and volunteers began the process of moving everything out of her Dibbleville location.

Work on her new location has been ongoing and she anticipates a Sept. 1 opening date.

On Wednesday, Aug. 24, professional movers were used to move the bulk of the equipment and shelving.

Back in early April, Schuler first announced that sometime this year she was closing the doors to her chocolate and candy shop in downtown Dibbleville.

Schuler said she decided to leave Dib-

bleville when a new landlord took away much of her space. While she still had a storefront, the back-of-the-store storage and work area had to be moved to the basement.

The new shop is all on one floor and offers double the space Schuler had before. The parking at her new location is also

better and will include handicap accessible spaces.

"It's the last big event before they go back to school," said Miller. "It's a great event for the community so that they can come together one last time before fall hits."

While there are grandstand events, carnival rides and a beer tent, the fair at its core is about horticulture and farm animals. The goal of the events is to raise awareness and educate the public about where their food comes from. Miller said now more than ever, people are interested in learning about this.

Miller said Michigan is number two in agricultural production. ## Fenton historians share a lifetime of collections

Now 80, Ken and Donna Seger try to downsize their home with annual garage sale

news@tctimes.com; 810-629-8282 **Fenton** — Where else can you find a cranberry picker, sheep's wool brush, Bill and Hillary Clinton masks and flashing Lyndon B. Johnson 1964 presidential campaign buttons, all for sale in one place?

Fenton historians Ken and Donna Seger sold many of those items and more at their annual August garage sale this weekend, hoping that some of the public would take home some of their historical treasures.

"We sold over \$1,000 worth of items before we even opened, because Ken contacted some of his collector friends," said Donna.

BB guns, vintage clothing, political items, sporting goods and World War II items were all part of the collectibles on sale for just pennies on the dollar. Many of the items have been found by the Segers on their own garage sale jaunts.

"We used to get some really good deals," said Donna. "I told Ken he can't go to any more garage sales this year until we get rid of some of this. We've got 11 rooms full of stuff. We both turned 80 this year and decided we can't leave this all for our kids to clean up."

Curators of the A.J. Phillips Museum in Fenton, the Segers live in an historic home that is almost a residential museum itself. Their home was built in 1842 by Judge Robert LeRoy for his daughter, Caroline, and houses many historical items that the couple has enjoyed collect-

ing for the past 48 years. "Now it's time to start getting rid of things," said Donna.

She's enjoying watching buyers snatch up good deals and taking home items that have brought the couple much joy over the years. "We sold a very pretty, ornate

1880s-era mantel clock," she said. For the buyers, looking at Fenton's history through these long-collected

items is an experience all its own. "It's the thrill of the hunt," said Martha Hyypio-Irwin, 62, who was looking for unique, specialty gift items and things a local family might use for their five foster kids. She ended up buying a mailbox to replace her broken one at home.

Ken and Donna relaxed on lawn chairs in their yard, watching friends, neighbors and other garage-salers go through their lifetime

of collectibles. "We keep saying this will be our last sale, but every August we pull out our boxes and go through our house for items to sell, and do it again," she said.

Donna added that she keeps asking herself how did they get to this age and how did everything accumulate so quickly? "One day, you're 50, and then you're 80," she said.

Walmart, closed its doors on June 26 of this year. The company, Bob Evans Farms, Inc. cited low performance as the reason for closing 27 of its restaurants nationwide.

The Fenton restaurant, located at 3600 Owen Road, opened in 2003.

Last week, Ruby Tuesday announced that it plans to close 95 of its 724 restaurants by September as it tries to cut costs and stem losses.

The Fenton restaurant, at 19005 Silver Parkway,

was one of those closed. It opened in 2001. The doors are now locked, windows boarded, and the sign is down.

According to freep.com, the company says it has been losing money because of increased competition and a decline in consumer spending on

other partners for the properties," said Hughes last week. "We don't have any specific plans or renderings that can be released at this time.

'We feel very optimistic about opportunities in the city," said Hughes. "We're excited about the new acquisitions but don't have more information at this time."

According to city of Fenton records, all taxes and utility bills due on the properties were paid and posted on Monday, Aug. 22.

The properties in question were purchased by LaJoice prior to his being charged with embezzling \$20 million from the Clarkston Brandon Community Credit Union (now Michigan State University Federal Credit Union), where he worked as chief financial officer. His case is currently moving through the Oakland County and federal court systems.

The SkyPoint purchases do not include the multi-million dollar Tyrone Township home owned by LaJoice and his wife, Ashleigh.

SkyPoint Ventures is also responsible for the purchase last year of the old bean company building, which has been completely restored and currently houses Red Fox Outfitters.

Earlier this spring, at a special meeting of the Fenton Downtown Development Authority (DDA), it was revealed that a three-story development, much like the Cornerstone building, will be constructed on the old Action Auto site, at Silver Lake Road and North LeRoy Street.

Hughes displayed conceptual drawings showing what the mixed-use building might look like.

Because the site was in the past used as a gas station and auto repair facility, environmental cleanup was required, and has been completed.

Hughes said the original project was

#### AUG. 28

1996: After four years of separation, Charles, Prince of Wales and heir to the British throne, and his wife, Princess Diana, formally divorce. On July 29, 1981, nearly one billion television viewers in 74 countries tuned in to witness the marriage in a grand ceremony at St. Paul's Cathedral in the presence of 2,650 guests. Their first child, Prince William, was born in 1982, and their second, Prince Harry, in 1984. On Aug. 31, 1997, she was killed with her companion, Dodi Fayed, in a car accident in Paris.

#### AUG. 29

2005: Hurricane Katrina makes landfall near New Orleans, Louisiana, as a Category 4 hurricane. Despite being only the third most powerful storm of the 2005 hurricane season, Katrina was the worst natural disaster in the history of the United States.

#### AUG. 30

2003: Actor Charles Bronson, best known for his tough-guy roles in such films as The Dirty Dozen and the Death Wish franchise, dies at the age of 81 in Los Angeles.

#### AUG. 31

1888: Prostitute Mary Ann Nichols, the first victim of London serial killer 'Jack the Ripper," is found murdered and mutilated in Whitechapel's Buck's Row. The East End of London saw four more victims of the murderer during the next few months, but no suspect was ever found. As the women rapidly bled to death, the killer would then brutally mutilate them with the same 6-inch knife.

#### SEPT. 1

1983: Soviet jet fighters intercept a Korean Airlines passenger flight in Russian airspace and shoot the plane down, killing 269 passengers and crewmembers. The incident dramatically increased tensions between the Soviet Union and the United States. On Sept. 1, 1983, Korean Airlines (KAL) flight 007 was on the last leg of a flight from New York City to Seoul, with a stopover in Anchorage, Alaska. As it approached its final destination, the plane began to veer far off its normal course. In just a short time, the plane flew into Russian air space. The Soviets sent two fighter jets to intercept the plane. They tried to make contact with the passenger jet. Failing to receive a response, one of the fighters fired a heat-seeking missile. KAL 007 was hit and plummeted into the Sea of Japan. All 269 people on board were killed.

#### SEPT. 2

1969: America's first automatic teller machine (ATM) makes its public debut, dispensing cash to customers at Chemical Bank in Rockville Center, New York. ATMs went on to revolutionize the banking industry, eliminating the need to visit a bank to conduct basic financial transactions. By the 1980s, these money machines had become widely popular and handled many of the functions previously performed by human tellers.

#### SEPT. 3

**1914**: Barely a month after the outbreak of World War I, Giacomo della Chiesa is elected to the papacy of the Roman Catholic Church, becoming Pope Benedict XV. An aristocratic native of Genoa, Italy, who had served as a cardinal since the previous May, Benedict succeeded Pius X, who died on Aug. 20, 1914.
